Short takes on area news Sex crimes send two ex-teachers. Milford man to jail

Two former teachers and a Milford man were all sentenced to prison terms Friday for sex crimes involving minors.

Jeffrey S. Kern, 31, former music teacher at Dover High School, was sentenced by Superior Court Judge Henry du Pont Ridgely to two years in prison and three years probation on a charge of sodomy involving a 14-year-old

Keith A. Gross, 27, former karate instructor at Delaware Technical and Community College drew a 15year prison sentence and five years probation from Ridgely for the rape of a 10-year-old girl and sodomy involving a 9-year-old boy.

A 42-year-old Milford man was sentenced by Superior Court Judge William G. Bush to four years in prison and two years probation for the rape of his 9-year-old stepdaughter.

The Harrington Journal is withholding the defendand's name to protect the identity of the victim.

The attorneys for Kern and Gross both deplored Delaware's lack of rehabilitation facilities for the treatment of sex offenders.

Dover voters approve library referendum

Dover voters approved a \$300,000 bond issue that will fund most of the \$398,000 expansion and renovation planned for Dover Public Library. Voters registered an overwhelming approval vote as 935 people cast their ballots at the library polls. The expansion project won by a 5-1 margin, with

784, or 84 percent, of the voters supporting the improvement program. The 23-year-old library will have a 2,800-square-foot extension added to its rear that will house part of the 78,000 books and provide space for new ones. In addition to the extension, funds will be used to redesign the building, to remove interior walls, and to install an elevator.

Gary Patterson, chairman of the Dover Library Commission, said bids will be offered in the spring, and construction should take about 18 months.

Colemans in car mishap in Georgia

Daniel Coleman, his wife Margaret, his brother Rev. Ellsworth and his wife Queenie Coleman were involved in the 38 car pile up on a Georgia bridge last Friday morning between Brunswick and Savannah Georgia. The Colemans escaped injury. "Our car was back quite a ways from the initial collision when a car stopped still on top of the bridge. A truck plowed into the rear of that car setting both vehicles on fire", said Daniel Coleman. When a truck ahead of me swerved to the left...I saw an object ahead of me. I swerved to miss it...and the truck right behind me plowed right into the rear of the vehicle I swerved to miss". Had Coleman remained in the same lane he would have been hit from the rear. He said it was slightly foggy in spots, "but right on top of the bridge you couldn't see a thing". There were a total of 38 cars involved in the mishap.

Longer school day rejected for most grades

The May proposal to lengthen the school day, which grew out of a recommendation of the Governor's Task Force on Education for Economic Growth, called for adding 30 minutes for Grades 1, 2 and 7-12.

At the three hearings on the topic all opposed the concept of lengthening the school day. Reasons cited most often were, quality of instruction matters more than the length of the school day; costs of the changes; effects of a longer day on family life; and the lack of conclusive educational research to support a longer day. A survey of school districts also showed little support for the state's requiring a longer day. Elementary schools in all districts but one already meet the proposed new state minimums, by action of the local boards, and most Delaware secondary schools exceed the current requirement of six hours. Local officials cited several problems foreseen from the state's requiring a longer day. Chief among them were, effects on extra-curricular activities and high school scheduling; effect upon contracts; and added costs. The department of instruction recommends only one change in state requirements—lengthening the day for Grades 1 and 2 from five to six hours of instruction. DPI and local officials would, however, continue to work to develop ways to use existing instructional time more effectively. Accepting the recommendations, the Board gave notice that it intends to consider changing the requirements for Grades 1 and 2 at its next meeting, with implementation planned for September, 1985.

Trump remembers "Bulge"

Known as the greatest battle in the greatest war, it was Hitler's last-ditch effort to defeat the Allies. It was the Battle of the Bulge.

Sunday was the 40th anniversary of this bloody battle of World War II. John Trump, of Felton, is one man who will never forget that day 40 years

The 59-year-old Trump was still a teenager when he served in the 90th Infantry Division, 3rd Army, under the command of the war's most flamboyant and audacious leader. Gen. George S. Patton.

"We knew something was going on but we couldn't figure out what," said Trump, "Out of a clear blue sky, they told us we were pulling out. They called it the 'breakthrough.' We didn't hear anything about the 'bulge' till we



came home."

Hitler had ordered the breakthrough against the advice of his top generals. German gasoline supplies were dangerously low. Hitler's objective was the vital Allied supply base at Antwerp in northern Belgium.

German Field Marshall Von Rundstedt, the brilliant counterpart of Patton, launched the surprise attack on Dec. 16, 1944 in the Ardennes Forest. While the folks on the home front were doing their Christmas shopping, John Trump was on a 100-mile journey to Bastogne in southeast Belgium. He rode in an open truck in fog and snow with the temperature at six degrees below zero.

"We rode in anything we could get. It seemed like forever. It was freezing cold. It was one of the worst winters in Europe in years," Trump said.

Patton wrote in his memoirs, "Christmas dawned clear and cold; lovely weather for killing germans." It was one of the most incredible

journeys in military history. Patton astonished his colleagues when he said he would move his entire 3rd Army the 100 miles to Bastogne in 72 hours. No one thought it could be done. They were proved wrong when Patton arrived on schedule and began his attack.

Referring to Trump's 90th Infantry, Patton said, "I passed through the last combat team of the 90th Division moving up for battle. These men had been in trucks for a great many hours with the temperature at six degrees below zero, and were thoroughly chilled...when the soldiers of the 90th Division saw me, they stood up and cheered. It was the most moving experience of my life

The objective in making the menacing 100-mile trip was to rescue the fierce fighters of the 101st Airborne who were surrounded by Germans in Bastogne.

Trump, who had landed at D-Day and had already been wounded twice, had a close call outside Bastogne when a bullet struck the front of his helmet, circled the helmet liner, and came out the back.

"I felt my helmet move, but I didn't think anything of it. Then someone said 'What happened to you?' When I looked at my helmet, I was really shook up,' he laughed.

"I also had bullet holes in my overcoat and gas mask," he added.

Gen. McAuliffe, who commanded the 101st, was sent a white flag by the Germans demanding that he surrender. McAuliffe gave his now-famous [Continued on page 2]



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



Winston NASCAR Racing News

NEW YORK — An \$11.25-million program, the most extensive and richest in motorsports history, was unveiled Friday night December 7th by R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co., the sponsor of the NASCAR Winston Cup Series.

Gerald H. Long, president and chief executive officer of Reynolds Tobacco, made the announcement at the annual NASCAR Winston Cup Awards Banquet here at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel.

The new programs include the Winston Million, in which a driver can win \$1 million, and The Winston, a new race with a \$500,000 purse, making it the richest race per mile in motorsports history.

In addition, Reynolds Tobacco, sponsor of the Winston Cup Series since 1971, will boost the 1985 NASCAR Winston Cup point fund to a record \$750,000. This is a \$250,000 increase over the 1984 fund which was awarded at the banquet.

If one driver has an extremely successful season, he could earn \$1,450,000 from Winston cigarettes.

"We are making a five-year commitment to The Winston and the Winston Million," said Long. "And when these events are combined with the 1985 point fund increase, the total potential value of all of these programs over the next five years will be \$11,250,000."

The Reynolds Tobacco executive said the company "is committed to ensuring that Winston Cup racing has no rival when it comes to being No. 1 in motorsports, and our annoncement tonight is our way of ensuring that." The Winston Million will be comprised

of the Big Four races on the NASCAR Winston Cup circuit — the Daytona 500, the Winston 500, the World 600 the Southern 500. If a driver can Winston Cigarettes. If no one is able to win three races. the first driver to win two of the four money," added Long. events in 1985 will earn \$100,000.

"From a promoter's standpoint, all of this will add tremendous drama to the season," said Wheeler. "It also has all the ingredients for a new superstar to emerge. Can you imagine the publicity a driver would get should he win The Winston, three of the four designated races in the Winston Million and the points title?

The TV set and oven were reported missing when the senior center opened Thursday morning.


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"The police were here within minutes. Chief McIllroy took fingerprints. They did a fine job," said Gene Price, director of the senior center.
