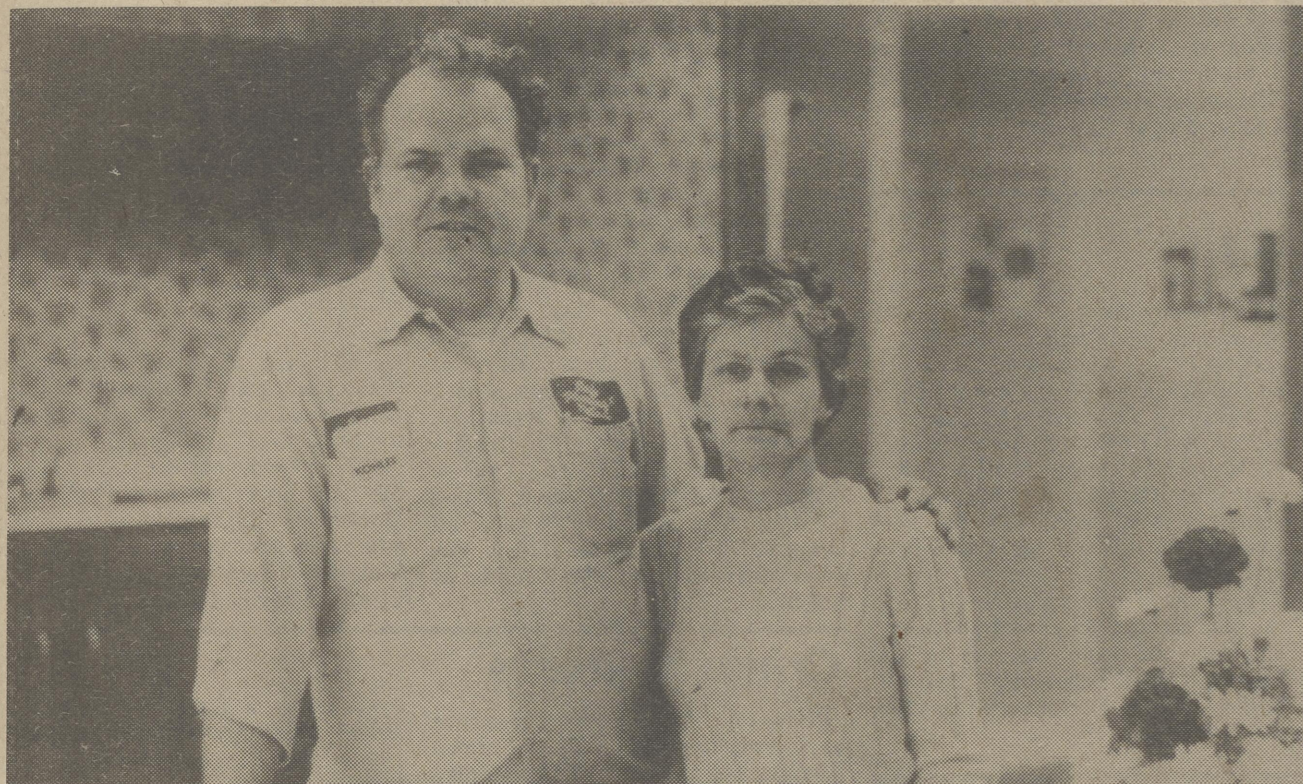

Parker on the mend - home for Easter

HACKENSACK, NJ Medical Center - At a press conference on Monday, Mrs. Cathy Parker, wife of injured harness horse race driver Jack Parker, Jr., explained the nature of her husband's injuries received in a race on March 20 at The Meadowlands.

Mrs. Parker says that her husband is in a good mood, "...he is joking, wants to see the films of his accident, and wants to return to racing as soon as possible." At the news conference, she indicated that she always retained hope that everything would come out all right. "During his coma, I talked to him all the time. Although he could not open his eyes or talk, he would indicate through hand signals that he understood what I was saying to him," said Mrs. Parker.

His doctors were also present at the news conference. Dr. John H. Hubbard was the doctor on duty when Parker was brought to the hospital. "The first thing we do in this situation is to order a cat-scan (brain X-ray) to determine the extent of the injuries. The X-ray showed a large blood clot at the rear base of the skull. The swelling caused pressure on the cerebellum...which is the reason for the coma or sleepiness" said Dr. Hubbard. The first operation was ordered "...right away to remove the blood clot...which when removed weighed 3 oz.," said Dr. Hubbard.

Two days later a second operation was performed because of internal bleeding around the brain. "This was a smaller operation, and was done to stop the bleeding...which was the case," said Dr. Robert C. Rubin who

performed the second operation. Dr. Rubin is a neurosurgeon. Dr. Rubin said "...when Mr. Parker was thrown onto the (race) track he was kicked by the hooves of oncoming horses. He had a severe head injury....but his recovery has been exceedingly well, and now he is well aware of what is going on around him. We expect him to be leaving the hospital and be home for Easter," added Dr. Rubin.

The events leading up to the accident were recounted by Mrs. Parker. "When the horses left the starting gate, my husband was on the outside. When he cut over from the outside post...the horse stumbled. This resulted in throwing my husband onto the

racetrack. He said he landed on all fours....and turned to look behind him to see the horses coming down on him. He tried to protect himself, but he could not. He was okay up until the horses got to him he said," said Mrs. Parker.

One of the factors the racing industry must look into is not only the safety of the head gear, but also the new sulkies are lighter and more springy. A slight jolt like the one with Parker will throw the driver off the cart.

This is not the first spill for Parker. He drove Adios Frank....a Delaware Sires Stake champion with an injured wrist and injured knee. Approximately a year ago he was in a spill which he appeared to have escaped injury. He complained of a pain in his hip but did nothing about it. He went to California still complaining of the pain in the hip. He had it X-rayed which showed a fracture. One of the things that saved him in this accident apparently was being in good shape as well as youth on his side.

Many of his friends and friends of his family here in Harrington have held the vigil and prayed for his recovery. Apparently the prayers were answered. Let's hope Jackie Parker, Jr. is back racing again real soon.

In '84, Parker had compiled 31 victories, 37 seconds, and 33 thirds in 269 starts, for a total money earned of \$391,148. At the time of the accident he was fifth in driver standings at The Meadowlands with EDDIE DAVIS fourth. Davis also out due to injuries, and is due to return home around Easter as well.

Brown running for reelection

"I believe we have a good school system, and we would like to make a good system better," said Marvin E. Brown, Lake Forest School Board President.

Brown, who officially announced his candidacy on March 30, is running for reelection to the post he now holds.

Brown's opponent for the two-year seat is Russell L. McCready of Felton.

"I think the Board has been very open to community input," Brown said.

"We've tightened up the promotion policy and set higher requirements than those set by state standards," he added.

Among Brown's priorities for the school board are: Review of the school curriculum; review and updating of school board policy; teacher's salaries; repair of the high school's leaky roof.

"Outside of the school budget, I think the review and updating of school board policy is the most important factor in any school district," Brown said.

Brown was a school board member from 1970 to 1979, and a two-time board president during those years. He was appointed board president in 1983 to fill the post vacated by William Garey's resignation.

"It's a team effort," said Brown. "The board needs input from the community — that means parents,

teachers, and administrators." Brown served as chief negotiator on contract negotiations between the board and the Lake Forest Teacher's Association.

"We hope to ratify the contract on April 23 at the regular board meeting," he said.

Brown, a Harrington native now living in Frederica, is a graduate of Harrington High School. He served in the military from 1951 to 1953 during

the Korean conflict. Retired from the Diamond State Telephone Co., he is presently employed by the Department of Agriculture as an Agriculture Products Inspector. He is a member of the Felton Independent Order of Odd Fellows. Brown is the father of two sons and one daughter, all Lake Forest High School graduates.

The School Board election will be held on May 8, the same day as the referendum on teacher's salaries.

Lewes dairyman receives 1984 Worrilow Award

William N. Hopkins of Green Acres Farm, Lewes, is this year's winner of the George M. Worrilow award from the University of Delaware Agricultural Alumni Association. Presented annually, the award recognizes outstanding service to agriculture by a university graduate.

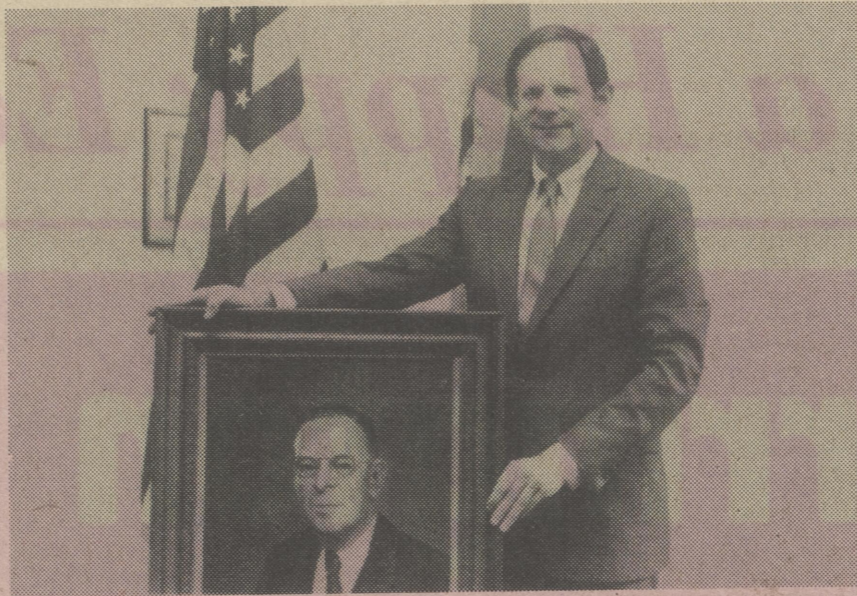
Hopkins grew up on a farm near Lewes and after attending high school there, earned his bachelor's degree in agricultural education from the University of Delaware. He graduated in 1942 and taught vocational agriculture for two years at A.I. du Pont High School near Wilmington before going into dairy farming.

Long recognized as an outstanding farmer, in 1956 he was a Delaware corn yield winner and in 1960 received the

USDA Award of Merit. He has been active in many community and farm organizations including the Sussex County Farm Bureau (which he helped organize), the Coolspring and Henlopen Grange, Delaware Guernsey Cattle Club, Delaware Holstein Cattle Club, Delaware Safety Committee, Lewes Rotary Club (one year as president), and Henlopen Ruritan Club. He served on the Lewes school board for 17 years, three of them as president, and also has been a member of the Board of Education of Sussex County Vocational and Technical College. He has been a member of the Sussex County ASCS, and in 1960 served as president of the State ASCS Committee. Since 1972 he has been a director of the Inter-State Milk Producers Cooperative and currently is a member of the executive committee.

Hopkins is married to the former Dorothy Elizabeth Cann. They have 10 children, eight of them graduates of the University of Delaware.

Hopkins is a well-known and respected member of Delaware's agricultural community.

Born in Logan, W.Va., Miller was reared Ashland, Kentucky. "When I was a kid I was kind of shy, I used to sing by myself," Miller said.

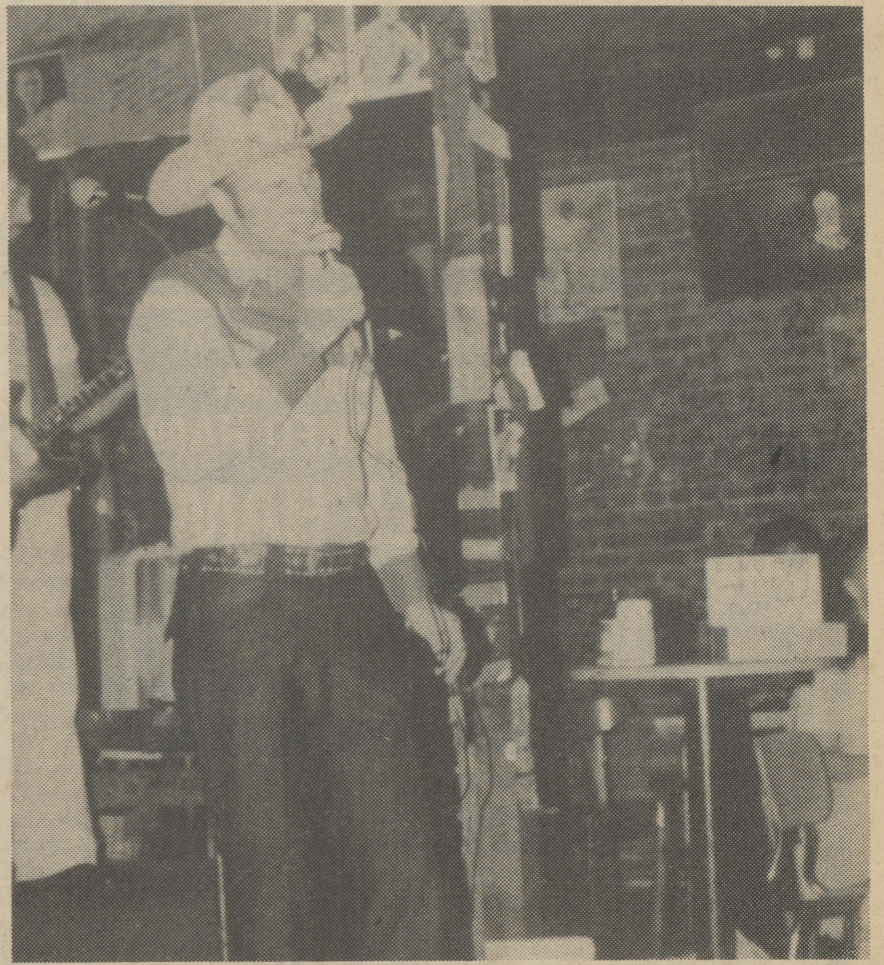
He's been a Hank Williams fan for as long as he can remember.

Sadly enough, the dealers had neglected to tell these new Delawareans that the farm they had bought, had been worn out and needed fertilizer before it would produce a crop, and that if they wanted eggs, they would first have to build a chicken house; in order to do that, they would have to buy and haul the lumber; before they could trap the muskrats, they would need steel traps (a costly item) as well as hip boots with which to walk the marshes and, in addition, a boat.

Danny Haines shadowed O'Donnell for 7 1/2 laps, in the 4200 meter run and also had a new personal record, with 10:40.7. Haines also missed Dan Donovan's Lake Forest mark by less than a second. Ralph Taylor (21 feet, 1 1/2 inches) Maurice Parker and Darrell Benson, blanked Seaford, in the long jump. 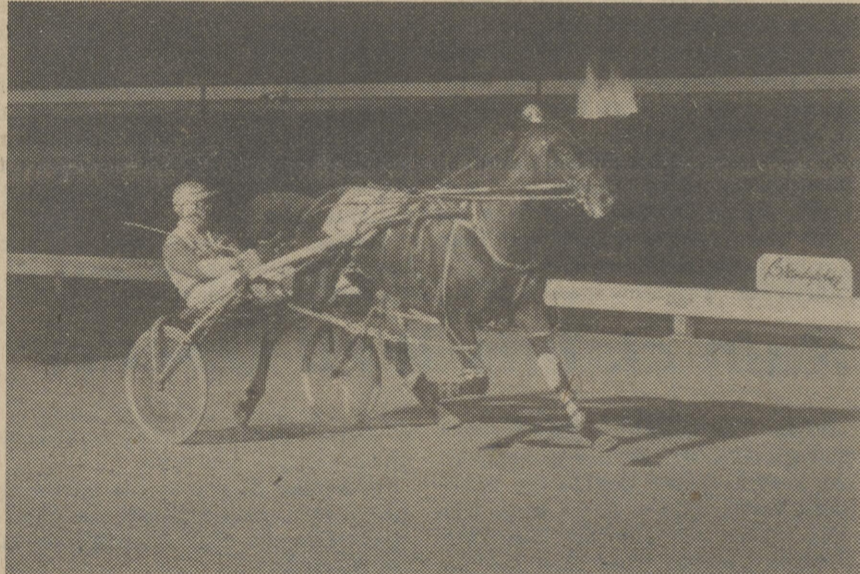

Waltrip wins TransSouth 500

 Veteran NASCAR stock car driver Darrell Waltrip became the first repeat winner of the '84 season. Waltrip's other victory came this year in the Valleydale 500 at his favorite and home track, Bristol, Tennessee. The win at Bristol tied a modern day record of 7 victories consecutively at one track. Richard Petty was the first to do it at Richmond.

The race at the historic track was marred with crashes and wrecks. Benny Parsons whose qualifying mark of 156.328 far exceeded the entire field was out of contention early when his car got sideways on the third lap. He hit the wall doing extensive damages to the automobile. He went to the garage area for repairs and lost over 20 laps. In that crash the mortality of cars climbed as Bobby Allison, Richard Petty, Dick Brooks, Geoff Bodine and Ron Bouchard all headed for the garage area. Petty remained on pit road for his repairs but still got several laps down. None of them were able to make up the laps. Allison had extensive damages. Both Bodine and Richmond were strong runners all day when they were on the race track. Each took double dips in the pits and garage areas with Rusty Wallace diving low hitting Bodine who for the second and final time went to the garage area for good. Richmond who trailed Lake Speed through most of the race after the third lap mishap, hit the wall and did extensive damages to the rear of the car. The car was towed to the garage area believing it to be all for the afternoon. "We repaired it and came back just to run for the points", said Richmond. Several laps later he was in another crash which took him out finally for the day.

Buddy Baker spun sideways under the caution on the backstretch to the amazement of everyone in the stands and behind the wheels of the cars on the racetrack. Baker was finished for the day, but Joe Ruttman who came on around and hit Baker who was stopped on the track, continued in the race.

Waltrip who started his NASCAR racing career in 1972 picked up his 59th career win. He remains 5th on the all time NASCAR win list behind Yarborough (79), Bobby Allison (80), David Pearson (105) and Richard Petty (198). Waltrip was always in the right place at the right time as he avoided all of the crashes and collisions. His car seemed to be unmarked at the end of the race. Waltrip's speed was an average of 119.926 mph. In the late race going it looked like Lake Speed and Bill Elliott would come on and challenge Waltrip who seemed to be running stronger each lap. Speed lost oil pressure due to a crashed head and Elliott experienced engine failure on the last lap and finished third. Terry Labonte got up for second with steady driving.

The latest standings for the Grand National Drivers are Waltrip (1138) tied with Labonte (1138), Rudd (1082), Earnhardt (1074), and Bill Elliott (1039).

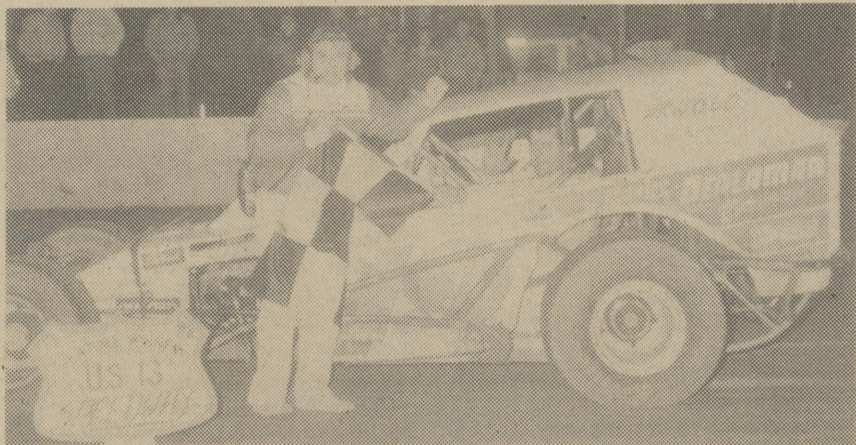

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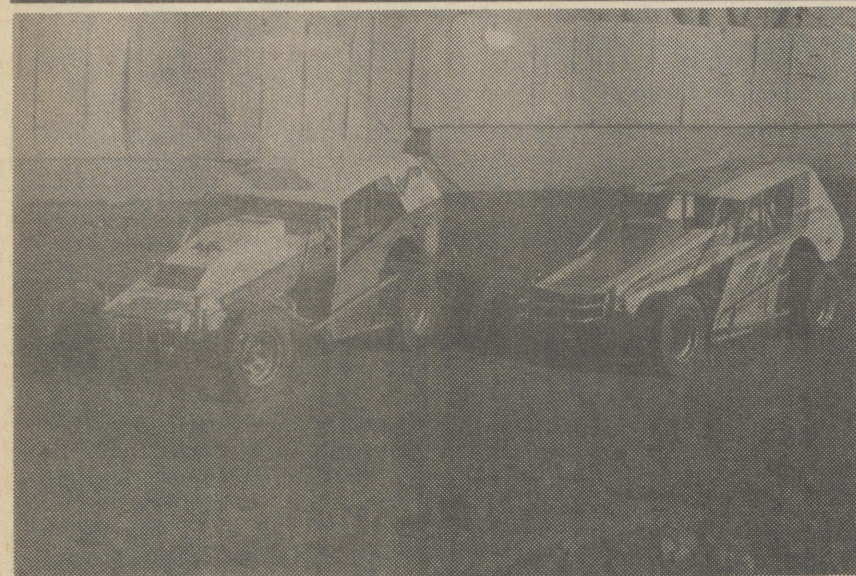
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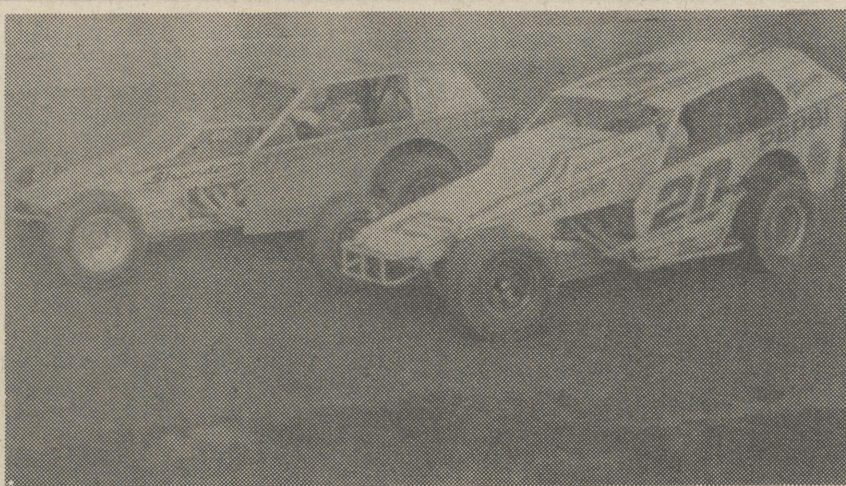

Delaware authors meet in Dover

More than thirty Delaware writers gathered at the Sheraton Inn-Dover Saturday for the first Author's Luncheon, presented by the Delaware Division of Libraries to celebrate National Library month.
Another 100 guests, many of them aspiring writers, attended the luncheon and rubbed elbows with the professionals, asked questions, and bought autographed copies of their books.
At least one published writer was seated at each of the 18 tables, with most tables having two authors present.
Norman Levy, author of *Our Deal*, delivered the keynote address.
Levy, of New York, recounted the ups and downs, the joys and sorrows in his struggle to make a living as a writer.
Levy, married to playwright Tina Howe, taught history at S.U.N.Y. at Albany for six years. He quit teaching

in 1973 and returned to New York with his wife, son, and daughter to try his hand at writing.
He wrote grant proposals for foundations, scenarios, television and movie treatments, and developed literary properties for actors and producers.
A literary agent read a nine-page story of his and suggested he turn it into a novel.
"Why did a grown man write a first novel?" Levy asked rhetorically. "I always had a story in me, but I had to find a voice for it."
"I told the agent I'd never written a novel before. She said, 'Well, make it up,'" Levy laughed.
The agent told Levy to write 50 pages and send it to her.
"She responded almost breathlessly and told me to write another 50 pages," Levy said.
Levy wrote 50 pages at a time until the novel was completed. After the manuscript was submitted to various

publishers, Levy accepted a book contract from Avon Books.
The book received good reviews from the critics and eventually became a best seller.
Our Deal is an autobiographical novel that tells the bittersweet story of a boy growing up in New York City during the Great Depression and World War II. It captures the mood and spirit of the era as it depicts the dreams and disappointments of a boy coming to grips with real life.
Levy advised would-be writers to write everyday.
"Norman Mailer, regardless of what he did the night before, writes every day," Levy said.
He also emphasized the value of rewriting.
"Hemingway wrote the ending of *Farewell to Arms* 56 times before he got it just the way he wanted it," Levy added.
Among the other authors at the

luncheon were: Dennis Hazzard, WAFL disc jockey and program director, and author of *The Country Music Trivia Quiz Book*; Jack Lewis, of Bridgeville, who wrote *Bay and River Delaware*; William J. Miller, of Dover, author of *Crossing the Delaware*; Dwight Steward, of Dover, who wrote *Genesis*; Dan S. Terrell, of Rehoboth Beach, author of *Eight Flags Over Lewes* and *The Story of the Homestead*; and Dr. James E. Valley, of Dover, who wrote *Rocks and Shoals*.
Seated at this reporter's table were Sarah Carlisle Brown, of Dover, author of six romance novels under her pen name Sarah Carlisle, and Dr. Raymond Grandfield of Mastens Corner, who has written a *Distributive Education Series*.
Carlisle has written *Kit and Kitty*, *Penny Wise*, *Widow Aubrey*, and three other romance novels.
