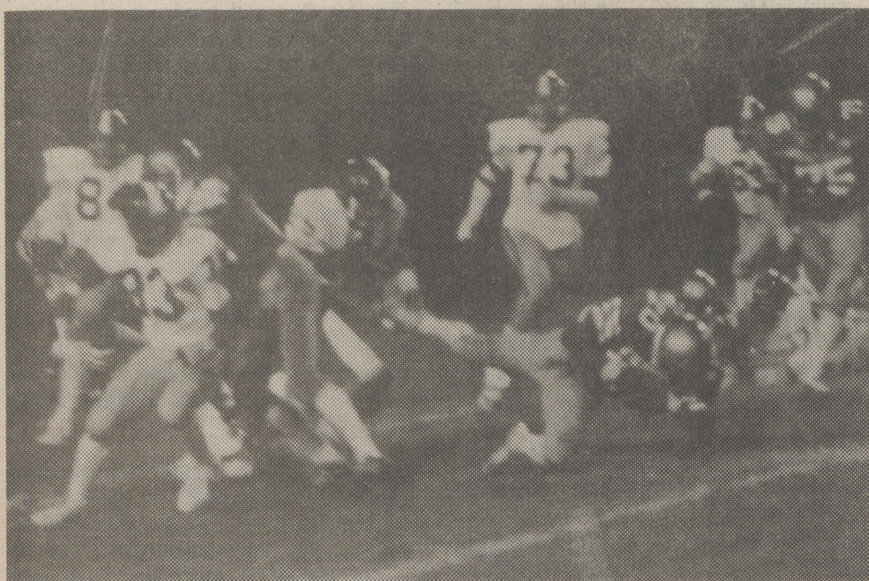

Spartan Gridders crush Milford 26-6

The Lake Forest Spartan football team won its second Henlopen Conference Southern Division title in four years by defeating the Milford Bucs 26-6 Friday night.

Quarterback William Scott led the Spartans to victory, rushing 73 and 57 yards for Lake Forest's first two touchdowns. The first one came with 3:16 left in the first quarter to give the Spartans a 6-0 lead. After regaining the ball from Milford, Martin Bordley caught a 28 yard pass on Lake Forest's 43 yard line which set up Scott's second touchdown run. The Spartans 2 point conversion try on the second touchdown was successful.

Lake Forest was still riding high on the 14-0 lead when Emerson Aiken of

Milford returned Eric Warren's touchdown kickoff 83 yards to make the score 14-6 after the Spartan defense blocked the extra point. The Bucs had a chance to score again and possibly tie the game when they recovered a fumble on the Spartan 25-yard line and drove to the 9 yard line. But the Spartan defense stopped them there, and the half ended with Lake Forest on top 14-6.

In the third quarter Milford almost scored again when they advanced to the Lake Forest 20, but James Hanes intercepted a pass to end the threat.

The fourth quarter saw Lake Forest take control of the game and score two more touchdowns to insure the victory. Mike Gygyryuk keyed the first one when he recovered Milford's fumble on

their 47 yard line. This set up a 47-yard touchdown run for Donnie Bell that put the Spartans on top 20-6. With 53 seconds left in the game Lake Forest scored again, after a 12-play 80-yard drive, on Wendell Watson's one-yard run. On the third and fourth touchdowns, the Spartan's extra point kick went wide.

Lake Forest's victory over Milford not only put them in the state tournament but gave them possession of the famous bell for another year. This is the fourth straight year the Spartans have won the "Battle of the Bell".

Another aspect of the traditional rivalry between the two schools was added last year - the canned food challenge. Students from both schools donate canned food for the needy, and

the school that brings in the most wins. Lake Forest High School won this for the second straight year by bringing in over 9,000 lbs. of food to Milford's more than 8,000. The two schools combined brought in over 6 1/2 tons of food. Delaware State Police Troop 3 sponsors the contest and presents a plaque to the winner. Trooper Hal Blades made the presentation Friday night to Lake Forest Student Government Association officers Jeannie Groff and Vicki Sauhez.

The win Friday night brought Lake Forest's season record to 3-0-2 in the division and 4-4-2 overall.

The Spartans will play Claymont High School at Claymont at 2 p.m. on Friday in Round I of the state tournament.

State Police request funds for programs

Col. Daniel L. Simpson, Delaware State Police Superintendent, has asked state budget officials for additional funds to finance a \$40.3 million proposed budget for the department.

The money requested would be used for a third helicopter, a computerized fingerprint-identification system, and a new-employee incentive program.

Simpson was unable to get funds approved for the same requests in 1983 when he was serving as acting secretary of the Department of Public Safety.

Simpson also proposed adding four "trooper-medic" positions to the helicopter service to provide adequate service to Kent and Sussex Counties.

The computerized identification system would permit "almost instantaneous scanning of thousands of fingerprints," Simpson said.

Also proposed at Friday's budget hearing was the addition of five positions to the Special Investigation Unit used in the fight against drug dealing. This would enable the unit to investigate street dealers as well as suppliers, Simpson said.

Arsonist arrested in Harrington

HARRINGTON - A woman who fled to Harrington following her conviction in Wicomico County, Md., on arson and attempted insurance fraud charges, was arrested here Thursday, according to Dana E. Caro, special agent in charge of the FBI's Baltimore division.

Carol Ann Ennis, 40, was arrested on federal charges of unlawful flight to avoid confinement, said Caro.

Ennis was awaiting sentencing after being convicted of burning her Wicomico County home in 1982. She had been released on bond during a pre-sentence investigation, according to Wicomico County Deputy Sheriff Ralph Shockley.

Ennis is also known by two aliases, Carol Ann Stier and Carol Ann Sylvester, said the FBI spokesman.

Ennis was released to the custody of the Wicomico County Sheriff's Department by U.S. Magistrate James P. Bailey.

Delaware to give out DPT Vaccine

Limited distribution of the DPT vaccine for diphtheria, pertussis, and tetanus will begin in early December, according to Delaware health officials. It is mandatory that children in Delaware have the DPT vaccine before they can attend school.

Pertussis, better known as whooping cough, is potentially fatal to infants.

A shortage of the DPT vaccine throughout the country resulted after three of the four manufacturers of the vaccine stopped production.

Pediatricians throughout the state have reported shortages of the vaccine.

The state has 5,500 doses of the DPT vaccine left in its stockpile. When the shortage became apparent doses were temporarily withheld from private practices and distributed only to public health clinics.

The American Academy of Pediatrics has warned since August that a shortage of the vaccine might result in an increase in the incidence of whooping cough.

Lederle Laboratories in Wayne, N.J. is the sole producer of the vaccine. Lederle will have another batch of the vaccine ready for distribution sometime in December, but even with increased production they can't keep pace with the demand, according to Dr. Maurice Liebesman, president of the Delaware Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics.

Vaccines guarding against diphtheria and tetanus are available. It is only the DPT vaccine that is scarce, according to Health Officials.

Newark man injured in hunting accident near Ellendale

Delaware State Police investigators at Troop 4, Georgetown, are investigating a hunting accident that occurred at 11:15 a.m. this morning near Sussex County road 213 approximately 2.5 miles south of Ellendale.

Allen D. Edwards, 23, of Glasgow Newark, was seriously injured when his shotgun accidentally discharged after he fell from a tree on Sussex County Road 213, 2.5 miles south of Ellendale. Edwards was with a twenty-one member deer hunting party from New Castle County when the accident occurred. He was transported to the Milford Memorial Hospital and treated for a gunshot wound to the abdomen; and then to the Delaware Division by Delaware State Police Helicopter where he is listed in serious condition.

Investigators are classifying the incident as an apparent accidental shooting and no foul play is suspected.

Pennsylvania man critically injured in hunting accident

Jeffrey MacNeil, 19, of Ashton, Pennsylvania, was critically injured while deer hunting when he was accidentally shot by Andrew R. Halko, 42, of Newark, Delaware who was also deer hunting. MacNeil was standing on an access road at the Bombay Hook Wildlife refuge conversing with another hunter. Halko, who had been following deer through the refuge, observed movement approximately 100 feet away in the area where MacNeil was standing. He fired one shot from his 12 gauge shotgun and struck MacNeil in the chest.

MacNeil was removed from the scene by the Leipsic Fire Company ambulance and taken to Kent General Hospital where he remains in critical but stable condition.

MacNeil was wearing bright orange when the accident occurred. Charges are pending further investigation.

"Big cat" sighted again

A large black animal believed to be the "big cat" that was sighted on several occasions during the summer was spotted again on Nov. 12 near a wooded area one mile east of Harrington.

Mary Korbelt, who lives on County Road 432, Harrington, was in her kitchen at 7:30 a.m. when she sighted the animal near a wooded area at the edge of a field about 100 yards from her home.

"I was in my kitchen and looking out. I couldn't believe it. It was pure black, and much bigger than a dog. A cat that was passing must have scared it. It started running. I'm telling you, it went so fast, it was like it had wings. I thought to myself 'Could that be a black deer?' It was just like it was flying," Korbelt said.

Korbelt's description of the animal (pure black, over three feet high and four or five feet long) fits the descrip-

tion given by others who have apparently seen the animal.

Well-defined paw prints, apparently made by a large cat, were tracked across the field leading to a wooded area about 150 yards from the road.

The animal was first sighted on June 19 in the small wooded area between Liberty and Clark streets in Harrington.

A photo of the animal taken by one of the observers was obtained by the Harrington Journal and published in the June 27 issue. A Greenwood man, who asked that his name be withheld, once raised and sold large cats. After looking at the picture, he said that the

Caulk resigns School Board post post

G. Wallace Caulk Jr., who was elected as a state representative in the 33rd District on Nov. 6, announced at a special school board meeting on Nov. 13 that he will officially resign as president of the Lake Forest Board of Education on Nov. 30.

In resigning his presidency of the school board, Caulk complied with a legal opinion handed down by the Justice Department that states he can't serve as a state representative and as board president at the same time.

The selection process for a new member began at the special meeting when the four remaining members requested applications from school district residents. The board set Dec. 4 as the tentative date to vote on a successor. According to a Justice Department opinion requested by district Superintendent Gerald S. Lysik, Caulk may not take part in the selection of his successor.

Caulk said on Sunday he regrets having to step down as board president, but feels he can continue to help the school district as a member of the General Assembly.

"Since I'm familiar with the school board and its problems, I'll be able to do a lot for the school district working along with Bobby Quillen," said Caulk.

Although he doesn't have to resign until he takes the oath of office in January, Caulk said a new member should be selected as soon as possible to enable the board to deal with important pending issues.

Although Caulk's five-year term ends in 1987, his successor will serve only until June 30. A May district-wide election will determine who serves the remaining two years.

In addition to choosing a successor to Caulk, board members will also hire a new administrative assistant. Advertising for the post began the beginning of this week and will run until the Dec. 7 deadline.

Farm Bureau makes new policy

DOVER - For 40 years the Farm Bureau's policy, to some "...has just been too negative..." said one Farm Bureau member recently.

Farm Bureau's President Jack Tarburton said at the annual banquet, held as usual at the Felton Fire Hall to the delight of the many members and guest - because of the delicious oysters served there, "...we are not for anything - and we are not against anything either".

He was referring of course to a position on the North/South toll road. The Farm Bureau noted so long for "being against" has altered their policy. The Bureau retained their position on the bottle bill - which is keeping the deposit on glass and recycling the aluminum.

On Friday night at the annual banquet, retiring Board members Ernest Vogel, Jr., Frank Hrupsa, and Bob Jones were recognized.

Francis and Virginia Winkler were recognized for 30 some odd years of service to the Farm Bureau as was Olin Gooden.

The Bureau members and guests on Friday night heard from Louisiana Farm Bureau President James Graugnard, who offered for consideration the "target price" as one way of helping farmers and farming economy. This is a subsidy where the loan rate and market price do not reach a level set by Congress then the government will pay the difference. A farmer cannot receive over \$50,000 as the difference.

He also stressed the fact that devaluation of the dollar and lowering of interest rates will weaken the dollar to the advantage of our economy and "will sharply bring down the deficit".

James G. Graugnard said "I have spoken with Sen. Russell Long of Louisiana, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture who has spoken to the President about this, and this is what they say," with full prosperity, and full employment more will be contributing to the reduction of the deficit.

One Farm Bureau member from Harrington, Joseph L. Taylor, Jr. spoke from the floor at the convention on Thursday and remarked on the following matters earlier this week.

"Although we did not take a stand on the so called North/South toll road... which was alright, we should have taken a stand on the need for an

East/West road...as well as repairs and maintenance to our secondary roads," said Taylor.

Taylor, of course, was looking at a problem he believes will loom as a super problem in the future. "The longer we delay attacking this problem...and the more we push it back for consideration merely means a bigger invoice somewhere down the road. The day is coming when something has to be done," Taylor concluded.

Taylor is referring to a central problem that no politician in office or those trying to get into office want to discuss. "Another thing that has been done is that the money gained from the Motor Fuel Tax has been used in the past to balance the budget. Half, of course, went to Federal government and then half went to balancing the budget. It should have been used for repairing secondary roads," he said.

Taylor said that in Rehoboth in the summer, about one and a half million people set up quarters, "...and these people expect fast routes to get to and from Washington, Baltimore and other big cities near us. They are demanding good main roads, but that leaves nothing for our secondary roads. We're hurting". In Ocean City, Md., there are at least another one million people in the summer time.

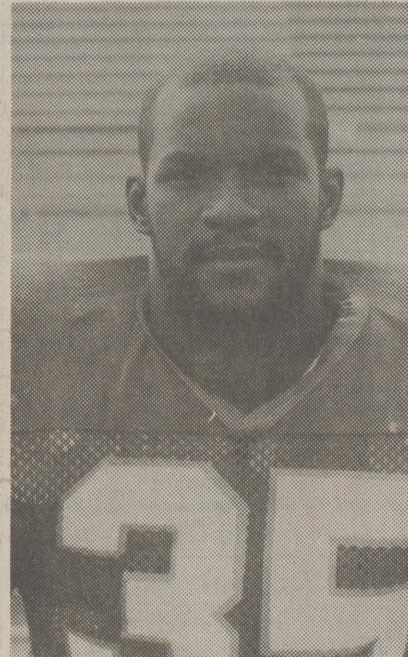

DOVER - Gene Lake, a graduate of Milford High, now a junior at Delaware State College was named Player of the Week by Sports Illustrated magazine the week of November 12th. He was selected for his play against Howard University, won by Del-State 45-7, on November 3rd. Lake scored 6 TD's (a record) and rushed for 232 yards. He ran for 74 yards in the 4th quarter of that game.

On November 10th, the last game of the season for Del-State, he rolled for 363 yards and 3 TD's against Liberty Baptist. In that game he came within nine yards of equaling the Division I-AA single game rushing mark. His season's total yards are 1,722 with 20 TD's. That is 161 yards shy of a single season rushing mark and 1 TD shy of the record for TD's. dumping more and more people and traffic into our area...we are headed for problems. Here is a nearby state doing something that will cause more congestion here-yet we are still sitting on our hands doing nothing," he added.

When discussion turned to developing commercial sites along by-passes or reducing the speed limit "...like we have here in Harrington where the speed limit from Watkins Trucks to the fairgrounds is 35 m.p.h. then instead of creating a by-pass we have merely caused the downtown commerce to move closer to the highway. This is wrong. We have caused more problems," he said.

"It is time that the Department of Transportation said no more frequently. We should say when we have had enough and not be dictated to by outside forces," he said.

Taylor, at the convention, pointed out that "riparian rights, as well as geo-thermal rights have been taken by

the State," he said. The contention was made on the strength of what has been going on within the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control.

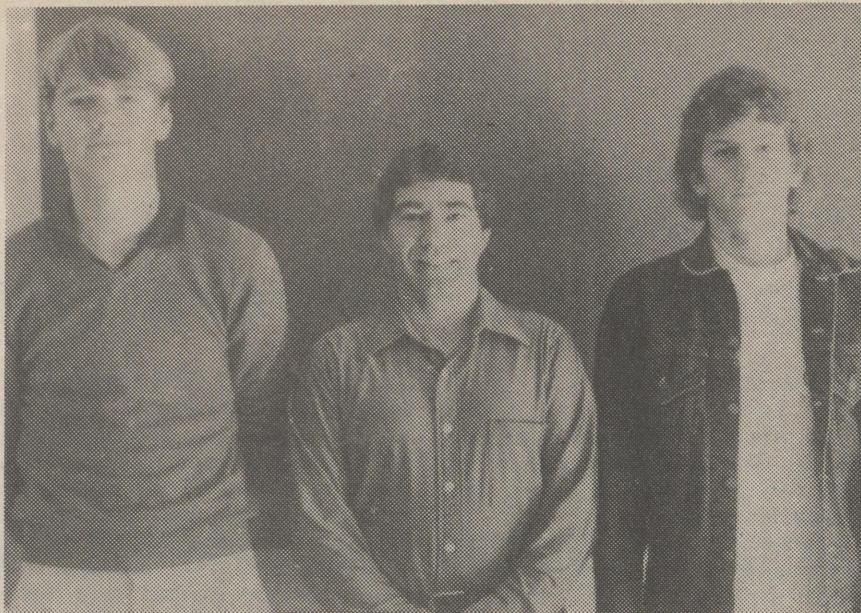
"Attempts on their part to tax in order to justify their existence has been wrong and unconstitutional because their has been a taking without compensation," he added. Taylor said these traditional rights of ownership "...of owning as high as Heaven and down to the center of the earth is in violation of rights under fee simple ownership."

"The right to regulate to conserve air resources should not be interpreted as being able to take without proper legislation and compensation." One of the points he referred to here was a tax on the number of gallons of water used by a private well measured through meters. "It is just ridiculous," he said, "...as is the war on nitrates. Simply does not exist as a problem to our health."

The kitchen is exciting today because I'm trying a new recipe. It is for Oatmeal Yeast Rolls and you just do it with a spoon, which is great. I hate getting my hands into things. If it turns out well, I'll share it later.

Which reminds me! It's about time I made the annual Minnehaha Cake and packed it away for Christmas. I have put this recipe in the column at least a couple of times in the thirty some years I've been writing to you all. This year so many of you have called and asked me to run it again. I am happy to do this, but please clip it and save because the repetition will bore those who have it or do not wish it. Here goes:

Minnehaha Cake

For the batter I use what the housewives of long ago called "1, 2, 3, 4 Cake". The method is the same as for any butter cake. Cream together 1 cup butter OR Crisco (I use Crisco), 2 cups sugar, 2 teasp. vanilla. Add 4 eggs, one at a time, beating well each time. Add 3 cups all-purpose flour, 3 teasp. baking powder. Alternately with 1 cup milk. This makes 3 deep layers.

For frosting I suspect the older cooks made boiled frosting and you can use any kind really. I get Pillsbury or Betty Crocker prepared frosting in a can. Some years instead of the white I get the buttered pecan, which is a lovely color and flavor. As you spread the frosting, between the layers and on top and around the sides, have ready chopped dates and black walnut meats and press them thickly into the frosting. (This is a Mess and time-consuming.) Then I add maraschino cherries here and there for a festive look.

Through the years each family has changed it a bit. For instance the original recipe called for the fruit in the icing to be raisins. If you prefer raisins, do this. I think the dates are tastier and keep the cake more moist. And some folk who do not like black walnuts may use other nuts. And the addition of the cherries is my own idea. It's so gay and pretty.

When it is completed, I set it in the freezer briefly to firm the icing so it can be wrapped. Do not forget it! Take out, wrap aluminum foil around it and then place in a plastic bag. Remove it the morning of Christmas Eve.

I wish I knew the origin of the name. You can occasionally find the recipe or some version of it in the very old cookbooks, but no reason for the name. Happy cooking to you!!

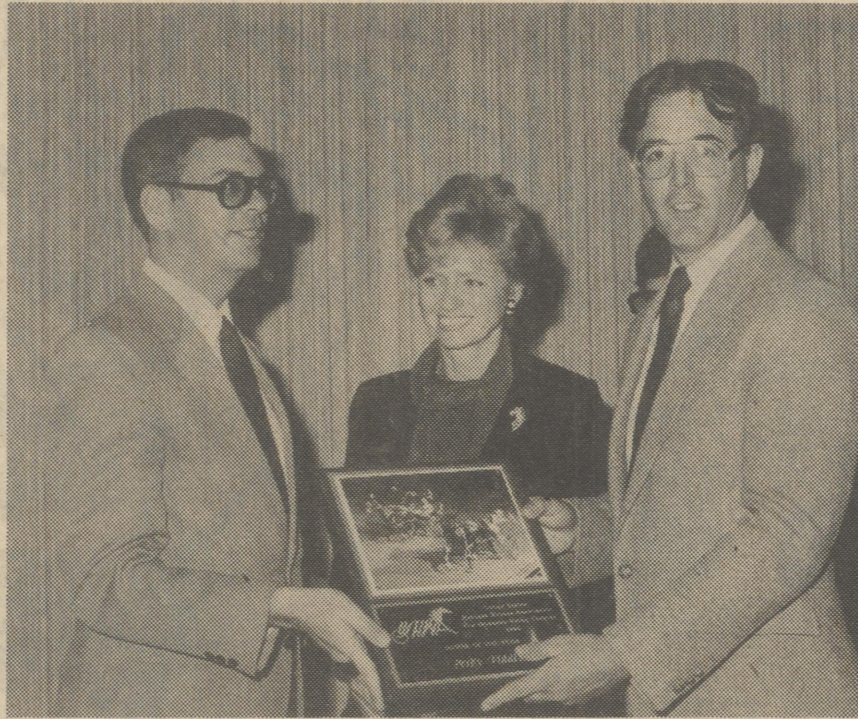

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE OBSTRUCTION OF VEHICLE TRAFFIC DUE TO RAILROAD SWITCHING AND MOVING OPERATIONS

Whereas, it has come to the attention of the City Government of the City of Harrington that Railroad switching and moving operations have caused a hardship on the citizens of this City, and

Whereas, the massive daily switching and movement operations performed by railroad companies within this City have caused congestion and delay on our public streets, and

Whereas, because of the switching and movement operations, railroad crossings throughout the City have been obstructed by the Railroad for very lengthy amounts of time, and

Whereas, it is in the safety and welfare interest of the citizens of this City that the blocking of railroad crossings within the City by railroad operations for a lengthy period of time be discouraged, and

Whereas, it is the interest of all that the interest of the citizens in use of the street within our City and the interest of the railroad companies in steady movement of freight through the City be balanced and competing interests be equal.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Council of the City of Harrington (a majority of those elected concurring therein):

Section 1. Amend Section 1.15, Chapter XI of the Municipal Code of Harrington 1982 by designating the existing paragraph as sub-

paragraph (a) and by adding thereto new subparagraphs to read as follows:

"(b) It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to operate any locomotive, train of cars or railroad in such a manner by switching operations or otherwise, so as to block a street crossing within the City so as to obstruct the flow of vehicle traffic for a period of more than ten (10) minutes, except in cases of accident or other similar emergency.

(c) Notwithstanding any provisions of this Chapter to the contrary, any person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this section shall upon conviction be fined a sum not less than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars nor more than two hundred fifty (\$250.00) dollars.

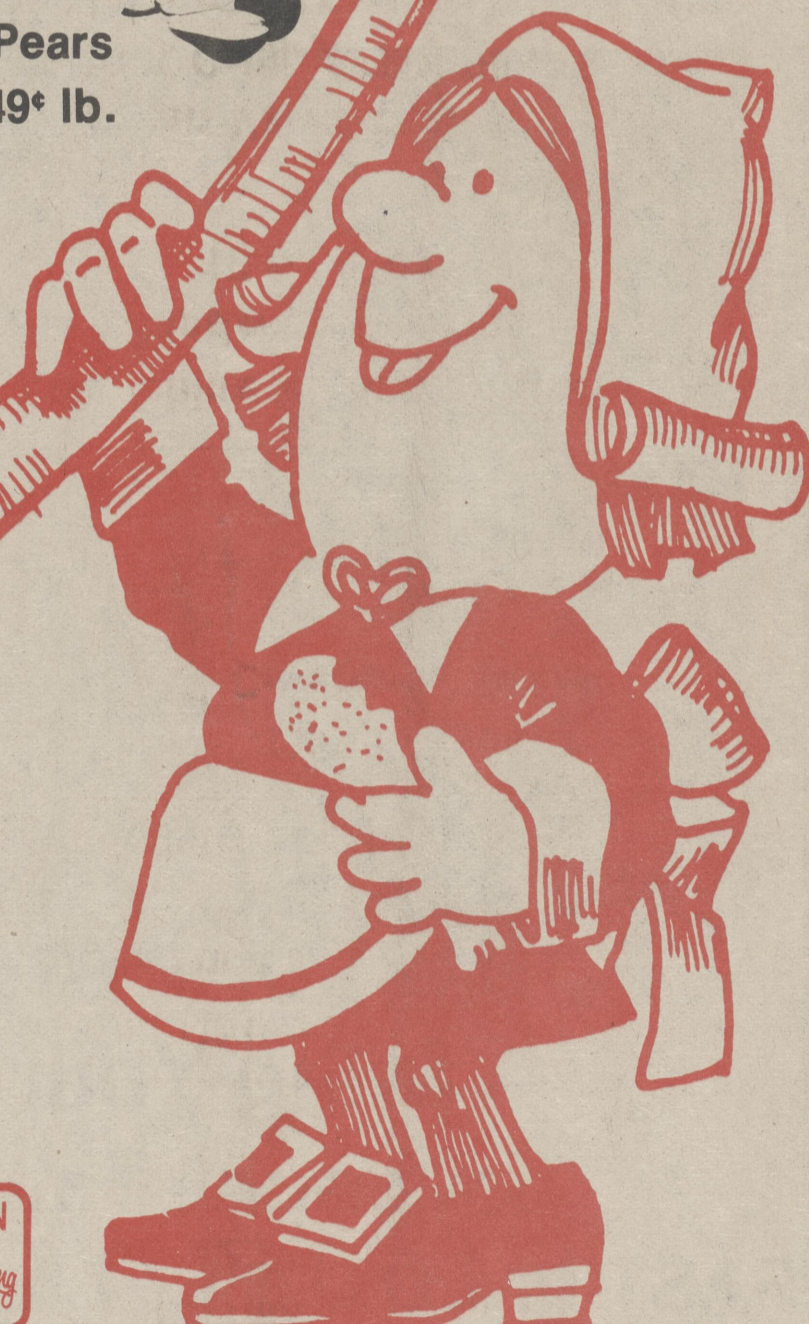
