at Virginia Polytechnic Institute, where she was the first woman head of the agriculture education society. She joined the Woodbridge faculty in 1979.

Mrs. Hutchinson lives on Billings Drive, Dover. She belongs to the First Baptist Church of Dover and has been Kent County Coordinator for statewide political campaigns.

Co-president of the Woodbridge Education Assn., Mrs. Hutchinson has worked on contract negotiations and coached girls' track and field hockey. She developed the Woodbridge floriculture program and is the first Delaware teacher to have her students certified as tree farmers. Adviser to the Woodbridge Future Farmers of America, Mrs. Hutchinson has prepared its members to win state contests and offices, including the first

female State FFA president. Mrs. Hutchinson has been the first woman head of the state organization of agriculture teachers and was the first woman to win a national award given to young teachers of agriculture.

Described as composed, knowledgeable, and organized, Mrs. Hutchinson is praised for her varied teaching methods and range of programs, which include individualized projects and college-level courses. She's said to have an admirable skill at involving all students in school and FFA and to show equal concern for their academic progress and their needs as developing young adults. Parents praise Mrs. Hutchinson for "showing students that they count, their opinions are valued, and they can attain anything they work for."

## LFHS mock election results

The Lake Forest Mock Election was held on Friday, Oct. 19, 1984 and was sponsored by the Social Studies Dept. of the high school. Most of the students were able to vote on a real voting machine which was on loan to the high school from the Department of Elections.

In grade 12, 80% of the class registered to vote. 59% of the seniors voted and 74% of all seniors registered voted.

In the junior class, 88% of the class registered, 70% voted, and 81% of all juniors registered actually did vote.

Grade 10 had the poorest registration rate. Only 67% of the sophomore class registered to vote. A mere 48% of the

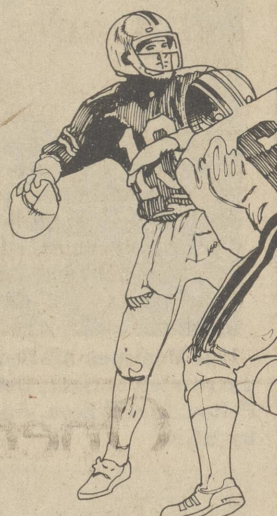
class voted. 71% of all sophomores registered voted in the election.

Freshmen registered in large numbers. During their display of patriotism and civic responsibility, 97% of the freshmen registered. 69% of the class voted. 70% of all freshmen registered voted in the election.

It was the hope of the Social Studies Dept. that this "hands on" experiment in government will better prepare our students for their role in our participatory democracy.

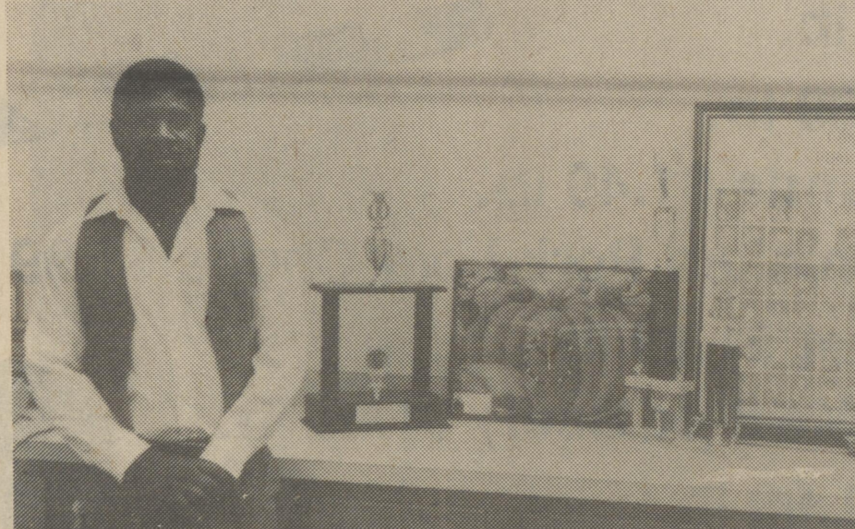

## Political Tidbits - Commentary

How accurate were the polls in yesterday's presidential election? Since this is being written on the Monday before Election Day, we have no way of knowing. But we can tell you what the various polls are predicting as we go to press.  
The NBC poll puts Reagan ahead by 24 points; the New York Times-CBS poll says Reagan by 19; the Washington Post-ABC poll shows Reagan ahead by 18; the Lou Harris poll puts Reagan in front by 12; and the USA poll says Reagan will win by a whopping 25 points.  
The largest margin of victory heretofore was Roosevelt's 1936 win over Alf Landon by 24 points.

Is your one vote really that important?  
Richard M. Nixon backers who answered no to that question and refrained from voting in 1960 regretted their folly the next morning. Kennedy won by 34,227,096 to 34,108,546 - a margin of only 49.9 per cent to 49.6 per cent.  
In 1916 Charles Evans Hughes went to bed on Election Night thinking he had defeated Woodrow Wilson for the presidency. He woke up to learn that California had gone for Wilson by less than 1 per cent. A switch of 2,000 votes and Hughes would have been president.  
In 1984 the election was even closer. Grover Cleveland beat James G. Blaine by 4,879,507 to 4,850,293. In this one a switch of 528 votes in New York would have sent Blaine to the White House.  
The Democrat Cleveland had acknowledged that he was the father of an illegitimate child. The Republicans started chanting "Ma, Ma, where's my Pa; gone to the White House, ha, ha, ha." Democrats retaliated with "James G. Blaine, James G. Blaine, the monumental liar from the state of Maine."  
But the slogan that cost Blaine the election came from a clergyman friend of his. The Rev. Samuel D. Burchard referred to the Democrats as the party of "Rum, Romanism and Rebellion." Handbills quoting the slogan were distributed in Roman Catholic churches across the country and Blaine kissed his chances good-bye.

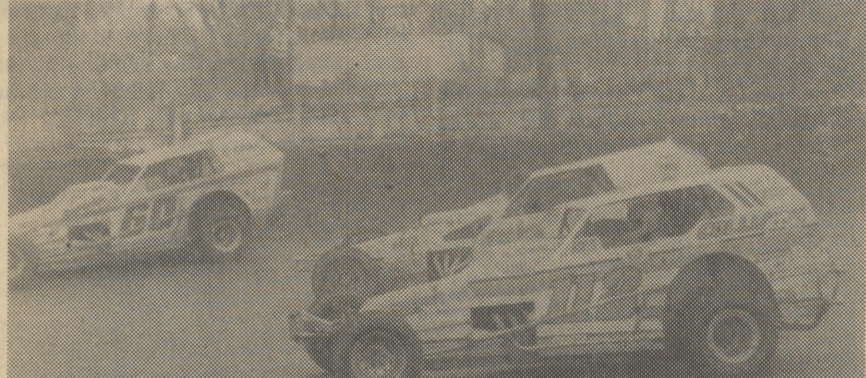

### Short takes

#### Labonte seeks Championship

HAMPTON, Ga. - If Terry Labonte finishes no lower than fourth in each of the remaining two NASCAR Winston Cup races and leads at least one lap in both events, he will capture the 1984 Winston Cup championship. On the other hand, if he finishes fifth or lower in the final two Grand National races and Harry Gant wins both events and leads the most laps in each one, Gant will be the national driving champion. Gant finished a half a second back of Darrell Waltrip in the Holly Farms 400 at North Wilkesboro (N.C.) Speedway on Oct. 14 and then a week later, he lost a heart-stopping duel with Bill Elliott by less than three feet in the Warner Hodgdon-American 500 at North Carolina Motor Speedway. The two second places cost him 10 points. "I still can't believe I lost Rockingham," adds Gant. "I thought I had it won. I still can't believe he (Elliott) came out of the fourth turn that strong. That one really hurt." The 500 will get the green flag at 12:45 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 11th, and the race will be televised live by WTBS Channel 9.

#### Turkey Derby XI

WALL TOWNSHIP - Turkey Derby XI will be completely different than the previous ten, and one new innovation added by Wall Stadium management will be a thirty-five lap non-qualifiers modified race. The event will carry with it a purse in excess of \$2,000 with \$400 going to the winner. #### Graham crowned 1984 Champion

SPRINGFIELD, Illinois (October 29, 1984) - Ricky Graham has been crowned the 1984 Camel Pro Champion. Graham, who won the championship in 1982, came into Sunday's race at Springfield, the final for 1984, with a 15-point lead over teammate Bubba Shobert. Graham needed only to finish ninth or better to clinch the championship, but charged into the lead right from the start of the 25-lap main event. Shobert was mired in the middle of the 17-rider field after a bad start, and Graham's main competition came from Ted Boody riding the only privately entered Honda in the race. Graham and Boody swapped the lead while Shobert charged through the pack and eventually passed both of them to take the lead. On lap 23, Boody and Graham bumped while fighting for second.

#### Promotor to pay Point Fund

THOMPSON, Ct. - Don Hoenic promoter of the Thompson International Speedway announced that since only 8 of the 10 Winston Racing Series events on the 1984 schedule were run, NASCAR decided there will be no Winston point fund money paid. The normal point fund breakdown would be as follows; track champion Richie Evans - \$1000, Jim Spencer - \$500, Mike McLaughlin-\$250, Reggie Ruggiero - \$150, George Kent - \$100. "We are disappointed with the decision that NASCAR has made. We feel an obligation to our competitors, and I have decided to pay these drivers the point fund money myself," said Hoenic. All checks will be awarded this Sat. at Thompson's annual banquet.

#### Bouchard teams up with Valvoline

Ray Bouchard will have the Valvoline sponsorship for the remainder of this year and 1985 Buddy Baker will field his own team sponsored by Bull-Frog Knits in 1985. Lake Speed will move to the 75 car in 1985.

#### Labonte is in the lead

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. - Terry Labonte has moved into the lead in the voting to determine the most popular driver on the NASCAR Winston Cup circuit. Labonte, who also is on verge of winning his first NASCAR Winston Cup championship, scored past Geoff Bodine and Richard Petty due to a huge influx of votes from his fan club and Piedmont Airlines. With four weeks left in the balloting for the National Motorsports Press Association (NMPA) award, Labonte holds a 1,395-vote lead over Bodine, the previous leader. Labonte has received 4,145 out of the 18,623 votes cast.

Jim McBee manhandled the competition at U.S. 13 Sunday to win his first Delaware State Late Model crown. McBee came from eighth to win the 50 lap event dealing with the stiff challenges of Hal Browning and Alex Beaumont in the process. Browning finished second followed by Ray Cable Jr., Beaumont and the fifth place car of Ron Wilson.

Beaumont led the first two laps of the show but Browning made his presence known when he wrestled the lead from him on lap three. The J&B Automotive #100 looked unbeatable as it led the next 16 circuits but McBee must not have been impressed. The awesome black #11 had locked onto Browning's bumper on lap eight bringing the #69 of Bob Wilkins along for the ride. Browning used every inch of the smooth surface to hold off McBee but the Gettysburg, Pa. driver found his chance on lap 19 and powered by Browning as they exited the fourth turn. Browning refused to give up and though Wilkins and the #K9 of Gil Clements were knocking on his back door he continued to pressure McBee.

McBee had his bubble dented on lap 35 when Browning showed that he knew his home track as he snatched the lead away from him in the 12 turn. As the two entered the 3-4 though, Browning's heart must have sank for the silver and black #100 faltered and began to show vapor from the exhaust

pipes. McBee regained the point as they passed under Bill Lawson's flag to complete lap 36. Though Browning was able to trade spots with the #11 for the remaining laps he could not hold onto the point for any length of time. Wilkins looked as if he would be the spoiler as he and Clements traveled close behind the leaders but a broken rear ended his battle on lap 42 a mere two laps after Clements had fallen by the wayside.

Browning's engine problems got progressively worse but he threw caution to the wind and captured a solid second as McBee took the win.

After drawing the pole slot the Wernersville, Pa. native proceeded to lead every lap of the event handily dealing with the challenges of the likes of Jimmy Horton, Carl Reynolds, Harold Bunting and finally his arch nemesis Kenny Brightbill.

Kozak played the game to perfection, deftly wheeling the #31 to an im pressive lead in the early laps of the virtually caution-free event. His racer only seemed to get stronger after the half-way mark as the track started to dry and many drivers began to lose the handle on their mounts.

Kenny Brightbill, the defending champion of the event, started the race in 18th spot alongside Kevin Collins in the Gary Ballough #112. Brightbill wasted no time in powering his Dealman #19 to the front but Collins wasn't so lucky. Two laps into the show a tangle of sheet metal in the #2 turn claimed Collins' car and did some cosmetic damage to the mounts of Reynolds, Frank Cozze and Garry Gollub. On the restart Kozak had his hands full with Horton, Bunting, Jarvis and Ronnie Tobias. The race would go under green for the next 33 laps as the mighty modifieds put up a wall of sound around the half mile.

The stew really came to a boil with a squadron of hotshoes on Kozak's tail. Horton kept continuous pressure on the #31 with 1984 Mod champ Harold Bunting and, by lap thirteen, Brightbill close behind. As they neared the halfway point lap traffic became a factor. The five front runners brought the fans to the edge of their seats as they maneuvered through the slower cars, at times going three and four wide at the exit of each turn. By lap 25 "Mr. Excitement" had picked off the others in the front pack and parked himself in second. Brightbill began to test Kozak's reflexes trying the Mills Bros. racer high and low for the next nine circuits.

On lap 35 the #7D of Charlie Moore broke in the third turn bringing out the caution. On the restart Brightbill called on his racer to make the pass but the unthinkable happened, the engine started to go sour. The #19 was still strong but Kozak had the edge and for the remainder of the show Brightbill, though he held off the rest of the field, was never closer than two car lengths to the rear bumper of Mr. Kozak.

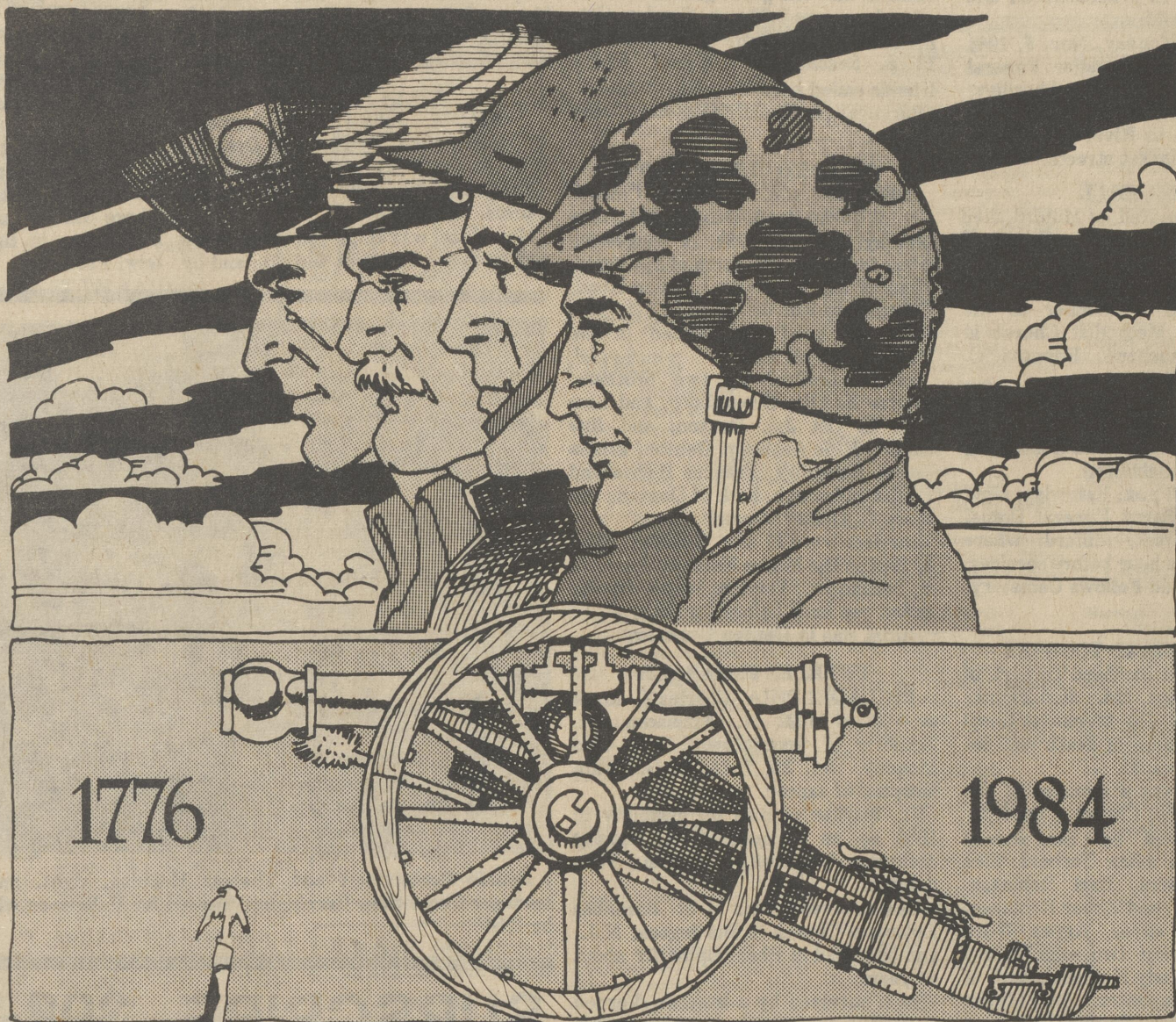

# HONOR OUR VETERANS



## Veterans' Day, 1984 - and every year...

What are a citizen's obligation to those who died in battle that a common enemy might be repulsed, and the nation they died for might endure?

More than 120 years ago, long before there was a Veterans' Day, during a carnage known as the "American Civil War", Abraham Lincoln expressed it in part, this way:

"It is for us, the living, rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they have thus far so nobly advanced... (it is) for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us, that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave their last full measure of devotion..."

That is the purpose, in spiritual essence, of this, the 1984 observance of that long ago Armistice Day, Nov. 11, 1918, as it has been in each year's observance since.

The "War to end all wars," did not succeed in its goal as every Veteran knows, but they also know what John Stuart Mill, the English philosopher and political economist of the 19th

century, meant when he quoted the price of freedom:

"...War is an ugly thing, but not the ugliest of things. A man who has nothing he cares about more than his personal safety is a miserable creature and has no chance of being free unless made and kept so by the exertions of better men than himself."

It is a high price, this freedom, as attested by the intervening conflicts since 1918 and the concurrent threats to the peace that is so desired by all and especially those Veterans who have experienced the "...ugliness of war..."

In 1954, Dwight Eisenhower signed legislation changing "Armistice Day" to "Veterans' Day". He did so in the spirit of honoring all veterans regardless of which conflict they had given their dedicated selves regardless of the cost to themselves.

With the feasts, holidays from schools and businesses, that spirit of dedication should be poignantly felt, for without that spirit, the gaieties would not exist to enjoy.

Don't forget the cost!

Veterans Day... a time set aside to remember and reflect upon the courage and steadfastness of all the members of our armed forces throughout our nation's history who have so honorably served their country in time of need.

We ask all to join us in tribute to these gallant men and women. They live on in our hearts; we are eternally grateful. Let us reaffirm our devotion to the ideals for which they fought and died in ongoing tribute to them all.

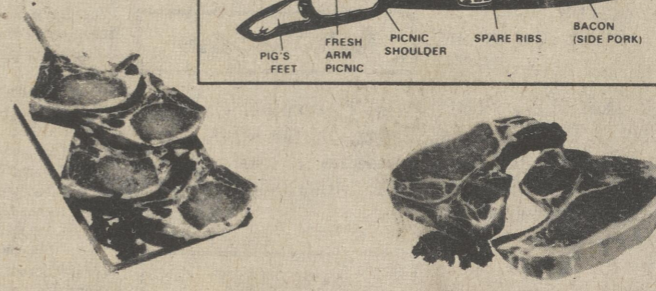
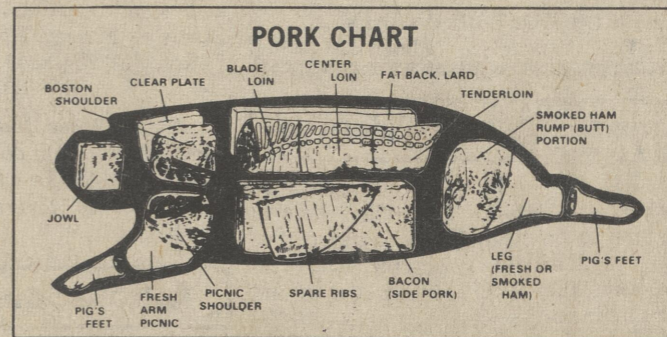

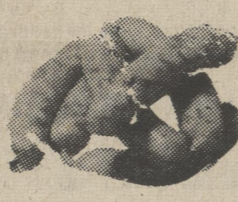
