

# Berry to take position at Washington College

**LAKE FOREST HIGH SCHOOL** - One of the most popular members of the Lake Forest faculty, Dennis Berry, will be leaving the school to take a similar position at Washington College in Chestertown, Md. this September. Berry, who came to Lake Forest in 1979 as Aquatic Co-ordinator will be the new...and first...Director of Aquatics for the Casey Swim Center at Washington College. He will be the first to hold this position. The facility to cost \$1.8 million will open in the early school year at Washington College. It is still under construction. The Lake Forest swim center was

opened in October of 1979. Berry was recruited from Kane Area High School located in Northwest Pa. near Erie to head up the new facility. He graduated from Lock Haven State College in 1975. Berry ran the program at Lake Forest and during his tenure the facility and team members have won local, state and national honors. Recognition as well was extended to Berry being a leader in the industry and well respected in his field. Berry initiated the elementary aquatic and secondary programs for the community as well as a community development program. This program now serves 27 neighboring communi-

ties. In 1981, the pool and facility received the Facility of Merit Award, a national honor, which placed it as "outstanding High School Aquatic facility", which included pool, programing and staffing. The age group swim team grew from 12 members in 1980 to its present enrollment of 90. They had undefeated teams in 1982. Three members of the swim team: Robby Bates, Jessica Coe, and Kelly Rawding received national recognition in a swim meet recently. They swept the meet. Lake Forest moved from the last 5 years to be the premier source of

aquatic information. "The people would say we want to run our programs like Lake Forest", said Berry recently. Berry has held clinics on State and a regional basis. "The District has been good to me. They have allowed me to operate on my own...no one was looking over my shoulder, which tells me that we really have a positive administration here...despite what people say. Let them come to Lake Forest and see for themselves, and we will turn the critics around", said Berry. Berry has been the featured speaker at national conventions "...and again

the Lake Forest School Board and the administration has allowed me to attend these functions and speak out on our program at Lake Forest. I have attended 5 or 6 major conventions already this year, and I think the word Lake Forest has been spread around rather well", said Berry. One other important factor to consider is that most of the graduates are job ready. "This is another positive part of our program here. We have many life guarding in Rehoboth as well as being swim instructors for the area. So the program works and it really builds confidence for our young peo-

ple", said Berry. Berry has also found enough time to author a book entitled "Guide To Training Swimming Pool Life Guards", which is currently being used around the country and at several universities. Berry is married to the former Judith Ann Taylor. They have two children, Tasha (8) and Justin (5). Washington College Swim Team will compete in the East Coast Athletic Conference (ECAC). We all wish Denny Berry good luck and success in his future travels, and thank him for making a success of our swim program at Lake Forest.

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## Biden says recent polls favor him

**HARRINGTON** - On a tour of Harrington on Friday, U.S. Senator Joseph Biden, Jr. (D-De.) released the results of a most recent poll by both the Cambridge Research Analysis and the poll the Republicans use...The Teeter one. In both cases, the results show Sen. Biden ahead by as much as 67% for Biden and 22% for former State Legislator, John Burris of Milford, with approximately 11% undecided. Sen. Biden continued his analysis of the polls and what they mean to his camp as follows: "As far back as April the polls showed 69 for Biden, 17 for Burris and 14 undecided. Then in May it was 65-19-14. In June the trend continued being 66 for Biden, 22 for Burris, and 15 undecided. In July they showed 67 for Biden, 22 for Burris and 11 undecided", he said. Which according to the Biden camp means that Sen. Biden is the overwhelming choice for the U.S. Senate seat. "Even the Teeter poll which the

Republicans use as a general rule has the figure 65 for Biden, 25 for Burris and 10 undecided seems to be the trend", said Sen. Biden. "I don't believe the negative campaign which he is waging is working for him. The polls would indicate that the approach to the campaign is not favoring him (Burris), because it is too negative", Sen. Biden said. Senator Biden disclaimed ever running a negative campaign against former U.S. Senator J. Caleb Boggs in 1972. Sen. Biden also personally explained how he thought the negative campaign was hurting his opponent. "I know a lot of the negativism has been used by my opponent in Sussex. I would say if anywhere...he should be known to the voters in Sussex. If the negative campaign was working for him it would certainly show up in Sussex. But the percentages have not changed. Biden said he feels that a lot of people in the State do not know his opponent "...particularly in New Castle County. The biggest problem I see for my

opponent is saying what he is for. In Other words he is stating what I am for or against...but they don't know what his position is all the time. It is more what I am...and not what he is", Said Sen. Biden. The job rating poll (like what kind of a job is one doing in congress) shows Biden with a high of 71 percent. This poll is measured from 4 categories which include excellent, good, fair and poor. The personal characteristics show him with a high respect. Biden also called for a general revamping of the reform. "I was long in favor of scraping the whole tax system...and replacing that with a moderate gross receipts tax", he said. He went further to state "...that I would also be in favor of eliminating the numerous loop holes in the present tax system as well". He also pointed out that he was in favor of spending more on education but returning to the basics and discipline. He would like to see low interest loans for college students.

Services were Friday at 2 p.m. at the Berry Funeral Home, Northwest Front Street, Milford, where friends called Thursday night from 7 to 9. Burial was in Barratt's Chapel Cemetery, Frederica.

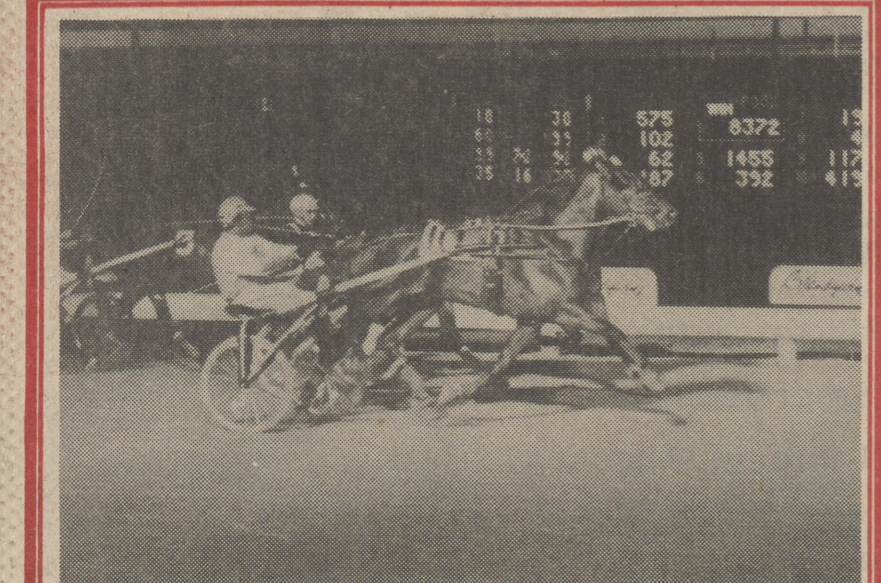
## Area farmer receives award

R.C. Willin, Jr., Willin Farms Inc. of Seaford, Del., was recognized July 30 at the National Corn Growers Association Annual Convention for winning first place state honors in the NCGA irrigated corn yield contest. Willin achieved the winning yield of 210.95 bushels per acre with DEKALB - PFIZER GENETICS 6060. "At no point in the field was there less than 200 bushels per acre," Willin reports. "6060 responds well to irrigation and good fertilization." Willin planted a population of 32,000 in 30-inch rows. Willin says other strong points of the hybrid include: good disease tolerance, good ear retention and fast drydown. Willin Farms Inc., raises corn, wheat, barley and soybeans on 1,200 acres in the Delmarva peninsula. The National Corn Growers Association, sponsor of the yield contest, is a 16-state commodity organization that is actively involved in corn production and corn market development. Now in its 26th year, the association sponsors annual yield contests, publishes a national magazine and plays an active role in legislative policy-making.

# Harrington firefighters have busy day

Thanks to the quick response of thirteen volunteer firefighters from the Harrington Fire Company, a ruptured 10-inch main line at Consolidated Thermoplastics (known as CT Film) in Harrington was repaired within four hours last Wednesday.

The line provides water for a cooling tower which is used in the plastic machinery-cooling system.

Hooking their hose to a nearby fire hydrant, the firefighters were able to secure the plant's water pressure, enabling the 80-employee industry to continue operations.

"Our job wasn't done until they were secure in their pressure. We kept the pressure up," said Aubrey Brown,

Harrington Fire Company rescue captain.

Later the same day, the volunteers were called out again in response to an ammonia leakage at Burris Warehouse in Harrington. Felton and Houston volunteers assisted the Harrington firefighters in monitoring a concentration of ammonia in the East Street area.

"It was detected by citizens," said Brown.

Brought under control within less than two hours, the trouble at Burris Warehouse "was handled very well," Brown said.

"We congratulate their fire brigade. It does a fine job," he added.

## DuPont signs training/blue-collar jobs bill

FREDERICA - Declaring that "workers need training for new jobs, not more income maintenance programs," Governor duPont today signed legislation creating a permanent fund for industrial training and school-to-work transition programs.

The bill, J.S. 1 for H.B. 698, also expands a highly successful, five-year-old tax incentive program designed to attract new blue-collar jobs to Delaware.

DuPont signed the legislation during a special ceremony at ILC Dover, Inc. in Frederica last week ILC, which manufactures the space suits used in the U.S. space program, has participated in the incentive program.

"By signing this bill, we are not only reemphasizing our commitment to

bringing blue-collar jobs to Delaware, but telling the men and women of this state that as the economy changes and expands, we are going to help them get the skills they need," duPont said.

The blue-collar jobs incentive program began five years ago with passage of the so-called "Gore Bill," an experimental program which provided corporate income tax credits and lowered the gross receipts tax for companies investing new capital in their operations or creating new jobs.

The Gore bill, named for Wilbert L. Gore, head of W.L. Gore & Associates, was directly responsible for creation of more than 1,200 jobs in the state, as well as a significant number of "spin-off" jobs.

## First Annual Flounder Tournament held in Milford

The First Annual World Championship Flounder/Fluke Tournament sponsored by the Milford Chamber of Commerce, was held Saturday in Milford.

When the starting vessel fired a flare at 8 a.m., 62 boats headed for Delaware Bay and a day of championship fishing.

Dave Allen, of Oxford, Pa., came home the big winner, walking off with the \$800 first prize for his catch of 5.86 pounds.

Pocketing the \$300 second prize money was Steve Flanagan, of Odessa,

Del., who landed a 5.67 pound flounder.

The \$200 third prize money went to Todd Shaffer, of Palmyra, Pa., for his 5.10 pound catch.

Those placing 4th to 9th went home with \$40 while those finishing 10th to 15th won \$20, with \$10 going to those finishing 16th to 50th.

Paying an entry fee of \$100, each boat was allowed a maximum of five people on board. All fishing was done in accordance with International Game Fish Association rules.

Plans are being considered to restructure the tournament for the 1985 Championship, according to Sandy Dale, Milford Chamber of Commerce executive assistant.

"We're thinking of including different species, like trout and bluefish, in next year's tournament," said Dale.

The Milford Chamber of Commerce also sponsors the annual World Weakfish Tournament which is held at the end of May.

## Felton man charged in US

**113 fatality**

Delaware State Police from Troop 3 have arrested Morris B. Hughes, 55, of R.D. 1, Box 103, Felton, Delaware on one count of vehicular homicide first degree and one count of vehicular assault first degree. Investigators determined that Mr. Hughes was operating the vehicle which failed to stop for the stop sign on county route 119 at U.S. 113 on August 1, 1984. Previously, it was believed Kermit Moore, 26,

of Frederica, Delaware, had been driving the 1971 Plymouth Fury.

The two charges placed against Morris Hughes resulted from the 11 p.m. August 1, 1984 collision causing the death of the passenger of the other vehicle and injury to the operator. On Sunday, August 5, 1984, Sarah Walls, 82, of 505 McColley Street, Milford, Delaware, expired in the Milford Memorial Hospital from injuries received in the collision. Her daughter, Dorothy A. Sjejan, 59, the operator of the 1981 Chevrolet Malibu, remains in good condition in the Milford Memorial Hospital. Alcohol was a contributing factor by Mr. Hughes in this, Delaware's fifty-sixth traffic fatality of 1984. Morris Hughes was arraigned last night at Magistrate Court 7 in Dover and ordered committed to the Delaware Correctional Center in default of a total bond of \$50,000.

White is a ROTC cadet and a student at the University of Delaware, Newark.

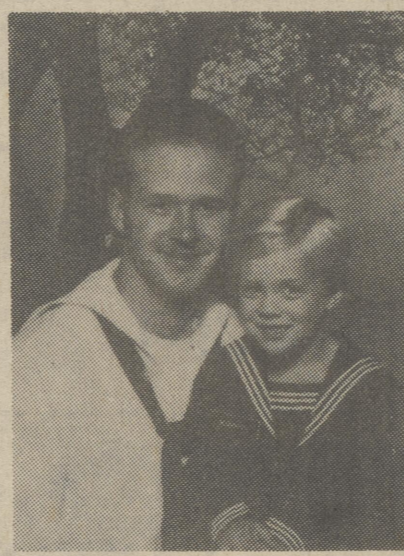

### JIFFY BANANA PUDDING

48 Vanilla Wafers  
6 Bananas  
1 Box vanilla custard pudding (instant or cooked variety, 8 1/2 oz.)  
Prepare vanilla pudding as directed on box label. When this is ready, line the bottom and sides of a deep dish with a thick layer of vanilla wafers, (not crumbled). Next, place alternate layers of sliced bananas, vanilla wafers, (that have been coarsely crumbled), and vanilla custard pudding in the dish, (the number of layers depend on the quantity desired). Make sure the top layer is a generous one of the crumbled wafers.

### PEAS 'N CHEESE SALAD

Six Servings  
1 can peas  
1 cup diced celery  
1 teaspoon grated onion  
1/2 cup chopped sweet pickles, or sweet relish  
1/4 lb. sharp cheese, diced  
1/2 cup mayonnaise  
salt and pepper to taste  
Chill and drain peas. Combine with remaining ingredients and toss lightly. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Serve on salad greens.

### CHOC. NUT ZUCCHINI CAKE

3 square unsweetened choc. or Nestles Choc. Bake  
3 cups flour  
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder  
1 tsp. baking soda  
1 tsp. salt  
4 eggs  
3 cups sugar  
1 1/2 cups salad oil (Wesson, Etc.)  
3 cups grated zucchini (unpeeled)  
1 cup chopped nuts  
1/2 cup coconut

1. Melt choc. and cool. (I use the Nestles Choco. Bake, little liquid packs of chocolate; 1 packet equals 1 square of chocolate - NO MESS)  
2. Grease and flour pans  
3. Mix all ingredients, except sugar, set aside.  
4. Mix with mixer at high speed until eggs are thick and light. Gradually add the sugar, beating well after each addition.  
5. Add oil and chocolate, mix well (At this point I added the vanilla)  
6. At low speed add dry ingredients, mix well, mixture will be very, very thick at this point.

Now okay to mix a big spoon zucchini and nuts to your mixture.  
Oven setting: 350°, bake in tube pan for 1 hour and 15 mins., bake as cup cakes about 20-30 mins.; bake in small loaf pans about 45-50 mins. (This will make about 6-8 pans)  
All can be sprinkled with confectioners 10x sugar  
This will freeze well. Sure will taste good January....Enjoy....

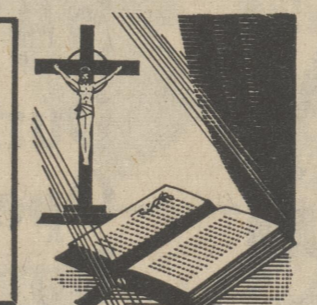

## In the Pocket from Brandywine

Victories by Intrepid Amlahurst and Grandpa's Roger in Winners-Over events, Breezy Fashion's win in a fillies and mares open and a three way tie for the driving championship highlighted the weeks racing at Brandywine.

On Sunday, August 19, Vern Crank guided Intrepid Almahurst to a 1:59.4 triumph in a \$5,500 Winners-Over pace. The 4-year-old son of Meadow Skipper took the lead shortly after a :29.1 first quarter and was allowed to race unoppressed through leisurely :59.2 and 1:31 fractions. When the challenges finally came to the Beacon Knoll Farms owned and Phil Molner trained ridgling, he was equal to the task Joe Hundertpfund, Jr. moved Traffic Director out of third on the backstretch to force the pace and challenged Intrepid Almahurst the rest of the way but was a neck shy at the wire.

Quick early fractions allowed Grandpa's Roger to capture Saturday's \$5,000 Winners-Over pace in 1:58.3. Jetlite (Scott Smith) grabbed the lead and took the field by the quarter pole in a brisk :27.4. Shifty Harry (Forrest Gerry, III), unable to find a seat, rushed up on the outside, forcing a :58.2 first half. Southern Robert (C.D. Harris) wheeled three wide around Shifty Harry and Hundertpfund, Jr., followed him with Grandpa's Roger. After passing the three quarters in 1:28.3, Jetlite and Shifty Harry began to tire. As the field turned for home, Grandpa's Roger moved four wide around Southern Robert and dashed down the lane, increasing his lead with every stride. The Carmine Petrino co-owned and Joe Hundertpfund, Sr., co-owned and trained 5-year-old son of Jolly Roger reached the finish line five lengths ahead of Southern Robert with Assumeitsme (Bob Anderson, Jr.) finishing third.

Also on Saturday, Crank reined Breezy Fashion to victory in a \$5,000 fillies and mares open in 1:59.4. The heavily favored Meadowlands invader Antholena D. (Jim King, Jr.) set comfortable fractions of :29.2, 1:00.1 and 1:29.2 while not being given a severe test. However, in the stretch, Antholena D. tired for no apparent reason and was overtaken by Breezy Fashion. The Bill Tyne, Jim Kruba and Howard Stern owned and John McNair trained 4-year-old daughter of Warm Breeze scored a neck win over Valiant Bid (Ed Gannon) with Antholena D. a dismal third.

On Friday, a two hole trip from Mark

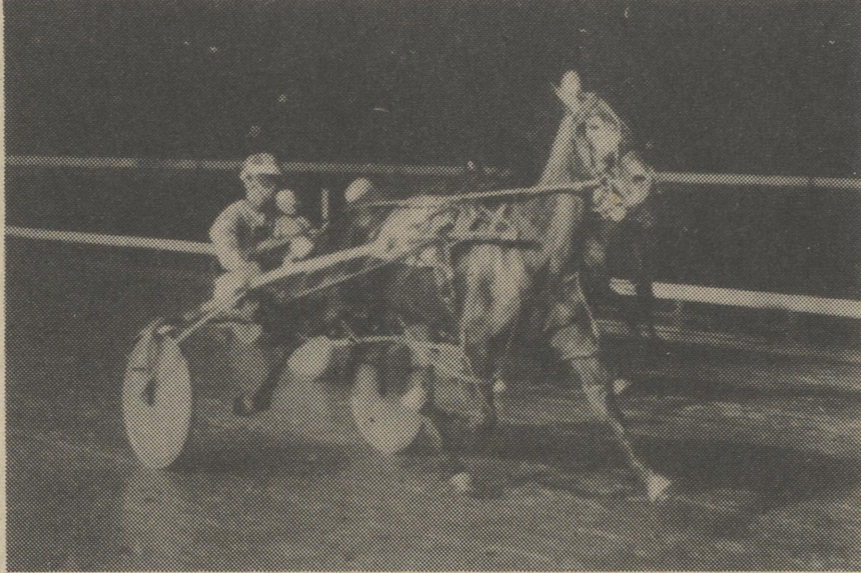
Daniels enabled Pizzelle to capture a \$3,500 trot in 2:02. O. Joy (Gerry, III) set panels of :29.3, 1:01.3 and 1:31.4 before Daniels guided the Herman Brown owned and Ellis Myer trained 4-year-old daughter of Speedy Somolli off the rail at the head of the stretch. Pizzelle drew off to score a three length win over the French import Kerk F. (Pierre Vercryse), who finished a strong second despite being parked for the entire mile.

A driving triple by defending driving champion Vern Crank doubles by Forrest Gerry, III, and Abe Stoltzfus on Sunday did little to clear up the picture as to who would capture the dash winning crown. In fact, it put the leading reinsmen in a three way tie for the honor. With only 12 days remaining in the 1984 meet, Crank, Gerry, III and Stoltzfus have each visited the winner's circle on 53 occasions. Jim Porter has 49 wins, ranking him fourth, just four out of the lead!

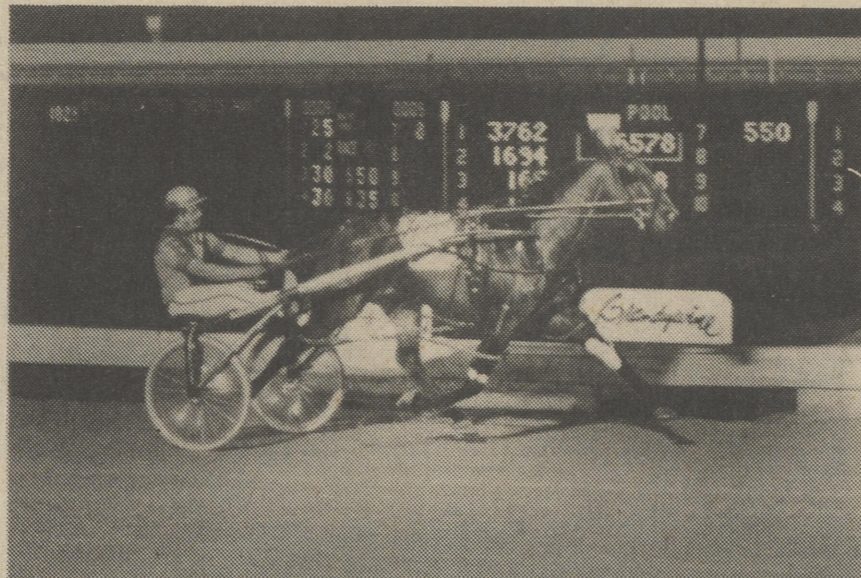
The race for the leading trainer is not nearly as close as Mery Stoltzfus (Abe Stoltzfus Stable) has 39 victories to his credit, 13 more than Purnel Jones.

Also deserving recognition is the father-son team of Joe Hundertpfund, Sr. and Jr. Since coming to Brandywine after Freehold closed due to the fire, the elder Hundertpfund has compiled an amazing .500 U.D.R.S. average as a trainer. In 48 starts, he has amassed 15 wins, 12 seconds and 7 thirds. His son has practically the same average as a driver. Leading the way in the Hundertpfund barn are Grandpa's Roger (a \$128,582 winner racing in the tough Winners-Over rank), Traffic Director (a \$10,000 purchase from the Sam Beegle Stable who won the \$10,000 final of the Co-Star Series after moving to his new home), Glencarron J. (a \$10,000 claim from the Stoltzfus Stable two months ago who has dominated the higher priced claimers since being claimed) and Anvil Foot (a very promising 2-year-old Bret's Star colt who has reeled off four straight wins and established a 2:00.1 mark.

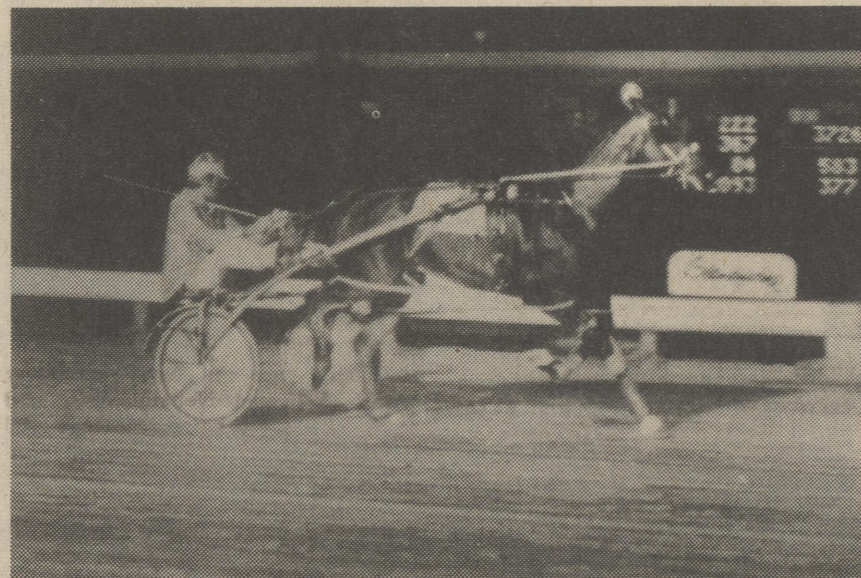
Even though Freehold has re-opened, the Hundertpfunds are continuing to do the main part of their racing at Brandywine. "We're certainly glad we came here," said Joe, Sr., a former police officer. "We've raced all over the country and it's a privilege and a pleasure to be able to race on this track. The trackofficials, the horsemen and the fans are just super. Everybody is so cooperative."

Rosecroft Raceway has reached accord on a new four-year contract with its mutual clerks, guards, admission and parking personnel.

A key element of the new contract is a unique "positive incentive" formula designed to reward productivity. Nearly all racetracks pay their clerks a daily salary. Newly hired clerks at Rosecroft will earn a percentage of the wagers they actually sell to track patrons.

Rosecroft President William E. Miller, II also announced the appointment of Michael Lee as the track's new mutual manager. Lee, 28, is a nine-year employee of Rosecroft and resides in Silver Spring, Maryland. He formerly worked as a clerk and auditor in the mutual department.

Rosecroft's 1984 60-night fall meet runs from October 3 through December 30.

The highlight last week was on last Wednesday as Grand Circuit continued by stopping at Springfield, Ill for the State Fair there. In the \$5,040 trot for 3-year-olds, it was Cornstalk...who raced during Grand Circuit week at Brandywine this summer turning miles of 1:56.2 and 1:53.4 the latter being the fastest trotting mile EVER. Howard Reisinger was the one who reined the colt to victory. It was Roberts, the 2nd trainer who raced the colt at Brandywine. In other races at Springfield in the \$63,282 mile for 2-year-old filly pacers in "The Castleton"...Rodine Hanover wins it in 1:54 with Anneris winning one division in 1:53.3 with the final going to Anneris (Jan Nordin) getting the win in 1:53.1 which at the time was the fastest 2-year-old mile ever. On Thursday in the \$35,552 Review for 3-year-old trotting fillies it was Fancy Crown getting the win in 1:55.3 and was reined to victory by Bill O'Donnell. The second mile was in 1:53.4, which equalled the time set the day before by Cornstalk. In the \$50,984 mile for 3-year-old colt pacers Colt Fortysix (Chris Boring) was scratched from the second heat as Ribber Rogge wins it in 1:52. Colt Fortysix is an Albatross colt. No official reason for the scratch for him in the second heat...speculation has it that the temperature was scorching hot making a second trip probably too much for the young horse. Other World Records were Crown Point—a two heat trot in 1:55.2 and 1:54, and Tarpot Melody a 3-year-old pacing filly in 1:52.4 in a time trial.

MEADOWLANDS on Thursday in

the Woodrow Wilson pace for 2-year-olds worth \$2,161,000, which is the richest harness race ever, was won by Nihilator driven by Bill O'Donnell in 1:52.4 which is the fastest mile by a 2-year-old ever, defeating Praise. The fractions were :27.2; :55.4; 1:25.2 with the last quarter :27.2. Praised Dignity (Bill Popfinger) Supreme Dynasty (John Campbell) and 4th to Devil's Adversary (Abe Stoltzfus). Devil's Adversary led through the half mile pole with Pershing Square taking the lead. Nihilator was 5th racing behind cover and on the outside. He followed various horses but mostly Nialfirst (Clint Galbraith). O'Donnell said he raced on the outside to stay out of trouble, but at the Meadowlands a lot of horses race on the outside due to the mile oval. "You can do it and not lose time", a spokesman at USTA said. Praised Dignity followed Nihilator through out the race and finished second. Devil's Adversary is owned by Jerry Taylor, a Philadelphia lawyer. He picked up \$172,000 for 4th money. They paid back to 5th with that horse getting 5 percent of the purse.

The win in the Wilson for O'Donnell break the all time money winning mark for a single season. He now has won \$6.2 million which mark was set last year by John Campbell. O'Donnell leads with 321 wins, Campbell (294), Lachance (283), Abbatiello (237), and Bill Parker, Jr. with 209. The leading money winners behind O'Donnell are Campbell (\$4,928,400), Gilmour (\$3,027,904), Lachance (\$2,329,286) and H. Filion (\$2,041,489). EDDIE DAVIS is 20th with 134 wins and \$1,050,964 in money winnings.

MEADOWLANDS on Friday night which was the closing night of the meet in the \$30,000 Open pace Raffi wins it for Mike Gagliardi in 1:54 over Guts, and Hilarton.

ROOSEVELT on Friday in the \$58,615 (each division) it was Lady Maud getting the win in the 3-year-old filly pace and Don't Dally (Butch Dokey) in 1:58.1 and Naughty But Nice for Tom Haughton in 1:56.4 which is a track record for 3-year-old pacing fillies.

LIBERTY BELL ON SATURDAY in the \$7,500 Preferred pace went to Great Nero (Bobby Myers) in 1:57.4. POCONO DOWNS on Saturday in the \$18,500 Keystone Laurel Pa Sires final went to Perky Fiddler for R.L. Farrington...a Brandywine regular in 1:56.1 which is an all age track record. SYRACUSE on Saturday in the

\$83,500 each division of the Zweig Memorial Trot for 3-year-olds in the \$100,000 American Trotting Championship to Crown Wood (Joe Marsh, Jr.) in 2:00.1 over Babe Kosmos and Bobbo Crown Wood and Babe Kosmos will represent the U.S. in this Saturday's Roosevelt International Trot.

LIBERTY BELL on Sunday in the \$5,500 to Lancon (Pierre Vercryse) in 1:59.4 a track record for aged trotting horses.

FREESTATE on Sunday in the Maryland Sires Stakes for 2-year-old pacers the winners were MH Dream (Bryce Truitt) in 2:00.3, Breezeview (Wayne Truitt) in 2:02.4 and Al Wil

(Preston Burriss, Jr.) in 2:00. BLUE BONNETS on Sunday in the \$100,000 Challenge Pace won by Soj's Aton (Steve Condren) in 1:56 after a driving rainstorm. Mr. Dalrae was 2nd with Supreme Jaeae Third.

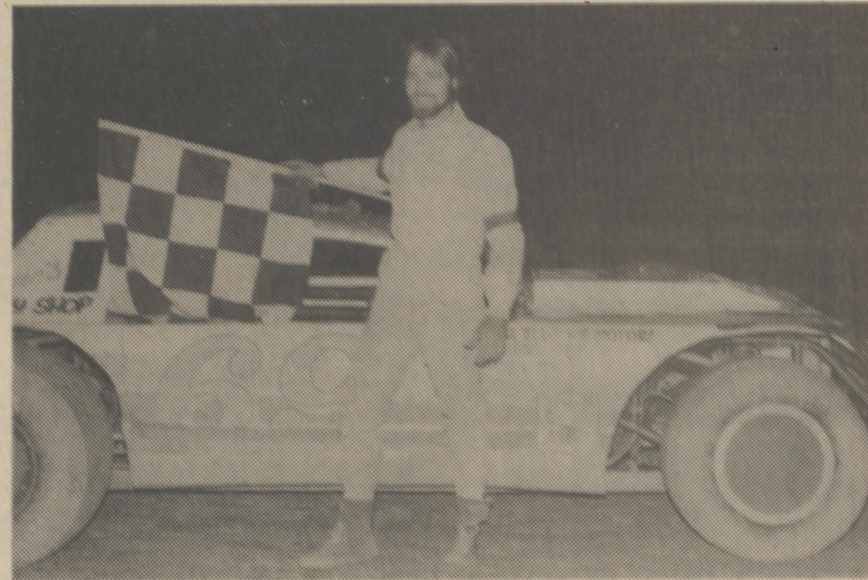

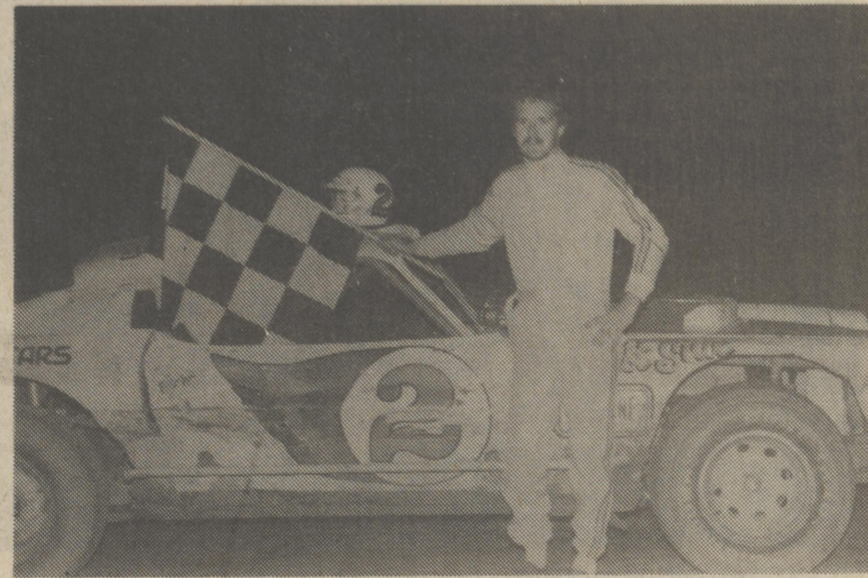

In the second thirty five lap feature, by the luck of the draw, Tony Siscone was awarded the pole position and finished in first leading all thirty five

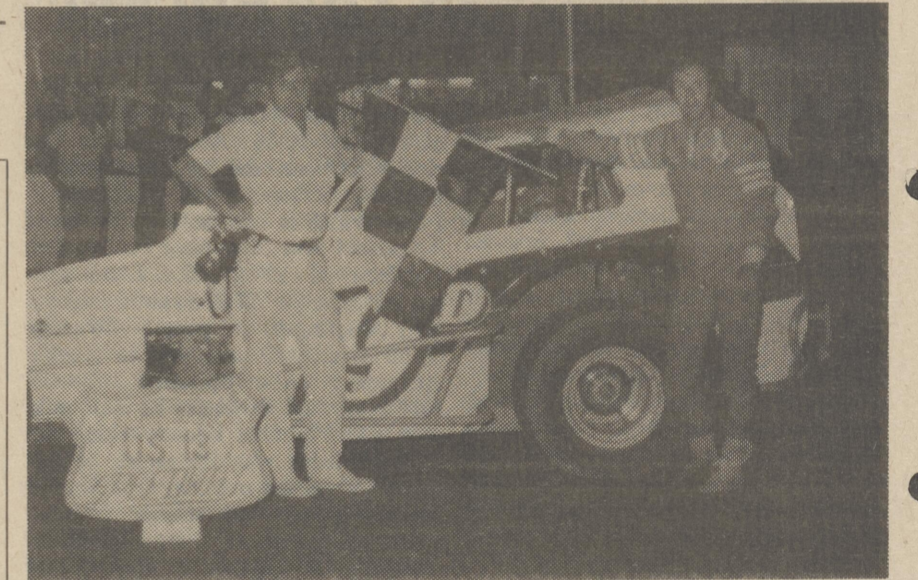

Bill Cameron recorded his third modern stock feature win in the twenty five lap main event, finishing second as Steve Springsteel as Harold Dauncey was third.

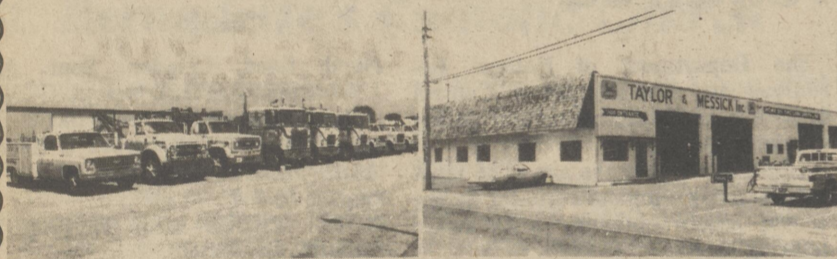

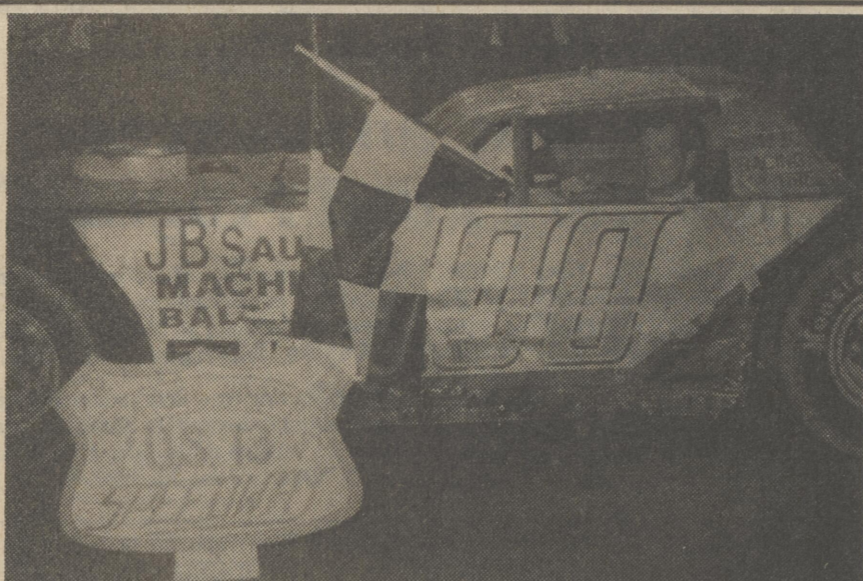

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Marianna's Microwaving



Editor's Note: Marianna Baker is a sales representative for the Comfort Home & Appliance Center, Bridgeville.

Beginning this week, The Harrington Journal will feature a weekly column, entitled "Marianna's Microwaving," with tips on microwave use and recipes.

MARIANNA'S MICROWAVING by Marianna. Microwave cooking can be economical and fun when learned how to use properly.

Microwaves produce energy, not heat. They penetrate to a certain depth where they pass over the water molecules in food and cause them to vibrate at extremely high rates of speed.

The result is heat produced by friction. You can achieve a similar result by rubbing your palms together very briskly.

Cooking occurs when this heat is transferred from the hot outer layers to the uncooked inner layers.

Traditional methods of cooking rely on heat transferred to food by conduction or convection; these are much slower processes.

In general, cooking by microwaves requires from one-half to one-tenth the time for conventional cooking.

The term rotate will be used in this weeks recipe and each week a new term will be defined.

ROTATING: Rotating a dish in a clockwise manner. When the term rotating is used in a recipe, it means to turn or rotate a dish 180 degrees

or a half turn unless otherwise specified in the recipe.

It is important that you follow all directions for microwave cooking.

Our first recipe is an easy one and it only takes 12 minutes. You can use this meatloaf recipe or substitute your own.

MEATLOAF

Power Level: High Microwave time: 12 to 14 minutes Servings: 5 to 6 Cookware: Microwave-safe bundt dish

Note: A round 2-quart glass casserole dish with a jelly glass in the center will substitute for a bundt dish.

Combine and mix well: 1 1/2 pounds ground beef 1 cup soft bread crumbs or cracker crumbs

1/2 cup chopped celery 1/2 cup chopped onion 1/4 cup chopped green pepper 1 egg 1/2 cup catsup

1. Pat evenly into a round bundt dish, pyrex or microwave safe.

2. Cook on high 6 minutes.

3. Rotate and cook another 6 minutes, still on high.

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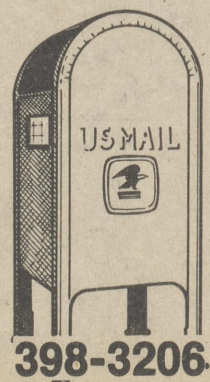

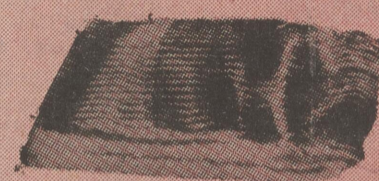
