

# Council hears drainage woes

Water woes that have plagued sections of Harrington bringing flooded streets and yards spilled over into City Council chambers Monday night as two residents brought complaints. The two, Donald West and Mrs. F. Nelson Melvin, reside on Second Avenue, virtually in City Hall's back yard. The drainage problem which brought on their complaints has been aggravated by heavy spring rains. But, they say, it is by no means a new situation.

West said he has asked the council for the past year and a half to do something about the water which backs up in the street and flows over the curb into his yard. It gets so deep, he contends, that the blades of a fan on his heat pump splash water into the vents on his heating system.

Melvin said the drainage problem has persisted for much longer than a year

and a half. But, she said, it is getting worse and it does not take a heavy rain for water to back up over the curb and into the yard. She gets water "...from five directions". It gets so bad that it flows under the house with a roar that sounds like a river. That keeps her awake at night, and she worries about damage to her home's concrete foundation.

The complaint session sparked a sharp exchange between the residents, several council members and Mayor Al Mann. Mann said Harrington's numerous drainage woes in the past have been tackled in a piecemeal fashion that has mostly produced further problems. The drainage on Second Avenue and in other Harrington areas needs an engineering study and a comprehensive approach. But all of that will cost big bucks for the city

and its taxpayers.

The Council, however, promised to give serious attention to the problem. Some study is already underway, and the city, through the budget process, will be looking for ways and means to long term solutions.

**Shore Stop Asks Sewer Hook-up**

At Monday's session the Council heard a request from Norman Thibodeaux of Shore Stop Food Stores that the Harrington area store (formerly Banks Convenience Store) be permitted to hook up to the city sewer system. The store at the corner of U.S. 13 and Delaware Avenue is outside city limits.

The store has discovered its present septic system to be inadequate. Although Thibodeaux said the company has an alternate plan for building a new septic system, it would prefer to

go the initially more costly route of tying into the city service. He said Shore Stop was prepared to absorb all the cost.

Mayor Al Mann said the hook-up if approved by Council, should be "...at no cost to the town for installation and operation." He also said the city needs a policy to deal with all such requests.

Thibodeaux was asked to prepare a legal agreement and return to Council on April 23 for a special 9 p.m. meeting to consider the request.

Two area residents at Monday night's meeting said their only concern was whether the proposal, if approved, would force them to be annexed to the city. The council said no.

**One Way on RR Avenue**

Amanda Morris, who lives at the corner of Center Street and Railroad Avenue, asked that Railroad Avenue

be made one way going from Liberty to Center. The street, she said, is very narrow, and she fears a car rounding the corner from Center Street will hit a child or a dog in her yard or end up in her front room.

The Council asked Police Chief Carl McLroy to make a study of the situation and report back to the April 23rd Council meeting. The section of Railroad Avenue in question is that which runs between the railroad, the rear of several Weiner Avenue residences and the Asbury Church parking lot. Making it a one-way street would require the Council to follow the ordinance procedure.

In other business Monday night, the City Council:

- \*approved after the second reading an ordinance reserving a section of Com-

merce St. between Fleming and the Salvation Army store as a loading zone. Parking there, except by the Salvation Army trucks, will be prohibited from 10 a.m. to 12 noon Monday through Saturday.

- \*agreed to terminate its contract for 40 weekly hours of coverage by the Delaware State Police as of May 5. The city has contracted with the State Police while its own force was being brought back to strength.
- \*discussed a proposal by Conrail that the city pay local contractor Jim Beene to cut grass on Conrail property. The city would then tack on a 15% handling charge and bill Conrail. The arrangement according to Conrail, would allow prompt payment to the local contractor and end the yearly hassle over getting all the grass on railroad property cut.

## The First National Bank of Harrington celebrates name change

**HARRINGTON** - The first bank for the community of Harrington which was founded in 1888 and whose past presidents were leading citizens of the community will no longer be referred to as "The First National Bank of Harrington." Instead, it will take the name in the form of its new owners.... J.C. Penney Co., one of the largest retail chain stores in the country....and be called JCPenney National Bank.

The original home of The First National Bank of Harrington is part of The Harrington Journal complex and is owned by Harry G. Farrow, Jr. "The building is under a program of resurgation to bring it back in the form of a bank....where ultimately the real estate offices of Farrow Realty will be located," said Mr. Farrow.

The First National Bank of Harrington reflects a long history of tradition steeped in the customs and practices of this community. In so many ways it reflects the pulse of this community. In

the beginning, monies were brought to the druggist Will Sharp, who in turn carried the money of the community to Milford for deposit in that bank. In 1888, the community of Harrington begun construction of its own bank. In the early years, business of banking was handled rather crudely and the bank surroundings and furnishings were crude as well. There was no running water in the original building. The building was believed to have been heated by a pot bellied stove. Probably in the beginning the bank was only open briefly each day, for most of the people who manned the bank had other jobs as merchants or clerks.

It was a slow pace, much the reflection of the community as well, over the years Slowly the bank grew... the community grew....and at one point in the early '20s and later, the community flourished. In 1922, the First National Bank of Harrington relocated to its present location, and the community began a rather rapid

growth for awhile. The depression and WWII were major setbacks, but after the war, more businesses sprang up. At one point, there were three new automobile dealerships and as many as five grocery stores. The First National Bank of Harrington was responsible for a major part of the growth of commerce in the community.

The JCPenney National Bank today has assets of over \$33 million, and it is the first of its kind where a major retailer has the ownership thereof. J.C. Penney Co. acquired the ownership of The First National Bank of Harrington by purchasing all of the common stock on June 27, 1983.

The announcement of the name change was made by David G. Jones, who became the new president following the purchase. "The name change is principally done to reflect the name of the new owners", Jones said. Mr. Jones went on to add that the new ownership by the prominent retailer

## Shaw appointed to Harrington Council

William Shaw, of Weiner Avenue, Harrington, was appointed Monday night by the Harrington City Council to fill the council seat left vacant by the resignation of Councilman Richard Henry. Shaw will serve until the next regular city council election in January 1985. It happens that that date would also mark the completion of Henry's term in office.

Henry, who resigned some weeks earlier, served Harrington's fourth ward. This was his second term on the

Harrington City Council. He was first elected in 1981. His second term was abbreviated to one year because the adoption of a new city charter necessitated staggering the terms of council members to continue the rotation system in which the city chooses two of its six council members each year. Council members normally serve for three years.

William Shaw is a former council member.

## McCready gives priorities on school board issues

Russell L. McCready, a candidate for the Lake Forest Board of Education, said on Friday the "School systems are caught up in excessive individualism — the 'me generation.' The school board's vital concern must be the educational and psychological development of the children. It must stop overreacting and take full control by establishing long-range plans."

McCready, a former Harrington Town Council member now living in Felton, said, "The board has lost the trust and support of the parents and the community. While it must assume full responsibility for its actions, it should encourage leaders of civic, community, and parents' groups to participate in decision making. It must solicit community support and cooperation for educational reform. The school board is faced with serious and complex problems and no consensus exists for their solution. It is getting no closer to solutions because it lacks unity and leadership."

McCready, a Harrington native, had officially announced his candidacy on

January 4 for the embattled Lake Forest Board of Education. His bid is for the two-year seat now held by board president Marvin E. Brown, of Felton. McCready is presently employed as chief of freight services at Dover Air Force Base.

Some of McCready's objectives for the school board are: "Make school administration responsive to the board; assure that counselors provide the students with responsible guidance on course selection and career objectives — this is a vital part of the educational system; monitor student academics and achievement by regular progress checks; assign homework for evaluation as necessary; devote more time to school studies and better use of the school day; provide current textbooks and instructional material and update regularly; establish community and parental advisory groups, and keep parents apprised of school policies and activities."

Saturday was the filing deadline for candidates in the school board election which will be held on May 8 between 1 p.m. and 9 p.m.

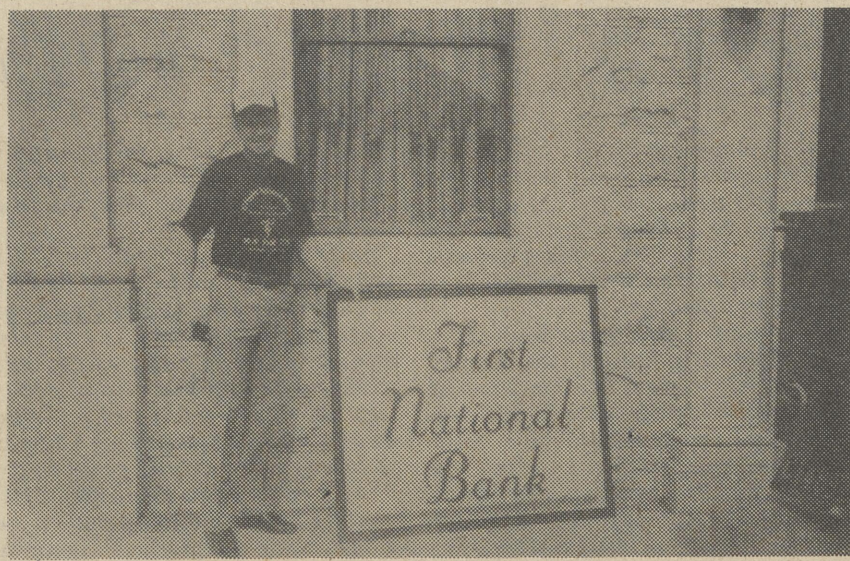



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### Griffith's Chapel gets ready for Memorial Day

Building was started on the tiny wood-frame chapel in 1804 on land donated by William T. Griffith to the Williamsville Methodist Church, and later became the property of the Peninsula of the United Methodist Church.

Williamsville, a small village west of Houston, was a bustling center of activity during the era of stagecoach travel when it was a major stop on the main line from Richmond to Philadelphia. On the trip from Dover to Salisbury, Md., drivers stopped at Williamsville to get fresh horses.

The mid-1800s saw the advent of the railroad, which bypassed Williamsville, causing a decline in the town's fortunes — and a similar fate for Griffith's Chapel.

The chapel gradually deteriorated until the Agricultural Museum in Dover was about to restore it in 1981, and feature it as a museum exhibit.

Led by Cal Hollis, Judy and Gary Manlove and a few other residents, the restoration efforts began. The group formed the Williamsville Historical Society and started raising funds to buy building materials.

The volunteer workers put on a new roof and siding, replaced floorboards and supports, installed a new chimney and an 1852 woodstove similar to the original, refurbished the 100-year-old piano and original pump organ, and rezoned the windows.

On October 31, 1982 the historical society was deemed the property by the Board of Trustees-Peninsula Conference of the United Methodist Church. "The Methodist Conference gave us a year's trial and then decided the property over to us," said Hollis.

"We submitted it to the National Register of Historic Places, and it was accepted by Delaware and also nationally," Hollis added.

The chapel sits at the fork in the road where roads 384 and 442 meet near Abbott's Mill, and is surrounded by a cemetery with gravestones going back to the Civil War.

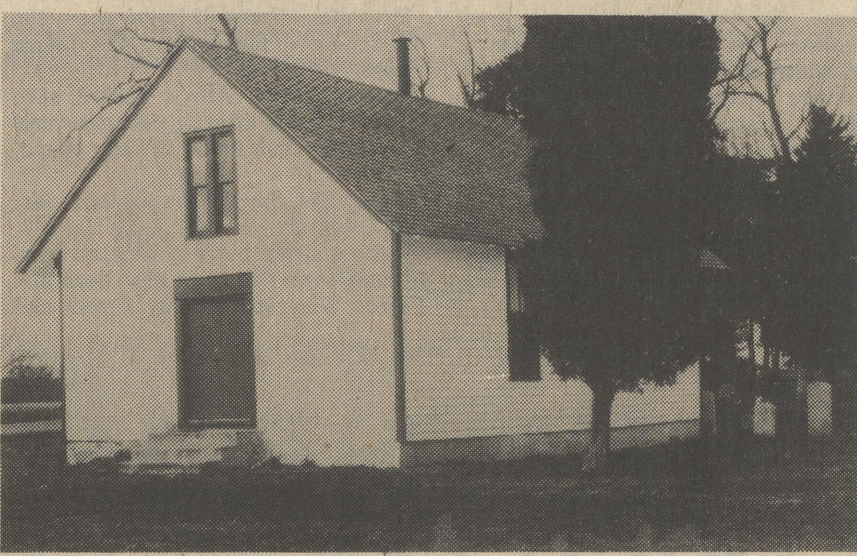
"We don't have a plot plan for the cemetery, and many of the graves aren't marked," said Hollis.

The original pews are still in the chapel, and a small balcony used as slave gallery is in the rear.

Although most of the major repair work has been completed, a great deal remains. The walls have to be re-plastered, painted, and stenciled with the original design. There is still work to be done on the cemetery, and the society is looking for someone who might have knowledge of the plot plan.

The historical society is incorporated and tax-exempt. It raises funds through donations and various activities such as flea markets, strawberry festivals, and pig roasts.

from the New Castle-Wilmington area, southward as far as Dover. In December of 1856, it was opened — with much ceremony — THROUGH TO HARRINGTON AND ON DOWN TO SEAFORD! However, Harrington was considered 'the center' of activity, commerce-wise, at that time, so most imposing ceremonies were held in Harrington with the Governor being present and military salutes being fired.

Mispillion Hundred had shown tremendous progress during the previous thirty year period, so the State Legislature began to notice Clark's Corner and, as a result, the name of the town was officially changed in 1882, by Act of the State Legislature, and was chartered in the name of HARRINGTON in tribute to Samuel M. Harrington, who was then State Chancellor.

Meanwhile, THE TELEGRAPH LINE had been built along the railroad as far south as Seaford. This was in 1861.

It was about this same period that "Railroad Fever" became so apparent in this area. Land owners, land brokers, bankers, anyone with an eye to increasing business and/or bettering their assets, became a part of the so-called "boom". There were even

those dealers in produce and real estate, who likened this new available transportation facility and this marvelous wireless communication system to be the very means by which lower Delaware would be another bonanza — like the Gold Rush to California of 1849', only — this venture would be a 'sure thing'. In the case of the gold rush, news spread quickly. Men and women from all parts of the United States abandoned their farms and businesses to rush to California. Many died on the difficult trip, through the mountains...Some did reach California, but very few became rich.

Likewise, news of the level, flat, fertile land of Delaware also spread rapidly, with the advent of the railroad. Brokers and dealers flooded with the papers to the northern states with the great potential. Their advertisements pointed out the mild climate, the level fields (so much more easily tilled than the rocky hillsides of New York State.) Apples were said to be the first to ripen for market in the 'entire Country'. There were fish in the ponds and oysters and lobsters and clams in the Bay. Chickens and cattle could graze to their heart's content, and the milk and eggs could be in the cities of New York, Philadelphia, even Boston — in a matter of hours — on the railroad!

We have checked these all out and discussed it here, and the main difference is that "our" bird not only has a red head, but he wears a cape collar so that all the feathers of his neck, front and back are scarlet red. He is smaller than the common flicker.

A Reader from Georgetown area has this bird at her feeder. She lives near a wooded area. We have about decided that perhaps he is a mutation, or the result of a rare breeding that has occurred between species of the flicker family. We do hope the lives and produces some children this summer.
