

Council says engineers to study drainage dilemma

Harrington's drainage dilemma will be studied by an engineering firm in an attempt to find a long-term solution to the problem. City Council members decided in a meeting Monday night. "We have to take a hard look at our drainage system," said Mayor Al Mann. City officials received a letter dated April 27 from the Environmental Protection Agency advising them to

take action within 30 days. The recent heavy rainfalls have caused overflow and infiltration problems. "You'll always have an infiltration problem. You'll never be able to solve it 100 percent," said Mann. **Shore Stop Seeks Sewer Hook-Up** Norman Thibodeaux of Shore Stop Food Stores, which is outside city limits, said he will have his attorney prepare a legal agreement to enable

him to hook up to the city sewer system. Thibodeaux said Shore Stop will absorb all costs. Since the present septic system is inadequate, Thibodeaux said, "We have no choice. We either hook up to the sewer system or close down." Thibodeaux was asked to post an assurance bond guaranteeing that the hook-up, once started, would be completed. Council called a special workshop

meeting for May 21 at 8 p.m. to consider the Shore Stop request. Other business Monday night included: *A request by Amanda Morris that Railroad Avenue between Center Street and Liberty Street be made one way going from Liberty to Center, was tabled until a feasibility report is received from the Fire Company. *Council called a workshop on May 22

at 7:30 p.m. to discuss the city budget. *Council accepted the resignation of Alderman Anna Hampton. *Council approved a form from the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control to spray for mosquitoes in areas adjacent to the city. *Council approved renewal of the lease on the building it occupies at 110 Center Street for one year at \$100 per

month (same as last year). *Grace Welch of the Heritage Day Committee requested a \$500 donation for the committee. Council deferred the matter until the city budget is drawn up and approved. *Linda Gray of WAFL radio station invited council members to appear on her live 15-minute radio show "Town Talk" to discuss matters of civic interest.

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Williams, McCready and tax hike win in vote

Voters in the Lake Forest school district thronged to the polls in record numbers on May 8, giving landslide victories to school board candidates Sara L. Williams and Russell L. McCready.

Williams and McCready ran a joint campaign that had the support of board member and self-styled "maverick," G. Wallace Caulk, Jr. Williams, who heads a district parents group, defeated George H. Jones and William A. Dannenhauer for a five year term. The seat was held by James Gussert who did not seek reelection.

Williams ran up 1,056 votes, Jones 640, and Dannenhauer, 210. McCready defeated board president Marvin E. Brown, who was appointed to the seat last summer, and was seeking to finish the remaining two years.

McCready garnered 1,124 votes to Brown's 753.

In a cliffhanging referendum on a 20-cent property tax increase to raise \$106,000 for teachers salaries, voters narrowly approved the tax hike by a 942-928 vote. The vote of approval gives each of the district's 190 teachers a \$428 pay raise in September. The record turnout of 1,870 voters

nearly doubled the vote count in previous elections. The huge turnout was the result of an unprecedented number of farm votes, according to Caulk and other district officials.

The farmer's bloc registered their protest vote after they were reportedly provoked by the school board's decision to transfer Lake Forest High School agriculture teacher Michael Coverdale to W.T. Chipman Junior High as a science teacher next fall.

Brown cited decreasing enrollment and lack of demand for the transfer. Caulk, who voted against the transfer, contended there was a demand for five agriculture teachers, including Coverdale.

Caulk is due to become board president in July.

Enrollment at the high school has dropped from 1,173 in the 1975-76 school year, to 859 as of April 27, according to statistics presented by board member Frederick Feutz at last Wednesday's special board meeting.

The secretary of the Lake Forest Future Farmers of America Alumni sent a letter dated April 24 to its 100 members urging support for Williams and McCready in the election.

Many observers thought the imbroglio sparked by the controversial trans-

fer decision would destroy the chance of a favorable vote on the tax referendum.

"Also voting were a lot of senior citizens on a fixed income who didn't want their taxes raised," said Williams.

"That vote was a surprise. I thought it (the referendum) would either win bit or lose big. I never thought it would be that close," said McCready.

Many teachers reportedly encouraged the 18-year-olds to exercise their voting rights, which could explain the large number of young people observed at the polls.

The districts' teachers association reportedly identified over 700 residents favoring the referendum. On election day teachers and parents combined forces to rally those voters to the polls.

Both Williams and McCready said Caulk's support was a factor in their successful campaigns.

"I'm sure he helped. His influence and his work with people and through people — yes, I'm sure it helped," said McCready.

Williams and McCready will be seated officially at the July school board meeting.

J. Simpson Jr. injured in harness horse accident

MEADOWLANDS, PA - Saturday night at The Meadows, John Simpson, Jr. was thrown from the sulky while warming up Desdemona Hanover. Simpson locked a wheel with an on-coming horse being driven by Ron Murin. At the time of the spill, the water truck was on the track "...along with an indeterminate number of horses". Apparently Simpson tried to veer out around the water truck and hooked wheels with Murin.

There are no apparent eye witnesses to the spill. Track spokesman at The Meadows, Joe Hardy said the camera was not running at the time, and no one took notice of what was going on. A horse directly behind Simpson being driven by Tom Kirwin apparently ran over him. Speculation has it that first

Desdemona Hanover kicked Simpson, but most feel that the horse being handled by Kirwin is the one which got him. Simpson was thrown immediately to the track upon impact with the sulky. His helmet came off almost immediately which gave rise to speculation that he did not have the chin strap in place. He was helmetless when he was locked.

Simpson was taken by aerovac to Allegheny General Hospital where his condition was diagnosed as being two skull fractures and a blood clot. He was operated on for the removal of the clot. He entered the hospital in critical condition but on Monday his condition had improved so that he was placed on "...the serious list". Hospital spokesperson in the Dept. of Community Relations stated that "...Mr. Simp-

son's condition is improving very well".

John Simpson, Jr. came to live in Harrington with his parents in 1946. He was a pre-preschooler at that time. "I remember the little squirt. I trucked them in here in 1946 in Howard Lynch's horse van. I had Joe (Hylan) at the other end of the barn that I am in now (Paddock turn at Harrington) and had Johnny (Simpson, Sr.) across from me. John would bring little Johnny down to the barn every day. He'd go over to Killen Grain and crawl all over those coal cars they had in there then...and get just as black as he could get. At the end of the week Joe (Hylan) and I would give him (John, Jr.) fifty cents apiece. That tickled him," said veteran horseman Olin Davis.

John Simpson's father John, Sr. is a member of Harness Horse Hall of Fame. He left Harrington with his family in the late 40's, early 1950 and went from rags to riches. They lived on Fleming St. while in Harrington, and their neighbor was the great one, Paul Vineyard, and his family.

All who remember John, Jr. from those days and since are praying for his recovery. At the end of the '83 season, John Simpson, Jr. had recorded 1102 career wins. His father's lifetime wins were 1,467. John, Sr. today is President of Hanover Shoe Farms.

Nancy Cook files for Lt. Governor

DEMOLITION DERBIES

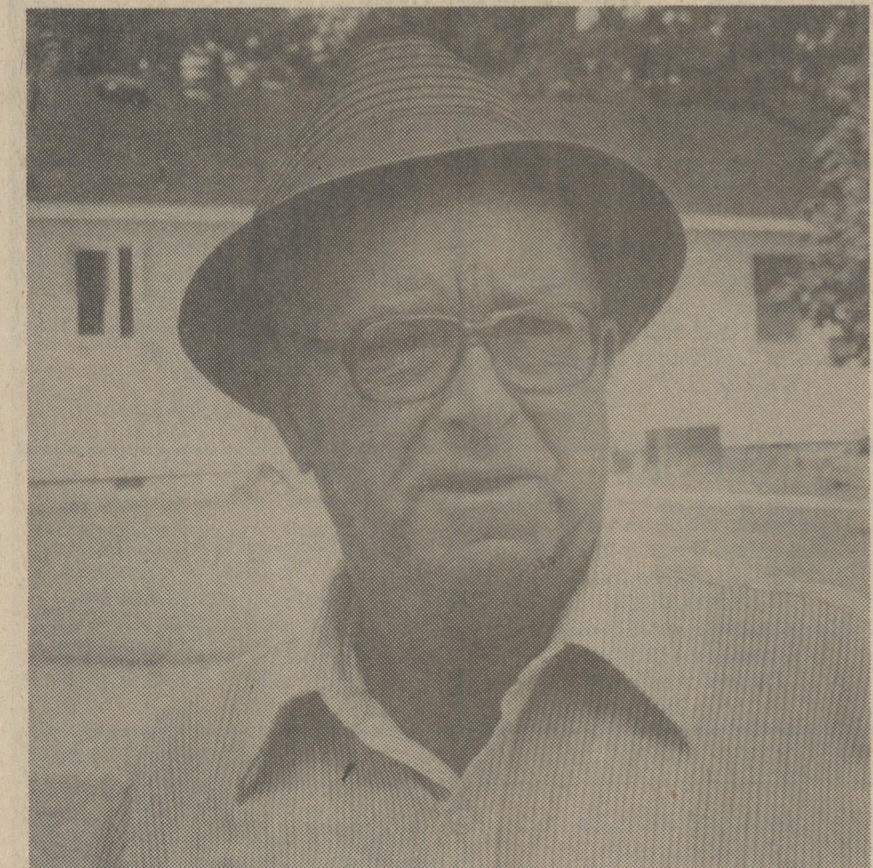

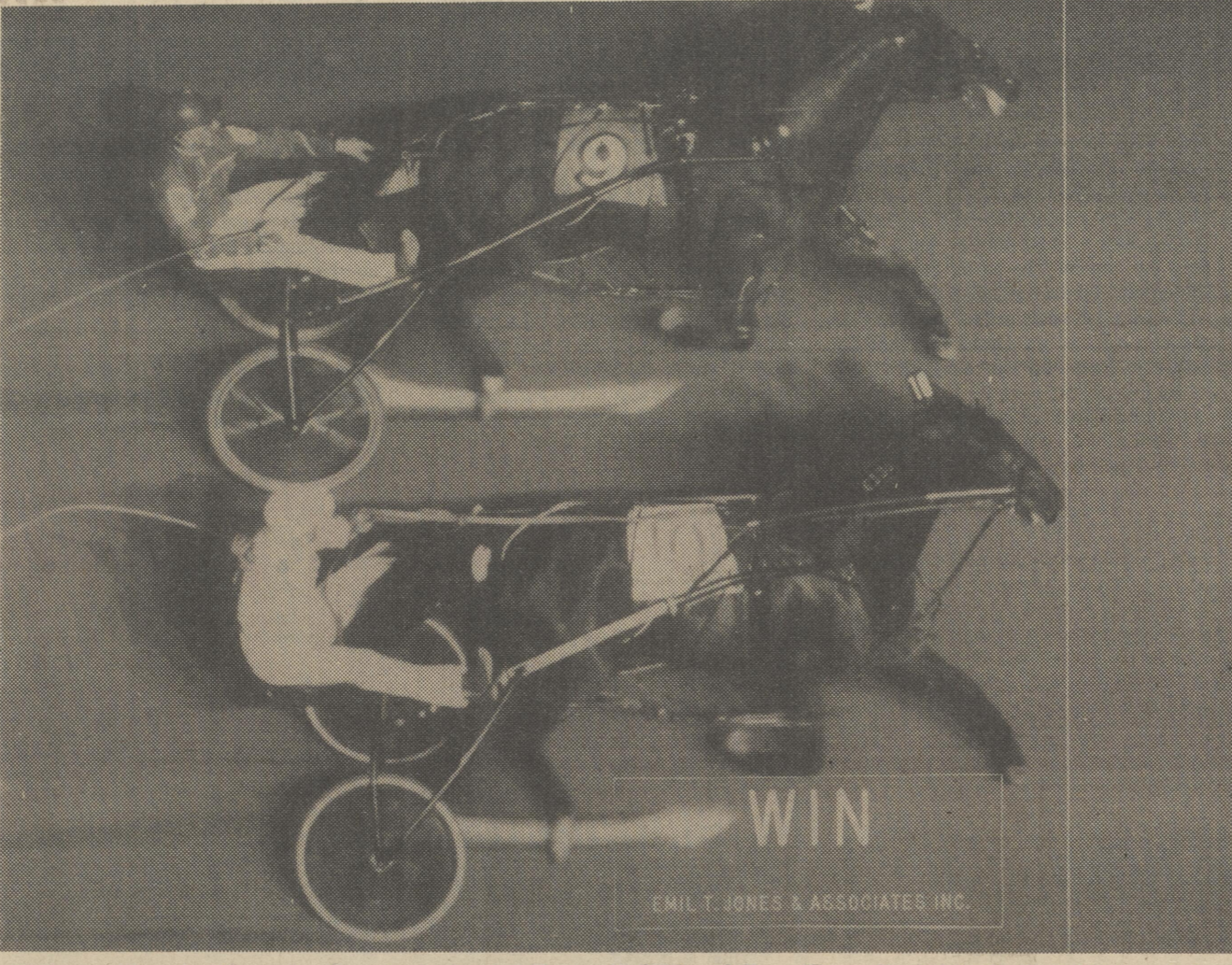

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Gab Fest

I enjoyed Elaine's article in The Chronicle about the late George B. Hynson, writer of our state song.

I was privileged to know Mr. Hynson as a personal friend and spent many happy evenings in his home. This was about the time I was in high school, and he spoke my language. He loved to discuss writing, reading, music and poetry. This little item about him might interest someone. One evening, in speaking of the old songs, he told me that his favorite song of the olden days was, *I Dream of Jeannie With the Light Brown Hair*.

The weather story is rain, rain and more rain, but we are so thankful that our homes are not standing deep in flood. My heart aches for those in the southern states who have had so much trouble weatherwise.

I was reading about the month of May in the Old Farmer's Almanac for the year 1853. That was a long time ago, but it tells us that the month of May 1853 had a lot of rain also. They predicted frost on the 8th, showers on the 7th, high tides on the 10th, showers on the 16th, signs of rain on the 20th and again on the 30th and 31st.

They loved the birds then too. The editor's column speaks of the Thrush. It says: "This merry and pleasant songster always appears about this time of the year. He is considered a friend of the farmer and is called by some 'The New England Mockingbird'." They say that the young lads interpret his song thusly: "Here I come! Here I come! Charly, Charly, Charly! What! What! Going to plant, Going to plant? Scratchem, Scratchem, Scratchem! Whew! Not hot!"

I delved into the Almanac of the year 1904 to see what that May was like since I was four months old at that time. It says that "May began on a Sunday that year," and follows with this statement: "Many planetary co-

nfigurations this month were viewed from the earth, such as to cause much disturbance in the atmosphere, heavy thunder showers and tornadoes in many parts of the United States."

The editor's column was very amusing. He says: "It would be better not to begin a journey between Thursday and the following Tuesday. He claims to have studied this profoundly and claims his deductions are correct. Here they are: Sunday is the worst day for murders; Saturday, the worst for floods. "So, if he is right, "Tuesday is the all around luckiest day, with Friday close behind, Wednesday and Thursday, third; Sunday, fourth; Monday, fifth and Saturday, last of all." Friday has not been unlucky in the history of the nation, however, for Columbus discovered America on Friday, he started on his return journey on Friday, landed on Palos on a Friday and returned to Hispanola on Friday. So there we are! For what it is worth!

I met an old friend in the Acme the other day who lives near the lake in Milford. She had a nature question. One day, recently she looked out her window and there marching sedately across her yard were a Mama Duck and several wee babies, marching in single file behind their mother. They were lovely to watch and she wondered what kind of ducks they were. Dad and Gary, my son-in-law, thought they were Wood Ducks, since she said they were a dull brownish green in color. I believe the mallards are brighter. I looked in Peterson's Bird Guide and they do not list any bird by the name Wood Duck. One pictured similar in color to the description was named "Garganey" which I never heard of. But it is native to Mass., N.Y., Delaware, Tenn., N. Car. and Alabama. This is as far as we have progressed in answering her question. Call if you have any ideas.

Bluegrass musicians have super new style

Ray Lewis, retired from the Air Force, had already started his own business when he heard the dobro played by Mike Aldridge in Salisbury, MD in 1981. Determined to learn to play the dobro, he practiced at home for many hours from March 1982 to the following February. "If you hit the wrong note on the dobro," explained Ray, "you know it!" It whines out of key like a wrong note on a fiddle.

He also practiced at the Price home, and then one day at Ocean City at a Fireman's Convention, he made his first public appearance with the Price family and their bluegrass band, *Pebble Creek*.

They were associated until October 1983, when Ray resigned to play the dobro with HOME GROWN 'N UGLY. It seems not unusual for musicians to change to different bands, and very few bluegrass bands survive with their original members.

In 1983, Tom Cravens first began to play the bass fiddle, and he handles it as though it were a part of himself. They seem to go together, both needing to be heard.

Tom's Oklahoma childhood included music. His father sang bass; his mother sang and played the piano; his sister played cello, and they all sang gospel in harmony. In the high school band, Tom played coronet, but he found he could earn money singing at weddings and as a Square Dance caller.

He didn't return to playing an instrument until 1979. In that fateful year, he began working with Walt Still and Gary Hahn at the Dover Air Force Base, and the latter were picking

guitar and mandolin at Pierce's Music Store, north of Dover. Now anyone could play at these jam sessions, so Tom went along, thinking maybe he could play spoons. He liked what he heard. Within two weeks he bought a guitar he didn't know how to play!

He learned three nights a week at Gary's house, and during lunch hour when Gary and Walt were picking in the parking lot.

At the same time, Gary, "that mound of sound on mandolin" and Walt Still, guitar, were picking bluegrass with the *Kent County Ramblers* on weekends. It wasn't long before Tom began playing and singing with *Pebble Creek*.

About the time HOME GROWN 'N UGLY was forming in 1982, Mark Letavish (pronounced like MacTavish), heard about it from his work at Kent General Hospital in Dover. Mark is an accomplished musician on accordion, guitar or banjo. He reads music, even scores for bluegrass music that express the incredibly fast, "hard driving" rhythms of the typical instrumental bluegrass. Mark is planning to marry a lovely Baltimore school teacher at the end of June, after the Eastern Shore Bluegrass Festival.

Bluegrass artists live and breathe bluegrass during a festival, and the one not to be missed will be at Callaway's Hitching Rail Campground near Milford, Delaware on June 15, 16 & 17th.

At this festival, the musicians will welcome any listener with the fortitude to stay up all night to hear their jam sessions in each other's bands. Hardly stopping to eat or sleep, they will also pick the strings in concert during the day.

From each other they learn new songs - sometimes old Scottish or Irish

melodies, or ballads that have been "lost" for a century, except in the memory of the bluegrass family passing it on the bow of the fiddle to the next generation.

It's an independent way of life they have, and a generous code of freely sharing music and playing for the fabulous enjoyment of the art.

HOME GROWN 'N UGLY will be playing all three days of the Festival.

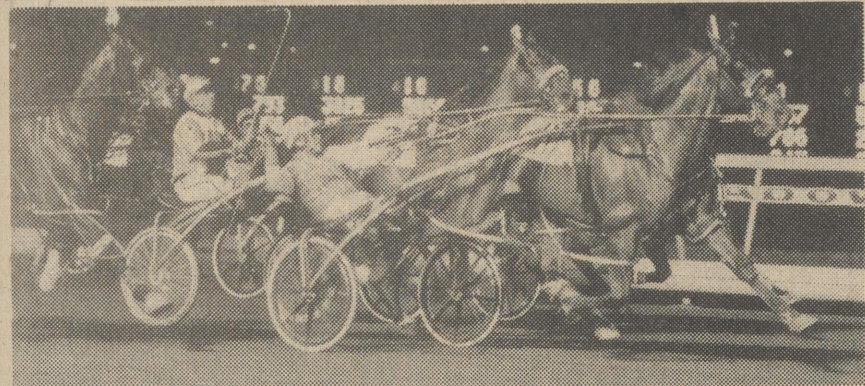

At Rosecroft on Sunday in the two \$20,000 Md. Sires Stakes for 3 year old fillies pace New Line with Jim Briteham wins it in 2:03.1 and Handful of Charm with Bryan Truitt in 2:01.1. We wish to again thank Rosecroft Raceway and their management especially Tom Aldrich for their fine hospitality shown our party on Saturday night which included USTA official Grady Speers, Frank and Mr. Harry Quillen. "Pete" joined us after dinner. He came late due to attending earlier a graduation party for his granddaughter. The program on Saturday night was for the William E. Miller Memorial mile for pacers. The first division was won by Christmas List (Bud Foster) in 1:58.1 (:28:1:00.3; last quarter in :30.1. He just nosed out Goldcreek Reno (Bryce Truitt) with Windemere Promise (John Wagner) getting the show. Christmas List was a top colt last year and has raced well so far this year down in Florida. He has a lifetime record of 1:58. He had the 10th position in the race and left behind Goldcreek Reno for cover for most of the race. Foster said after he got him straightened out in the stretch he gathered himself up and came on like a freight train. He goes to Vernon Downs this week and according to Foster is scheduled for a

lot of big races this year. Foster said the slow second quarter actually won it for his horse...being that he was in the second tier. "They set the early pace which rated perfectly for my horse who is a grinder," said Foster. In the \$15,000 Invitational Pace, GEX R-mano won it in 1:56. The week before he had gone in 1:55. They were trying to break the record but a slow first quarter...:28.2; a slow half...:58.3 and the three quarters in 1:27 was the story. He cut the mile and really opened up the lead in the final quarter. Roger had said earlier in the week in the track kitchen that he thought he could have set the world record the week before with Keystone Famous but a bumped bike early on spelled the difference.

I had just enough horse left at the wire...but nothing more beyond that. He is a lazy horse...and the slow fractions suited him, but every time I hit him (hit him three times) he came up a little more, said Rho.

Hubrail notes from the first Miller: Tom Haughton (Farmsteads Fame)... he was just a little short...only had one qualifying race...and he was a little sick...and not at his best on a half-mile track. John Wagner...thought I had put Bryce away at the 3/4 hoping the other were locked in back there...but when I pecked at my colt top of the stretch, touched him with the whip, he gave it up a little...might have been tired...and he doesn't like the whip... if the 4 horse (Farmsteads Fame) had come early, I might have let him go...I wanted to leave quick and open up some seats. Bryce Truitt...didn't want to go out real hard behind Wagner because the last time I tried to force him he went off stride...Fontaine's colt was bearing in and hitting the rail...so I had to come out...he was on one line coming out of the turn, and he bore in a little and then he was on that line some through the stretch...and they can't go as fast as they can when they're doing that...and that might have been the difference...but I don't want to make excuses...he went a real big trip...and its great to be second, but it is kinda tough to lose just by a little....

Barton Lobell's impressive triumph in a preferred pace, George Allen's seasonal debut and Avon Row's upset victory in a fillies and mares open highlighted a thrilling week of racing action at Brandywine Raceway.
Forrest Gerry, III, guided Barton Lobell to his fifth victory in his last seven outings, capturing Saturday, May 12th's \$9,000 preferred pace with a 1:57.4 clocking. Most Happy Glenn (Abe Stoltzfus) led the field past the quarter pole in a blistering 27.4 before yielding the front end to Full Respect (Jim Porter) nearing the half. B.J. Scarlet (Tom Sells) was first over as the field passed the half in 57.4. Gerry, III, then tugged on Barton Lobell's right line, moving the 6-year-old son of Nansemound second over on the backstretch. As B.J. Scarlet took the front end nearing the three-quarter pole, Gerry, III put the Jim Angelo owned, Duane Stoliker trained gelding in full gear in pursuit of the leader.
After B.J. Scarlet led the field passed the three-quarter pole in 1:26.4, Barton Lobell charged up to take command rounding the far turn and quickly opened up a four length advantage. George S. (Ken McNutt), making his first start since the New Faces Series at The Meadowlands in March, took up the chase as the field turned for home but proved to be no match for the winner, fading to fourth at the wire behind the fast closing Duke Of Talbot (Red Ross) and Tar Keel (Bob Shahan).

George Allen who became the fastest 3-year-old pacer in harness racing last year with a 1:53 time trial at the Red Mile in October won his 1984 debut with an impressive 1:58.4 score in Sunday's (May 13) \$6,500 winners-over pace. The impeccably bred pacer has been standing in stud in Pennsylvania earlier in the year before owners returned him to the racing world as planned.
Avon Row (Stoltzfus) was a wire-to-wire victor in the co-featured \$5,500 fillies and mares open, holding off an impressive Whisper Wave (Kim Vincent) with a 28.3 kicker to notch a 2:00.2 triumph for owners Ben and

Sofia Scharf and trainer Merv Stoltzfus (*Correct*). The 6-year-old daughter of King's Row raced as a team with Whisper Wave from before the half, holding off the continuous challenge of the latter to prevail by a half length with Bola (Vern Carnk) finishing third. Scarlet Meema (Jim Campbell), a multiple stakes winner who posted 12 wins and one second in her 13 starts at two, made an equipment break shortly after the start and finished seventh in her 1984 debut.

Also on Saturday, Handsome Devil (Stoltzfus), the winner of the \$100,000 second consolation of the Woodrow Wilson Pace last year, scored his first win at three with a wire-to-wire victory in a conditioned event in 2:00.3. The Jerry Taylor owned, Stoltzfus trained colt had come up empty in two previous starts in stakes races this season.
For Stoltzfus, the win was his tenth triumph in just 24 starts since shipping to Brandywine from Florida a few weeks ago. With two seconds and three thirds added to his victories, the 42-year-old horseman has compiled an incredible .504 average thus far.

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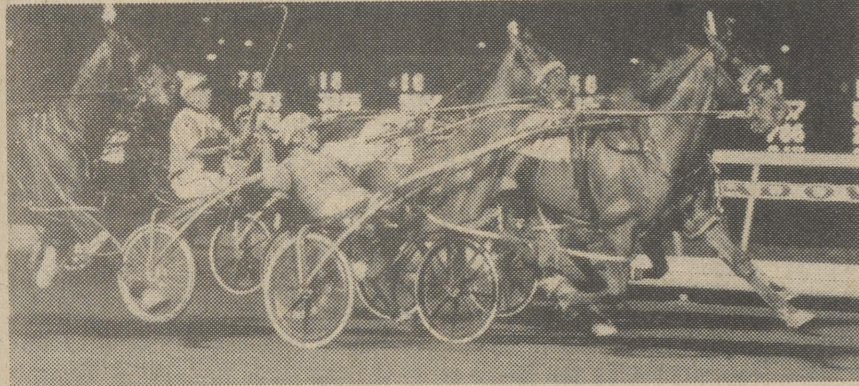

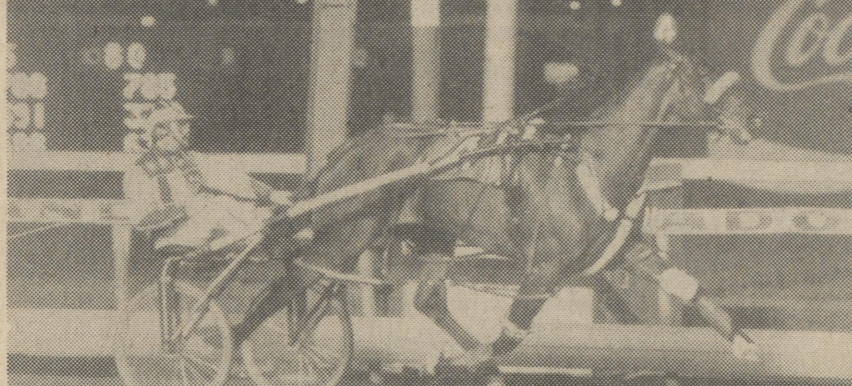

Desdemona Hanover won the \$34,900 Currier and Ives Filly Trot with Bill Fahy subbing for injured John Simpson, Jr. Desdemona beats Bonnie and Super Hattie in 2:01.3.

At Liberty Bell on Sunday Treisk-aideka wins it for Joe Scorsone in the \$7500 Preferred Pace in 1:56.4 over Laughing Man and Omaha Lus.

At Balmoral Park Illinois on Sunday in the \$17,500 Invitational Pace, Madge's Nero gets the win and all age track record in 1:56.2.

At Rosecroft on Sunday in the two \$20,000 Md. Sires Stakes for 3 year old fillies pace New Line with Jim Brittingham wins it in 2:03.1 and Handful of Charm with Bryan Truitt in 2:01.1. We wish to again thank Rosecroft Raceway and their management especially Tom Aldrich for their fine hospitality shown our party on Saturday night which included USTA official Grady Speers, Frank and Mr. Harry Quillen. "Pete" joined us after dinner. He came late due to attending earlier a graduation party for his granddaughter. The program on Saturday night was for the William E. Miller Memorial mile for pacers. The first division was won by Christmas List (Bud Foster) in 1:58.1 (:28:1:00.3; last quarter in :30.1. He just nosed out Goldcreek Reno (Bryce Truitt) with Windemere Promise (John Wagner) getting the show. Christmas List was a top colt last year and has raced well so far this year down in Florida. He has a lifetime record of 1:58. He had the 10th position in the race and left behind Goldcreek Reno for cover for most of the race. Foster said after he got him straightened out in the stretch he gathered himself up and came on like a freight train. He goes to Vernon Downs this week and according to Foster is scheduled for a

lot of big races this year. Foster said the slow second quarter actually won it for his horse...being that he was in the second tier. "They set the early pace which rated perfectly for my horse who is a grinder," said Foster. In the \$15,000 Invitational Pace, G.EX R-manero won it in 1:56. The week before he had gone in 1:55. They were trying to break the record but a slow first quarter...:28.2; a slow half...:58.3 and the three quarters in 1:27 was the story. He cut the mile and really opened up the lead in the final quarter. Roger had said earlier in the week in the track kitchen that he thought he could have set the world record the week before with Keystone Famous but a bumped bike early on spelled the difference.

The attendance for Saturday's card was 8200 with a new record handle of \$885,974. There were also 8 two minute miles. On Monday night at Rosecroft in the trotting stakes...the first was division of two for the Maryland Sire Stakes won by King's Lady (Ray Richards Jr. of Harrington) in 2:08.2, and Macies Girl getting the second division in 2:13.1 for Marty Burton. In the Maryland Standardbred Race Fund of two divisions it was Kismets Song (Robert Shahan in 2:06 with the 2nd going to Yankee Tornado with Per Eeriksson in 2:05. This meet at Rosecroft they wagered \$40 million with an average handle of \$475,555 and avg. attendance of 4280.

In the second division of the William E. Miller pace it was Mannart Maple Leaf getting the win for Rho Filion in 1:58.1 with fractions of :29; :57.4; and 1:28.4. He beat Holmes Hanover in a real squeaker also with Embrace Me (Bill Poppinger) up for the show. Rho said at track side that he knew the colt was a good one...even though he came in late. "I tucked in behind the 9 horse (Mind Bender) because I knew he would leave fast. The fractions also suited me especially the :31 second third quarter. I had just enough horse left at the wire...but nothing more beyond that. He is a lazy horse...and the slow fractions suited him, but every time I hit him (hit him three times) he came up a little more, said Rho.

Hubrail notes from the first Miller: Tom Houghton (Farmsteads Fame)... he was just a little short...only had one qualifying race...and he was a little sick...and not at his best on a half-mile track. John Wagner...thought I had put Bryce away at the 3/4 hoping the other were locked in back there...but when I pecked at my colt top of the stretch, touched him with the whip, he gave it up a little...might have been tired...and he doesn't like the whip... if the 4 horse (Farmsteads Fame) had come early, I might have let him go...I wanted to leave quick and open up some seats. Bryce Truitt...didn't want to go out real hard behind Wagner because the last time I tried to force him he went off stride...Fontaine's colt was bearing in and hitting the rail...so I had to come out...he was on one line coming out of the turn, and he bore in a little and then he was on that line some through the stretch...and they can't go as fast as they can when they're doing that...and that might have been the difference...but I don't want to make excuses...he went a real big trip...and it's great to be second, but it is kinda tough to lose just by a little...

Barton Lobell wins preferred race: George Allen impressive in return

Barton Lobell's impressive triumph at a preferred pace, George Allen's seasonal debut and Avon Row's upset victory in a fillies and mares open highlighted a thrilling week of racing action at Brandywine Raceway.

Forrest Gerry, III, guided Barton Lobell to his fifth victory in his last seven outings, capturing Saturday, May 12th's \$9,000 preferred pace with a 1:57.4 clocking. Most Happy Glenn (Abe Stoltzfus) led the field past the quarter pole in a blistering 27.4 before yielding the front end to Full Respect (Jim Porter) nearing the half. B.J. Scarlet (Tom Sells) was first over as the field passed the half in 57.4. Gerry, III, then tugged on Barton Lobell's right line, moving the 6-year-old son of Nansemond second over on the backstretch. As B.J. Scarlet took the front end nearing the three-quarter pole, Gerry, III put the Jim Angelo owned, Duane Stoliker trained gelding in full gear in pursuit of the leader.

After B.J. Scarlet led the field passed the three-quarter pole in 1:26.4, Barton Lobell charged up to take command rounding the far turn and quickly opened up a four length advantage. George S. (Ken McNutt), making his first start since the New Faces Series at The Meadowlands in March, took up the chase as the field turned for home but proved to be no match for the winner, fading to fourth at the wire behind the fast closing Duke Of Talbot (Red Ross) and Tar Keel (Bob Shahan).

George Allen who became the fastest 3-year-old pacer in harness racing last year with a 1:53 time trial at the Red Mile in October won his 1984 debut with an impressive 1:58.4 score in Sunday's (May 13) \$6,500 winners-over pace. The impeccably bred pacer has been standing in stud in Pennsylvania earlier in the year before owners returned him to the racing world as planned.

Avon Row (Stoltzfus) was a wire-to-wire victor in the co-featured \$5,500 fillies and mares open, holding off an impressive Whisper Wave (Kim Vincent) with a 28.3 kicker to notch a 2:00.2 triumph for owners Ben and

Sofia Scharf and trainer Merv Stoltzfus (*Correct*). The 6-year-old daughter of King's Row raced as a team with Whisper Wave from before the half, holding off the continuous challenge of the latter to prevail by a half length with Bola (Vern Carnk) finishing third. Scarlet Meema (Jim Campbell), a multiple stakes winner who posted 12 wins and one second in her 13 starts at two, made an equipment break shortly after the start and finished seventh in her 1984 debut.

Also on Saturday, Handsome Devil (Stoltzfus), the winner of the \$100,000 second consolation of the Woodrow Wilson Pace last year, scored his first win at three with a wire-to-wire victory in a conditioned event in 2:00.3. The Jerry Taylor owned, Stoltzfus trained colt had come up empty in two previous starts in stakes races this season.

For Stoltzfus, the win was his tenth triumph in just 24 starts since shipping to Brandywine from Florida a few weeks ago. With two seconds and three thirds added to his victories, the 42-year-old horseman has compiled an incredible .504 average thus far.

Third place was awarded to Scott Dimeler who performed brilliantly before an overheating engine sidelined him. Fourth went to Rich Littlefield followed by Kevin McMullin, John Allabaugh, Roland Saxton Jr. and Rick Nutter.

Jerry Stumpf and his #42 were in the I.F. pits and Jerry appears to have recovered from his serious illness of last year. However, he is still not up to driving so his wife Sandy (the car owner) selected Stoney Galebach to drive the dark blue #42.

Stoney started outside pole and quickly moved into the lead after two early interruptions. On the second lap Bob Dale moved into the lead only to find himself spinning out before the lap was completed obviously the victim of mechanical breakdown. This returned the lead to Galebach but now Jimmy Borthwick was the challenger. The two cars battled and swapped positions for the next four laps before the #77 took a solid lead. For nine laps Borthwick appeared headed for victory lane. With only five laps remaining in the race, Borthwick's engine gave out on the backstretch and Galebach was home free with a win that was the best therapy ever for Stumpf. 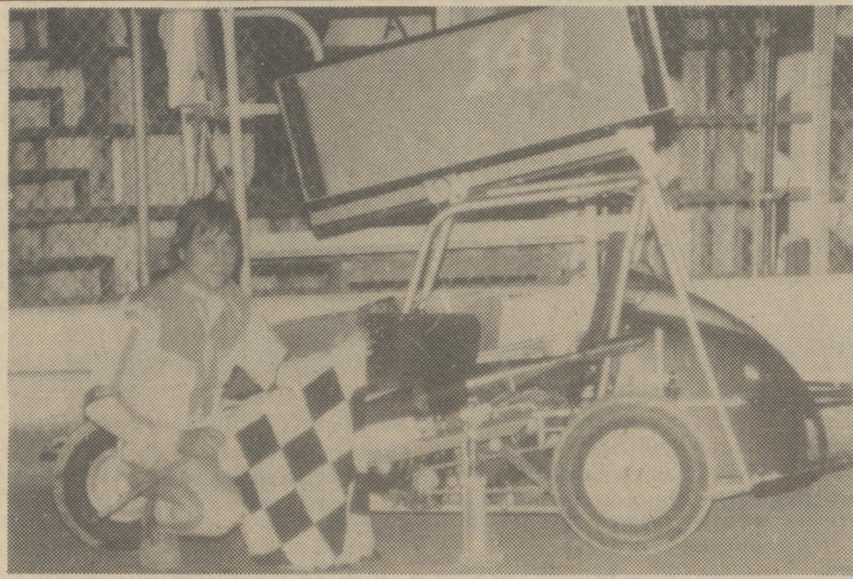

Stoney Galebach found himself in the lead with Mike DeFrank chasing him despite a sticking needle valve that could be heard all over the speedway area. DeFrank wasn't about to give up in his initial micro midget ride and he relentlessly manhandled an obviously imperfect running race car.

DeFrank persisted and ended up a fifth behind winner Galebach, Bennett, Bill King and Don Jacobs. Sixth place went to Nelson Carey followed by Don Trego, Baker, Willie Harrington and Jim McNeill whose brand new car failed to take the green flag.

The two stroke open feature saw a brilliant run from 5th to 1st on the first lap by Dennis Garehan. SUNDAY, MAY 6 - Cale Yarborough eased a little closer to the magic 100 victory mark when he notched his career 80th NASCAR Grand National Stock Race when he won the Winston 500 at Talladega.

It did not look like Cale would prevail the record setting lead changes (71 changes among 13 drivers) despite the fact that he broke his own pole setting record going 202.67 mph and set a new race record of 172.988 mph.

Early retirees from the race included the entire Junior Johnson team of Waltrip and Bonnett, both of whom had engine failure.

Yarborough was not getting the full mileage...or 50 he contended...his partners on the NASCAR circuit were getting. The late stages of the race saw fast running Buddy Baker and Benny Parsons pitting for fuel. With Gant and Yarborough still running, the crowd sensed the finale of the great race. When they pitted on lap 177, Gant and Yarborough took off for the remaining eleven laps (188).

Gant was strong and had plenty of fuel, but Yarborough fell on Gant's bumper for the remainder of the race, conserving tires and gas.

On the final lap, Yarborough drafted by Gant on the backstretch with Gant trying to redraft by him in the tri-oval. The plan failed again for Gant who finished second, one car length back. It marked the 15th time Gant has finished second in a NASCAR Race.

Many drivers contended there was a lot of debris on the track all day long. Earnhardt contended some had been there since the day before. The debris cost these drivers like Earnhardt and Bodine the race as they cut down tires and hit the wall. The high speeds left the cars out of control when they cut down the tires.

One highlight of the race was a fifteen lap shoot-out between two Hall-of-Famers...Richard Petty and David Pearson. The crowd gave them a standing ovation.

Ron Bouchard ran real strong on the track, the scene of his only victory. A broken and lost nut caused a costly pit stop...which he was never able to make up.

Yarborough claimed his fuel tank was bone dry at the end of the race. "I had to pump her several times in that last lap. I as afraid I would run out," he said.

Waltrip wins Coors 420

DAYTONA BEACH, FLA - NASCAR Winston Cup Grand National Director Dick Beatty, citing the intent of caution flag rules, declared Darrell Waltrip the official winner of Saturday night's Coors 420 at Nashville (Tenn.) International Raceway Monday, and Neil Bonnett as the second-place finisher.

When Waltrip, running just ahead of Bonnett, took the caution flag to complete the 419th lap of the 420-lap event, the cars should have been "frozen" into position as they crossed the start-finish line and not allowed to change position on the final lap, Beatty said.

"Safety has been and continues to be our top priority," Beatty said. "The intent of the caution flag is to protect the drivers. Allowing the drivers to race a full lap after receiving the yellow flag and pass the accident on the backstretch was not in the spirit or guidelines of our rules."

Beatty pointed out that NASCAR rules call for all cars to slow to a reasonable speed, regardless of position on the track, as soon as the yellow flag is displayed. Because there are no adequate procedures for "freezing" every car at its exact position at that point, the start-finish line marks that position, Beatty said.

"In this case, the caution flag was displayed before the leaders reached the start-finish line and not 'during the white flag lap,' as we initially ruled," Beatty said. "The final lap should have been run under a cautious pace because of the yellow flag conditions, and each car should have held the same position at the checkered flag that it did as it took the yellow flag to complete the 419th lap." Terry Labonte was officially declared the eighth place finisher and Dick Brooks ninth because of passing on the final lap.

"We misinterpreted the rule at the conclusion of the race and failed to incorporate the intent of the yellow flag rule," Beatty said. "We are currently reviewing the rules covering this type of situation in an attempt to better clarify the intent. We are going to do everything in our power to maintain our reputation as the safest form of motorsports."

The NASCAR Rule Book allows "corrections...prior to posting of official race results," which were posted late Monday afternoon, as well as allowing "final disposition of flag disputes (to be) decided by NASCAR official in charge of the event," which was, in this case, Beatty.

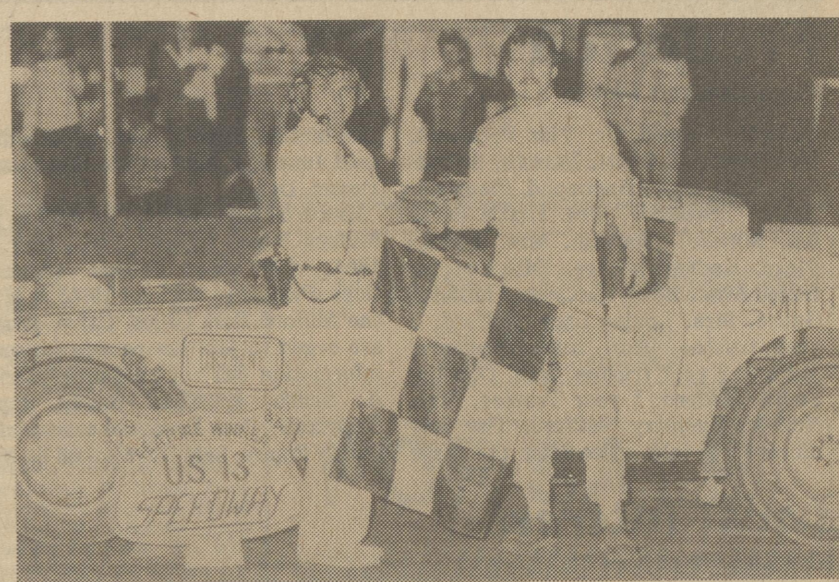

On lap twelve, disaster struck the leader as the motor let go in turn one

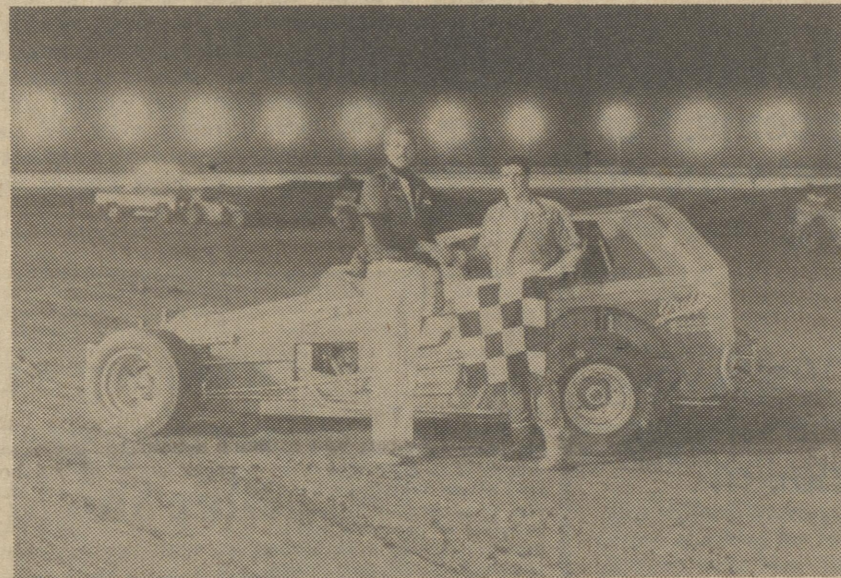
sending the car sliding to a stop and second place runner Mauser, with nowhere to go hit the rear of Brittain's car.

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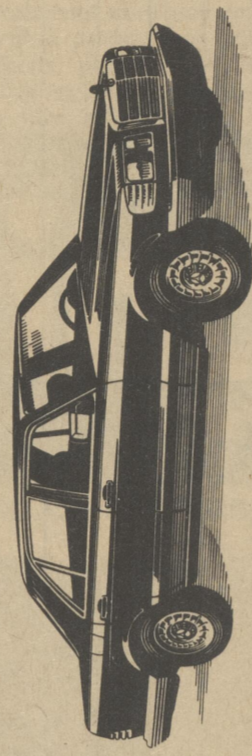
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Better Short Track Performance a Must for Miller High Life/Digard Team

The key factor which led to Bobby Allison and the Miller High Life/Digard racing team winning the 1983 NASCAR Winston Cup Championship was their amazing performance in the 10 short track events along the 30 race schedule. In the 10 races last year, Allison recorded two firsts, four second, three thirds, and a fourth. But that was 1983. Comparatively speaking, the record on the short tracks so far this year has been as different as day and night. In four events on tracks less than a mile in length, Allison insists, "We have run extra strong on all the short tracks, but with the blown engines, the broken rear-ends and the like, it's definitely cost us some wins. "Just look back at the Bristol race for instance," continued Allison. "We had a full lap on the entire field and then had the rear-end go out. That's been indicative of the way our luck has run." While the Miller High Life/Digard Buick was able to complete all but two laps, an incredible 4,367 of the 4,369 possible laps (99.954 per-
