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## Short Takes on Area News

### PSC approves \$13M proposal in Diamond State Rate Case

The Public Service Commission has approved a proposed \$13 million settlement agreement offered by the Diamond State Telephone Company dating back to June 1983.

Diamond State sought \$25.9 million in additional intrastate operating revenues based on wholly projected, 1984 revenue requirements. As the case proceeded this amount was reduced to \$16.9 million.

The reasons cited for the additional revenues were lost revenues from the historic AT&T divestiture; increased operating expenses; and the need to recover business costs which were disallowed in a 1982 rate case.

Diamond State, which has temporary rates in effect under bond to generate \$14.6 million on an annualized basis, will be refunding in excess of \$1 million with interest to its customers. The details of this refund will be announced in the near future.

Final action in this case, specifying the new rates and the date of their implementation, is expected this month.

### Chicken Festival set for June

Robbin Gray of Salisbury, Maryland has been named chairman of the 1985 Delmarva Chicken Festival, the annual salute to the peninsula's multi-million dollar broiler industry.

Gray, president of Gray Insurance Agency in Salisbury and Millsboro and a longtime member of Delmarva Poultry Industry, Inc. (DPI), is heading the committee currently planning for the June 7, 8 and 9 festival at the Wicomico Youth and Civic Center in Salisbury. He was appointed chairman of the festival scheduled for 1984, but the event was cancelled due to the threat of avian influenza invading poultry flocks on Delmarva. With the influenza problem under control, the festival has been rescheduled and Gray has again agreed to chair the committee.

In addition to his association with DPI, the trade association representing Delmarva's poultry industry, Gray is an active member of the Salisbury Area Chamber of Commerce, host organization for the 1985 festival. He serves on the Chamber's board of directors and their education and agri-business committees.

As highlights of the three-day event, Gray pointed to the Chicken Festival Parade; appearances by Maryland National Guard parachute and Cobra teams; "Chicken Capers," a series of humorous events billed as the olympics of the chicken world; carnival rides and games; plenty of chicken, both barbecued and fried; Delmarva's giant fry pan; a poultry industry exhibit; and a program of interest to consumers, featuring a series of demonstrations on the use and preparation of chicken.

### Woo to get award

Lt. Governor S.B. Woo was in Silicon Valley, California March 8th and 9th to receive the "Best Achievement Award" at the Asian American High Tech Convention. While at the convention, Woo made a presentation about the unique features of Delaware which could be very attractive to high tech industries.

One of the co-sponsors of the convention is the Asian American Manufacturers Association. The association represents a large number of business people in Silicon Valley as approximately one third of the companies in Silicon Valley were started by Asian Americans. There were 120 companies and 85 exhibitors featured at the second annual convention. Approximately 8,000 people are expected to attend.

Woo's presentation pointed out that Delaware has the highest percentage in the nation of employees in the high tech fields with 14.8 percent. He also pointed out that more than half of the Fortune 500 companies are incorporated in Delaware and that four out of five of the largest U.S. banks each has an operating center in Delaware.

At a banquet Saturday night, the "Best Achievement Award" was presented to Woo by the Asian American High Tech Convention in recognition of his election as Lt. Governor. Woo is now the highest elected Chinese-American.

### Taylor joins U of D as Extension Agronomist

Dr. Richard W. Taylor has joined the staff of the University of Delaware Cooperative Extension Service as a specialist in soil fertility and crop management, effective March 1.

A native of Eastern Shore Virginia, Taylor holds a doctorate in plant science/agronomy from the University of Connecticut, with emphasis on minimum tillage forage establishment. He earned his master's degree in forage management and quality at Connecticut and has a bachelor's degree in agronomy from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University.

Taylor comes to Delaware from the Louisiana State University Rice Research Station in Crowley, La., where he conducted research on forage management and on wheat, grain sorghum, soybeans and corn as alternative crops to rice. This work focused on crop establishment practices (primarily no-till), flood irrigation, and weed control. His work included studies on no-till seeding of corn and grain sorghum into cover crops.

## Harrington Council gets Budget Proposal

HARRINGTON. City Manager George Volenik presented the Council with the new budget on Monday night at the regular monthly meeting of the Harrington City Council. No figures were issued from the report. The Council members will study the proposal, accept it, or make changes to the plan. The figures will be issued at a later date when the Council has had an opportunity to render a decision on the proposal.

In other matters, Councilman Ray Gagne requested a workshop meeting on the proposed traffic survey. Streets of Mechanic, Wolcott, and Grant had been under study regarding "No parking...to parking only on one side...to painting of curbs back from the intersections."

"I think what is in the mill is a re-codification of the ordinances so that we can come up with a standard zone for no parking areas," said City Manager George Volenik. In some areas of the code for Harrington the no parking zones are set out as being so many feet from the intersections while in other areas it sets out no parking

within so many feet of the fire hydrants. "What we need is a standard to go by something like so many feet back from the intersections...but where that falls on or within the placement of a fire hydrant then so many feet over all," added Volenik.

It was reported at Monday's meeting that the papers for the UDAG grant on the new shopping center to be constructed between the north and south bound lanes of US 13 have been filed in

Washington within the dead-line. The review of the application will be Thursday in Washington at the Office of Housing and Urban Affairs (HUD). It is expected to be approved. "We have a commitment from Marstellers Market as a tenant, and two other tenants have committed...but I am not at liberty to disclose their names," said James D. McGinnis, President of Alpha Real Estate Co. agent and owner developer of the proposed shopping center. Most of the work on the development of the shopping center is being done by Phillip McGinnis, son of James McGinnis.


## Area Catholics new Bishop to be installed

Installation ceremonies for the new Bishop of Wilmington, the Most Rev. Robert E. Mulvee will be held on April 11, at St. Elizabeth's Church, in the City of Wilmington. The new spiritual leader for Catholics in Delaware and the Eastern Shore of Maryland was appointed by Pope John Paul II on February 19.

Bishop Mulvee, 55, has been auxiliary bishop of the Diocese of Manchester, New Hampshire, since February 1977. He will serve as the seventh bishop of Wilmington, succeeding Bishop Thomas J. Mardaga who died May 28, 1984.

His new responsibilities include the 56 parishes of the local diocese. The diocese also has three counties in Delaware, and nine counties in Maryland.

## Free fingerprinting of children held at Moose

HARRINGTON MOOSE HOME. All students of the Lake Forest School District were offered free fingerprinting at the Harrington Moose Home last Thursday night. There were about 150 children with their parents in attendance.

"No one wanted to sponsor it this year...so we thought it would be a good idea to continue what had begun last year by the State Police," said Paul Yannucci a member of the Harrington Moose.

According to Yannucci there are 2 million kids a year who show up missing. "They say one out of every six kids in this country show up missing each day," said Yannucci.

The children are fingerprinted and the card which they are fingerprinted on is given to the parents. "When a child shows up missing...all the parent has to do is give this to the investigating officer, who in turn puts it into the national computer. It then goes all over the United States," he said. "When a kid is picked up all they have

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## City establishes policy to improve cash flow

The City of Harrington is seeking to improve its cash flow in order to improve its cost effectiveness in providing services to its citizens.

This requires that monies owed the City be received on a current basis. Harrington has a high rate of payment of taxes, water and sewer charges, and trash fees by its citizens. There is however a very small percentage of the people who are behind in the payment

of these charges.

Therefore to reduce its outstanding accounts the city has initiated a policy that collection efforts will be increased. Under this policy individuals who have delinquent accounts will be given a notice of letter from the city reminding them of the specific amounts due. Included in this notice people will be given a reasonable time to clean up their accounts. It is anticipated that the majority of delinquencies will be paid up by the date specified in the

notice. Citizens are encouraged to contact the City Office if they cannot meet the date set forth in that notice in order. This is extremely important because under the plan accounts that have not been paid will be turned over to the City Attorney for collection.

This policy will benefit the financial operation of the City especially in view of the current threat of termination of Revenue Sharing to municipalities.

So she would stir up some meal, salt and I do not know what else, and drop them from a spoon onto the hot broth. They were soggy and heavy and my husband did not like them. Since I did not like either, I never bothered to ask for the "recipe."

I do think that they deserve a space in Elizabeth's cookbook because they were enjoyed by my husband's people and others. Does anyone know about these and if so, would you get in touch with us.  
Speaking of books, I have finally agreed, after many requests and telephone conversations to make up a book of my thirty some years of Gab Fests columns. This is a monumental task, but I am plowing along. It will take some time to read, sort, and coordinate them before I can start typing. Now, this astonishes me. As I read, I find I am enjoying them as though I were reading a new book by someone I used

## From the Pastor's Pen

We are now approaching the Easter season. Easter is the time when we commemorate the crucifixion, burial and resurrection of Jesus Christ. It is significant that at the beginning of Jesus' earthly ministry it is said, "Jesus began to preach, and say, Repent; for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matt. 4:17). Jesus, the Son of God, offered God's kingdom to the people at that time, indicated by the words, "is at hand". Throughout His ministry of great teachings and authenticating miracles the people, however, gradually rejected the kingdom of heaven for this earth, undoubtedly because its establishment required repentance from sin. We note then that toward the end of Jesus' ministry He changed His message. "From that time

forth began Jesus to show His disciples, how He must go into Jerusalem, and suffer many things from the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and be raised again on the third day" (Matt. 16:21). It is clear that Jesus was crucified because people rejected God's rule over them. People in their rebellion to God's Son and their desire to live their own life of sin without repentance, crucify God's Son. Thus we understand why the Scriptures say, "Christ died for our sins" (1 Cor. 15:3). People are no different today from Jesus' day. Either people reject Jesus Christ or they believe in Him. They who reject Him become guilty of crucifying God's Son and those who believe in Him become saved from their sins and will be recipients of God's coming kingdom. Where do you stand at this Easter time?

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

Pulde has reached the final round in the last two odd years — 1983 and 1981 — finishing second each time.

The Granada Hills, Calif., driver is in second place in the Winston World Championship Series standings after his runner-up finish at the season-opening Winternationals in Pomona, Calif. (Al Segrini leads with 1,114 points.) Pulde has 920, followed by Rick Johnson with 818, John Lombardo with 732 and Ed McCulloch, who drives the Miller American Racing Oldsmobile, with 724 points.

Pulde, partner Mike Hamby and crew chief Bill Schultz spent the last month attempting to find a solution to engine problems that plagued them at the Winternationals. The engine broke twice, pushing the rods through the side of the block each time.

Pulde's Pontiac recorded times of 5.71 and 5.77 seconds while winning the match race.

If Pulde is able to maintain his performance level, he could break the Gainesville Raceway elapsed time record, set last year by Tim Grose at 5.78 seconds.

The 1984 Miller Time race was scheduled to be the final one for McLaughlin and car owner Norm Foster. He figured to have a hard time coming up with a new ride in the middle of the season but his surprising win over a very strong field at Martinsville changed all that.

Earles added that an additional \$5,000 in point fund money would be up for grabs at the end of the season for the top five finishers at the area tracks if they enter and compete in the Cardinal 500 event.

Heading the list of improvements are 8,000 new seats that have been converted from bleacher seats to more comfortable chair-backs, and a new Permatex/IROC garage which will house 24 cars in 7,500 square feet of floor space.

Other improvements include doubling the size of one of the roof-mounted photo stands, adding an executive suite (for a total of 11), remodeling the Motor Racing Network radio booth, the addition of a large concession stand, increasing the electrical capacity of the entire operation, and parking, gate and grandstand signage to help fans find their seats more quickly.

HAMPTON, Ga. — Neil Bonnett and Junior Johnson are determined to prove the "experts" wrong in 1985.

"The true colors of that team will come out this year," says Johnson.

Johnson said, "I said Neil's team would be in a whole lot better shape this year, and we were going to come out strong and run like we did several years ago."

In 1984, Johnson signed a lucrative three-year contract with Budweiser and Kentucky Fried Chicken to field a two-car team with two-time Winston Cup champion Darrell Waltrip and Bonnett as the drivers.

"But Junior said to forget that idea. He said, 'we've still got two years left on the contract (with Budweiser) and we were going to win races.' He was very understanding."


"After the second race at Bristol last year, we had problems that we shouldn't have had," said Johnson.

In the Busch 500 at Bristol, Tenn., last August, Bonnett was battling Terry Labonte for the lead when Bonnett wrecked with 132 laps to go in the Winston Cup race.

"I had to restructure things after what happened," says Johnson. First, he hired Tim Brewer to be team manager for the Bonnett organization. "This allowed Doug (Richert) to concentrate all of his efforts on being crew chief," added Johnson.

"You have to keep adapting, keep getting better as the year goes along if you want to remain competitive from the first race on. And that's exactly what we are going to do in 1985."
