

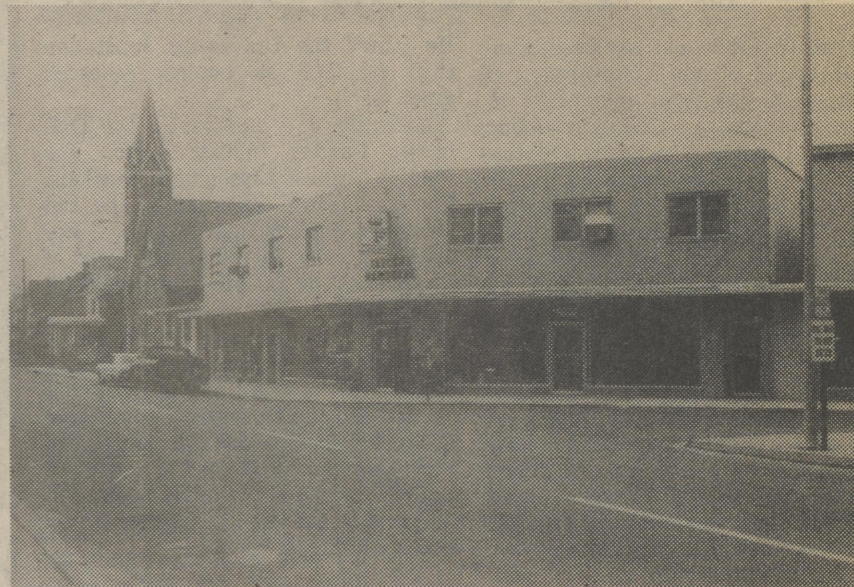

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## Taylor's Hardware celebrates 50th Anniversary

HARRINGTON — On January 2nd 1935, the Taylor's Hardware business for purposes and intent came into existence. It was founded by J. Edward Taylor.

Taylor who graduated from Goldey College in 1934 first took a job in the payroll department of Libby, McNeil, & Libby Co. in Houston. When the Company wanted to move him to their headquarters in Chicago, he decided to remain instead in Harrington.

In 1934 he and the late Charles L. Peck, Sr. formed the Peck and Taylor Hardware in Harrington. A year later Taylor purchased Peck's interest and founded the Hardware that we know today.

Over the years Taylor and Taylor's Hardware have been monuments in this community of less than 2000. From his own love of baseball, he helped found and organize Little League Baseball in Kent and Sussex Counties. He and the Hardware have lent their support all through those years.

As a farm boy...he was raised on a

farm just west of Harrington, his love of the farm and farm life drew him into the tractor and farm implement business as well. In 1935 he began selling John Deere tractors and other John Deere farm implements. "We also sold horse drawn implements as well", Taylor is quick to speak out on, because he had grown up on a farm where horses were worked. "I sold my first tractors to my father...C. Arthur Taylor and a fellow by the name of John Lister", said Taylor recently.

The John Deere business and Hardware business were run together at one point at the same site where the Hardware is today. "We had a display lot behind the Hardware", said Taylor. Later the John Deere business was moved to the lot at the end of Commerce St. where Reese Ave. joins. "We built the building there which is still standing today and is used as a warehouse for the Hardware", said Taylor.

Later the John Deere business was moved to its present site on the Vernon

Road, which was the former site of the Murphy & Hayes building and blacksmith shop.

Mr. Taylor served first as a Director of the Peoples Bank of Harrington in 1948. Later became Vice President and on the death of Mr. E.B. Rash in 1966, became its President, which he serves today in that capacity.

He has been a former City Councilman, Director on the Board of the Milford Memorial Hospital, former President of the Harrington Lions Club, and many State Government commissions.

At 72, Mr. Taylor still shows up at the Hardware each day along with his wife, Lela Parker Taylor...who was his first partner in the Taylor's Hardware business, even though he and she have passed the reins to their son Robert Taylor. The joy of doing what they like to do best keeps them in a young and healthy state.

We salute the Taylors and Taylor's Hardware for their contribution to the community.

## Spartans win opening round of Holiday Tournament

DOVER — The Lake Forest Spartan Basketball varsity team opened the Holiday Tournament at Dover with a decisive win over Caesar Rodney five 52-47.

The Spartans will open their Southern Division play following the holidays. Their record through Thursday was 1-2.

"Our ability to stay out of foul trouble is the key to our successes", said head

coach Bill Falasco. He was referring to the two defeats his team suffered before the holidays at the hands of Dover and Sussex Central. "Benson, Warren, and Hill fouled out of the Dover game which we lost by 7 points", said Coach Falasco. Kevin Benson at 6'6", Eric Warren at 6'2", and Victor Hill at 6'4" are the big front for the Spartans. Behind them in the back court are Keith Chandler at 5'10" and Buc K Bordley at 5'8".

The Spartans will definitely have an advantage this year with their height. On Thursday night their foul shooting (17 for 26) with 12 of 17 in the fourth quarter kept them in the game. "It was the margin of victory for us", said Falasco. The Spartans were 18 for 39 from the floor. "We should have made more shots. We usually take more, but overall we handled the ball well. The passing was great and if we keep this up...we will win some more games", said Falasco.

On Thursday night Hill was high with 13 points, Benson had 11 and Warren scored 7. The big gun for the Spartans was Keith Chandler who scored 12 points in the Winning cause.

## MMH Laboratory adds latest chemistry analyzer

The Clinical Laboratory of Milford Memorial Hospital has installed the most modern, state-of-the-art chemistry analyzer that is available on the market today. The DuPont Automatic Clinical Analyzer V was recently purchased by the Hospital to improve the diagnostic services of the Clinical Laboratory. The new ACA V is a fully automated instrument that offers a range of diagnostic tests more extensive than any other automated chemistry analyzer. The tests include general chemistry, special chemistries, enzymes, therapeutic drug monitoring,

and coagulation tests. These tests are of great clinical value to physicians and their patients. Among the many tests that the ACA V can perform are tests that can help determine if a patient has had a heart attack within the previous 72 hours, tests that can measure kidney and liver function, tests that identify blood clotting problems and cardiac risk, and tests that can diagnose diabetes, pancreatitis, iron deficiency, dehydration, gout, abnormal potassium, and parathyroid abnormalities. It can also measure the toxic level of many drugs found in blood or urine

samples. The ACA V has the capability of completing 105 tests as compared with a limit of 60 tests on the equipment that was replaced.

Joyce Parent, M.T. (ASCP), Chemistry Supervisor, and Jeannie Thomas, M.L.T. (ASCP), Laboratory Technician, of the MMH Laboratory staff received a week of special training on this equipment at the DuPont Company Laboratories in Wilmington. The entire technical staff of the Laboratory is now trained to use the new analyzer and all accuracy, precision, and calibration tests of this equipment have been completed.

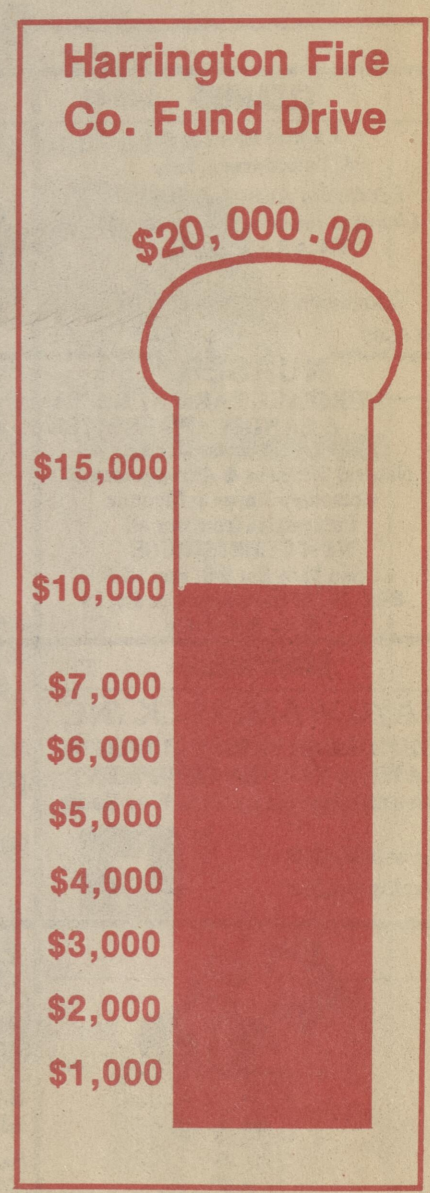

#### Traffic fatality on U.S. 13 in Harrington

Delaware's first traffic fatality of the holiday weekend occurred Saturday, December 22 on U.S. 13 in Harrington.

Robert and Jane Quade of Harleysville, Pa. were traveling south on U.S. 13 in a car which was driven by Robert Quade. Sgt. Barry I. Beck, of the Delaware State Police, said the car went off the right edge of the road, traveled 41 feet before striking a utility pole with the front fender and continued 59 feet before stopping.

Jane Quade, 47, was taken to Milford Memorial Hospital where she was pronounced dead from massive head injuries Saturday. Robert Quade, 54, was also taken to Milford Memorial Hospital where he was treated for multiple cuts and bruises and released.

Sgt. Beck stated that alcohol was involved in the accident, but there will be no charges made.

The couple was traveling from their home in Pennsylvania to a vacation in Florida.

#### VCR stolen from Harrington woman

Melissa Mae Elliott, of Harrington, had a video cassette recorder stolen from her unlocked car in the Milford Plaza on Dec. 21, according to the Milford Police Department.

George W. Chaloupka has been named director of the University of Delaware Georgetown substation effective January 1, 1985, succeeding Edward H. Ralph, who will retire December 31. Chaloupka currently serves as extension poultry specialist, a post he has held for the past 10 years.

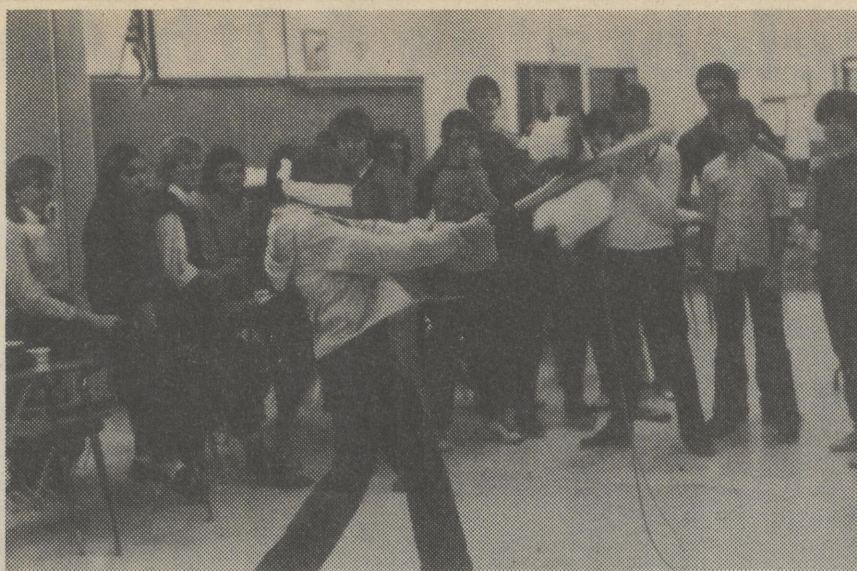
A Delaware native, Chaloupka holds a bachelor's degree in agriculture from the University of Delaware, with a major in poultry production. He grew up on a farm near Milton.

After graduating from college he taught agriculture and general science at Sanford Preparatory School near Wilmington and managed the school farm for two years. He then worked for nine years as a technical assistant for O. A. Newton & Son Co. in Bridgeville.

He joined the University substation staff in 1965 as poultry research associate.

Chaloupka is a member of the Delmarva Poultry Industry, Inc., the Poultry Science Association, Southern Poultry Science Association and the Delaware Poultry Improvement Association. He also serves on the board of trustees of the Delaware Agricultural Museum.

As substation director, he will hold a joint appointment with the University of Delaware Agricultural Experiment Station and the Delaware Cooperative Extension Service. He will continue to serve as extension poultry specialist on a part-time basis, and an assistant will be hired to assume the balance of his extension duties.

## Delcastle science teacher wins State Teacher Award

Susan A. Thomas, science teacher at Delcastle High School, New Castle Co. Vo-Tech District, has been named 1985 Delaware Teacher of the Year.

Ms. Thomas, who lives on Homestead Drive, Alban Park, Wilmington, was cited for representing the best traits of Delaware's 5400 public school teachers by State Superintendent William B. Keene at an awards dinner held at the Dover Sheraton Nov. 13.

She becomes the state's candidate for National Teacher of the Year, a title which will be conferred next spring.

Ms. Thomas, 38, joined Delcastle in 1979 after nine years of teaching at Howard HS, Wilmington. She also taught in the University of Delaware's Upward Bound program and at Shaw JHS, Philadelphia.

A 1968 graduate of Cheyney State College, Pennsylvania, she studied at the U of D 1969-70 as a fellow of the National Science Foundation and organized the college's first Black Awareness Week.

Ms. Thomas has developed courses in applied science, advanced earth science, and chemistry for cosmetology students. She was vice-president of the New Castle Co. Federation of Teachers and serves on the principal's advisory committee at Delcastle.

At Howard she founded the Poplar Street Players, a dramatics group, and the student athletic association.

A member of St. Matthew Episcopal Church, Wilmington, she sings in the Chancel Choir and has been clerk of the vestry.

She helped to found the Children's Theatre of Jack and Jill, Inc., and Playcrafters, an adult drama group. She serves on the board of the Christina Cultural Arts Center and performs with the Wilm. Drama League.

Ms. Thomas has been a cub scout den mother and a volunteer helper with Big Sisters and the Layton Home for the Aged.

Ms. Thomas is known as a creative teacher whose stamina and energy enable her to be superbly prepared for her classes. Respected for her command of her subjects, she relies on clear objectives and varied materials and succeeds at reaching students at all levels.

Appreciated by her colleagues for her dedication and wit, Ms. Thomas is said to go well beyond teaching the facts of the subject at hand and to instill in her students a general love of learning.

## What to do if someone is choking

If your dinner partner or child chokes on food, you must be able to act quickly. The signs of choking will be obvious. The person will be reddish-blue in the face. They will try to dislodge the obstructing piece of food, often grasping their throat. They will be unable to cough, speak or breathe. Without help, they can become unconscious or suffer cardiopulmonary arrest.

Would you know what to do? A new brochure by the American Heart Association, "First Aid For Choking," illustrates the positions for back blows and chest or stomach thrusts to help dislodge particles stuck in the throat. It also describes what to do if an adult, child or infant becomes unconscious from the obstruction. Even if the particle is removed, the booklet recommends, the victim should be examined by a physician as soon as possible.

The American Heart Association of Delaware recommends every family member and restaurant employee learn how to help a choking person, and even

better, how to prevent choking. Obstructions in the air passage occur every day and account for about 3,000 deaths each year in the United States. Not all obstructions are food. Sometimes children try to swallow small toys.

Prevention is the most effective safety precaution.

The Heart brochure offers these tips:

- Cut food into small pieces.
- Chew food slowly and thoroughly.
- People wearing dentures should be especially thorough about chewing food.
- Avoid laughing and talking when you are chewing and swallowing.
- Avoid excessive intake of alcohol before and during meals.
- Keep marbles, beads, thumbtacks and other small objects out of reach of children and infants. Restrict them from walking, running or playing with food or toys in their mouths.

## Sutcliffe to succeed McGinniss as Milford High School's Principal

Milford High School will have a new principal on July 1, 1985.  
Dr. Robert Sutcliffe, 37, will succeed Mr. Daniel McGinniss, who will be Director of Administrative Services for the Milford School District.  
Dr. Sutcliffe, of Milford, was born in Abington, Pennsylvania and has both B.A. and Ph.D. degrees in education. Before coming to the Milford School District, Sutcliffe taught for six years in the Abington School District. He then came to Milford High where he became Vice-Principal. For seven of the eight years he has been Vice-Principal, Sutcliffe has been in charge of school activities, school attendance, and school discipline. This school year, Sutcliffe supervises the school's curriculum and guidance counseling.  
"My new position is different because

I am responsible for all the aspects of high school. I am very excited and am looking forward to the new challenges of the position," said Dr. Sutcliffe.  
The main goal Sutcliffe hopes to achieve as principal of Milford High will be to continue to refine the High School's present program. He promised not to "make any major changes" in the school system, but to continue "the good work" performed by outgoing principal Daniel McGinniss.  
Referring to last year's State Task Force on Education report, Sutcliffe smiled and said, "I found it very interesting. It reinforced what Milford High has acted on the past three or four years."  
Dr. Sutcliffe resides in Milford with his wife, Carol, and their seven-year-old son, Jason.

## To Our Visiting Family and Friends Introducing our pastor, Father Charles L. Brown, III

Although Fr. Charles L. Brown III is the way you see our pastor's name listed in the bulletin, around Milford and Harrington you are more likely to hear him addressed as Fr. Charlie. Born in Methodist Hospital in South Philadelphia to Charles L. and Marie Moresi Brown, he was the first of their two sons. His brother Richard joined the family 2½ years later. In 1952 the Brown family relocated in Elsmere, De. to make it easier for Mr. Brown to reach his office in the engineering department of the DuPont Co. which had moved from Wilmington to Newark. A product of the public schools of Pa. and De., Fr. Charlie graduated from Henry C. Conrad High School in 1959. In Sept. of that year he began his studies for the priesthood for the Diocese of Wilm. at St. Mary's Seminary College, St. Mary, Ky. and continued his theological studies at Catholic University of America. ## Elliott, Parsons top 200 in Talladega Testing

TALLADEGA, AL — Bill Elliott served notice here over the Christmas holidays that he will have to be reckoned with when Busch Beer Pole Position Qualifying for the Daytona 500 takes place on Saturday, February 9th, at Daytona International Speedway.  
Elliott, testing here for the Daytona 500, turned an incredible, although unofficial, fast lap of 202.881 miles per hour. It won't go in the record books, but Elliott's time bettered the NASCAR qualifying record of 202.692, set last May at Alabama International Motor Speedway by Cale Yarborough prior to the Winston 500.  
With temperatures unseasonably warm at 60-70 degrees, both Elliott and Benny Parsons posted impressive times.  
Parsons, in a brand new 1985 Chevrolet Monte Carlo, clocked 201.102 mph. He and crew chief Leo Jackson were testing air flow to the carburetor as

well as different chassis set-ups.  
"The weather here was much like to will probably be in Daytona, sunny and warm, so both of these teams should feel pretty good about their chances at Daytona," said AIMS General Manager Don Naman. "This is the first time anyone has gone over 200 in pre-season testing here and, if this is any indication, the 1985 season is going to be something else."  
Elliott wouldn't specify what his crew, headed by his brothers, Dan and Ernie were looking for on their 1984 Ford Thunderbird, but his quickest laps came when he put a 1985 T-Bird nose on the car.  
Both Elliott and Parsons know their way around Talladega's high banks. Elliott has had the outside pole for the last three races at Talladega, while Parsons was the first stock car driver to top 200 mph in qualifying, doing so prior to the 1982 Winston 500.

# The Delaware State Housing Authority Home Mortgage Program

In order to promote home ownership in our state, the Delaware State Housing Authority is continuing its home mortgage program to assist low and moderate income individuals in the purchase of homes. The Authority has entered into agreements to purchase conventional, FHA, or VA mortgage loans from thirty-one mortgage lenders statewide. Borrowers who qualify will benefit from low interest rates and better terms than are common now. Funding for the loans will be provided by the Authority's sale of mortgage-backed revenue bonds.

### Who is eligible?

Anyone who has not owned a home in the past three years, and who has a current family income of less than \$35,000 a year, and who meets the normal credit requirements of the lending institution. The first-time buyer requirement does not apply to purchasers buying in the targeted area around Ellendale.

### What kind of property qualifies?

The borrower must have a specific property in mind. It must be located in the State of Delaware, and be the borrower's primary residence. If located in Kent or Sussex Counties it must cost less than \$67,900 if it is an existing home, or \$81,300 if it is a new home. Higher prices are allowed in the targeted area, and for two to four unit properties. For details on the targeted area, contact any lender.

### How do you apply for a loan?

The borrower should telephone any of the participating lenders listed below, starting Wednesday, January 2, 1985 at 9:00 AM. If the borrower is eligible, and meets the

lender's requirement, the loan will be made directly by the lending institution. Borrowers should not apply to the Delaware State Housing Authority.

### What will the loan cost?

The interest rate on all mortgages granted will be 10.85% per year. There will also be an origination fee of 3% of the amount borrowed of which ¾% will usually be paid by the borrowers and 2¼% paid by the seller. Other items, such as lender application and processing fees, closing and mortgage insurance costs, may be charged to the borrower.

### What will the loan terms be?

All loans made under the program will be for a term of thirty years and carry a fixed interest rate.

### How large a down payment is required?

Minimum down payments range from 0% to 5% of the purchase price depending on whether the loan is conventional, FHA, or VA.

## The Legend of Lonnie LeeRoy Yarbrough Remembered

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — Lonnie LeeRoy Yarbrough died December 7th 1984. His death ended in tragedy as his life had been for the last 12 years.

Yarbrough's star rose high quickly in the NASCAR ranks. In nine years time from the time he first raced a stock car in the NASCAR circuit (1960) to the height of his career in 1969, Yarbrough won 14 Grand National races. He won the ones which counted, but within two years his career had hit rock bottom. He never recovered and he never returned to stardom.

What happened? Well we know that, but how it happened or what caused it might certainly remain a mystery. My theory is that he suffered brain damage which was irreparable from the bout with "tick fever". The fever reached such high temperatures for such a long period of time that he would not be able to recover.

He is a great guy to write about. His saga reaches hero proportions. What happened in the end might have been avoided. Maybe not. Let's continue to remember him when he was on the rise.

"I remember going to Daytona one year. Must have been 1960 or '61. LeeRoy was in one of the modified races. (Daytona held the modified races then.) He has a 1953 studebaker with 427 c.i. Ford engine—the one with a bullet nose and rear," said Bill Towers, Sr. father of local stock car star Bill Towers, Jr. "He brought the fenders right down just over the top of the front wheels—then took them right on down to the ground, and right under the front fender", continued Towers. "Well...it was something to see. You've never seen anything like it. He got the pole", Towers said. "Was it fast?", I asked. "Fast...when they dropped the

green flag...the car on the outside pole (of him) got the closest to LeeRoy really at that point, because when that car and the field was coming out of the second turn—LeeRoy was going through the 3rd turn. That's how fast he was—and if you know how long that backstretch is at Daytona you know what I am talking about." Towers related with a grin. "That old Ford was purring," Towers remarked with another grin and laugh from his love of Fords. "Well sir...when LeeRoy got into the 3rd turn—the car went airborne. It sailed right on around the third and into the fourth turns," said Towers. "He was right up there in the air. The car came right on around and crashed into the end of the pit wall," remarked Towers in disgust. "Tore the car all to pieces, but he wasn't hurt," said Towers. "He could have backed off her 20 or 30 miles an hour...they still wouldn't have caught him—but no... not LeeRoy, he had to keep the throttle down. That's the way he was," concluded Towers.

That's a neat little story about the famous Ford driver. We thank Mr. Towers for that. We want to know more about LeeRoy and little happenings to him. So if you know of any write me at Raceweek, P.O. Box 239, Harrington, DE 19952 or call (302) 398-3206.

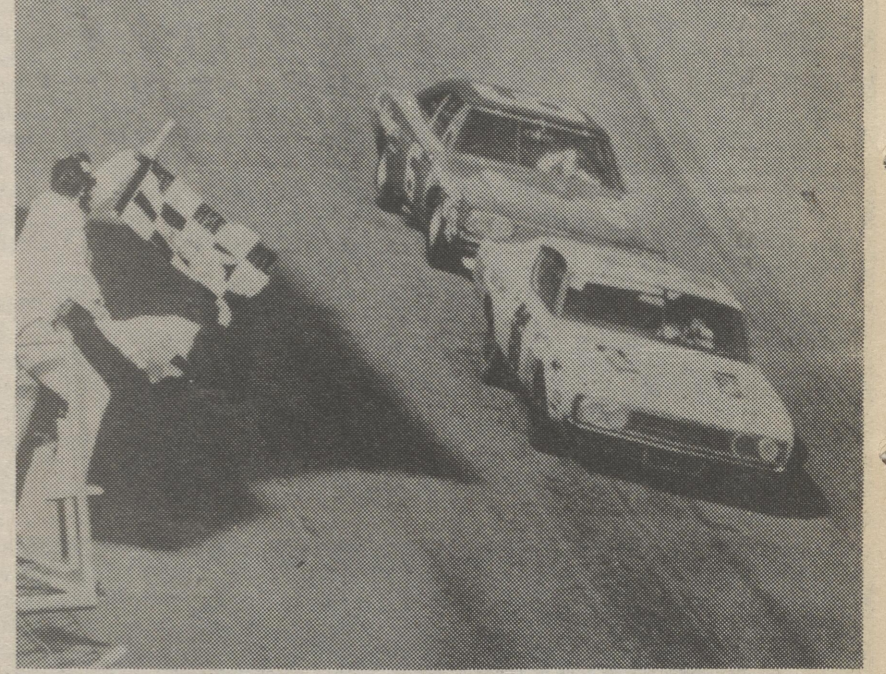

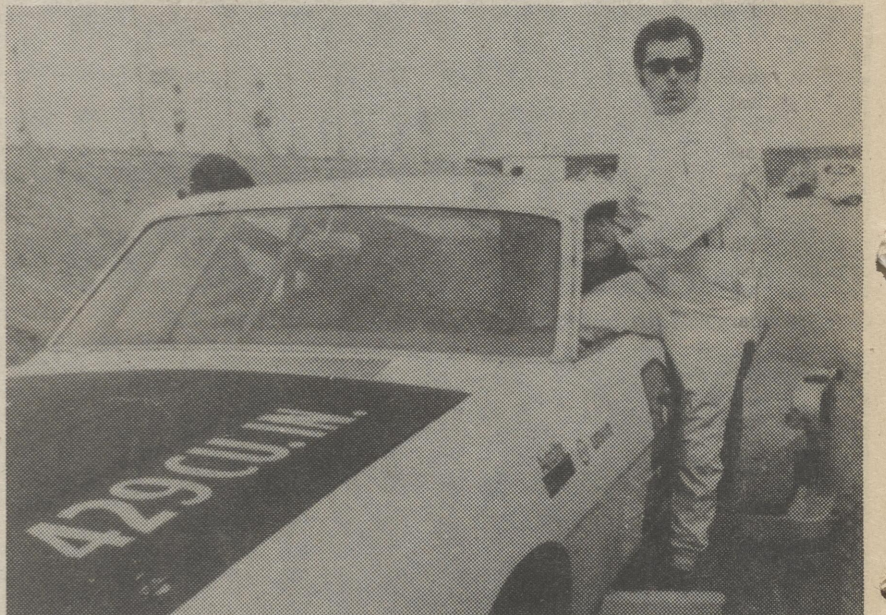

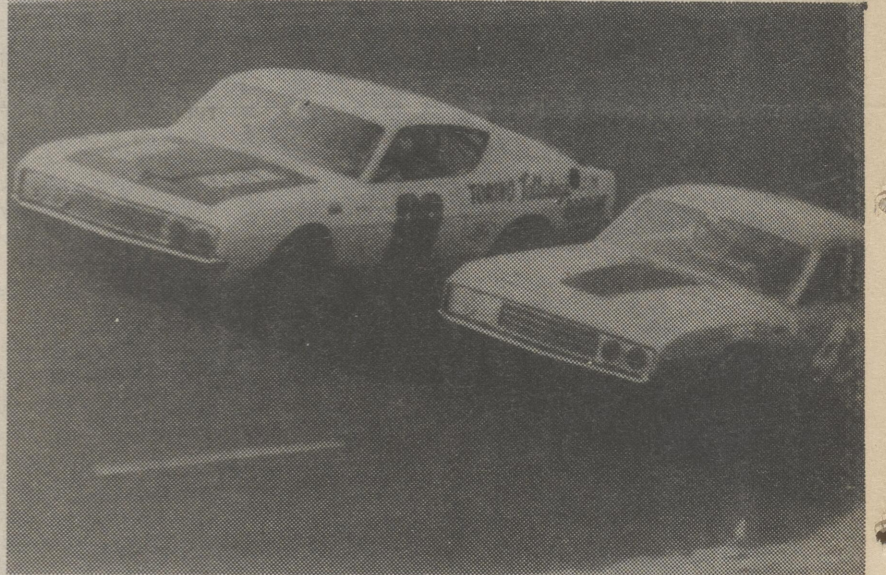

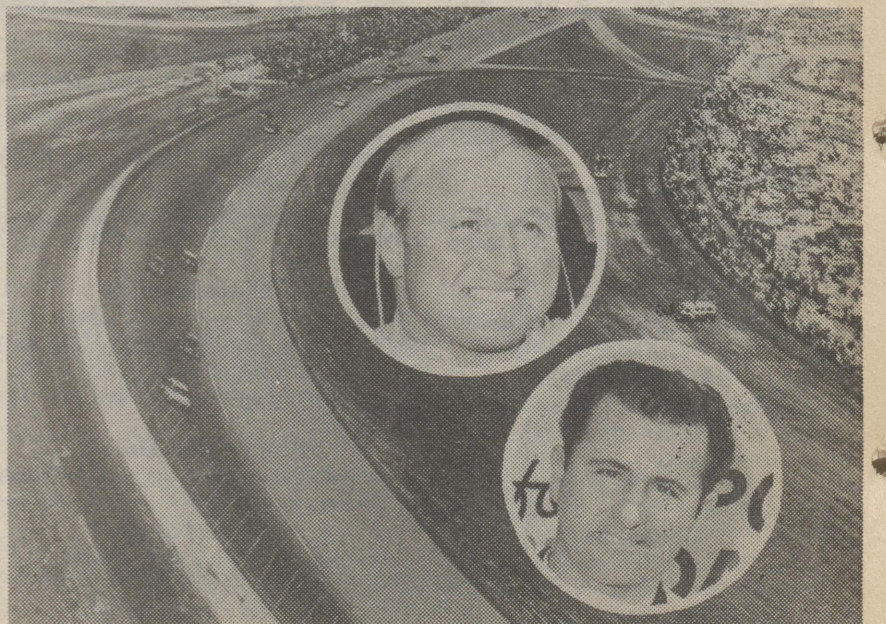

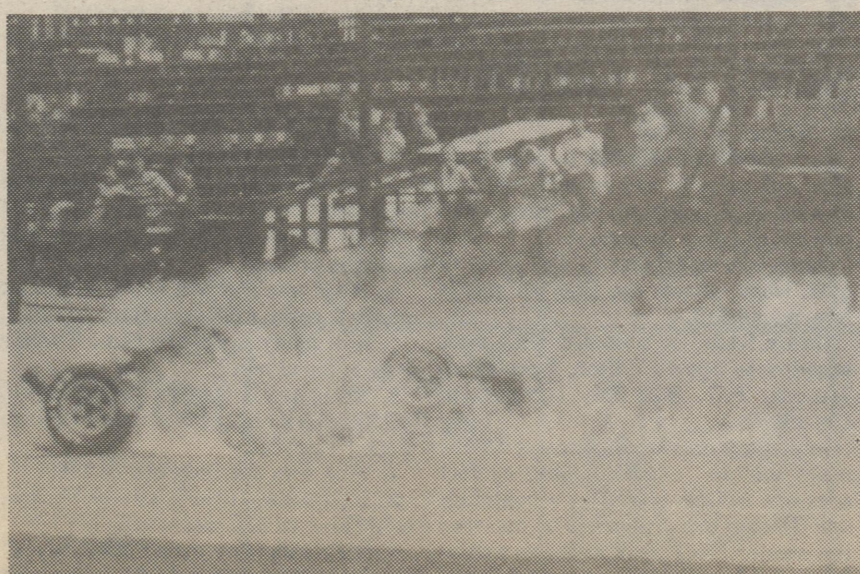
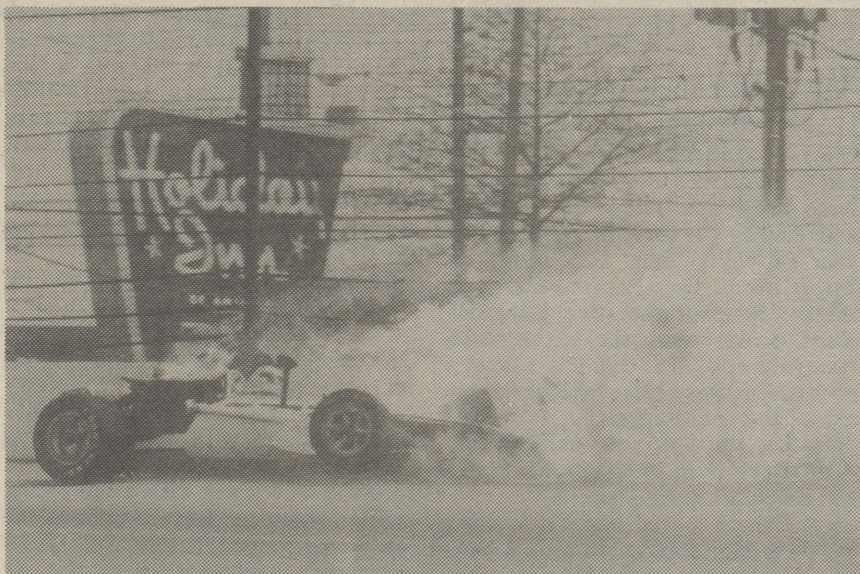
