School Board candidates file for two board seats

Five candidates have filed for two seats on Lake Forest School Board. The candidates for the two year term are Henry Heller, Earl Roberts and Jose Soriano. The candidates for the five year term are William Dannenhauer and David Welch. The election is to be held on May 14, 1985 between the hours of 12 noon to 9:00 p.m. The profiles of the candidates are as follows:

HENRY HELLER

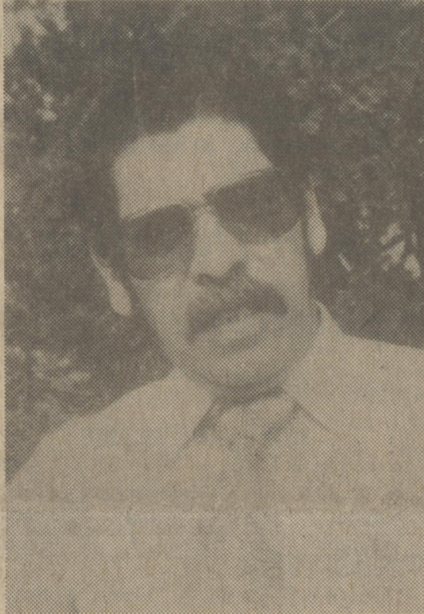
Henry Heller is retired from the U.S. Air Force. A native of the Bronx, N.Y. who has made his home in the Felton Area. He is 55 years old and has 5 children who have attended Lake Forest schools. Heller has been active in the Band Boosters and the Citizens Advisory Committee on the referendum in which he has attended the last 10 or 12 special meetings on the referendum. "I think that trying to do everything at once with the referendum is not giving the taxpayers a break. I would like to see a 6 year capitalization improvement plan to keep the costs down."

He also feels the 5th graders are without proper science and social studies textbooks, "...and in some instances they need to be upgraded". "I also feel frustrated with some of the happenings...things that are surfacing that need answers. I don't want to condemn anyone...but we need answers and we need unity," he said.

"I believe in the democratic process...and I would just like to get the issues out to the public," he said.

Heller is an executive officer to the Warden at Kent Correctional Institute. He has been there since '73.

EARL ROBERTS

Earl Roberts is the incumbent. He is presently serving out a vacancy created on the Board. His terms ends June 1. Roberts points out that his main interest is the best education possible for the children of the District. He is quick to add that his education and business background stemming from his career job at Del-Tech lends itself to his candidacy. He also points out that his experience as a sitting

member of the Lake Forest School Board allows him to be a more formidable candidate. Robert says it takes approximately 4 months of practical experience as a sitting member of the Board to understand the procedure and what is going on at the meetings.

Roberts feels that the Board needs to spend more time with groups in the District...like the PTA...set policy but allow the administrators to administer. "The teachers and the administration need a Board that gives them leadership and clear direction," he said.

He feels that he is a highly motivated

positive leader, "...and the people tell me that I am doing a good job, and I know that I am. Also I let my fellow Board members know when I agree with them or disagree with them," he said. He also feels the Board spends too many hours in Board meetings each month. "We need a Board that can work together," he concluded.

DAVID WELCH

David Welch is a native of Harrington. He has two children in the School District. He feels the School District needs some new ideas, "...and I feel that I can supply them. I am interested

in representing the people in the District. If elected I will appoint 10 to 12 people throughout the District as chairmen of certain areas in the District. I will work with them and through them to classify the issues... and get feedback from the people in the District.

JOSE SORIANO

Jose Soriano currently resides in Harrington. He is employed by the State Department of Public Instruction.

Soriano sees two areas that he feels if elected he could help improve in the

School District. "They are teacher and administrator accountability," he said. "We have good and bad teachers in the district. Where we have bad teachers is in the area where administrators have not given the teachers any real direction," he said.

Soriano is in education on the secondary level. He feels his education and administrative background would lend itself to serving on the School Board. "I have real problems with the Board holding so many meetings throughout

The proclamation coincides with the national observance of the 50th anniversary of the soil and water conservation movement in America.

Balascio joins U of D Ag Engineering Faculty

Dr. Carmine Balascio has joined the University of Delaware College of Agricultural Sciences as an assistant professor in the department of agricultural engineering, effective April 8.

A Delaware native, Balascio holds bachelor's degrees in agricultural engineering technology and mathematics from the University of Delaware. He holds a master's degree in agricultural engineering with emphasis on soil and water conservation from Iowa State University. He earned his doctorate at Iowa State in agricultural engineering and engineering mechanics, with a minor in mathematics.

Balascio will teach courses in soil and water conservation, and land surveying. He will also conduct research for the Delaware Agricultural Experiment station in the area of water use and quality as these relate to agricultural production.

Aetna Shirt gets J.C. Penney shirt contract

HARRINGTON. Since 1970 the Aetna Shirt Company of Baltimore has been doing business in Harrington. They hire 100 employees and for the most part are one of the real life lines... economically...in this community.

For the first time in the history of Aetna Shirt Co. a contract was awarded to them by J. C. Penney Co., a giant in retailing.

The local shirt factory makes only shirts. According to Mrs. Dolores Gerardi, the plant manager in Harrington, the contract calls for plain blends and some oxford button downs. "There will also be a mixture of short and long sleeve," added a jubilant Mrs. Gerardi.

David Jones, President of the JCPenney National Bank in Harrington, was also very pleased that his

bank owner awarded the contract to the local shirt concern. "We hope there will be many more contracts for Aetna."

It is not certain if there is any connection between the JCPenney National Bank and the award of the Aetna Shirt Co. contract, but it does pose a coincidence of sorts. "The fact that J. C. Penney Co. has seen fit to award the contract to Aetna Shirt Co., is notice that they recognize the quality that goes into their fine product. It makes me very happy to see this happen," said Jones.

The JCPenney National Bank, once the First National Bank of Harrington, has not lost its local flavor. "We may have changed the name of the Bank but we have not lost sight of the need for the Bank to still be involved in the

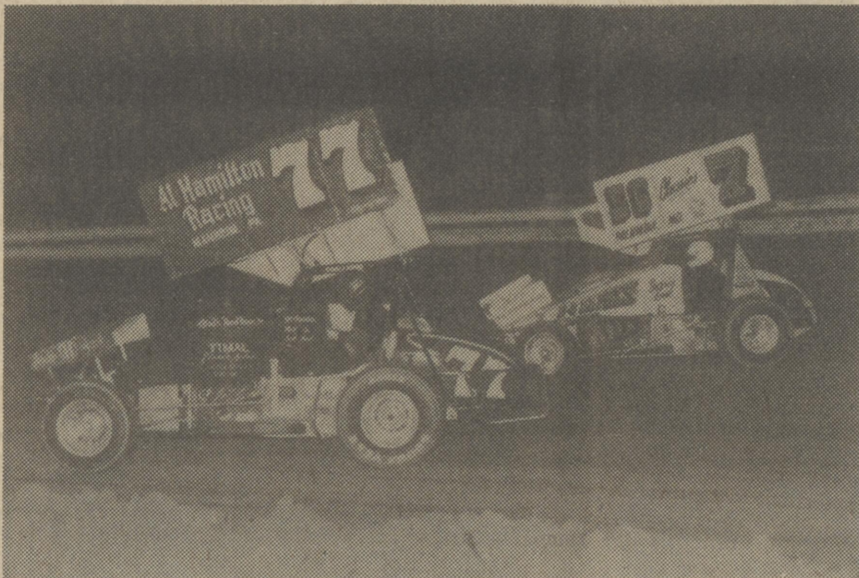

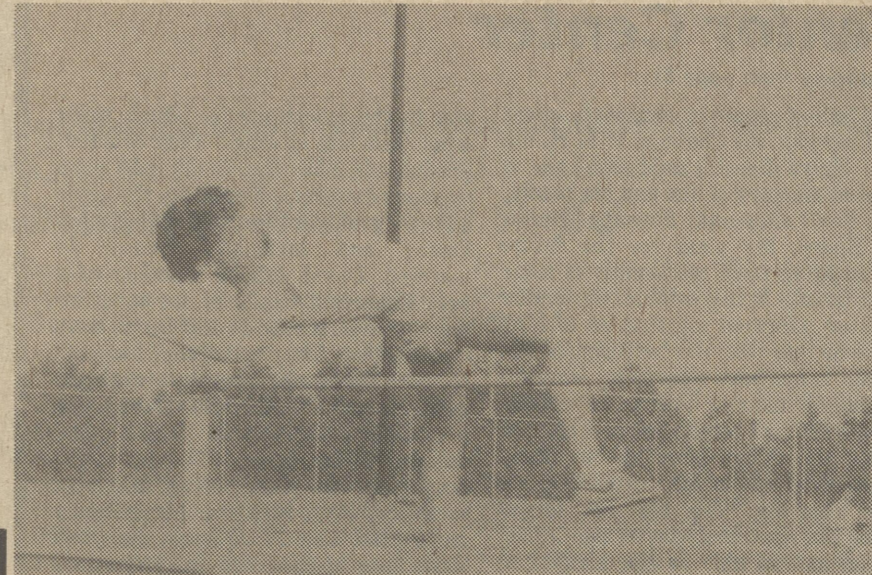
