


# Angry citizens protest asphalt plant next to Harrington

 HARRINGTON — Some 50 citizens were invited to a meeting at City Hall last Thursday night to voice their displeasure with an asphalt plant located just outside the City Limits (behind the Burris plant).  
 The plant is operated by James Julian Inc., a construction company out of Wilmington. It is located on the farm owned by William Hearn.  
 The meeting was chaired by State Representative G. Robert (Bobby) Quillen. Present also were two representatives of the Air Resources Department Bob Taggart and Charles Wilkins at the invitation of Rep. Quillen.  
 The citizens have been complaining all the while the plant has been open. Julian who has the contract to resurface U.S. 13 has been operating the plant since the summer. The citizens find fault with the noise factor, increase in traffic and generally protesting the

location of the plant as a nuisance.  
 Norma Short said she has seen "...a blue smoke hovering over the premises." Jim Mancini who lives on the Farmington Road said the "noise factor is something else. You get this loud boom when they start up each day, and heavy vibrations all day long."  
 Originally Julian had worked out a contractual situation with the Delaware State Fair to locate the plant on the south end of the Fair's property in that area beyond the training track and along U.S. 13. So much fuss was raised on the location that Julian broke off negotiations and selected the present site.  
 The harness drivers who train at the Fairgrounds are complaining that the emissions are causing their eyes to be irritated. This was raised at the last Board of Adjustment meeting in Dover "...that if it is doing this to the driver's eyes what effect is it having on the horses."

Dot Fry phoned the Air Resources one day recently to complain about the emission...whether it be blue smoke or the white cloud that refused to break up...in that the emissions were holding in the air. When this happens according to Mr. French who heads the Air Resources department "then something is wrong. Their mixture is just not right...there is an overloading problem or something like that," he said.  
 The phone call by Mrs. Fry caused operations to be shut down. "But by the time the Air Resources people got down here to check, they couldn't find anything. Stopping operations destroyed the evidence," one person said.  
 James Mancini who lives along the Farmington Road said "...if you can imagine having a plant such as this right in your front yard...then you can understand our concerns." Mancini went on to say that the plant has a detrimental effect on the property

values.  
 Oneslady who lives on the east side of the railroad tracks is without a buffer between her property and the plant. Mancini said "...this lady is really suffering. She is completely exposed to the noise, emissions and the heavy vibrations. How can she stay in that trailer like that without suffering is amazing. You know she is suffering."  
 The Air Resources people feel there is nothing harmful about the emissions coming from the plant. The State has laws on "...noise tolerance levels", but there is no money to implement it added Representative Quillen.  
 Most people cannot understand why a plant such as this which qualifies under the zoning "light industrial" was permitted to be placed in this particular location. Norma Short, former City Manager of Harrington who works for the City said she feels the plant would

## High school students stage blood drive & "ghost out"

 This past week students and staff at Lake Forest High School participated in two programs.  
 On Thursday, December 12, students took part in a blood donation program in which students 17 years old with a weight of over 110 pounds could give a blood donation.  
 Each donor had to fill out a questionnaire of their family medical history, have their blood tested, their blood pressure and pulse taken before the actual blood donations. Some students were hesitant.  
 The donor could give their blood to the blood bank in their parent's account or donate it to some elderly person or anyone in need.  
 Most kids said they gave to save lives, maybe a small child.  
 The school came through with 54 donations.

On Friday, December 13th, the school took part in a ghost out along with other area schools.  
 The ghost out was part of S.A.D.D. (Students Against Drunk Drivers) program to alert teenagers of the hazards of drinking and driving.  
 During the school day students volunteered to have their faces painted white to depict death, after which time they couldn't speak except to a teacher. This was to show their friends how life would be without them.  
 During an average day, one person dies every 23 minutes due to an accident with a drunken driver. One in three is a teenager.  
 Students signed up for classes on drunk driving to be offered throughout the rest of the school year.  
 During the holidays, let's all remember not to drink and drive. The life you save may be your own.

## Heritage Farms celebrate Christmas in a unique way

 Twelve years ago the business we know today as Heritage Farms Nursery was called Choptank Nursery. It was principally a wholesale operation run in the main by Carl Senos.  
 Today the business is becoming more and more a retail operation as wife, Jean Senos comments, "We have learned to listen to the public. They tell us what they want, and I think you have to adapt to that sort of thing," said Mrs. Senos. This is the fifth generation of the Hopkins family that has lived in the house and this setting west of Harrington near the Village of Bursville. From their "heritage" the business has taken its new name.  
 Heritage Farms is "unique...I think" so says Jean Senos. "We usually have the largest selection of plants." Last spring Heritage Farms had the largest selection of Perennials and herbs.  
 "Right now we have the largest selection of poinsettias," added Mrs. Senos. She also is quick to add that why Heritage Farms is so unique is that there is never the absence of the personal touch. "We never send plants out of here before we instruct the patron on how to care for the plant," added Mrs. Senos.  
 Poinsettias are boxed, tops covered, "...especially on windy days...and we sleeve ours."  
 A small tenant farmhouse was recently moved to the premises which is used today as an office and showroom. Added to the farmhouse is an enormous greenhouse site of Mrs. Senos' pride, for today during the Christmas season is housed the largest assortment of poinsettias. "I think that another of our successes is being able to bring to the public a large variety of species of

plants. We have been able to expand our retail business through the development of the floral arrangements for businesses and internal design and decorating of the home," said Mrs. Senos.  
 The nursery business is a seven day a week job. "There is always the need for planning...like a year ahead in this business," added Mrs. Senos.  
 In addition to planning ahead, Jean and husband Carl, often attend seminars on nursery business. Last summer Jean spent a week at a seminar in Ohio where accent was placed on garden center management, marketing, floral design and proper care of plants.  
 Today as nursery business becomes more and more professional, the need for certification is necessary. "We take pride in the fact that our stock is certified which means that our plants are disease free," said Mrs. Senos. Certification means that State officials have visited their place of business and checked out the plants there for possible diseases.  
 Heritage Farms is unique and different to be sure, which is the theme Jean Senos conveys. This Christmas "...which is really the first Christmas you might say for us here at Heritage Farms..." is also very unique because each weekend through December "...there has been a little personal touch. We have been serving hot cider and homemade eatables for our customers", added Mrs. Senos. For the Senos family this is just a way of showing their appreciation of their customers for their business. "We don't want our customers to feel they are coming into say a grocery store to buy a

## Citizens voice interest in new referendum

HARRINGTON — The school board and concerned citizens met at the W.T. Chipman Library mainly to discuss the prospects of a new referendum to be held in May.  
 The new referendum could in fact be the same as the old one which was defeated on November 16th, or as district assistant for administrative services, Richard D. Moretti said "...may be modified some"...or must make a dramatic change from the original.  
 It was proposed through the board by Dr. Lysik that a "new citizens advisory group" be selected to help prepare for the new referendum vote in May. Just how that body would be selected was anyone's guess. Dr. Lysik, however, said he did not want to leave the selection process to chance. Meaning of course that there was too much at stake. One citizen had suggested that the names be drawn from a hat.  
 It was suggested by the administration that anyone choosing to serve on the advisory group should submit their names and addresses to the district office.  
 Time is of the essence regarding the referendum, which everyone in attendance, discovered at Thursday night's meeting. According to Dr. Lysik, first an acceptable referendum must be presented to the citizens of Lake

Forest school district. The proposal must be presented to the Department of Public Instruction by February in order for the State to act upon it for a referendum vote in May. The administration and the school board have their work cut out for them.  
 Richard Moretti also reported at Thursday's meeting that the 14 cents called for in the referendum for that portion of the November 16th referendum appears now to be short of that which will be needed to qualify for the state's equalization formula. It now appears that the needed increase here would call for at least a 17.5 cent increase per \$100 of assessed value for real estate. The district would have been short of its full share entitled under the State's formula.  
 Some of the pressure was taken off the internal affairs of the district...which is sometimes referred to as educating the children...in that Superintendent Dr. Lysik ordered the Kent-Sussex diagnostic Center transferred from North Elementary at Felton to South "B" in Harrington last week. The move was brought about by the hiring of a new teacher at North. This came about as a result of approval finally by the State Department of Public Instruction

 Burt and Madeline Satterfield were in attendance marking the Christmas Day tragedy which took the life of their son Kevin (12-25-83). A candle was lighted


by them in memory of Kevin.

## Harrington Fire Company under fund drive

 HARRINGTON — The Harrington Volunteer Firemen...those guys who protect our homes and who are called out all hours of the night and day have recently sent out letters asking for contributions to their fund drive.

be better suited in a location "...which was somewhat remote...but not stuck right up against a town as it is". The Air Resources people including Mr. French said that it is not giving off carbon dioxide. "If people are saying that it smells like carbon dioxide...then they are wrong, because carbon dioxide is odorless," he said. "Besides that," he added, "...we do not have a problem like they had in India or West Virginia with Union Carbide. There is no eminent danger to people in this area." French also said the Peninsula is "...very well ventilated. We get good air and wind currents here on the Peninsula. So the gases are dispersed readily in the air," he said.

Unofficially it has been reported that the Air Resources sent a letter to the Board of Adjustments opposing the location. Mancini said that "...all that had been taught about real estate makes it clear (to me) that it is in the wrong place, because of the location that close to a residential area. It is noisy, dirty and has caused an increased traffic flow as well as being a detriment to the value of my property as well as others who live there."

There is no expiration on the permit from the Air Resources Commission, but the zoning is only good for one year. In fact the plant is operating within the law as far as the Air Resources department is concerned, the people who live in close proximity to the plant are still unhappy with the plant being "...right in their front yard."

The plant shut down its operations last Thursday for the season. Just so happened that was also the day this meeting took place. The plant is scheduled to resume operations next March or as one person said, "...shortly after the thaw." 

calling for another teacher due to the unit count allowing the hiring. To make room for the new teacher (Special Ed) at North, the classroom which housed the Diagnostic Center was vacated. The Superintendent would have been able to complete this, regardless of whether a new teacher was hired under the executive powers invested in him as the District Superintendent. It comes under the category of "what is in the best interests of the students." The move of the Diagnostic Center to

South "B" was one of the proposals under the defeated November 16th referendum...as well as moving the Administrative offices to South "B". The question now is whether the administrative offices will be moved to South "B" under executive powers vested in the Superintendent. Part of the referendum which failed has now flown back into the teeth of the voting public who voted against the referendum. The next meeting is the regular monthly meeting on December 19th at the High School.


## Lake Forest names several to All-State football squad

## Mark Martin to NASCAR '86

DAYTONA BEACH, FL — Twenty seven months ago, Mark Martin competed in his last NASCAR Winston Cup stock car race. After narrowly missing out on rookie of the year honors on NASCAR's premier circuit in 1982, Martin was looking forward to a successful career. But of the 61 Winston Cup races that have been held since he dropped off the tour, the 26-year-old Martin has attended one of them. But, while he's been out of NASCAR competition, the three-time American Speed Association champion has not been inactive. He won six pole positions and four races in 1985 on the ultra-competitive ASA circuit. Then came the decision by his ASA car owner, Jerry Gundersman of G&G Trucking of Franklin, WI to embark on a limited Winston Cup program in 1986.

The team, running a Banjo Matthews-built Ford Thunderbird, plans to run at least six superspeedway Winston Cup races in addition to a full ASA season sponsored by Miller American. Their season will start with Speed Weeks '86 at Daytona International Speedway and the Feb. 16 Daytona 500. Martin, with engine man Robert Yates of Yates Engine Systems looking on, took his out-of-the-box T-bird around the 2.5-mile trioval at 199.87 mph on December 10. He said the team's second scheduled test session, on Jan. 5, is proof that they're serious about this effort. "Jimmy Fennig, my crew chief, is probably the bet guy I've ever worked with. He has the potential to be the next superstar crew chief in the sport, and his brother Jeff is one of the very best in this country at body, paint and metal work."

## Charlotte gets \$20 million face lift

HARRISBURG, N.C. — A 12-story tall corporate office complex containing a private, exclusive club, 17 new V.I.P. suites, 15,000 additional seats — it's all part of a new \$20 million expansion project announced on December 10th, at a news conference in Charlotte by Charlotte Motor Speedway officials. The innovative building — which will be incorporated into existing grandstands near the speedway's main entrance — will house the speedway's ticket facilities and corporate offices, in addition to the one-of-a-kind Speedway Club, with eloquent dining, observation deck and special enclosed, air-conditioned seats for race-time viewing. The construction, completing the Ford Grandstand project conceived years ago, is targeted to begin in June, shortly after the 1986 Coca-Cola World, 600 on May 25. The office-building complex with the Speedway Club will be built first, with a completion target date of May 1987. "The new building will have more than 100,000 square feet," said Smith. "It will include Speedway offices, a conference center, new computerized

ticket sales, area theater, souvenir storage area, retail sales store, and a lobby to exhibit race cars and other such memorabilia." The Speedway Club will be located 125 feet above the track's surface. Members will reach the club level by riding glass elevators to a plush restaurant featuring American and Continental cuisines and live entertainment. "The Speedway Club will be the most luxurious private club ever built in the South," continued Smith. "The atmosphere will be much like that at a very fine horse-racing track and will be totally unique to the world of motorsports. The interior will feature Italian marble, the finest leathers and a \$1 million kitchen, staffed by the most learned chefs." The club will offer exclusive seating for 800 members on the corporate suite level, with an additional 3,000 V.I.P. seats in a glass-enclosed section of the upper grandstand. Sale of Speedway Club memberships will begin immediately. The second phase of the construction project, which is targeted for completion by October, 1989, will include the addition of 17 new luxury suites, bringing the total number of suites to 59. In addition, 10,000 new seats will be erected in the Ford Grandstand, which will complete grandstand seating from the fourth turn to the 40-unit condominium complex in turn one. "In all, 10,000 additional race fans will be treated to one of the best seats in the house," said Smith, "high above the first turn." "When these exciting projects are completed, it will reinforce Charlotte Motor Speedway's position as being the most modern and complete sporting complex in the world."






