#### Short Takes on Area News PSC approves \$13M proposal in Diamond State Rate Case

The Public Service Commission has approved a proposed \$13 million settlement agreement offered by the Diamond State Telephone Company dating back to June 1983.

Diamond State sought \$25.9 million in additional intrastate operating revenues based on wholly projected, 1984 revenue requirements. As the case proceeded this amount was reduced to \$16.9 million. The reasons cited for the additional revenues were lost revenues from the

historic AT&T divestiture; increased operating expenses; and the need to recover business costs which were disallowed in a 1982 rate case. Diamond State, which has temporary rates in effect under bond to generate

\$14.6 million on an annualized basis, will be refunding in excess of \$1 million with interest to its customers. The details of this refund will be announced in

Final action in this case, specifying the new rates and the date of their implementation, is expected this month.

He was appointed chairman of the festival scheduled for 1984, but the event was cancelled due to the threat of avian influenza invading poultry flocks on Delmarva. With the influenza problem Robbin Gray under control, the festival has been rescheduled and Gray



has again agreed to chair the committee. In addition to his association with DPI, the trade association representing Delmarva's poultry industry, Gray is an active member of the Salisbury Area Chamber of Commerce, host organization for the 1985 festival. As highlights of the three-day event, Gray pointed to the Chicken Festival Parade; appearances by Maryland National Guard parachute and Cobra teams; "Chicken Capers," a series of humorous events billed as the olympics of the chicken world; carnival rides and games; plenty of chicken, both barbecued and fried; Delmarva's giant fry pan; a poultry industry exhibit; and a program of interest to consumers, featuring a series of demonstrations on the use and

#### Woo to get award

Lt. Governor S.B. Woo was in Silicon Valley, California March 8th and 9th to receive the "Best Achievement Award" at the Asian American High Tech Convention. While at the convention, Woo made a presentation about the unique features of Delaware which could be very attractive to high tech

One of the co-sponsors of the convention is the Asian American Manufacturers Association. The association represents a large number of business people in Silicon Valley as approximately one third of the companies in Silicon Valley were started by Asian Americans. There were 120 companies and 65 exhibitors featured at the second annual convention. Approximately 8,000 people are expected to attend.

Woo's presentation pointed out that Delaware has the highest percentage in the nation of employees in the high tech fields with 14.8 percent. 
#### Area Catholics new Bishop to be installed

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

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
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#### City establishes policy to improve cash flow

The City of Harrington is seeking to improve its cash flow in order to improve its cost effectiveness in providing services to its citizens.

This requires that monies owed the City be received on a current basis. Harrington has a high rate of payment of taxes, water and sewer charges, and trash fees by its citizens. There is however a very small percentage of the people who are behind in the payment

of these charges.

Therefore to reduce its outstanding accounts the city has initiated a policy that collection efforts will be increased. Under this policy individuals who have delinquent accounts will be given a notice of letter from the city reminding them of the specific amounts due. Included in this notice people will be given a reasonable time to clean up their accounts. It is anticipated that

notice. Citizens are encouraged to contact the City Office if they cannot meet the date set forth in that notice in order. This is extremely important because under the plan accounts that have not been paid will be turned over to the City Attorney for collection. This policy will benefit the financial

#### The Episcopal Church Diocese of Delaware

Episcopalians throughout Delaware are celebrating 1985 as the 200th anniversary of the founding of the Diocese of Delaware.

Highlights of this celebration include a six-week historical exhibit of art work, communion vessels, manuscripts, letters and portraits, and a diocesan-wide festival celebrating the Diocesan Bicentennial and the 10th anniversary of the episcopate of retiring Bishop William H. Clark.

The year also marks the 100th anniversary of the Episcopal Church Women, the 50th year since the designation of St. John's Church as a cathedral, and the 40th anniversary of Bishop Clark's ordination to the dia-

The major event will be the Bicentennial Celebration on Sunday, May 5, at St. Andrew's School near Middletown. The program will begin at 4:00 p.m. with Evensong, starting with a procession of active and retired bishops, clergy, lay readers, acolytes, choirs and representatives from other denominations.

The service will be held under a large tent, capable of accommodating up to 1,400 people. All 40 congregations in the diocese will be represented. Following the service, a reception for Bishop Clark and Rosemary, his wife, will be held in the school's adjacent

gymnasium. The historical exhibit will be held April 14 through May 27 at the Brick Hotel in Odessa. Every church and mission in the diocese has been asked to lend items of historic interest to this exhibit, which is expected to draw a large attendance.

The Rev. Dr. John Guest of Sewick-

ley, Pa. will conduct a preaching/ teaching mission in New Castle County March 13-17, sponsored by the Episcopal Churches in the Brandywine Convocation.

The diocesan celebration actually began in January when the Rt. Rev. John M. Allin, presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church, addressed the annual diocesan convention.

When the united colonies severed their political ties with England in the American Revolution, it became necessary for the Anglican Church in this country to become free of English control as well.

Delaware Episcopalians met in 1785 and elected delegates to a convention in Philadelphia. It marked the first gathering of the church in Delaware and it is this date that the Diocese uses as its official beginning.

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

#### Gab Fest by Pat Hatfield

Leader, Elizabeth Russ, tells me she is getting material together to write a cookbook of old-time recipes from Delaware and the Eastern Shore. Isn't that exciting? And what a treasure it will be for all of us who collect cookbooks.

When we talked on the phone yesterday she asked me if I had ever heard of Cornmeal Dumplings. I know about them but have no recipe. In fact I expect it is like the slippery dumplings ...everyone just stirred them up, by guess and by golly!

I grew up in Kent County and they were not known in my family. But when I came into Sussex County Hatfields, my mother-in-law, "Miss Anne" was very fond of them. They were always served with a pot of greens, kale, turnip greens, seven-top, mustard or winter cress. When the greens were almost done in the old iron pot, Miss Anne would say, half apologetically, "Now I think we must have a corn dumpling." She meant cornmeal. So she would stir up some meal, salt and I do not know what else, and drop them from a spoon onto the hot broth. They were soggy and heavy and my husband did not like them. Since I did not like either, I never bothered to ask for the "recipe."

I do think that they deserve a space in Elizabeth's cookbook because they were enjoyed by my husband's people and others. Does anyone know about these and if so, would you get in touch

Speaking of books, I have finally agreed, after many requests and telephone conversations to make up a book of my thirty some years of Gab Fests columns. This is a monumental task, but I am plowing along. It will take some time to read, sort, and coordinate them before I can start typing. Now, this astonishes me. As I read, I find I am enjoying them as though I were reading a new book by someone I used

#### From the Pastor's Pen



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

When Bonnett did not win a Winston Cup race or a pole position in 1984, while Waltrip was the top race winner with seven triumphs, these same people were quick to state, "I told you

"I offered to quit (during the late stages of last season)," says Bonnett. "I told Junior that if I was hurting the team, I would quit and go elsewhere. I began to question myself since I wasn't winning like I should have.

Qualifying heats were won by Davis "But Junior said to forget that idea. He said, 'we've still got two years left Doug Mason edged Marvin Winters to on the contract (with Budweiser) and we were going to win races.' He was very understanding."

"After the second race at Bristol last year, we had problems that we shouldn't have had," said Johnson. In the Busch 500 at Bristol, Tenn., last August, Bonnett was battling Terry Labonte for the lead when

the Winston Cup race. This was the last time in '84 that Bonnett came close to a victory.

Bonnett wrecked with 132 laps to go in

"I had to restructure things after what happened," says Johnson. First, he hired Tim Brewer to be team manager for the Bonnett organization. "This allowed Doug (Richert) to concentrate all of his efforts on being crew chief," added Johnson.


"You have to keep adapting, keep getting better as the year goes along if you want to remain competitive from the first race on. And that's exactly what we are going to do in 1985."




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
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ROCKINGHAM, N.C.-March 3-ON THE MOVE-Terry LaBonte [44] chases
