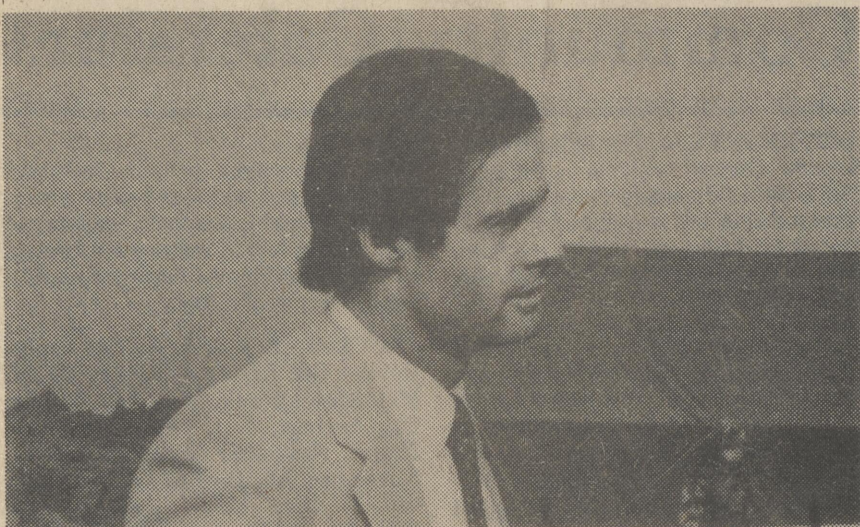


Congressman Carper visits Harrington



U.S. Congressman Thomas Carper

 HARRINGTON — U.S. Congressman Tom Carper (D-Del) was in Harrington a week ago Monday where we joined up with him at the Harrington Senior Center for a very well prepared meal.
 Congressman Carper was asked about his position of the current crisis involving savings and loan institutions across the nation where the current crisis is centered in Maryland. Carper said that there is legislation which he has sponsored in Congress...since he is a member of the U.S. Banking Commission...in which "...we will be able to strengthen our system with the

S&L by an early warning system...so that the matter does not get out of hand too late."
 Carper also said this involves strict examinations of the bank's records. "We need to be able to free up examiners so that they do not come directly under the banking institution which they are examining," he said. He recommended higher pay for the examiners.
 He also added that institutions such as those in Maryland where the matter has gotten out of hand is to prevent high risk loans, and more diversification of loans, and staying away from loans to lesser developed nations where it is not

feasible for a lending institution to do so without risk. "In general I think we are saying let's shore up the entire financial system," he added.
 One of the recent legislation which Congressman Carper is involved from a sponsor standpoint is "...the oil spill liability." "This legislation allows us a uniform federal law for state and nation to make sure the vessel owners...as was the case recently in the Delaware River to pay for the damages," he said. It is the super-fund bill which Carper discussed. Congressman Carper also sits on the U.S. Maritime commission.
 He was asked...since he is a veteran Navy pilot...how he felt about John

Walker's role selling information to the Russians. "I have recently co-sponsored legislation that would allow us to deal with the death penalty where people are convicted of crimes much of which Mr. Walker has been charged", he said.
 He added that we have to look at who is getting clearances, "...and also whether the cause is a cause...which might have been interpreted as the case with the Rosenbergs verses those who turn the information over for money." He also said we need to be more selective on who gets these clearances.
 "On balancing the budget...well he approves...but more on that next week.

MMH receives Grant

Milford Memorial hospital was recently notified that its Medical Library is to be the recipient of a \$4,000 grant to improve and update its book collection. The grant is being provided by the National Library of Medicine and was made possible through the circuit riding program of the Delaware Academy of Medicine. According to Mrs. Gwen Elliott, Milford Memorial Hospital's Medical Library supervisor, this is the first grant ever to be made in Delaware. Milford Memorial Hospital

will add \$1,000 to this grant so that a total of \$5,000 will be available for the upgrade of the library's book collection.
 The Circuit-Riding Medical Library service of the Lewis B. Flinn Library of the Delaware Academy of Medicine, which made this grant possible, is one of only 15 in the country. Circuit library programs offer professional library services to small or remote medical facilities that otherwise would not have access or be able to bear the cost of such services.

"Share the Wealth" cited for fraud violations

A Georgia company that is selling discount coupon books in Kent County has been cited for violations of the State Consumer Fraud Act and the Delaware Home Solicitation Sales Act. MC Advertising, doing business here under the trade name "Share the Wealth" and company president Mark Steinberg have agreed to halt unlawful business practices, alter their telephone sales operation, and offer refunds to customers who have purchased their discount coupon books.
 According to Consumer Affairs Director Donald E. Williams, the company has entered into a Consent to Cease and Desist Order founded on allegations that "Share the Wealth" misrepresented its product and used deceptive language in its telephone sales pitch. Williams said, "Share the Wealth was using a cleverly programmed telephone sales pitch that was potentially misleading and confusing. It could have led consumers to believe that they had won free gifts,

when in fact the company was not making any free gift offers."
 "Since July, "Share the Wealth" has been selling discount coupons redeemable at several local businesses on a variety of products and services. A book of coupons was priced at \$29.95. Potential customers are contacted by telephone, and if they agree to buy the coupon book, a salesperson is dispatched to their homes to deliver the product and collect payment.
 Upon payment for the coupon book, customers receive what the company describes as a "free gift selector", a sealed envelope containing a valuable "free gift" offer. Each envelope contains a voucher and an order form for one of eight products, and instructions on how to claim the merchandise from a California mail order company.
 Williams said, "In order to claim the free gift, one must pay an assortment of

Harrington Sunshine 4-H honors Jane Everline

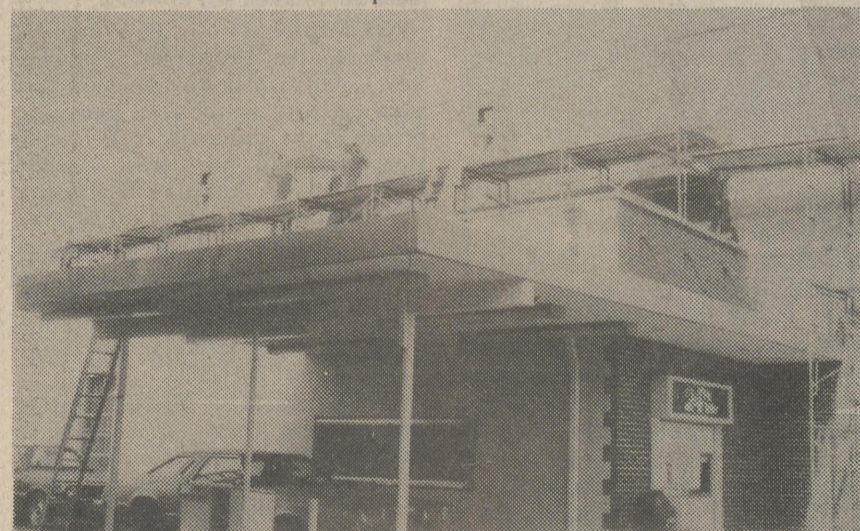

Harrington loses water pressure

HARRINGTON — The City lost its water pressure on Monday night. The rain storm broke the power line near the water pumping station when a fuse blew out. The current was off at the pumping station for 8 hours. "There was no indication that anything was wrong, because nothing else was out. It was only when people started calling in that we discovered the problem," said City Manager George Volenik.
 Delmarva Power responded immediately, restoring the current so that the water pumps could begin pumping again. The outage caused the water tower to be drained.

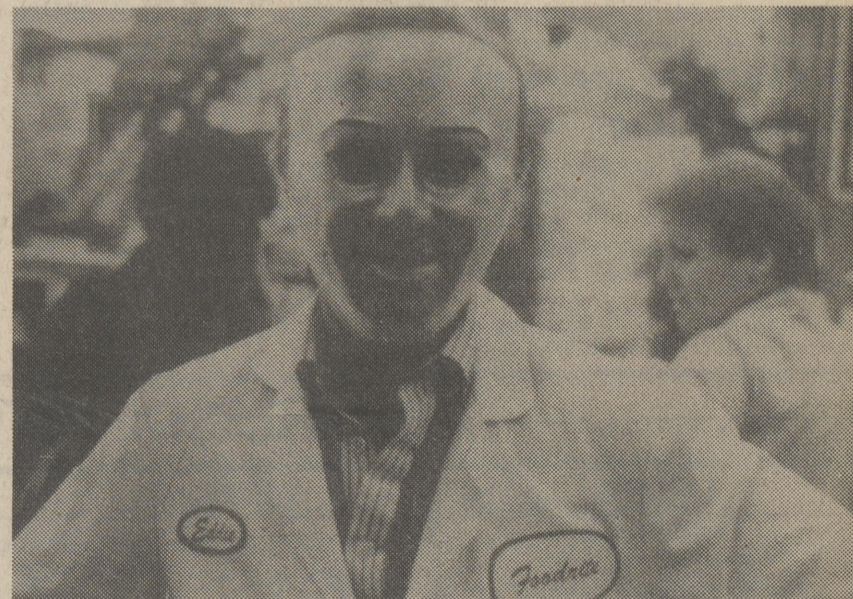
Improving conditions for laboratory animals

WASHINGTON — "We know that animal abuse in the laboratory exists, and that it can be stopped," Senator William V. Roth, Jr., R-Del., said of his sponsorship of legislation requiring more humane treatment of animals used in research. The Senate passed the legislation by voice vote.
 The Improved Standards for Laboratory Animals Act would require research laboratories to use research methods that minimize animals' pain and sets up Institutional Animal Committees to monitor compliance by research facilities.
 The act would also require the cage and other physical environments to be adequate to suit the needs of the animals involved. In addition, the legislation would establish a central information center of the results of past experiments to encourage researchers to review what has already been discovered before they begin experimentation.

National Accreditation achieved at KGH

Kent General Hospital has been granted a maximum-termed Certificate of Accreditation from the nationally respected Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals (JCAH).
 Hospital President Dennis E. Klima explained that participation in the comprehensive evaluation is "completely voluntary," and "a way which the health care industry can police itself to keep standards high."
 He expressed satisfaction in KGH's ability to earn a full three-year renewal certification "at a time when we are undergoing expansions in both services and facilities."
 To ensure a smooth review process by the JCAH team last spring, Hospital Vice President Jim Reber appointed a 14-employee task force a year earlier to "review from within, the quality of both service and care provided in each department, and to also look critically at the service environment." Heading this review team was Assistant Administrator for Patient Services Mark F. Letavish, aided by Douglas A. Beish, Technical Laboratory Manager.
 Also serving on the Task Force were KGH managers Brenda Burt, RN.; Phyllis Counterman, R.N.; John Fifer, Kathryn Hall, R.N.; Benjamin Inloes, Michael Karolczak, Mary Paullisky, James Preising, Cheryl Rogers, R.N.; Bernice Romanowski, Vera Sztivich, R.N.; and Maureen Wessel, R.N.
 Letavish said the JCAH evaluators pinpointed the area of Quality Assurance as particularly high rated.
 The recertification also qualifies the Hospital to continue receiving federal Medicare funds.

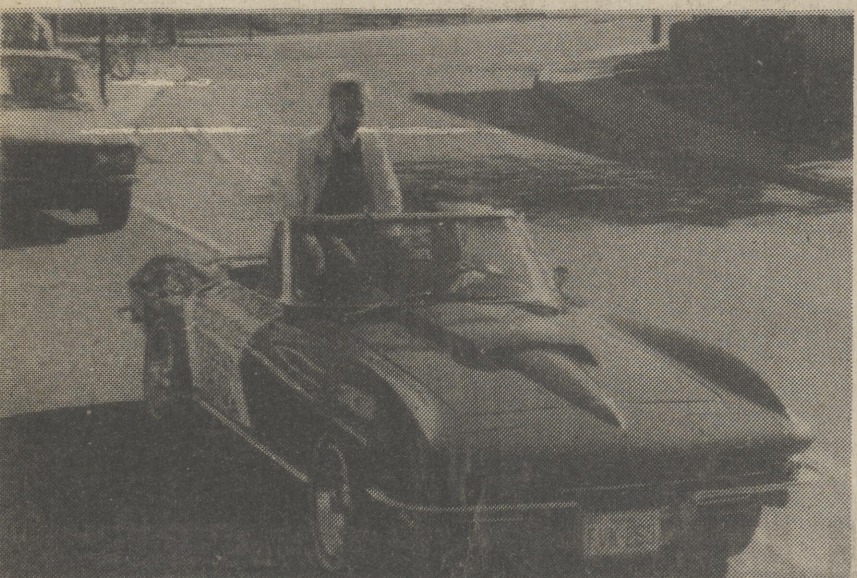
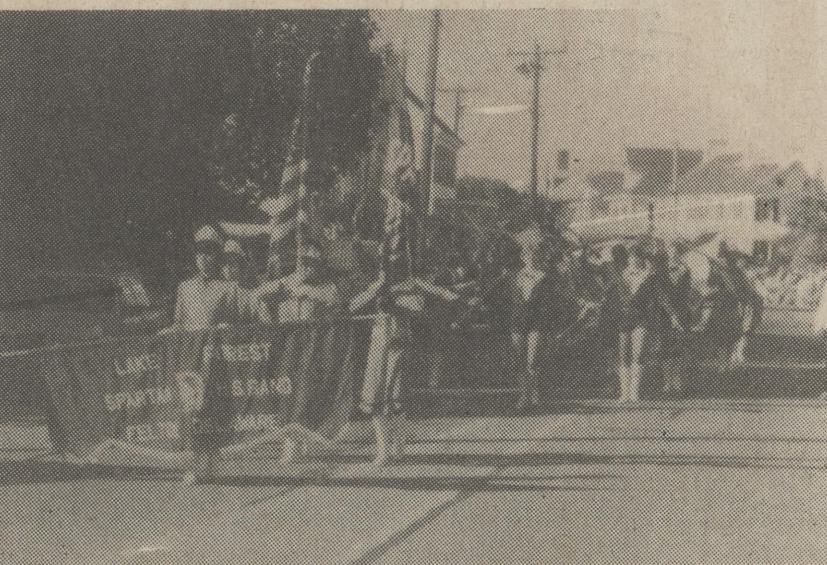

shipping, handling, and insurance fees, not to mention a sales tax. The charges range from \$25 to \$142, depending on the type of product described in the voucher.

Although "Share the Wealth" president Mark Steinberg disavows any business connection between his company and the California mail order firm, Steinberg has agreed to deposit \$500 into an escrow account for the purpose of paying any legitimate claim of any customer who does not receive a gift item as represented in the promotional literature his company distributed to purchasers of the coupon books.

Customers who participate in the gift award program and who either do not receive the merchandise within the time period promised or who do not receive a gift conforming to what was advertised are entitled to a refund of

all charges paid for such merchandise by writing to "Share the Wealth" at its offices at P.O. Box 452, Conyers, Georgia 30207.

Williams is also asking anyone with a complaint about the gift offer to contact the Division of Consumer Affairs at 736-4000 or 571-3250.

"Share the Wealth" has also agreed to offer a refund to any consumer who has purchased a coupon book at a cost in excess of \$25. This refund offer stems from violations of the State Home Solicitation Sales Act. Since the coupon books were priced over \$25, "Share the Wealth" was required to inform buyers of their right to cancel the purchase within three business days from the time of sale. This law applies to all door-to-door sales contracts of \$25 or more. "Share the Wealth" has agreed to advertise the refund offer in the Delaware State News.

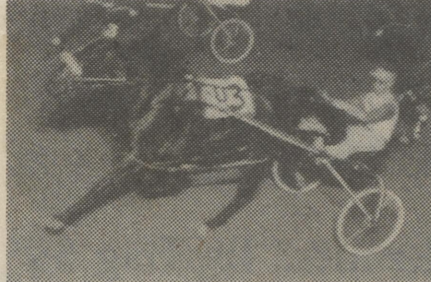

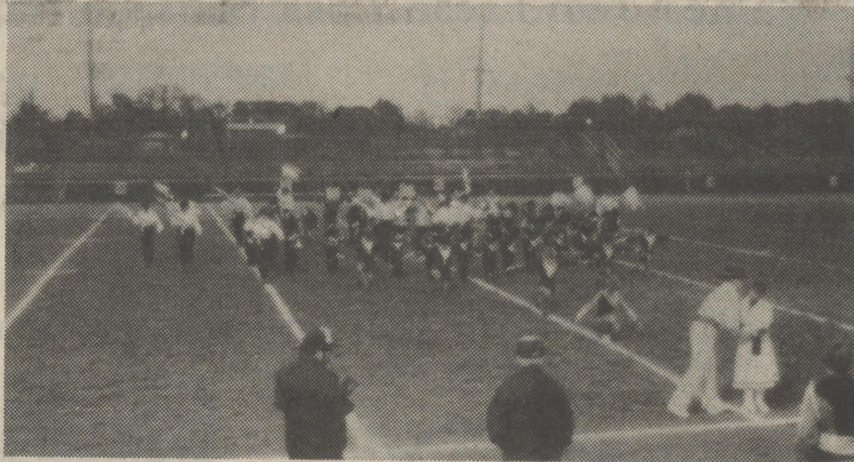

Social Security for divorced persons

As a divorced individual, you should be aware of what protection Social Security can provide at the time of death, disability, or retirement.

Unmarried children can receive monthly benefits when either parent insured under Social Security dies or is entitled to disability or retirement checks. Their payments continue to age 18 (19 if still in high school) or to any age if disabled before 22.

If you are caring for a child under 16 or disabled who is getting benefits on your deceased former spouse's record, you may be eligible for checks also if your earnings are limited.

If there are no children, you can receive benefits on your former spouse's record if your marriage lasted at least 10 years. If he or she is alive, you can receive payments as a divorced spouse at 62 or older; even if your former spouse has not yet retired (provided you have been divorced at least two years).

As a divorced widow or widower, payments generally can start at age 60. However, they can begin as early as 50 if you are disabled.

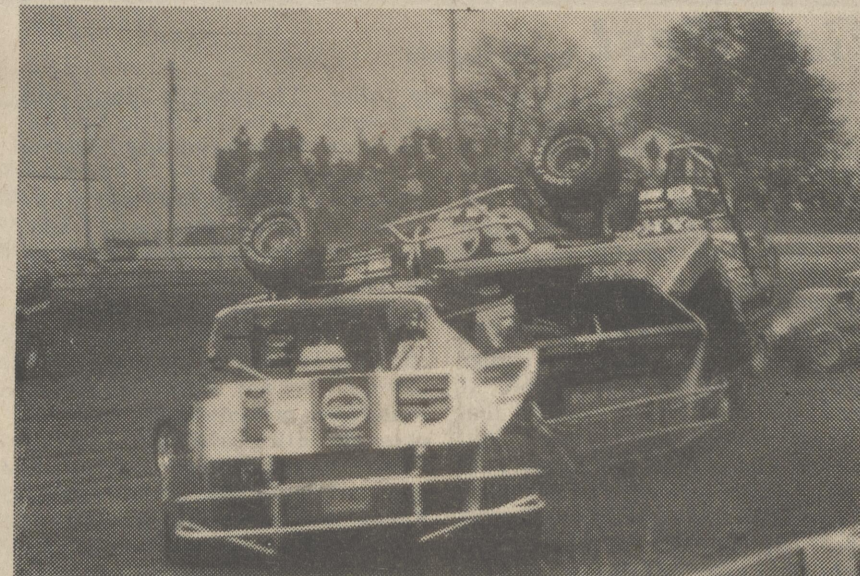
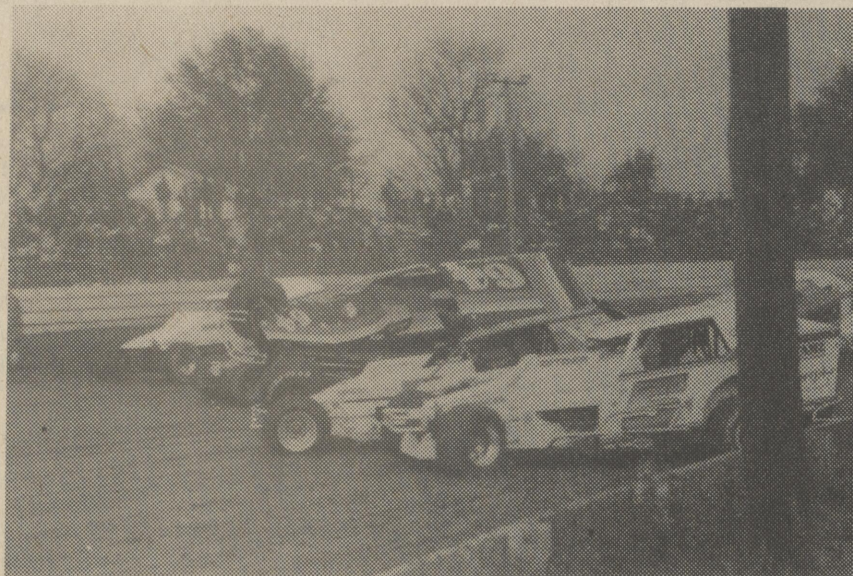

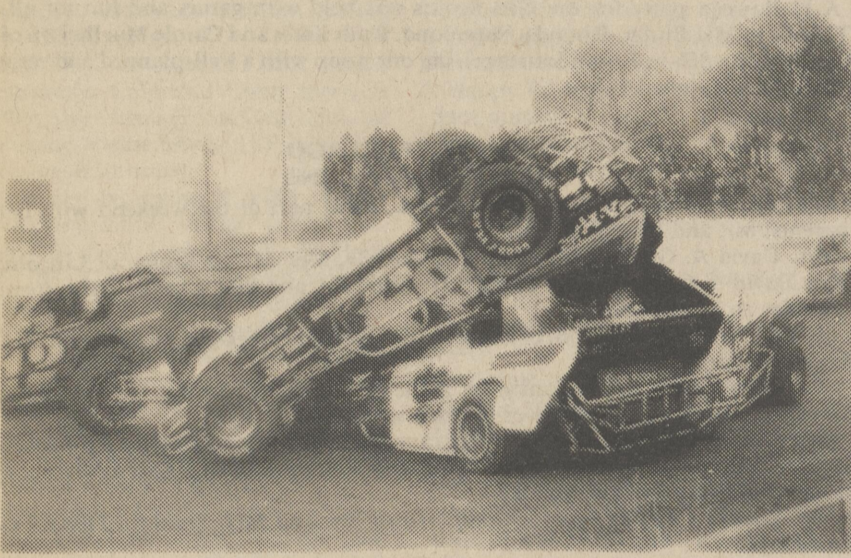

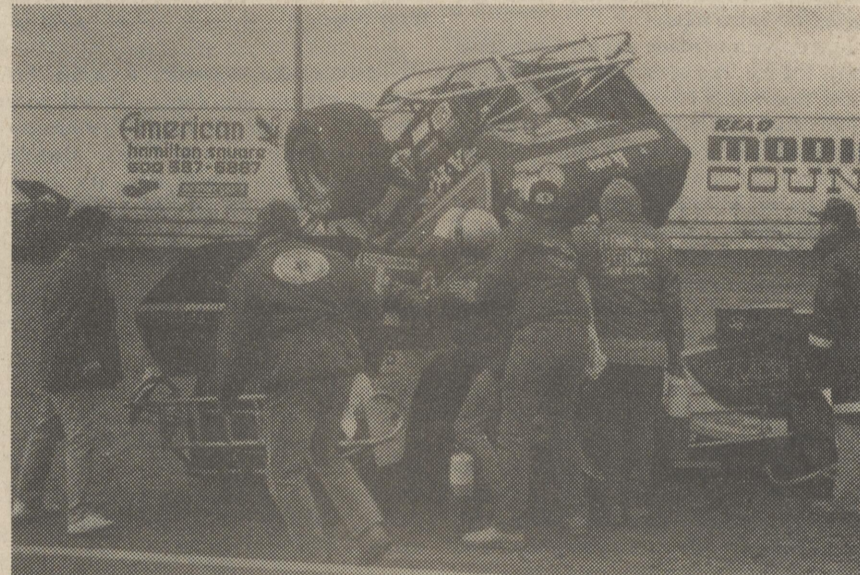

Bill Elliott wins Atlanta Journal 500

HAMPTON, GA — Red-headed Bill Elliott ran to his 11th victory of the season on Sunday in the Atlanta Journal 500. He picked up \$57,650 for his efforts pushing his record setting season total to \$2,034,468. Not bad for a relatively new comer to NASCAR Grand National racing...and especially one who still resides in his grandmother's basement.

It was a good day for Fords as the 28 car of Cale Yarborough followed Elliott through the finish line. Cale led 134 laps while Elliott was not only the race winner, he was also the lap leader with 169. He also pulled down the Gatorade Circle of Champions winner. There were four cars on the lead lap. Following Yarborough were Waltrip and Earnhardt in Chevrolets. Yarborough picked up \$29,600 for his efforts over the afternoon while Waltrip and Earnhardt picked up \$21,125 and \$15,300 respectively.

Kyle Petty's Ford was running extremely well prior to his accident with Sammy Swindell. A.J. Foyt and Michael Waltrip were involved in an early race accident with Clark Dwyer when that car riding high on the racetrack, drifted into the wall coming down on the bottom of the race course taking out Waltrip and Foyt.

Elliott's winning time was 1:39.597 mph winning by a margin of 4.2 seconds. Harry Gant who led the first 10 laps and 15 overall was the pole sitter at 167.940 (32.626 seconds). Tim Richmond was the second round qualifier while Davis Marcus got the Times Timeliest Move award and Kyle Petty got the Goody's Headache award.

Although Elliott ran well all day, caution flags nearly cost him a win. On one other occasion brother Ernie, the crew chief on the Coors Ford, recalled brother Bill following one pit stop saying later that he thought a wheel lug was loose. It wasn't and this slowed Elliott plus causing him to make up eleven places at the time.

When the Elliott Ford stayed out on the race track without any cautions or interruptions "it flat ran away from everyone", one spokesman at the track said.

Morgan Shepherd turned in a good day of racing finishing 5th and earning just over \$7,000. Terry Labonte earned \$15,025 for his 6th place finish while Harry Gant who finished 8th picked up \$15,675.

The leading money winners are Elliott with \$2,034,462 followed by Waltrip with \$910,948, Gant with \$663,465, Labonte with \$563,475, Bodine with \$475,065, Earnhardt with \$455,983, Bonnett with \$417,320, Rudd with \$411,535, Yarborough with \$310,465, and Lake Speed with \$261,005 rounds out the top 10.

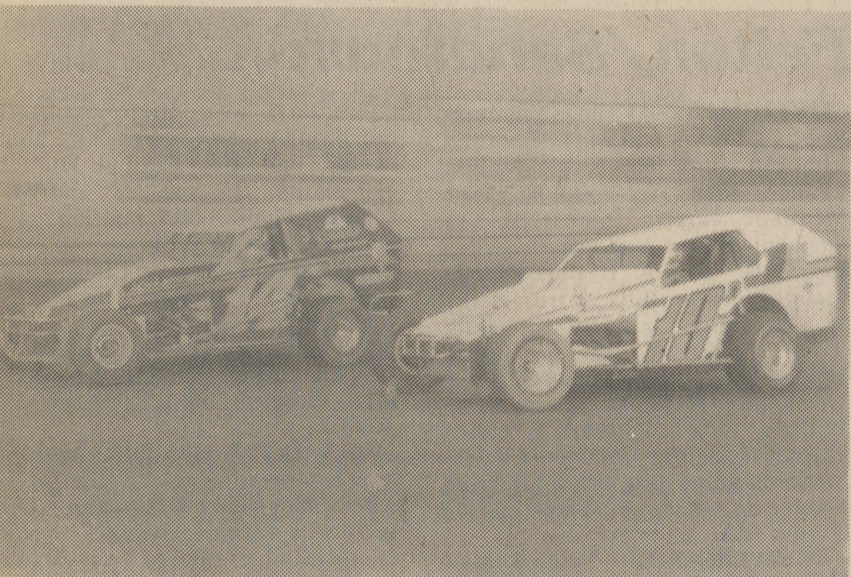

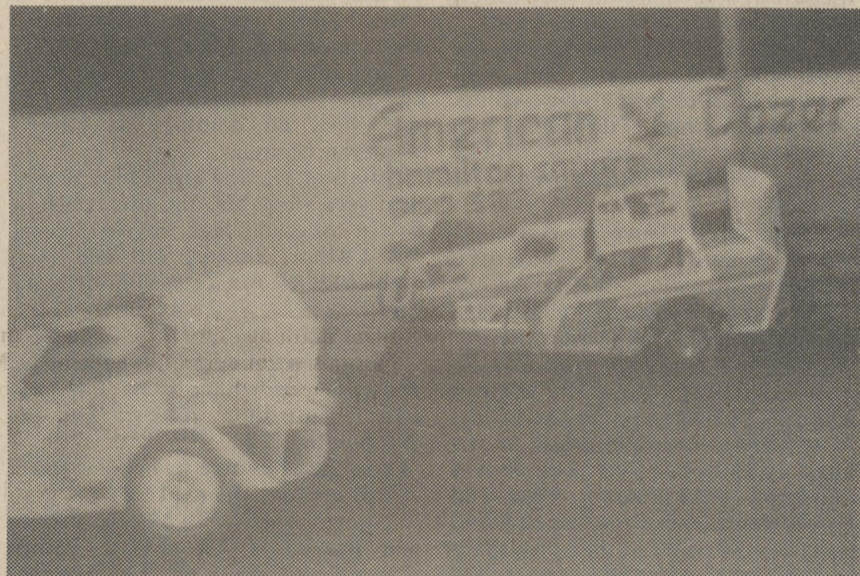

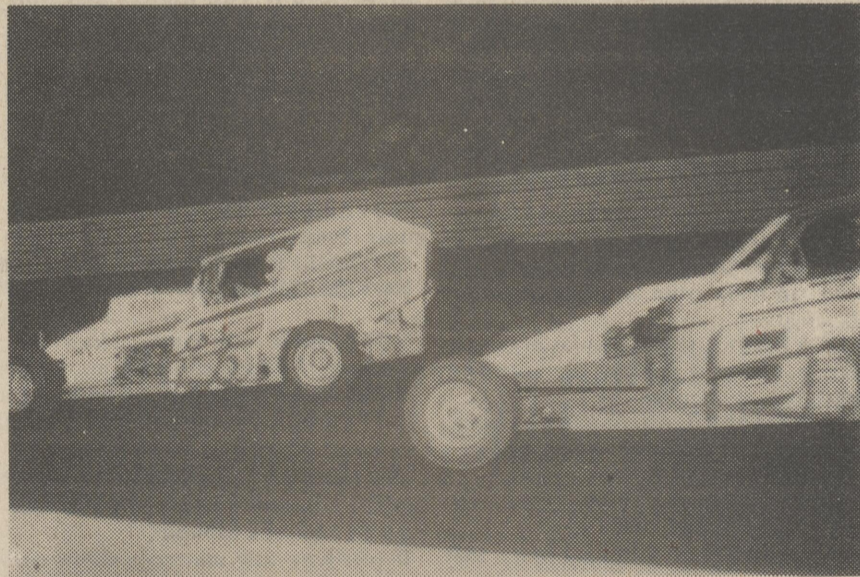

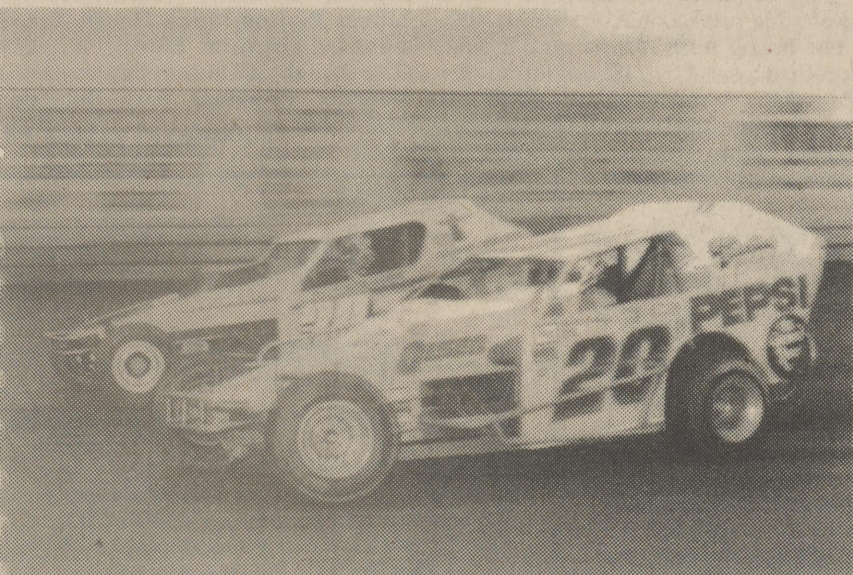

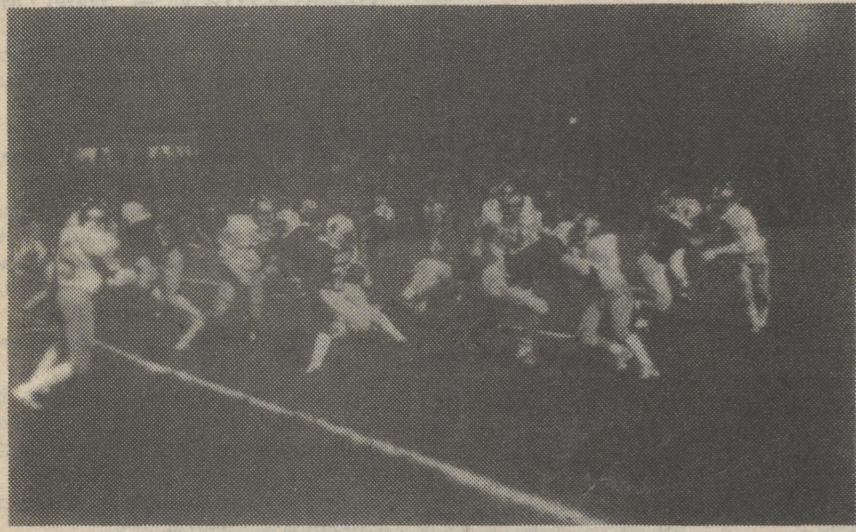

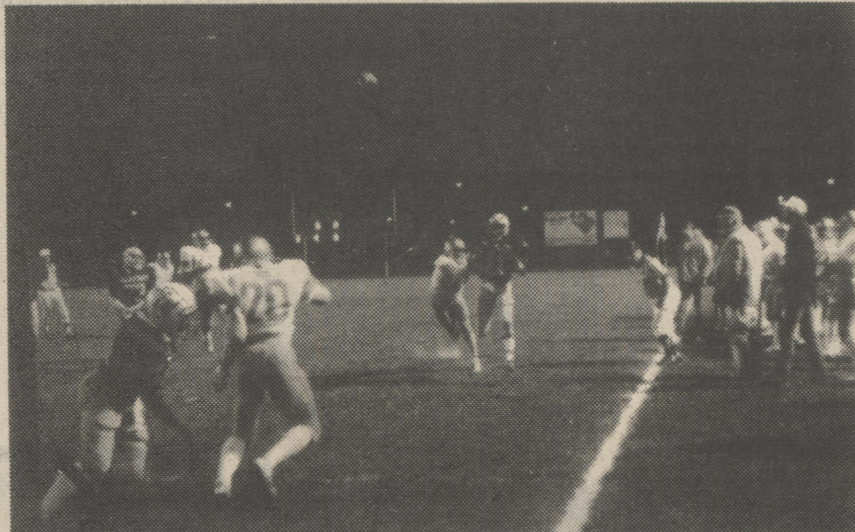
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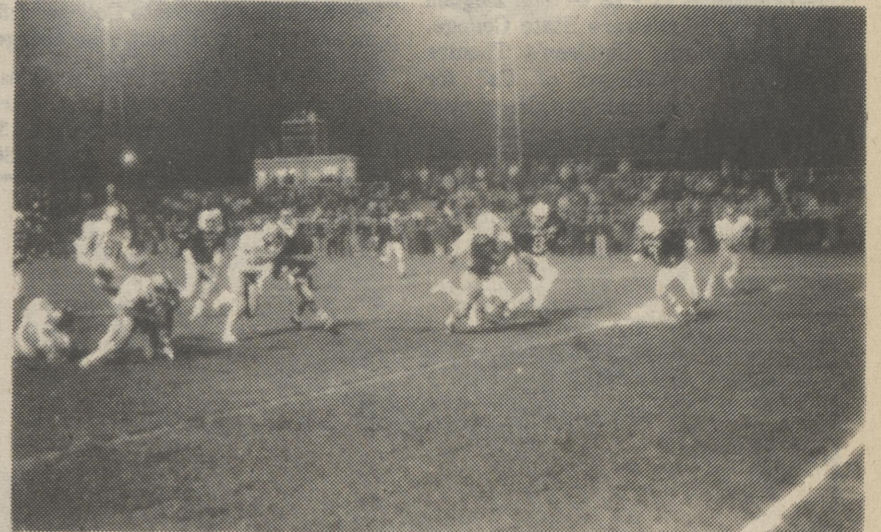

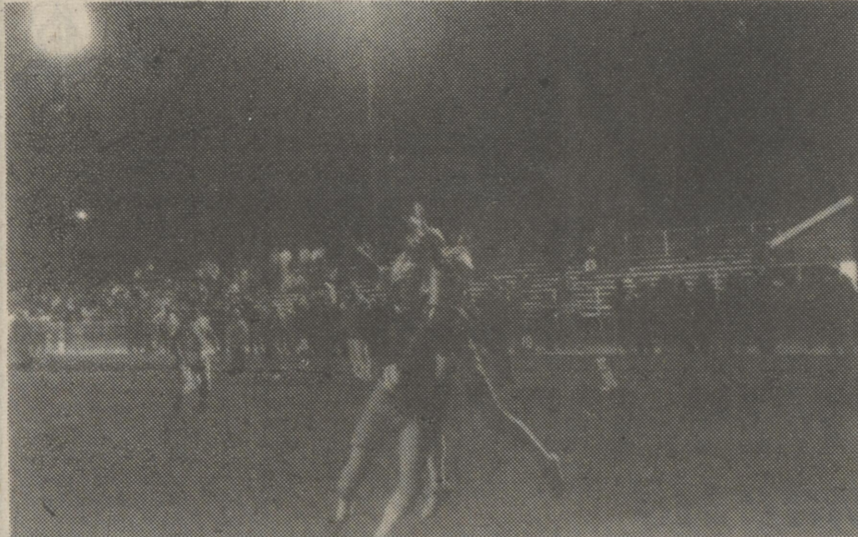

The Father of Veterans Day

"The nation which forgets its defenders will be itself forgotten," said former President, Calvin Coolidge.

As we doff our caps this month in reverence and remembrance of the legion that did not return, we pay special homage to a life-long Legionnaire who provided the spark that turned Nov. 11 into a national observance to honor our nation's war veterans: Max C. Floto, "The Father of Veteran's Day."

Floto, World War I veteran, began campaigning for a holiday to honor veterans while attending the second meeting of his hometown Milton L. Bishop Post 301, Connellsville, Pa., Sept. 11, 1919. The post passed the motion and Floto presented it to the Pennsylvania department convention, which also passed it.

The holiday proposal also was among resolutions adopted by the first National American Legion Convention in Minneapolis in 1919.

Floto then pushed for the state itself to recognize the day and, on March 31,

1921, the Pennsylvania legislature designated as a legal holiday Nov. 11, the date on which the World War I armistice became effective.

Working with Thomas W. Scott, a fellow veteran from Connellsville, Floto and other supporters talked with and wrote to congressmen and, on May 13, 1938, President Franklin D. Roosevelt established Nov. 11 as an official national holiday: Armistice Day.

In 1954 the name was changed to Veterans Day to make the observance appropriate for those who had served in two wars since the original measure was passed. When efforts were made to change the observance to the fourth Monday in October, Floto successfully lobbied against the idea.

In 1978 Floto was presented with a congressional award recognizing him as the father of Armistice Day. He died Jan. 25, 1985, at age 88.
