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Williamsville honors Civil War dead

Historic Williamsville Chapel was the scene on Sunday for a moving tribute to those soldiers who fought and died in the Civil War.

About 125 people gathered in tiny Williamsville, located three miles southeast of Harrington, for a Memorial Day celebration to honor those who died in a war that divided the nation and destroyed time-honored traditions forever

The special service was coordinated by Marvin Schelhouse of the Williamsville Historical Society, and Cal Hollis, president of the society.

Schelhouse was decked out in the Union blue uniform and Hollis was garbed in Confederate gray.

Several women wore dresses of the Civil War era.

The ceremony began inside the chapel at 1 p.m. with Hollis' welcome speech

Greenwood man killed in motorcycle accident

Twenty-three year old Vincent P. Mahalik, of Greenwood was dead on arrival at Milford Memorial Hospital following a 9:25 p.m., May 20 accident. State Police accident reconstructionists from Troop 3 revealed that the accident occurred on county route 35, about two and one-tenth miles south of Frederica.

Mahalik and an unidentified friend left a party near Frederica and were headed home on their motorcycles. The victim was ahead of his friend, traveling south on his 650 cc Yamaha motorcycle. For some unknown reason, Mahalik lost control of the motorcycle in a sweeping righthand curve and he crossed into the northbound lane of county route 35. A 1983 Ford pickup truck, driven by Paul E. Reimer, 21, of Milford, struck the motorcycle as

Mahalik attempted evasive action. Mahalik and the motorcycle were dragged for almost fifty feet before

Reimer could stop his truck. Mahlik was taken by Frederica ambulance to Milford Hospital where he was pronounced dead at approximately 10:00 p.m. He suffered multiple head and chest trauma. Mahalik was wearing a helmet at the time of the accident. Investigators do not suspect that alcohol was involved.

County route 35 was completely closed for two hours following the accident while investigators completed necessary measuring. The death of Vincent Mahalik is Delaware's 35th highway fatality for 1984. On May 20, 1983, there were 31 traffic deaths.






next 2 days were spent touring London, and the group even took a half day to visit Winsor Castle outside London.
