

School Board calls special meeting to explain teacher changes

HARRINGTON - The Lake Forest School Board will hold a special meeting tonight in an effort to explain staff reductions at the elementary, Junior High, and the High School.

At the regular Board meeting on Monday, April 23rd, the proposal of certain staff reductions was decided upon at that time. In the regular portion of the meeting, it was recommended and approved that the non-renewal of a contract not be renewed for a science teacher for the 8th grade at Chipman.

Following the regular meeting last Monday night, the Board went into

executive session to discuss the reduction in force (RIF) procedure to take at the elementary, junior high, and high school level. At the elementary level two half time contracts will not be renewed, and they are half at East and half at South. At Chipman two areas were actioned, and they were 1) a non-renewal of a science teacher contract at the 8th grade level, which is a full-time contract, and 2) holding off filling a temporary contract of a Spanish-English teacher (parttime), which is a Spanish reading course at Chipman. At the High School, one teacher's contract was not renewed in the business department, and one

Ag-teacher involuntarily transferred from the High School to the Chipman School.

It was the transferring of the Ag-teacher to Chipman which has caused a great deal of concern within the Ag-Department among fellow faculty members. The decisions rendered by the Board on the eye of the School Board referendum, for the sole purpose of raising teachers' salaries, some fear may cause the referendum to be defeated. There has never been a referendum for the purpose of raising teachers' salaries in the District.

The alternative to not transferring the Ag-teacher to Chipman where he

would teach science is to reduce in force a teacher at the academic level according to one district official. There are alleged to be 867 students enrolled at the Ag-level. If one academic teacher is not reduced and the Ag-teacher is kept, their salaries would be paid out of local supplement. The question is whether the present enrollment in the Ag-department would support 5 Ag-teachers. This is one purpose of Wednesday's meeting scheduled for 8 p.m.

Sara Williams, a candidate for the School Board in Tuesday's election (May 8th) in response to a charge that she was part of a letter which was

circulated in the district through the FFA Alumni Association. She is quoted as saying, "...I was not a part of the draft of the letter. What I have stated factually is that the philosophy around our house is to do what is necessary, and if facts are to the contrary than what has been stated to me is that I would vote to reinstate the teacher who has been moved from the High School to Chipman."

The School District referendum is scheduled for Tuesday, May 8, with voting at North Elementary, East Elementary, and South Elementary between the hours of 1 p.m. and 9 p.m. The referendum proposes a twenty-

cent per 100 dollars increase on present property assessed valuation. The new rate would take effect July 1st. The contention is that the present teachers' salaries are behind the State, County, and Sussex County. The significant progress the district lays claim to relates to advancement through the 5 year program of curriculum review, instructional resource center to serve all teachers, programming for gifted and talented students for grades 1 through 8, a comprehensive plan for computers, and a school district task force on education has been implemented to build fiber between the school district and the community.

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Burton receives Outstanding Citizen Award

Irwin G. Burton, a leading Milford businessman and civic leader since 1933, received the Outstanding Citizen of the Year award from the Milford Chamber of Commerce.

The longtime community leader was honored with the award at the Chamber's annual dinner-dance held at the Carlisle Fire Hall on April 13.

When Burton founded his automobile dealership in 1933, the country was in the throes of the Great Depression. It was a year of business failures, bank closings, breadlines, and soup kitchens. It was a year that saw formerly productive men selling apples on street corners. It was a year the number of unemployed passed the 12 million mark. It was not the best year to start a new business.

Yet I.G. Burton and Co. was a "success from the beginning," said its founder. "A new car sold for \$600 at that time."

Burton began the business with five workers and watched it grow to its present day work force of 74 employees.

The 76-year-old Burton is the father of eight children, most of whom are in

the Delaware area. While his son David is president of the company, the elder Burton remains active in the

business he founded over 50 years ago.

Burton's award as Outstanding Citizen of the Year from the Chamber of Commerce had a touch of poetic justice — he was the Chamber's first president when it was established in 1933.

"My work is my recreation," Burton laughed when asked what he does for recreation.

In addition to serving as president of the Milford Chamber of Commerce, Burton has also served as president of the Rotary Club of Milford, American Red Cross Delaware Chapter, and the Milford Memorial Hospital Board of Directors.

He also served as chairman of the McCabe Scholarship Awards at Swarthmore, and on the boards of Shawnee Country Club, Delaware Health Planning Council, the Bi-County United Way Community Fund, and the Daniel Hirsch Poor Fund Committee.

Burton remains active as a member of the Rotary Club and the Milford Memorial Hospital Board of Directors. If you believe that keeping busy keeps you young, you need only point to Irwin G. Burton as walking proof of your belief.

Biden predicts close race for Presidency

Sen. Joseph Biden (D-Del.), the Delaware Demosthenes, appeared on TV's Meet The Press program Sunday and fielded questions in his usual quick, decisive, and articulate manner.

"I'll go out on a limb and say this election is going to be decided by two percentage points. It's going to be a close election," Biden said, speaking of the presidential race.

Although Biden hasn't endorsed either Democratic candidate, he said, "I could live with either Mondale or Hart."

Biden said his major criticism of the Reagan administration is that it pays most of its attention to a military solution to problems.

Biden, elected to the U.S. Senate when he was 29 years old, is seeking his third term. His opponent for the senate seat is John M. Burrell of Milford, former Delaware State representative.

Concerning Nicaragua, Robert Novak, of the Chicago Sun-Times, asked Biden if he preferred the Marxists or those fighting for a democratic regime.

"Those fighting for a democratic regime," replied Biden.

Biden went on to explain that not all of those fighting the Marxists were advocates of democratic principles.

"A lot of them are a bunch of bully dictators," Biden said.

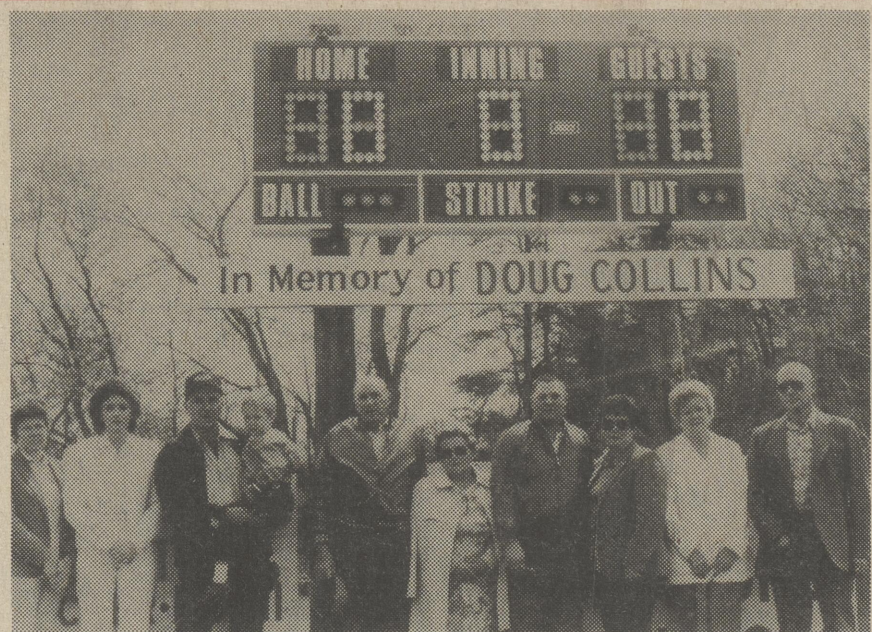
Collins and Carroll honored at Little League ceremonies

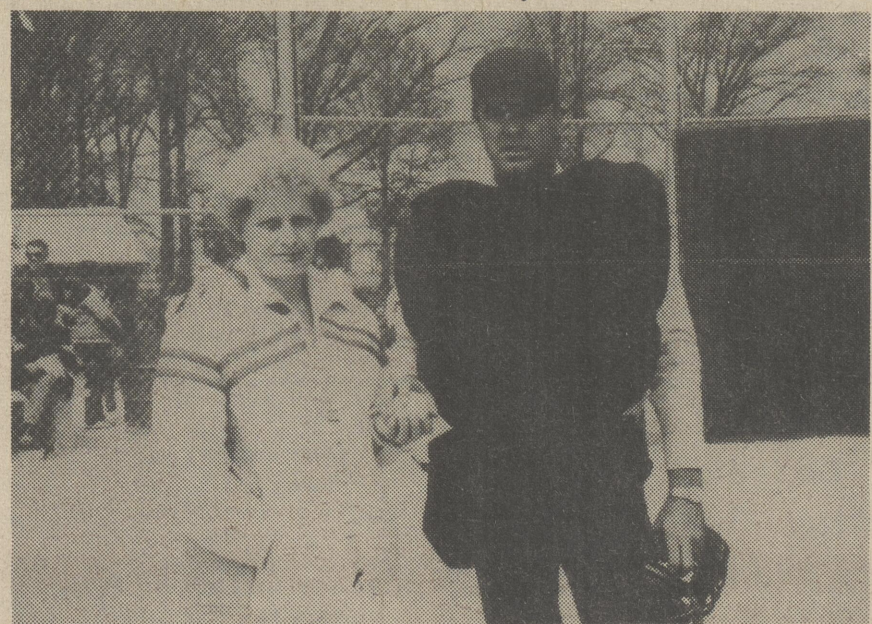
MOOSE PARK, HARRINGTON - In one of the best organized Little League ceremonies in many years, Doug Collins and James N. Carroll, Jr. were remembered for their involvement in Little League by Little League President David Lawson on Saturday.

Lawson cited Collins for his participation as a player from minor leaguer through to big league play. Collins was killed in an auto accident last July. His maternal grandparents, Walter and Marie Messick donated the new computerized scoreboard located in left field. On hand for dedication ceremonies, in addition to the Messicks, were Bobby and Dorothy Messick Collins, parents of Doug Collins, Robert and Elizabeth Collins, paternal grandparents of Collins, Jimmy Messick and his son, James Walter, Rhonda Messick, and Mary Ann Messick Wilson.

"Jim" Carroll was involved with Little League from its founding in 1962. He either managed or umpired during his involvement. He umpired his last game in 1972 just prior to his first heart attack. Although he did not participate in field activities after that, he remained close to Little League activities. Lawson remembered Carroll "...as a one hundred and ten percent participant...either on the job or at Little League." Carroll died of a heart attack this past March. Mrs. Emma Carroll, Jim's widow, received the ball used following the first pitch in the opening game in Senior League play.

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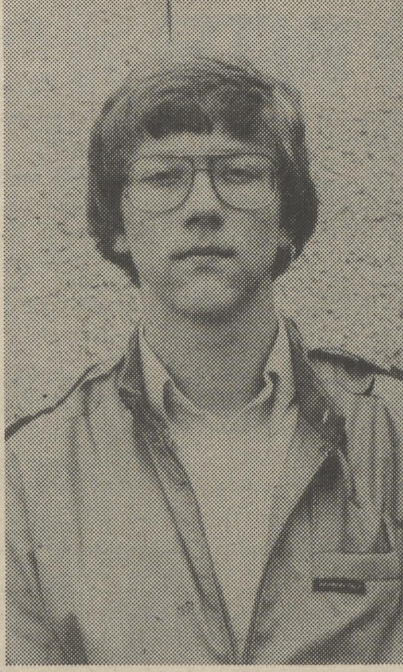

Hank Miller sings Hank Williams

Hank Miller had the Carlisle Fire Hall in Milford reverberating with the haunting melodies of Hank Williams as he sang up a country music storm Saturday night.
The Tennessee troubadour gave a stirring performance as he belted out one Hank Williams hit after another, many of them requested by members of the audience.
Miller is lead singer and guitar player for Tennessee Bourbon, a six-piece country music group out of Nashville, Tennessee. Stan Burnette, who appeared at the Grand Ole Opry with Roy Brusky, is on steel fuitar, and Russ Willford, who played the Grand Ole Opry with Stonewall Jackson, is on lead guitar.
In addition to the Milford engagement the group has appeared at the Seaford Municipal Banquet Hall and the Hartly Fire Hall.
Miller's singing voice has an uncanny resemblance to that of his idol, the late Hank Williams. Miller invests each song with the same strong emotion that catapulted Williams to country-music stardom, and made him one of the first three members elected to the Country Music Hall of Fame in 1961.
Hank Williams is the greatest legend in the history of country music. Most country music authorities agree that he

was the most talented performer in the field. Doctors attributed his death to a heart attack, probably brought on by the huge quantities of alcohol he had consumed over the years along with the many pills he had taken to ease the pain of a chronic back ailment.
He was on his way to cover an Ohio engagement when he was found dead in the back seat of his car on New Year's Day, 1953. He was 29.
Miller sang, "Long Gone Lonesome Blues," "Dear John I Sent Your Saddle Home," "Mansion On The Hill," "Wedding Bells," "Your Cheating Heart," "I'm A Long Gone Daddy," and "I'm So Lonesome I Could Cry," which was requested twice, and other Hank Williams classics.
The show, appropriately, is billed as "The Living Legend of Hank Williams" and can be seen at the Brandywine Fire Hall in Maryland on May 4, and the Friendly Fire Hall, Centreville, Md. on May 5.
If you attend these shows and would like to transport yourself back in time, just close your eyes and pretend it's 1951. After Miller sings the first few bars, open your eyes - you'll swear you're at the Grand Ole Opry and Hank Williams is on stage. That's the kind of magic spell Miller casts with his rousing performance.

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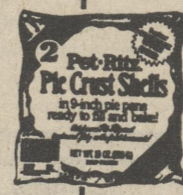
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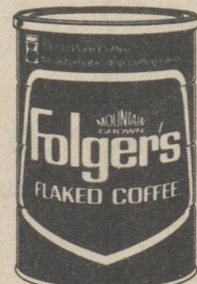

Barratt's Chapel celebrates "200th"

United Methodists from throughout the nation gathered at Barratt's Chapel Friday to witness a dramatic re-enactment of a 200-year-old meeting that sparked the founding of an independent Methodist Church in this country.

It was on the very same spot — marked by a metal star on the Chapel's floor — that Francis Asbury met Thomas Coke in 1784 to chart the course of Methodism in the new country.

Asbury and Coke were the denomination's first American bishops. About 300 United Methodists — including 105 members of the Council of Bishops — attended the special anniversary service. The small chapel accommodated about 200 of the participants while the remainder saw the service on closed-circuit television under a specially constructed tent outside the church.

The 204-year-old Barratt's Chapel, often referred to as the "Cradle of Methodism," was the site of the Methodist's first celebration of the sacraments of communion and baptism in America.

Rev. Noland B. Harmon of Atlanta, a 92-year-old retired bishop, preached a slightly sermon that was the highlight of the service.

"If they didn't come to us we went to them... Nobody had ever tried such an itinerant ministry before. They didn't think it would work," Harmon said, describing the circuit riders who often

rode hundreds of miles on horseback to preach the gospel and make converts.

Rev. Jeffrey Jones of Baltimore played the role of Thomas Coke and Rev. Stephan C. Rettenmyer of Highland, Md. portrayed Francis Asbury in a dramatic dialogue detailing their historic meeting.

John Wesley had commissioned Coke to travel to America and ordain Asbury as bishop and superintendent of a new church.

Citing the democratic principles of America, Asbury refused ordination by Coke unless duly elected to the office by his fellow preachers.

A few weeks later, at Lovely Lane Chapel in Baltimore, Asbury's colleagues elected him as the first bishop of the new Methodist Episcopal Church.

Because Asbury was the only preacher sent from England who had survived the Revolution, he was suspected of traitorous activities.

Forced to hide out for two years at Judge Thomas White's plantation in Whitesburg, Asbury preached under cover of darkness at nearby Methodist homes.

At the conclusion of the service, many participants visited the Barratt's Chapel Museum adjacent to the chapel.

Following the service, the 105 members of the Council of Bishops traveled to Baltimore for the quadrennial General Conference of United Methodists which convened on May 1 for an 11-day meeting.

How & Why - St. Stephen's

Now, we must examine the fate of the little Chapel during these years of Mr. McKim's absence. It remained for the year following, under the guidance of Mr. Milnor of Christ Church, and was open twice a month. Upon his departure, the Chapel was closed for seven months until January 1881. Then the new Vicar from Milford, held services for three more years, twice a month, but with little encouragement and with congregations growing smaller. So the little red Chapel was silent from May of 1885 until February of 1889, almost four years.

Sadly, during those four years, the building was abused and desecrated almost beyond belief. The beautiful chancel window (gift to Mr. McKim from St. Lukes, in Germantown, Pennsylvania, had not a piece of glass left in it. The Milodeon, also a personal gift, was ruined. The porch door had been forced open and for three years it was put to all sorts of profane and dirty uses. With the exceptions of a service conducted two or three times during

the four year period the church was silent and - well - abandoned. But, in spite of the 'almost defeats', when Mr. McKim returned to Milford in 1881, he began, again, to minister to St. Stephens.

Note: It is here that I wish to state, that in research, I find no actual reference as to exactly how the name, St. Stephen was chosen. Scharf's History of Delaware states - "The St. Anne's Episcopal Church in Harrington was consecrated by Bishop Lee, June, 1876. The building was erected by subscription, the greater portion of the amount being contributed by the Reverend J. L. McKim of Milford, who held services there until about 1887."

The discrepancies seem to be obvious in this History of Mr. Scharf's and it is now presumed that one of the writers, working for Mr. Scharf, in copying the material from old records, mistakenly wrote 'St. Anne's', whereas, it should have been 'St. Stephen's'.

In The Pocket

Barton Lobell's win in the Winners-Over pace, Abra Cadabra's triumph in the Stepping Stone Series and Meadowmate's victory in the Princess Series topped an action packed week of racing at Brandywine Raceway.

Barton Lobell overtook pacesetter El Alamien in deep stretch to capture the \$6,700 Winners-Over pace on Sunday, for a now lifetime mark of 1:57. The 8-year-old gelded son of Nansemond avenged his loss of last week (He broke stride before the start and lost by just a nose.) despite being handicapped with the tough nine post. Last in the nine horse field at the half, eighth at the three quarters and sixth at the top of the stretch, the Jim Angelo owned pacer came four wide on the final turn and flew down the lane to register a neck victory over El Alamien. Woody Smith guided the latter to fractions of 29.1, 58 and 1:27.3 before yielding to the winner. The victory was the fourth in the last five starts for the Duane Stoliker trained, Forrest Gerry, III reined pacer. Jordache (Bob Anderson, Jr.) finished four lengths further back in third.

Abra Cadabra notched his seventh consecutive victory in taking the \$10,000 finale of the Stepping Stone Series last Tuesday in a new mark of 1:58.2. Trainer-driver Jim Brittingham put the 3-year-old son of Abercrombie on the lead shortly past the eighth pole and set fractions of 29.3, 59.1 and 1:28.4 before drawing off in the stretch to win by three lengths over J. Fox (Ross Hayter) and Keystone Burma (Whitey Moore). A \$10,500 purchase for owner Brantley Watkins earlier this season, Abra Cadabra has now won nine of his ten starts this year, including four victories in preliminary legs of the Stepping Stone.

Brittingham also captured the \$4,000 consolation, piloting Navatross to a personal best tying 2:00.3 triumph over Great Romance (Mark Schwartz) and Bobbietron (Ken McNutt).

16-year-old Eddie Dennis guided Rita's Bunny to a wire-to-wire 2:03 win in the \$4,000 consolation over Scarlet Wil (Hayter) and Anytime Anywhere

(Steve Milam). The clocking was a new lifetime best for the 4-year-old daughter of B.G.'s Bunny, eclipsing her old mark by two full seconds.

Cheryl's Beth captured the \$5,500 fillies and mares open on Saturday prevailing in a close three horse photo. Joe Spoto reined the 7-year-old daughter of Keystone Andy to a nose victory over Melody Gi Gi (McNutt) and Avon Row (Pete Petersheim) in 2:00, one of seven "magic miles" over the weekend.

Other racing highlights of the week included Victory Man's (Walter Ross, Jr.) 1:58.1 triumph in a \$5,700 conditioned pace on Saturday, Rance's (Tom Selis) eight and a half length win in his first career start in 2:02.4 on Wednesday and big upset on Thursday.

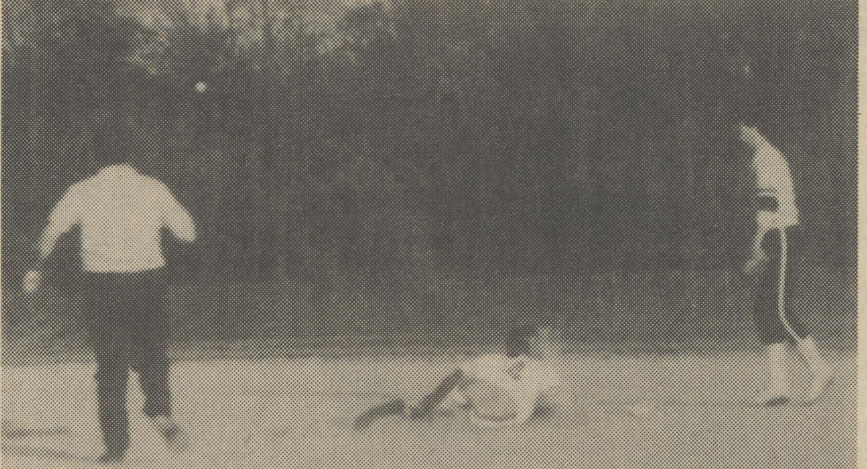
Gary Sweetman guided Deep Hollow Nick from eighth at the head of the stretch to a half length victory, enabling the 4-year-old son of Tempered to pay \$294.20 to win and what is believed to be an all-time Brandywine record of \$215.80 to place. Coupled with Counterfeit Dream (Mike Rossi), the exacta paid \$7,643.20. The one lucky winner played the first two digits of her house number (8 and 5) to collect the highest exacta payoff in the past five years at Brandywine.

The race for the Brandywine driving championship remains a close battle. Through April 30, Gerry, III and Walt Callahan (13 wins) hold a one victory lead over Pres Moore, Jr. with Crank and McNutt two wins off the pace. In the leading trainer category, Stoliker (10 wins) leads Brittingham and Brock by two victories.

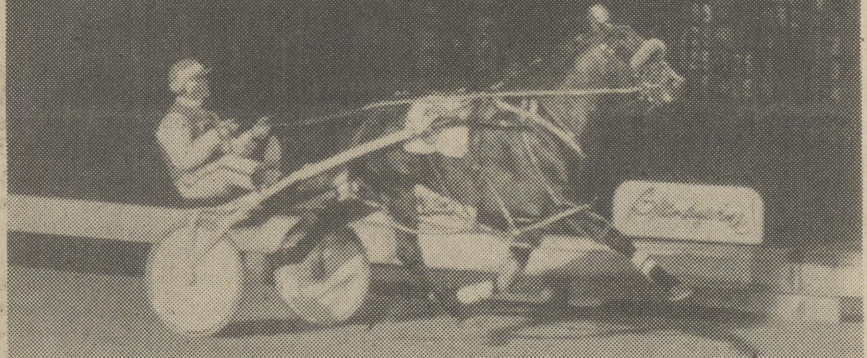

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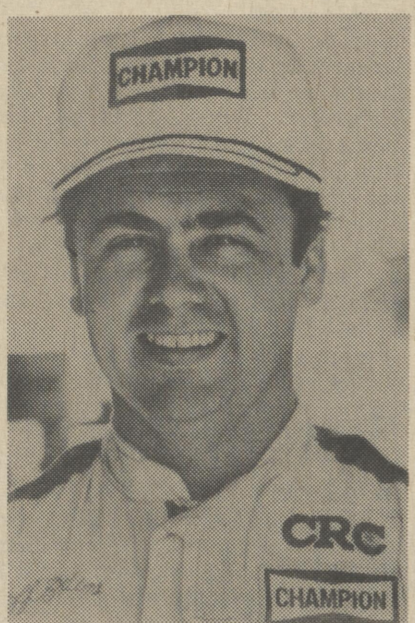

Bodine gets first NASCAR win

MARTINSVILLE, VA - On a track where he was once heralded as a champion in the modified ranks and from a track president "...who has treated me like his son...since I first came here to run the modified," it meant the first victory in 89 starts for Geoff Bodine. But it was more than a first win - it meant far more than the first win and also the winner's share of the \$250,000.

The big plus for the new team put together just eight months ago at Charlotte, was the fact that the win solidified the last remaining slot on NASCAR's coveted Winner's Circle program. It was the ninth and last slot still open. That reward will mean a cool \$99,400 to the All-Star Race Team sponsored by Northwestern Security Life and owned by Rick Hendrick. The first money was worth \$29,880. It also prevailed all but forgotten Harry Hyde another feeling of glory. The last time he visited winner's circle was with Neil Bonnett at Ontario in the season ending race in 1977. That team was owned by entrepreneur Jim Stacey.

Bodine became a "transplanted Yankee" when he moved his racing operations south to Richmond and Emanuel Zervakis three years ago. He confided in this writer two years ago at the NASCAR awards banquet in New York how he lived in a "camper outside of Zervakis' garage" away from his family awaiting a call from NASCAR. Through a few fancy steps he ended up on the NASCAR circuit in the 88 gatorade car which had parted company with Ricky Rudd. Bodine became the Rookie-of-the-year in that car in 1982. I remember the mild mannerism as part of Bodine's make-up, but realizing that there was a guy who possessed a tiger's heart. I also remember discussing this very same thing with my friend Charlie Roberts who has known Bodine I guess since he climbed in his first modified and raced around New York State and Jersey surfaced ovals. Roberts said very confidently, "...Geoff is a winner. Once he gets the hang of it (NASCAR tracks) he will become a consistent winner. He is one of the best to come along in a long while. You won't be able

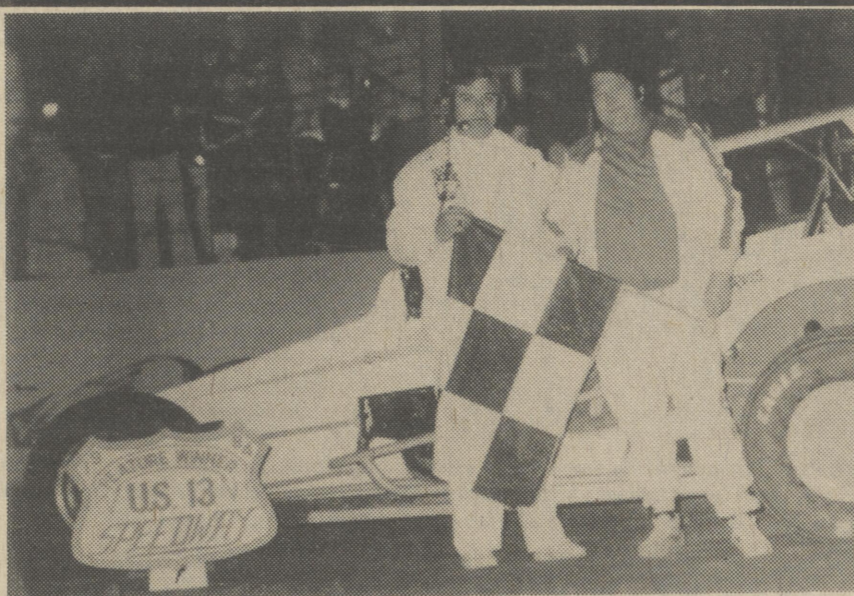
to keep h im back....he is just too good....too intense." It is a credit to Bodine that victory has come so quickly to this newly formed team in the ninth race out.

For the longest time on Sunday, it appeared that rising star Ricky Rudd would run away from the field and hide. Ignition problems caused the tragedy to befall Rudd.

Suddenly Bodine emerged as the new challenger to tireless leader Bobby Allison. But unrelenting determination by driver and crew caused Bodine to charge past Allison with 48 laps to go. A tire change pit stop where Bodine put back "...a good set of tires he had used earlier in the race" spelled the difference.

A fellow modified racer Ron Bouchard also charged by the field in hot pursuit of Bodine, but he was unable to overtake him. "We just did not get on the tires we wanted," said Bouchard. He finished 4.61 seconds behind Bodine in a Buick Regal.

Bodine now has won 1 NASCAR event at Martinsville averaging 73.264 mph, seven modified events, and two late model Sportsman Races. The track has been good to Bodine. For him, it is a pay check track.

Jarvis aces his first modified victory for '84

Modified chauffeur Richard Jarvis of Ocean City, Md. piloted his racer to an overwhelming victory in the 30 lap modified feature at U.S. 13 Speedway Saturday night. This was Jarvis' first win at U.S. 13 since early last season. The next four spots in the finishing line-up went to Bob Toreky, John Kozak, Hal Browning and Tommy Long respectively.

Jarvis moved swiftly from his eighth spot in the starting grid and led the field across the start/finish line to complete lap two. Pole sitter John Kozak held onto the second spot until lap six when Bob Toreky in the Lee's Auto Parts #14 glided by him on the front stretch.

By lap seven Jarvis had nearly a straightaway lead on the field when the caution flag was brought out for Gary Trice whose car lay disabled in the fourth turn. This closed the field back up and on the restart second place car Bob Toreky strongly challenged Jarvis as they came off the fourth turn. Toreky fell short however and Jarvis quickly regained his long distance lead. This same power play was repeated

three more times throughout the race as the caution would fly, the field would tighten up and the 680 car of Jarvis would blast away from them when the green lights came on again.

Jarvis not only won his first feature of the 1984 season, making him the third different modified feature victor at U.S. 13 in the three weeks that they have been open, but he also broke the track's modified lap speed record of 21.15 seconds (originally set by Jarvis) with a lap time of 21 seconds flat.

Pettyjohn consistently circled the half-mile clay oval averaging speeds of up to 83 miles per hour for a lap time of 21.65 seconds.

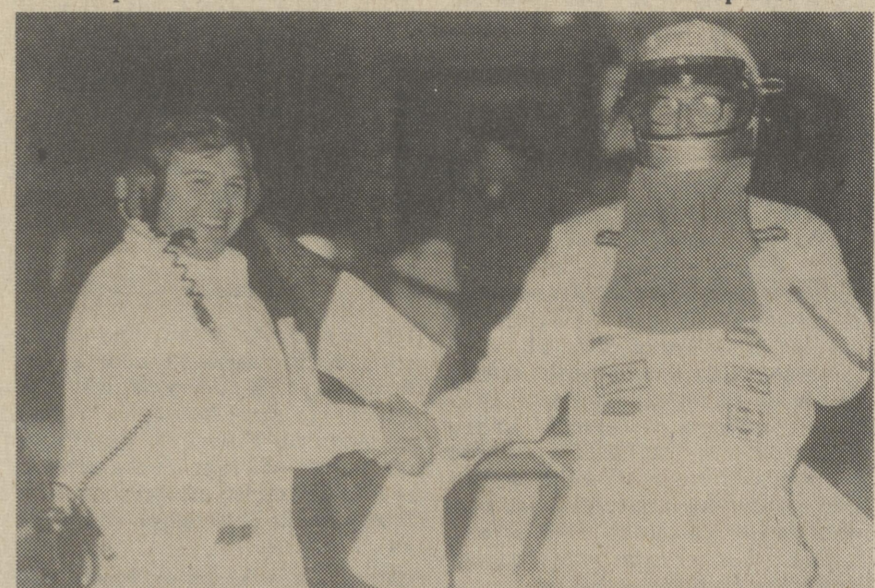
The other competitors in the field navigated the track equally as well and completed the race without a single caution period, but Pettyjohn clearly had the power and the best chassis

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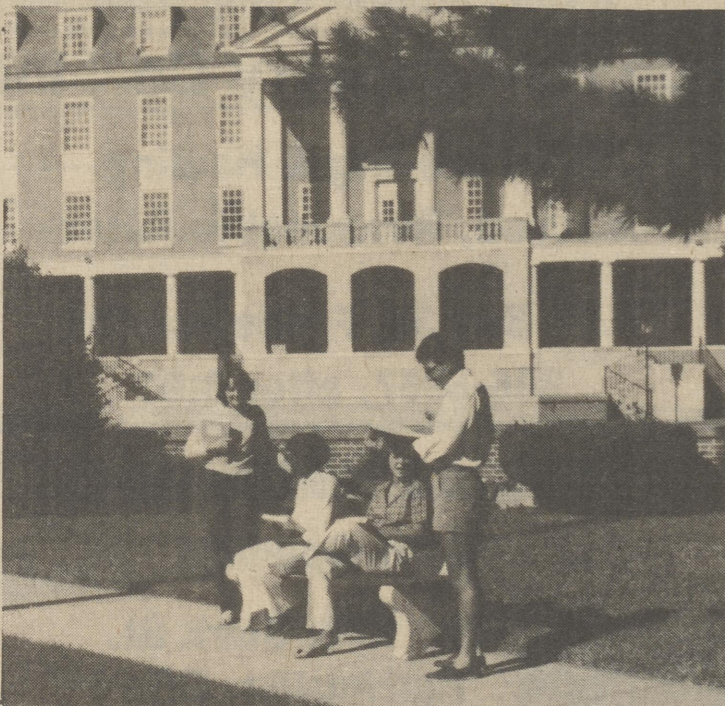

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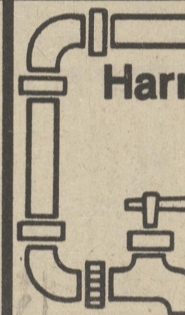

Thoughts on Mother's Day

The day set aside each year in honor of our mothers is usually the second Sunday in May. The custom of wearing a carnation is still carried on today. A colored carnation means the mother is still living, and if a white carnation is displayed, it means that the mother is deceased.

The custom harks back to our heritage from England. It was known early on as being Mothering Sunday, and was placed somewhere in mid-Lent. Other countries in Europe have observed a similar day.

In 1872, Julia Ward Howe first suggested a day be set aside in honor of our mother. She observed June 2nd, and she also called it "...a day of peace". She held her annual Mother's Day celebration in Boston.

The tradition spread to the south and in particular Kentucky where Mary Towles Sussean, who was a school teacher, started the ceremonies there in 1887. Later from Indiana, Frank E. Herin of South

Bend observed a similar day in 1904.

Anna Jarvis of Grafton, W.Va. and Philadelphia began the first nationwide campaign for day of observance for Mothers. She selected the second Sunday in May, and began the carnation custom. On May 10th, 1908, services were held in Grafton and Philadelphia. The service at Grafton first honored the mother of Miss Jarvis's own mother, Anna Reeves Jarvis.

It followed in 1912 at a General Conference of Methodist Episcopal Churches in Minneapolis, Minn., a resolution was passed honoring Anna Jarvis as the founder of Mother's Day...and the resolution suggested the second Sunday in May.

On May 9th, 1914, President Woodrow Wilson signed a joint resolution of Congress and the executive branch of the government that there would be a national day in observance of Mother's Day. The following year it became a law of the land.

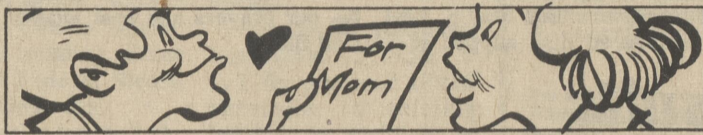

McKim's own handwriting found so far, states - "October 27, 1872, at School House in Harrington, Delaware, baptized Francis Lawrence, Son of William and Mary, his wife, born August 7, 1872." Signed J. Leighton McKim.

The dire conditions mentioned previously faced Mr. McKim when he reopened St. Stephen's in 1894. To make matters worse, in 1901, the Convention withdrew the small sum of one hundred dollars per annum because, the Journal says, the Chapel was not properly Diocesan property, although no such question had been raised during the episcopate of Bishop Lee from 1869 to 1886, or that of Bishop Coleman 1887 to 1907, both of whom were well acquainted with the circumstance and the difficulties encountered by Mr. McKim and both of whom had encouraged the work. Records show a total of \$248.00 was spent to make the Chapel usable for services upon Mr. McKim's return. Regardless, he continued administra-

tions to St. Stephen's without intermission until May 1, 1913.

From 1914, until 1930, intermittent services were held in the little red Chapel.

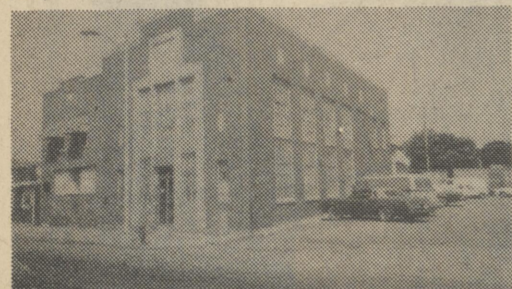
Then, Father Joseph Hinks, of Christ Church Milford, began to hold regular worship services twice a month, for a small and faithful congregation. Thus, began a close bond, between Christ Church, the Parish, and St. Stephens, the Mission. By 1932, under the guidance of the beloved Father Hinks, and the interest and cooperation of its faithful Episcopal congregation, St. Stephens was — in its ascendancy. Lay Readers were coming in, and a Sunday School Class was being started.

But, now, for the nonce, we will cease our historical reminiscing on the beginning of the Mission of St. Stephen, because, at this time St. Stephens was ascending — to a new phase in its history, and this will be related later.

But, now, we know, that at this time — The Spirit — not the spirit, per se, but that higher, intangible part of the spirit — the part synonymous with the true meaning of the NAME - ST. STEPHEN — had truly found its HOME — in Harrington, Delaware.
