Parker on the mend - home for Easter

HACKENSACK, NJ Medical Center -At a press conference on Monday, Mrs. Cathy Parker, wife of injured harness horse race driver Jack Parker, Jr., explained the nature of her husband's injuries received in a race on March 20 at The Meadowlands.

Mrs. Parker says that her husband is in a good mood, "...he is joking, wants to see the films of his accident, and wants to return to racing as soon as possible." At the news conference, she indicated that she always retained hope that everything would come out all right. "During his coma, I talked to him all the time. Although he could not open his eyes or talk, he would indicate through hand signals that he understood what I was saying to him", said

His doctors were also present at the news conference. Dr. John H. Hubbard was the doctor on duty when Parker was brought to the hospital. "The first thing we do in this situation is to order a cat-scan (brain X-ray) to determine the extent of the injuries. The X-ray showed a large blood clot at the rear base of the skull. The swelling caused pressure on the cerebellum...which is the reason for the coma or sleepiness" said Dr. Hubbard. The first operation was ordered "...right away to remove the blood clot...which when removed weighed 3 oz.," said Dr. Hubbard.

Two days later a second operation was performed because of internal bleeding around the brain. "This was a smaller operation, and was done to stop the bleeding....which was the case", said Dr. Robert C. Rubin who

performed the second operation. Dr. Rubin is a neurosurgeon. Dr. Rubin said "...when Mr. Parker was thrown onto the (race) track he was kicked by the hooves of oncoming horses. He had a severe head injury....but his recovery has been exceedingly well, and now he is well aware of what is going on around him. We expect him to be leaving the hospital and be home for Easter," added Dr. Rubin.

The events leading up to the accident were recounted by Mrs. Parker. "When the horses left the starting gate, my husband was on the outside. When he cut over from the outside post...the horse stumbled. This resulted in throwing my husband onto the

racetrack. He said he landed on all fours....and turned to look behind him to see the horses coming down on him. He tried to protect himself, but he could not. He was okay up until the horses got to him he said," said Mrs. by William T. Ficka

One of the factors the racing industry must look into is not only the safety of the head gear, but also the new sulkies are lighter and more springy. A slight jolt like the one with Parker will throw the driver off the cart.

This is not the first spill for Parker. He drove Adios Frank....a Delaware Sires Stake champion with an injured wrist and injured knee. Approximately a year ago he was in a spill which he appeared to have escaped injury. He complained of a pain in his hip but did nothing about it. He went to California still complaining of the pain in the hip. He had it X-rayed which showed a fracture. One of the things that saved him in this accident apparently was being in good shape as well as youth on

Many of his friends and friends of his family here in Harrington have held the vigil and prayed for his recovery. Apparently the prayers were answered. Let's hope Jackie Parker, Jr. is back racing again real soon.

In '84, Parker had compiled 31 victories, 37 seconds, and 33 thirds in 269 starts, for a total money earned of \$391,148. At the time of the accident he was fifth in driver standings at The Meadowlands with EDDIE DAVIS fourth. Davis also out due to injuries, and is due to return home around Easter as well.

The School Board election will be held on May 8, the same day as the referendum on teacher's salaries.


Lewes dairyman receives 1984 Worrilow Award

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

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

Bishop's Easter Message - 1984

Dearly Beloved in Christ:

At the beginning of Lent a few short weeks ago I urged you in union with Christians throughout the world to associate yourselves in a penitential spirit with the redemptive work of Jesus for our salvation.

In addition to the usual forms of penance traditional in the Church prayer, self-denial, almsgiving and service to others - I strongly recommend refelctive meditation on the mysteries of our faith in order to gain a deeper appreciation of God's tremendous love for us.

Nowhere is God's love more visibly and powerfully demonstrated than in the events of Holy Week which the Church brings to the eyes of our mind with consummate skill in the sacred liturgy: "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son." (Jn. 3:16). And the Son so loved us that he gave himself for our salvation.

Now, having sounded the depths of her Lord's passion and death in the Sacred Triduum, the Church is aglow, even ecstatic on this Easter day, with the triumphant joy of his resurrection. What does Easter mean for us here and now? Reflect on the opening prayer of today's Eucharistic liturgy: 'God our Father, by raising Christ your Son you conquered the power of death and opened for us the way to eternal life. Let our celebration today raise us up and renew our lives by the Spirit that is within us."

Both the faithful and the not-sofaithful can find reason for hope in the Easter message by following the

admonition of St. Paul in today's second reading: "...set your heart on what pertains to higher realms where Christ is seated at God's right hand. Be intent on things above rather than on things of earth." (Col. 3:1,2). And the Apostle's cry to the Corinthians: "Now is the acceptable time! Now is the day of salvation!" (II Cor. 6:2). All of which can be summed up by saying that hope is valid if one avoids presumption and corresponds with the graces that flow so abundantly from the heart of the risen Christ.

It has been suggested that all of life itself may be considered a kind of Lent because it is a training time, the good or ill use of which determines the eternal destiny of each one of us. Hopefully that destiny will be for all of us a supremely satisfying and everlasing Easter, the happy culmination of a life-Lent well spent.

In the Eucharistic liturgy on Easter Sunday the penitential rite is omitted and the entire congregation is asked to stand and renew their baptismal vows and promise of fidelity to Christ and the Faith. To insure the fruitfulness of the reflections contained in this Easter message and with genuine pastoral love, I beg you to join wholeheartedly in this highly significant ceremony of renewal today.

That our Risen Lord may keep us faithful to him always and happy in his service is the fatherly wish and prayer

How & Why - St. Stephen's

Some of the unscrupulous dealers brought their prospective clients down from New York State and showed them the 'great possibilities' — the apples, peaches (depending on the season), the marshes where muskrats could be caught for their pelts, which sold as high as \$3.50 each, and peaches \$1.00 to \$3.00 per basket, and eggs by the crate could be sent to city markets. Some dealers (as has been told many times over) actually 'salted' apple groves and even some fish ponds, just as the Land Agents in the Gold Fields had 'salted' the streams and hillsides with little nuggets and gold dust for their prospective customers. As a result of this publicity, many staid farmers, to the north of us, already tired of plowing the hilly and rock strewn land, and envisioning level Delaware as an "Eden of Farming", sold everything they had and bought land in this area, some from the previously-mentioned unscrupulous

Sadly enough, the dealers had neglected to tell these new Delawareans that the farm they had bought, had been worn out and needed fertilize before it would produce a crop, and that if they wanted eggs, they would first have to build a chicken house; in order to do that, they would have to buy and haul the lumber; before they could trap the muskrats, they would need steel traps (a costly item) as well as hip boots with which to walk the marshes and, in addition, a boat. The new owner wasn't told that the tree he had seen with the beautiful apples under it - was old, would not bear fruit, and the apples he had seen there had been 'salted' under the old tree. Most importantly of all, he had been rightly informed about the existence of the railroad and the communication line beside it, but — he was not reminded that in order to get his eggs to the

railroad he would need wagons, horses, and enough eggs to make up 'a shipment' before the broker in Philadelphia would take them! Therefore, he was literally 'tied' to another broker who could buy the individual farm products and ship them under his name, paying the new Delawarean only what he wished. Therefore, in 1868, in the cold month

of February, three destitute, brokenhearted and disillusioned gentlemen had piteously turned to their former Bishop in New York State and by Springtime of that same year having received no reply to their letter, but with the warming weather bringing them some hope of - maybe - food and sustenance. Though these men were broken-hearted at their plight, they were not yet - broken-spirited! They had touched bottom in material things, but they staunchly held to their faith, and it did see them through that trying time. It was then they had appealed to Father John Leighton McKim of Christ Church of Milford. The Reverend Mr. McKim was touched by the Harrington Gentlemen's plea, and he agreed to conduct services in the school house on two Sunday afternoons per month, without seeing any chance of remuneration, even for his travel back and forth from Milford to Harrington. About this time, reports from Christ Church in Milford, telling of the Reverend McKim's dedicated work in Harrington, reached The Young Mens Missionary Association. This Association was a voluntary group, entirely independent of Diocesan control. It understood the pathos Mr. McKim had for the struggling Harrington mission and it sent him \$50.00; in 1871 another \$50.00 was sent for the work in Harrington; in 1872, a deposit of \$100.00 was placed "in bank" for the same purpose. It was understood that, at that time, these monies were to be used toward building a Chapel, or at the discretion of Mr. McKim for his support in furthering the work. During the period 1870 to 1878, when the committee was disbanded, a total of

Richmond who trailed Lake Speed through most of the race after the third lap mishap, hit the wall and did extensive damages to the rear of the car. Several laps later he was in another crash which took him out finally for the day.



ODESSA, MO (April 13, 15) - Green (Sacramaneto, CA) was probably the least noticed of the newcomers to this year's World of Outlaws circuit. However, he proved his worth Sunday afternoon when he captured the 30-lap World of Outlaws/Skoal Bandits Shootout sprint car feature at I-70 National Speedway.

Green and Shuman tied with 98 points apiece for the STroh's Challenge Cup point win. Based on his better feature finish, Green became the fifth different driver in as many events to claim the Stroh's point honors.

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

Another 100 guests, many of them aspiring writers, attended the luncheon and rubbed elbows with the professionals, asked questions, and bought autographed copies of their books.

At least one published writer was seated at each of the 18 tables, with most tables having two authors pres-

Norman Levy, author of Our Deal, delivered the keynote address.

Levy, of New York, recounted the ups and downs, the joys and sorrows in his struggle to make a living as a writer. Levy, married to playwright Tina Howe, taught history at S.U.N.Y. at Albany for six years. He quit teaching

in 1973 and returned to New York with his wife, son, and daughter to try his hand at writing
