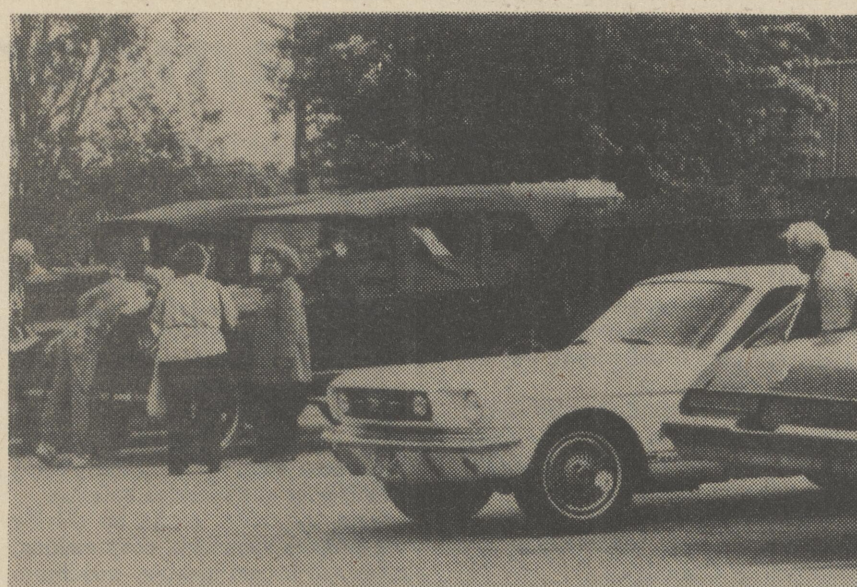

(Continued from page 1) deadlines, further increasing the risk of accident or illness. Just as farmers devote time and energy to equipment and building maintenance, financial matters, and the chemical and fertilizer needs of crops, so they must devote time and energy to protecting the most important resource in their business—their families and employees, Jester says. Safety doesn't just happen, it must be made to happen. By making safety a top management goal, he says many of the accidents which maim and kill hundreds of thousands of farmers and farm workers

each year can be eliminated. Delaware recently completed its second farm accident survey. Based on preliminary statistics. The results are encouraging, the specialist reports. Disabling injuries are down by over 40 percent from 1977 figures. According to Jester, this indicates that more farmers are giving safety a high priority in their management plans. He also credits the farm safety programs of organizations like the Delaware Farm Bureau, the Delaware Grange, Southern States Farm Home Advisory Committee and the Farm Safety Coordinating Committee for making farming safer in Delaware.

It's an all-expense journey to Finland for six weeks for young business and professional men, ages 25 to 35. Rotary International will provide the round-trip air fare. In Finland, Rotarians will provide housing and meals for them.

The trip is called Group Study Exchange, an educational and cultural program of the Rotary Foundation. It will begin May 15, 1985.

The staff saw to each family's needs and served them as honored guests. A bountiful buffet was served, with Jim Sluter as head chef.

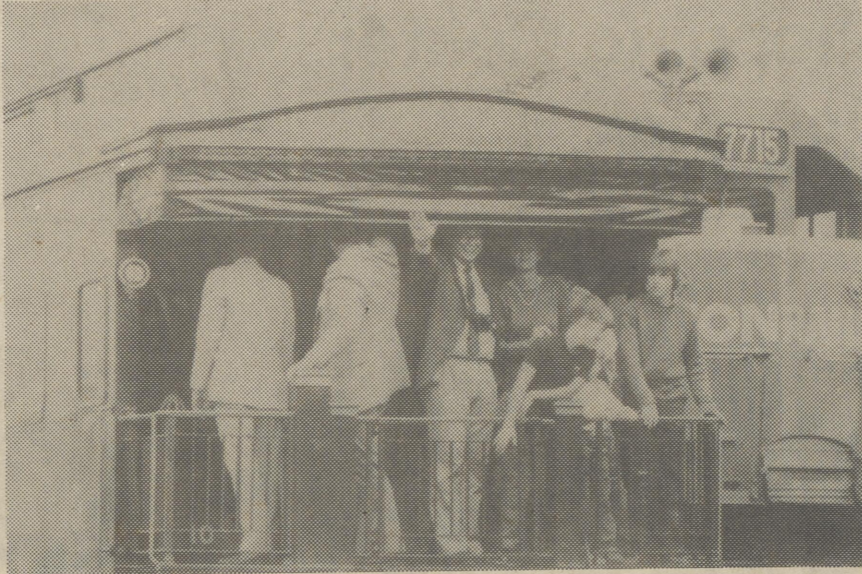
The weather favored the occasion, and the residents of the home enjoyed the socializing.

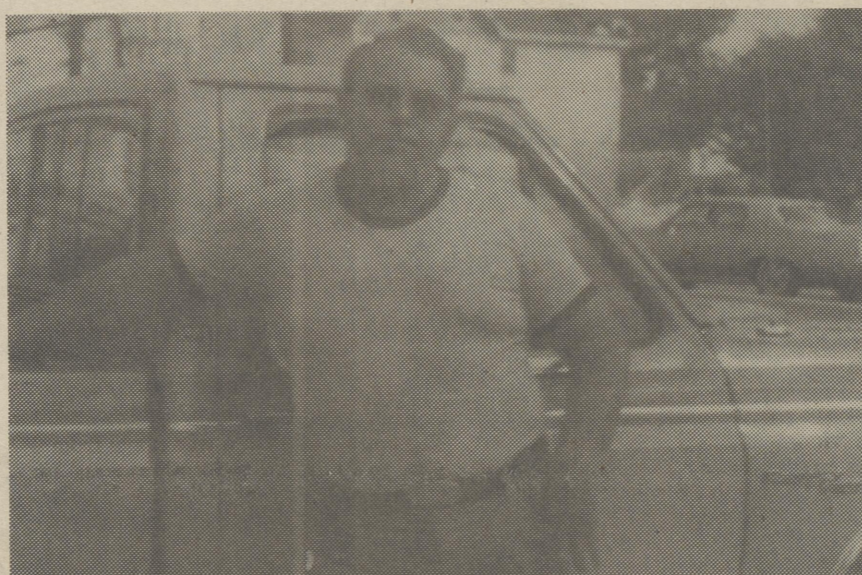

This week, our hints, tips and directions are taken from "Litton's Microwave Cookbook, Vol. 7, Fruits and Vegetables."

If you have never used your microwave for anything but heating your morning coffee water, I encourage you to pull out all stops and start microwaving today.

Many foods have a natural cover (they do not need to be wrapped or covered), thus making microwaving an easy way to prepare your family's favorites. Acorn squash, potatoes and corn are a few examples of foods with natural covers.

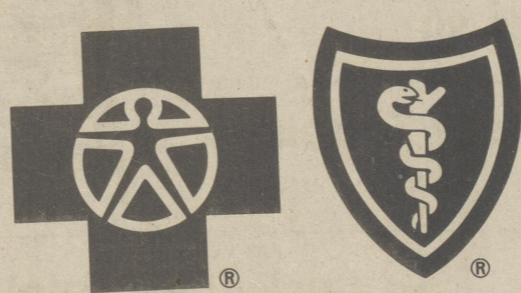
FRESH CORN ON THE COB IN THE HUSK

- 1 ear - 3-5 minutes
 - 2 ears - 4-9 minutes
- Microwaving enhances the flavor and nutrition of corn. For best flavor, microwave as soon after picking as possible, right in the husk, providing a natural cover.
1. Arrange ears in the husk on microwave floor with space between. No preparation is needed. Rotate (turn 180 degrees, or half turn unless otherwise specified) and rearrange during cooking.
 2. Let corn stand 5 minutes, cover with a towel or paper towel.
 3. Husk corn after standing. Point the tip down, pull back leaves carefully to avoid steam. Grasp silk in other hand and pull sharply.
- You will be delighted with how easy it will husk and how delicious it will taste.
