The kids in elementary through high school grades buy and sell common stocks available on the American and New York Stock Exchanges using a "pretend" \$100,000 and the computers at Widener University in Chester. A computer printout of their stock portfolio is mailed out weekly. The student teams of 3 or 4 students can mail transaction sheets to the computer center as often as they want.

The students use "grown up" strategies of selling short and buying on margin. The kids learn that buying on margin is like buying on credit in real life. Selling short works effectively when the price of a certain stock goes down. The student team portfolios are charged interest for the credit extended to them in their margin accounts and reflect broker's commissions for

every transaction.

A by-product to this handson economic education is teamwork skills.

While the profits earned are only on paper, the students are learning just how the capital market works--because they are involved. They learn to evaluate available research data. financial statements, reports and various market indicators, and in general, to utilize the same techniques employed by "real" market specialists.

To monitor economic and political events that impact stock prices the students also develop the habit of reading the daily newspaper.

The team making the most money from each school will attend an awards dinner to be held at Widener University in May. Also, the top

winners in the region will be taken on a one-day bus trip next June by Butcher & Singer to visit the World Trade Center and view the excitement of the trading floor at the New York Stock

The Stock Market Game is funded by Butcher & Singer, Inc. and Sun Co.; it is sponsored by the ACEE, Widener University, and the Philadelphia Inquirer. Fern Berger, assistant vice president and registered investment broker with Butcher & Singer, and Brad Siegerman, graduate assistant at Widener University, serve as coordinators for the game.



Use of helicopters by the Delaware State Police for emergency medical functions has been a growing project since 1971. The growth has seen our Aviation Unit progress from a single helicopter with limited medical equipment and minimal training to two larger aircraft.

The four latest additions to the Aviation Unit, our trooper/medics, are intended to add significant capability to life saving efforts in Sussex and Kent Counties. Two-hundred and four medical missions were performed in Sussex County alone in 1984. Only four of these were responses to on-scene emergencies, including highway and rural motor vehicle accidents.

Broad support has been received from all the hospitals. The trooper/medics will perform this medical service under the "standing orders" and direct supervision of emergency room physicians in each of the hospitals involved. Beebe Hospital will provide medical control in Sussex County and Kent General Hospital in Kent County. The medical and fire/ambulance community understands that we seek only to supplement an already well developed, equipped and trained emergency response system. Our limited resources cannot meet the total demand, but careful use of time and resources will allow the Delaware State Police to have aircraft in Sussex County and lower Kent County more often. The more time spent there, the more available it becomes

## From the Pastor's Pen



The Easter season is a joyous time because it culminates in the observance of the resurrection of Christ. This resurrection gives the believer a great hope of his own coming resurrection and eternal life.

There were, however, some sad experiences associated with the crucifixion of Jesus Christ. Some of the sad experiences involve the reactions of people at the trial of Jesus before Pilate and at Jesus' actual crucifixion. These reactions of people reveal the steps of how people of all ages reject Jesus Christ. First we find that "Pilate said unto them, Whom will ye that I release unto you? Barabbas, or Jesus?" (Matt. 27:17). The people chose Barabbas. Now Barrabas was a murderer. Jesus was sinless, Barrabas was the worst of sinners. The people decided to kill righteousness and release sin. When people want to do away with God and His righteous ways and allow sin to have freedom in life

and society, they have taken the first step in rejecting Christ.
Secondly, "Pilate saith unto them,

What shall I do then with Jesus? They all say unto him. Let Him be crucified" (Matt. 27:22). This is the actual decision to be rid of Jesus. All His words and deeds were good for people to help them and to forgive them, yet they said "no". The second step in rejecting Christ is to say "no". This is a fearful step because it is saying "no" to God. A person then has the guilt of crucifying Jesus upon his soul before

Thirdly, when Jesus was hanging on the cross, "they that passed by reviled Him, wagging their heads" (Matt. 27:39). This reaction was one of mockery, unbelief and hatred. This is a tragic step when people so react to God and His offer of righteousness as to revile Jesus. They wagged their heads in rejecting Jesus.

Hopefully, you will not follow these steps in rejecting Jesus at this Easter

## Parker puts accident in the past

Last Wednesday night, an anniver-sary in the life of harness driver Jack Parker, Jr. passed nearly unnoticed. Parker refused his wife's request to take the night off and laughed off a suggestion from Cathy Parker that he pass up the 10th race.

It was exactly one year earlier--March 20, 1984--when Jack Parker nearly lost his life in a racing accident, driving No. 7 Hope Valley in the 10th race at the Meadowlands.

Instead of fearing the night, however, Parker was fired up, winning the first race of the night at the Meadowlands with a 20-1 shot named Pine Bay A. It

was his 19th victory of the meet. Everyone tells Jack Parker how lucky he is. He tends to respond that if he was really lucky, he wouldn't have gotten hurt at all.

"It could have been a whole lot worse than it ended up being," the 29-yearold Paramus, N.J., resident says now. "I look at it two ways. If I was lucky, it would never have happened. Or I would have broken my arm or something like that. But after my bad luck, I had some good luck."

A year ago Parker was guiding Hope Valley down the backstretch when the horse broke stride, hurling the driver to the track. A trailing horse stepped on Parker's skull, leaving a lasting impression of his hoof. Parker was rushed to Hackensack Medical Center, comatose with two brain hemorrhages. It took two operations and three weeks before the feisty Parker emerged from the coma. Remarkably, he was back racing 18 weeks later, winning his first drive back on August

2 with I'm A Wanderer It took Parker a lot of hard work to make it back, to regain his strength

and overcome his injuries. Jack's wife never doubted he would. "Racing has been the best medicine," Cathy admits.

"I really don't think about the accident," Parker says, his speech still slower and more deliberate than before the spill. "I've watched tapes of the accident but I really don't remember anything that happened. I'm just glad to be racing."

Suffel had had several heart operaations, including a coronary bypass operation last year in Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore.

He has no immediate survivors in the Delaware area.


The Sovran Bank 500 NASCAR Winston Cup Grand National race, set for Sunday, April 28 at Martinsville Speedway, will be the richest event in the track's 38-year history.

First place is worth \$28,825 with \$16,100 for second and \$10,725 for third. Nearly all finish positions in the 30ear starting field will be greatly increased by NASCAR's various plan awards, paid by the speedway.

There will be \$8,100 in time trials alone. The fastest qualifier will receive \$3,000, including the \$1,500 Busch pole position award. The outside pole man will earn \$2,000 with \$1,000 for third, \$500 for fourth and \$300 for fifth.

Darrell Waltrip holds the record payoffs for Martinsville Speedway with \$35,225 for winning the 1983 Sovran Bank 500 and \$38,300 in taking last fall's Goody 500.

Geoff Bodine of Julian, NC, won his first Winston Cup event in this race last year and is defending champion in the Levi Garrett Chevrolet. Sharing the big weekend will be the Azalea 150, a 150-lap NASCAR National Championship Modified race to be run at 2 p.m. Saturday, April 27.

dale 500 wins against Junior Johnson's teams, whose drivers have captured 19 of the 28 races at Bristol since 1971. Driving an Elder-prepared car for Osterland Racing, Dale Earnhardt swept both the 1979 and 1980 Valley-

Ten years before, Elder paired with David Pearson at the Holman and Moody racing team to win both Bristol races in 1968 as well as the track's Fall event in 1969. The Bristol victory string was part of the best two seasons of Pearson's illustrious Grand National

In 1968 and 1969, the Pearson-Elder combination won 27 races enroute to consecutive Winston Cup titles. In 99 races spanning the two seasons, they also compiled an incredible record of 78 top-five finishes (79%) and 82 top-10 finishes (83%).

"Bobby likes high banked tracks like Bristol," says Elder. "I think he'll be pretty quick right off, but it might take him a while to learn how to work traffic. Once he gets that down...and he's gettin' better all the time...watch

\*\*\*\*\*\* In talking about pole position qualifying for the May 5th Winston 500 at Alabama International Motor Speed-

way, the following was overheard: "I think there is a good chance that the qualifying record Bill Elliott set at Daytona could stand," says Phil

Parsons. Benny Parsons thinks it could well be faster.

"The strong Fords will run at least 205, and probably faster, so I think you'll see a new record set in qualifying at Talladega," says Benny, who drives a Chevrolet for Leo Jackson. "We are not in that hunt, and I don't know if anyone else can run with Elliott and Cale, either.'

During this iron-man stint, he has driven in 399 straight NASCAR Winston Cup races -- the longest consecutive race streak in auto racing

He will extend his remarkable record to 400 when he starts the Valleydale 500 at Bristol International Raceway on March 31.

"You play that stuff (injuries) down, so you can go ahead and do what you have do do," says Petty. "It's mind over matter. And, I've been fortunate in that I've always had a high threshold Volunteer 500.

The last Winston Cup race that Petty missed was the Georgia 500 on Nov. 7, 1971, at Macon, Ga., and he was injury-free at the time.

He failed to run the NASCAR event because of a disagreement he and several other top drivers had with the promoter of the race.

The last race that Petty missed due to an injury was the 1970 World 600 at Charlotte Motor Speedway. He had suffered a dislocated shoulder in the worst wreck of his career at Darlington, earlier in the month and his doctor said he should not race in the

You could miss a race back then and still have a shot at the championship," recalls the driver of the STP Pontiac. But he has ignored a doctor's advice many times since then in compiling his

consecutive race record. The worst injury of his career came in 1979 when he suffered the broken neck in a wreck at Pocono, Pa. "But we didn't say anything about it," says Petty, who has competed in a record 962 Winston Cup races during his illustrious career. "We were afraid NASCAR wouldn't let us run if they

At the time, Petty explained the neck brace he was wearing by saying he had suffered pulls and tears in the ligaments and muscles of his neck. But he doesn't regard that injury as

the most painful he had had to endure. "The rib injuries are the worst," notes the 47-year-old racer. The worst part is when it pulls the muscles loose from your rib cage.

While Petty is not regarded as one of the favorites to win the pole position for the Winston Cup race, Bristol is the site of Petty's last pole position. It came on Aug. 24, 1979, in the

The Rockingham crash also left Bill with a painful injury at a time when he needs to score well to stay in the hunt for the Winston Cup championship. He currently langushes

Here, Bill Elliott and his older talk about the sudden turnaround in their fortunes: (QT is short for Quick times by Ford)

QT: How severe is your injury from the Rockingham wreck and how will it affect you in the coming events? BILL **ELLIOTT**: I fractured the fibula in my lower left leg. It's really painful, and I'm having a tough time getting around. The doctors want to put it in a cast, but I won't be able to drive if they do. And I need to be in the car.

I really don't know how it will affect me at Atlanta (Ha Ha). It will be painful to mash the clutch, for sure. Fortunately, Atlanta's a track where you don't have to do a lot of shifting, so that will be helpful. I'll just try to do my best.

If I can't stay in the car, I don't know what I'll do or who might drive. One of those terms, then, what's an additional the people I would want to drive the car, if I couldn't finish the race, would be Benny Parsons. He treats a car about the same as I do-not trying to drive it into holes that aren't there or beating the car into the ground to prove something. He's sensitive to the QT: A new NASCAR tire rule

penalizes a team two laps if they change more than two tires under a caution. You have written off two race cars due to wrecks with cut tires. What are your thoughts on the rule as you get ready for Atlanta? BILL EILLIOTT: I can't say that the tire rule cost us those two wrecks and two race

to the rule and I won't.

But I do know that when you run through debris on the track from a wreck, the yellow comes out and you can only change two tires without a penalty. It causes great safety concern

If you picked up debris and one of the tires you changed shows that it was cut, there's a good chance the unchaged tires have also been adversely affected. From a pure safety standpoint it makes MORE sense to change four tires under yellow than it does to change two and take a chance.

ERNIE ELLIOTT: I understand that the rule is aimed at cutting costs by limiting the number of tires we can use during any given race. But look at it from this standpoint. This is big-league sports. We're spending whatever it takes to win, whether that's a million dollars, a million and a 1/2 or whatever.

We have Coors, a national company, sponsoring us. It is our responsibility to run as fast as we can every time we roll off the truck-to represent them the best we can.

If it takes \$6.000 worth of tires to win a race of \$300, then that's what it takes, & that's what we'll spend. In \$20,000 or \$30,000 worth of tires? Right now, the new tire rule has

saved us a few hundred dollars at Richmond and Rockingham. But, we've torn up two race cars, one of them a total write-off. That's approximately \$50,000 we've had in race car damage. Every tire we took off at Rockingham

had cuts in it, so you can understand our feelings. If Bill has run through debris, we'd rather change four ties every yellow.

QT:After winning Daytona, you are the obvious pick to win the Winston Mllion-the \$1 million prize for winning three of the so-called big four (Daytona

From Quick Times by Ford Motor Company. Cola World 600 at Charlotte, Southern 500 at Darlington). Can it be done? BILL ELLIOTT: It will be difficult to win the Winston Million. There are so many good cars to beat every Sunday,

and all fo the front-runners know, if they want that million, they have to win all three of the remaining races. We have a slight advantage in that well only have to win two of the remaining

QT:Is it true that your Daytona engine-which set the absolute lap record for a stock car at 205.224 mph-was less than the maximum allowable 358 cubic inch displacement? ERNIE ELLIOTT: Yes. That engine measured 354 cubic inches. All the engines we run are smaller than the allowable. They all seem to fall within the 350-356 cubic inch mark. We'r getting adequate power from them to be competitive, so those extra four to eight cubic inches aren't hurting us

right now. But most importantly, it gives us a little breathing room when NASCAR tears down our engine after we win or

finish in the top five. QT:Has Ford's Performance Equipment Program helped you to be more competitive? ERNIE ELLIOTT: We've never had a problem with reliability of durability of parts and pieces for Ford motors. The problem in the past was in supply and the number of available pieces for development work.

During the past year, that has improved so much there is day and night difference. Now the parts are available in quality and quantity. And that is very important to us because we spend so much time and money in engine research and development.

Last year, we spent more that \$500,000 in our engine research and development program. At any given moment, we have about 15 different engines in various stages of development. We constantly keep changing and searching for improvement.

We want to be the best and fastest Ford team.

A couple of years ago, we weren't an 'established" team like Junior Johnson, the Wood Brothers, or Bud Moor Engineering. But we are one of the best now. And we will continue to improve.

I think Ford realizes those things. We understand that Ford is not buying race teams or spending millions of dollars like they did back in the "factory days" of stock car racing. I believe we all know where we stand

and what our goals are. Ford is supplying parts and pieces that are good-and in good quantity.
We have input into the creation of new
