The recommendation that a single emergency number be established first came from the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and the Administration of Justice in 1967.

The following year American Telephone and Telegraph Company announced that the three-digit number "911" was being made available nationwide as an emergency telephone number.

In the same year, Delaware initiated a major effort to establish communication centers in each of the state's three counties. The project was supported by

state funds and a grant from the National Highway Safety Bureau. In September 1976, Seaford implemented 911 for police and fire service in the 629 telephone exchange.

After a feasibility study, New Castle County established the service in December 1980. Kent County agreed to provide the service in April 1983, as did Sussex County County in May of this year.

When Workman cut the ribbon on Sept. 25, Delaware's pioneering effort was made official.

Elliott gets good news

DOVER - Dave Elliott, the embattled insurance commissioner was delighted with the report released Friday by Marna C. Whittington, Finance Department secretary and Stephen T. Golding, state budget director.

Elliott has been the target for media criticism in recent months as a result of a state audit calling attention to irregularities in the insurance department's accounting procedures.

Whittington's report indicated the irregularities are minor ones that could be found in any agency. Carelessness in paper work for expenditures and the department's lack of an internal procedures manual appeared to be the causes of the alleged violations, according to the report.

The brouhaha stemmed from a report released by state auditor Dennis E. Greenhouse

Elliott said the review was a "vindication of the accusatory comments of the state auditor.'

Woo leads Robinson in radio poll

A poll concerning the Lieutenant Governor's race in Delaware was taken by WILM Newsradio in Wilmington on September 26th.

The results of the poll have S.B. Woo, the Democratic nominee for the state's second highest position, leading Battle Robinson, his Republican counterpart, by ten points (55% to 45%). A total of 112 people participated in the tally. The poll, taken as part of a daily series called "The People Poll," urged people listening between 6:35 and 8:00 am to telephone the station with an answer to the question: "Who would you favor in the race for Lieutnenat Governor? The station conducted the Poll without promotion an effort to prevent candidates' organizations from trying to influence the results.

Conservative Caucus backs Burris

The Conservative Caucus of Delaware Political Action Committee announced its endorsement last week of Republican candidate John Burris in the U.S. Senate race against incumbent Democrat Joseph R. Biden, Jr.

William D. D'Onofrio. spokesman for the committee, described Biden as "part of the entrenched liberal power structure in this nation that has been responsible for policy failure after policy failure."

"When you understand", said D'Onofrio, "that it is Congress that appropriates every dime spent by the federal government and what that spending will be for, and has oversight over those expenditures, and that it is the U.S. Senate that has the power of confirming or denying presidential appointments to the policy-enforcing bureaucracies and departments and the judicial system, then you understand that it is Congress that must shoulder the blame for policy failures."

"Upon entering the U.S. Senate in 1972", continued D'Onofrio, "Joe Biden, with increasing impact, became part and parcel of a liberal mindset that has endangered our national security by pandering to those whose goal is to destroy us, played havoc with our economy through socialistic schemes, and substituted true civil rights under our Constitution with enforced equality of result."

The TCCPAC spokesman concluded, "We believe that John Burris is the needed conservative alternative to the liberal antics of Joe Biden. We hope Delawareans will support John Burris as our state's contribution to the ensuring of a meaningful change of direction in Washington."

Abbotts Mill was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in Nature Education Society (DNEC) as a center for environmental activities in 1981.

Antique horse-drawn carriages, provided by Nutter Marvel, carried festival-goers on tours of the sylvan beauty of the surrounding countryside. Although a mill has stood on the present location since 1808, the existing structure was built in the 1880's. The last miller, Ainsworth Abbott, purchased the mill in 1919. The mill continued in operation until 1960 and was acquired by the state in 1963.

Robert McKim, manager of the non-

profit DNEC, lives in a house on the grounds and conducts tours of the historic mill along with his other

Felton man arrested on drug trafficking charges


