

Tkachuk says good-bye to Frederica

FREDERICA — An angry crowd of Frederica citizens crowded into the tiny Frederica Town Council chambers on Wednesday to register their disapproval of Bruce W. Tkachuk resigning his position as Police Chief for Frederica. Tkachuk resigned last month by way of a written statement. "I resigned...typed up my resignation and left it in the Town Hall. But they claim they never got it. It was either lost...or something else happened to it. I know that I typed it up and placed it in the Town Hall," said Tkachuk on Saturday. Tkachuk said it was all over his responding to ambulance calls. "I responded to the (Frederica) ambulance call. A man was dying of an apparent heart attack. I administered CPR to the victim...and rode in the ambulance

with him to the hospital", added Tkachuk. He explained that once you begin CPR, you must continue until you get to something like a hospital. "But he was dead when we got to the hospital. There was nothing anyone could have done," said Tkachuk. "But something was said about me leaving the Town on other (ambulance) business. They said the Town could be liable. But that wasn't the chief objection I had. They docked me an hour of pay that week for my time spent riding to the hospital," said Tkachuk. "I couldn't believe it. Then I found it somewhat amusing", added Tkachuk. "It would have been different if all of the council had not gone along with it. But they all voted...as best I know to dock my pay one hour for that ambulance run", continued Tkachuk. Bruce W. Tkachuk wears many hats.

He is permanently employed by the Capital Police Force. "We give security to the State buildings...and people employed by the State." But he is also a certified emergency medical technician. "When the members of the Council feared the town could be sued for negligence in administering first aid...I have to point out that I take an oath to help those in distress situations. If I don't respond...I guess I could be sued. Especially when I have the knowledge to administer first aid...and don't do it", said Tkachuk. "So...I was in a catch 22k," he said. Tkachuk is also very active in the Boy Scouts, having organized a Troop for the handicapped. On Saturday in an interview with *The Harrington Journal* with Tkachuk, he said "...nothing could change my mind around. I will not go back to Frederica

as Chief of Police." But he was also quick to add that he was very fond of Frederica and its townspeople. "I like that place. It was real nice, and I liked the people. We were getting things done in a short time. I slowed the speeders down although we had not gotten our radar equipment as yet," he concluded. But Tkachuk was working with the young people, and there he had stopped a lot of public drinking of alcohol and public drunkenness by some young people in Frederica. "No one was enforcing the ordinances. And that was something I started doing right away...so that everyone knew I was there, and I intended on upholding the law," he added. Mrs. Gail Forbes, a resident of Frederica and sister-in-law of Rebecca Zullo...who is a member of the Town Council, led the charge by the

townspeople to have Tkachuk reinstated. "We need a police officer in this Town. We are not too small to have a policeman. We need to be protected," she added. Mrs. Zullo said her sister-in-law was "...on her own. Just because she is my sister-in-law does not mean anything. I have been accused of giving out Town business. So...I am keeping quiet," said Zullo. Members of the Frederica Fire Company were on hand to blast the Council for not coming to them first if they had any complaints. Alvin Schmitt spoke for the Fire Co. saying the "Frederica Fire Co. is getting a bad rap for all of this." Tkachuk was close to the Frederica Fire Company. "They have a great Fire Company in Frederica, and an equally great ambulance crew. I would stack them up against any in the State," said

Tkachuk. Tkachuk recalled an incident when a small child was struck by a moving vehicle. "I want to tell you they did one great job. They were very thorough in checking the child out. I was very much impressed with that incident," he added. Although Mayor Helen Powers offered to call Tkachuk and ask him to return as well as apologize for the incident, "As of today (Saturday) I have not heard from anyone on the Council. But it won't do any good. I have made up my mind not to return. I think a police officer must have the trust and support of the Council which he serves. I can't say that I have that kind of support," said Tkachuk. He said that he had three offers from other municipalities to serve as a police officer, and one from a company doing investigative work.

Superintendent orders students to South B

HARRINGTON — In a workshop session last Thursday night, Superintendent Gerald Lysik disclosed that he had ordered the move of the Kent-Sussex Pre-school Diagnostic Center from North Elementary School to South B in Harrington. Under the referendum held on November 16th, part of the proposal appearing in the referendum was to move the "diagnostic center" to South B as well as convert part of that school (South B) to an administrative center for the District. This part of the referendum thought to be highly controversial to the town folks in Harrington proved to be a source of great discontentment throughout the District. The referendum was defeated by a 2-1 vote. Under the powers invested in him as superintendent, Dr. Lysik may move students if he feels the move is in the best interests of the students. The move was also founded on the hiring of a new first grade teacher at North as provided for under a recent resolution by the Department of Public Instruction. The unit count (number of students) allowed this. This was also designed to help the overcrowding at North. Again this was an argument put forth prior to the referendum as reason for supporting the measure. To make room for the new teacher and a new classroom, the Diagnostic Center was ordered to South B. Dr. Lysik reasoned the space was available at South B, which is also the building in the best condition at the present time in the District. Prior to coming into public session which lasted approximately 30 minutes, there was a two hour long executive session. The agenda for the executive session listed the hiring of a new teacher, advice from the District Attorney on a district matter which was not disclosed except that it was a personnel matter, and the Superintendent's long awaited evaluation of the administrative staff. The personnel matter in Thursday's executive session involved the same personnel matter discussed at the end of the last school board meeting. The question arises in all executive sessions whether it be in school board or [continued on page 2]

Mayor releases plan of review for police

HARRINGTON — Mayor Mann released figures representing part of a study being made by him on the police department at Monday night's regular monthly meeting. "The study so far has indicated that two themes are prevalent, and they are (1) excellent coverage by the Police Department for the Town and (2) the numbers indicate that the Police Department is being overworked," he said. The Mayor also indicated that department totals show or will show total man hours invested, court hours, station hours, vacation time, sick time and work load "...and even the SCU (radar) time being worked," he added.

The Mayor asked that with this as a start the Council sit down at a workshop in January and refine the study so that a plan can be developed for the department. "We need to define the problems," said the Mayor. "What has happened in the past is a vote to go into executive session to discuss the police department...and what happens? Nothing really except throwing the blame all over the place...with nothing being resolved," he added. The Mayor suggested that the Council resolve the matter once and for all time "...by either giving them credit where it is deserved...and the backing they justly deserve," or as was implied chart another course.

Gleason resigns from Harrington Council

HARRINGTON — Councilman Joseph Gleason read aloud a letter which related his resigning from the Council. Gleason who was appointed to succeed an ailing Richard Henry over a year ago will be stepping down immediately. "I have made plans to go back to school and enroll in computer science courses," said Gleason. Currently Gleason is a math teacher at the W.T. Chipman Junior High

School. He said that when he returns to school he will be required to attend classes once a week "...plus untold amount of lab work." The Charter allows the Council to appoint a replacement for Gleason from now until the next election in January. "Since it is so close to the election, the Council might want to wait for the outcome of the election to be held in January," Mayor Mann said. [continued on page 2]

Public Hearing has no opposition and another UDAG Program proposed

HARRINGTON — The Planning & Zoning Commission last month approved the re-zoning of 4 plus acres along Peck Avenue belonging to Dudley Willis for "townhouses R-3". At Monday night's meeting the first reading and the public hearing on the request were held without any opposition from neighbors. The project is being built by John Seymour and Andy Eashum, both of Maryland. The Council approved a request by City Manager, George Volemik, to push through the paperwork for a possibility of getting another UDAG grant which would total approximately \$4 million. The project would not be named by Volemik, except to say that it involved a present business that wished to expand. Volemik said the Town under the UDAG grant stood to make approximately \$1 million. The grant request and related paper work must be in by January 31st 1986.

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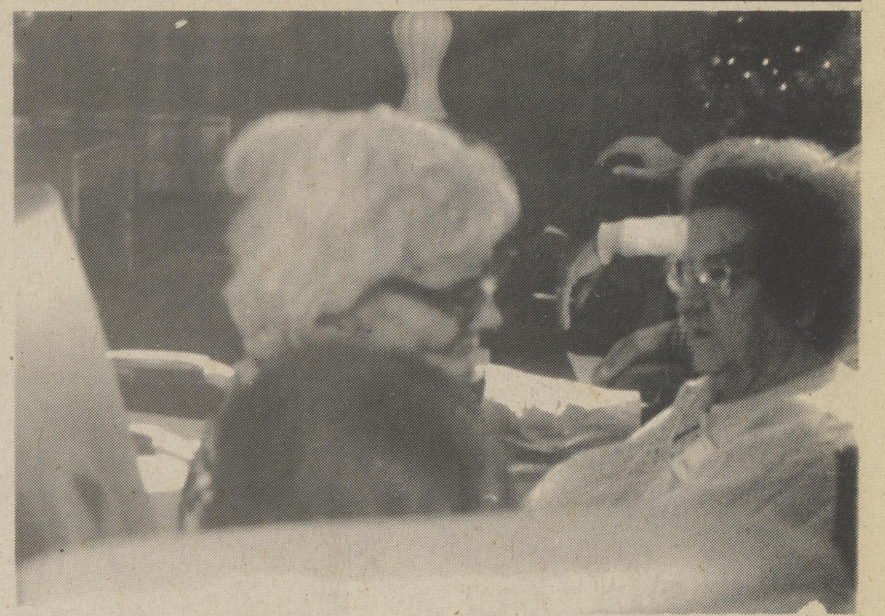

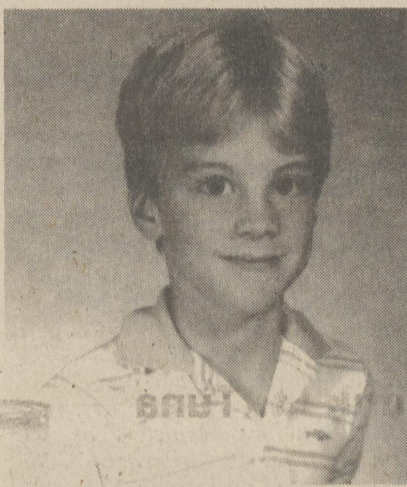

Hothead won the \$127,500 Maywood Pace on Friday at Maywood Park in 1:58.3 for the 28th win in 1985. This is not a record although he is tied this year with a horse from Canada named Graduate Boy who races in Canada.

This is a record which is for North America. The all time record is held by Victory By, another Canadian horse.

"Up there in that so called Maritime series of races...the horses are raced twice a week. They are just tougher horses. That's why they can do it that way," said Jerry Connors of U.S.T.A.

It is being led by Dave Rovine who is part of the "Shady Five Management Co." and they say "they can make owning a race horse fun and profitable." You must make a reservation by calling 302-378-8112.

Some more notable horses which the group has developed in the past have been George S., Tuff Choice, Glen Almahurst who is the fastest horse EDDIE DAVIS ever drove which came at the Meadowlands two years ago on Hambletonian Day in a piece of 1:52.1.

What Rovine and his group does is form syndicates and limited partnerships. Know your law as to which way you want to go. But as far as knowing what they are doing...their TRACK RECORD speaks for itself. We will have more on Dave Rovine and his group in succeeding weeks to come.

Jerry Connors of USTA has done it again. Jerry was first in his college (around Philadelphia) but spent a lot of time at nearby Brandywine Raceway where he studied under the great one...Marv Bachrad. Well Jerry has written a new book for USTA entitled "Handicapping Beyond The Basic Theory and Practice for the

Intermediate Handicapper." As you can imagine, the book is for the benefit of the wagering public. The book can be purchased through USTA...it has a beautiful full color cover...for \$3.50 by writing USTA, 750 Michigan Avenue, Columbus, OH 43215 or phoning 614-224-2291. It is a great one. Jerry has done it again. An example of what is in there goes something like this...Time, in and of itself, is an important factor in harness racing, but it must be evaluated in terms of the fractions of the race, and the "work" a horse had to do in the race. There is a vast difference between a 2:00 mile by a horse who stayed on the rail, and a 2:00 mile by an animal who was out and battling much of the way.

When studying the sixth race at Pocono Downs on August 19, 1984, one saw several competitive pacers in the 2:03-2:04 range. Marion Idol's 2:03.1 in his last start put him right with the rest, but the way he achieved his 2:03.1 is what makes him the play in the race.

Marion Idol was parked past the half in getting the top, outside two of the three turns at Pocono, and still held on for third, beaten less than three lengths. What's more, the first two panels were clocked in 29.3, and 59.4 — extraordinary times for a horse at this bottom claiming level. And then the horse held on well to boot. Jim Clouse, the track's leading driver, surely would be able to work out a better trip for Marion Idol this time out. (Marion Idol raced with cover through most of the mile, moving to challenge on the final turn, and widened out in the stretch to score by more than four lengths, clocking 2:03.1 over the good track. The win mutual was a healthy \$9.60 a good reward for handicappers who did the work of finding a contender who could overcome a rough trip and be competitive."

The leading dash winners are Lachance with 542, Campbell with 450, Bill Gale with 439, O'Donnell with 410. The leading money winners are O'Donnell with \$10,143,767, Campbell with \$9.4 million and Lachance with \$5,465 million.

Nihilator named Horse of the Month for November

COLUMBUS — Nihilator, richest and fastest racehorse in the history of harness racing, has been named as November Harness Horse of the Month by the U.S. Trotting Association.

The sophomore pacing sensation had a near-perfect month, beginning with a 1:54 2/5 victory against Open competition at Garden State Park, the site for each of his four November outings.

Next came a 1:53 3/5 victory in an elimination for the \$770,000 Pilgrim Stake, in which he bested stablemate Chairmanoftheboard and Armbro Dallas. In the final, one week later, Armbro Dallas upset the son of Niatross to become only the third horse to turn the trick (Marauder, this year, and Dragon's Lair, last year, were the

others). Despite the loss, observers say the Pilgrim Final may have been Nihilator's most impressive effort of the month, having raced from the worst possible post, the ten hole, while heading into a brisk head wind down the backstretch, only to lose by a neck to Armbro Dallas in 1:52 3/5.

Nihilator's owners, the Wall Street-Nihilator Syndicate, announced that last Friday's Breeders Crown would be his last outing before heading to stud duty at Almahurst Farm. He went out like a champ, winning the \$565,053 "Crown" in 1:53 — pacing the last quarter-mile in a very quick 26 seconds. The victory was his 35th in 38 career outings, and pushed his earnings to a record \$3,225,653 — becoming the first of his breed to earn over \$3 million.

Ingersoll-Rand, which sponsored the competition in 1982, 1983, and 1984, has renewed its participation for 1986, announcing an increase in total purse and point money from \$75,000 to \$90,000.

The company's absence during 1985 was caused by a reorganization which included the sale of its Hand Tool Division. Pointing out that Ingersoll-Rand has been associated with stock car racing for more than 25 years, NASCAR President Bill France Jr. stated that the Pit Crew Championship has grown to be one of the most innovative, successful programs in motorsports.

Winston and Nascar honors their own in New York

NEW YORK — The NASCAR Winston Cup point fund will be a record \$2,000,000 in 1986, making it the largest motorsports point fund in the world.

Gerald H. Long, president and chief executive officer of R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co., said that Winston will double its 1985 point fund contribution, raising it to \$1.5 million. The \$500,000 NASCAR track operators and promoters point fund will be merged with the Winston Cup point fund in 1986, bringing the total to \$2 million.

Long made the announcement Friday at the annual NASCAR Winston Cup Awards Banquet at the Waldorf-Astoria.

Long said the driver who wins the 1986 Winston Cup championship can earn \$550,000.

Darrell Waltrip, the 1985 champion, received a check for \$250,000 from Winston at this year's awards dinner.

"We view the Winston Cup championship as the most coveted award in all of motorsports, and the winner should be properly rewarded," said Long.

"The sport's tremendous growth in the last decade is due in part to the emergence of the Winston Cup championship as the ultimate prize for a race driver. And that is why we are increasing the amount of money the champion can win by \$200,000."

Continuing, Long said, "the winner of next year's title can earn more than the total Winston Cup point fund of just two years ago."

This is the sixth time in the last seven years that Winston has increased its point fund, which was \$500,000 in 1984

and \$750,000 this year. The point fund will be divided into two segments in 1986 with \$500,000 being divided among the top 10 drivers at the mid-year point.

The driver who is leading the Winston Cup standings after the Pepsi Firecracker 400 at Daytona Beach, Fla., on July 4 will earn \$150,000.

If the same driver goes on to win the championship, he will receive another \$400,000.

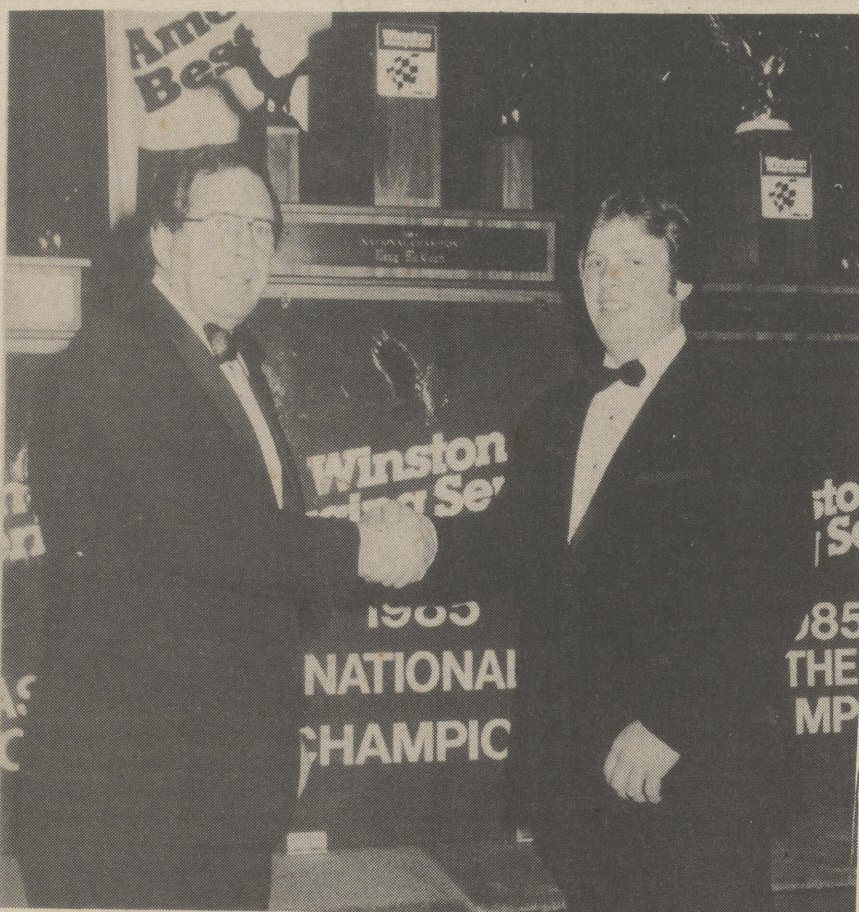
The driver who occupies the No. 2 position after 15 of the 29 races will receive \$100,000.

The runner-up in the overall Winston Cup standings will take home \$225,000.

Long called 1985 "another record-setting year for the Winston Cup Series as we saw record crowds at race after race, and this substantial increase in the point fund is our way of saying thanks to the drivers and crews for putting on such great races. It is the great side-by-side racing that NASCAR Winston Cup racing is famous for that brings out the record crowds."

In winning the 1985 award, Elliott garnered 33,961 votes of the more than 104,000 ballots cast to win the most popular vote by a wide margin.

The award will increase Elliott's winnings for the year to more than \$2.4 million as he will receive a check for \$20,000 from Winston cigarettes. The check will be presented to Elliott at the annual National Motorsports Press Association (NMPA) convention in Charlotte, N.C. on January 13th.

The NMPA took over the balloting from NASCAR and opened the voting to all racing fans.

Finishing second in this year's balloting was Richard Petty. Petty, a nine-time winner of the award, received 15,697 votes.

Darrell Waltrip, the 1985 NASCAR Winston Cup champion, was third with 12,329 votes.

Waltrip reflects on the early days

NEW YORK — Darrell Waltrip vividly recalls the days when he worked on the loading dock at Kentucky Electronics in Owensboro, making a \$120 a week. He was 22 at the time, and he admits he spent many a workday dreaming about winning a national driving championship.

"You have got to dream of being a star before you can be one," says Waltrip. "I firmly believe that. But you also have to have the drive to make those dreams become reality, and I just knew it would happen."

And it did. On Friday night at the annual NASCAR Winston Cup Awards Banquet at the Waldorf-Astoria, Waltrip will be honored as the 1985 Winston Cup champion. For winning his third title in the last five years. He will receive the coveted Winston Cup trophy and a check for \$395,537.

"As a kid, you never thought about the money," says Waltrip, who became the all-time leading money winner in auto racing history this year. After he picks up the championship money, the superstar from Owensboro, Ky., will have won \$6,330,901 during his illustrious career.

"Your dreams were of winning races, championship," adds the 38-year-old. "Racing is all I've ever wanted to do since I was 6 years old. I was always thinking about race cars, even in class or at work."

His father, LeRoy, says that actually, "Darrell was about 5 when he started pretending to be a race car driver."

He would tear around the neighborhood on his tricycle, making "rrrrrrrrrr" noises like the car of his favorite driver, G.C. Spencer, over at the local dirt track in Owensboro.

A few years later, he was racing at the same speedway. "And sometimes my mother would have to pass up a new dress or pair of shoes because we were spending our extra money on racing," recalls Waltrip.

But the Waltrip family was not alone in believing that Darrell would fulfill his visions of winning a Winston Cup championship.

"He was one of those who was gifted from the start," says John Hamberg, who competed against Waltrip during the late 1960s on the quarter-mile oval with the massive title of Kentucky Motor Speedway. "Darrell had the ability. He was smooth from the word go."

Hamberg admits that the competitors didn't make it easy on Waltrip during those his early years. "At that time, a lot

of people were resentful of young people," notes Hamberg, "and Darrell had a pretty hard time. But it seemed like the first thing you knew, he started getting better and better, and by the last part of his second season there, he was winning a lot."

Fourteen races in a row to be exact. He continued his winning ways at Nashville, Tenn., and then in 1972, he decided it was time to tackle the "major leagues," the NASCAR Winston Cup circuit.

"When I first got into Winston Cup racing, I learned quickly that you can't join the circuit and set the world on fire, no matter how brave or good you are," says Waltrip.

"For the first few years, it was nothing but hard work; the money wasn't there and the glory certainly wasn't there. It was a lot of late nights, long hours and peanut butter and saltines."

But he was determined to succeed. "I made up my mind to ride the ride no matter what happened," he says. "I knew that someday, I would do more than lead a few laps. I knew I would win — races and championships."

The tide began to turn in 1975 when he won his first NASCAR race at his home track, Nashville. And three months later, he was asked to drive the DiGard-Gatorade Chevrolet.

Waltrip showed that Bill and Jim Gardner had selected the right driver when he won his first race for them in only his eighth start in the car, the Capital City 400 at Richmond, Va.

He went on to win 25 more races for the DiGard team, but he didn't begin to fulfill all of his dreams until he joined the Junior Johnson team in 1981.

"When I joined Junior," says Waltrip, "I wanted the '80s to be mine. It is my time. At the end of the '80s, I'll be getting up there (in age) and probably looking for something else to do. I wanted this to be my decade."

And it has so far. He has won three Winston Cup championships, 40 races and \$4,413,929 in five seasons with the Johnson-Budweiser team.

"Each championship has been a little sweeter," adds Waltrip. "And when I accepted the Winston Cup trophy at the Waldorf I thought back to those days on the loading dock when all my thoughts were about the day when I would be champion."

"And I think the reason I was able to fulfill my dreams is that I never thought about not being where I am today. I only thought about how long it would take me to get here."

the Coors Tour will continue to be the nucleus of the schedule," said Curley.

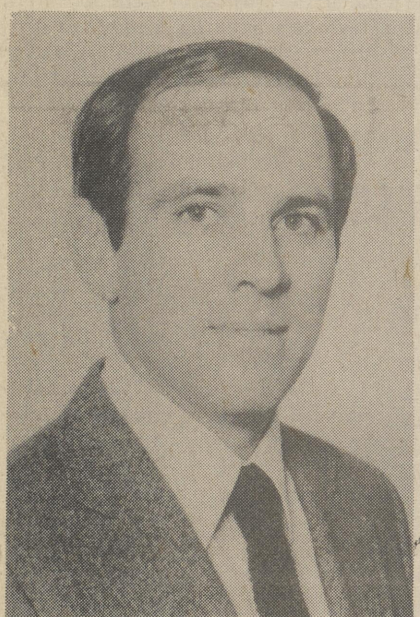

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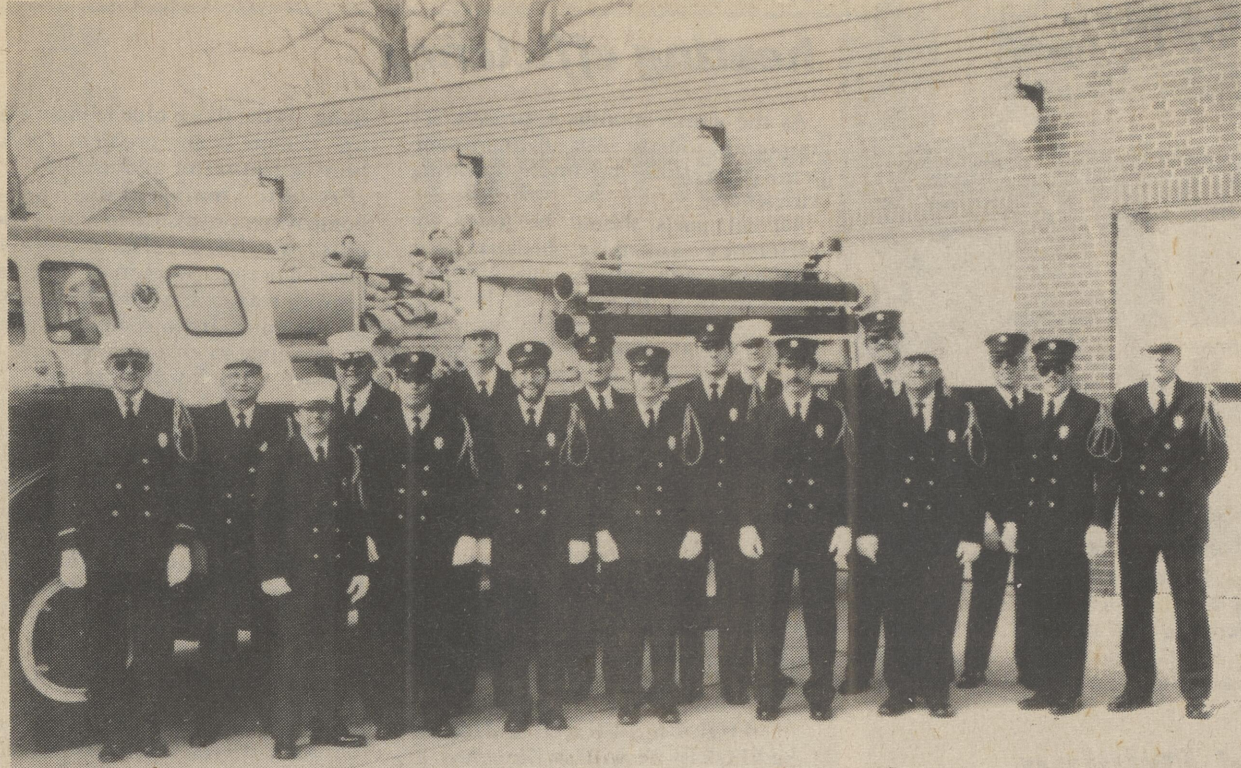

Short Takes on Area News

Carper endorses the Superfund

Delaware's only Congressman, Tom Carper, (D-DE) has sponsored or favored the Superfund since its embryonic stages.

There are 13 existing or proposed Superfund sites in Delaware. Carper cited several areas in Delaware of which are concerns of his: places such as Tybouts corner, Wildcat Landfill near Dover or the NCR site near Millsboro...as well as the most recent toxic vinyl chloride emission at the Formosa plant in Delaware City. Carper was also very much involved in the most recent hazardous oil spill in the Delaware River.

Carper has recently sponsored amendments that support the Superfund legislation. "The fund has gone from \$1.6 billion which was provided for 1980-85 to \$10 billion over the next five years.

The legislation would require the EPA to begin clean up operations on 600 toxic dumps by 1990...including those in our state, as well as standards to go by on other environmental laws such as the Clean Water Act and the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act.

Carper introduces a new dimension to the Superfund legislation and that is the "Right to Know" on the part of the citizenry. That is the potential hazard and dangers to our health. Also to go with this is the right of the citizens to "sue". He said "this should help clear the air for citizens like those in Delaware City and other communities."

It is only fitting to add that Tom Carper is working for you and me in Washington.

Winter maintenance a must for heating efficiency

As the winter months approach, it's important to have your heating system serviced to ensure maximum operating efficiency.

All oil units should be tested for efficiency annually because the efficiency with which they burn oil degrades over the course of the year. This test will help you to determine what upgrading steps will be necessary and should only be done by trained personnel. Efficiency tests and the resulting adjustment are vital because every increase of 5% in efficiency lowers your fuel bill by over 6%.

If you own a gas fired heating system a visual inspection of your unit is necessary. Check to see if all the burner tips are firing and then examine the

flame. Is the flame blue with an orange tip? If there is any problem, consult a heating contractor at once.

Periodic maintenance by the homeowner can also help reduce energy bills. All furnace filters should be cleaned or replaced monthly during the heating season. Baseboard fins, electric or hot water, require periodic dusting or cleaning to ensure maximum heat transfer, as do hot air registers.

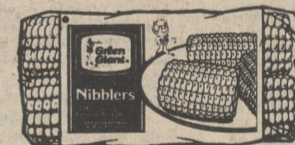
