Winchell files for Sheriff's Office

DOVER - Richard "Dick" Winchell wants to be the next County Sheriff. "I like the job. I've been a deputy since 1979, and I feel I have the know-how to

make it work", said Winchell. Dick Winchell first came to Dover in 1952 from Boston...via the U.S. Air Force. He retired as a Tech/Sergeant in 1969 and stayed in Dover. While here he met and married Theresa Donohue of Massey, MD. She was a teacher in the Smyrna School District at the time. They have two children....

James Paul and Maria. Winchell feels he can bring his administrative skills to the Sheriff's Office, "...which will benefit the taxpayers of the county". Winchell said that since he has been a Deputy Sheriff with the cooperation of Sheriff George Dill and former Sheriff George Hill as well as the office staff "....we have instituted a new filing system, improved the docket system, and we are working to improve records management". Winchell admits that he still sees the office as a real challenge. "This was my first impression....and I still hold to it. I think we need a data bank if we want to statistically know why certain things cost what they do (in the

office)" Right from the first time he landed in Dover, Winchell has been involved in the community. While in the service and upon his arrival, he became a member of the Dover Jaycees and later became the president of the Dover Chapter. Following his discharge from the Air Force, he became involved in scouting. He is the former Kent County Scout Executive where he raised money for scouts, organized troops, and worked with the adult leaders. He spent one short stint in Virginia as Scout Executive and Director of Camping at Camp Shenandoah near Staun-

Following his return from Virginia, he became a realtor and had his own firm called Continental Realty. He is a member of the Camden-Wyoming Fire Co., where he has served as Secretary-Treasurer, former president, and member of the Board of Directors. Presently he serves as a member of the Fire Police. He has served as the County and State Training Officer. He currently serves as President of County Association and has developed a 30-hour training program. He is also a member of the Camden-Wyoming Rotary Club where he has served a number of years as Secretary-Treasurer. He presently serves on Senator Biden's County Advisory

Committee, a past Vice-Chairman of the 32nd District where he remains a member of the committee.

The Kent County Sheriff's Office has an annual budget of \$80,000. "We are very cost conscious in the office, but I believe we need 3 full time deputies. We need to do this without increasing the budget.....that much", Winchell said. "The reason behind this", he said, "was from a safety and liability standpoint. Sometimes we need a back-up particularly when you have to levy sometimes on a person's property. It can get a little touchy", he added.

Winchell said he also favors hand gun training for deputies with re-qualifying each year. "We are law enforcement officers, but we are not police officers. We don't need police training, but nevertheles we are sometimes called in to back up the police. So...it is necessary from the liability viewpoint", he concluded.

"I think deputies need to be merited, because we are finding that it takes a while for a deputy to get the handle fo things and know how to makes a fully civil execution", Winchell said. He also feels that "...maybe 20 years down the road the County will go to a Countywide police force". If this be the case, Winchell said "...I think the Sheriff's Office would be a good training

ground". Currently, the Sheriff's Office is conducting a drug abuse program implemented through civic groups in communities by working with parents.

Delaware writer creates new hero

Mystery fans all know private eyes Mike Hammer, Sam Spade, Philip Marlowe and Nero Wolfe.

Now meet Ray Martin — Bodyguard! Ray Martin is the brainchild of writer Reinsmith thought the time was ripe for a switch from the hackneyed private eye to a new type of hero.

"I didn't think a bodyguard as hero had been done before," said Reinsmith, "and neither did my editors. I just thought the average reader would be looking for something new."

And they apparently were. Reinsmith introduced Ray Martin to readers in 1980 in a paperback original entitled "Bury the Past." The reader response was excellent. Reinsmith got back to his typewriter and quickly pounded out two more novels in the Ray Martin series, "The Blonde Target" and "An Extra Body."

The 53-year-old Reinsmith has written 38 novels and over 800 short stories and articles. His prolific literary output ranges from men's magazine and science-fiction to mysteries and gothics. Reinsmith collaborated with his wife Madeline on the gothics which were published under the pen name Diana Tower.

Although he still writes an occasional short story for Mike Shayne Mystery Magazine, Reinsmith now concentrates mainly on his novels.

"I eventually told myself I had to get out of the short story business. I wasn't building a name or readership," Reinsmith said, "With novels, you get a following, and those who like you will read all your books.

Reinsmith is a tall, bespectacled man with a ready smile and a modest, unassuming manner. He could easily pass as a bank clerk, a head librarian, a psychological counselor, or your friendy insurance adjuster. When told that he doesn't look like a

guy who writes mysteries, he laughed. "I've been told that. I don't know what a mystery writer is supposed to look

Reinsmith attended P.S. du Pont High and Goldey Business School. Since he was a "Shy sort of guy," he began writing as a high school senior to occupy himself. It wasn't long before a science-fiction magazine called "Fantastic Universe" bought a short story and paid him \$20. Reinsmith was on his way. But it would be many years before he could earn enough money to guard!"

Reinsmith saw action in Korea, where he was decorated three times. After Korea, he married and became the father of three children.

To support his family, he worked as a chemical operator for Diamond Shamrock, all the while writing in his spare

About ten years ago he started earning enough money from his literary endeavors to enable him to say goodbye to the chemical company.

The money is in the reprint rights. My agent offers my published stuff to different countries," Reinsmith said. A German publisher bought the rights

to his novel "Red Lion" and reprinted it as "Sandra." A Danish publisher bought the rights to one of his Mike Shayne short stories.

'That's the best money-making source for my type of writer - the overseas market," he added.

In his novel, "The Five and Dime Murders," which is his own personal favorite among all his books, Reinsmith draws upon his combat experiences in

Reinsmith has written nine novels so far in the Ray Martin series. The first three were published by Tower Publications. When that company went bankrupt, Reinsmith signed a contract with Dorchester, which has published the other novels in the series.

Others in the Ray Martin series are: "Somebody to Kill;" "A Body for Christmas," which was dedicated to Al Cartwright, former sports editor of the Wilmington News-Journal and one of the nation's top sports writers before his his semi-retirement; "The Model Body", which was published in February and is now on the stands; and three to be published later in the year, "A Body in Paradise," "Nobody's Perfect," and "Too Many Bodies."

The cover of the first book in the series tells us "Ray Martin - Bodyguard is fast with his fists and handy with a gun. As for women, he can take them or leave them — and usually does

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. - The adage "the sky's the limit" has taken on a new meaning for today's aviation pathfinders exploring a frontier that has no barriers or boundaries — where the "limit" is measured only by man's abilities and the "sky" is called space. Air Force Staff Sgt. Arthur T. Ware Jr. of Felton, and other men and women assigned to the Eastern Space and Missile Center, continue the exploration and development of the space frontiers first pioneered by astronaut Alan B. Sheppard, Jr. aboard the spacecraft Freedom 7, in May 1961. Ware, son of Arthur T. and Joann Ware, Felton, was only 4 years old when Sheppard made his historic flight. science and has provided many benefits to mankind. I feel it's in our best interest to pursue this program to the utmost of our ability.

Where the "limit" will be on further space exploration is anyone's guess, but for the men and women involved with the space program, and more importantly the space shuttle, man will be limited only by his imagination and technological expertise.

"I think there will be significant advances in the design of spacecraft by the year 2000," said Ware. "They will be based on the design of today's shuttle, but the craft will be larger and the propulsion will be self-contained. I don't see individual passenger travel in the near future, however," he conclud-

How & Why - St. Stephen's

by Bessie Austin Burdziak

Stephen was the Chief of the seven deacons appointed by the Apostles. He was a Greek convert - with very strong faith and he was blessed with a fine gift of oratory. He became the first Christian Martyr. Stephen was a very religious man and a man with vision far ahead of his time. He was brilliant. Most of the Apostles at that time still thought that Jesus had planned to preach a new form of Jewish religion. They had not given much thought to peoples from other areas and cultures. However, Stephen was gifted with great vision. He looked further than to the restrictions of a single race - for he had been blessed with the secret of Jesus, that is, spreading teachings among all the nations and, finally, a possible merging of all religions into one. He was brave, eloquent and attractive, but most of all, he was filled with compassion, for the underprivileged, the poor and needy, and the unknowledgeable.

His great plan was to preach to those of higher rank, first, in the great temples, trying to imbue them with a faith which would encompass all their fellow men - thereby spreading the word of helping others and, in general, doing good works for all.

Stephen's numerous miracles were attuned to his credo, and those who followed his teachings grew rapidly in number and news of his beneficence to all races and cultures and creeds grew and spread. Sadly, though, it was this popularity and acceptance of his philosophy which brought an end to the life of this devout and kindly man — at the

hands of the High Council of the Sanhedrin, or more accurately, by the mobs aroused by the trials held by the Council with its witnesses of perjury against Stephen. His death has been reckoned to have been about 37 A.D. He was the First Christian Martyr! But Stephen's spirit did not die - instead, it grew! And, so his name, St. Stephen has become synonomous with mankind in times of personal need and suffering and, when he most devoutly sought empathy from a source far higher than he had at hand. As we reflect on this briefly-put background on the meaning of a "name", we should feel a serene sense of pride, and even some "awe" because we have been granted the privilege of furthering the significance of the name St. Stephen and those creeds for which it stands.

With these thoughts in mind, we may be better able to understand the depth of priousness with which three gentlemen from the Harrington area, in the Year 1868, on the 5th Day of February, directed a most touching letter to -(and I quote) -

Harrington, Delaware February 5th, 1868 TO: The Right Reverend Bishop Potter OF: The State of New York.

We, the undersigned citizens [Previously] of the State of New York and also contributors of the Episcopal Church in the various poarishes of State, beg leave to represent, that having removed our families to the vicinity of Harrington, Delaware, for [Continued on page 9]

DE Trout season opens

federal hatchery that formerly supplied most of Delaware's trout, the stocking program had to be cut back this year. Nearly all of the fish will be purchased from private hatcheries using revenue from the sale of Delaware trout stamps. There should be ample fish for all since a total of 16,650 10-inch long rainbow and brown trout and 250 trophy size rainbow were stocked in Delaware's seven trout streams this spring. There will be some holdover rainbow trout still in the stream from last fall's bonus stocking of 8-inch fish. The streams stocked this spring include:

1) White Clay Creek from the dam at Curtis Paper to the Pennsylvania line; 2) Red Clay Creek from the concrete bridge above Yorklyn to the Pennsylvania line; 3) Mill Creek from Brackenville Road to Route 7; 4) Pike Creek from Route 72 to Henderson Rd.; 5) Christina Creek from the Maryland line through Rittenhouse Park; 6)

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The 1984 Delaware trout fishing Wilsons Run from Route 92 through season will begin at 7:30 a.m. on April Brandywine Creek State Park.

These designated areas are now Due to the closure in 1983 of the closed to all fishing until April 7 to allow for stocking. As in previous years, the daily catch limit is six trout. However, in the "fly fishing only" stretch of White Clay Creek (from just above Thompson's Bridge to the Pennsylvania line), the possession limit is four trout. In this special designated area, anglers may hook and release fish provided that they have no more than three in possession.

> Anglers should note that most parking along Delaware's trout streams and foot access to the streams is privately controlled, so please be considerate. On opening day weekend, parking will be available in Thomas Marshall's railroad museum parking lot near Red Clay Creek. On Beaver Run, Woodlawn Trustees will open their lot where Beaver Run enters the Brandywine during the month of April. Parking elsewhere at these two streams will put the driver at risk of having his car towed away.

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

BALTIMORE, MD - Renovations are being completed on the nationally famous St. Jude Shrine here, and the Pallottine Fathers and Brothers who operate it hope that work will be finished so that it can be reopened again by April 18.

The red brick classic revival building, which houses the Roman Catholic Shrine, is at 308 North Paca Street in downtown Baltimore.

The Shrine attracts thousands of pilgrims annually mainly from the northeast United States. Most are people who are devoted to St. Jude, known as the saint of the impossible and hopeless. He was one of the twelve Apostles of Jesus Christ.



STEPHEN" implied centuries ago yet retains, still, today.

In 1760, a tract of land had been patented (as was custom) by the State Body of Assembly, to a Mr. Benjamin Clark. No official mention is made of this property, until 1810, when a descendant of the original Benjamin Clark erected a hotel - or wayside stop for travellers where they could rest their horses, stay the night and partake of the Inn's table fare. By 1856, the wayside stop was known as "Clark's Corner".
