Daisy has been rearrested

HARRINGTON — "It's getting a little ridiculous now", said one citizen of Harrington when told that Dog Warden, Donald Aliff, had reappeared in Harrington and arrested Daisy again. Aliff tried to catch Daisy, but she was too smart for him. "She is onto his ways", added another citizen of the Town. Instead Aliff tried unsuccessfully to serve a warrant on postman Frank Collins, but Collins said "...I am

not the dog's owner. You can't serve me. Daisy follows me or any other postal employee with this mail cart," said Collins.

Instead Aliff quickly appeared at the door of Daisy's owner Mrs. Pat Maher, who was not only shocked to see Aliff "but quite alarmed. Now it is getting to the point where it is more harassment than anything else," The Dog Catcher and his supervisor

John E. Caldwell are saying that Daisy was not always in Collins' sight, and therefore was classified as "...on the loose." But Collins says that the dog is in his sight.

Meanwhile Daisy is arrested and awaits trial, but other dogs including strays for the most part go untouched. Citizens are still complaining about "strays" getting into their trash, "...which is not the kind of thing Daisy

does," one citizen said.

One report had it that Attorney General Charles M. Oberly, III was really surprised to learn that Daisy had been rearrested. He had dismissed

charges against Daisy on September 25 when Daisy's owner, Pat Maher had asked for a jury trial in the Court of Common Pleas in Dover through her attorney H. Cabbage Brown Jr. Oberly

said "the officer better have a good case against Daisy...because he (Oberly) did not want to waste the court's time on matters such as this."

Collins said Aliff "tailed me (Collins) for about a quarter of a mile before he tried to grab Daisy." Collins said he mentioned to Aliff that he was supposed to leave Daisy alone and not bother her, "...but he said I was trying to

tell him how to do his job. So I just shut up", said Collins.

Pat Maher has been summoned to appear in Magistrate's Court #6 in Harrington on December 4th at 9:30 a.m. "I guess we will see what happens then. I don't know what Cabbage (Brown) plans to do. Maybe we will take it to the Court of Common Pleas. I just don't know," said Mrs. Maher.

Coch Mary Ann Hitchens develops successful record at U of D

It would be impossible to discuss the success of the University of Delaware women's athletic program without mentioning Mary Ann Hitchens, Assistant Athletic Director, coordinator of Women's Athletics and head field hockey coach.

Hitchens joined the Blue Hen staff in 1969 as coach of both the experimental field hockey and basketball women's athletic programs which were made official varsity sports in 1971. Hitchens resigned her position as basketball coach in 1978 after compiling a seven-year career record of 71-35 that featured six post-season appearances. She continues to coach a nationally recognized field hockey program and has put together a 153-64-24 record that included four appearances in the national field hockey championships including a second place finish in 1978. This past season, she led the Blue Hens to the East Coast Conference championship with a

15-4 record. It was her second ECC title with the other coming in 1983. For her efforts, Hitchens received 1985 ECC Coach of the Year honors for the second time. She also won the award in 1983. The Blue Hens have appeared in all four ECC championship games.

In her capacity as Women's Athletic Coordinator and Assistant Director of Athletics, Campbell has overseen the growth of a ten sport women's athletic program that has produced nationally recognized programs in field hockey and lacrosse as well as consistent Eastern powers in volleyball, basketball, swimming and softball.

Hitchens was an outstanding athlete at Milford (DE) High School where she earned 12 varsity letters and scored over 1,000 career points in basketball. She received her Bachelor's Degree in Physical Education from the University of Delaware in 1967 and her master's

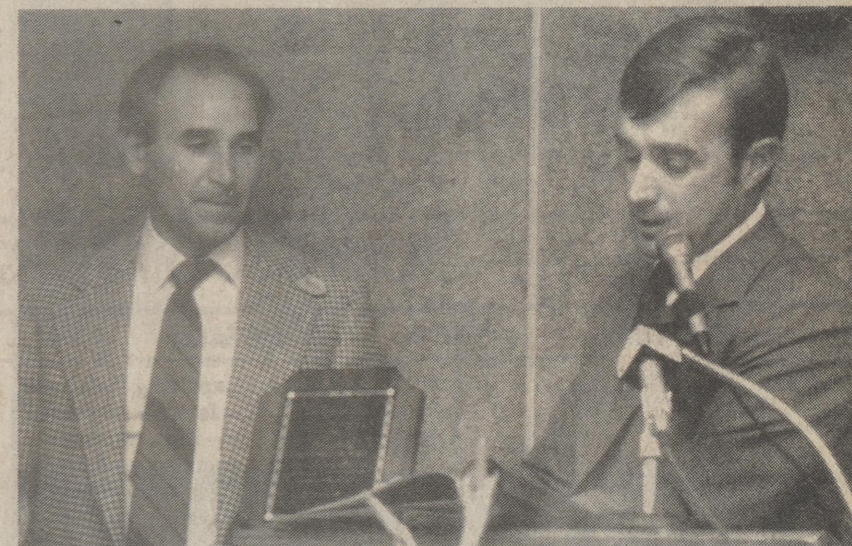

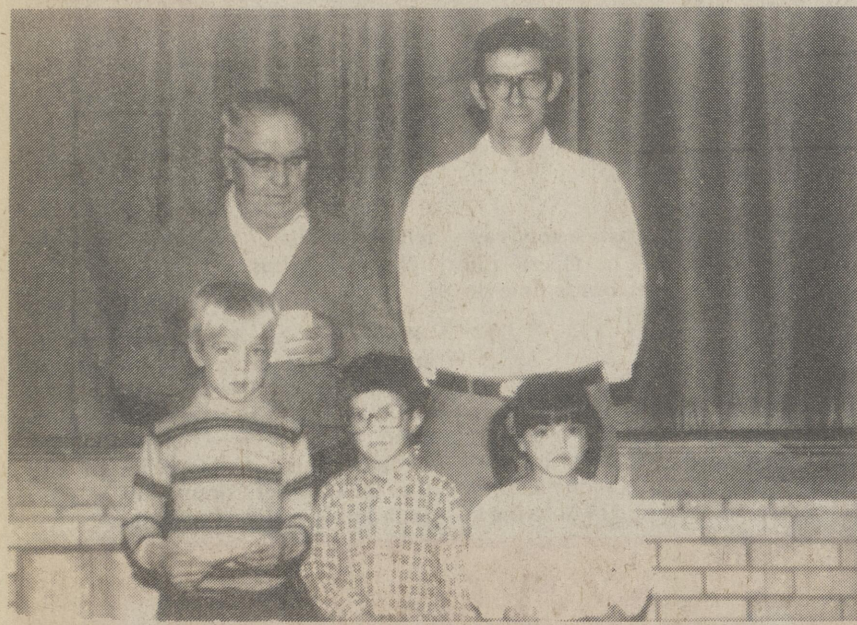

The farmer can seek a low tax by showing that his land has not produced up to capacity and he the farmer thereby has a loss in money. The Farm Bureau also voted to oppose

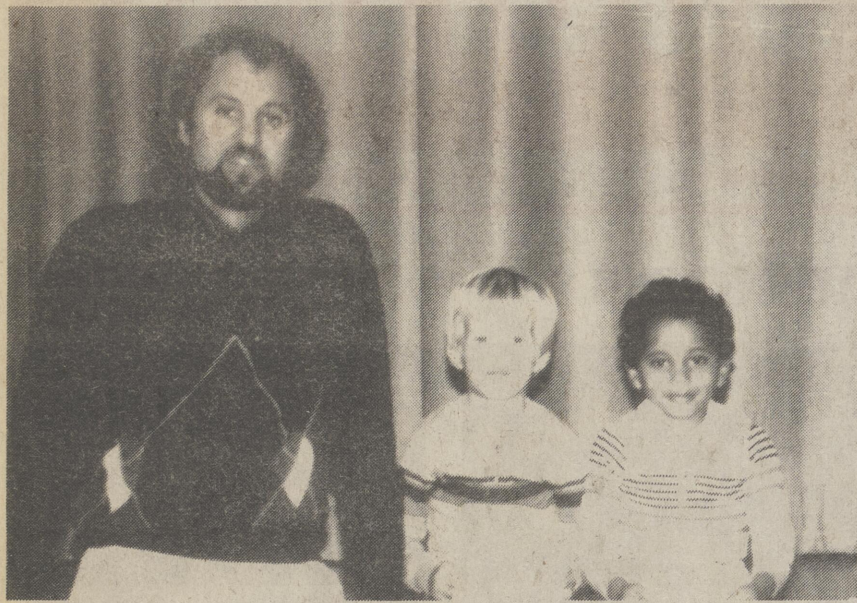

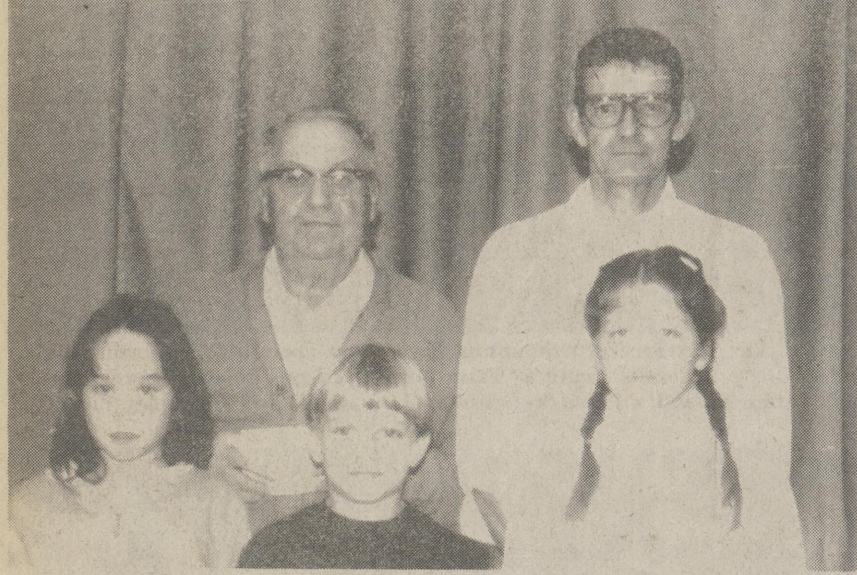

The Delaware Agricultural Museum to present "A Farmer's Christmas"

The Delaware Agricultural Museum once again will be presenting its popular annual Farmer's Christmas program on Friday, December 6, and Saturday, December 7, from 5:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. each night. During both evenings, the St. Andrew's Concert Choir, from St. Andrew's School in Middletown, will be performing a holiday program. On Friday evening, the Dover Country Dancers will be demonstrating a variety of 19th century dances and on Saturday night, traditional guitar, banjo, and ballad music will be performed by the talented Murray Callahan, from the Philadelphia area.

On both evenings, the museum will feature a display of late 19th and early 20th century winter farm activities, such as hog slaughtering, meat processing, candlemaking and soapmaking. Also, the First State Model Railroad Club of Dover will be displaying miniature modules

depicting various agricultural railroad stops based on the original 1923 blueprints of the Pennsylvania Railroad from Wilmington to Delmar.

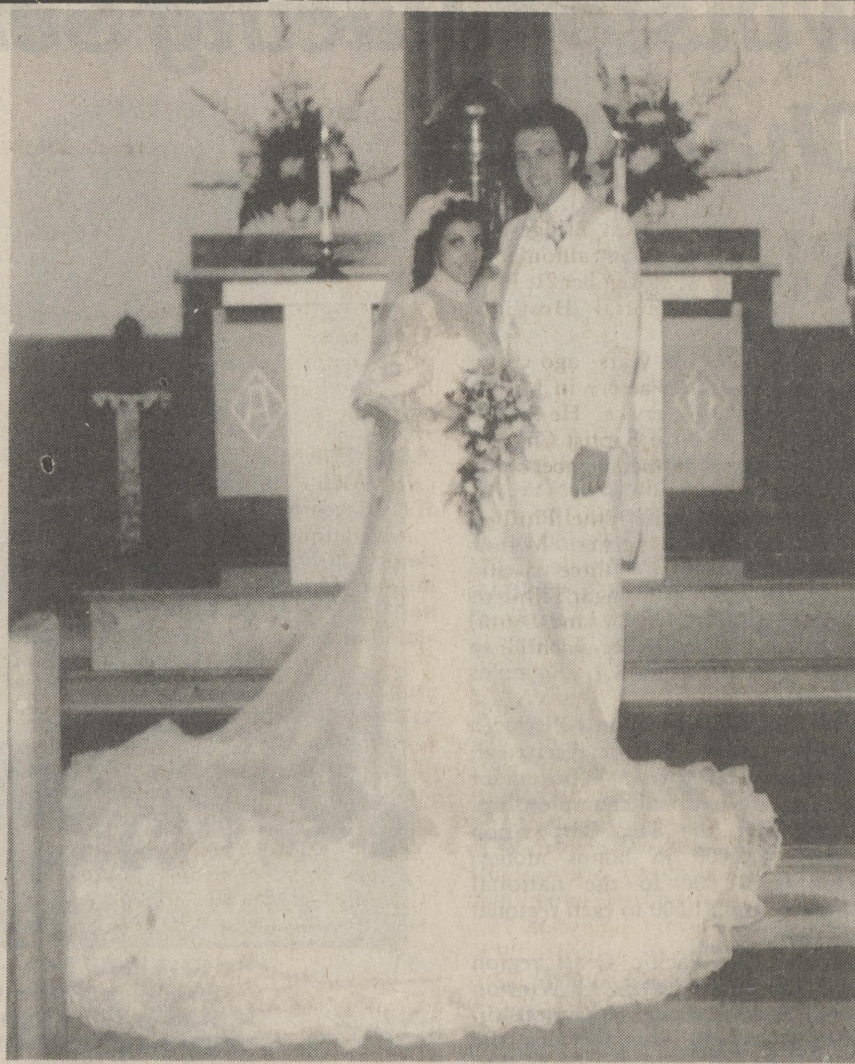
It seems that after they know it is ready, the urgency is not there. Of course there

PITTSBURGH, November 21 - Bill Elliott, who shattered NASCAR records this season with 11 victories and more than \$2 million in prize earnings, is the 1985 Eljer Driver-of-the-Year.

Elliott was the unanimous selection in balloting today by Eljer's panel of 10 leading U.S. motorsports writers. He becomes only the second unanimous winner in the 19 year history of auto racing's most prestigious award. Mario Andretti, the 1984 Eljer Driver-of-the-Year, was the first.

"Winning the Eljer Driver-of-the-Year Award means a great deal to me, especially being the unanimous selection," says Elliott, who won the honor for the first time. "It sends chills down my spine to think about being in the same category as Mario Andretti and the other drivers who have won this award. It's hard for me to imagine being in the same league as those great drivers."

The Eljer award annually honors the top driver in the world of motorsports. The winner is chosen from all major forms of competition, including NASCAR, CART, IMSA, SCCA, USAC, NHRA and North American events in Formula One Grand Prix racing. Panel members vote quarterly for the outstanding driver and again at year-end for the overall Eljer Driver-of-the-Year.

The Dawsonville, GA, native dominated competition on the NASCAR circuit this season with his 11 victories and 12 pole positions, despite finishing second to Darrell Waltrip in the run for the Winston Cup Points Championship.

In quarterly balloting for the Eljer Driver-of-the-Year Award, Elliott won three of the four votes, claiming first, second and third quarter awards. CART racer Bobby Rahal broke Elliott's lock on the award this past quarter on the strength of his year-end performance in Indy Car competition.

The high point of Elliott's season came on September 1 at Darlington International Raceway where he won the Southern 500 and claimed \$1 million from R.J. Reynolds for winning three of NASCAR's "BIG FOUR" events. He had previously won the Daytona 500 and Winston 500. The other crown jewel is the World 600, which Waltrip won.

In addition to those three races, Elliott was victorious in the Coca-Cola 500 in Atlanta, TransSouth 500 in Darlington, Budweiser 500 in Dover, Van Scoy 500 at Pocono, Miller 400 in Michigan, Summer 500 again at Pocono, Champion Spark Plug 400 again in

Michigan and the Atlanta Journal 500.

"I am genuinely thrilled to win this award. I wouldn't trade those accomplishments and the year that we've had for Darrell's any day", explains Elliott.

"It would have meant a lot to win the Winston Cup Championship, but we feel we've accomplished more in one season than any other team in racing, and we did it on our own," he continued. "I think a lot of people don't understand that we started this team from scratch and raced our first full NASCAR schedule in 1983. We didn't team up with an established name in the business like Junior Johnson. We did it on our own."

The Coors/Melling Team was formed in 1982 and completed its first full NASCAR season in 1983. Since its formation, Elliott and his team have won at least one major award each season.

In 1982, the team claimed the year-end NASCAR pit crew championship. In 1983, Elliott claimed his first Grand National victory at the Winston Western 500 in Riverside and finished third in Winston Cup Points Championship. The following year, he won three races, again finished third in the points standing and was voted NASCAR's "Most Popular Driver".

Elliott will receive a \$10,000 cash prize and Eljer Driver-of-the-Year Trophy at the annual banquet in New York at the prestigious "21" Club on December 6.

Previous winners of the Eljer Driver-of-the-Year Award were Andretti (CART), 1984, 1978 and 1967; Bobby Allison (NASCAR), 1983 and 1972; Waltrip (NASCAR), 1982, 1981 and 1979; Johnny Rutherford (CART), 1980; Cale Yarborough (NASCAR), 1977; David Pearson (NASCAR), 1976 and 1973; A.J. Foyt (CART), 1975; Bobby Unser (CART), 1974; Richard Petty (NASCAR), 1971; Al Unser Sr. (CART), 1970; the late Lee Roy Yarborough (NASCAR), 1969; and the late Mark Donohue (CART), 1968.

A.J. Foyt will drive Preston Henn's Porsche 962 at the finale. Foyt also has signed to drive the first three Camel GT races in 1986, including the SunBank 24 Hours of Daytona, the Lowenbrau Grand Prix of Miami and the Coca-Cola 12 Hours of Sebring.

Since the Porsche 962 brand has won 15 of 16 Camel GT events this year, IMSA officials decided to remove the turbocharger boost control knob from inside the cockpit and made the Porsche 962s run with additional weight.

Al Holbert of Warrington, Penn., has clinched the 1985 Camel GT championship and its accompanying \$60,000 bonus. Other champions who will be crowned at the Camel GT

NASHVILLE, TENN — The finest weekly stock car racers in the country was honored during the 1985 NASCAR Winston Racing Series banquet Saturday night at the Opryland Hotel.

Doug McCoun of Prunedale, Calif., was crowned the 1985 NASCAR Winston Racing Series national champion and collected \$25,000 in bonus awards from R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co.

Each regional champion collected a \$10,000 bonus and McCoun received an additional \$15,000 from Winston for capturing the national championship.

In addition, the STP Corporation awarded \$22,000 in bonus money, including \$2,000 to the national champion and \$1,500 to each regional champion.

McCoun, the Pacific Coast region champion, won the NASCAR Winston Racing Series national championship under a system that divides the country into five regions. Other regional champions included Charles Powell, III of Moncks Corner, S.C. in the Southeast region; Richie Evens of Rome, N.Y. in the Northeast region; and Elton Sawyer of Chesapeake, Va. in the Mid-Atlantic region.

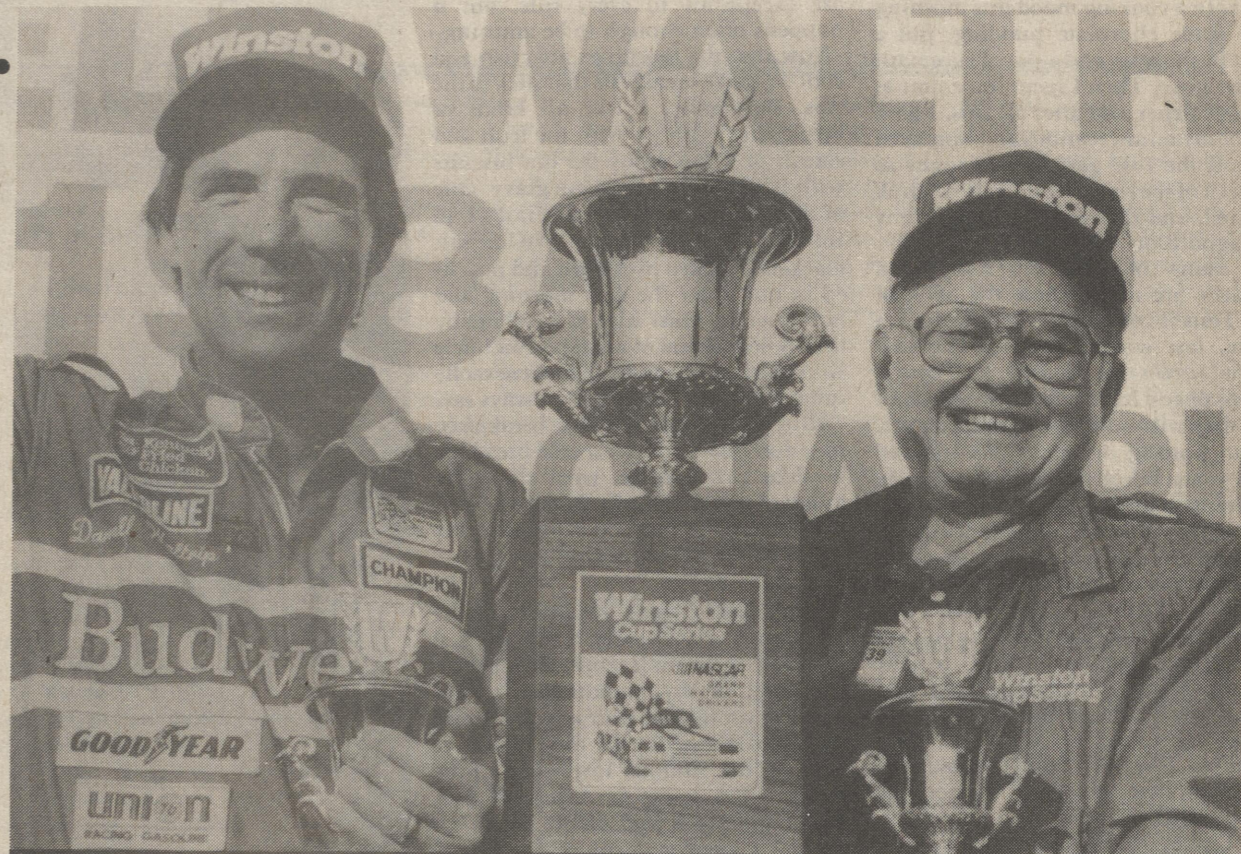
Because all four of the Camel GT championships have been decided, most teams will use the race as a test session for 1986 models.

DAYTONA BEACH, FLA — All four Camel GT championships have been clinched, but more than \$175,000 in bonus awards will still be up for grabs during the Eastern Airlines Finale Dec. 1 at Daytona International Speedway.

Following the 17th and final International Motor Sports Association (IMSA) Camel GT race of the season, Al Holbert of Warrington, Penn., will collect a \$60,000 bonus from R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co. at the 15th annual Camel GT banquet.

The banquet is scheduled for 7 p.m. on Dec. 1 at the Holiday Inn-Surfside in nearby Ormond Beach, and \$280,000 in Camel GT bonus awards will be distributed.

The three other Camel champions each will collect a \$15,000 bonus from

R.J. Reynolds. Jim Downing of Atlanta, Ga., has already clinched the new Camel Lights division title, 19-year-old Canadian John Jones has won the Camel GTO title and Jack Baldwin of Woodstock, Ga., has clinched his second straight Camel GTU championship.

In winning the Camel GTU title, Baldwin became the first driver since the late Peter Gregg to win back-to-back Camel championships.

Deer season second best on record

Delaware's deer hunters didn't break the record set last year during the early shotgun season, but the number of deer tagged does mark 1985 as the second best year on record.

During the nine day season that ended November 16, local hunters killed a total of 2,015 deer, with the biggest, and eight pointer, weighing in at 216 pounds. That deer was taken by a Lewes, DE man. The 1984 early shotgun season is still the best on record with a total kill of 2,125. 1983, when 1,869 deer were taken now rates as only third best.

Hunters who took part in the early season for primitive weapons (muzzleloaders), which ran from October 10-12, did manage to set a new standard, taking 202 deer. The previous best was 1983, when 196 deer were killed during the fall season.

Wildlife officials also report that 48 deer have been taken to date by archers.

Archery season will continue November 18 - January 20-25.

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EASY BUTTER COOKIES

There are a few standard cookie recipes I make each year around the holidays. Each year I try to add something new and different. The first time I tried this cookie recipe, it became a standard. You can make the dough ahead, clean up the mess and save the baking for several days later when you have more time. They store especially well in a tin jar, and as with most butter cookies, aging of about one week makes them even better.

Sliced thin, about 1/8" or even less, they are a delicate butter cookie. Sliced thicker, up to 1/4", they are more of a short bread type of cookie. When making the latter, you may want to decorate with candy sprinkles, cherries or sugar before baking. For larger cookies, just make bigger rolls.

Treats from Anne's Kitchen

Shape in round, square, diamond or anything else you can come up with. You can't change the homemade goodness with the shape.

I usually set my oven at 350°, but on occasion have had to slightly vary temperature. Time is something else you will have to use your judgment on. A lightly browned bottom is what I go by. My first cookie sheet gives me my cue.

- 1 lb. butter
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 3 whole eggs
- 2 teaspoons flavoring of your choice
- 1 cup finely chopped nuts (optional)
- 5 cups flour

1. Cream butter and sugar
2. Add eggs one at a time, beating after each addition.
3. Add flavoring, blend
4. Beat at low speed and add flour, sifting while adding
6. Divide dough into as many rolls as you feel comfortable working with. Shape rolls and wrap in waxed paper; chill till firm for several days.
7. Pre-heat oven, slice rolls and place 1 1/2" apart on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake.
8. Remove to wire rack and cool completely for several hours. Store about one week.

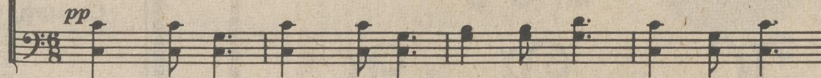

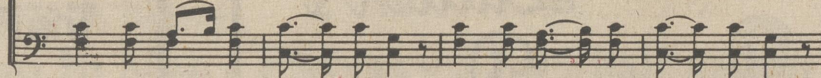

RICE PUDDING

- 2 cups water
- ½ cup rice (raw NOT INSTANT)
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 egg yolks
- ½ cup sugar
- 1 quart milk
- 2 egg whites
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- cinnamon


1. In a large pot, cook water, rice and salt till rice absorbs all the water. Set aside and cool.
 2. Beat two egg yolks in some of the milk, and add with sugar to the cooked rice. Return to stove and cook till mixture is fairly thick.
 3. Beat two egg whites stiff and fold into rice mixture. Be sure to distribute well. Stir in vanilla.
 4. Put into serving bowl, sprinkle with cinnamon, and chill a few hours.
- This recipe is so creamy and tasty that I wouldn't even suggest cream or any kind of topping. You need nothing to enhance the taste. Serves six easily, but you may find yourself making a double batch next time.*

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

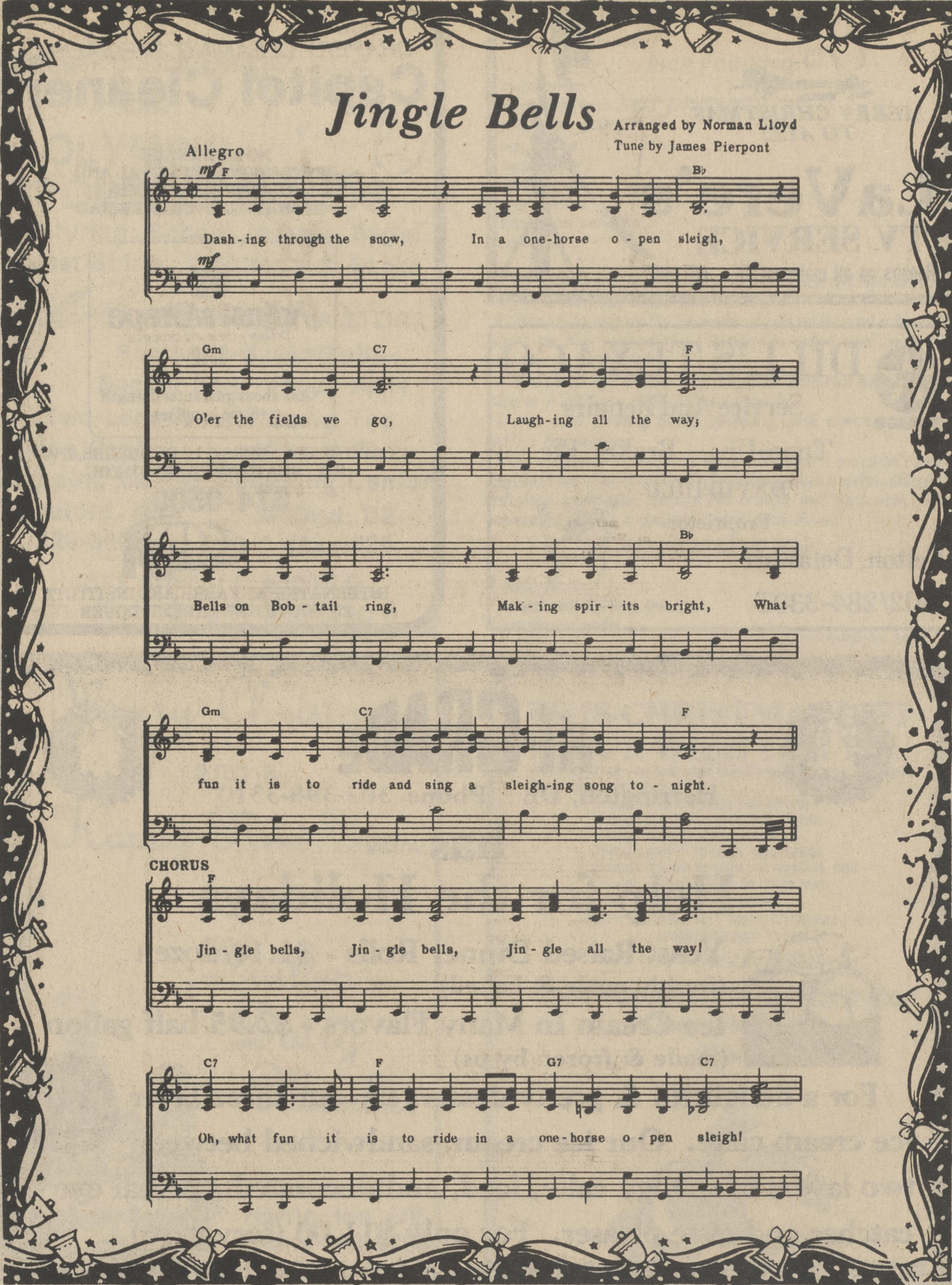

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

- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ginger

Sift above ingredients together and set aside.

Heat 1/2 cup butter and 1/2 cup molasses in a large saucepan over low heat till butter melts. Add the sifted dry ingredients and 2 tablespoons hot tap water. Stir till blended. Chill completely. Meanwhile prepare "Apple Butter Filling".

APPLE BUTTER FILLING

Cook 1/4 cup apple butter, 1/3 cup chopped dates and 1/3 cup sugar in small saucepan for 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Blend in 1 tablespoon butter and cool.

Back to the "Gingerbread Men"; Knead chilled dough into a ball on lightly floured board. Roll out to 1/4 inch thickness.

Cut dough with cookie cutter and place men on ungreased baking sheet.

Spread about 2 teaspoons filling over heads and bodies keeping filling toward center and away from edges. Top with another man (no need to seal edges) and decorate with raisins to mark features and buttons. Stretch the arms and legs into curved position and the men will look like they are dancing or running.

Bake at 400° 8-10 minutes. For plain cookies, 5 minutes. After 5 minutes remove to a wire rack to completely cool.

BAKED STUFFED HAM

- 1 fully cooked ham, weighing about 12 lbs.
- 10 oz. (approx.) fresh spinach
- 1 onion, medium size
- ½ cup fresh chopped flat parsley
- 1 cup dry red wine
- ¾ cup honey
- 4 teaspoons cornstarch
- 2 tablespoons cidar vinegar

1. Trim thick skin, if any, from ham. Make x-shaped cuts, 3 inches deep and 1 inch apart all over fat side with a sharp knife.
2. Trim stems from spinach and cut out any course ribs. Chop onions and parsley fine, (all should be washed well and paper towel dried). Mix well in a bowl.
3. Press mixture into cuts, packing in well with your finger to fill openings. Place ham, fat side up, in a large shallow baking pan. Brush with part of wine.
4. Bake in slow oven, 325°, brushing several times with more win, 2½ hours.
5. Stir honey into remaining wine, brush part of mixture over ham. Continue baking and brushing with remaining honey mixture 30 minutes or until top is richly glazed. Remove ham from pan and let stand about 30 minutes, for easier carving.
6. Pour fat and juices from baking pan into a 4-cup

measure; let stand a few minutes until fat rises to top, skim off fat. Add water to juices, if needed, to make 3 cups. Return to pan, heat to boiling.

7. Blend about 3 tablespoons cold water into cornstarch until smooth, in a cup. Stir into boiling liquid. Continue cooking and stirring, scraping baked-on juices from bottom and sides of pan until sauce thickens. Boil three minutes, stir in vinegar.

8. Turn ham, meaty side up. Cut a thin slice from bottom so it will stand flat. Place fat side up on platter. Cut a wedge shaped piece from shank end and lift out, then carve and arrange on platter. Serve sauce in a separate bowl.
