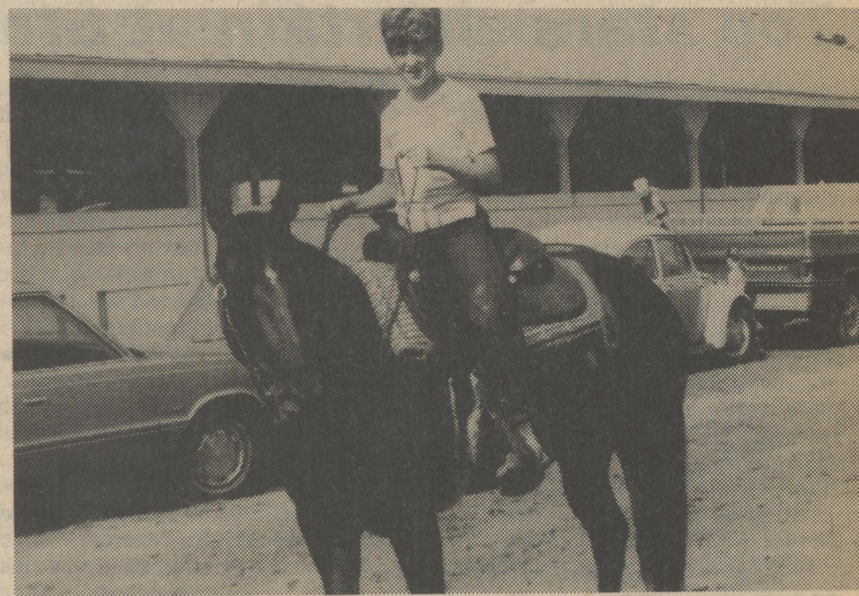

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School Board unlocks more issues — Coverdale goes back to High School

LAKE FOREST HIGH SCHOOL - The third Tuesday of the month has now become the new official regular night for the School Board in Lake Forest to meet. Last Tuesday was the night.

One of the largest gatherings of citizens from the Lake Forest School District showed up for the regular Board Meeting. One of the hottest items on the agenda was the one to return Michael Coverdale to the faculty of the Lake Forest Ag Department. That item along with two other items...the second being to instruct the Guidance Department of the Lake Forest School District to enroll any student who so desires to be enrolled in a Vo-Ag course and thirdly to continue the Co-Op program under the guidance and supervision of the Department Chairman, Jim Testerman. This precipitated a great controversy among Board members mainly because it was not on the original agenda. The question was called and a vote taken

with the official vote being 3 in favor, one against and one not voting (Roberta O'Neal). The latter declaring the motion not in order according to Roberts rules of order whereas she understood it to be that the three items should be broken down and voted on separately.

Some Board members who were against the motion reasoned that the matter of reinstating a teacher from the Junior School where he (Coverdale) had been assigned, to the High School was in fact intervening with policy reserved for the Superintendent and his administration.

The motion on all three items carried. The net result was that Mr. Coverdale would be paid out of "local funds"... that is taxpayer's money if the so-called unit count which is formulated by the State Board of Education to determine the number of teachers for each school. As of now...based on the May-June count of students, the number of units is down and therefore it follows that the number of teachers is

down. In short, some were let go...and in Mr. Coverdale's case assigned to the

Junior School. New Board member Russell

McCready reasoned that historically the number of students has always been down at the end of the year from what it was at the beginning of the school year. McCready says the student enrollment will be up when school resumes in September...justifying the need for the extra teacher.

Going unnoticed is the fact that the Business Department has lost a teacher "...one teacher is now without a job...", said Vicky Boyd, who is a ranking member of the teachers association (the union). Board president Wallace Caulk said more teachers will be hired if the need so dictates either through unit count or basic need due to too many students per teacher.

At one point Mr. Caulk made an inquiry as to why there were so many drop-outs in the District. Theories were offered by the administration that the Co-Op program contributed to the number of drop-outs. It appeared that Mr. Caulk did not rest his case on this matter. "I feel this is a matter of

utmost importance...and I feel we need to reduce this number in this category," he said.

An issue that was greatly overshadowed by the controversy which beset the School Board meeting was the matter of whether or not the "trailer-classes" would arrive in time to start the new school year in September. These units are programmed to go to the school at East

Elementary in Frederica. According to Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds for the District, Charles Sausbury, "...it appears that it will be close. I cannot say at this time whether the delivery will be made. It does not look good," he said.

In other matters, Glen Davidson was made the new Assistant Principal for Lake Forest North Elementary. Under the new plan for meetings the workshop will meet the first Tuesday of the month, and the regular Board meeting will convene on the second Tuesday.

Fairgoers flock to 65th Annual State Fair

The nine busiest days of the year in Harrington began last Friday with the official opening of the 65th annual Delaware State Fair.

Make that ten days if you count Thursday's preview.

Gary Simpson and other fair officials, looking toward a record-setting crowd, lined up some of the country's top talents, including such headliners as the Charlie Daniels Band, David Frizzell and Shelly West, Boxcar Willie, and the Hubcaps among others.

The fair's schedule of events also included stock car racing, the Joie Chitwood Thrill Show, and all-girl mud wrestling.

Something entirely new, a draft horse

pulling contest, can be seen today at 12 noon.

The Strate Shows, with their many exciting rides and game booths on the midway provide the kids with abundant fun and thrills.

For those who work up an appetite there is the large ham or chicken platter for only \$3.75 at the Delaware State Grange food booth, and the scrumptious steak sandwiches served by Haven Bare at his booth to the right of the grandstand entrance, along with the many other booths offering food and drinks.

Yet to come are the aforementioned draft horse pulling contest at 12 noon today, and tonight's championship stock car racing starting at 7:15 p.m.

Thursday, which combines Governor's Day, Hardee's Day, and Senior Citizens' Day, will see The Speer Family and The Hinsons perform their popular gospel-singing acts. For those 60 and over there is free admission to the fairgrounds and for those 65 and over there is free admission to the grandstand show.

Hardee's coupons, when exchanged with \$5.00 at the Fair will entitle the holder to unlimited rides on the James E. Strates Midway from Noon until closing. Coupons will also be available which call for free admission into the grandstand show that same evening. Fireworks will follow the show.

On Friday the internationally famous Boxcar Willie will be on hand to

perform his country music act in two grandstand shows (7:30 p.m. and 9:30 p.m.) with fireworks to follow.

The Giant Demolition derby can be seen at 12 noon on Saturday.

Winding up this year's fair on Saturday night with two shows will be the multi-award-winning Charlie Daniels Band.

The Charlie Daniels Band represents the largest outlay of cash for a grandstand show in the fair's history.

But fair officials expect the top country western band which also appeals to rock and pop fans to pack the grandstand for the two shows with an act that will create a bigger bang than the fireworks that follow.

FIFE hits homer in Houston

HOUSTON - This tiny town of 300 is now the national headquarters for The American Institute of Fellows in Free Enterprise (FIFE).

In a ceremony on Saturday, the onetime Broad Street home of John Wharton, a former Houston general store proprietor, was dedicated as FIFE Hall.

The 12-year-old FIFE is a dream come true for Cal Hollis Jr., a 67-year-old retired Milford-area businessman.

Hollis organized FIFE in 1972 to teach America's young people the basic principles of our economic and free enterprise system.

Economics often referred to as the "dismal science," isn't ordinarily a subject that generates a great deal of enthusiasm among young people. But as conceived by Hollis the kids

took to it like a cat to catnip. Demonstrating the original thinking so valuable in the free enterprise system, Hollis decided to teach the subject by making a game of it — a game of baseball.

Thus, "You Can Do It" baseball was born.

In the game, teams of students "pitch" and "field" questions. Some questions are "singles," others are "doubles," "triples," and "homers."

Teams compete locally, and the championship team is decided in a "World Serious" playoff.

"We borrowed that one from old Dizzy Dean," said Hollis, referring to the old-time baseball star who was great in pitching but poor in pronunciation.

"Mystery Animal" stalks Five Points

Two large German shepherds apparently were attacked last Thursday by the big cat-like animal that has stalked the Five Points area for the past three weeks.

The shepherds, along with a smaller mongrel, all owned by George and Sylvia Eilers of Five Points, suffered cuts and scrapes over the eyes and along the jaws, according to Sylvia.

"It about took the hide right off them," said Sylvia.

"He (one of the shepherds) can bite an automobile tire and flatten it. So you know that animal has to be pretty big and strong to cut him up," said George.

"That's right," said Sylvia. "Our mailman had four brand new tires, and that dog bit a hole right through one of them. The mailman went a little ways and had a flat."

Sylvia said she saw a large animal go under her house about 9 a.m. on Thursday.

"At first I thought it was an overgrown cat. Then I got to thinking — it was too big to be a (house) cat," Sylvia said.

George and Sylvia raise chickens in a pen in their backyard.

"The last time I counted them, I counted 38," said Sylvia. "I don't know if any are missing, but five of them were out of their cage."

The five dogs they own have been "acting up for the last couple of weeks," said George.

He believes the "big cat" could be trying to get at the chickens and that the dogs have picked up its scent.

Sylvia wasn't the only Five Points resident to see the animal last Thursday.

Twelve-year-old Jimmy Wilkerson was in his home when he saw the animal in a cornfield about 15 yards from the house.

"It didn't really come out of the corn field. It stuck its head out and went back in. It looked like the head of some kind of big cat. It was all black. It scared me," said Jimmy, a well-spoken, intelligent youngster.

"No way I'm going near that corn field until they find out what that animal is," Jimmy added.

Originally sighted June 19 in a small wooded area between Liberty and Clark streets in Harrington, the same animal, or one remarkably similar, has now been spotted on four occasions in the Five Points area.

Bill Quillen talks on drugs in Journal visit

Bill Quillen, democratic candidate for governor, visited *The Harrington Journal* Friday en route to the official opening of the Delaware State Fair.

Quillen said there will be a major emphasis on drug law enforcement in his campaign.

"We have to arrest more than just a bunch of kids on a street corner. We have to reach those higher up," he said.

The amount of money spent in the battle against drug abuse is "incredibly small," Quillen said.

"They talk of the good government has done. That's one area in which they have hurt us," he added.

As a corridor state surrounded by land, sea, and air, Delaware is vulnerable to drug trafficking, according to Quillen.

The Delaware State Police drug unit of only nine men "ought to be doubled," he added.

Quillen, in a talk last month before the Delaware Trial Lawyers Association, said that "80 to 80 percent of the robberies, burglaries, assaults, and thefts committed in Delaware are drug-related."

He said the National Institute of Drug Abuse found that an average of 3.6 crimes per week are committed by narcotics addicts.

Despite the magnitude of the drug problem, Delaware is "doing very little to meaningfully deal with the drug abuse problem," Quillen told the trial lawyers.

"A multi-faceted attack on the illegal use of drugs including enhanced law-enforcement efforts, improved drug rehabilitation efforts, and increased efforts to educate the young people as well as the general public of this state to the dangers of drug abuse must be a

Hollis hopes to get national companies involved as sponsors so that junior high school students throughout the nation can play "You Can Do It Baseball" next Feb. 22, George Washington's birthday.

The first "You Can Do It" game, held in Milford Middle School on Jan. 15, 1976, saw bands and cheerleaders and more than 1,000 people turn out to "cheer young Americans from the left-field bleachers."

In recognition of its historic significance "You Can Do It" baseball, Milford Middle School was inducted as the first member into FIFE's national hall of fame. A plaque honoring the school was awarded to School Principal Dr. Gary Annett in Saturday's ceremony.

Hollis, in his traveling days as an officer of the National Federation of Independent Businessmen, often asked his business friends for their ideas on "what makes this country tick."

The questioning of his friends sparked

the idea for the founding of the non-profit American Institute of Fellows in Free Enterprise.

Hollis' probing also resulted in a book titled *The Story of What Makes America Tick*, an anthology of essays in which 16 authors give their philosophies on the whys and wherefores of the success of America's free enterprise system.

The book, compiled by Hollis, has been placed in 3,000 schools.

Former U.S. Senator and Delaware governor J. Caleb Boggs was grand marshal of a parade that moved down Broad Street from Delaware 14 at 11 a.m. The parade, including three horse-drawn carriages, was led by the Greater Newark Colonial Fife and Drum Corps.

Thomas Stainback, former president of the New York Chamber of Commerce, was installed as the new honorary chairman of FIFE, succeeding the retiring Boggs.

Also attending the ceremony was former Delaware governor, Sherman W. Tribbitt, who led the Pledge of Allegiance.

After the brief Pledge of Allegiance, Hollis drew laughs, saying "with politicians, you have to give them something that comes to a stop."

Following the ceremony hot dogs and apple pie were served. These traditional American favorites were washed with lemonade, perhaps in deference to Hollis' dictum: "The kid with a lemonade stand is free enterprise in its youngest form."

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Strong winds cause damage in Greenwood area

At approximately 9:30 a.m., July 18, 1984, a strong force of wind from the south west passed through the Greenwood area causing damage to property in the area. The most severely damaged property in the Greenwood area included that of a mobile home on Sussex County Road 590 west of Greenwood and the Woodbridge School on U.S. Rt. 13. The mobile home, which is owned by George L. Jefferson, Jr., 25, of R.D. 2, Greenwood, was occupied by Lisa McCafferty, 24, of the same address at the time the damage was incurred, however, Miss McCafferty was uninjured. Two trees fell onto the mobile home causing the mobile home

to partially collapse. The force of wind then travelled through Greenwood causing damage to the roof shingles and grounds of Woodbridge School. Most of the damage incurred by the winds was structural. Several TV towers, flagpoles and trees were damaged. The area of damage stretched from approximately 1 mile west of Greenwood to approximately 1 mile east of Greenwood.

An area on State Route 30 near Milford and Sussex County Road 207 and Sussex County Road 225 near Lincoln experienced similar winds. The only damage in this area was tree and structural damage to TV antennas.

Arrests made in tattoo shop burglary

Delaware State Police Troop 3 in Woodside have made two arrests in connection with the burglary of Diamond State Tattoo in which approximately \$2800.00 worth of tattooing equipment, stereo equipment, and ivory figurines were taken. The burglary occurred between February 28, 1984 and March 4, 1984.

Investigators at Troop 3 executed a search warrant on Wednesday, July 11, 1984 at the residence of Bruce Lowder, 22, of 16A Whispering Pines Trailer Park, Magnolia, Delaware and recovered tattooing equipment valued at approximately \$1,000.00. During the search, marijuana and drug paraphernalia was discovered. Lowder was arrested for receiving stolen property felony, possession of drug paraphernalia. He was arraigned at Magistrate

Court 6 in Harrington and released on \$5,000 unsecured bond.

A second search warrant was executed on Friday, July 13th, 1984 at the residence of James C. Gallager, 22, of 3025B Hawthorne Drive, Dover, Delaware. A reel to reel tape recorder, tapes, and ivory figurines valued at approximately \$900.00 was recovered. Gallager was arrested for receiving stolen property felony. He was arraigned by Magistrate Court 6 in Harrington and released on \$2,000 unsecured bond.

The recovered property was identified as the property taken in the burglary.

Diamond State Tattoo, located on U.S. Rt. 113 in Dover, is owned by Bert and Amber Vangorder. Other arrests are pending.

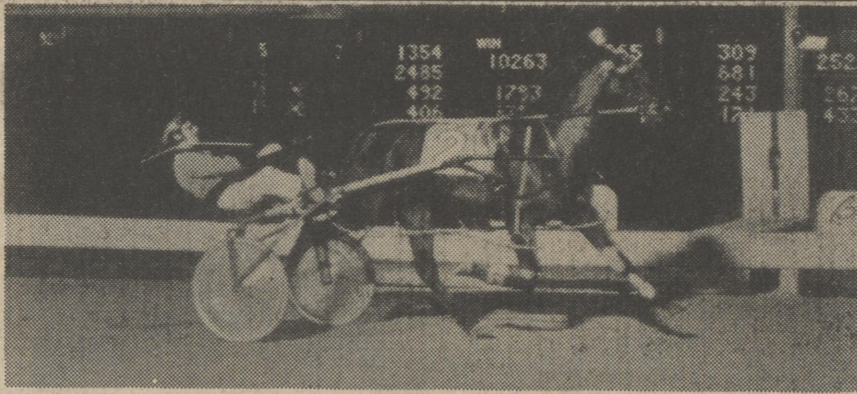

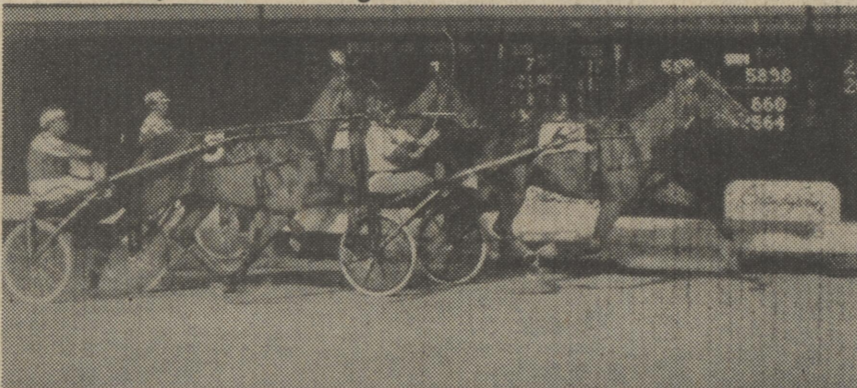

As the horses fanned but for the drive home, Farrington, swung the Lloyd and Nancy Arnold owned son of Warm Breeze to the outside and wore down the leaders to win by a head over Accordion with Farm Main Man a neck back in third.

Escape Forever proved that it was Herve forever as the Herve Filion bred, co-owned and driven colt scored

a 2:00.2 victory in the third division. 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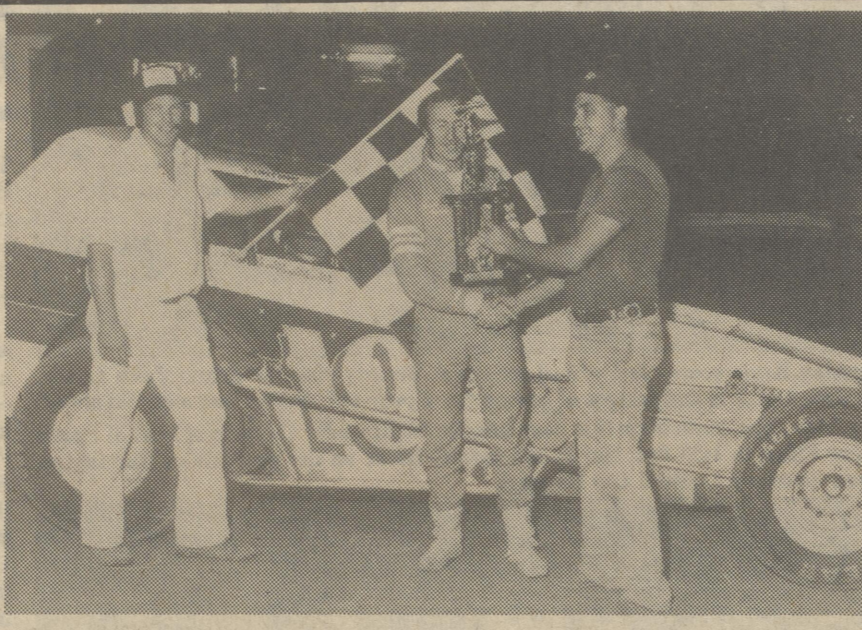

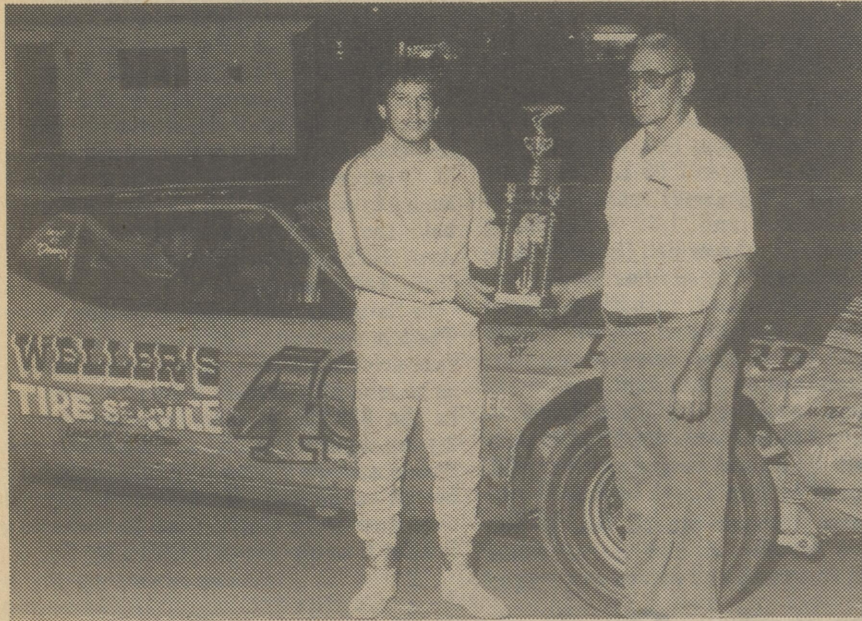

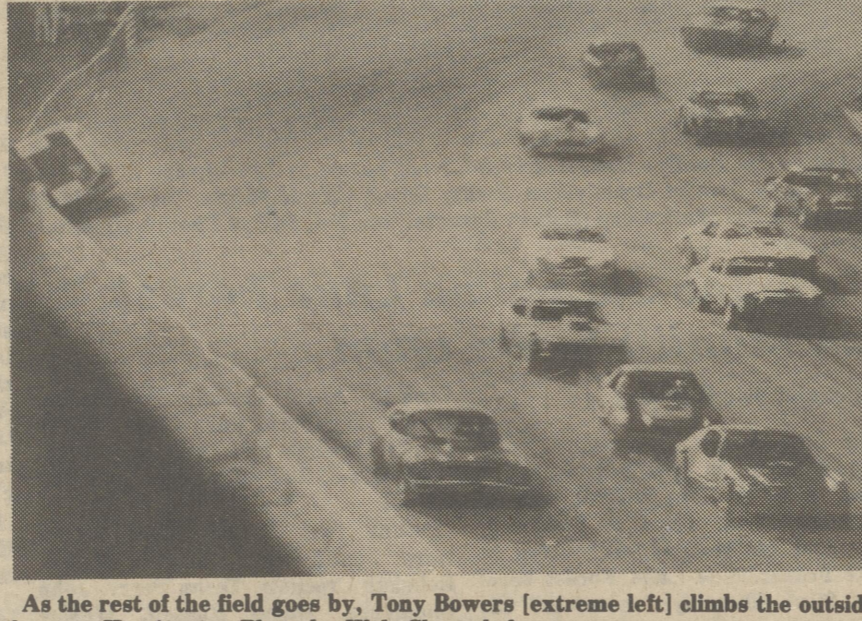

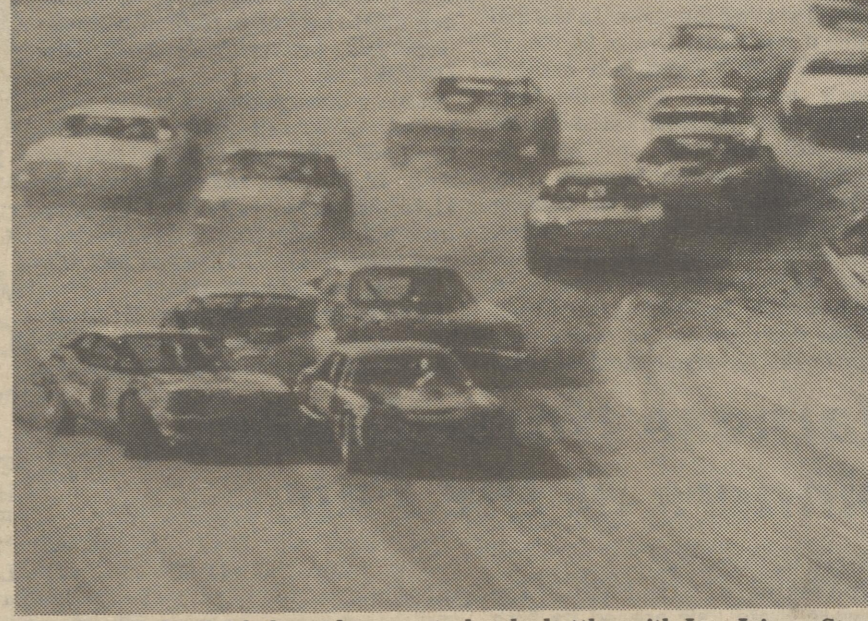

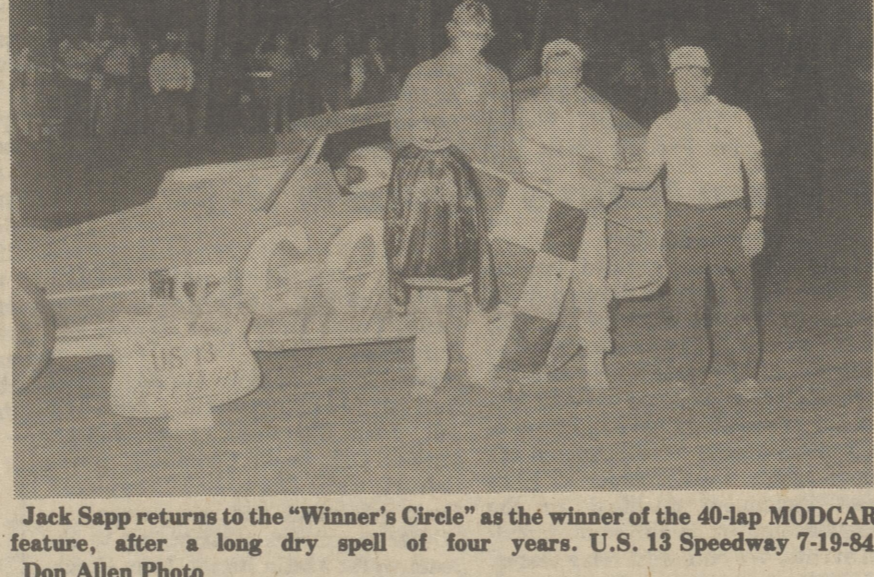

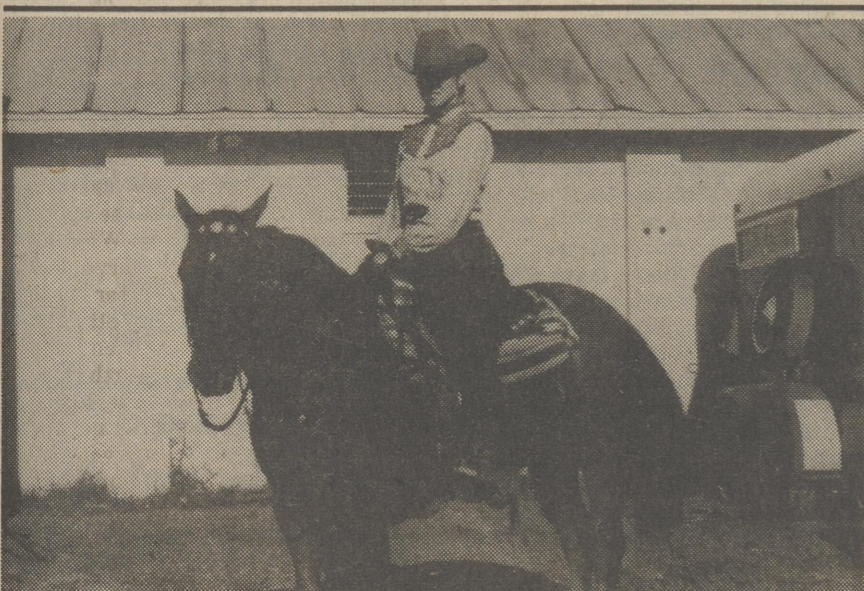

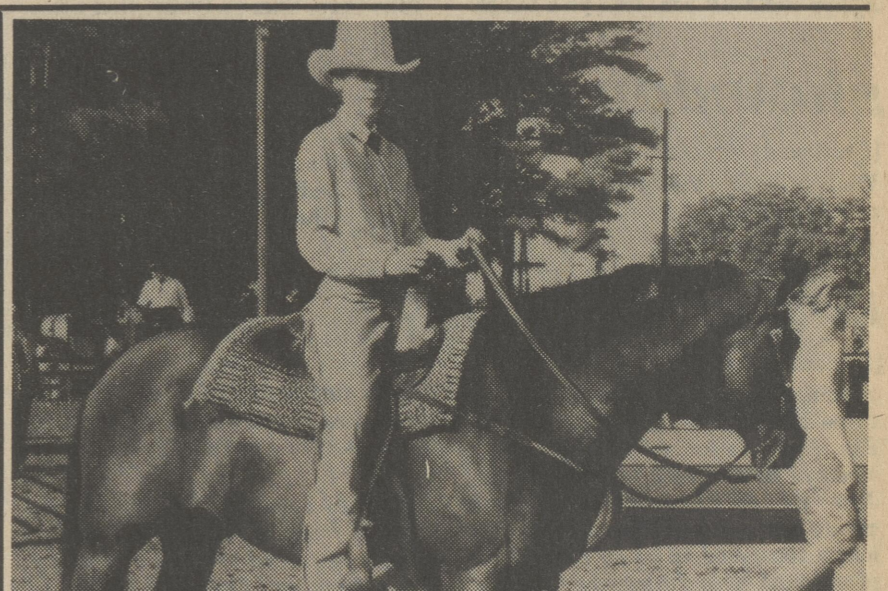

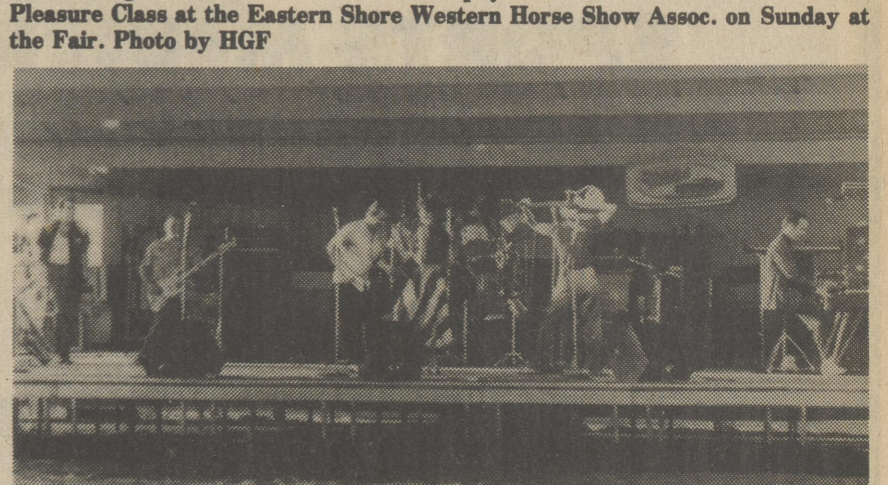

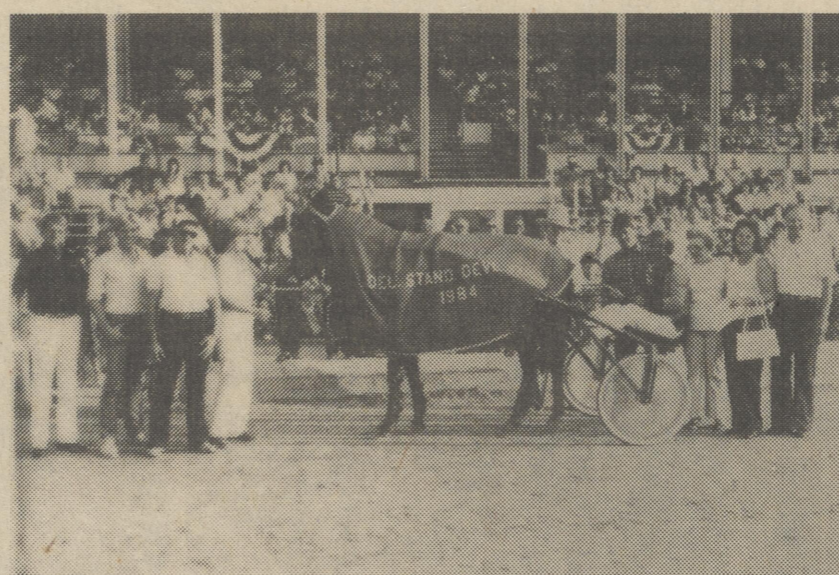

The plant itself resembled the week commonly known as Hog week, but these plants produced a cascade of hot pink blooms which hung down in the manner of wisteria. The common name was "Kissing Strings". Ask your Senior citizen friends and maybe someone will be able to tell us about it.

What are you cooking these hot, humid days? As I've said before, I am a firm believer in something hot in your stomach at least once a day. We do lean heavily on ham and potato salad which is what I served by house guests last week. Fresh green beans from the garden made the hot dish.

Today was a bit cloudy with a cool breeze, so I wanted to get away from the inevitable tuna, good though it may be. So I went down to the shop and counted noses to see how many for lunch, and I came up and made spaghetti with meat sauce. It was a welcome change.

I collect recipes for coffee breads, and recently I found a new one. It was well received by the family (except for the kids who do not like raisins) but you could leave them out if that is a problem with your youngsters. This is called "Peanut Butter Bread". Here's how: In a mixing bowl cream together 3/4 cup peanut butter, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/4 cup molasses and 2 eggs. Stir in 1 cup applesauce and 1 1/2 cups raisins. Measure into a bowl the dry ingredients: 1 cup all-purpose flour,

one cup whole wheat flour, 1 teas. baking soda; 1/2 teas. salt, 1/2 teas. cinnamon. Add to the creamed mix and blend thoroughly. Spread in a loaf pan, 9x5x3. Bake in preheated 325 oven for 1 hour or until toothpick comes clean. Cool in pan ten minutes, then turn out on rack and let completely cool before cutting.

We are now wallowing in a world of roses and glads. These are two of Dad's hobbies and we love to share them with friends.

Our roses are blooming profusely but they have such short stems. This makes them difficult to arrange. They do not hold well in the house either. By the second day they are drooping and petals falling. Some expert has said that roses should be cut during the heat of the sun. We always thought with the morning dew upon them.

Oven meals are lifesavers. I make up casseroles and then you can rest while they are cooking. Animals know about resting. I watched "Ladybug", our wee brown dog who has adopted us, and no matter how playful and active she is, she will flop down anywhere and takes frequent rests and naps. I am reminded of a very active lady, up in years, whose friends marveled that she could do so much housework and gardening. When they spoke of it she told them her secret. She said: "When I am hoeing in a row of beans and I feel like I will fall with fatigue, I do not wait until I get to the end of the row to see if I do. I just throw down the hoe in the middle of the row and go in the house and lie down for an hour. Then I can finish the row!" It works. These little "mini vacations" are the answer.

A twister went through this morning, doing a bit of damage. We were not in the path of it. We are humbly grateful for that and for the soft rain that is falling like a blessing upon the land.

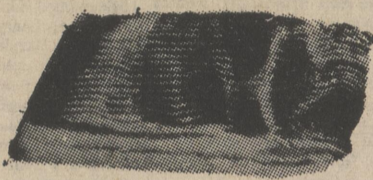

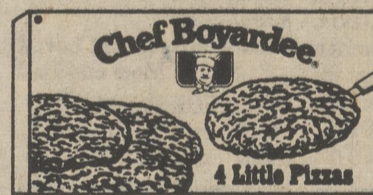

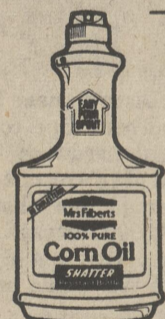
