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Wyatt, Coleman and Temple in...Yannucci and Boyd seek seat

HARRINGTON — Harrington will hold their election at City Hall for seats on the Town Council on January 14th with the polls opening at 12 noon and closing at 7:00 p.m.

There are four council seats up for election. They are in Wards 1, 3, 4, and 5.

Councilman Jack Wyatt is unopposed from Ward 1 as is Councilman Dan Coleman from Ward 3. Councilman James Temple who is serving out the year Councilman Ray Gagne resigned due to change of domicile is unopposed. He will serve a term of 1 year from the 5th Ward.

The contest is in Ward 4 where Paul Yannucci and James Boyd seek that seat created by the vacancy through the resignation of Councilman Joe Gleason.

Gleason resigned because he will be entering night school for computer study. Gleason is a teacher at the W.T. Chipman School in Harrington.

Both Yannucci and Boyd seek an elected office for the first time. Yannucci said his chief concern is to get a better water system implemented in the area where he lives. "We do not have enough water pressure here (Dorman

Street, Center Street and areas near the W.T. Chipman School.) We just do not have enough pressure to fight a fire in this area. I know the City was studying the problem...and we all thought it was going to go through. I do not know what happened...but I do know that I will push to get this matter corrected," said Paul Yannucci. He also added that

he would try to bring harmony to the Council "...and try to get things to work smoothly in the City Government."

Yannucci has lived in Harrington since October, 1977. He moved to his area from Ohio as a result of being an Air Force Reservist. He is still active as an Air Force Reservist where he flies the C5-A. Yannucci was part of the CETA

program which allowed him to become employed by the Harrington Police Department as a patrolman. Currently he serves as a Corrections Officer at the Delaware Corrections Center at Smyrna as well as keeping up his flying time, while in Reserve status with the Air Force.

James Boyd is a French teacher at the

High School. He resides on North Street. Boyd said he would like to get involved in the Town and become a part of it by serving on the Council. "I guess you can say that I feel it is part of your civic duty to serve the citizens by serving on the Council," said Boyd. He has served on St. Bernadette's Parish Council for several years, and has been a

part of the negotiating team at the High School on contracts for the teachers. "I hear a lot of people complaining about high taxes and assessments. I would say this...that if elected, and I will have an opportunity to study the matter more thoroughly...I would be in a better

Harrington Police Department has unusual month

Arrests up — police car wrecked

HARRINGTON — Chief Carl McLroy announced this week a very unusual month of happenings in December. "We had 154 complaints which is very high for our department...with 88 criminal arrests of which 30 were felonies and 58 misdemeanors", said Chief McLroy. Arrests were made and indictments returned in burglaries happening at Burton's Sport Shop, Quillen's Market, the Harrington Newsstand and a house on the corner of Center and Calvin streets.

The persons apprehended and arrested for the crimes at Burton's Sport Shop, Quillen's Market and the Harrington Newsstand were all involving the same suspects. "Mostly you had cigarettes and other merchandise stolen from these places. Some soda machines were

opened for the money," said McLroy. On this past Friday, the "green squad car" was wrecked when Patrolman John Horseman "...was answering a 1040 at Magistrate Court 6. A 1040 means an officer is down or in trouble," said McLroy. What was happening was a person had been arrested and taken into custody. While in the Magistrate Court, he was told that he would be placed in jail until his hearing. "He apparently began throwing chairs around the Court and the State Trooper called in the distress. John (Horseman) was answering the call. He had the flashing lights on and the siren going when he hit the intersection of Liberty St. and U.S. 13," said McLroy. Horseman collided with a car going southbound on U.S. 13. "That car did

A new member and two new officers were elected by the University of Delaware Board of Trustees at its semiannual meeting December 13 in Clayton Hall.

Locally, Robert F. Rider, chairman and chief executive officer of O.A. Newton & Son Inc. of Bridgeville, was elected to a six-year term on the board, replacing the Hon. Elbert N. Carvel, who retired from the board last spring. Mr. Rider served as president of O.A. Newton & Son Co. Inc. from 1969-84 and has been a director since 1956.

Since 1979, he also has served as president of Newton Leasing & Finance Co., and has been secretary-treasurer and a trustee of the Newton Foundation since 1958.

In 1984, Mr. Rider was named a trustee of the Wilmington Medical Center and a member of the Board on Professional Responsibility of the Supreme Court of Delaware. In August of this year, he accepted an invitation to join the Dean's Advisory Council in the University of Delaware's College of Business and Economics.

President of the Delaware State Fair since 1976, he serves as a director of the Bank of Delaware, the Diamond State Telephone Co., the Chesapeake Utilities Corp. and the Eastern Shore Natural Gas Co. From 1965-84, he was a director of the Nanticoke Memorial Hospital, which he also served as president from 1976 to 1978.

position than to say one way or the other." Boyd has lived in Harrington for 8 years and the Lake Forest District for 13 years. The Council seat in the 4th Ward is for 3 years. Councilman Jack Wyatt has served on the Council for 15 years. His election will mean serving for another 3 years on the Council. "I think that I am very well liked in my Ward. I stress keeping the Ward clean for the people that I serve," said Wyatt. He said he would like to see Harrington grow over the next several years, and he hopes to be an integral part of it. "I think that it is about time the Town grows. We have a good young Council, and I know that I can work with them to help make the Town grow. Now...we need to go forward," said Wyatt. Wyatt has been a major party in working with politicians in getting funds for the Town for street improvements and related services. "We are now working on getting 3 percent money for our citizens to improve their homes. We hope to have money for landlords and maybe businesses later on," added Wyatt. Councilman Wyatt currently serves as Street Commissioner for the Town. He also added that he hopes to get money to improve the waste treatment plant, and improvements to the streets.

Councilman James Temple said after serving out a portion of the past year for Councilman Gagne, "...that I am still in the learning stages. I do not want to make real pronounced statements that I cannot back up. But...I am interested in getting this cheap money for our citizens for housing rehabilitation. I am also interested in trying to bring down the property assessments and taxes. We have too many senior citizens on fixed incomes who cannot afford the high taxes," added Councilman Temple. "Something has to be done," he added.

Councilman Dan Coleman who is completing a 3-year-term will win reelection by virtue of being unopposed. Councilman Coleman is one of the most dedicated people to serve on the council. A former state employee who worked in an administrative capacity in the Social Services Child Protection agency of the State said he wanted to be returned to the Council "because...I want to see completed some of those things which I have started...relating to housing and drainage in the 3rd Ward." "I also want to be a watchdog on the spending in the Town. I made a motion to put the money we received from Revenue Sharing into a savings account for one year...and then invade it...but I

was defeated on that motion. I still think that was a good idea. We need to get on strong fiscal footing," added Coleman.

Coleman speaking freely said he feels the Town needs to expand its tax base. "We need to do this through bringing in additional industry or commerce through UDAG grants...for as long as they last."

Councilman Coleman said it was also necessary to enforce the housing code. "We need to be consistent with our findings here. What is enforceable against one should have a play against all property owners. There should not be any exceptions," he added.

He said he would take a more active role in affairs of the Police Department. "I am not ready to say whether the Police Department should come under the City Manager or like it is now under the Council. I want to hear more discussion on this."

Councilman Coleman said he favors a pension plan for the City employees, but does not favor paid meetings for the Council members. "I feel that Council members should be rewarded at the end of the year with a dinner for their services during the year," he said. "But that's all."

"I have enjoyed serving on the council...and I am so happy to be able to continue this into the future," added Councilman Coleman.

Councilman Coleman was very ill this past summer with blood clots. He has recovered and "I am almost back to having my complete health back," he said.

Coleman and Councilman Don Jarrell were co-sponsors of the motion to retain and set aside 5 cents of the latest tax increase for street repairs and maintenance. "I hope this is in place, and we are able to capitalize on it," added Coleman. He added that Dorman Street and Peck Avenue are in need of repair.

The annual meeting of the "citizens or electors of the Town" will be held on January 10th...this Friday at City Hall beginning at 7:30 p.m. The purpose of this meeting is to report on the business of the Town for the past year as well as introduce plans for the next year. Persons who have filed for election will be introduced to the citizens present.

On Wednesday the 15th of January, which is the day following the election, there will be a Council meeting at 7:30 at City Hall for the purposes of swearing in of newly elected Council persons as well as conducting other organizational matters or any business the Council sees fit to take under consideration.

Linking learning with earning

The Educational Resources Association (ERA), in conjunction with the Lake Forest School District will hold a Science/Math Workshop for eighth grade students on Tuesday, January 7, 1986, at 9:00 a.m. at the W.T. Chipman Junior High School in Harrington.

The objective of the workshop is twofold. First of all, ERA is trying to reach these young people at a crucial point in their lives, just prior to entry into high school, to encourage them to continue to take all the math and science available to them. The second purpose of the workshop is to show these students role models in sectors of employment deemed "nontraditional" and to dispel any myths that might have discouraged them from pursuing a nontraditional career. This is especially important for young women who still tend to opt less for professional, technical, or skilled trade areas. By encouraging these young people, ERA hopes to lay the ground work for a

satisfying and profitable career, without maths or sciences, these students are closing many doors for careers in fields such as financing, engineering, technology, medicine and social science.

The entire Chipman Junior High School eighth grade class will be able to hear a panel of speakers discuss their jobs and careers, and how they use math and science in their work. The panelists will also show students how they have successfully integrated work with their personal lives. Speakers for this panel were chosen not only for their special career field, but because they also provide positive role models to counteract a tradition of stereotyping. The speakers are: Carol Ann Fend with the Dept. of Transportation, Joyce Dyer, JCPenney National Bank; Matt Hampe, Milford Memorial Hospital; Karen Pugh, U.S. Air Force Reserve; and Monnie Wrightson, Kent General Hospital.

The five member panel are all community resource people who have volunteered to be Educational Resources Association volunteers. ERA is a state organization that helps Delaware educators bring the community to the classroom. Hundreds of Delawareans have volunteered to be resources for our schools, and help students from kindergarten through college learn about the world of work. The Lake Forest Science/Math Workshop is one of many such activities sponsored by ERA.

Two arrested in murder near Garrison's Lake - Third suspect sought

Steven C. Satterfield, 22, of Henderson, Maryland and Richard C. Thompson, 22 of Cheswold, have each been charged with murder first degree and possession of a deadly weapon during the commission of a felony. Both were committed to the Delaware Correctional Center without bond.

The victim, Bohdan "Bob" Wskres of Stonehouse Village Court, Sykesville, Md. was apparently assaulted by Satterfield and Thompson using an axe handle and a knife.

Satterfield and Thompson were taken into custody at the Garrison's Lake boat ramp and parking area, along U.S. route 13, southbound at approximately 2:00 a.m. Friday morning. Trooper Ronald Rhodes of Troop 3 had observed the defendants in their vehicle while driving past the boat ramp and parking area. Trooper Rhodes immediately returned to the parking area and was later accompanied by TFC Robert S. Valeski. The troopers located a second vehicle at the parking area with the engine idling. This was the

victim's vehicle. Following a brief interview of the defendants, the troopers became suspicious. Trooper Rhodes conducted a brief search of the area and located the victim a short distance away on the ice-covered lake. The defendants were then taken into custody without incident.

The two arrested and another suspect along with the victim were seen earlier at the bar at the Fairways Inn on US 13 near Garrison's Lake. The victim who was 45 was bludgeoned to death with an axe handle and a knife. Information provided by the State Police indicates that all might have been in an argument and scuffle at the Inn earlier.

Trooper Ronald Rhodes should be praised for being on his toes in pursuing the investigation which led to the arrests of the two suspects.

Wskres was a supplier's representative working with an independent contractor at Dover Air Force Base.

The State Police are looking for a third suspect, Randy Graham. There was no address given for Graham.

not have enough time to stop." The car on U.S. 13 was driven by Jeff DeShields of Harrington, and he was carrying 3 people. No one in the DeShields car or John Horseman were hurt. The DeShields car suffered front end damage as did the squad car.

Chief McLroy and Patrolman Jeff Cooke were attempting to follow Horseman to Magistrate Court "...but we were unable to get the car started. This delayed us allowing Horseman to

go on to the distress call," said McLroy.

The investigation into the cause of the accident is ongoing. No charges have been placed against anyone at this time according to Chief McLroy. "If there were no mechanical failures to the squad car, and in fact, John (Horseman) would be guilty of running the stop sign...then the law says we are at fault," said Chief McLroy.

The car is presently locked up in the garage behind City Hall.

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

With all the tracks in the surrounding area closed, Dover Downs is still just having an average meet. The attendance and pari-mutuels were up right after the holidays, but since have tapered off again. The closest park open now is Philadelphia Park...for runners.

Mike Lachance is far ahead of the nearest competitor...John Campbell in the dash race for '85. Big Mike pulled down 592 wins...just 45 behind the all time record set by Herve Filion who set it with 637. Bill O'Donnell set the modern mark for most money won with \$10 million 192 thousand. Nice year for affable Bill.

There is a strike at The Meadowlands. Roosevelt ended their meet in a strike. The contract at Roosevelt had expired with four days remaining. According to one spokesman at USTA the employees wanted more money, and Roosevelt had threatened a cut in pay.

At The Meadowlands, the horsemen...owners, etc. are striking for a guaranteed purse. They want a minimum of \$10,000 per race...or so much a night overall. They claim the standard breed meet did more for The Meadowlands than the thoroughbreds...so they want a slice of the action.

Steve Warrington is back racing in Florida. He apparently had some problems with his back due to an old injury. He won his first race when he got back in the bike.

Rosecroft opens on the 17th of January.

For those who might have missed the short take on Frank DeFrancis which was presented by NBC. The coverage was at the running track at Laurel. The central theme was simply a "...mecca for the gambler". It was truly incredible. "All the comforts of home...away from home." It is too bad more promoters don't set up appointments with Mr. DeFrancis and get up on the latest technology.

CAMPBELL SET TO DEFEND DRIVING TITLE

The driver that made the biggest headlines in 1985 was Bill O'Donnell, who was the regular driver for a pair of champions in Nihilator and Prakas. O'Donnell scored victories in the Hambletonian, Meadowlands Pace and Little Brown Jug behind those two on his way to record single-season earnings of over \$10 million. But John Campbell may have had the better year.

The now 30-year-old native of Ontario doesn't mind the attention being paid his friendly rival.

Campbell also scored more than his share of major stakes triumphs. He won a million dollar race, the Sweetheart Pace, with Follow My Star; and also took the richest event for freshmen filly trotters, the Merrie Annabelle, with Britelite Lobell. He won a leg of pacing's Triple Crown when he captured the Cane with Chairmanof-

theboard. And he won no less than four different events in the Breeders' Crown championship series, including the tests for two-year-old colts of both gait with Robust Hanover and Express Ride. While Nihilator and Prakas have retired to stud careers, all of the above colts and fillies are slated to return to action in 1986.

ABBATIello AND LYNCH ELECTED TO HALL OF FAME

Trainer-driver Carmine Abbatiello and racing official James M. Lynch have been elected to the USHWA-Living Hall of Fame by members of the United States Harness Writers Association. They are the 36th and 37th harness racing greats thus honored.

Abbatiello, of Colts Neck, NJ, recently went over the 6,000 plateau in career victories, and he has earned over \$40 million in purses. He has won top driving titles at Roosevelt, Yonkers, The Meadowlands, Freehold, and Monticello.

Carmine went into harness racing from high school, learning from brother Anthony before starting his own public stable in 1964. He was named "Man of the Year" by Harness Horsemen International in 1982 and won a special achievement award for the U.S. Harness Writers in 1978.

Jim Lynch is a highly-respected director of racing who worked for many years at Liberty Bell Park. He has been hailed as the "dean of racing secretaries" and has trained many of today's best-known officials in the sport.

In his teenage years he helped organize maine racing in Weymouth, MA. Following U.S. Air Force Service in World War II he taught school and served as a state steward. He left teaching to work full time at tracks such as Rosecroft (where he was general manager), Old Orchard, Foxboro, Brandywine, Ponce de Leon, Hilliards and Liberty Bell where he became director of racing in 1969.

Lynch, who lives in the Philadelphia suburb of Bensalem, has received numerous awards, including honorary membership in USHWA in 1974.

Earlier, Levi B. Harner, a veteran-driver in the northeast, was also elected into the Living Hall of Fame. All three men will be honored at the association's awards banquet on Sunday, April 13, 1986 at the Hyatt Cherry Hill, NJ, and they will be formally installed in the Hall of Fame at Goshen, NY, next summer.

COHEN AND EFFRAT NAMED TO WRITERS HALL OF FAME

Retired sports writers Leonard Cohen and Louis Effrat have been elected to the United States Harness Writers Association Writers Corner Hall of Fame. They will be honored at USHWA's 38th annual awards dinner-dinner-dance, Sunday, April 13, 1986 at the Hyatt Cherry Hill, NJ, and again next summer during installation ceremonies at the Hall of Fame of the Trotter in Goshen.

Cohen is a retired sports editor of the New York Post and was actively engaged in race coverage of Roosevelt and Yonkers. He initiated coverage of training camps in the south to spark off-season interest in the sport.

Effrat is a retired racing writer for The New York Times. His by-line stories about racing in metropolitan New York and major Grand circuit events appeared for many years.

FLYING RICH NAMED DECEMBER HORSE OF THE MONTH

Flying Rich, who soared over the best pacers racing at Florida's Pompano Harness Track throughout the month of December, has been named as Harness Horse of the Month by the U.S. Trotting Association.

The five-year-old son of Meadow Skipper, owned by Ernest Hartman of Seaford, DE had shown much promise at two, but then he foundered (a usually-crippling foot disease) during his three-year-old season. The Abe Stoltzfus stable laid him off for some 15 months before coming back to the races late last year, and in 1985 Flying Rich started to make up for lost time, winning 21 races and over \$138,000.

The bay stallion shipped to Pompano on November 30 and promptly won his first start, then ripped through all three of his December tests against Invitational performers at the Florida oval. The times weren't necessarily spectacular — 1:57 1/5, 1:58 4/5, and then 1:59 over a sloppy oval — but Flying Rich was very impressive in all of his starts.

The Spartans demonstrated good ball control. "We did not turn the ball over...and the shooting percentage was


above 40 percent," added Coach Falasco.

The Spartans are known for their "alley-oops" and long passes down court on a bump and sun version of football. When it works, it makes the opposition look real bad.



Varsity wrestlers take Laurel down

LAKE FOREST HIGH — This year...this year is a premier year for the varsity wrestlers under the skillful coaching of head coach Tom Shaffer and assistant coach Mike Smith. Any team in the Henlopen Conference facing the Spartans this season will be in for a real battle...a real close match every time.

"Well...it looks like we have some real dedicated kids out there this year. And you can see them developing each step along the way," said Coach Tom Shaffer. With two weight classes open for forfeits each time, Shaffer knows that these kids must wrestle their hearts out to hang in there.

In three other classes the story is along the same line, but you might say the flip side. In the 100 lb. class, Mike Popivchak is underweight by about 6 lbs. "This makes it tough for Mike...and he is going to have it tough all season. But he goes out there with a great determination...and he is learning. He will get better as the season goes along...but he will have a fight each match," said Shaffer.

Popivchak lost in the first period by virtue of a pin on Friday night.

In the other two classes at 147, Greg Gillie "...will have most of his matches close ones this season. That is a tough class for Greg, but Greg is going to be right there. His opponent can't let up...or Greg will have him," added Shaffer. Gillie lost a real close match on Friday night.

The other class at 157 has Wendell Watson coming off football and last year of track. "Those two sports you can rest in between carries or races...but wrestling you have to go 6 minutes each time out. Wendell is working up to that," said Shaffer. Watson lost his match on Friday.

Derik Dill pinned his opponent in the first period on Friday in the 121 lb. class. "Derik came out and got taken down very quickly. But Derik got up — got the kid in a head lock...took him down and got the pin," said Shaffer. Wrestling for the most part has small chunky kids with close in wrestling. With a tall person, the height can be a tremendous advantage once the skills are developed.

In the 128 lb. class, Ken Outten pinned his opponent with another quick pin. "I got him (his opponent) in a half nelson for the pin," said Ken Outten. "He got a duck in...put the kid on his back. Kenny is real skillful. After the duck in...he tied the kid up and took him down real nicely," said Shaffer.

Darryl Cherry pinned his opponent in the 3rd period of play. "Darryl wrestled real well. He faced this kid in the Seaford tournament in the wrestle-back and won there on points. I am real proud of Darryl for this fine performance," said Shaffer.

In the 140 lb. class, Pat Sullivan won

on a technical fall...15 point spread. "Pat's a real worker. He has wrestled tough all season and particularly in this match. He likes the 2 on 1 tilt. So...he just worked the kid back and forth tilting him for points going back to the original position...then tilting him back again for more points. He did a real good job. You might say he did it by the book," said Shaffer.

Mike Gygyrynk lost in the 167 lb. class by a slim 5 points. "Mike wrestled one of the top wrestlers in the Conference. He got pinned by the kid in the Seaford tournament. But he wrestled and lost on points here which saved us a lot of ground," added Shaffer. His opponent was 11-0 last season.

In the 187 lb. class, tough and rugged Scott Fleming came through in flying fashion for the Spartans. "Scott knew we needed a pin in his match. A pin was vital to allow Marvin (Hicks) in the heavyweight class to just win on points as opposed to a pin," said Shaffer. "I just can't say enough for Scott...he is so big for his class...and strong...and quick...plus he has a tremendous strong athletic desire to win," added Shaffer. Fleming as a result dominates everyone he wrestles. Fleming on Friday got a pin in the first period...as a result of fiercely attacking his opponent.

The win by Fleming paved the way for Marvin Hicks to come through in the heavyweight class. "The pressure was off Marvin somewhat. At least all he had to do was go for the win as opposed to the pin," said Shaffer. "Marvin went against a strong kid...but he prevailed. We are all proud of Marvin who is just a sophomore," added the coach. Marvin is a three letter varsity sport athlete "...who works hard all the time to be better."

The Spartans go to Delmar on Wednesday (tonight) and to Indian River on Friday night.

Head coach Tom Shaffer's father...Tom...was an outstanding athlete back in West Virginia. He was also a dominating force in forming very good athletic teams at Caesar Rodney in the late fifties and sixties. He was regarded as a top notch coach in those days. His son Tom...our wrestling coach...seems to be following in the footsteps of his father.














