

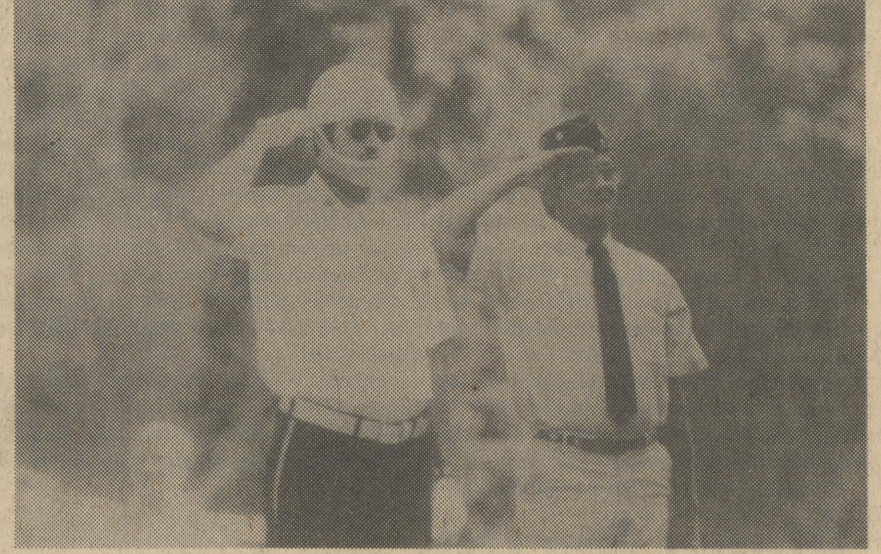

Before the parties and picnics began, before the softball games and the drinking starts, let's do the most important thing. Let's honor our war dead and wounded.

Memorial Day is a day that we have set aside to remember those who gave their life's blood in the service of their country. Our nation has been in many wars - declared or otherwise, from the American Revolution to Vietnam to the Mid-East. Some of these wars were popular with the American people, some were not, but still the American soldier fought and died.

These brave young men and women made the ultimate sacrifice, their lives to keep this country free and safe from the hostile hordes of the enemy. We as a nation of peace lovers can never give enough thanks to those who were killed or wounded on foreign soils.

To remember why we went to war is not enough, let us also remember that we can go to war at anytime or in anyplace in the name of freedom. If you are at a parade or a picnic or even a softball game this Memorial Day and you see a veteran standing there alone, or in a wheelchair or on crutches go up to him or her and just say "Thanks". It will mean a lot to them. Let's not forget all of our veterans still in hospitals around the country who will never be able to go home.

Don't let these men and women of the armed forces, who have given so much of themselves, be forgotten.

No time can anyone be more alone than on Memorial Day.

Roth Bill would make deadbeat doctors pay up

WASHINGTON - "More than 1800 doctors who received National Health Service Corps scholarships have breached their agreements, leaving the government with \$61.3 million in outstanding loans," Senator William V. Roth, Jr., R-Del., said today as he introduced legislation to collect from physicians who default on federal loans. "These same doctors continue to supplement their income with federal dollars from Medicare and Medicaid."

Roth's bill, The Physicians Education Loan Collection Act of 1985, would offset Medicare and Medicaid payments made to defaulting physicians or the health care organizations with which they are affiliated.

"Mr. Ramsdell, I want a pickle and two cents worth of oyster crackers." Do you remember? Good! You know for sure, pickles never tasted better! Many times we passed the pickle up and down the row of seats at school and each of the kids took a bite. Germs

—never had any! Never thought of colds and the horrible things that go on now. Lunch time for many at Harrington Public School meant a trek to Ramsdell's store. For lunch; that tidbit of lunch goodies might well be cheese tidbits, a piece of cheese, a can of potted meat, a piece of bologna, a fresh trolley bun, a cinnamon bun, a cream puff (from Sibitzke's bake shop, "up town"), a Nehi soda (rarely), a small bottle of milk, ice cream cone, a candy bar, bag of peanuts, a box of crackers or cookies, a banana, an orange or apple. Wasn't it good to see that huge bunch of bananas hanging from the ceiling of the store! Apples by the basket—oranges in crates as well as lemons, cheese by the large, round rings or wheels, bologna by the yard (ha, ha). Cookies by the small box or by the pound in glass covered, big boxes. Sometimes there was no glass top. Candy by the penny's worth, a nickel candy bar—much bigger than you get now for 30 or more cents. A bag of peanuts that lasted, an ice cream cone for five cents that put the now 50 cent ones to shame. Gone too are the Eskimo Bar (polar bars are good tho), a Marvels chocolate drink, a small pie that was tasty for pennies, white celery. Think real hard for there are others!

From the Pastor's Pen

For many people moral standards are set by public opinion. Of course there are moral standards set by our civil laws and from these we determine what is right and what is wrong. But what about those moral questions that are not answered by definite civil laws? This is where public opinion comes in to set moral standards. People set their moral standards by what the majority of people approve or disapprove. However, we have seen in recent years the changing of public opinion in a gradual way. Those people who have access to the public media have been able to gradually change public opinion. This is one of the reasons we have seen a gradual lowering of moral standards in recent years. Conduct that was once considered morally wrong gradually has become morally right.

What is needed is a moral standard established upon something greater than civil laws or public opinion. This must be God's moral standard. Much of our public problems of child abuse, abortion, greed, elderly abuse, drunk-

en drivers, pornography, rape, and the like, have come from a departure from God's moral standard as revealed in the Bible.

A classic example of this is the moral question about homosexuality. Once unquestionably considered morally wrong homosexuality is being presented and accepted by some people as an "alternative way of life". Gradually public opinion is being changed to where some day homosexuality may be morally accepted as heterosexuality. But what does God say? "Therefore, God also gave them up to uncleanness through the lusts of their own hearts, to dishonor their own bodies between themselves. For this cause God gave them up into vile affections; for even their women did exchange the natural use for that which is against nature; and likewise also the men, leaving the natural use of the woman, burned in their lust one toward another, men with men working that which is unseemly" [Rom. 1:25, 27].

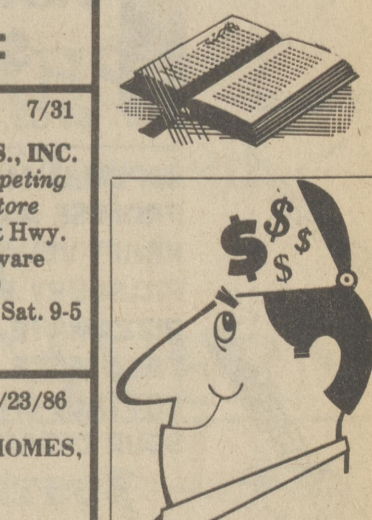
Setting our moral standards according to God will give us a better life, a better family, and a better society in which to live.

Ramsdells store was on Center St. Their first store was on the right (coming from school on Dorman St.) at this time Mr. Ramsdell was a mail carrier, and Mrs. Ramsdell tended the store. Business got so brisk they moved across the street and built a new store and a house, location next to the Wingate property (corner of Center & Calvin). At this writing Butlers live there. Ramsdells store was a department store as well as a grocery. Mrs. Ramsdell had excellent taste in choosing dress materials, slippers and shoes for kids and lots of sewing and personal aids. Mr. and Mrs. Ramsdell and their clerks were patient, kind, accommodating and neighborly! The clerks, as I remember were Eddie Simpson, Amy Brown Price, Blanche B. McKnatt, Bess Warrington and Josie Sapp. Weichenhiser, Dale Phillip cut meat. Delivery boys came in the latter years of the store, Larry Harrington, a quiet, nice young man. Before Larry, Mr. Ramsdell did the chore. Ramsdells store was a store before many telephones, Mr. Ramsdell would go to his customers, take orders and deliver. He knew what cut of meat you liked. Whether you liked white or brown eggs, what cookie was your favorite, the ice cream flavor you preferred, when a lady or gent brought in a good old sugar cured ham, Mr. Ramsdell told you. Goodness,

honey, wouldn't a hot biscuit and a piece of that kind of ham go good right now?

Some Ramsdell kept book (store bills). Some paid by the week, month, cash and sometimes he carried a customer if they hit hard times. (My husband George did the same thing for many when he was in "service station".) Hope Mr. Ramsdell got reimbursed Ramsdells store was known by other names; Le Grand and Clover Farm. Still in most people's mind it was always Ramsdells Store. It served my mother and father's generation. My generation and my children. Enter Earl Quillen as a clerk, later bought the store and house and kept "Ramsdells" Store until he moved to the present site on Dorman Street (where Knoxs apartments stood, but before Knoxs apartment, the site was Harrington Public School.) Remember? Mr. and Mrs. Ramsdell was active in church, school and civic matters.

Ramsdell's remembered your birthday, Christmas, when you were ill. Can't you remember some nice things about the "town" store with a kind-country heart?

Wasn't it fun going hand in hand with a special friend (to buy candy, ice cream or even get some groceries for the family?) Rationing time was hard on the Ramsdells. They tried so hard to see that all their customers got treated fairly. Remember?

Frankly Speaking

Heroes from another time

With Memorial Day upon us, my mind not only thinks about our courageous war dead and wounded, but to another type of fighting hero, the harness horse. With muscles straining to the limits of endurance, hearts pumping madly, these animals fight for every inch of ground they travel, not for their lives, although the harness wars are sometimes over for them very quickly, but for an inbred desire to win. Many a racehorse has come and gone since the first two horses were harnessed up for a race. Take a brief stroll into history with me, if you will.

In 1890 Hal Pointer was the first horse to beat 2:10 in a race; he won in 2:09 3/4 at Terre Haute, Indiana.

The first 2:00 pacer wearing hoppers

was Grattan Bars, 1:59 1/2.

In 1902 the horses driven by E. F. (Pop) Geers won \$116,370, and that record stood until 1915, when horses driven by T. W. Murphy won \$117,200.

Dan Patch, 1:55 1/4 paced in 2:00 or faster in 13 different states 30 times between 1902 and 1908 - 9 times in 1905 alone.

Single G, 1:58 1/2 never missed getting a purse check until he started in his 151st race.

Anderson Wilkes was 25 years old when he sired Single G.

Greyhound, 1:55 1/4, trotted a quarter in 26 3/4, a half in :56 3/4 and the third quarter in 1:26 for his record of 1:55 1/4. He trotted 24 miles in 2:00 or faster, nine of these were in races.

Sportsman's Park will take wagering on 10 races—the Driscoll Final, the New Jersey Classic Final on July 5, the Meadowlands Pace, the Sweetheart Final, the Mistletoe Shalee Final, Beacon Course Trot, Countess Adios, Tarport Hap on August 1, the Holmes and the Wilson.

Freestate's 11-race schedule includes all four legs of the Driscoll Series (May 16, 23, 30 and June 6), the Debutante on June 18, the Goshen Cup, all three legs of the World Cup, the New Jersey Classic and the Meadowlands Pace.

Foxboro will offer just three races—the finals of the Driscoll, Meadowlands Pace and Woodrow Wilson.

Browning scores second of season over record Late Model field

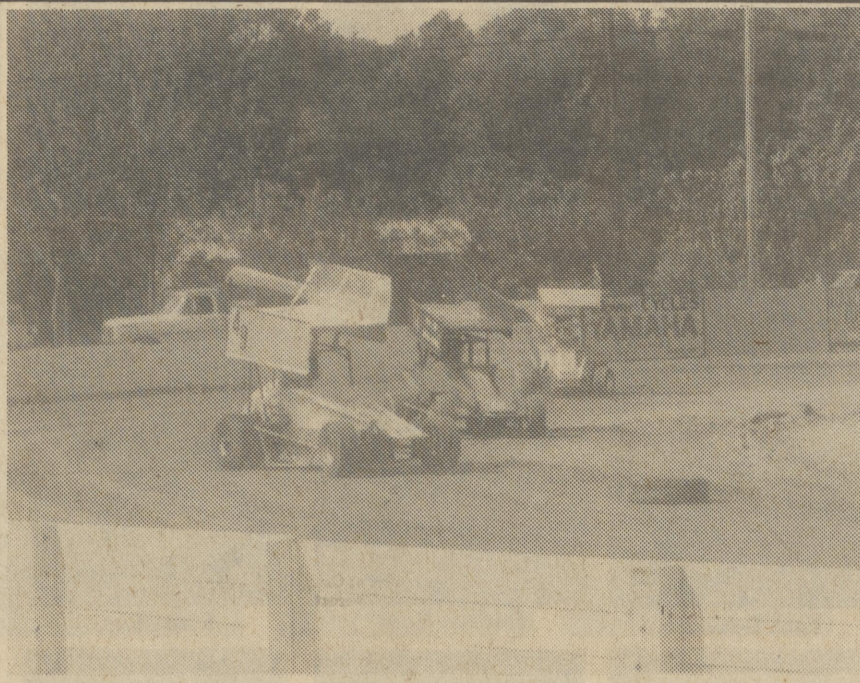
