Torgeson completing the top ten. Alvin Hudson, Jon Kane and Billy Walters were next.



## Farmland Assessment Act designed to aid farmers

by Harry G. Farrow Jr.

A legislative act passed in 1968 and amount of taxes a farmer has to pay. strengthened in 1976 by a Constitutional Amendment will be the subject of discussion through workshops by the University of Delaware in the downstate area some time in November.

This act called "The Farmland Assessment Act of 1968" is designed to give farmers and their land a tax break. Where city life began to move into the rural areas of this nation.... particularly in the industrial north, the call went up for government (who else) to enact legislation so that farmland near heavy development could continue to be treated as farmland....there-

by being taxed as such. In our state, New Castle farmland came under this plan for years. Not that Kent and Sussex Counties were not eligible....for they were, but development below the canal was going at a much slower pace. The need was not there. The rapidly ascending values on farmland as well as tremendous hikes in taxes in New Castle County enabled the plan to work there and come under this farm legislation.

When a farmer....and farmers in Kent and Sussex Counties are eligible for this program....go to their local tax office to apply for this tax break, their farmland is taxed on the basis of net farm income which the land produces. The farmer's house and buildings are not allowed under this program.

Prior to 1981 farmers in Kent and Sussex Counties have not had the need for such a program, because the taxes in both Counties were extremely low. There had not been many school referendums or reassessments of property values to cause farmers to be concerned with the amount they have had to pay in taxes.

Since 1981, according to Jerry Vaughn of the School of Agriculture at the University of Delaware, there is some cause for now making use of this

be to their benefit if they had. With the assessed values on farmland under this legislation being based on net farm income, it would be a plus to the farmers of down-state "....because for the most part the values we are dealing with here are negative now..... and have been for some time", added

Vaughn said that the savings in taxes might be as much as \$500 "...and I think most farmers today in these areas would greatly appreciate this".

Vaughn said many factors are effecting the income of the farmer here on the Peninsula. "Consistency in quantity and quality are factors to be dealt Harrington Sunday the Peninsula. "Consistency in quantiwith here. We have not always been consistent, and properly marketing your product is a very vital factor. Growers in other parts of this country are more consistent....and the markets react to that. It is natural. Anyone can see that", said Vaughn.

"The objectives of farmers here and elsewhere are another vital segment to the success of the farmers. They are combining proper use of their time as well as labor saving methods versus time spent at school of higher education and time off too. Some think our farmers have too much time off....but really they are trying to balance out all of these factors as people in other walks of life are facing and deciding," added Vaughn.

Today a farmer must be a "...good manager of everything...personnel, estate planning, and farm managing.... and that is why a farmer in Kent and Sussex must now look at this program. We will be in those counties in November with our team from the University....I hope we have some good attendance," said Vaughn.





operated off the owner's property. According to University of Delaware extension safety specialist Ron Jester. registration could change that. Many states are beginning to require registration for ATV riders. Identification and control can actually lead to greater



opportunities for riders as regulations and guidelines are established. Registration funds could be used to provide recreational riding areas. Registration also facilitates insurance coverage, resulting in limited liability and greater freedom in public riding.

It is increasingly common to require riders to complete a certified safety course in order to register their vehicles. The ATV industry stands solidly behind this movement. The Specialty Vehicle Institute of America (SVIA) was established and funded by the four major manufacturers of ATVs Kawasaki, Suzuki and Yamaha) to promote safety objectives.

Along with the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, the SVIA has issued a joint safety alert to warn consumers of the potential risks involved in operating an ATV. The Delaware Cooperative Extension Service has also joined in the effort to promote proper training for ATV riders and to increase familiarity with basic safety procedures.

In the last three years all manufacturers have brought out four-wheel models, expected to be safer than the original three-wheel ATV. But many riders who cut their teeth on the three-wheel model would rather fight than switch. Herb Clendaniel, ATV salesman and safety instructor for a dealership in Dover, vows, "The three-wheeler will always be my first love. There's nothing like it for excitement." He acknowledges that the four-wheel design is a bit more stable, but firmly believes that with proper training and practice a rider can learn

Maneuverability is one reason for the single front wheel enables the rider to make sharper turns than are possible with four wheels. Ironically, it is this popular design feature that makes the machine trucky to handle. However. while it hasn't been factually proven, many riders consider the threewheeler easier to handle than the four-wheeler on soft ground.
Clendaniel conducted a three-wheeler

As the workshop participants learned, there are many potential hazards in operating an ATV. Clendaniel emphasized that the term "all-terrain" should be modified in the rider's mind to "most-terrain," and that operators should always avoid paved surfaces and water deeper than 10 inches. master the unfamiliar design on rugged terrain, using the body as part of the machine in negotiating steep inclines and sharp turns.

Clendaniel pointed out that while one of the machine's attractions has been its potential for mud games, these too can present hazards. One of the most popular is "rooster," in which riders try to cover each other—or practically bury each other— in mud thrown from their ATVs. Statistics show that one frequent type of ATV-related injury is a wrenched back— from dragging mired ATVs out of the mud.

Riders should also be equipped properly. The instructor modeled a vast array of protective clothing from a basic helmet to a padded chest protector that looked like a cross between an umpire's uniform and a costume from "Star Wars". Head and eye protection is the most critical factor in safe riding. Clendaniel strongly recommended helmets offering the fullest possible facial covering, along with reliable goggles. The one other essential item of basic riding gear is some type of sturdy boot to support and protect the foot and

Before demonstrating hill-climbing and turning techniques, Clendaniel showed his Field Day audience how to do a routine "walk-around" safety and readiness check—which should be done each time a rider mounts an ATV. As with any vehicle, proper maintenance is important. Clendaniel advised all owners to know how to check their vehicle for damage, change oil and air filters, adjust their brakes, and adjust and lubricate the drive chain. "But all internal engine adjustment should only be done by a qualified mechanic," he emphasized.

"We fully support the ATV industry's efforts in safety training and promotion, and are developing programs that will supplement their safety drive," Jester says. "We want to see every rider get comprehensive safety train-
