It is normal for a person to believe in God. Atheism is a system forced upon pastor, a man openly declared he did not believe in God. that he was an
atheist. The pastor asked the man if he knew everything that anyone could
ever know. "Of course not", retorted the man, "no one knows everything
that could ever be known." "Well then", replied the pastor "is it possible
that one of those things you do not that one of those things you do not
know is that there is a God?" It is no
wonder that the Bible says, "The fool wonder that the Bible says, "The fool
hath said in his heart, There is no God" (Psalm 14111 .
