

# Jim Blades records 100th Harrier victory

One of Delaware's most successful coaches in any sport is Lake Forest's Jim Blades. He also devotes many extra hours to any sport he coaches in order to give his teams every possible opportunity to win. Lake Forest's first dual meet of 1985 resulted in a hard-fought 25-32 victory over a tough Milford team at Milford.

The triumph was the 100th of Blades' varsity Cross-Country career against a meager loss total of 17. Blades' runners with the optimism of youth had already arranged for an engraved plaque for their leader plus a post-meet victory party.

Mark Tozer, the slender Spartan sophomore, is a budding superstar in

distance running. Mark excelled in the Junior Olympics this summer as he ran very well at 5000 meters against older rivals in qualifying competition. His efforts at the Delaware State level, the Middle Atlantic level and finally the Eastern Regional level earned him a berth in the National Championships in Washington State. Since he would have been, at age 14, competing against 16-year-olds, he wisely decided to forego the expense of the long, cross-country trip.

Mark recently turned 15 and has already established himself as the top distance runner in Kent and Sussex counties, and he also ranks high at the State level.

At Milford, Mark finished a whopping 35 seconds ahead of Chris Ayres of Milford, who may be the number 2 downstate runner, and he did it on Ayre's home course. He set a new course record of 16.41 in the process.

Eric Payne continues to improve and was only 14 seconds behind Ayres. Ray Powell was another seven seconds back. Payne and Powell are fine runners and, like Tozer, Billy Haggerty, Jon Kane, Shawn Torgeson and Brad Turner, got their start in the excellent program at W.T. Chipman School in Harrington, under the able tutelage of Coach Baxter Smith.

Mike Mosley was eighth at Milford, followed by Billy Haggerty, with Scott

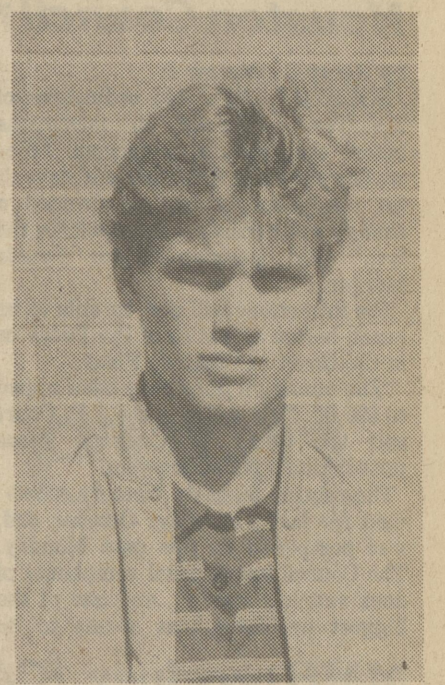
Torgeson completing the top ten. Alvin Hudson, Jon Kane and Billy Walters were next.

Pat Caskey, Shawn Torgeson, Todd Kramer, Randy Wroten, Jeff Davis and Brad Turner were others to contribute to Blades' 100th victory.

Milford has no girls' team this year, so the Spartan girls held a practice run. Kelli Felton toured the three mile layout in 21.04, with her sister Melanie running strongly to finish in 21.46. Five new prospects, Tara Dixon and Lorraine Lake finished close together with veteran Shirlaine Goodman in between them. Sherri Parson, Della Smith and Sheva Batton made up the remainder of the team.

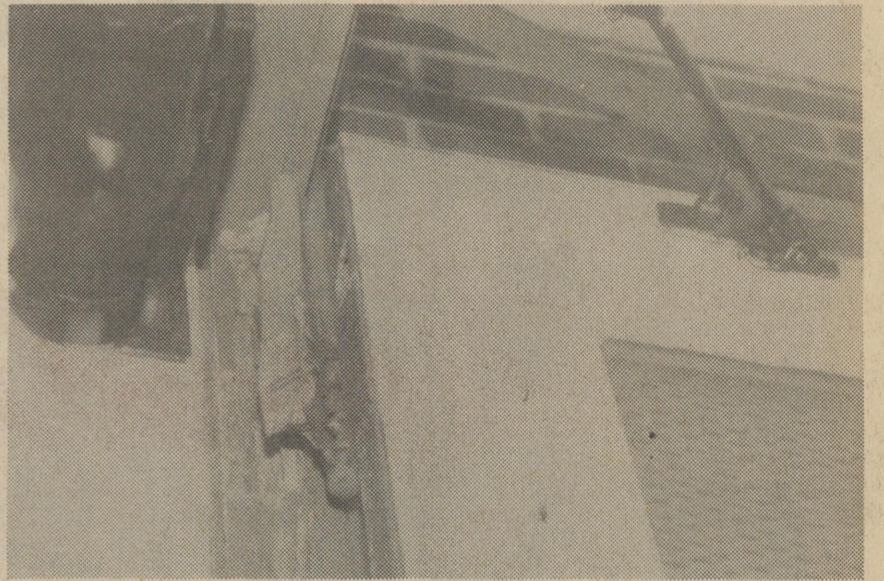

## Farmland Assessment Act designed to aid farmers

A legislative act passed in 1968 and strengthened in 1976 by a Constitutional Amendment will be the subject of discussion through workshops by the University of Delaware in the downstate area some time in November.

This act called "The Farmland Assessment Act of 1968" is designed to give farmers and their land a tax break. Where city life began to move into the rural areas of this nation... particularly in the industrial north, the call went up for government (who else) to enact legislation so that farmland near heavy development could continue to be treated as farmland...thereby being taxed as such.

In our state, New Castle farmland came under this plan for years. Not that Kent and Sussex Counties were not eligible...for they were, but development below the canal was going at a much slower pace. The need was not there. The rapidly ascending values on farmland as well as tremendous hikes in taxes in New Castle County enabled the plan to work there and come under this farm legislation.

When a farmer...and farmers in Kent and Sussex Counties are eligible for this program...go to their local tax office to apply for this tax break, their farmland is taxed on the basis of net farm income which the land produces. The farmer's house and buildings are not allowed under this program.

Prior to 1981 farmers in Kent and Sussex Counties have not had the need for such a program, because the taxes in both Counties were extremely low. There had not been many school referendums or reassessments of property values to cause farmers to be concerned with the amount they have had to pay in taxes.

Since 1981, according to Jerry Vaughn of the School of Agriculture at the University of Delaware, there is some cause for now making use of this

legislation designed to cut down on the amount of taxes a farmer has to pay. According to Vaughn, "...the farmers of Kent and Sussex should have made the shift since this time (1981). It would be to their benefit if they had."

With the assessed values on farmland under this legislation being based on net farm income, it would be a plus to the farmers of down-state "...because for the most part the values we are dealing with here are negative now.... and have been for some time", added Vaughn.

Vaughn said that the savings in taxes might be as much as \$500 "...and I think most farmers today in these areas would greatly appreciate this".

Vaughn said many factors are effecting the income of the farmer here on the Peninsula. "Consistency in quantity and quality are factors to be dealt with here. We have not always been consistent, and properly marketing your product is a very vital factor. Growers in other parts of this country are more consistent...and the markets react to that. It is natural. Anyone can see that", said Vaughn.

"The objectives of farmers here and elsewhere are another vital segment to the success of the farmers. They are combining proper use of their time as well as labor saving methods versus time spent at school of higher education and time off too. Some think our farmers have too much time off...but really they are trying to balance out all of these factors as people in other walks of life are facing and deciding," added Vaughn.

Today a farmer must be a "...good manager of everything...personnel, estate planning, and farm managing.... and that is why a farmer in Kent and Sussex must now look at this program. We will be in those counties in November with our team from the University...I hope we have some good attendance," said Vaughn.

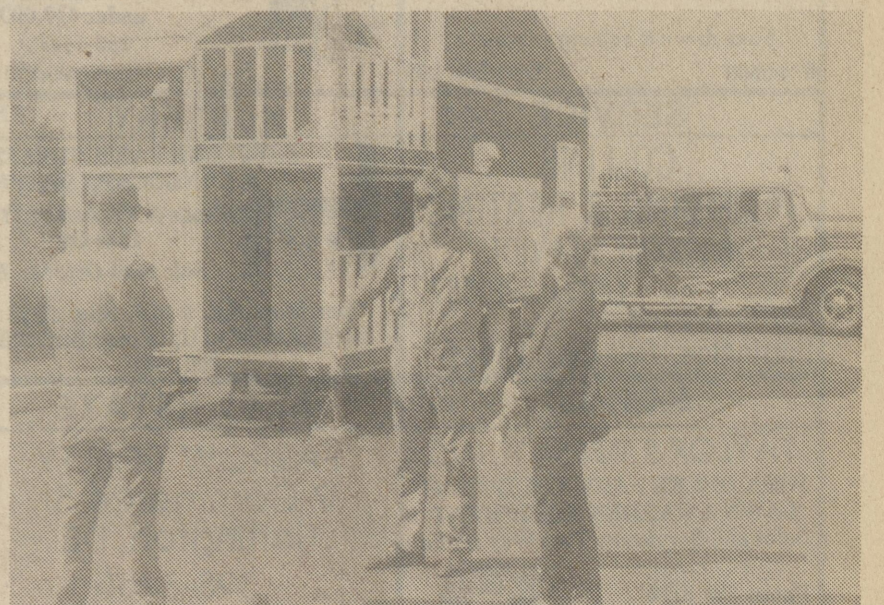
The event also kicked off Fire Safety Week. Fire Safety Week begins on October 6 and will end on October 12.

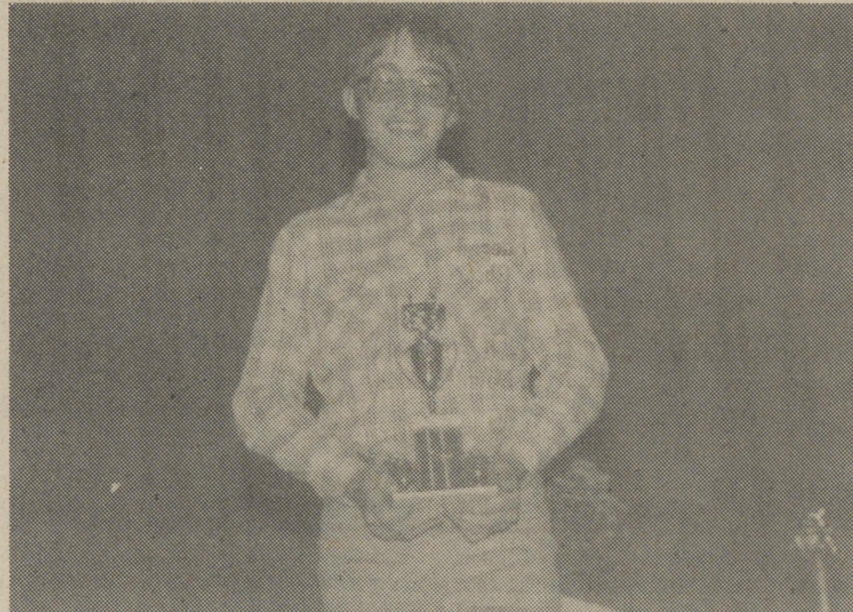

## DP&L sponsors good neighbor energy fund for third year

Delmarva Power & Light Company continued its good Neighbor Energy Fund drive for the third year with a check for \$8,000 to the Salvation Army of Salisbury recently. The fund is designed to help people throughout the Delmarva Peninsula who are having trouble paying their energy bills.

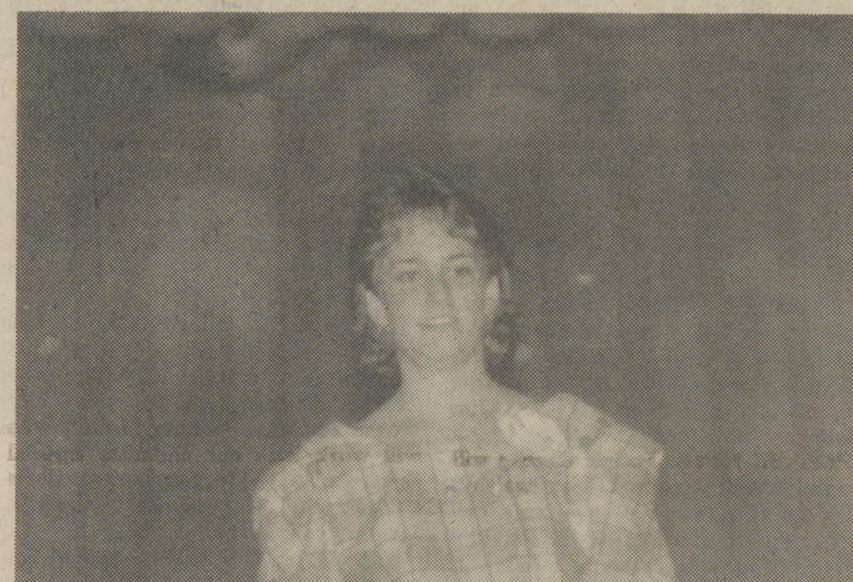
"Each winter, many people on the Delmarva Peninsula face losing their heat because they cannot pay their

electric or natural gas bills. Our experience shows that most of the people are willing to pay for the energy they use, but for some unexpected reason — loss of job, health problems, and others — they can't," said Martin F. Duffy, manager of consumer affairs for Delmarva Power.

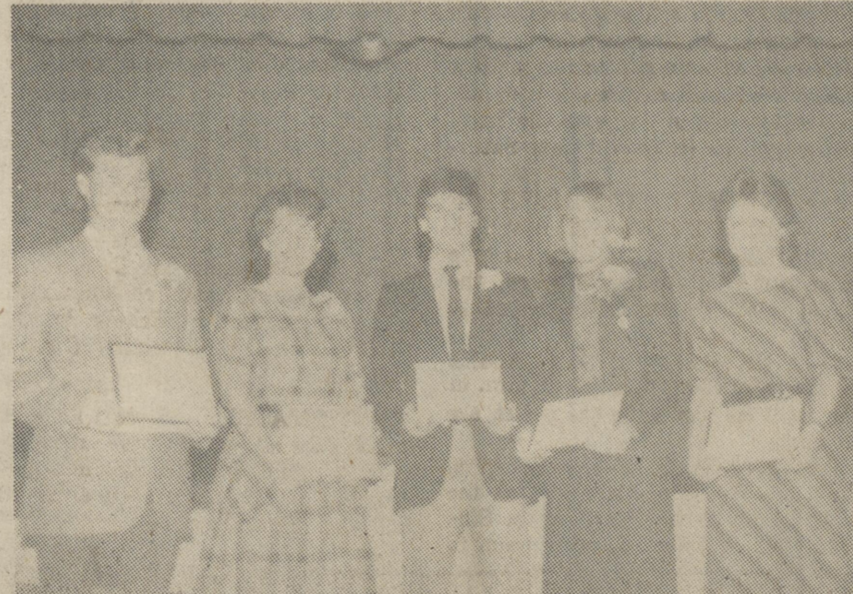
"Together we can help these people," Duffy said.

Delmarva Power has asked the Salvation Army to administer the fund throughout the Delmarva Peninsula. The Salvation Army will make all the decisions about distributing the fund. Checks should be made payable to the Good Neighbor Energy Fund and sent to the Salvation Army. Pre-addressed envelopes can be found in October and November electric bills. To reduce expenses, customers' cancelled checks will be their receipts.

"Last year, more than \$144,000 was raised through this fund to help more than 2,800 family members on the Delmarva Peninsula," said Duffy.

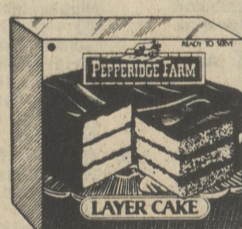

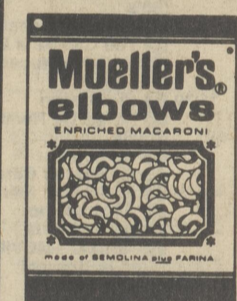
