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School Board candidates file for two board seats

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Five candidates have filed for two seats on Lake Forest School Board. The candidates for the two year term are Henry Heller, Earl Roberts and Jose Soriano. The candidates for the five year term are William Dannenhauer and David Welch. The election is to be held on May 14, 1985 between the hours of 12 noon to 9:00 p.m. The profiles of the candidates are as Collows:

HENRY HELLER

Henry Heller is retired from the U.S. Air Force. A native of the Bronx, N.Y. who has made his home in the Felton Area. He is 55 years old and has 5 children who have attended Lake Forest schools. Heller has been active in the Band Boosters and the Citizens Advisory Committee on the referendum in which he has attended the last 10 or 12 special meetings on the referendum. "I think that trying to do everything at once with the referendum is not giving the taxpayers a break. I would like to see a 6 year capitalization improvement plan to keep the costs down. He also feels the 5th graders are without proper science and social studies textbooks, "...and in some instances they need to be upgraded". "I also feel frustrated with some of the Chappenings...things that are surfacing that need answers. I don't want to condemn anyone...but we need answers and we need unity," he said.

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
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Dill joins Harrington Journal staff







Elliott harnesses "Ducktail" into Winston Cup dominance

HARRISBURG, N.C. — Is Bill Elliott "Ducktailing" his way to a fat onemillion-dollar paycheck?

Formula I champion Alan Jones once described stock car racing as a "bloody black art" because of the mystery surrounding the draft. The mystery of why Elliott's sleek Ford Thunderbird can't be drafted has been solved. It's the "Ducktail."

And "Ducktailing" deals with the draft, or lack of a draft Elliott's T-Bird leaves on the Winston Cup super-speedways.

The biggest test comes May 26 in the Coca-Cola World 600 at Charlotte Motor Speedway, where the "Ducktail" could harvest Elliott a million bucks. A new tire compound should make drafting easier at Charlotte.

Here's how the dreaded "Ducktail" effect works: The sleek sides of Elliott's Thunderbird, more compact than the "boxy" General Motors cars, allow air to rush onto cars running close behind in an attempt to draft. Therefore, it pushes a trailing Chevrolet, for example, instead of forming a vacuum and natural draft effect. In addition, the Ford's rear window is sleeker, again allowing high-speed air to flow down the back end and push the car running behind.

The three streams of air form a "Ducktail" at the rear end of Elliott's Ford. The term comes from the 1950s, when you may have combed your greasy hair into a point at the base of your neck.

The result is that Elliott has won three of the five races this season. A victory at Talladega would give him two chips down on the Winston Million; the final chip could fall at the Coca-Cola World 600

"His Ford punches a much smaller hole," Richard Petty says of Elliott's

"Ducktail." "The Ford is rounded and the wind gets closer behind it much quicker.

"All that's a plus, even when not drafting. Maybe it just means a half-tenth-of-a-second difference, but if you get enough half-tenths, you've got that tenth-of-a-second difference we're all looking for."

Most car owners and drivers give the Elliott brothers Dan and Ernie plenty of credit for making their own gains on the superspeedways, using the legal advantages the T-Bird offers to the ultimate. But the "Ducktail," does give Elliott the racer's edge.

"You come right in behind and it slows you down," said Darrell Waltrip, who drives one of Junior Johnson's Chevrolets. "The Ford is lower and smaller, and you're running right in its wake... He's turning the air right on you. Give him an advantage like that, and the fact that his car lasts forever, and I'd say he'll be the dominant force until something happens.

"And the way his rear window lays down, it's just the perfect aerodynamic design. Any good team that has the advantages Elliott has will scald you every time."

Johnson says he's no match for Georgia's answer to Huck Finn. "I just don't think the Ford can be drafted on the superspeedways," says Johnson, "It's so small, there's no draft.

"If he's allowed to keep his car that way, the season at Charlotte and Talladega, Daytona and Atlanta will just be a repeat, over and over again," says Johnson, who adds that he has strongly considere changing to a Ford because he finds at least four other technical areas where the T-Bird ranks superior compared to his Chevrolets.







Only a 1-2 finish by Kelli Pelton (5.52) and Lori Wilson, in the 1600 meter run and a 2-3 finish by Patti Drew, at 400 meters, kept the visitors by sewing up the meet, after six events, bearing in mind that Seaford had some sure points coming up, in who was one of the keys to a 68-64 win.

Sheva Batton and Melanie Pelton, started the Spartans' comeback, on the track, by finishing one-two, in the 300 meter low hurdles.

Lori Wilson (2.38) and Debbie Jester (2.40.5) ran strong races, with Jodie Jensen, clocking a very good 2.45.9, in fourth place, behind Seaford's Beth Hall. Ken Hutchins continues to flirt with the school record, in the pole vault. Ken cleared 12 feet, 6 inches and needs to go only two inches higher.


