

Taylor's Hardware celebrates 50th **Anniversary**

HARRINGTON - On January 2nd 1935, the Taylor's Hardware business for purposes and intent came into existence. It was founded by J. Edward Taylor.

Taylor who graduated from Goldey College in 1934 first took a job in the payroll department of Libby, McNeil, & Libby Co. in Houston. When the Company wanted to move him to their headquarters in Chicago, he decided to remain instead in Harrington.

In 1934 he and the Late Charles L. Peck, Sr. formed the Peck and Taylor Hardware in Harrington. A year later Taylor purchased Peck's interest and founded the Hardware that we know

Over the years Taylor and Taylor's Hardware have been monuments in this community of less than 2000. From his own love of baseball, he helped found and organize Little League Baseball in Kent and Sussex Counties. He and the Hardware have lent their support all through those years.

What to do if someone is choking

on food, you must be able to act quickly. The signs of choking will be obvious. The person will be reddish-blue in the face. They will try to dislodge the obstructing piece of food, often grasping their throat. They will be unable to cough, speak or breathe. Without help, they can become unconscious or suffer cardiopulmonary

Would you know what to do? A new brochure by the American Heart Association, "First Aid For Choking," illustrates the positions for back blows and chest or stomach thrusts to help dislodge particles stuck in the throat. It also describes what to do if an adult, child or infant becomes unconscious from the obstruction. Even if the particle is removed, the booklet recommends, the victim should be examined by a physician as soon as

The American Heart Association of Delaware recommends every family member and restaurant employee learn how to help a choking person, and even

If your dinner partner or child chokes better, how to prevent choking. Obstructions in the air passage occur every day and account for about 3,000 deaths each year in the United States. Not all obstructions are food. Sometimes children try to swallow small toys.

Prevention is the most effective safety precaution.

The Heart brochure offes these tips: Cut food into small pieces.

Chew food slowly and thoroughly. People wearing dentures should be especially thorough about chewing

Avoid laughing and talking when you are chewing and swallowing. Avoid excessive intake of alcohol before and during meals.

Keep marbles, beads, thumbtacks and other small objects out of reach of children and infants. Restrict them from walking, running or playing with food or toys in their mouths.

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

The Delaware State Housing Authority Home Mortgage Program

n order to promote home ownership in our state, the Delaware State Housing Authority is continuing its home mortgage program to assist low and moderate income individuals in the purchase of homes. The Authority has entered into agreements to purchase conventional, FHA, or VA mortgage loans from thirty-one mortgage lenders statewide. Borrowers who qualify will benefit from low interest rates and better terms than are common now. Funding for the loans will be provided by the Authority's sale of mortgage-backed revenue bonds.

Who is eligible?

Anyone who has not owned a home in the past three years, and who has a current family income of less than \$35,000 a year, and who meets the normal credit requirements of the lending institution. The firsttime buyer requirement does not apply to purchasers buying in the targeted area around Ellendale.

What kind of property qualifies?

The borrower must have a specific property in mind. It must be located in the State of Delaware, and be the borrower's primary residence. If located in Kent or Sussex Counties it must cost less than \$67,900 if it is an existing home, or \$81,300 if it is a new home. Higher prices are allowed in the targeted area, and for two to four unit properties. For details on the targeted area, contact any lender.

How do you apply for a loan?

The borrower should telephone any of the participating lenders listed below, starting Wednesday, January 2, 1985 at 9:00 AM. If the borrower is eligible, and meets the

lender's requirement, the loan will be made directly by the lending institution. Borrowers should not apply to the Delaware State Housing Authority.

What will the loan cost?

The interest rate on all mortgages granted will be 10.85% per year. There will also be an origination fee of 3% of the amount borrowed of which 34% will usually be paid by the borrowers and 21/4% paid by the seller. Other items, such as lender application and processing fees, closing and mortgage insurance costs, may be charged to the borrower.

What will the loan terms be?

All loans made under the program will be for a term of thirty years and carry a fixed interest rate.

How large a down payment is required?

Minimum down payments range from 0% to 5% of the purchase price depending on whether the loan is conventional, FHA, or VA.




