

# Yard flooded for four years

Last week's severe storm which flooded many downstate streets, homes, and yards didn't disturb Dorothy Scott of East Street, Harrington. The 62-year-old Scott is used to it. Her yard has been flooded for the past four years.

It all began four years ago when the Division of Highways widened and blacktopped East Street. Since that time Scott's back yard and the ground on either side of her house have been flooded.

Diane Reed, Scott's daughter, who

lives next door, said the Division of Highways filled in a drainage ditch that had been in front of her house, and covered a drain that had been in front of her mother's house. A curbstone which was laid stops the floodwater from flowing to a drainage ditch farther down East Street.

"The city says the state has to fix it, and the state says the city has to fix it," Reed said.

"I've called everybody. I've called Bobby Quillen, Governor du Pont's office, Senator Biden's office, the Red Cross, and the Board of Health. I hope

someone does something," she added.

Scott, a resident of Harrington for 35 years, lives with her 21-year-old son Billy.

Because she has asthma and fears further health problems, she spends many days and nights at her daughter's home.

Wooden steps leading to the front and back entrances have collapsed, Scott said.

The oil deliveryman and the electric meter reader have to don boots when they service Scott's house.

"You should have seen my oil man. He didn't have his boots last time. He had to wade through the water. The poor man was soaked," Scott said.

"We used to have picnics and family reunions in the yard, but we can't have them anymore. I can't even get to my clothes line," she added.

"The highway people came here last week and said something would be done," Scott said on Friday.

Meanwhile, she waits patiently for the day when she can walk in her yard — without boots.

## Delaware writer creates new hero

Mystery fans all know private eyes Mike Hammer, Sam Spade, Philip Marlowe and Nero Wolfe.

Now meet Ray Martin — Bodyguard! Ray Martin is the brainchild of writer Richard Reinsmith of New Castle. Reinsmith thought the time was ripe for a switch from the hackneyed private eye to a new type of hero.

"I didn't think a bodyguard as hero had been done before," said Reinsmith, "and neither did my editors. I just thought the average reader would be looking for something new."

And they apparently were. Reinsmith introduced Ray Martin to readers in 1980 in a paperback original entitled "Bury the Past." The reader response was excellent. Reinsmith got back to his typewriter and quickly pounded out two more novels in the Ray Martin series, "The Blonde Target" and "An Extra Body."

The 53-year-old Reinsmith has written 38 novels and over 800 short stories and articles. His prolific literary output ranges from men's magazine and science-fiction to mysteries and gothics. Reinsmith collaborated with his wife Madeline on the gothics which were published under the pen name Diana Tower.

Although he still writes an occasional short story for Mike Shayne Mystery Magazine, Reinsmith now concentrates mainly on his novels.

"I eventually told myself I had to get out of the short story business. I wasn't building a name or readership," Reinsmith said, "With novels, you get a following, and those who like you will read all your books."

Reinsmith is a tall, bespectacled man with a ready smile and a modest, unassuming manner. He could easily pass as a bank clerk, a head librarian, a psychological counselor, or your friendly insurance adjuster.

When told that he doesn't look like a guy who writes mysteries, he laughed. "I've been told that. I don't know what a mystery writer is supposed to look like."

Reinsmith attended P.S. du Pont High and Goldey Business School. Since he was a "Shy sort of guy," he began writing as a high school senior to occupy himself. It wasn't long before a science-fiction magazine called "Fantastic Universe" bought a short story and paid him \$20. Reinsmith was on his way. But it would be many years before he could earn enough money to

devote full time to his writing.

Reinsmith saw action in Korea, where he was decorated three times. After Korea, he married and became the father of three children.

To support his family, he worked as a chemical operator for Diamond Shamrock, all the while writing in his spare time.

About ten years ago he started earning enough money from his literary endeavors to enable him to say goodbye to the chemical company.

"The money is in the reprint rights. My agent offers my published stuff to different countries," Reinsmith said.

A German publisher bought the rights to his novel "Red Lion" and reprinted it as "Sandra." A Danish publisher bought the rights to one of his Mike Shayne short stories.

"That's the best money-making source for my type of writer — the overseas market," he added.

In his novel, "The Five and Dime Murders," which is his own personal favorite among all his books, Reinsmith draws upon his combat experiences in Korea.

Reinsmith has written nine novels so far in the Ray Martin series. The first three were published by Tower Publications. When that company went bankrupt, Reinsmith signed a contract with Dorchester, which has published the other novels in the series.

Others in the Ray Martin series are: "Somebody to Kill," "A Body for Christmas," which was dedicated to Al Cartwright, former sports editor of the Wilmington News-Journal and one of the nation's top sports writers before his semi-retirement; "The Model Body," which was published in February and is now on the stands; and three to be published later in the year, "A Body in Paradise," "Nobody's Perfect," and "Too Many Bodies."

The cover of the first book in the series tells us "Ray Martin — Bodyguard is fast with his fists and handy with a gun. As for women, he can take them or leave them — and usually does both!"

Reinsmith, Martin's creator, said, "I can see James Garner playing the role, without hair-dye. Ray Martin has a touch of gray."

Don't be surprised if next year's television slogan is: "Move over Magnum, P.I., move over Mike Hammer. Make room for Ray Martin — Bodyguard!"

## Senator Roth announces dredging funds for Bowers

WASHINGTON - A project to remove potentially dangerous shoals from the entrance channel to Bowers Beach will go forward this spring, Senator William V. Roth, Jr., R-Del. has announced. The dredging of the Murderkill River entrance channel was in jeopardy because of a shortage of funding.

As in the past years, money for the dredging was requested by the Army Corps of Engineers in Philadelphia but

was deleted by the Corps headquarters in Washington. Roth contacted Lieutenant Colonel Roger Baldwin, District Engineer for the Philadelphia District, to see if alternative funding could be found. Through innovative contracting and money saved on other projects by the Corps, Philadelphia District officials were able to supply enough funds to complete the dredging.

This is the second time within two years that funding for the dredging has

been in question. In 1982, Roth personally contacted Army Secretary John O. Marsh.

Charter boat operators as well as recreation boaters have been reporting the existence of a dangerous shoal since last fall. At low tide, the bar could effectively block entrance to Bowers Beach.

"I'm relieved that the dredging will begin as early as May, in light of the

inconvenience and safety problems that the shoals could create if they are not removed," Roth said. "During the late spring and through the summer, headboat operators carry thousands of

bay fishermen each week. The two state-operated boat ramps at Bowers are heavily relied upon by Delaware boaters. I commend the Philadelphia Corps officials for their efficiency in dealing with this problem."

## Winchell files for Sheriff's Office

DOVER - Richard "Dick" Winchell wants to be the next County Sheriff. "I like the job. I've been a deputy since 1979, and I feel I have the know-how to make it work," said Winchell.

Dick Winchell first came to Dover in 1952 from Boston...via the U.S. Air Force. He retired as a Tech/Sergeant in 1969 and stayed in Dover. While here he met and married Theresa Donohue of Massey, MD. She was a teacher in the Smyrna School District at the time. They have two children... James Paul and Maria.

Winchell feels he can bring his administrative skills to the Sheriff's Office, "...which will benefit the taxpayers of the county". Winchell said that since he has been a Deputy Sheriff with the cooperation of Sheriff George Dill and former Sheriff George Hill as well as the office staff "...we have instituted a new filing system, improved the docket system, and we are working to improve records management". Winchell admits that he still sees the office as a real challenge. "This was my first impression....and I still hold to it. I think we need a data bank if we want to statistically know why certain things cost what they do (in the office)".

Right from the first time he landed in Dover, Winchell has been involved in the community. While in the service and upon his arrival, he became a member of the Dover Jaycees and later became the president of the Dover Chapter. Following his discharge from the Air Force, he became involved in scouting. He is the former Kent County Scout Executive where he raised money for scouts, organized troops, and worked with the adult leaders. He spent one short stint in Virginia as Scout Executive and Director of Camping at Camp Shenandoah near Staunton, Va.

Following his return from Virginia, he became a realtor and had his own firm called Continental Realty. He is a member of the Camden-Wyoming Fire Co., where he has served as Secretary-Treasurer, former president, and member of the Board of Directors. Presently he serves as a member of the Fire Police. He has served as the County and State Training Officer. He currently serves as President of County Association and has developed a 30-hour training program. He is also a member of the Camden-Wyoming Rotary Club where he has served a number of years as Secretary-Treasurer. He presently serves on Senator Biden's County Advisory

Committee, a past Vice-Chairman of the 32nd District where he remains a member of the committee.

The Kent County Sheriff's Office has an annual budget of \$80,000. "We are very cost conscious in the office, but I believe we need 3 full time deputies. We need to do this without increasing the budget....that much", Winchell said. "The reason behind this", he said, "was from a safety and liability standpoint. Sometimes we need a back-up particularly when you have to levy sometimes on a person's property. It can get a little touchy", he added.

Winchell said he also favors hand gun training for deputies with re-qualifying each year. "We are law enforcement officers, but we are not police officers. We don't need police training, but nevertheless we are sometimes called in to back up the police. So...it is necessary from the liability viewpoint", he concluded.

"I think deputies need to be merited, because we are finding that it takes a while for a deputy to get the handle for things and know how to makes a fully civil execution", Winchell said. He also feels that "...maybe 20 years down the road the County will go to a County-wide police force". If this be the case, Winchell said "...I think the Sheriff's Office would be a good training ground".

Currently, the Sheriff's Office is conducting a drug abuse program implemented through civic groups in communities by working with parents.

## Felton serviceman part of space program

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. - The adage "the sky's the limit" has taken on a new meaning for today's aviation pathfinders exploring a frontier that has no barriers or boundaries — where the "limit" is measured only by man's abilities and the "sky" is called space.

Air Force Staff Sgt. Arthur T. Ware Jr. of Felton, and other men and women assigned to the Eastern Space and Missile Center, continue the exploration and development of the space frontiers first pioneered by astronaut Alan B. Sheppard, Jr. aboard the spacecraft Freedom 7, in May 1961.

Ware, son of Arthur T. and Joann Ware Felton, was only 4 years old when Sheppard made his historic flight. Today he is an air traffic control operator at Patrick Air Force Base, Fla.

"We provide air traffic control to NASA and Federal Aviation Administration aircraft on the day of the launch and landing," said Ware.

Since Alan Sheppard rocketed into the history books as America's first man in space, the U.S. has become the frontrunner in space exploration with the world's only manned moon landings and is now preparing for further space exploration with the only "reusable" spacecraft on earth, the Space Transportation System (STS) "space shuttle."

"The most interesting part of the shuttle program, for me, is not the technical aspect but the feeling I get during lift-off. Watching it in person, I actually hear the rumble of the engines and feel the vibrations," Ware said. "The best part of the launch is when the shuttle rolls 90 degrees right after it takes off. To see that in person makes you appreciate the awesome spectacle it really is."

"Our space program has brought about numerous advances in various fields, such as medicine, food processing and aerodynamics," Ware continued. "It has increased the field of

science and has provided many benefits to mankind. I feel it's in our best interest to pursue this program to the utmost of our ability."

Where the "limit" will be on further space exploration is anyone's guess, but for the men and women involved with the space program, and more importantly the space shuttle, man will be limited only by his imagination and technological expertise.

"I think there will be significant advances in the design of spacecraft by the year 2000," said Ware. "They will be based on the design of today's shuttle, but the craft will be larger and the propulsion will be self-contained. I don't see individual passenger travel in the near future, however," he concluded.

Ware is a 1975 graduate of Lake Forest High School.



# Police Beat

Detectives at Troop 2 have arrested a thirty-three year old Middletown man in connection with the March 16 kidnap and sexual assault on a Newark area woman. William H. Brown, of 211 North Catherine Street, Middletown, is currently at Gander Hill in lieu of \$20,000.00 secured bond. He is charged with attempted rape first degree and kidnap first degree. Brown was arrested at Troop 2 on March 22nd. Investigators were led to Brown from the description and partial tag number of the suspect vehicle supplied by the twenty-nine year old victim. The vehicle was traced to the defendant's brother who acknowledged lending the vehicle to his brother on the day of the crime.

Brown picked up the victim in a Datsun in the Fairwinds area of U.S. route 40. The victim, who was soliciting a ride to work, voluntarily entered the vehicle. She was driven to a secluded wooded area of Kirkwood on state route 71 and forced to disrobe. The suspect attempted sexual intercourse and when the victim resisted, committed various other sexual acts on

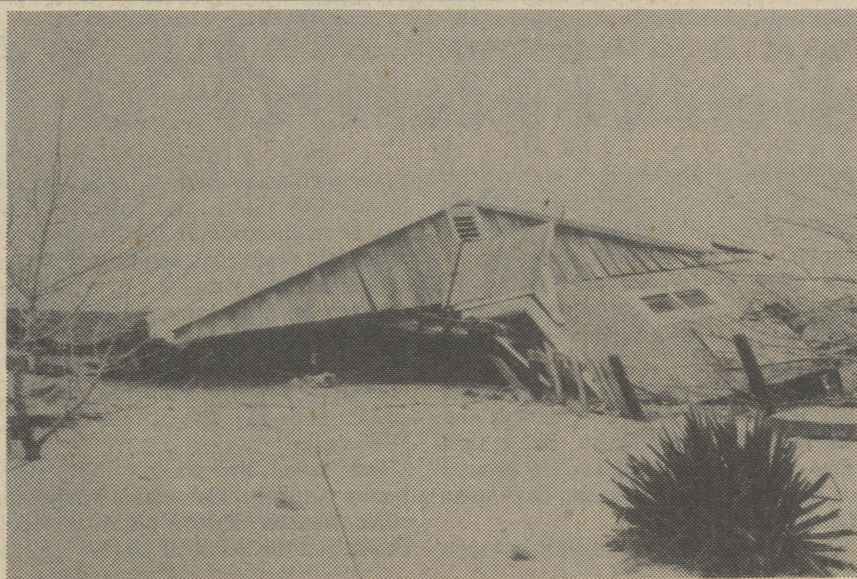
her. The suspect subsequently released the victim in the area of route 71 and route 896.

Brown, an unemployed laborer, was arraigned at Court #11 and is awaiting a preliminary hearing at a later date.



nounced dead. She had broken ribs and internal injuries. Adams was transported to Nanticoke Hospital where she was treated and released for a minor back injury and contusions.

A seventeen-year-old Georgetown girl was raped after she and her sister agreed to sit in a parked car following a dance at the Shriner's Club on county route 319, east of Georgetown.

On Sunday, March 18 at approximately 2:00 a.m., the victim and her older sister agreed to sit in a parked car at the Shriner's Club. The victim's sister left the car and went back into the club. The defendant and another subject drove away with the victim and parked in a secluded area. The defendant punched the victim in the face and threatened to shoot her if she did not agree to engage in sex with both subjects. The unidentified subject attempted to rape the victim but was unsuccessful. He traded places with the defendant who again threatened the victim and coerced her into compliance. Afterward, the defendant drove the victim to her residence north of Georgetown and released her.

The victim reported the rape on Thursday, March 22, 1984. The defendant, Lonnie R. Hilliard was arrested for rape first, conspiracy first and terroristic threatening on Friday, March 23 and committed to Sussex Correctional Institute in default of \$30,500 secured bond.

The police are still searching for the second subject.

John C. Barnes, 75, of Salisbury, MD was the sole occupant of a 1982 Oldsmobile traveling westbound on state route 24 on Tuesday. Norma J.

Hitchens, 35, of Millsboro, DE was the sole occupant of a 1977 Dodge traveling eastbound on state route 24 in a blind curve. The Barnes vehicle crossed the double yellow line into the path of the Hitchens vehicle, striking it head-on. The Barnes vehicle came to rest in the eastbound lane. The Hitchens vehicle was knocked backwards 20 feet. Barnes was taken to Nanticoke Hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival at 5:00 p.m. of multiple blunt force trauma. Hitchens was transported to Beebe Hospital where she was pronounced dead on arrival at 5:20 p.m. of massive head injuries.

The death of these two drivers brings Delaware's fatal count to 15 for the same period this time last year.

Troop 4 in Georgetown reports the arrest of Ricky A. Johnson, 22, following his involvement in a domestic dispute with Stanford P. Drummond, 30, both of Lincoln.

On Monday, March 26, 1984, approximately 5:10 p.m., in the Greentop settlement south of Lincoln, Drummond became engaged in a domestic dispute with family members of Johnson. One of the family members ran to the home of Johnson to solicit his assistance. As Johnson left his house, he saw Drummond crossing Johnson's yard. Because of an alleged gesture made by Drummond, Johnson believed Drummond was going to shoot him. Johnson fired four shots at Drummond with a pistol. Drummond was struck in the back by two shots and transported to the Milford Hospital and admitted in critical condition to the intensive care unit. Johnson was arrested and committed to Sussex Correctional Institute in default of \$30,000.00 secured bond.

## House vote commends Jaycees for food distribution program

The State House of Representatives on March 14th introduced a resolution commending the Delaware Jaycees and Jaycee Women for their volunteer work in organizing the Federal Surplus Food Distribution Program. The program was begun in mid-February.

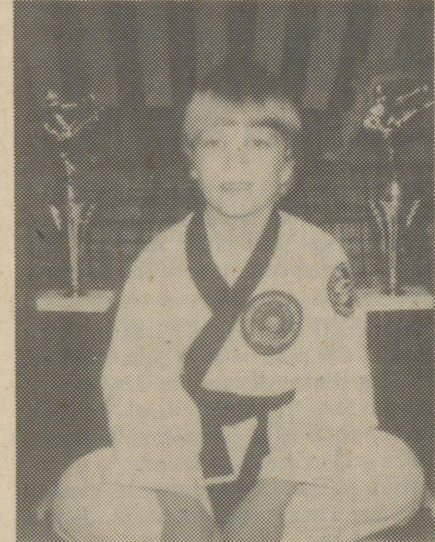

## How & Why - St. Stephen's

Stephen was the Chief of the seven deacons appointed by the Apostles. He was a Greek convert - with very strong faith and he was blessed with a fine gift of oratory. He became the first Christian Martyr. Stephen was a very religious man and a man with vision far ahead of his time. He was brilliant. Most of the Apostles at that time still thought that Jesus had planned to preach a new form of Jewish religion. They had not given much thought to peoples from other areas and cultures. However, Stephen was gifted with great vision. He looked further than to the restrictions of a single race - for he had been blessed with the secret of Jesus, that is, spreading teachings among all the nations and, finally, a possible merging of all religions into one. He was brave, eloquent and attractive, but most of all, he was filled with compassion, for the underprivileged, the poor and needy, and the unworkable.

His great plan was to preach to those of higher rank, first, in the great temples, trying to imbue them with a faith which would encompass all their fellow men - thereby spreading the word of helping others and, in general, doing good works for all.

Stephen's numerous miracles were attuned to his credo, and those who followed his teachings grew rapidly in number and news of his beneficence to all races and cultures and creeds grew and spread. Sadly, though, it was this popularity and acceptance of his philosophy which brought an end to the life of this devout and kindly man - at the

hands of the High Council of the Sanhedrin, or more accurately, by the mobs aroused by the trials held by the Council with its witnesses of perjury against Stephen. His death has been reckoned to have been about 37 A.D. He was the First Christian Martyr! But - Stephen's spirit did not die - instead, it grew! And, so his name, St. Stephen has become synonymous with mankind in times of personal need and suffering and, when he most devoutly sought empathy from a source far higher than he had at hand. As we reflect on this briefly put background on the meaning of a "name", we should feel a serene sense of pride, and even some "awe" because we have been granted the privilege of furthering the significance of the name St. Stephen and those creeds for which it stands.

With these thoughts in mind, we may be better able to understand the depth of prouidness with which three gentlemen from the Harrington area, in the Year 1888, on the 5th Day of February, directed a most touching letter to - (and I quote) -

Harrington, Delaware

February 5th, 1888  
TO: The Right Reverend Bishop Potter OF: The State of New York.

We, the undersigned citizens [Previously] of the State of New York and also contributors of the Episcopal Church in the various parishes of State, beg leave to represent, that having removed our families to the vicinity of Harrington, Delaware, for

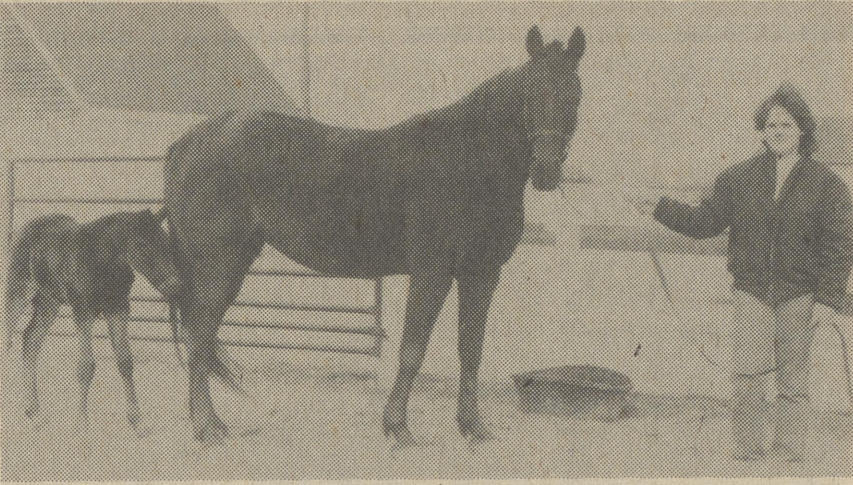

## DE Trout season opens

The 1984 Delaware trout fishing season will begin at 7:30 a.m. on April 7.

Due to the closure in 1983 of the federal hatchery that formerly supplied most of Delaware's trout, the stocking program had to be cut back this year. Nearly all of the fish will be purchased from private hatcheries using revenue from the sale of Delaware trout stamps. There should be ample fish for all since a total of 16,650 10-inch long rainbow and brown trout and 250 trophy size rainbow were stocked in Delaware's seven trout streams this spring. There will be some holdover rainbow trout still in the stream from last fall's bonus stocking of 8-inch fish. The streams stocked this spring include:

- 1) White Clay Creek from the dam at Curtis Paper to the Pennsylvania line;
- 2) Red Clay Creek from the concrete bridge above Yorklyn to the Pennsylvania line;
- 3) Mill Creek from Brackenville Road to Route 7;
- 4) Pike Creek from Route 72 to Henderson Rd.;
- 5) Christina Creek from the Maryland line through Rittenhouse Park;
- 6) Wilsons Run from Route 92 through Brandywine Creek State Park.

These designated areas are now closed to all fishing until April 7 to allow for stocking. As in previous years, the daily catch limit is six trout. However, in the "fly fishing only" stretch of White Clay Creek (from just above Thompson's Bridge to the Pennsylvania line), the possession limit is four trout. In this special designated area, anglers may hook and release fish provided that they have no more than three in possession.

Anglers should note that most parking along Delaware's trout streams and foot access to the streams is privately controlled, so please be considerate. On opening day weekend, parking will be available in Thomas Marshall's railroad museum parking lot near Red Clay Creek. On Beaver Run, Woodlawn Trustees will open their lot where Beaver Run enters the Brandywine during the month of April. Parking elsewhere at these two streams will put the driver at risk of having his car towed away.

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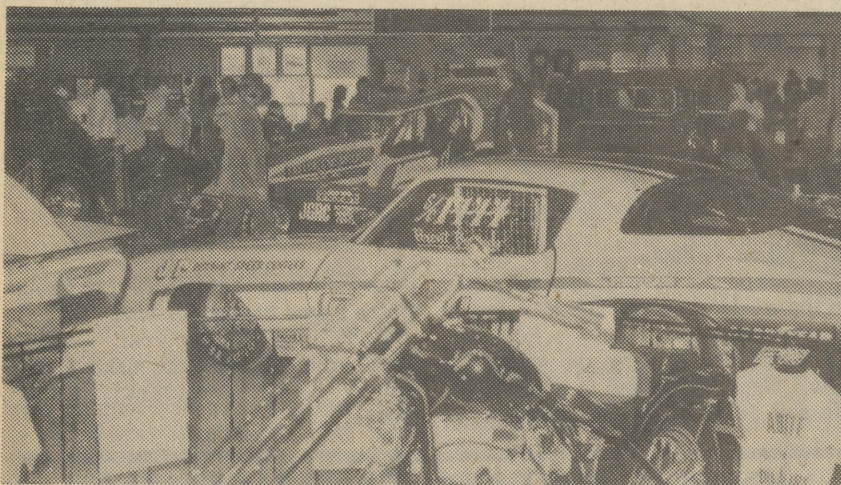
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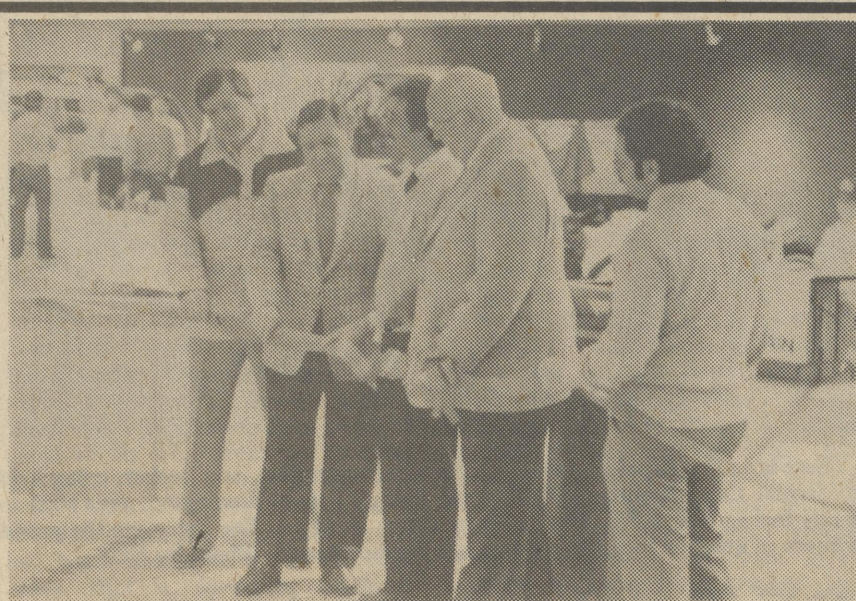

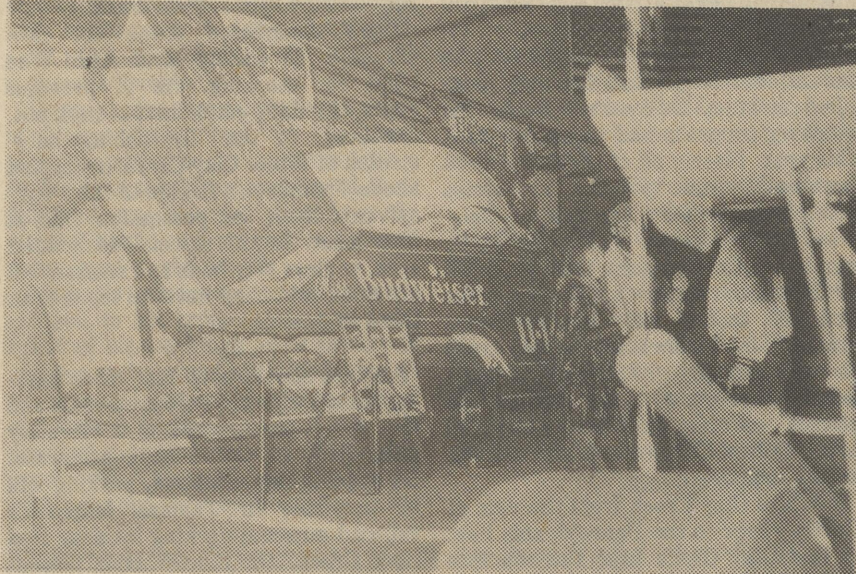

## Motorama '84 big success

Dateline: Salisbury, Maryland Motorama '84 blew into town today and the fans of motorsport and automotive history went wild.

This show, held at the Wicomico Youth and Civic Center, was the first in what fans and participants hope will be a long line of annual motorsports trade shows. From the time the ribbon was cut by the Honorable Paul Martin, mayor of Salisbury, at 5 p.m. Friday, March 30, until the close of the show at 10 p.m. Saturday, March 31st, a total of 13,000 plus people were treated to one of the grandest displays of speed-sport technology ever seen on Delmarva.

Exhibits ran the gamut from custom bikes and street rods to such national favorites as the Skool Late Model Sportsman car driven by Chuck Bown, who was also available for autographs, the Miss Budweiser Hydroplane and the fabulous Ford known as Big Foot. Local drag racing and stock car fans were not disappointed either as they were allowed to examine several of the

new mounts that will be campaigned in the coming season at U.S. 13 Dragway and Speedway.

Thirty-seven vendors dealing in automotive and/or motorsports related merchandise rounded out the show on the main floor with sparkling displays of the finest merchandise their establishments have to offer.

The crowning touch of the event was provided by several local classic car owners. The banquet hall next to the main floor was transformed into a "Walk Through the Ages" of automotive history starting with a beautiful 1912 Ford Speedster and culminating with the "Muscle Cars" of the sixties, such as the Shelby Mustang and Olds 442.

At the close of the show Saturday night, exhibitors, participants, Civic Center manager Frank Byoub and staff and promoters John "The Greek" Theofiles and Charlie Cathell, though pleasantly exhausted, were already making plans for Motorama '85". ## St. Jude Shrine to reopen

BALTIMORE, MD - Renovations are being completed on the nationally famous St. Jude Shrine here, and the Pallottine Fathers and Brothers who operate it hope that work will be finished so that it can be reopened again by April 18.

The red brick classic revival building, which houses the Roman Catholic Shrine, is at 308 North Poca Street in downtown Baltimore.

The Shrine attracts thousands of pilgrims annually mainly from the northeast United States. Most are people who are devoted to St. Jude, known as the saint of the impossible and hopeless. He was one of the twelve Apostles of Jesus Christ.

The Shrine was closed last fall when a routine inspection of the roof showed that there were cracks in the trusses and main supports.

The building which houses the Shrine was originally built as a Baptist Church in 1873. It became St. John the Baptist Church, an Italian national parish in 1917, and the Shrine was established there shortly after the outbreak of World War II in 1941. First it attracted local people with special services called novena services; people pray for a special intention over a period of nine consecutive weeks. These are still held weekly at the Shrine and attract many

people.

When it was discovered that the Shrine roof was in bad condition, the Pallottines closed the building so that repairs could begin.

Father Louis Micca, Pastor of the Shrine, hopes to reopen the Shrine by mid-Holy Week. Those who make pilgrimages to the Shrine are making plans now for 1984 visits.

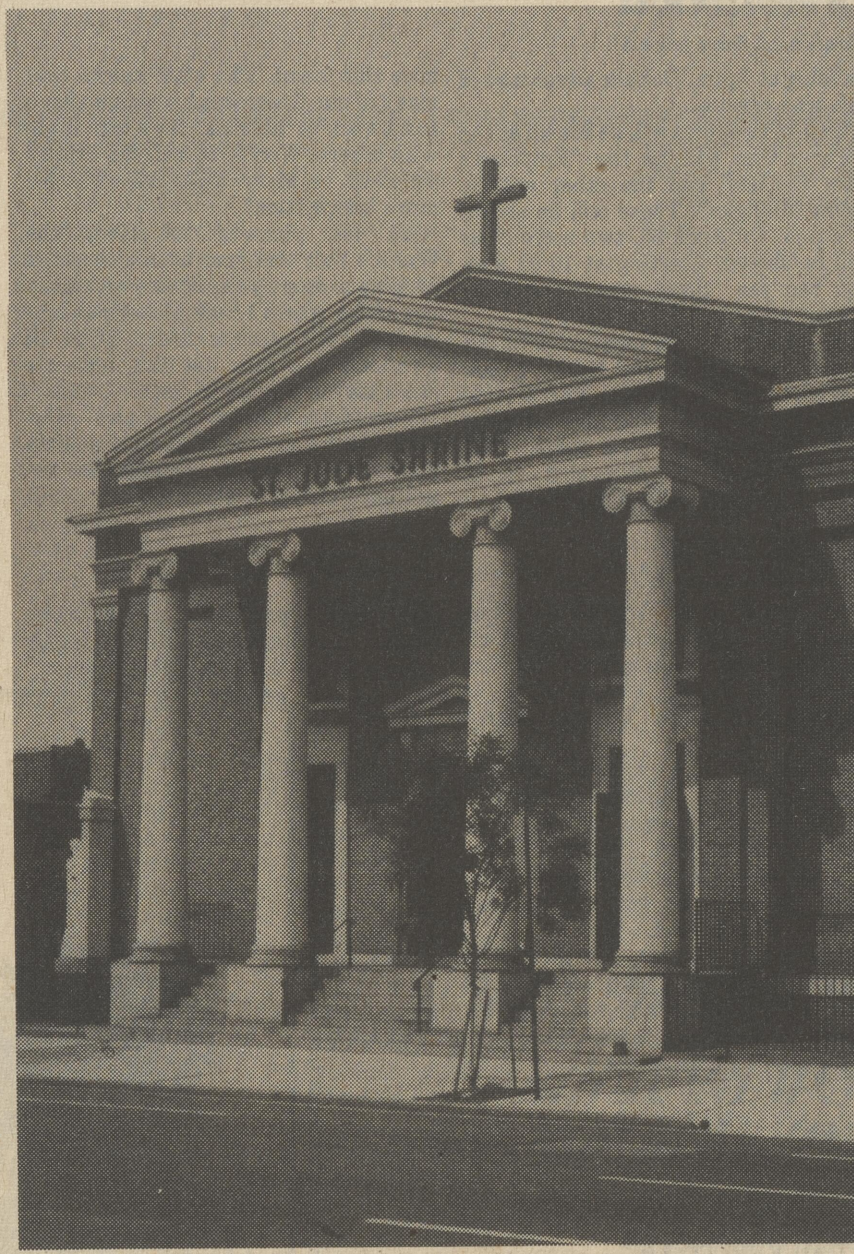
Pilgrims expressed dismay when the Shrine was closed last fall. Mrs. Kate Finger of Brooklyn, N.Y., who plans to come down for her 13th annual trip, said she usually organizes 40-45 women.

"We went to the Inner Harbor last year and we're going back again this year," she said, delighted with the restaurants and waterfront view.

"I've always had a great devotion to St. Jude," said Mrs. Frances Brennan of Wilmington, DE who plans to come down again too.

Mrs. Henry Stadnicki of Shamokin, PA said she is looking forward to visiting again when the work is finished. "My husband has a special devotion to St. Jude," she said. "We plan to come again in the summer."

Father Micca said he hopes the pilgrims will once again plan to visit the Shrine when it is finished next month.

the supposed advancement of our prospects and better enjoyment and health of our families, we are - destitute of a place for public worship, and - all our means being already exhausted, we ask of you your influence for a donation for the purpose of building a chapel at Harrington, Kent County, State of Delaware, and we will ever remain your humble servants.

Signed: Aaron Barlow  
A.B. Barlow  
S.P. Hewes,

(All previously of the town of Hobart, in Delaware County, the State of New York.)

Inasmuch as the above letter, directed to Bishop Potter of the State of New York, in the Year 1868, had brought no reply forthcoming five months later - by Springtime - and these Harrington families were still "men without a church", they took upon themselves the task to make another approach so Episcopal services might be started in Harrington. The same three gentlemen who had addressed their letter to their former Bishop, were deputized by their cohorts, to be a committee, to visit the Reverend J.L. McKim, then Vicar of Christ Church in Milford, Delaware. NOTE: If there had been many sources of appeal open to these three determined gentlemen, none would have been more dedicated toward their cause than was the Reverend John Leighton McKim.

At this meeting, Messrs. Barlows and Hewes, humbly stated to Mr. McKim, the purpose of their visit. They asked - if there were any possible way in which Episcopal services could be held for their group, maybe twice a month, on a Sunday afternoon, in a room they had available in the Harrington public school. While making this request of Mr. McKim, these gentlemen frankly stated that they were financially,

(personally) insolvent, the crops they had planted with such expectations - had not "panned out" due to the poor quality of the land they had purchased. They did earnestly profess their intention to carry on and, if they could prevail upon him to minister to them for a year, without benefit of any contribution from them - they would then (so they hoped) be able to contribute toward the support of a minister. They also reiterated their strong intention to see their plan materialized - a chapel built in Harrington.

Now, it is appropos that we elucidate somewhat regarding the circumstances in this area "round about this period". By looking back - in this manner - we may glean and absorb - more profoundly - the gentle perseverance and adherence toward a goal - the name "ST. STEPHEN" implied centuries ago - yet retains, still, today.

In 1760, a tract of land had been patented (as was custom) by the State Body of Assembly, to a Mr. Benjamin Clark. No official mention is made of this property, until 1810, when a descendant of the original Benjamin Clark erected a hotel - or wayside stop for travellers where they could rest their horses, stay the night and partake of the Inn's table fare. By 1856, the wayside stop was known as "Clark's Corner".

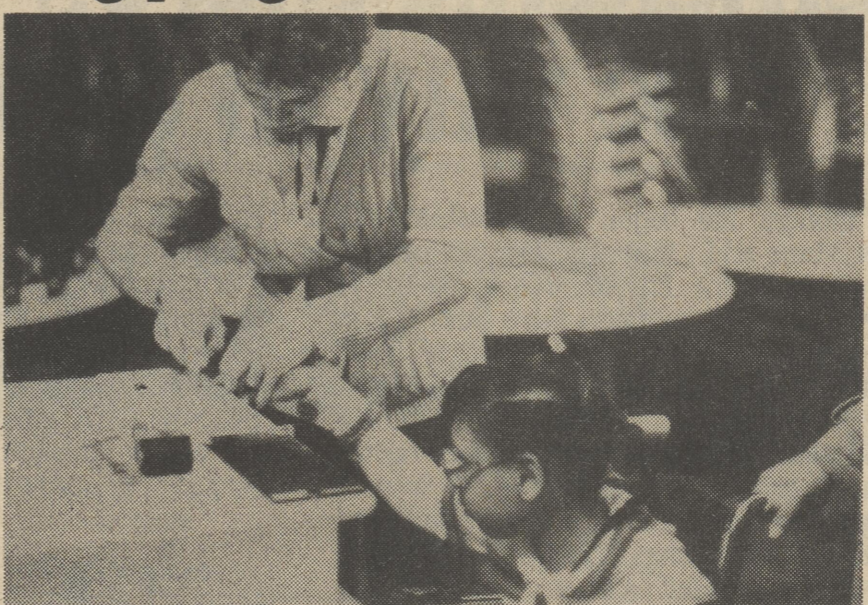

## Educational News

### Large turnout for fingerprinting program

After seven evenings of playing with fingers, the Lake Forest School District finishes up its fingerprinting sessions. State law mandates that school districts must offer the service to all students from preschool to 9th grade. As of this evening, approximately 900 students have been fingerprinted.

Fingerprints were taken for two evenings at North Elementary, and two evenings at South Elementary, two evenings at East Elementary, one evening at the W.T. Chipman Jr. School. The High School students all went to North Elementary the same evenings that North had their prints done. The work was done by volunteers in each community. The volunteers were trained by a group of teachers and community people who had attended a session on fingerprinting conducted by the Delaware State Police.

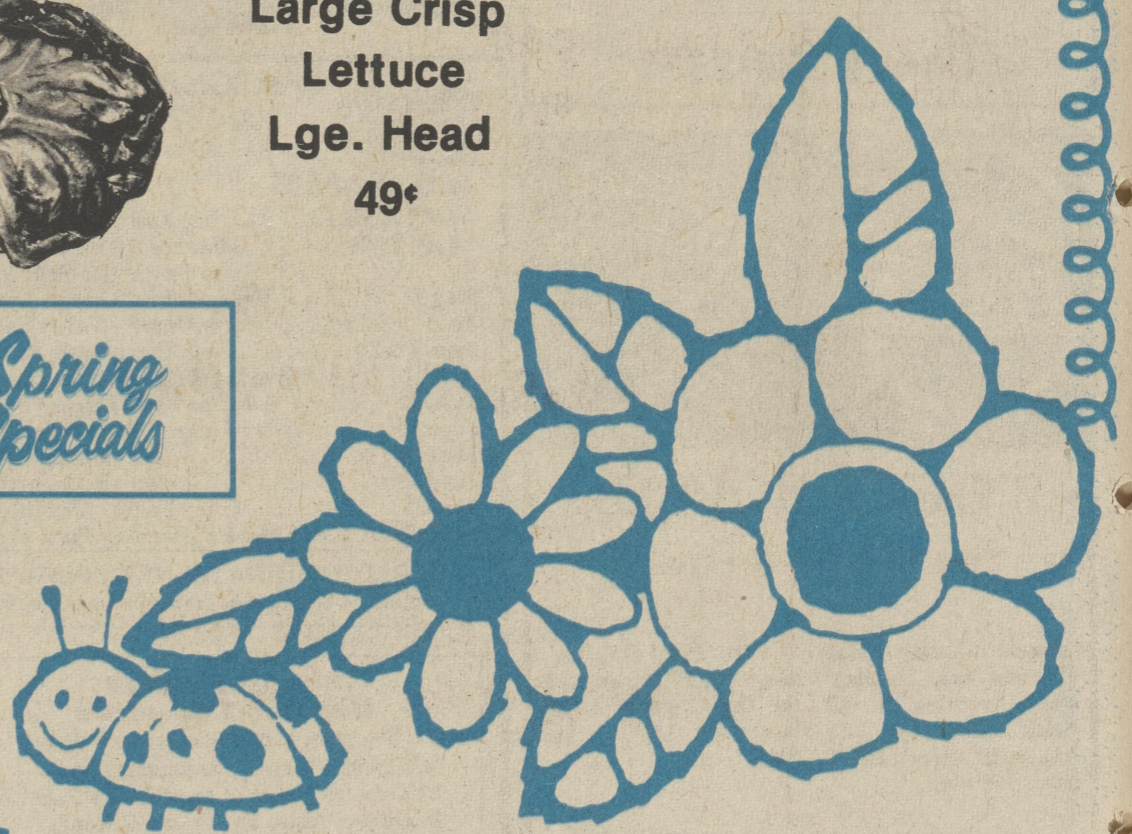
