### Council hears drainage woes

Water woes that have plagued sections of Harrington bringing flooded worse and it does not take a heavy rain The Council, how tions of Harrington bringing flooded streets and yards spilled over into City Council chambers Monday night as two residents brought complaints. The two, Donald West and Mrs. F. Nelson Melvin, reside on Second Avenue, virtually in City Hall's back yard. The drainage problem which brought on their complaints has been aggravated by heavy spring rains. But, they say, it is by no means a new situation.

West said he has asked the council for the past year and a half to do something about the water which backs up in the street and flows over the curb into his yard. It gets so deep, he contends, that the blades of a fan on his heat pump splash water into the vents on his heating system.

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Melvin said the drainage problem has persisted for much longer than a year for water to back up over the curb and into the yard. She gets water "...from five directions". It gets so bad that it flows under the house with a roar that sounds like a river. That keeps her awake at night, and she worries about damage to her home's concrete founda-

### The First National Bank of Harrington celebrates name change

the beginning, monies were brought to HARRINGTON - The first bank for the druggist Will Sharp, who in turn carried the money of the community to Milford for deposit in that bank. In 1888, the community of Harrington begun construction of its own bank. In the early years, business of banking was handled rather crudely and the bank surroundings and furnishings were crude as well. There was no running water in the original building. The building was believed to have been heated by a pot bellied stove. Probably open briefly each day, for most of the people who manned the bank had other jobs as merchants or clerks.

It was a slow pace, much the the community grew....and at one point in the early '20s and later, the community flourished. In 1922, the rst National Bank of Harrington relocated to its present location, and growth for awhile. The depression and WWII were major setbacks, but after the war, more businesses sprang up. At one point, there were three new automobile dealerships and as many as five grocery stores. The First National Bank of Harrington was responsible for a major part of the growth of commerce in the community.

The JCPenney National Bank today has assets of over \$33 million, and it is the first of its kind where a major retailer has the ownership therof. J.C. Penney Co. acquired the ownership of The First National Bank of Harrington by purchasing all of the common stock on June 27t, 1983.

The announcement of the name change was made by David G. Jones. who became the new president following the purchase. "The name change is principally done to reflect the name of the new owners", Jones said. Mr. Jones went on to add that the new ownership by the prominent retailer [Continued on page 2]

Russell L. McCready, a candidate for the Lake Forest Board of Education, said on Friday the "School systems are caught up in excessive individualism the 'me generation.' The school board's vital concern must be the educational and psychological development of the children. It must stop overreacting and take full control by establishing longrange plans."

McCready, a former Harrington Town Council member now living in Felton, said, "The board has lost the trust and support of the parents and the community. While it must assume full responsibility for its actions, it should encourage leaders of civic, community, and parents' groups to participate in decision making. It must solicit community support and cooperation for educational reform. The school board is faced with serious and complex problems and no consensus exists for their solution. It is getting no closer to solutions because it lacks unity and leadership."

McCready, a Harrington native, had officially announced his candidacy on

January 4 for the embattled Lake Forest Board of Education. His bid is for the two-year seat now held by board president Marvin E. Brown, of Felton. McCready is presently employed as chief of freight services at Dover Air Force Base. Some of McCready's objectives for the

school board are: "Make school administration responsive to the board; assure that counselors provide the students with responsible guidance on course selection and career objectives — this is a vital part of the educational system; monitor student academics and achievement by regular progress checks; assign homework for evaluation as necessary; devote more time to school studies and better use of the school day; provide current textbooks and instructional material and update regularly; establish community and parental advisory groups, and keep parents apprised of school policies and







### How & Why - St. Stephen's

A Post Office was established in 1857 with Mr. Matthew J. Clark as first Postmaster. The area was expanding, and descendants of the original land grantees, found themselves in a position to "partially retire" - rent out or even sell parts of their large acreage and move to the settlement and the then "budding" social life of Clarks' Corner; and they also found themselves able to build some very fine homes. (This situation carried through to many of the area towns, Milford, Felton, Frederica and many of these

fine homes with their gingerbread decor are still viable.

The political division of land, known as Mispillion Hundred (as well as that known as Murderkill Hundred) was prospering - and these people who, by this time, had their land (via inheritance) paid for and clear, were reaping the so-called bounty, locally, that is. However, now, and this is an 'important now', after much deliberation and many lawsuits for "land damage" the Pennsylvania Railroad Co. was extend-




Defending his 1983 Late Model Title is Lou Johnson.

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### Griffith's Chapel gets ready for Memorial Day

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Building was started on the tiny wood-frame chapel in 1804 on land donated by William T. Griffith to the Williamsville Methodist Church, and later became the property of the Peninsula of the United Methodist

Williamsville, a small village west of Houston, was a bustling center of activity during the era of stagecoach travel when it was a major stop on the main line from Richmond to Philadelphia. On the trip from Dover to Salisbury, Md., drivers stopped at Williamsville to get fresh horses.

The mid-1800s saw the advent of the railroad, which bypassed Williamsville, causing a decline in the town's fortunes - and a similar fate for Griffith's Chapel.

The chapel gradually deteriorated until the Agricultural Museum in Dover was about to restore it in 1981, and feature it as a museum exhibit. Led by Cal Hollis, Judy and Gary Manlove and a few other residents, the restoration efforts began.

The group formed the Williamsville Historical Society and started raising funds to buy building materials.

The volunteer workers put on a new roof and siding, replaced floorboards and supports, installed a new chimney and an 1852 woodstove similar to the original, refurbished the 100-year-old piano and original pump organ, and reglazed the windows.

On October 31, 1982 the historical society was deeded the property by the Board of Trustees-Peninsula Conference of the United Methodist Church. "The Methodist Conference gave us a

year's trial and then deeded the property over to us," said Hollis. "We submitted it to the National Register of Historic Places, and it was accepted by Delaware and also nation-

ally," Hollis added. The chapel sits at the fork in the road where roads 384 and 442 meet near Abbott's Mill, and is surrounded by a cemetery with gravestones going back to the Civil War.

"We don't have a plot plan for the cemetery, and many of the graves aren't marked," said Hollis.

The original pews are still in the chapel, and a small balcony used as slave gallery is in the rear.

Although most of the major repair work has been completed, a great deal remains. The walls have to be re-plastered, painted, and stenciled with the original design. There is still work to be done on the cemetery, and the society is looking for someone who might have knowledge of the plot plan.

The historical society is incorporated and tax-empt. It raises funds through donations and various activities such as flea markets, strawberry festivals, and

However, Harrington was considered 'the center' of activity, commerce-wise, at that time, so most imposing ceremonies were held in Harrington with the Governor being present and military salutes being

Mispillion Hundred had shown tremendous progress during the previous thirty year period, so the State Legislature began to notice Clark's Corner and, as a result, the name of the town was officially changed in 1862, by Act of the State Legislature, and was chartered in the name of HARRINGTON in tribute to Samuel M. Harrington, who was then State

Meanwhile, THE TELEGRAPH LINE had been built along the railroad as far south as Seaford. This was in

It was about this same period that "Railroad Fever" became so apparent in this area. Land owners, land brokers, bankers, anyone with an eye to increasing business and/or bettering their assets, became a part of the so-called "boom". There were even

those dealers in produce and real estate, who likened this new available transportation facility and this marvelous wireless communication system to be the very means by which lower Delaware would be another bonanza — 'like the Gold Rush to California of 1849', only — this venture would be a 'sure thing'. In the case of the gold rush, news spread quickly. Men and women from all parts of the United States abandoned their farms and businesses to rush to California. Many died on the difficult trip, through the mountains....Some did reach California, but very few became rich.

Likewise, news of the level, flat, fertile land of Delaware also spread rapidly, with the advent of the railroad. Brokers and dealers flooded with the papers to the northern states with the great potential. Their advertisements pointed out the mild climate, the level fields (so much more easily tilled than the rocky hillsides of New York State.) Apples were said to be the first to ripen for market in the 'entire Country'. There were fish in the ponds and oysters and lobsters and clams in the Bay. Chickens and cattle could graze to their heart's content, and the milk and eggs could be in the cities of New York, Philadelphia, even Boston - in a matter of hours - on the



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
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### Helping the gifted child get the most out of school and life

school, their talents often are neither understood nor given support, according to Growing Child, the monthly child development newsletter.

Parents of highly gifted children should be aware that schools of education do not generally prepare teachers to recognize, understand, or teach gifted children. A child who is more advanced than the others in the class will still be expected to do the same work as the others. If he finds it boring and doesn't finish it, many teachers may criticize rather than give special assignments to challenge advanced skills.

If the gifted child tries to carry out an assignment in a creative or unusual way, he may be criticized for not doing it "the right way." Many gifted children thus earn the label of "trouble maker." Their discouragement can cause them to give up trying, which is a great loss to them and to society.

Exceptionally gifted children often are neglected when funds are given to programs for exceptional children in

people feel great compassion for children who are physically or intellectually handicapped, and educational programs for these children almost always receive funding over programs

for gifted children. People usually feel that gifted children can "take care of themselves" and become indignant at the thought of spending money on special programs for them. But highly gifted children are handicapped in a society that stresses conformity, and they need special attention to develop their talents.

So how can parents help?
\*Give the child a chance to develop his special talents. Notice the things he does well, and spend some time sharing them with him.

\*Talk with him about how he feels about himself and help him to appreciate his special gifts without feeling he's set apart from other children. \*Help your child understand that other people will not always appreciate

When highly gifted children go to the schools. Few schools have pro-chool, their talents often are neither grams for gifted children at all. Many people's reactions to him. So how can parents help?

\*Give the child a chance to develop his special talents. Notice the things he does well, and spend some time sharing them with him. At the same time, remember that he is still a child. Be understanding of his behaviors that are not as advanced as some of the other things he can do.

\*Talk with him about how he feels about himself and help him to appreciate his special gift without feeling he's set apart from other children. Try not to compare your child with his brothers or sisters or any other children. They are all special in their own unique

\*Help your child understand that other people will not always appreciate and understand his special talents. Listen to his feelings about other people's reactions to him. This is particularly important when he goes to school. Try to find, or develop with

other parents, an educational program that will give your child a chance to develop his special talents.

\*Help your child understand and meet

the expectations of the teachers in his regular classes when he goes to school. At the same time, talk with his teachers about giving him appropriate special assignments to keep him interested and challenged in the areas of his special gifts.

\*Most of all, be on your child's side. Help him feel good about himself as someone who can get along with others and do whatever he sets his mind to
