

Dr. Warmouth loses bid for new trial

DOVER — Dr. Whitfield E. Warmouth, the Millford optometrist who was convicted of sexually assaulting two female patients by a Kent County Court of Common Pleas jury on September 29, 1983 has been denied a new trial by Kent County Court of Common Pleas judge Merrill C. Trader.

whereby he contended that his attorney of record, G. Francis Autman, at the trial was "incompetent to represent him." Judge Trader sat as the presiding judge on both trials. In his opinion last Wednesday, Judge Trader found that Dr. Warmouth had competent representation at his initial trial.

According to Judge Trader, the alleged infractions that Dr. Warmouth put forth by his new attorney, Nicholas H. Rodriguez, were so minor they

would not have affected the outcome of the trial.

Dr. Warmouth alleged in the trial and the hearing that he was "set up" by the victims of the sexual assaults and further that the two testifying victims were known to each other implying some sort of collusion.

Following the 1983 conviction in the Court of Common Pleas, Judge Trader imposed a \$1,000 fine on Dr. Warmouth, probation for two years,

and that he seek psychiatric treatment. Nearly a year later, the State Board of Optometry Examiners imposed its sanctions for unprofessional conduct plus a 5 year revocation of his license to practice, which was followed by a 15 year probation.

Dr. Warmouth appealed these decisions by the State Board, and this resulted in a motion for a new trial. Dr. Warmouth alleged 21 counts were previously misrepresented at the trial as

well as alleged collusion between the victims.

The opinion which Judge Trader handed down on Wednesday suggested that Dr. Warmouth had approved of his attorney during the 1983 trial proceedings. Judge Trader who was the presiding judge in both proceedings said "...the trial judge is in the best position to rule on this type of proceeding." Judge Trader rejected the arguments put forth by Dr. Warmouth's attorney.

Both Rodriguez and Dr. Warmouth agreed they would seek a new trial on appeal to the Supreme Court of Delaware. The sanctions of the Optometry Board is also on appeal to the Supreme Court.

Dr. Warmouth also faces a civil suit by one of the female victims for civil damages.

The optometry practice of Dr. Warmouth continues with a statement from Dr. Warmouth that his office is extremely busy.

Aetna Shirt in Harrington to close

HARRINGTON — Morton and Saul Offitt, owners of Aetna Shirt in Baltimore and Harrington will close their doors by mid-March.

The shirt firm which has been in business since 1970 employs 90 people. The principal item manufactured at the Harrington plant is men's shirts.

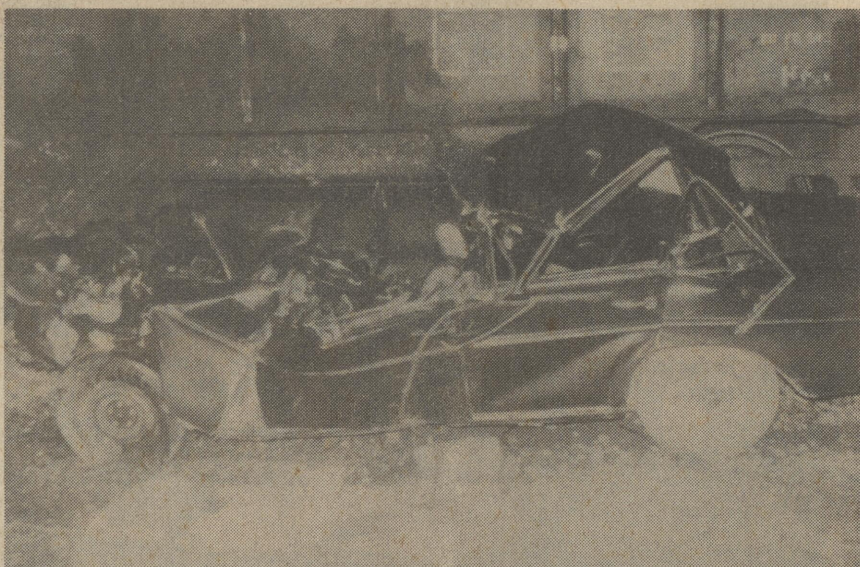
According to the Offitts, the cloth being used to complete one order now for a retailer "should be used by mid-March or sooner, and the doors will close. It is as simple as that," said Saul Offitt when contacted in his Baltimore office. "We cannot compete with the foreign market. No...way. They are just too low, and it is going to get worse," said Offitt.

Offitt said the sales since 1984 have dropped off dramatically, "...and it does not justify keeping two plants open."

The main plant in Baltimore will continue to operate as usual.

The company is trying to find a buyer for the business. "We have excellent stitchers and cutters." The workers produce dress shirts, tuxedo shirts, sport shirts...long and short sleeves for men only. Most of the shirts are wholesaled out to firms who locate them on the retail market.

The Aetna Shirt Company of Baltimore was established in 1916. It is currently owned by brothers Morton and Saul and their cousin Simon B. Offitt.



Two people were killed when this Mercedes Benz collided with a Conrail coal car train on Monday night at approximately 9:30 p.m. The train was heading north on the track from Millsboro to Harrington. Hammond sentenced to two years in 1983 accident

DOVER — Superior Court Judge Robert C. O'Hara sentenced Ronald R. Hammond Jr. to the maximum term of 5 years on Friday. Hammond was granted 3 years probation with a 2-year term in prison.

A Kent County jury on April 25 found Hammond not guilty of vehicular homicide and vehicular assault, but guilty of leaving the scene of the accident.

Judge O'Hara also ordered Hammond to serve 150 hours of community service which had been the recommendation of the Attorney General, and that the community service be with those individuals who are permanently handicapped due to results of accidents involving drunken drivers.

Defense attorney, James Liguori of Brown, Shiels and Chasanov in Dover, pleaded with the court not to jail Hammond in that "...it is a tragedy, but

it need not go any further."

Judge O'Hara speaking for the court said "...it was clear that the major charge had been proven at the April 25th trial...yet the jury spoke."

Judge O'Hara continued that he felt Hammond had received a tremendous break in the April 25th trial when the jury found him not guilty of the major charges.

Among the people present at the sentencing hearing on Friday was State Attorney General, Charles M. Oberly, III who has pushed for stricter enforcement of the law regarding drunk drivers, said "...this should be a sign and clear message to drunken-driving offenders that you cannot drink and drive over the highways of this state. Nevertheless the sentencing stunned the courtroom. Many cried as Hammond was led from the courtroom to the prison at Smyrna.

Phelps and Dill to retire

HARRINGTON — Two long time employees of the Lake Forest School District will retire this June 30th. They are speech pathologist and psychologist, Gloria Dill and high school principal, Dr. Margaret Phelps.

Gloria Dill, a native of Hazleton, Pa. first came here in October, 1948 and became associated with the State Department of Public Instruction until 1969.

With consolidation the order of the day, Mrs. Dill came to the Lake Forest School District as a full time speech pathologist and psychologist. Students with speech and hearing problems were forwarded to Mrs. Dill to correct the problems related to these two areas of a child's education.

Mrs. Dill graduated from Blooms University in Bloomsburg, Pa. where she majored in speech pathology and Spanish with a minor in English.

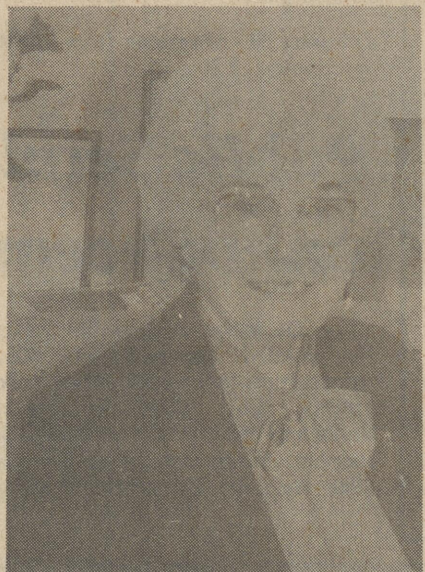
For Gloria Dill, working with children "...has brought the most enjoyment. Where you could correct a child's problem particularly in the area of communication skills."

She continues to teach a course now and then at Wesley College, "...and I will continue to do that following my retirement." The Dills (her husband, Jack, a native of Harrington) plan to travel. "We went to Europe last year and visited the German exchange student who lived with us when we lived in Harrington. We plan to travel to the Far East following my retirement...and also Hawaii," said Mrs. Dill.

Dr. Margaret Phelps, the high school principal, will also retire effective June 30th. Dr. Phelps came to the Felton School District in January of 1958 as an English teacher. "There was a teacher shortage then...and once DPI (Department of Public Instruction) discovered I had an English certification I soon became much in demand."

Dr. Phelps has worked her way through the school system having taught different grades at Felton through the junior high to the high school.

When school consolidation came about, Dr. Phelps moved from Felton to the high school as Chairperson of the English Department. From there she became Guidance Counselor at the

high school and Chairperson of that department. From there she became assistant principal at the high school in 1973, and the principal at the W.T. Chipman School in 1977. She was named principal of the high school in 1978.

In the meantime she had received enough credits to complete her Masters Degree and Doctoral Degree in Education.

Dr. Phelps sees consolidation as bringing many benefits to the district. "It is also true that you lose some things like loss of a feeling of being in a community, but we are able to offer a broader curriculum." During the mid-70's, the movement which began in the 60's peaked. "You had use of drugs, a loose approach to the dress code and general rebellion with the students. They felt they needed more freedom," added Dr. Phelps.

Those problems have been erased for the most part. "I pushed for and got the abandonment of the student smoking area, brought about a more structured environment, raised the passing grade from 60 to 70, and eliminated the free period," said Dr. Phelps. "The free period was due to the freedoms the students sought. They wandered through the halls, which was not good. It permitted a loss of the structured environment," said Dr. Phelps.

Conrail reports on net income

PHILADELPHIA — Consolidated Rail Corporation reported net income of \$112 million on revenue of \$783 million for the fourth quarter 1985. Audited net income for full year 1985 was \$442 million on revenue of \$3.21 billion.

Net income for the fourth quarter 1984 was \$89 million on revenue of \$792 million, while the full year 1984 net income was \$500 million on revenue of \$3.38 billion. Pursuant to a 1981 labor agreement, Conrail's employees were paid wages below industry levels for the

first six months of 1984; wages were restored to industry levels as of July 1, 1984, and continued at those levels for the full year of 1985. On an "apples-to-apples" basis, if industry-scale wages had been in effect for all of 1984, the company would have recorded net income of about \$435 million.

Net income per common share for fourth quarter 1985 was \$4.06 vs. \$3.30 for the same period of 1984. For full year 1985, net income per common share was \$16.02 vs. \$18.50 for 1984.

Early Childhood Development Center - A closer look

On January 22, two Lake Forest innovative programs were picked for presentations at the University of Delaware. One was the L.F.H.S. program for problem children, S.T.E.P.S., and the other was a slide and cassette presentation on the Early Childhood Developmental Center (ECDC). This center is located at the Lake Forest North Elementary School and two teachers in the program, Mrs. Nancy Campbell and Mr. Robert Hawkins, prepared and presented the ECDC program. This program was extremely well received and literature will now be disseminated to all state school districts.

SCOPE OF THE PROGRAM

The ECDC serves all mildly handicapped children in the Lake Forest School District between the ages of 3½ and 8 who have been properly identified and placed in accordance with the State guidelines. Each child's progress is reviewed annually by the staff and parents to determine continued placement in the ECDC.

IDENTIFICATION AND PLACEMENT

Each year the ECDC conducts a search in the Lake Forest School District for all children between the ages of 3½ and 6 who may exhibit any mild handicap that could result in potential learning delay. This screening includes (in order):

1. The DIAL-R (Developmental Indicators for the Assessment of Learning-Revised)
2. The LAP (Learning Accomplishment Profile)
3. An evaluation of vision, hearing, and speech
4. Individual evaluation by a trained

school psychologist. Children are placed in the program only if all four of the above screening techniques indicate eligibility and with written parental permission.

CURRICULUM

The ECDC curriculum has been developed to accommodate individual differences. Though children go through the same sequence of development, they obviously do not do so at the same rates. These differences are accommodated in several ways — a variety of activities matching tasks to needs, using different techniques, and repeating the content in interesting ways. The curriculum offers a wealth of activities including many "hands on" experiences through which children learn about themselves and their world.

PARENT COMPONENT

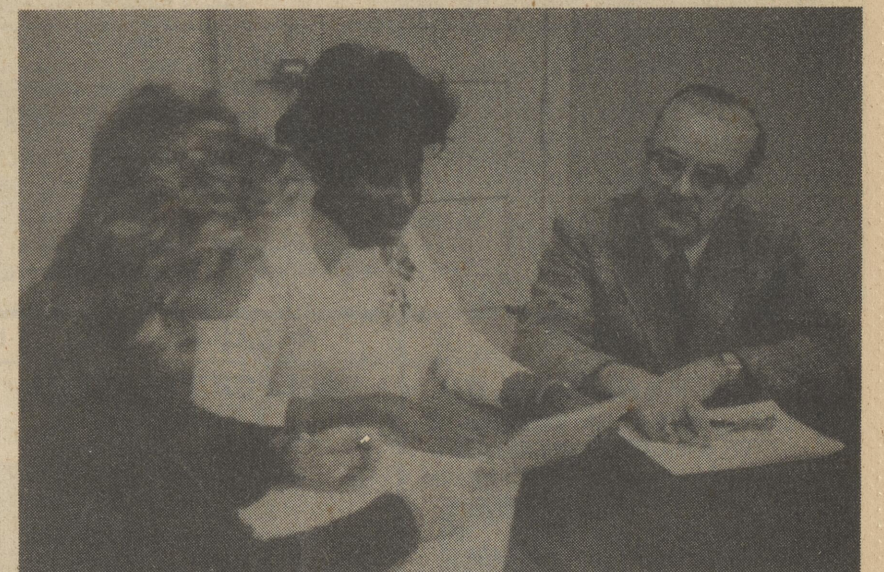
The peak of parental interest in the progress of their children in school is usually during the early childhood years. The ECDC attempts to capitalize on this interest by visits each week to the homes of several students. A monthly newsletter and four parent workshops yearly supplement the usual parent conferences and reports.

FUNDING

The ECDC is funded primarily by Special Education Unit funding of the State of Delaware. Additional funds are provided by the Lake Forest School District.

Teachers who work in the program other than Mrs. Campbell and Mr. Hawkins include Ms. Vickie Hobbs, Ms. Mary Jean Mason and Mrs. Doris Ridenour. Aides in the program are Mrs. Karen Bedsole, Mrs. Doris Bostick and Mrs. Marion Haines.

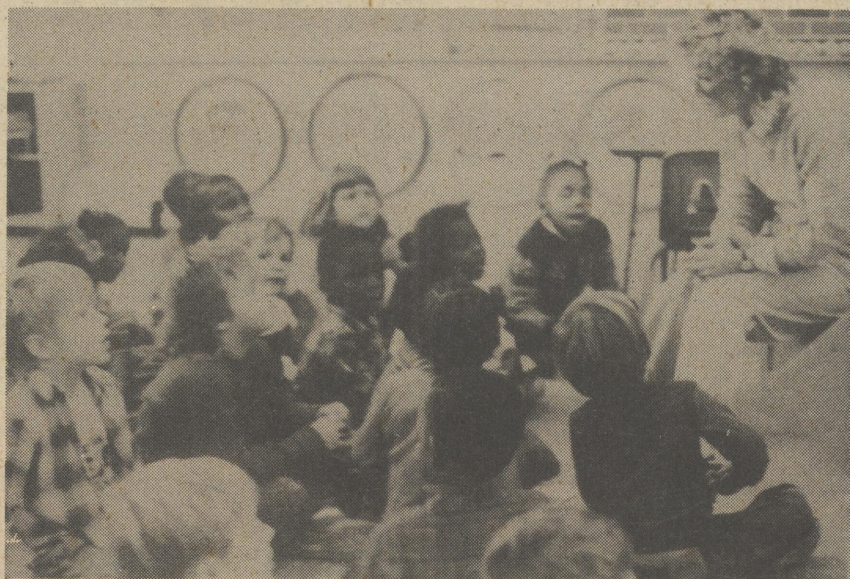

I recently read in one of the local papers that the Internal Revenue Service is purchasing or is about to purchase, a new computer system to help them process tax forms. 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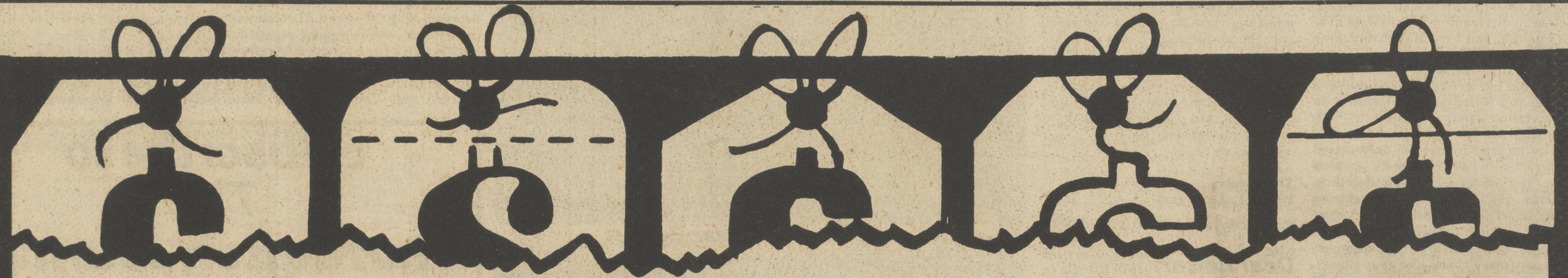

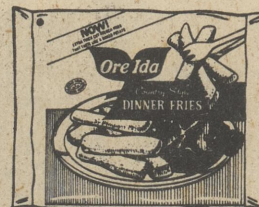

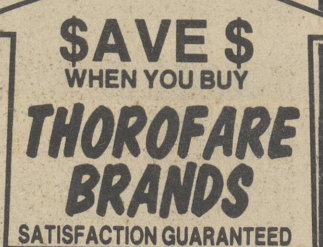

Shrove Tuesday soon became known as Pancake Day. In old England, housewives flocked to the churches on the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday to be "shriven" or absolved of their sins. At the tolling of the bell in the morning, it was customary for the housewife to drop whatever she was doing and hurry to confession. Since this was also the day for feasting and eating pancakes in the small towns, these holiday cakes soon became known as "shriving cakes" because they were made on the

The English cooks made their pancakes according to this formula. These ingredients will be included in the recipe for the pancakes at St. Stephen's this year. Annual Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper, February 11 - On Tuesday, February 11, from 5:00 to 7:00, the parishioners of St. Stephen's Church will serve their annual Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper. The public is cordially invited. Tickets may be purchased from members of St. Stephen's or at the door.

Shrove Tuesday, Fat Tuesday, Mardi Gras, or Pancake Day falls this year on February 11. Pancake Day is a centuries-old traditional holiday. Even older than Pancake Day are the pancakes for which it is famous and the reminder that this is the last day of feasting before the Lenten fast begins.

The pancake was the first known form of cooked bread. People in the neolithic age created a food which was destined to be a world favorite. They made on their hot stones "griddles" the world's first pancakes from ground wheat and corn. Our ancestors discovered that this moistened ground grain baked on stones made a delicious meal. Pancakes delight the people of the world to this day.

It wasn't until 461 A.D. that fasting during the Lenten season was practiced widely. In that year, St. Leo decreed that Christians should "fulfill with their fast the apostolic institution of the forty days". St. Leo (known as "The Great") took interest in the affairs of all parts of the church. He was the one who persuaded Attila, the Hun, to spare Rome. After Leo's decree, the custom of fasting during Lent spread rapidly. Its annual observance was ordered by the church in the ninth century. Pancake Day, as we know it today, originated in the year 1000.

At that time, an English abbot, Aelfric, set forth the proclamation that "in the week immediately before Lent, everyone should go to his confessor and confess his deeds, and the confessor shall so shrive him as he may then hear by his deeds what he is to do."

This proclamation by the Abbot resulted in wide observance of "Shrove Tuesday", which soon became, in addition to a time for confessing sins, a day of merrymaking in many parts of the world.

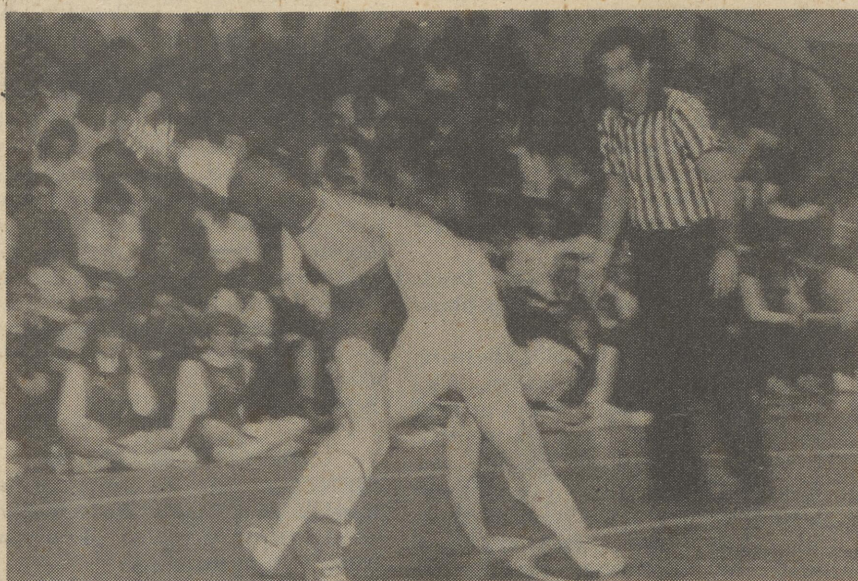

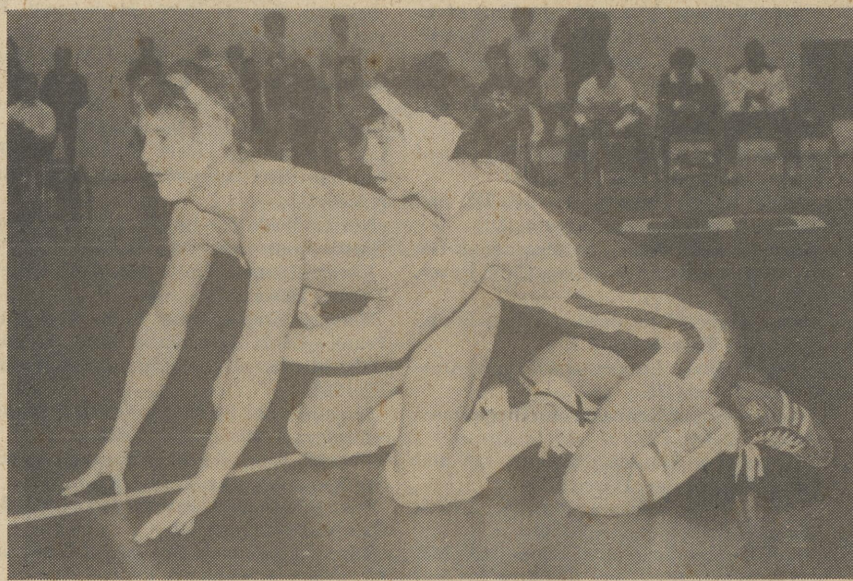

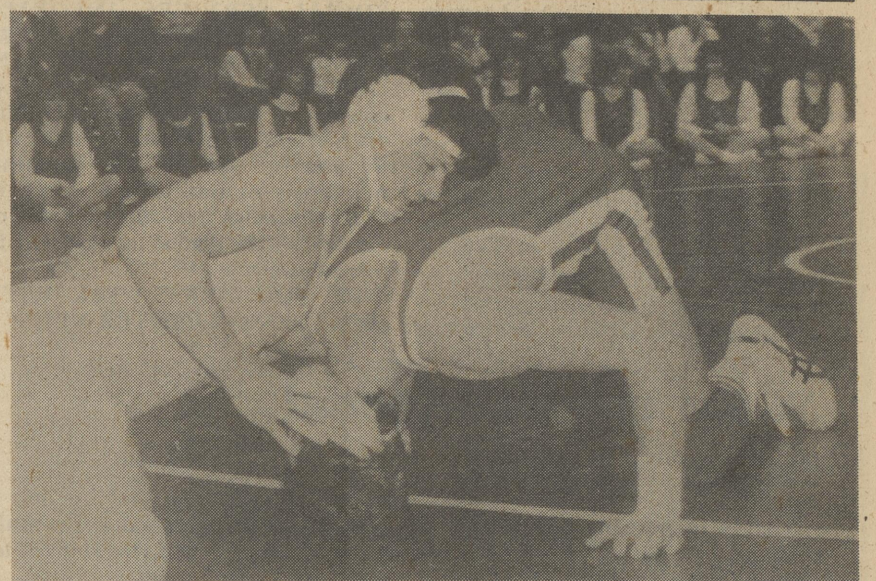

At 132 lb. class, Darryl Cherry lost to Dave Leager with a pin in the first period. This was Leager's 45th consecutive win which broke his school record. "Darryl went after him all through the match...but Leager, a more experienced wrestler, was able to out-

maneuver Darryl. We are proud of Darryl for hanging in there," said Shaffer.

Pat Sullivan almost recovered from a bout with the flu, lost his match by a technical fall. "Pat was moving all during the match, but he ran into a more experienced wrestler," said Shaffer. "Pat was real determined to stay off his back...and he did," added Shaffer.

Greg Gillie surrendered a 13-4 loss in the 145-lb. class. "Then Smyrna kid went right out, took Greg down...and started building points. That's how they do it...get early points and keep building or holding on," added Shaffer.

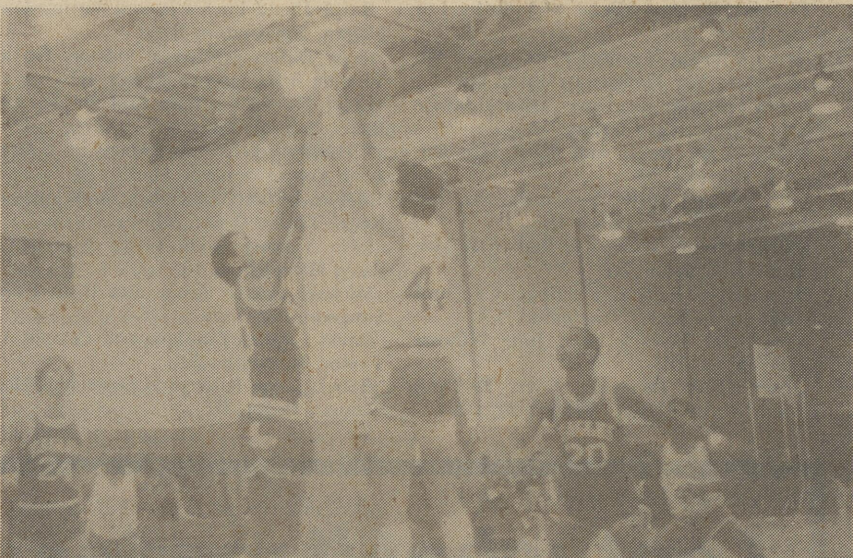

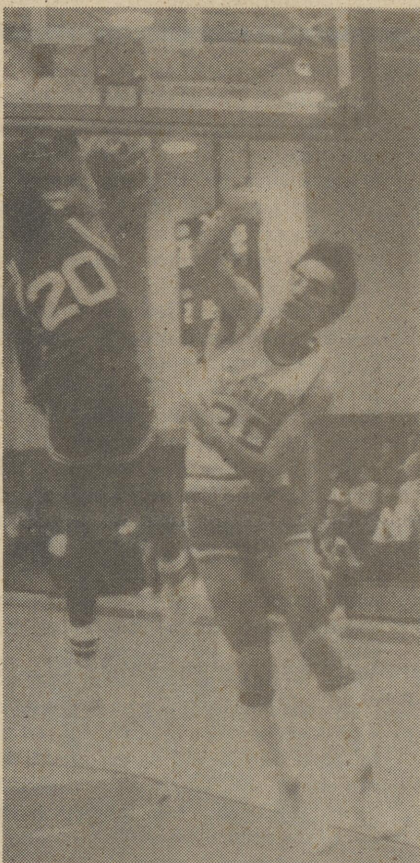

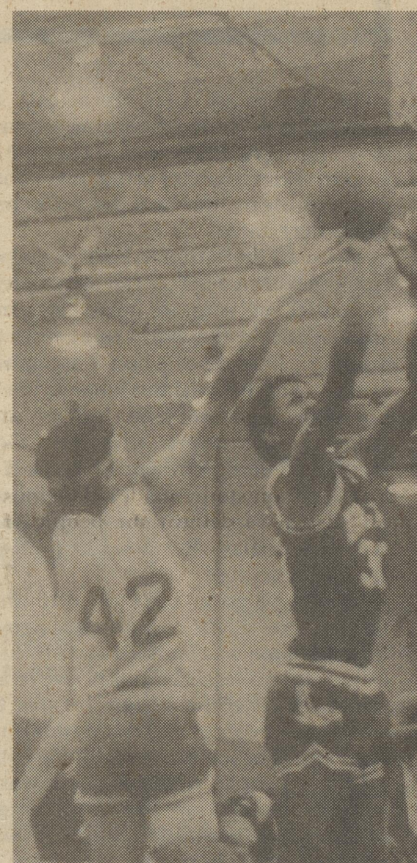

Lent-what it means

The season of Lent is a call to conversion — a time of turning around, of changing our direction. It is a time to stop running, to cease being busy about many things while avoiding the one thing necessary.

Lent is an invitation to burrow deeper into the barren desert of our secret selves to rediscover who we really are...not who we are in the world or at work or school or home; not who we are to our families and friends; but who we are to ourselves — alone and hungry and naked in the desert, with only God watching. Being scrutinized by God is an awesome experience. That is why we are prepared for it by the special sign of Ash Wednesday. But a sign can have several meanings.

Take the mark of Cain. At first thought, we might consider it a sign of evil; this man was branded as a brother-killer. But on second thought, we recall that Cain asked for a sign, because he was afraid people would kill him for a murderer. So God marked him out from all other people. And that mark was a sign of contradiction: first, it was a sign of sin; but it was also a sign of God's personal protection.

The mark of ashes means much the same to us. It is first of all a sign of sin; of the sins obvious to others, of secret sins known only to ourselves, of deeper

inclinations to evil that we may not be completely aware of, of the radical unworthiness that is simply a part of being a creature. It is the sign of our personal sins, and of our compliance with the evil in the world. All that sin marks us out for death, just as it did for Cain.

But as for Cain, so for us — the mark is also a sign to ourselves and to the world that we remain under the personal protection of God. But we have more than Cain, more than protection, more than just coming out even with sin.

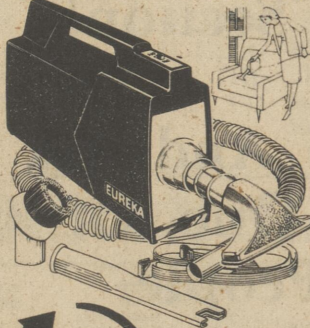
There is another sign: we receive ashes in the form of a cross. That signifies our belief that the cross has overcome evil at its root, that the death of Jesus is stronger than any number of sins we could possibly commit, that where sin abounds just there does grace more abundantly.

Ash Wednesday is a reminder that God's justice is blinded by God's mercy. The cross of ashes is God's annual sign to us — like spring — that death does not have the last word. Under the protection of the cross, we believe that, out of the dead ashes of our past sins, we will come to live again.

NB: This medication from Celebration is one which can be helpful to us all as we being our Lenten journey.

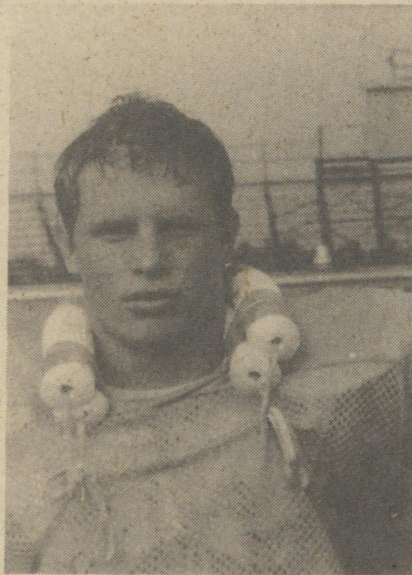

Division of Fish and Wildlife

An illegal deer spotlighting outing had near tragic consequences for one Sussex County man last week.

On January 21, at 10:45 p.m., a Selbyville police officer stopped a vehicle carrying five persons for possible motor vehicle violations. As the officer approached on foot, the passengers apparently tried to conceal a .30.06 rifle. The gun accidentally fired, striking passenger Joseph L. Lynch Jr., 19, of Frankford, in the arm. Lynch was rushed to a nearby hospital for treatment, and after a subsequent investigation, Selbyville police notified state game wardens of possible game law violations.

As a result of the game warden's investigation, two other passengers in the vehicle have already pleaded guilty to charges of illegal spotlighting and conspiracy, and have received fines of \$100 on each charge. The two were identified as: Anthony V. Littleton, 25, of Georgetown; and John Mark Franklin, 23, of Bishopville, Maryland. Charges of conspiracy, hunting deer out of season, discharging a firearm from a public road, and spotlighting, are still pending against Medford Clyde Franklin, 26, of Route 100, Box 193A, Dagsboro.

A juvenile in the car was also charged with spotlighting and conspiracy, and charges will be brought in family court.

In 1986, rewards of up to \$100 will be

paid for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons committing the following offenses:

1. Placement or tending of 220 and 330 Conibear traps in any field, woods or marshland in Delaware.
2. Possession of illegally killed deer.
3. Killing of Endangered Species (Peregrine Falcon, Bald Eagle, all sea turtles).
4. Illegal sale of wildlife.
5. Illegal killing and sale of beaver or red fox.
6. Hunting during period of license revocation.
7. Killing wild turkeys.

The Operation Game Theft number is 1-800-292-3030.

Persons witnessing any hunting or related activities that appear illegal or suspicious are urged to call the DNREC radio room at 736-4580.

Remember: Wildlife offenses need to be investigated by a game warden immediately if there is a chance to make an arrest. Any delay in getting the information to the warden decreases the chances that an arrest and conviction can be obtained.

The Division of Fish and Wildlife recently joined with other federal and private agencies in offering a reward of up to \$4,600 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons responsible for shooting a bald eagle that was found in Bombay Hook National Wildlife Refuge.
