"It didn't really come out of the corn field. It stuck its head out and went back in. It looked like the head of some kind of big cat. It was all black. It scared me," said Jimmy, a wellspoken, intelligent youngster.

"No way I'm going near that corn field until they find out what that animal is," Jimmy added.

Originally sighted June 19 in a small wooded area between Liberty and Clark streets in Harrington, the same animal, or one remarkably similar, has now been spotted on four occasions in the Five Points area.






