The eleven women and five men were chosen by their school districts for their superior ability to inspire students with a love of learning and for representing the best traits of Delaware's 5400 public school teachers.

Albert H. Jones, president of the State Board of Education, will announce the State Teacher of the Year at an awards dinner held Nov. 13 at the Dover Sheraton. Members of the Department of Public Instruction review materials handed in about local nominees and observe each candidate at work in the classroom.

Final selection is made by a panel of six judges, including the three mostrecent state teachers of the year -Teresa G. Carey of Frankford Elementary School, Indian River District, of the General Assembly, the teacher 1984; Harriett B. Donofrio of the Cape Henlopen District, 1983; and Renee O'Leary of Wilmington Manor Elementary, Colonial District, 1982.

Sixteen persons have been nomin-ted for the title of Delaware Teacher president of the Del. Congress of Parents and Teachers; Kenneth V. Hilton, member of the State Board of Education; and Anne Batman of Caravel Academy, president of the Del. Assn. of Student Councils.

The winner becomes Delaware's entrant in the national program sponsored by the Council of Chief State School Officers; Good Housekeeping magazine; and Encyclopedia Britan-

The program seeks to honor skilled and dedicated teachers who have won the respect of students, parents, and colleagues for their contributions to education and the community.

The State Teacher of the Year will address community groups in an effort to inform the public about the current status of Delaware schools. By action receives a \$5000 grant to use for the educational benefit of his or her

Mrs. Reisenger was charter president of the Delaware Association for the Gifted. She has judged world-level contests in the Olympics of the Mind, an activity in which her students have won national awards. She helped to develop the Lake Forest gifted program and formed a parents support group. She speaks at state and regional meetings on educating the gifted and

Mrs. Reisenger is described as a stimulating and fun-loving person who offers her pupils a varied and challenging program which helps them build their minds in a warm, friendly atmosphere. Known for her boundless energy, she attends meetings or classes four nights a week plus weekends. Articulate, organized, and flexible, Mrs. Reisenger is said to excel at maintaining rapport with regular classroom teachers. into a Church of God of the Seventh Day. A graffiti message spraypainted on the sidewalk in front of the store on Oct.

30 threatened, "KKK. We're going to burn it down. Be Careful."

Some residents say the graffiti threat was the handiwork of Halloween pranksters, but others feel there is anti-Hispanic prejudice behind the threat. "They just don't like Puerto Ricans," said one woman, who requested

Another resident said she heard rumors that the Hispanic group plans to convert the former hardware store into a halfway house.

"...if it's going to be a halfway house, our house will be up for sale," she said. The owners of the building could not be reached for comment.

Delaware Memorial service held for Gandhi

A memorial service for Indira Gandhi, India's slain prime minister, was held

Saturday at Delaware State Hospital chapel.

More than 150 people attended the half-hour service which included readings from Hindu Scripture, eulogies from members of Delaware's Indian community and tributes from Sen. Joseph R. Biden Jr. and Lt. Gov. Michael

The 66-year-old prime minister died last Wednesday after being gunned down by her own security guards. She was succeeded by her 40-year-old son

Biden, who had met Gandhi on two occasions, paid tribute to the slain leader. "She impressed me with her breadth, her depth and her wisdom...Mrs. Gandhi, in fact, did lead a noble life. Unless India produces another leader like her, India and the entire free world will have difficulty," said Biden. Castle said, "Mrs. Gandhi ruled with iron will toward uniting India. There are difficult days ahead for India."


LFHS mock election results

The Lake Forest Mock Election was held on Friday, Oct. 19, 1984 and was sponsored by the Social Studies Dept. of the high school. Most of the students were able to vote on a real voting machine which was on loan to the high school from the Department of Elec-

In grade 12, 80% of the class registered to vote. 59% of the seniors voted and 74% of all seniors registered

voted. In the junior class, 88% of the class registered, 70% voted, and 81% of all

juniors registered actually did vote. Grade 10 had the poorest registration rate. Only 67% of the sophomore class



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class voted. 71% of all sophomores registered voted in the election.

Freshmen registered in large numbers. During their display of patriotism and civic responsibility, 97% of the freshmen registered. 69% of the class voted. 70% of all freshmen registered voted in the election.

It was the hope of the Social Studies Dept. that this "hands on" experiment in government will better prepare our students for their role in our participatory democracy.

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

Political Tidbits - Commentary

How accurate were the polls in yesterday's presidential election? Since this is being written on the Monday before Election Day, we have no way of knowing. But we can tell you what the various polls are predicting as

The NBC poll puts Reagan ahead by 24 points; the New York Times-CBS poll says Reagan by 19; the Washington Post-ABC poll shows Reagan ahead by 18; the Lou Harris poll puts Reagan in front by 12; and the USA poll says Reagan

will win by a whopping 25 points. The largest margin of victory heretofore was Roosevelt's 1936 win over Alf Landon by 24 points.

Is your one vote really that important?

Richard M. Nixon backers who answered no to that question and refrained from voting in 1960 regretted their folly the next morning. Kennedy won by 34,227,096 to 34,108,546 -a margin of only 49.9 per cent to 49.6 per cent. In 1916 Charles Evans Hughes went to bed on Election Night thinking he had

defeated Woodrow Wilson for the presidency. He woke up to learn that California had gone for Wilson by less than 1 per cent. A switch of 2,000 votes and Hughes would have been president.

In 1984 the election was even closer. Grover Cleveland beat James G. Blaine by 4,879,507 to 4,850,293. In this one a switch of 528 votes in New York would have sent Blaine to the White House.

The Democrat Cleveland had acknowledged that he was the father of an illegitimate child. The Republicans started chanting "Ma, Ma, where's my Pa; gone to the White House, ha, ha, ha." Democrats retaliated with "James G. Blaine, James G. Blaine, the monumental liar from the state of Maine."

But the slogan that cost Blaine the election came from a clergyman friend of his. The Rev. Samuel D. Burchard referred to the Democrats as the party of 'Rum, Romanism and Rebellion." Handbills quoting the slogan were distributed in Roman Catholic churches across the country and Blaine kissed his chances good-bye.

Gab Fest by Pat Hatfield

One of my grandmother's old sayings was, "It's an ill wind that blows nobody good." Of course our beautiful fall season blew most of us a lot of good. I hear the farmers say that they could do with a bit of frost to hasten the soy bean crop. But here in our own little part of the world, we loved the no frost, and the hot nights and even hotter days. The heat excited the lima bean patch to produce more beans. Picking the lima beans is about the only garden chore I am able to still do, and I enjoy it even if the old joints protest.

Today I am cooking up a huge pot of limas to feast on. We do ours Sussex County style because we like the broth with them. I put the washed beans into a large pot and add a chunk of side meat, a medium-size tomato cut up, a big onion, half of a green pepper, salt and a good helping of sugar and about a quarter pound of butter or margarine. We cook them about two hours, adding wee slippery dumplings about a half hour before they are ready to eat. With hot biscuits or muffins and a salad, this makes a hearty and satisfying meal.





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
