# Lister Hall retires after 30 years at ASCS Office



Lister Hall

Lister V. Hall is one of those people who is lucky enough to be available and to be at the right place at the right

Thirty years ago Lister Hall and his family had their tenant farm sold out from under them. Hall was without land to farm and no way to feed his family until he found another farm to lease. Charles Maske, a representative of the Agricultural Stablization and Conservation Service office in Kent County at the time, asked Hall to help him out for a few days as a field reporter. He retired as the agency's director. And thus, we have the beginning of an association that was to continue compatibly for the next 30

Lister Hall was born and grew up around the Bowers Beach, Frederica, and Harrington areas. His ancestry can be traced back to one of Delaware's

early governors (Governor Hall, 1880). His first name is derived from the married name of Governor Hall's daughter. His family were tenant farmers and Lister Hall has continued the farming tradition. Farming is not only an avocation for Hall, but a vocation as well. Farming is the only way of life Hall knows. His employment with ASCS has been an extension of that way of life.

Over his 30 year career with ASCS, Hall has seen big changes take place in farming. In the early days, farming produced a modest livelihood and enabled the family to eat well. Farm families worked from sun up to sun down with their laborers in the fields. There were a few pieces of equipment like tractors and combines. Much of the work on the farm was done with bare hands and bent backs. The work was dirty; the hours long and tiring. A good or bad harvest depended primarily on a

good strong back and the weather. Today's farm families still work from sun up to sun down. There are fewer laborers in the field. Much of the actual farming is done by machinery. The machinery is very large and elaborate with such added features as air conditioning and AM/FM radios. Backs and hands are still needed, but the crops are fed with fertilizers, pesticides, and other chemicals. The work is not quite as hard and dirty; the hours do not seem quite as long and tiring. The weather can still provide the farmers a lot of grief, but they irrigate now. Farming requires a large outlay of money, but may not realize a good return on the investment.

Lister Hall believes the major changes in agriculture have been realized because of the technological advancements. Agricultural technology has provided the farmer with a different way of approaching an old

problem--feeding the people. Better, more efficient equipment, advanced chemical tech., innovative farming methods and the conservative use of the land has enabled farmers to produce a better quality and a greater quantity of food. Hall feels the biggest change is the "No Till" method. With this method very little tilling or no tilling is done. A small narrow furrow is run, the seeds are planted, and the miracle of growing begins. The method conserves the land. There is no erosion and the seeds do not blow or wash away The advantages of this method are varied. It is quicker, because it saves time plowing, harrowing, planting, and weeding the field. The method also provides for conservation of the land. Less time and workers are used, but the cost of chemicals and equipment equals this out.

been government subsidies. In essence the government pays farmers for not producing as large a yield as is possible for them. The government also makes payments to the farmers if their crops fall below the target prices on the market. Subsidies provide various advantages. They help farmers maintain a reasonably stable financial status. Also, the market maintains a fairly stable condition, which will provide, at least, minimal profit for everyone. However, reduction of planting hurts our country in the foreign market. Because of the high cost of producing the food, we are required to sell at a high price. This high cost does not make us competitive with other countries which can sell their farm products

at a lower cost. Hall has seen changes in the farm community besides those caused by modern technology and subsidies. Beginning with the years around World War II, the government has set down various controls for the farmer. Price control started in those years. The farmers could produce all they wanted, but the government set a ceiling price. After those years, prices did not reach the ceiling, they spiraled downward. Farmers and the farm way of life took a beating. Later crop controls were introduced. Farmers were required to learn and understand something besides the land and the weather. it is sometimes difficult to control the amounts of food which will be produced. Govenment bureaucracy had to become a part of their work ethic. It was not an easy change. However, further refinement of the program

Another change Hall has seen has stability. Voluntary subsidies offer the been government subsidies. In essence farmer a guaranteed price higher than the current market value if they cutback voluntarily. Hopefully, the controls will help inflation remain low. A rise in the inflation rate can have many undesirable side effects.

Farming is not the simple process of planting a seed and waiting for the sun and the rain to help it grow. Agriculture is a mega bucks industry. Hall believes the ASCS helps to control the growth and the direction of the industry. ASCS is a system established for the administration of government subsidy and conservation programs. It is an arm of the US Department of Agriculture. There is an agency office in every county in the United States in which farming is done. Farming programs are administered at the local level in every county. Hall feels the administration of this program is excellent, because it uses the talent of local people for direction. The program's uniqueness has provided for its success. The role of ASCS is to make farming a structured, profitable bus-

Lister Hall believes this particular system works very well and would like to see it continue to operate as it does

Hall obviously believes and practices what he preaches. Two years after having to move from the land he had rented, he bought five acres of the same land he had been raised on. Hall has farmed his land through the years--subsidies, controls and inflation not withstanding. Now that he is from compulsory cutbacks and subsi-dies has provided farmers with more After all, the land is where his heart is. **new officers**
