## **Citizens oppose Riverbend at County Meeting**

#### by Cathy Hickman

Riverbend, a proposed mobile home park near Frederica, was given much opposition Thursday night at the Kent County Regional Planning meeting. The park would be situated on 451 acres located on U.S. 113. It would be adjacent to Barratt's Chapel, one and

1/2 miles southwest of Frederica. Numerous personnel from Dover Air Force Base attended the meeting, and much of their opposition was due to the fact that one of their C-5 flight approaches was directly over the site. This would mean that the planes would be flying with full thrust at only 1100 to 1700 feet above the ground. Forty to sixty planes a day come into Dover Air Force Base with the same approach. A retired air force officer argued that the base had a greater importance than the mobile home park.

sixty-five mobile home lots open right now. The population trend in Kent County is 100 people per month, which proves that there needs to be more omes available.

Tunnell's park will be equipped with tennis courts, swimming pools, playgrounds, recreation areas, a marina, plus other amenities that other parks in the area don't have.

The park will be fenced with a 6-foot chain link fence and a 6-foot landscaped buffer will be between the park and highway.

Rep. Wallace Caulk, president of the Barratt's Chapel trustees, represented

The trustees felt that the park would take away from the historical value of the chapel. The chapel had always had a backdrop of 200 acres of farmland and the trustees would like to keep it that

Caulk was also concerned with the rising problem of Frederica's sewer system.

The Department of Agriculture was opposed to the mobile home park because 3.4% of the land that would be used for the park is the best farmland in the state.

Tunnell attacked by saying that the Department of Agriculture was becom-

Ulysses S. Grant, a concerned citizen, complained that the park would cause an increase in conjested traffic on U.S. 113. He also stated that trees in the area where over 100 years old and charged that the Tunnells would have the trees removed. Tunnell defended himself by saying that their company would save the trees.

The commissioners of the Planning and Zoning board requested that the plan for the park be denied. The approval of the park is now up to

### **Houston Council resumes** meeting in August

HOUSTON. The Houston Town Council will not hold their July meeting. The regular meeting scheduled for the first Thursday of the month, which was a holiday, July 4, was postponed to the second Thursday of the month. This meeting was canceled because of a lack of a quorum.

The next meeting will be August 1, which will be the regular scheduled meeting.

### Harrington man charged with raping 13-year-old

HARRINGTON. Wagner M. Harmon, 23, of Harrington, was charged with second-degree rape on July 12 and is being held at the Delaware Correction Center in default of \$25,000 secured bond, according to Delaware State Police. On June 24 Harmon took a 13 year old girl to Stayton's Sand and Gravel Inc., on Kent 384, and allegedly forced her to have sexual intercourse. Harmon knew the girl. He then drove the girl back to Harrington and let her out near her home, said Cpl. H. David Young.

The incident was not reported until June 11.

### Chili Cook-off held in Milford

MILFORD. Delaware's first "Great Eastern Invitational Chili Cook-off and Chicken Barbecue" was held on Saturday at the farm of Charles and Lorraine West. north of Milford.

Governor Mike Castle won first prize for his secret chili recipe, but withdrew his entry and the prize went to the second place winner, a Dover law firm. The firm titled their entry "Assumption of Risk Chili". The chili contained chicken, pork, ground beef, tomatoes, and wine.

The firm won a Texas-size beer trophy and a round trip to California to compete for \$25,000 in the International Chili Cook-Off to be held in October. The proceeds from the event will be divided between the James S. Brady Memorial Foundation and the Kent County Republican Committee.

### University announces increases

The University of Delaware's 1985-86 tuition rates, are \$2,100 for Delaware residents and at \$4,800 for nonresidents. The previously announced tuition for Delawareans was \$1,825 per year.

Charges for part-time students also have been set for the coming year. The per-credit-hour rate for resident undergraduates will be \$88, up \$17, and \$117 for graduate students, up \$22. Nonresident undergraduates will pay \$200, up \$20 per credit hour, and nonresident graduate students will be charged \$267, an increase of \$28.

Tuition for the 1984-85 academic year was \$1,710 for Delaware residents and \$4,300 for nonresident students.

The FM station (WAFL) will have an adult contemporary format, which will play popular hits in all musical categories except hard rock. The AM station (WYUS) will have a country format unlike its old middle-of-the-road format.

Prettyman is the owner of the station and Kolobielski is the general manager.

Both Prettyman and Kolobielski own radio stations in Salisbury, MD. Prettyman owns WICO-AM and FM. Kolobielski owns WJDY-AM and FM. Kolobielski is originally from Milford and Prettyman is a native of Laurel.

## **Congressman Carper** visits Harrington

Delaware's Congressman Thomas R. Carper visited The Harrington Journal Monday to give his views on such important issues as deficit reduction. terrorism, and the inland bays' pollution problem.

Congressman Carper said that we should not "retaliate against terrorists camps until the other seven hostages are set free." Carper stated that hijacking could be terminated if the security at airports could be stricter and more cooperation with the UN (United Nations) could be achieved.

"I want to see the hijackers prosecuted for hijacking and murder. As a Navy man myself, the death of the US Navy man came down hard on me," said Carper about the recent hijacking of the TWA airplane.

Short Takes [Continued from page 1] Police warn pet owners of animal nappers

The Delaware State Police at Troop 3 are issuing warnings to pet owners about a scheme whereby people in the area are soliciting for free animals such as cats and dogs. These animals are then sold to illegal laboratories.

The solicitors usually state that they will give the animal a good home in the country. They also leave a false name and address.

The animals are then put through a 5 to 30 day conditioning period where they're wormed and vaccinated. They are then sold to a research laboratory from \$25 to \$200 depending on the demand and the species.

The animals are usually used for cardio-vascular, neurological, eye, and nutritional research.

The laboratory prefers dogs that are medium-sized short-haired, and of the hunting variety, especially labrador retrievers.

Cats of any breed are used.

No animals have been reported as stolen as of yet.

Investigators advise pet owners to "tatoo" their animals because researchers will not use these animals. Continued on page 3]





voted today to support the development of a public multi-use sports and education complex - the first of its kind in Delaware, and possibly the world. Under the Bond Bill Committee's recommendation, the state of Delaware will commit \$1.2 Million towards the creation of an Olympic caliber athletic training center, which will be Delaware." constructed on the site of the former Mount Pleasant Jr. High School. The center will also serve as a public recreation and education facility. In making its appropriation, the Bond Committee stipulated that release of the \$1.2 Million was contingent upon the commitment of \$800,000. in private to the state for its generous financial contributions.

After learning of the Bond Committee's vote, State Representative state would likewise show their finan-David Ennis, the primary supporter of cial support. the complex, said, "I've spent a long time on my knees over this one, my hopes and prayers have been answered." Rep. Ennis said the Bond Committee's vote means that Delaware can take a sizable first step toward the development of a comprehensive first class, multi-use sports facility. "It'll be the first of its kind in the world," he said, "combinind an olympic size pool and ice sheet, physical fitness equipment, housing for athletes, a sports medicine facility, cultural arts, a sports hall of fame and a history of Delaware's involvement in the Olympics." Ennis added, "It is also anticipated that high school and college level courses will be available to the athletes."

Supporters of the project hope to have the sports complex in operation in time for the 1988 Olympics. Phase one construction - the restoration of the former Mount Pleasant Jr. High School equipment for the ice sheet - will be completed in one year.

### Pedestrian struck and killed near Smyrna

Keller, 20, of Duck Creek Trailer Park, were struck by a car which drifted from the right lane onto the shoulder. The Datsun was operated by Duane Defebbo, 36, of New Castle, Delaware. Defebbo was uninjured in the 5:12 p.m. collision, and charges against her are pending the outcome of the investigation. Both Bowers and Keller were transported to the Kent General Hospital by the Smyrna American Legion ambulance. Joyce Bowers was pronounced dead on arrival at 6:28 p.m. Cynthia Keller, was treated for multiple abrasions and contusions and released. The death of Joyce Bowers is seven below last year's total on this date.

### Bridgeville crash kills 2, injures 1

BRIDGEVILLE. A Monday afternoon accident in Bridgeville killed two members of a Greenwood family and a third was injured when their car collided with a truck after running a red light at U.S. 40 and Delaware 404. Lizzie Johnson, 72, of Greenwood, was declared dead on arrival at Nanticoke Memorial Hospital in Seaford. Landy Williams, 50, of Greenwood, died at the hospital after suffering severe chest injuries and multiple broken bones. Both Johnson and Williamson were passengers.

The driver of the car, Fannie Williamson, 44, of Greenwood, was in serious condition, with severe chest injuries and multiple fractures.

John Sniegowski, 36, of Newark, was the truck driver and was uninjured. Seatbelts were not worn by anyone in the accident.





tives The legislation, H.B. #124 was sponsored by Rep. George "Bobby" Quillen, (R-Harrington) who called it long overdue. Speaking on the House floor, Rep. Quillen said it's beyond belief that mistreating a burial place would be anyone would even think about distur-

Quillen added, "Maybe the stiff fine associated with this legislation will make the social deviant think twice about joyriding in a cemetery."

The legislation also prohibits anyone clearing land from destroying old family gravesites.

Under H.B. #124 anyone found guilty of defacing damaging or physically subject to a fine of \$1,000 to \$10,000.


