Brown moves downtown

HARRINGTON. Elwood Brown is a native of Harrington. Ten years ago he left a CPA firm in Dover and came back to Harrington. He set up shop...a Public Accounting office on U.S. 18 on the outskirts of Harrington.

Recently he moved to a new location in down-town Harrington. You might say he has come home.

Brown was one of nine children raised alone by their father Odoth Brown. It was one thing to be raised in a large family, but around Harrington...and on a farm...well things could be pretty tight.

They grew up playing baseball, which was a way to keep everyone busy. The early introduction to the game of baseball sticks with Brown today as he manages one of the Little League

teams.

He was drafted into the U.S. Army in November 1954 was sent to Ft. Gordon for signal training. Following his training he was shipped to Hawaii where he spent the remainder of his enlistment.

Following his tour of duty, he entered East Carolina College where he received a B.A. degree. He returned to Delaware and entered Goldy Beacon College in Wilmington and received an associates degree in business and accounting.

"From there I went to work for the government. I took a job in Washington, D.C. in the office of Inspector General (the audit arm of the Department of Agriculture)", he said. The training was to prove to be invaluable,

for it enabled him to develop a skill (auditing accounts) which was to become an important part of the accounting procedure here at home for many large businesses.

"I travelled a lot into Ohio, Pennsylvania, Kansas and the like...but the worst part was trying to convince myself that I wanted to live in the big city just for the money", he said.

"Finally one day I made up my mind that I could not go it any further. So...I resigned my very good job...and came to work for Bill Manter in Dover", he continued. It was there that Brown introduced to the Manter firm the dimension of offering a big service of auditing big accounts.

I worked there for 7 years...and I just decided that I wanted to be on my

own", he said. "I struck out for home...sold my house in Dover, and used the funds from that sale to purchase a home in Harrington...as well as live on the balance for a couple of years. It was tough...but we made ends meet", he concluded.

"I had no accounts to call on, but gradually the business grew", he said. This time of the year with taxes to be filed I put on three part-time employees to go along with one full time employee...and a part time employee the year around", he said.

Brown is an active member of Ashbury Methodist Church as well as other organizations in the community. He is married to the former Betty Skeria. They have two boys...Kyle (10) and Jason (5).

Short Takes on Area News

Returning what belongs to the taxpayer

An improving economy combined with strict fiscal discipline in the management of State finances have put Delaware in an enviable position again, says newly sworn in Governor Castle.

For the second year in a row, Delaware's revenues promise to exceed the State's spending needs. Experts say that our surplus will be \$44.5 million more than the budget requires, even after we have added money to the rainy day fund and provided the two percent cushion for emergencies that is required by law.

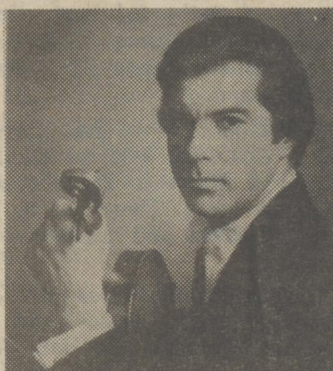
"I believe this money belongs to the taxpayers of this state," he said, who plan to use the budget surplus two ways: a personal income tax cut to take effect January 1, 1986, and the establishment of the Delaware Improvement Fund for capital improvements and projects to help prepare Delaware for the celebration of the U.S. Constitution's Bicentennial in 1987.

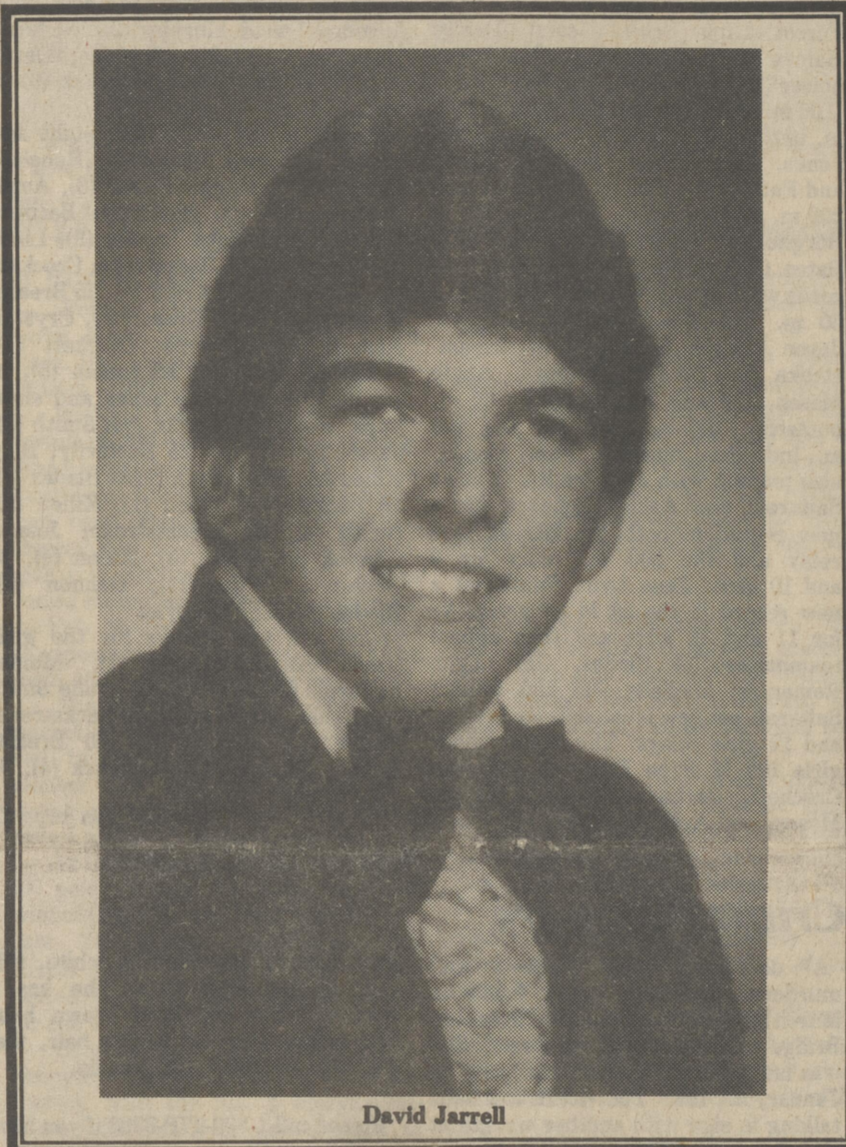
MMH Auxiliary Gift Shop adds to Hospital Building Fund and Campaign

Low-Income families not taking advantage of Fuel Assistance Program

"Low-income families are not taking full advantage of the Delaware Fuel Assistance Program to help them with their heating costs," said Cabinet Secretary Frances M. West of the Department of Community Affairs, this week. The Fuel Assistance Program is a component of the federally funded Delaware Energy Assistance Program (DEAP), administered by the Division of Community Services (DCS).

"Since the program officially began accepting applications on November 1, 1984, it has only served 8,099 households as of December 31, 1984," West continued, "just 57% of the minimum 14,200 households Delaware expects to assist with fuel bills under the FY '85 DEAP. If a family believes it may be eligible for fuel assistance, I urge the head of the household to call a County intake center for an appointment."

Eligibility for fuel assistance is based on the following income guidelines: Household Size: (HS) 1, Maximum Gross Income (MGI) \$6,225; HS 2, MGI \$8,400; HS 3 MGI \$10,575; HS 4 MGI \$12,750; HS 5 MGI \$14,925; HS 6 MGI \$17,100. *For families with more than six (6) members, add \$2,175 for each additional member.

Applicants should bring with them to their County intake office:

1. Proof of income (3-4 recent check stubs; W-2 form; written verification of monthly AFDC or Social Security payments, or any other documentation as proof of income).
2. Documentation of Social Security numbers of all household members over 18 years of age.
3. Proof of type of home heating fuel used (bill from vendor with applicant's name and address).
4. Proof of total number of household members (birth certificates, social security numbers, etc.).
5. A copy of the applicant's rental lease if heat is included in rent.

"Applicants should not wait until their household is out of fuel, but should call

for an appointment now, prior to falling into a crisis situation" West concluded.

Other components of DEAP include:
 1. *Weatherization* - providing such services as attic insulation, installation of storm windows, caulking, weatherstripping, replacing broken glass and installation of door sweeps. Mobile home residents are also eligible for weatherization services. Eligible households may receive up to \$900 in labor and materials.

2. *Oil Furnace Retrofits* - furnace tune-ups to eligible household for oil furnaces operating at less than 72% efficiency to bring operating efficiency to 80% or better.

3. *Minor Furnace Repair* - provides minor (\$100 or less) furnace repairs to inoperable heating units to ensure safety and operation.

4. *Emergency Housing* - provides short-term emergency housing to eligible households who are experiencing heat related emergencies.

5. *Consumer Energy Education* - provides energy education brochures, displays, films, and materials that demonstrate ideas and ways of conserving energy to reduce fuel costs and consumption.

The aforementioned programs operate a year round with the exception of the fuel assistance and emergency housing components which will end April 30, 1985. Households interested in any or all of these DEAP services may call the following County intake centers to schedule an appointment:

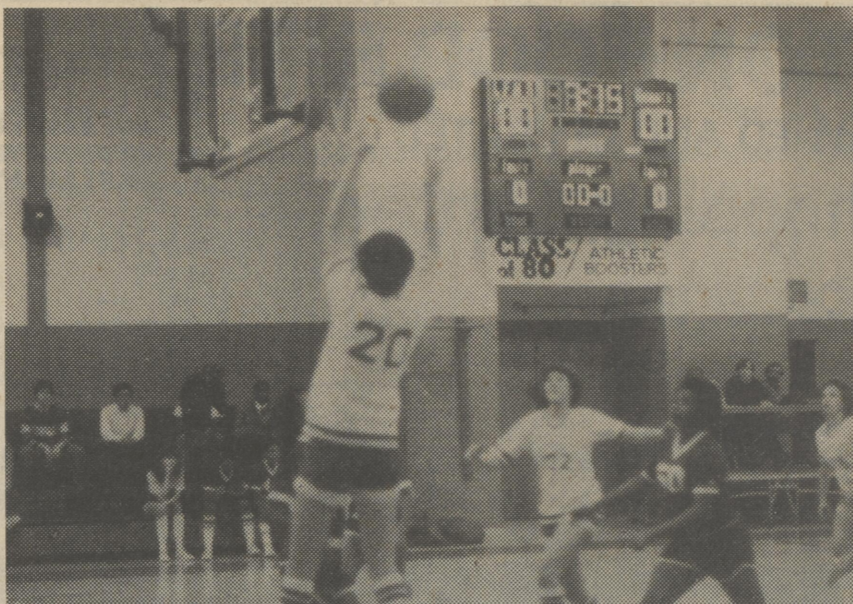

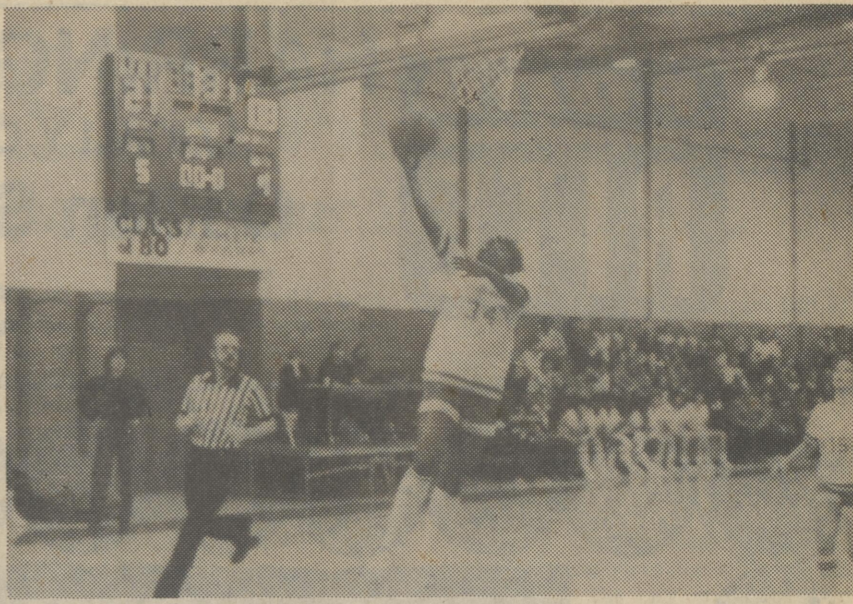

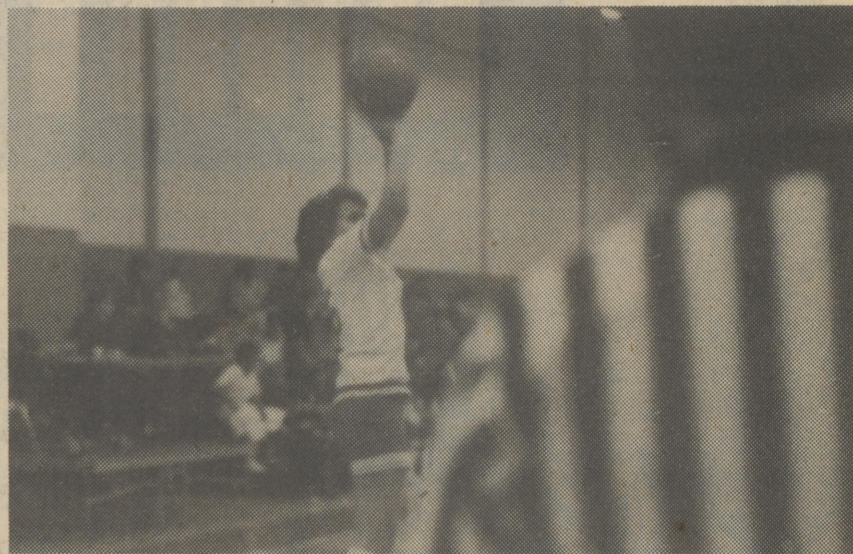
Teresa Taylor getting two of her 19 points against Woodbridge. Photo by HGF.

Pit Chatter

Former Grand National driver Larry Flynn still has racing in his blood. He's competing in the street stock division at Florida dirt tracks.

With all the excitement over the assault on 200 mph in Daytona testing, almost overlooked has been the strong showing of Busch Late Model Sportsman cars. Running with downsized engines due to a 1985 rules change, both L.D. Ottinger and Phil Parsons posted strong laps as they prepared for the Feb. 16 Goody's 300. Ottinger says he expects the pole winning speed to be about 184, not far from last year's 187.

The 7-Eleven chain plans a big marketing campaign leading up to the Feb. 14 Twin Qualifiers, which it will sponsor this year. In addition to a strong media advertising push, they'll have a giveaway at the track that day.

An early favorite to win the ARCA 200 pole position would be Bill Venurini of Chicago, who bought one of the Cale Yarborough Chevrolets. The ARCA purse of over \$73,000 is expected to attract more than 50 entries for the 36-car field.

Country and western singer T.G. Sheppard signed on as an associate sponsor with the No. 4 Morgan-McClure team this year and decided to visit Daytona to see how his investment might do. On the first lap Sheppard witnessed, driver Joe Ruttman tested at over 200 mph. "I think I came to the right place with the right people," said Sheppard. "This is going to be a fun experience this year."

Folger's Coffee is the team's primary sponsor, and they'll run 16-20 races this year.

It looks like old times are definitely back in the Ford vs. Chevrolet battle. When Chevrolet driver Geoff Bodine

was asked how to make the Fords more competitive, he answered, "Slow them down", and Hello Bill Towers, Sr.

The wall-testing which Benny Parsons did prior to the Talladega 500 hasn't effected his driving, but soreness in his shoulder has kept him off the golf course. "I've only played twice since then because it hurts when I make my downswing," he says. "But I shot 75 on one of those rounds, my best ever."

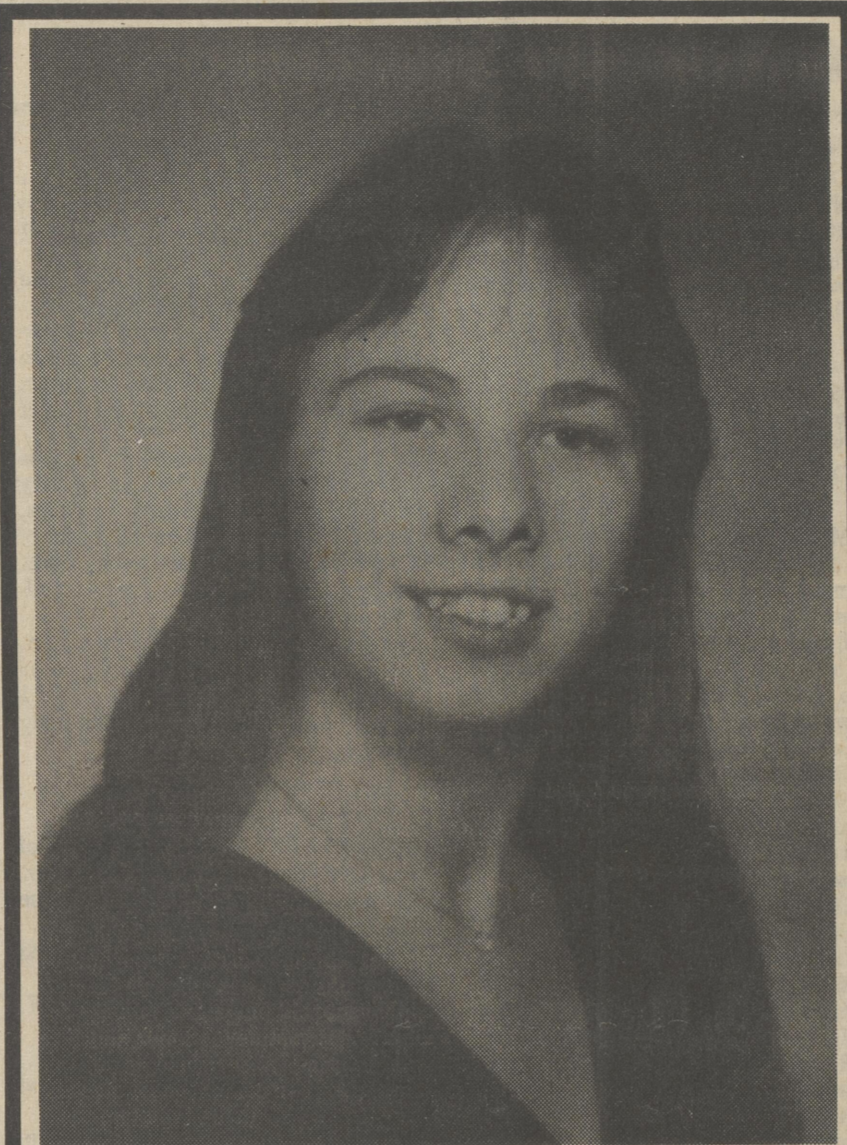
wave!

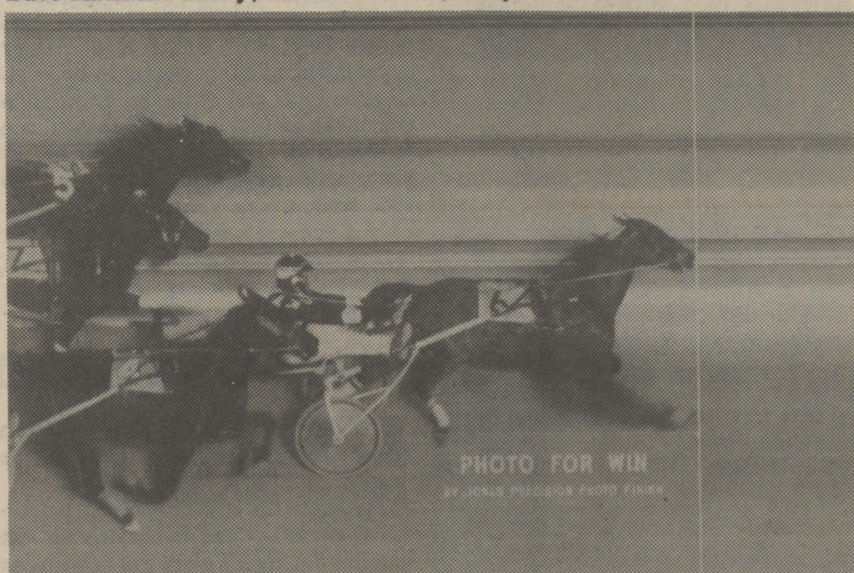
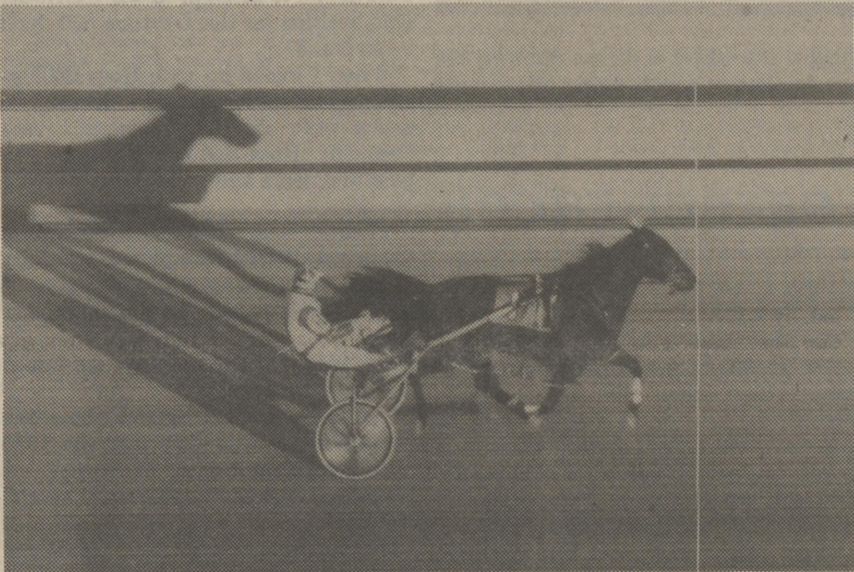
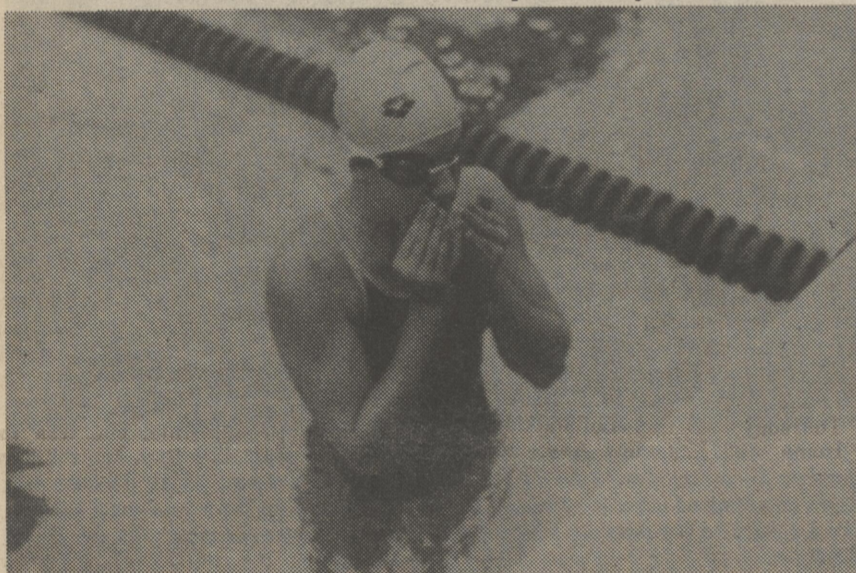

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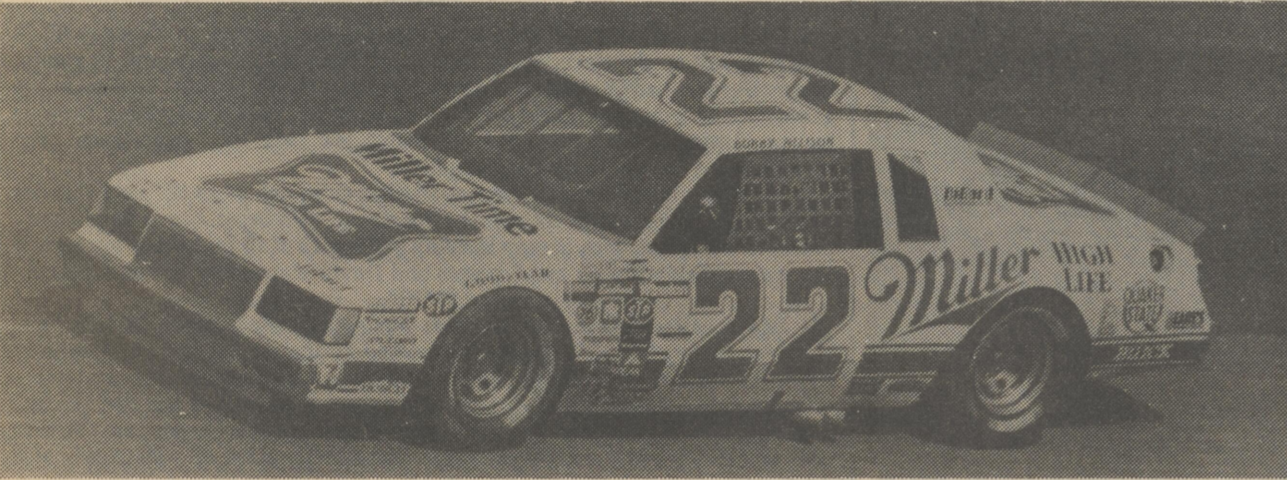

Bobby Allison's illustrious career races into third decade

[This is the first of three installments on the career of legendary racer Bobby Allison, driver of the Miller High Life/DiGard Buick. The Feb. 17 Daytona 500 marks Allison's 30th year behind the wheel of a race car.]

MILWAUKEE -- It was a Saturday night in February 1955. Eisenhower was president, Milton Berle was entertaining America on a new device called a television and Paul Brown had just led the Cleveland Browns to the NFL title with a 56-10 romp over the Detroit Lions.

A lanky 17-year old named Bob Sunderman climbed behind the wheel of a race car and competed in his first race ever at a small race track in Hialeah, Fla.

The Cleveland Browns and Milton Berle are no longer as prominent. Six more presidents have resided in the White House. But Bob Sunderman is going strong and is perhaps the biggest name on the American Motorsports scene.

The name of Bob Sunderman was an alias. Today, Bobby Allison isn't trying to hide his racing career from his parents. And in February 1985, Allison

is again climbing behind the wheel of a race car in Florida. Only this time, the track is a bit larger and the race is a bit more prestigious -- the Daytona 500.

"I never really thought about this being my 30th anniversary," said Allison, driver of the Miller High Life/DiGard Buick. "My career has come a long way, but then again, 30 years is a long time."

Allison ran several races at Hialeah in 1955, but raced under the alias to keep his parents from knowing of his hobby. Soon, though, his parents became aware of his racing escapades.

"My folks found out I was racing and they didn't take too kindly to the idea that their kid was messing around with race cars," said Allison. "They persuaded me to stop awhile, but it was too late. Racing was in my blood and I went back to Hialeah to race."

"Dad always wanted me to work in the family business and it wasn't an overnight thing to get the folks to accept my racing," he said. "After they did, I couldn't have asked for any more moral support than what they gave me."

The racing days at the Hialeah

Speedway built a foundation for Allison's professional and personal life. It was there that he met Judith Bjorkman, now his wife of 25 years.

Hialeah was a good place to start, but there was not enough additional racing action in south Florida. To sustain his appetite for the sport and to make a living, Allison moved to the Birmingham, Ala. area in 1961 because there were several tracks within reasonable driving distance.

"When I was 23, I loaded up Judy and our baby son Davey, and we moved to a little house in the country just outside of Bessemer, Ala. We eventually moved to Hueytown and it has been our home ever since."

The period of Allison's relocation was also a time when racing was undergoing significant growth and expansion throughout the Southeast. Allison spent the next few years successfully adapting to the changes and making a name for himself as a winner.

(The next installment in this three-part series deals with Allison's step into the big time -- NASCAR Grand National competition. The road was a rough one.)

MILWAUKEE (Jan. 21, 1985) -- Bobby Allison's racing team recently conducted three full days of testing at Daytona.

"We were extremely pleased with what we found in our sessions," said Nelson. "Benny Parsons' team really had their car performing well in tests a few days back. We were able to expand on some of their advances and came up with a few innovations of our own."

"Parson's team was able to get additional power by adjusting the air flow to the carburetor," said Nelson. "We decided to look at the complete tuning aspect and ran through a whole realm of possibilities."

"We were able to reach an optimum setting that will create additional horsepower with even greater fuel efficiency," he said.

"The DiGard crew will probably perform one more wind tunnel test before Daytona," Smith said. "Their organizational effort seems to be at an all-time high and with the knowledge they have gained in the off-season, the Miller High Life Buick will be as prepared as anyone for the start of the 1985 season."

NASCAR driver and former Winston Cup Champion Bobby Allison must have found driving a dirt modified car

in upstate New York to his like last year.

The popular driver has announced that he'll return to the land of DIRT racing in 1985 for three shows, including his first crack at landing a starting berth in the prestigious and rich Schaefer 200 during Super DIRT Week '85. The 14th renewal of the world's largest and richest dirt racing event will take place October 9th to 13th, at the New York State Fairgrounds in Syracuse.

Allison will drive a Troyer Experimental Mud Buss in 1985, steering the same Troyer car with a Ron Hutter power plant that carried veteran Jack Johnson to the Schaefer 200 title last October. Allison's Miller Beer modified will again come out of the Jumpin Jack's Pro Speed Shop of Jim Bechy and Jack Johnson for all three shows.

Allison will make his initial visits on dirt this coming summer at New Venture Speedway in Vernon, New York, on Tuesday night, June 25th; and for this year's CRC Chemicals Super DIRT Qualifying Series '85 test at Rolling Wheels Raceway in Elbridge on Tuesday night, Aug. 13th.

DIRT President and Super DIRT Week promoter Glen Donnelly has announced that nearly half of the tickets for the grandstand area for this

year's Schaefer 200 have already been sold.

David Pearson is 21 again. When he wheels out his Chevrolet on February 9 to attempt to win the Busch pole position for the Daytona 500, he'll be in No. 21.

"When I joined up with Hoss (Ellington) to run 1985, we had a decision to make with the car number," said Pearson. "Hoss had run No. 1 for the past few years and I had been running No. 16."

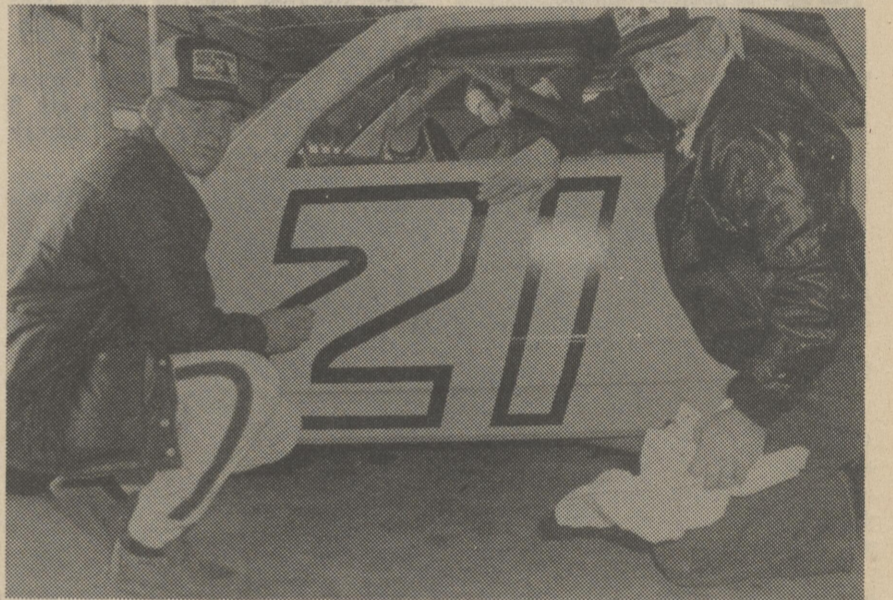
"Then it was announced that Kyle Petty's deal with the Wood Brothers called for them to run No. 7 because of the 7-Eleven sponsorship. That left 21 open."

The Wood Brothers were contacted and gave permission.

And Pearson is 21 again, riding the same number that won him the 1976 Daytona 500 and 43 of his career 105 NASCAR Winston Cup Grand National victories.

The car won't look like the Wood Brothers' cherry red and white machine except for the number, as sponsor Chattanooga Chew's colors are white, yellow and black. But it will be No. 21.

Glen Wood remembers the days fondly. "We ran together a lot of times, we had a lot of fun and we won a lot of races," he says. "If we don't have No. 21, then we wouldn't want anyone but

David to have it."

Pearson is realistic: "Everybody knows that numbers don't win races, but it means something to the fans and to me personally."

"I've been fortunate to have won under several different numbers, and what that means is that I've had good car owners and car builders."

"Most people remember No. 21 and the Woods. But my first wins were in No. 3 for Ray Fox, and then later in

No. 6 for Cotton Owens. One year, when Dale Earnhardt was hurt, I filled in for him and won at Darlington (the 1979 Southern 500) in No. 2.

"And remember this: the last time I won a Grand National race was in No. 1...for Hoss Ellington. That was in the 1980 TransSouth 500.

"That was the last time Hoss had a winner, too. Now we're back together. Maybe we can make up for lost time." In No. 21. As in "21 Forever."
