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Williamsville honors Civil War dead

Historic Williamsville Chapel was the scene on Sunday for a moving tribute to those soldiers who fought and died in the Civil War.

About 125 people gathered in tiny Williamsville, located three miles southeast of Harrington, for a Memorial Day celebration to honor those who died in a war that divided the nation and destroyed time-honored traditions forever.

The special service was coordinated by Marvin Schelhouse of the Williamsville Historical Society, and Cal Hollis, president of the society.

Schelhouse was decked out in the Union blue uniform and Hollis was garbed in Confederate gray.

Several women wore dresses of the Civil War era.

The ceremony began inside the chapel at 1 p.m. with Hollis' welcome speech giving a brief history of the chapel.

"We're not sure when it was built, but we do know it was about 1850," Hollis said of the small chapel which is now on the National Register of Historic Places.

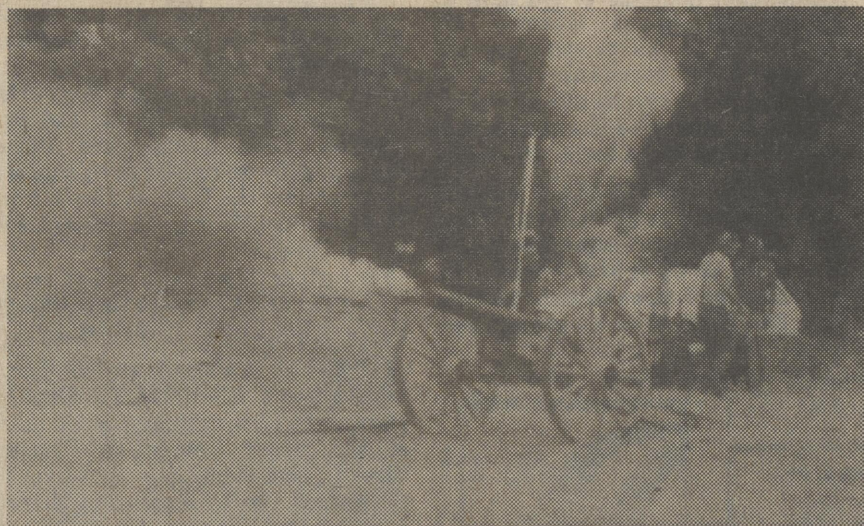
After prayers, hymns, Scripture readings, and patriotic songs, Schelhouse delivered a stirring speech on the Civil War.

"If the walls of this church could speak they would reveal the emotions, frustrations and uncertainties of those who worshipped here during the turbulent years between 1861 and 1865...it was known as the Civil War and it claimed the lives of over 600,000 men...Year by year it grew in purpose and meaning, and today it is known as Memorial Day and honors all men and women who paid the supreme sacrifice for this country in all the wars from the Revolution up to the most recent losses incurred in Lebanon and Central America," Schelhouse told the assemblage.

Schelhouse has been a Civil War buff for the past 20 years.

The Asbury Quartet (Keith Burgess, Matt Burgess, Jim Olson, Dale Jarrell) followed Schelhouse's speech with a galvanic rendition of "battle hymn of the Republic."

At the conclusion of the chapel service

the group moved outside for a grave-site ceremony.

Standing only a few feet from the graves of several Civil War veterans, Chaplain John H.K. Miller, State and National Chaplain, Veterans of Foreign Wars, delivered a speech in which he made a plea for national unity.

"Today it seems to me, me, me, instead of we, we, we," said Miller.

Rebekah Hollis and George S. Manlove gave readings, and the Asbury Quartet gave rousing interpretations of "Deep River," "Swing Low Sweet Chariot," and "America the Beautiful." Matt Burgess played "Taps."

John Ellsworth, a Lewes blacksmith, fired an authentic Civil War cannon,

which he owns. Ellsworth is a descendant of Ephraim Ellsworth, the first officer killed in the Civil War.

According to the story handed down the generations, the Civil War Ellsworth was a friend of Abraham Lincoln. He reportedly saw a Confederate flag flying outside an inn in Alexandria, Va. Fearing that the Confederate banner would offend Lincoln, Ellsworth was climbing the pole to remove the flag when he was shot by the innkeeper.

A second cannon blast about 3 p.m. signaled the end of the services.

Refreshments, including homemade ice cream, hot dogs, soda, and popcorn were available following the ceremony.

Profits in profanity

When the customers stop cussing at the tavern in Stone's Hotel, the Harrington Little League players will have fewer bats and balls.

It all started in 1975 when owner Ray Gagne decided to upgrade the language used in his popular bistro.

Gagne had an idea.

He decided to place a "Cuss Jar" on the bar. The cuss jar is a plastic outsized whiskey bottle that stands about three feet high. Every time a patron cussed, he would be asked to put a coin in the jar.

But Gagne didn't know what to do with the money that would accumulate. He thought of maybe having a party for his customers when the cuss jar became full.

His problem was solved when Allen Baker walked into the bar one night. Baker was then president of the Harrington Little League.

"He looked like he was really put through the ringer," Gagne laughed. "We got to talking and he told me the Little League had only one ball. They were so broke they couldn't afford another."

Gagne now knew what he would do with the money. He would donate it to

the Harrington Little League.

In that first year, Gagne donated \$230 to the Little League coffers.

In 1976, a good year for the cussers made the Little League \$550 richer.

During 1977 the profane people were really prolific. They racked up \$700 in cuss words.

"The next year I decided to put some of the money in the bank to draw interest. I figured if the cuss jar peters out, I'll still have something to give the Little League," Gagne said.

For the next four years Gagne and his cussing clientele contributed \$1,000 a year to the Little League. Everything over \$1,000 was deposited in the bank.

By now Gagne had expanded his cuss jar business to include another jar in his package store adjacent to the bar. The new jar didn't require the contributor to cuss. He donated his coins simply out of a desire to help the Little League.

In three years the package store jar collected \$1,465.

The money jars have collected a grand total of \$10,320 since Gagne hatched his money-making idea ten years ago.

Cuss money bought a \$1,375 pitching machine in 1982 and has, over the

years, helped pay for backstops, bats, balls, and uniforms.

Most bar patrons pay the cussing penalty with a smile, but not all.

For example, there was the man who said if they ever took any of his money he would never come in again.

One day he cussed.

"I immediately took a quarter. He never came in again," Gagne laughed.

Then there was the rowdy softball team from Smyrna.

"They turned the jar upside down and one of them grabbed the money," Gagne said, "I had him arrested. The judge stipulated that he make a \$25 donation to the Little League."

A woman came in, looked at the jar, and said, "What the #!%?# is that?"

Gagne took a dime.

"What the #!%?# are you doing?" Gagne took another dime.

"Put that back, you #!%?#!"

Another dime.

"She was smiling, though," said Gagne, "She took it as a joke."

But regardless of how you take it, if you cuss in Gagne's bar, you pay. Anyway, it helps the Little League. And anyone who wouldn't help the little League is a (expletive deleted).

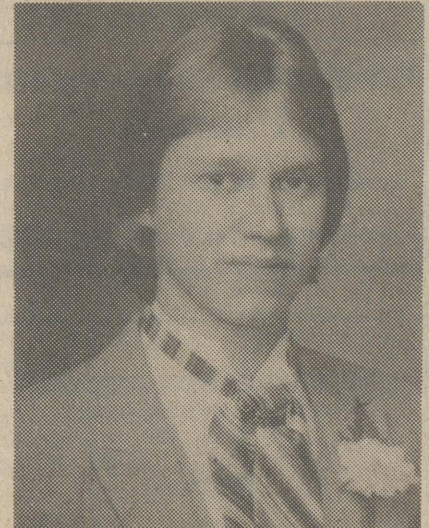
enemies as well as our friends, to try to reach that delicate balance that will keep our country safe and lead to peace? What is the role of the peacekeeper?

Greenwood man killed in motorcycle accident

Twenty-three year old Vincent P. Mahalik, of Greenwood was dead on arrival at Milford Memorial Hospital following a 9:25 p.m., May 20 accident. State Police accident reconstructionists from Troop 3 revealed that the accident occurred on county route 35, about two and one-tenth miles south of Frederica.

Mahalik and an unidentified friend left a party near Frederica and were headed home on their motorcycles. The victim was ahead of his friend, traveling south on his 650 cc Yamaha motorcycle. For some unknown reason, Mahalik lost control of the motorcycle in a sweeping righthand curve and he crossed into the northbound lane of county route 35. A 1983 Ford pickup truck, driven by Paul E. Reimer, 21, of Milford, struck the motorcycle as

Mahalik attempted evasive action. Mahalik and the motorcycle were dragged for almost fifty feet before Reimer could stop his truck.

Mahalik was taken by Frederica ambulance to Milford Hospital where he was pronounced dead at approximately 10:00 p.m. He suffered multiple head and chest trauma. Mahalik was wearing a helmet at the time of the accident. Investigators do not suspect that alcohol was involved.

County route 35 was completely closed for two hours following the accident while investigators completed necessary measuring. The death of Vincent Mahalik is Delaware's 35th highway fatality for 1984. On May 20, 1983, there were 31 traffic deaths.

Milford woman in chicken cook-off

Ruth M. Hurley of Milford has been selected as one of the 26 finalists from the northeastern United States to compete in the 1984 Delmarva Chicken Cooking Contest. Cook-off finals will be held on Saturday, June 9, in Salisbury, Md.

The Delmarva Chicken Festival, the usual site of the chicken cooking

contest, has been cancelled this year because of the recent outbreak of avian flu. The festival is held every year and the cooking contest is held every other year (in even-numbered years).

The contest is closed to the public to eliminate the possibility of people coming from those areas that have been exposed to the avian flu, according to Connie Parvis, a representative

of the Delmarva Poultry Industry, Inc. which sponsors the cooking contest.

Hurley was selected as a finalist on the basis of her "Cabbage Patch Chicken" recipe, which she sent to contest officials.

"I'm not a competitive cook. I entered only once before, but didn't win," Hurley said.

Hurley is the mother of four boys and one girl, all of whom enjoyed "Cabbage Patch Chicken" while growing up, according to Hurley.

"They'll all be rooting for me," she laughed.

"It's an old recipe. I've updated the name," she added.

The grand prize winner will receive a 10-day trip for two to Hawaii plus \$1,000 spending money, a Frigidaire microwave oven, LP gas grill, and household gifts from Sunbeam, Wear-Ever and McCormick & Co. Second and third place winners will share an additional \$2,500 and a collection of appliances and cookware.

The 96 mile crossing of the English Channel took almost 6 hours before docking at Portsmouth. After the quick trip to London, the group was ready for a good night's sleep. The next 2 days were spent touring London, and the group even took a half day to visit Windsor Castle outside London.

CABBAGE PATCH CHICKEN
Ruth M. Hurley
1 broiler-fryer chicken, cut in parts, skinned
1/2 cup margarine
8 tablespoons flour, divided
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup minced onion
1/2 cup sliced mushrooms
1 cup chicken broth
1 cup milk
6 cups chopped cabbage

oven about 45 minutes or until chicken is fork tender. Makes 4 servings.

In oven-proof frypan, place margarine and melt over medium heat. Remove from heat. Add chicken, one piece at a time, turning to coat. In shallow dish, mix together 5 tablespoons of the flour, salt and pepper. Add chicken, one piece at a time, dredging to coat. Heat frypan with remaining butter to medium temperature. Return chicken to frypan and cook, turning about 10 minutes or until brown on all sides. Remove chicken and set aside. In same frypan, place onion and mushrooms and cook until onion is transparent. Add remaining 3 tablespoons of flour, stirring until mixed. Add broth and milk; cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until thick and smooth. Add cabbage and stir to mix. Place chicken in single layer over cabbage mixture. Cover and bake in 375°F.

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The case of the mysterious balloons

LF F.L.A.G. Raisers Meeting

On Monday evening, April 30, 1984 at Lake Forest North Elementary School library, a special F.L.A.G. Raisers meeting was held. For our program, the Smyrna Phoenix, gifted and talented group from Smyrna School District, and their teacher Mrs. Betty Hudson, were present to present a demonstration of their robot named "Eagle".

The robot was purchased from Heathkit Company in kit form for the amount of \$1200.00. The building of the robot took between 5 to 6 months working an average of 2 nights per week for completion. The student team was selected by application with 15 persons on the team. The students participating in the construction of the robot ranged from 5th through 12th grades.

Barry Solway was the Master of Ceremonies for the demonstration. Brian Hobbs showed a slide presentation entitled "Making of Eagle I", a film which the students themselves produced. Richard Bordley described the video equipment and described the making of the film.

Before attempting the assembly of "Eagle I," the team contacted personnel from Clifton Precision Instrument to better comprehend the material and instructions and from Dover Air Force Base to learn Quality Control. Maj. Hish, Avionics, Dover AFB donated some material. Mr. Al Vitron, photographer was helpful with the structure of the robot. Mr. Gushione from Del. Tech gave his assistance with electronics. The circuit boards were assembled after learning

the basic fundamentals of soldering at Del Tech.

Brad McFarland demonstrated the robot "Eagle" weighing approximately 35 lbs. and speaks, "My name is Eagle." He has 14 circuit boards and runs on batteries. He has a separate motor for each movement. He can walk with 3 speeds forward and backward. There are 2 speeds for arm movement. His head rotates with 3 speeds for head movement. He can pick up an object. He senses light and can detect the brightest light. He has a motion detector which can even count the number of times he detects motion. He can be programmed to detect hearing.

The presentation of "Eagle I" was received with much enthusiasm and the F.L.A.G. students of Lake Forest School District are very appreciative of Smyrna Phoenix Team taking the time to demonstrate their robot.

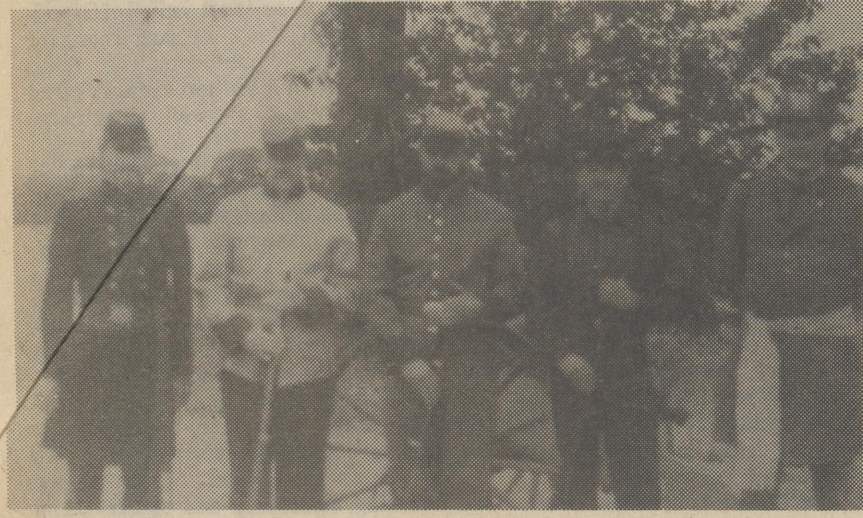

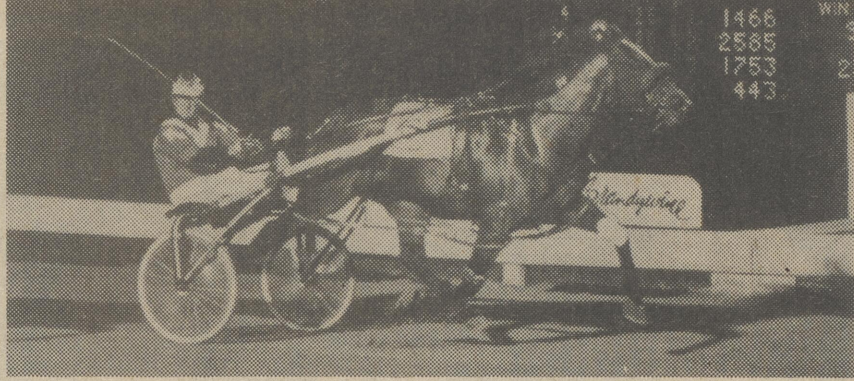

Jeff Cameron guided discerning to a

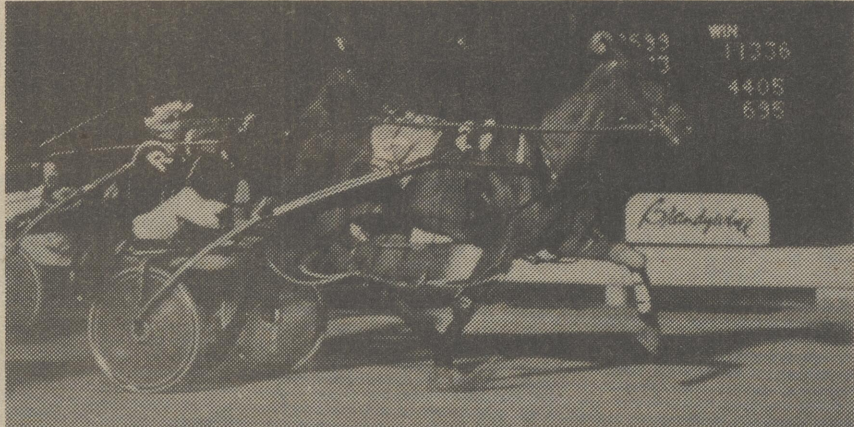

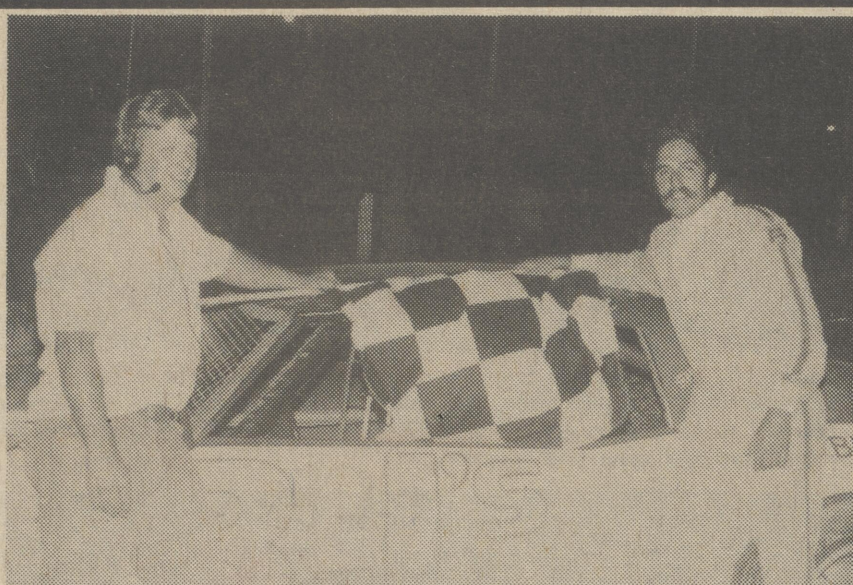
of the field.

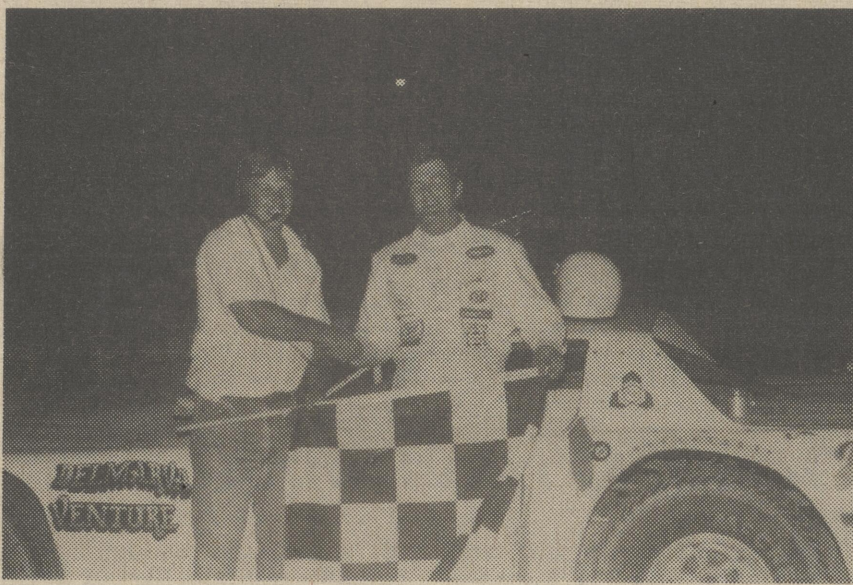

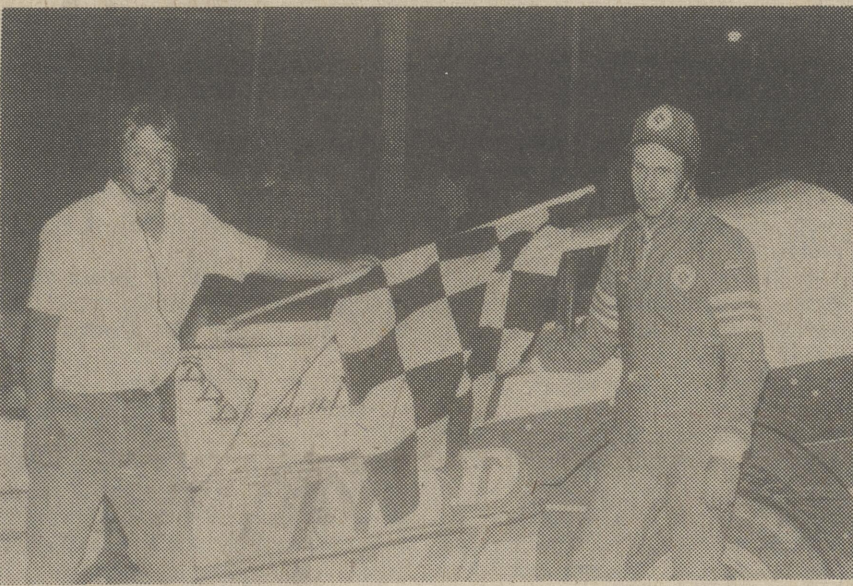
