Delmarva Chicken Festival is finger lickin' good

Special to the Harrington Journal SALISBURY - The Delmarva Chicken Festival, after being kayoed by the threat of avian influenza in 1984, returned to Salisbury, Md., Friday to the finger lickin' delight of an estimated 30,000 big bird lovers.

The 1985 Delmarva Chicken Festival kicked off at noon on Friday with formal opening ceremonies at the Wicomico Youth and Civic Center and continued through Sunday until 5 p.m. closing time.

The festivities included an arts and crafts show, a home and trade show, chicken industry exhibits, a carnival with rides and games, a gospel concert, antique cars and marching bands, along with many other attractions. Included among the many entertainment groups were The First United

States Army Band, The Sweet Adelines, The Epworth Quartet, The Banjo Dusters, Country Grass, Crystal Creek and the Stoney Creek Cloggers. A highlight of the festival was a series of zany competitions called "Chicken Capers--The Olympics of the Chicken World." Included were a chicken plucking contest, an egg toss, a chicken scratch for coins and a frying pan toss.

"We're doin' very well," laughed Dan. Cooking Contest this year. The contest, which is held in even numbered years, will be held again in June 1986. Because of Saturday's early rain, 11 of the 44 scheduled entries in the

festival parade were forced to cancel their participation. The Maryland National Guard parachute jump and Cobra Team exhibition also cancelled out because of the inclement weather. When the 1984 Delmarva Chicken Festival was cancelled because of the avian influenza threat, it was the first cancellation in the festival's 37-year

Delmarva's Giant Frypan, which is used to cook the estimated 8,000 chicken pieces consumed during the festival, can cook 800 quarters of chicken at one time. It requires 140 gallons of oil to fill There was no Delmarva Chicken it, and it takes 375 pounds of flour, 75 pounds of salt, 30 pounds of pepper and 30 pounds of paprika to cook the 8,000 pieces. When it was constructed in 1950 it was the largest known frypan in the world. It is estimated that more

than 100 tons of chicken have been cooked in the pan since 1950.

From its humble beginnings in 1923 on a family farm in Ocean View run by Mrs. Wilmer Steele and her husband, the commercial broiler industry has mushroomed into a multi-million-dollar industry. Delmarva is the fourth largest broiler production area in the country. Susssex County is the number one broiler county in the nation and annually produces over 50 percent more than the number two county, Washington County, Arkansas.

Over the weekend, Salisbury was one town in which you didn't place an order for pizza or hamburger. A cynic once said that life gives us "chicken today and feathers tomorrow." But Friday, Saturday and Sunday were the days of

The attempt to demolish the Tower was halted when The Harrington Historical Society learned of this. people like Grace Welch and Ken McKnatt of The Society began a long trek to gain title to the Tower for the Society.

It came to an end on Thursday night when representatives of Conrail's Real Estate Div. Edward K. Melchior and Jodi M. Powers, presented Ken-McKnatt, President of The Harrington Historical Society, Grace Welch with the deed to the Railroad Tower.

Others recognized for their efforts to

complete the transaction were Arthur C. "Buck' Cahall, III, Donald Jester, who was chairman of the drive to raise money to refurbish the Tower, and Todd Dennis, who in representing the Harrington Jaycees presented the Society with a check raised from the hay-ride at Halloween.

Entertainment was provided by Jimmy Emberlain's group which includes wife, Merle, and Novelle McReynolds. Bill DiMondi from Gov. Castle's office read aloud a proclamation giving credit to the Society and its members for their efforts to save the

Harrington Jaycees, who are celebrating their 25th year in Harrington for outstanding community involvement and work.


The Council also approved a new lease on City Hall to be \$350 per month, which is due to run for one year ending on September 1, 1986.



Short Takes on Area News Carper supports state position on Coastal Zone Management

WASHINGTON, D.C.-Congressman Tom Carper (D-DE) said today that he is strongly opposed to current efforts to compromise Delaware's Zone Act. "I am opposed to what the administration and some of my colleagues from coal states are trying to do," Carper said. "One of the basic tenets of the federal Coastal Zone Management Act is that what happens in the waters off our coast is best determined by our own people.'

"Delaware has an exemplary Coastal Zone Act that has long been approved at the federal level, and it has served us well. There is no question that this goes beyond Delaware's interests alone. What we are faced with is a threat to any coastal state's ability to control activities in its own waters.'

In April, the state Supreme Court upheld a ruling by the Delaware Coastal Zone Industrial Control Board. The ruling confirmed that the Act prohibited Coastal Barge Corp. from going ahead with the coal transfer operation at the

I was travelling south when I came to a road almost perpendicular to the road I was on, (the road slanted slightly to the north). I stopped at a stop sign, (verified by a witness). I proceeded to turn left and go east. I cleared the intersection and drove about sixty feet, (verified by a State Troopers testimony and a report from the building Inspectors Office). I stopped on the road for I saw another motorist, coming west out of a curve, driving in the middle of the road, (verified by picture of skid marks). I feared he would collide with my car on the left side and felt if I stopped, he would know where I was not going and could steer clear of my car. I cannot speak for the other motorist but it appeared that he noticed the same as I and became

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


