

W.T. Chipman continues in the "Stock Market" game

The kids in elementary through high school grades buy and sell common stocks available on the American and New York Stock Exchanges using a "pretend" \$100,000 and the computers at Widener University in Chester. A computer printout of their stock portfolio is mailed out weekly. The student teams of 3 or 4 students can mail transaction sheets to the computer center as often as they want. The students use "grown up" strategies of selling short and buying on margin. The kids learn that buying on margin is like buying on credit in real life. Selling short works effectively when the price of a certain stock goes down. The student team portfolios are charged interest for the credit extended to them in their margin accounts and reflect broker's commissions for every transaction.

A by-product to this hands-on economic education is teamwork skills. While the profits earned are only on paper, the students are learning just how the capital market works—because they are involved. They learn to evaluate available research data, financial statements, reports and various market indicators, and in general, to utilize the same techniques employed by "real" market specialists.

The Stock Market Game is funded by Butcher & Singer, Inc. and Sun Co.; it is sponsored by the ACEE, Widener University, and the Philadelphia Inquirer. Fern Berger, assistant vice president and registered investment broker with Butcher & Singer, and Brad Sieglerman, graduate assistant at Widener University, serve as coordinators for the game.

To monitor economic and political events that impact stock prices the students also develop the habit of reading the daily newspaper.

The team making the most money from each school will attend an awards dinner to be held at Widener University in May. Also, the top

Rzewnicki nominated to Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board

State Treasurer, Janet Rzewnicki, has been nominated for appointment to the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board (MSRB). The MSRB was established in 1975 by Congress to develop rules governing securities firms and banks involved in underwriting, trading and selling municipal securities—tax exempt bonds and notes. The Board, which is composed of members of the municipal securities industry and the public, is a self-regulatory body which sets standards for the industry—rules based on the expertise of the industry members.

I feel very honored to be nominated for this prestigious position. The MSRB sets all rules for the municipal securities industry. It is nice to be recognized for my financial background, as well as what I've been able to accomplish in office to date," said Rzewnicki.

The State of Tennessee announced Thursday the successful sale of \$58 million in paperless bonds. The Treasurer of Tennessee called Janet Rzewnicki to report that Tennessee was following Delaware's lead in adopting book-entry bonds. This is the fourth state to adopt the paperless method (Delaware, Utah, Massachusetts and Tennessee).

Mrs. Rzewnicki, recently spoke at a workshop sponsored by the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) on book-entry bonds. The workshop was 2 1/2 days in Washington, D.C.

Methodist Clergy and lay people protest at Embassy

Clergy and lay persons representing the 504 churches of the Peninsula United Methodist Conference joined those protesting apartheid in front of the South African Embassy in Washington Friday (March 22).

Led by the Rev. Dr. David Weber, Executive Director of the Methodist Action Program in Wilmington, Del., the group consisted of District Superintendents the Rev. Dr. C. Edwin Lasbury (wilmington), Rev. Ewart C. Hackshaw (Salisbury) and Rev. Howell O. Wilkins (Easton), the Rev. Clifford Armour, the Rev. Dr. Robert Price, the Rev. Dr. Vernon L. Schmid, The Rev. Dr. Gordon Stapleton, the Rev. Harvey Manchester, Jr., the Rev. Louis Timmons, the Rev. Victoria Martinez and Cindy Quillen, a lay person. Most of the group were arrested.

United Methodists have been protesting apartheid in South Africa by actively picketing the embassy alongside members of other denominations and well-known persons from the entertainment world.

Delaware State Police Trooper/MEDIC Program

Use of helicopters by the Delaware State Police for emergency medical functions has been a growing project since 1971. The growth has seen our Aviation Unit progress from a single helicopter with limited medical equipment and minimal training to two larger aircraft.

The four latest additions to the Aviation Unit, our trooper/medics, are intended to add significant capability to life saving efforts in Sussex and Kent Counties. Two hundred and four medical missions were performed in Sussex County alone in 1984. Only four of these were responses to on-scene emergencies, including highway and rural motor vehicle accidents.

Broad support has been received from all the hospitals. The trooper/medics will perform this medical service under the "standing orders" and direct supervision of emergency room physicians in each of the hospitals involved. Beebe Hospital will provide medical control in Sussex County and Kent General Hospital in Kent County. The medical and fire/ambulance community understands that we seek only to supplement an already well developed, equipped and trained emergency response system. Our limited resources cannot meet the total demand, but careful use of time and resources will allow the Delaware State Police to have aircraft in Sussex County and lower Kent County more often. The more time spent there, the more available it becomes in unpredictable times of need.

LF grad Bobby Jacobs to hold soccer camp

Bobby Jacobs, a graduate of Lake Forest High School and son of former major league baseball infielder, Forrest "Spook" Jacobs, will conduct a soccer camp beginning in mid-June and running to the end of that month.

Jacobs' father, Forrest "Spook" Jacobs broke into organized baseball in 1954 with the Philadelphia Athletics under Connie Mack. When the team moved to Kansas City he stayed with the team through 1957. He was traded to Pittsburgh at the end of the 1957 season and played with the Pirates during the 1957 campaign. He was sent to Columbus, Ohio in the AAA League there, and managed for awhile in Tennessee.

The younger Jacobs, Bobby is a graduate of Lake Forest High School and Virginia Wesleyan (Norfolk). He was an all-stater in soccer and an All-American for 3 years in college. He also pursued a baseball umpiring career for a short time in the Florida, Appalachian, and Southern Leagues.

The camp will be located at the Marshall Pond City Park, Lovers Lane, Milford. "We will hold a camp for 5 to 9

years olds from 9:00 to 12:00, June 17-21...and from June 24 through 28

for ages 10 through 17 from 9:00 to 3:00 p.m.," said Bobby Jacobs.

The techniques of soccer will be stressed. "We will be on the move at all times. Lots of hustle. You must accept the fact that you are coming to camp to learn and work hard. There will be no goofing off," said Jacobs. "There will be certain areas zoned off for goalies only...where we will teach the art of defending a goal...diving...slapping, and ball control," said Jacobs. He also said they would emphasize the penalty kick...and other areas for corner kicks. "There will be open areas for drills and skills...where techniques like trapping, heading, striking the ball...and philosophy of the game will be taught. And, yes, the art of dribbling the ball," he said.

"The kids will be coming here to learn, and I want to stress the fact that we will be in a serious atmosphere," he said.

Jacobs will be attracting some of the most prominent names in the sport of soccer. "From Florida Southern University we will have on hand head Coach, Sam Snow...who I was in college with and played on the same

college team. We also have Helmut Werner of Randolph Macon. I played on his college all-star team in Virginia. Head Coach, Tom Bowman of Washington College and Gerald DiBartolo of Salisbury State will be here. We are also hoping that the head coach from Washington and Lee University will be here, and Bill Schellberger of Lynchburg College in Va., who is the nation's winningest coach. So it will be a good camp with quite an array of coaching talent," added Jacobs.

Jacobs also plans to hold wrestling and basketball camps in the Dover area later in the year. He played those two sports as well.

Virginia man killed in accident near Farmington

Accident Reconstructionists at Delaware State Police Troop 3, near Woodside, are investigating a single vehicle accident that has left an Oakton, Virginia man dead.

The mishap occurred at approximately 10:20 p.m. last night on U.S. route 13, northbound, approximately seven-tenths of a mile south of Farmington. A Chevrolet Chevette, being driven northbound on route 13 by Matthew F. Thomas, 21, of 2888 Linda Marie Drive, Oakton, Virginia ran off the east side of route 13, northbound for approximately 106 feet before overturning. Mr. Thomas was totally ejected from his vehicle. Mr. Thomas was transported to the Milford Memorial Hospital by the Greenwood Volunteer Fire Company ambulance where he was pronounced dead at 11:30 p.m. of massive head injuries.

Christopher B. Cooper, 20, of 11814 Vale Road, Oakton, Virginia, was a

passenger in the right front of Mr. Thomas' vehicle. Mr. Cooper was transported to the Milford Memorial Hospital by a Delaware State Police helicopter. He was treated for multiple facial lacerations and contusions and released.

Walter T. Logan, 43, of R.D. 1, Box 1032 A, LaPlata, Maryland, was a passenger in the right rear of Mr. Thomas' vehicle. Mr. Logan was transported to Milford Memorial Hospital by the Greenwood Volunteer Fire Company ambulance. He was treated for multiple lacerations and contusions and was released.

Seatbelts were not worn by any of the occupants of the vehicle and investigators report evidence of alcohol involvement on the part of Mr. Thomas.

This brings to total 12 highway fatalities this year as compared to 14 at this same time last year.

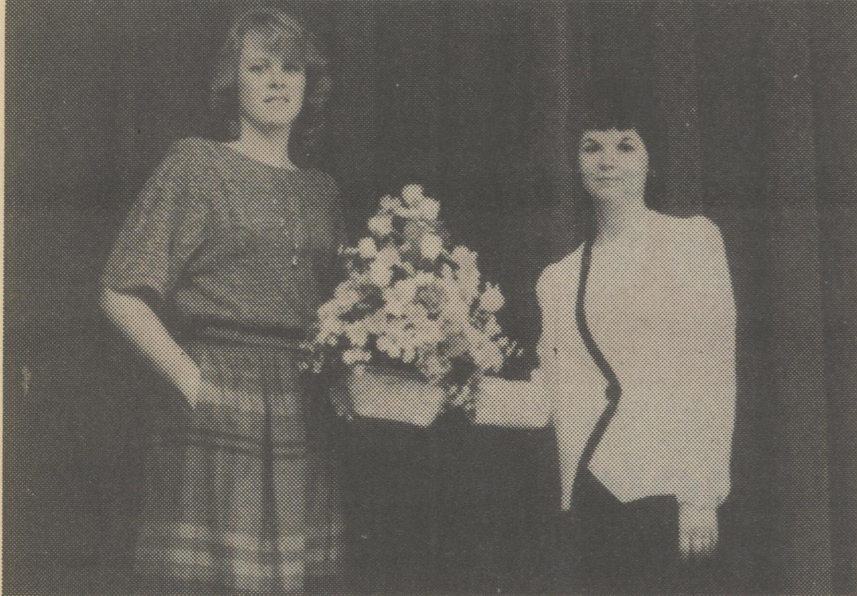

For the last six years, I have been president of Aid Association for Lutherans, Branch 5195 in Thousand Oaks, California. Our branch has been the catalyst for fundraising in the helping of Bob Hughes to fight his legal battle with the State of Delaware. The money we have raised has come from a lot of work, numerous fund raising events, and from many ordinary middle class people. We believe Bob Hughes is innocent of the murder of his wife and we were delighted that the Delaware Supreme Court has overturned the second conviction.

We believe the charges should be dismissed against this man. Mr. Oberly, now attorney general of the state, has prosecuted Bob both previous trials and both trials have been declared unfair by the Supreme Court. Mr. Oberly is charged to administer justice. He should have no obligation to Mr. and Mrs. Bell, Bob's in-laws, and yet he states in the newspapers that he has an obligation to them. He has just as much obligation to the Hughes family and Chad and Brock.

The people of Delaware should know

that the Hughes family has made numerous efforts to share Bob and Sereta's sons with the Bells. They have refused all contact and have never even seen the boys since shortly after Sereta's homicide. The Hughes family have strong Christian convictions and still would forgive the Bell's vindictiveness and share Chad and Brock when Bob is finally free.

The people of Delaware should also know that the Hughes family still owes \$150,000.00 in debts from these trials. Our branch continues to have fundraisers to pay interest on these funds and to try to whittle them down. I'm sure the people of Delaware would have to pay Bob's legal fees in any third trial which many of us doubt could be fair in your state. It has been too widely publicized already.

Another fact you should know is that attorneys Randy Holland and Jerry Street have handled Bob's second appeal to the Supreme Court without being paid one cent since the second trial. We thank God that these men have continued to pursue justice and you can be proud of these attorneys. I

cannot say the same for your attorney general, Mr. Charles Oberly.

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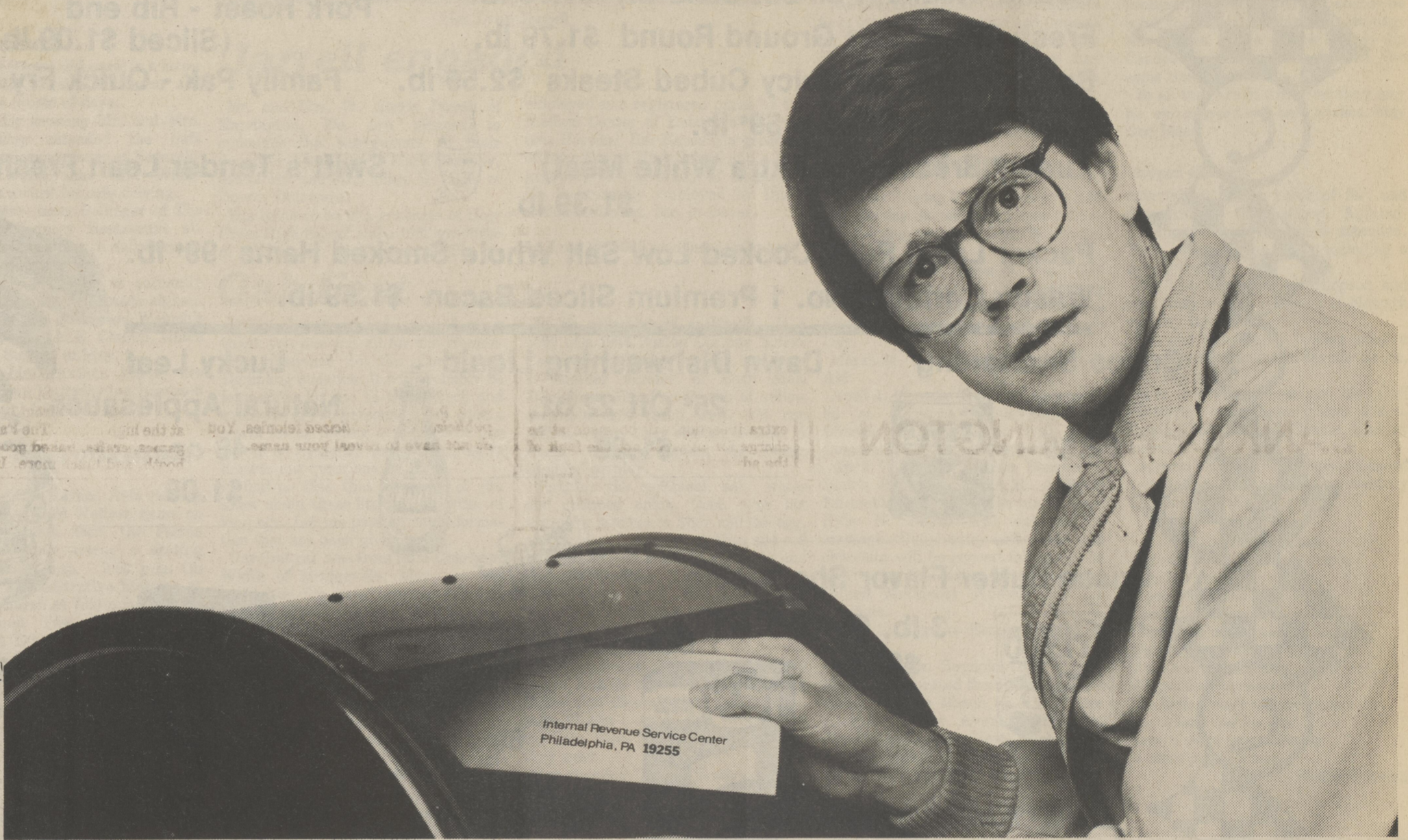

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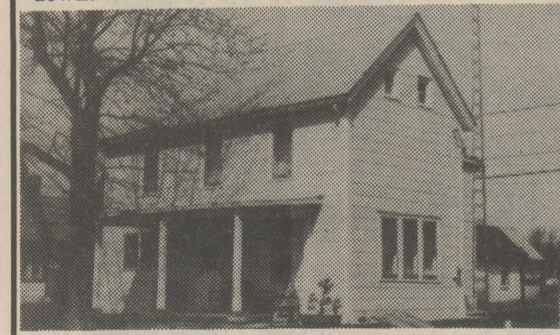

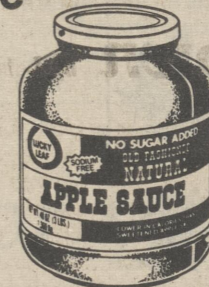

Gab Fest by Pat Hatfield

Before I get carried away I must thank you one and all for the tremendous response to the Corn Meal Dumpling question. It will probably be impossible for me to thank each and everyone of you personally, but what a warm loving feeling it is to know you are all so loyal and caring in trying to answer our questions.

I had no idea that so many of you knew about these little corn patties of long ago. Let me pass on the information that has been given to me.

Our first call was from Miss Charlotte White of Bridgeville. Many of you know her I'm sure because she has always been so active in our community affairs. Miss White reminded me of something I had forgotten. These little dumplings were called by the local folk "Corn Dodgers". My mother-in-law used that name. This is the way Miss White's mother made them. One pint of cornmeal, 1/2 teasp. salt, 2 tablespoons melted butter, add enough cold water to make a dough. Pat out small ovals with your hands and lay them on top of the boiling broth. Cook 20 minutes. They were always put on top of greens or cabbage.

The next interesting conversation was with one of our men Readers from Lincoln, who reminded me that we had talked a couple of years ago, when we were into the question of okra. For the life of me I have misplaced his name, but he knows we appreciate his interest.

In his collection of cookbooks, is a copy of a 1944 Boston Cooking School Cookbook by Fanny Farmer, and here is another version of Corn Meal Dumplings. One-Fourth cup of yellow cornmeal, 1/4 teasp. salt, 3/4 cup boiling water, 1 egg slightly beaten, 1/2 teasp. chopped onion, 1/2 teasp. chopped parsley.

Combine the cornmeal, salt, water and chopped onion. Cook over hot water for two hours, then add the egg, and parsley. Shape into patties and roll in flour. Lay on hot soup or broth and cook ten minutes.

How about that? Two hours in a double boiler! In that time you would have to keep adding water to the bottom of the boiler.

Then my friend, Tess, called and told me to look in my Delmar "American Revolution Bicentennial" cookbook on page 27 and I would find two recipes for Corn Meal Dumplings. And there they were.

One is called "Mark's Recipe" and is very simple. 2 cups cornmeal, 1/4 teasp. salt. Pour boiling water over and scald the meal. (It doesn't say how much water.) When cool, mix into dough...the scalded meal will hold it together. Take biscuit-sized portions and flatten with your palms. Drop into medium boiling pot. Be sure the pot is past simmering but not hard-boiling. Either will cause the dumplings to fall.

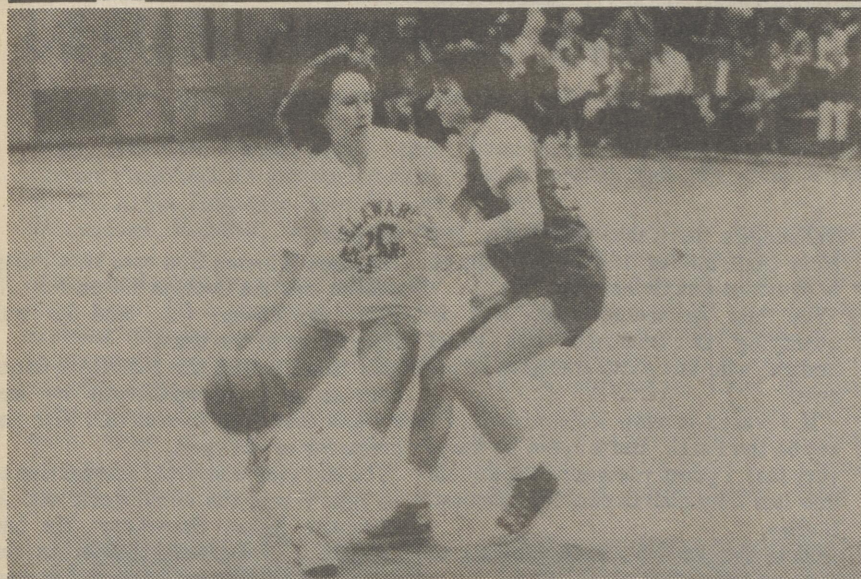

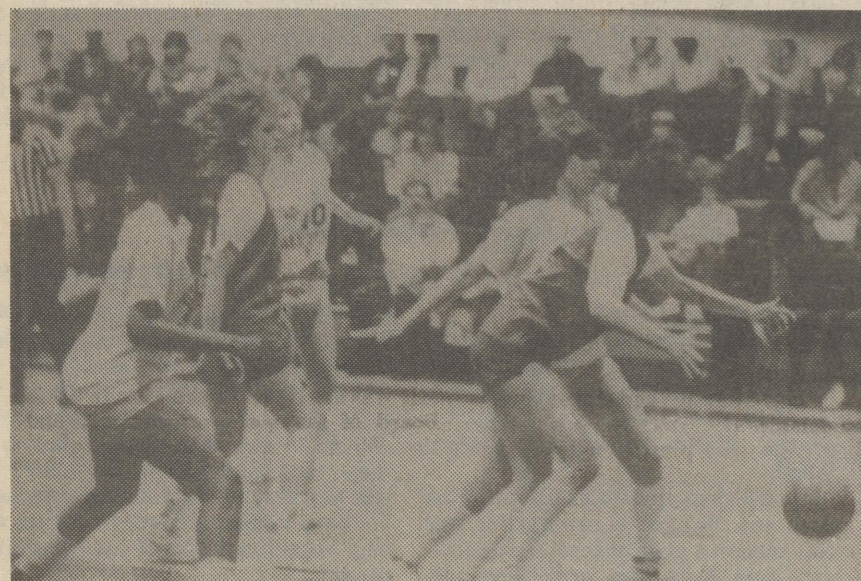

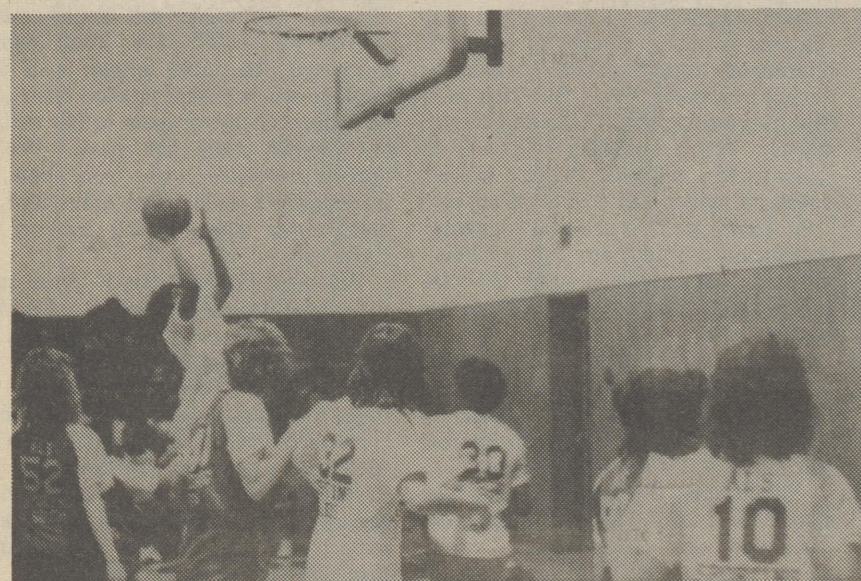

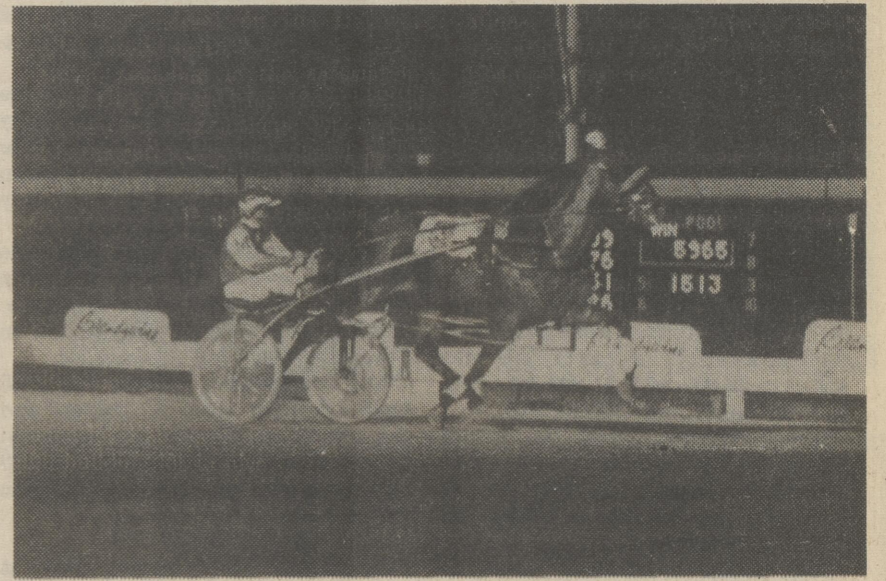
The Varsity tennis team has not won a match in three years, but Coach Dyal believes there might be a turn-around this year.

Parker puts accident in the past

Last Wednesday night, an anniversary in the life of harness driver Jack Parker, Jr. passed nearly unnoticed. Parker refused his wife's request to take the night off and laughed off a suggestion from Cathy Parker that he pass up the 10th race.

It was exactly one year earlier--March 20, 1984--when Jack Parker nearly lost his life in a racing accident, driving No. 7 Hope Valley in the 10th race at the Meadowlands.

Instead of fearing the night, however, Parker was fired up, winning the first race of the night at the Meadowlands with a 20-1 shot named Pine Bay A. It was his 19th victory of the meet.

Everyone tells Jack Parker how lucky he is. He tends to respond that if he was really lucky, he wouldn't have gotten hurt at all.

"It could have been a whole lot worse than it ended up being," the 29-year-old Paramus, N.J., resident says now. "I look at it two ways. If I was lucky, it would never have happened. Or I would have broken my arm or something like that. But after my bad luck, I had some good luck."

A year ago Parker was guiding Hope Valley down the backstretch when the horse broke stride, hurling the driver to the track. A trailing horse stepped on Parker's skull, leaving a lasting impression of his hoof. Parker was rushed to Hackensack Medical Center, comatose with two brain hemorrhages. It took two operations and three weeks before the feisty Parker emerged from the coma. Remarkably, he was back racing 18 weeks later, winning his first drive back on August 2 with I'm A Wanderer.

It took Parker a lot of hard work to make it back, to regain his strength and overcome his injuries.

Jack's wife never doubted he would. "Racing has been the best medicine," Cathy admits.

"I really don't think about the accident," Parker says, his speech still slower and more deliberate than before the spill. "I've watched tapes of the accident but I really don't remember anything that happened. I'm just glad to be racing."

Horseman John Suffel dead at 47

John Suffel, 47, who had been a champion horse owner and trainer on the Delaware Valley harness racing circuit, died of heart failure Saturday at his home in West Palm Beach, Fla.

Two of Suffel's champion studs, Ridgewood Express and LaRoan, were voted by the Delaware Harness

Writer's Association as the second and third best horses on the Delaware Valley circuit in 1982.

Suffel, recipient of the association's "Good Guy Award" for 1983, sold his 60-acre farm in Fruitland, MD and his 24 horses after his doctor advised him to retire because of health problems.

Suffel had had several heart operations, including a coronary bypass operation last year in Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore.

He has no immediate survivors in the Delaware area.

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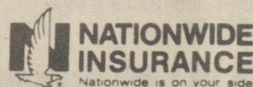

from New Castle County, seven from Kent County and six from Sussex County.

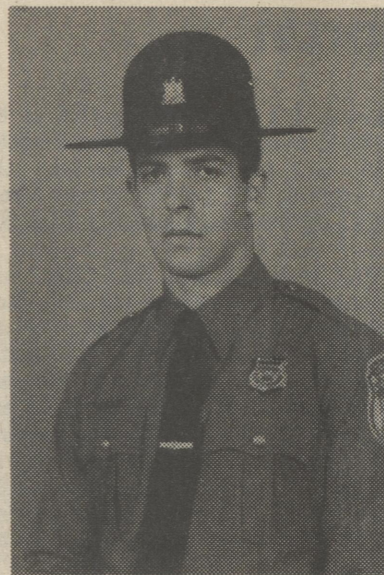
