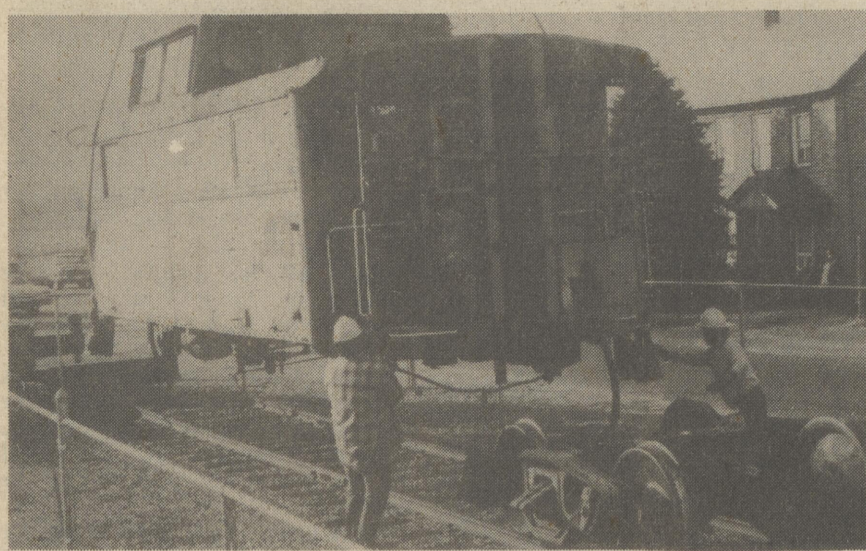


Harrington Historical Society gets caboose

There were no bands or speeches at this retirement ceremony. However, railroaders and train lovers of all ages gathered last Saturday morning to watch a fading piece of American and Railroad history, a caboose, come to the end of its line at the Harrington Railroad yard.

Walter "Shorty" Ratledge laid the track for the caboose adjacent to the Railroad Museum. It was appropriate that "Shorty", a railroader for 40 years, prepared the end of the line for the latest acquisition of the Harrington Historical Society. Co-chairman of the society, Donnie Jester, went to Reading, PA to pick out the caboose. It was the oldest one available, manufactured in December, 1926, for the Pennsylvania Railroad and reportedly worked the Delmarva Peninsula. Further research on its history is being conducted.

According to Jester, "It was the Cadillac of its day." One of the first metal cabooses, it provided a home away from home for the crew of five.

The caboose was donated by Conrail along with the crew that maneuvered it into place. Ernie McCarter planned and directed the lifting of the 24 ton caboose. McCarter, a veteran of numerous derailments, decided to break the caboose down into three pieces. Gerald Shanks operated the 65 ton crane that lifted all the pieces into place. The use of the crane was donated by John Mervine of Nanticoke Homes.

"The caboose will be sandblasted and repainted the original Pennsylvania Railroad colors," according to Jerry Hayman, Co-chairman of the Harrington Historical Society. It will then be opened to the public. Funding for the restoration will come from private donations.

Harrington producer is 1986 Delaware Pork All-American

John Curtis of Harrington has been named 1986 Delaware All-American Pork Product. The award was announced at the annual dinner meeting of the Delaware Pork Producers Association January 16 at the Bridgeville Fire Hall.

The new Pork All-American received his degree in agricultural technology from the University of Delaware in 1974. He became president of Curtis Farms, Inc., a family-owned business, in 1984.

Curtis markets 2000 hogs a year from his farrow-to-finish operation. He has

constructed a new raised-deck, controlled-environment nursery and is remodeling one of his two farrowing houses to include sloped farrowing pens to keep sows more comfortable during farrowing. His hogs are marketed on a grade-and-yield basis. Curtis has experimented with using milo in their feed. In addition to pigs, he raised 150 acres of barley, 300 acres of corn, 550 acres of wheat and 700 acres of soybeans.

Curtis serves on the boards of directors of the Delaware Pork Producers Association and the Delaware Crop Improvement Association. He is chairman of Brown Branch Tax Ditch, a member of the Delaware Farm Bureau and a committeeman for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. He is also vice president of the Harrington Volunteer Fire Company and a member of Asbury United Methodist Church. Curtis and his wife, Beverly, have a 3-year-old son, John Franklin, and a year-old daughter, Jennifer Lynn.

Pork All-American winners are selected by fellow producers on the basis of production efficiency, leadership in their local swine industry, participation in civic activities and general overall farming excellence. Nominees must be under 40 and must have made an outstanding contribution to the pork industry in their state. Approximately 40 states participate in the program.

Curtis will receive a special plaque from the National Pork Producers Council during the American Pork Congress March 11-13 in St. Louis, MO.

Referendum Advisory Committee doing survey

The Lake Forest Advisory Committee for the 'proposed referendum' tentatively planned for May is presently doing a telephone survey gathering answers relative to the 'planned referendum in May'.

The answers will be published next Tuesday at the regular meeting of the Advisory Committee.

For the referendum to be legal it must be held no less than six months from the last referendum. Under the state statute there would not be enough time allowed to hold the referendum in May. If held, a special dispensation would

have to be granted by the State Department of Education. Discussion on the topic has left some suggestions that "no referendum be held in May" to holding separate referenda on the equalization money and the construction project. It is also possible to use the money the district has as a result of the funds from debt service being retired, the settlement from the construction company on the roof, and monies from minor caps. This amounts to about \$450,000. To use this money, a referendum would have to be put to the people.

If you are unable to make an appointment, both hospitals will accept walk-ins for the screenings who will be accommodated as space is available.

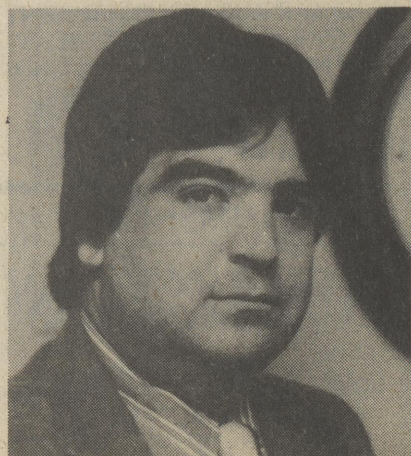
Boyd wins only City contest

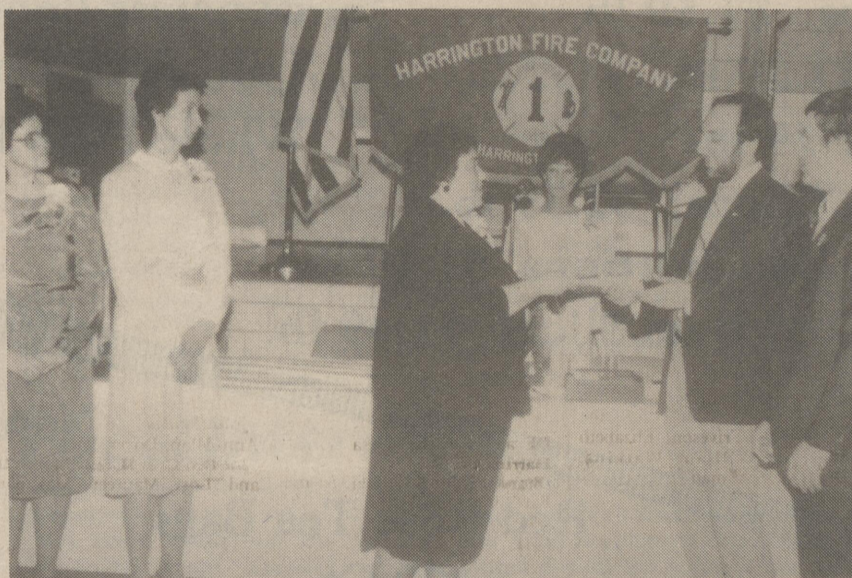

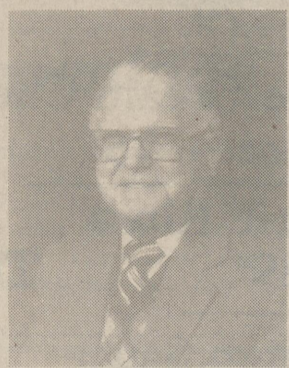
Delaware State Agriculture Dept. appointments

Secretary of Agriculture John Block has reappointed Richard H. Lester as State Executive Director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). Reappointed to the ASCS Committee were Charles H. West, Chairman and William R. Conaway and Christopher Wicks as Members. The State Executive Director is responsible for carrying out Federal farm programs, and the State Committee oversees their administration. Lester, of St. Georges, manages and operates 700 acres in New Castle

County where his major crop is corn. West, of Milford, has almost 7000 crop acres in production of wheat, barley, carrots, peas, soybeans, lima beans, cucumbers and spinach. Conaway, of Bridgeville, manages Newton Farms in Sussex County, producing sweet corn, field corn, soybeans, wheat, peaches, apples and grapes. Wicks, of Middletown, has a 350-acre vegetable-grain operation in New Castle County and farms in partnership with three of his sons.

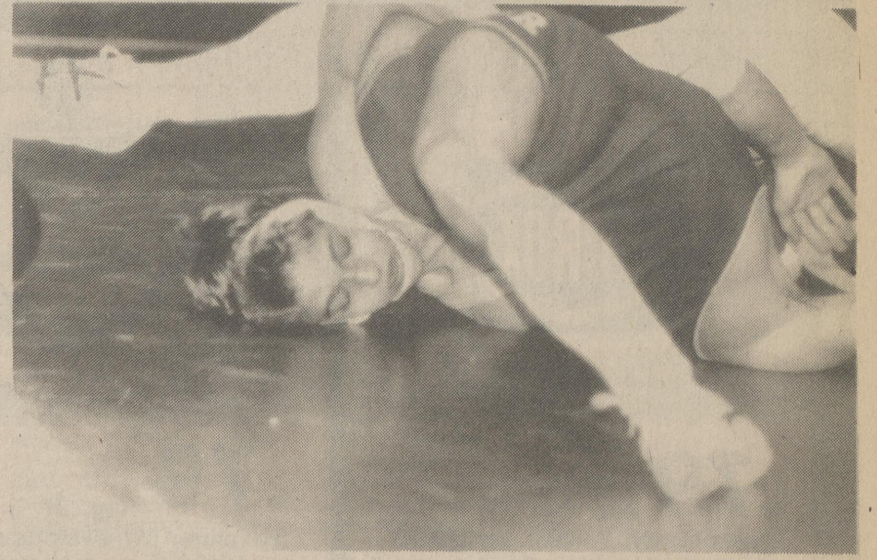

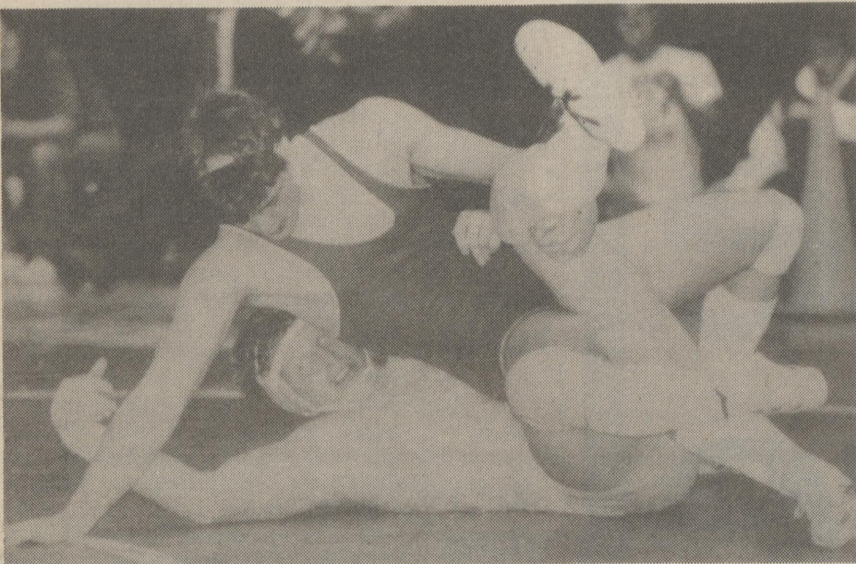

Porter, Fleming and Hicks remain undefeated in mat play

Steve Porter, wrestling at 107 pounds recorded his third and fourth consecutive pin this past week in wins over CR and Milford.

Both Scott Fleming and Marvin Hicks each picked up a win and a pin in their two matches this past week.

The Spartans are now 5-0 for the season.

In the CR match which was away and usually a tough one, the Spartans got off to a flying start with three pins from Steve Porter, Derik Dill (119), and Ken Outten (128). "They looked real good at this level...and we were looking for three pins in the higher classes. We were sure we would get one and maybe more," said Tom Shaffer.

In the 147 pound class Greg Gillie wrestled a real tough kid (Vrundy) and beat him 9-8. "So we were inching along...but we needed a pin here or there," added Shaffer.

"Scott wrestled one of the top weight classes and won his match 8-0. He had the kid on his back several times...but just could not put him away. The kid really had to fight to stay off his back," said Shaffer.

Then Mike Gygyryuk came through with a pin at 3:15 and Marvin Hicks picked up a 13-9 decision.

In the Milford match on Friday night also away, Porter picked up the first pin with 52 seconds in the first period gone. "We are glad Steve and his family moved back into the District. He has real good skills...a hard worker with a strong desire to be the best," said Shaffer.

Derik Dill picked up a pin with 1:18 gone in the first period followed by Ken Outten with another pin with 2:13 gone. "These guys are really coming through for us...if we get the 3 pins down low...it pretty much seals it up for us," said Shaffer.

Greg Gillie came through with a 9-7 decision. "Greg...was leading all through the match, but the kid swept the pressure on and kept inching along. It was a close match," said Shaffer. Gillie had wrestled him in the Milford tournament and won there too.

Pat Sullivan lost his match, and Darryl Cherry lost too for the first time this season.

Gygyryuk, Gillie, Outten, Dill, and Cherry each have lost one match this season. Their record is 4-1.

Following the Cherry loss, Wendell Watson lost 10-1 which put Milford in the lead. "But...not for long as Mike (Gygyryuk), got a pin in 51 seconds followed by a Fleming pin in 37 seconds...followed yet by a pin from Marvin (Hicks) in 3:24," said Shaffer. Coach said Marvin had his opponent on his back and pinned 5 or 6 times in the first period but each time they were out of bounds.

Most of the toughest matches are behind the Spartans now. "But...we still face Smyrna, which is about the best in the conference," said Shaffer.

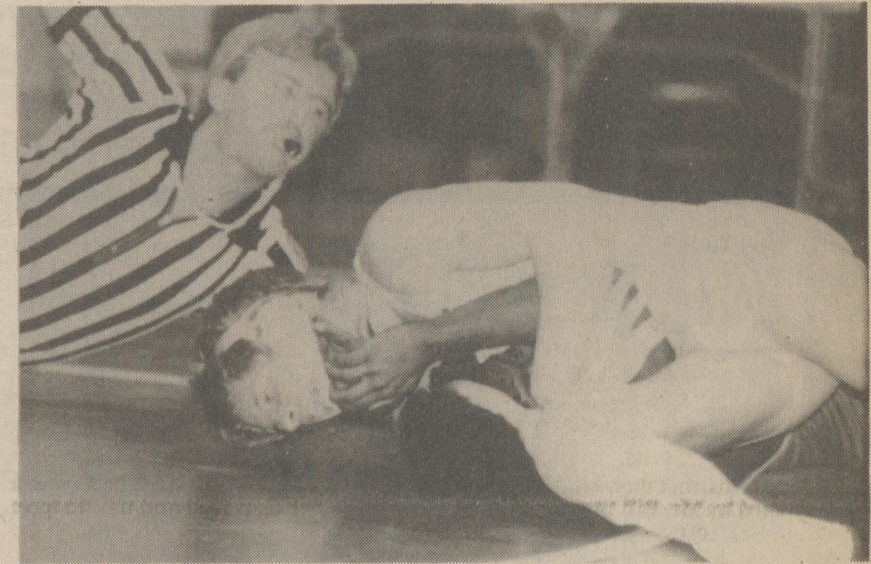
This week the Spartans wrestle Seaford (non-conference) and Woodbridge. "Seaford will be tough," said Shaffer.

The Spartans have a record of 5-0 and lead the Conference's Southern division. "We will take the wins any way we can get them...but it would be an advantage if some could be stretched out some. Take Scott (Fleming) he has had tow forfeits, 2 pins of 45 and 40 seconds and one match went the distance. So he has wrestled only 7 minutes out of 5 matches," said Shaffer.

JV NOTES — In the JV match with Milford, Mark Tozier recorded a pin as did Craig Reed, Joe Brown and Eric Giddens. William Deputy won his match 12-5.

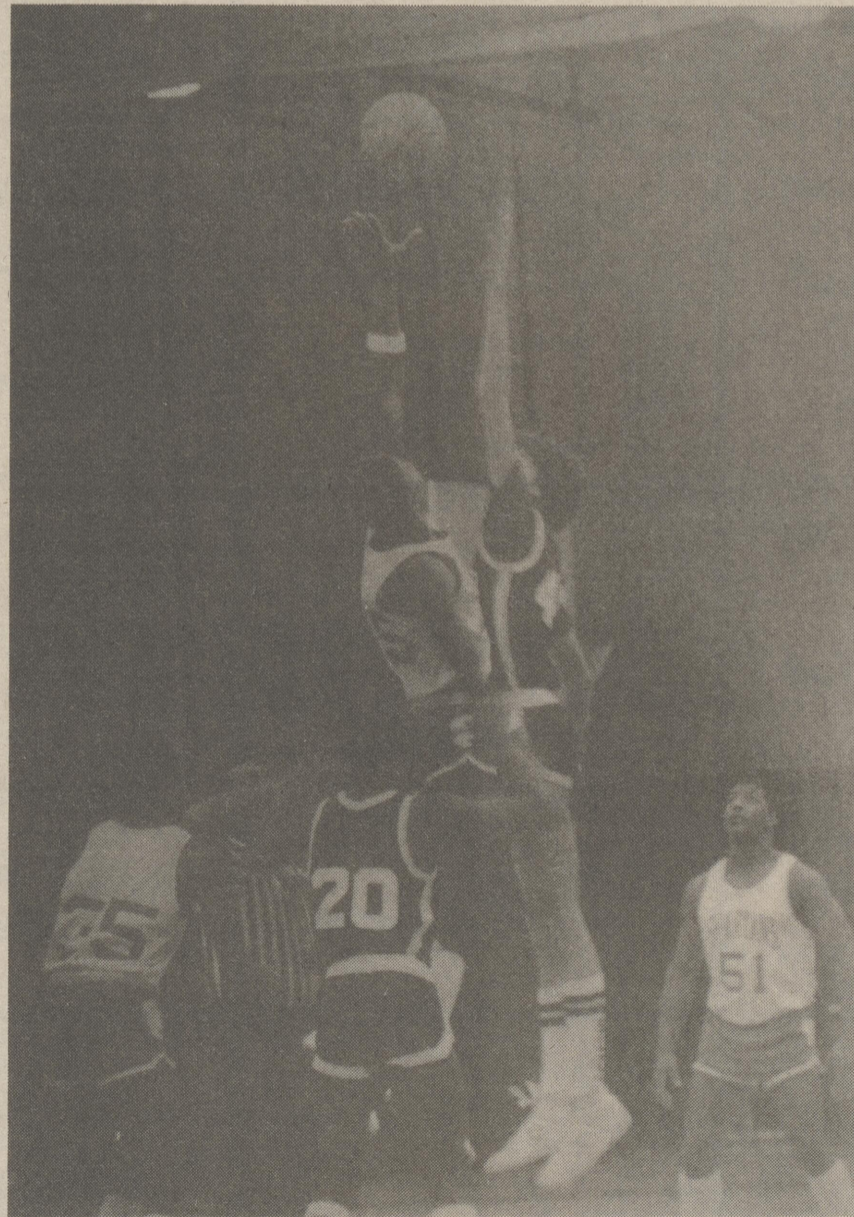

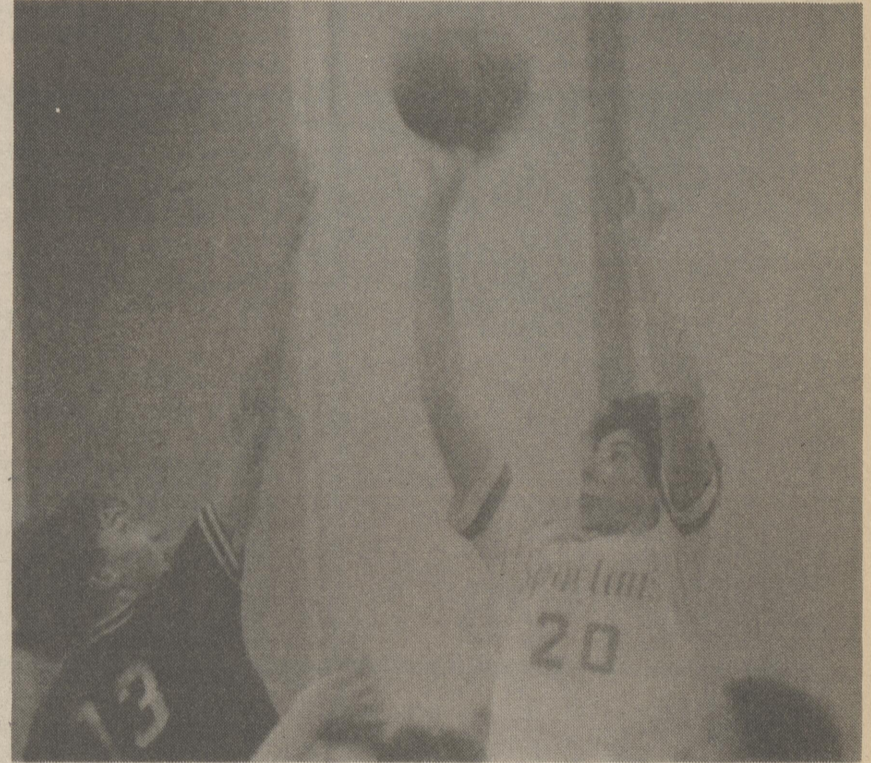
