Felton Council reviews

Town Council was called to order on Monday, April 7 at the Felton Railroad Station. President George Egler called the meeting to order and Secretary Jim O'Connor read the minutes from the

previous meeting. The issues of interest from the previous meeting were the discussion of the insurance on the water tower with the William Moore Insurance Agency. Another issue brought up was the possibility of having police officers patrol around the elementary school school. Another point from the previous meeting was that Rob Parnell had his building permit approved for a laundromat that will be open seven days a week until 9 p.m. One other issue concerning the town's firemen is that the referendum was passed for them to

wash their cars at the fire station. Also councilman James Sluter inquired about Bud Hurd's status as a council member while he is being paid by the Town as a police officer. A vote was held at the previous meeting to have Hurd removed as a police officer. This motion was defeated by council. With this the reading of the old business minutes was completed and the

discussion of old business proceeded. With the floor open William Myers proceeded to speak about the Kerry Development. This is a proposed 18 house development in western Felton. It will be a single family dwelling project in that each house will range from \$42,000 to \$55,000. Residents of North Street and surrounding areas are worried about a traffic problem if the

project goes through. The town council will have a public meeting on Tuesday, April 15 at 7:30 p.m. at the railroad station. At this meeting council will meet with all residents involved and listen to their views and suggestions. The planning and zoning committee is currently looking into the Kerry Development and seeing what the long range plans are. As of right now the sewer system will be able to contain everything, and

the water situation is being studied. On the issue of new business, two families have requested building permits. David and Julie Bickling would like to add a bedroom and dining room.Blake and Holly Scott of Branch

Street inquired about a two car garage. Both of these requests were put on hold until the public meeting on the 15th.

The town is also looking into the purchase of office equipment for the town office. Carroll's will be having a sale of office equipment on the 17th and council members will be checking out the equipment. The town is looking to purchase a phone recording and answering machine, a new copier, and a

Also in police business there were some new developments. Police officers will be on duty on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights until 2 a.m.

Council also appointed Jim Sluter to be in charge of parks and recreation. He will see that the town will be beautified and cleaned up.

Police officers also received increases in pay starting with the new pay period. Police officers received a one dollar raise across the board. Also, all new employees of the town of April 1, 1986 will have a 1.45% Medicare tax taken out of their pay as signed into law by President Reagan.

Mary Ann Stumpf received a raise from \$115 a month to \$150 a month. All raises are effective on the start of the

next pay period. This was the final order of business for the evening and motion was made to adjourn the meeting and it was carried. Currently the town is auditing its books. At the previous meeting there was a motion to hold all bills until the receives audit was completed. As of right now the audit is not completed so the motion to hold all bills has been rescinded. All outstanding bills have been paid.

suffer from a fungus disease which causes twigs and branches to die back. Symptoms start at the lowest branches and may progress to the crown.

Infected leaves have small, purplerimmed spots which later become large blotches that may run together and kill the whole leaf. Another sign of decline is the appearance and rapid growth of water sprouts or suckers on infected


From the water sprouts, the disease may spread into a limb or trunk, forming cankers of dead tissue which limit water flow into the affected limb. These appear as sunken, cracked or discolored areas beneath the bark.

Though there is no cure for this disease, dieback can be reduced by spraying dogwood foliage with a fungicide, starting when flower buds have opened to the cup stage. The government recommends either mancozeb (Fore), benomyl (Benlate), mancozeb plus thiophanate methyl (Zyban), or maneb (Dithane M-22).

Dogwood trees in the Northeast often Check labels for rates and handling precautions.

> Apply one of these materials weekly so that developing leaves are constantly protected by a film of fungicide. When leaves reach full size, spray at four-week intervals until early July. Such routine sprays greatly reduce the amount of leaf spotting and the movement of infection into a tree. Warm, dry spring weather



also helps prevent the spread of the

Weather extremes appear to influence the severity of anthracnose infections. Long rainy spells in early spring, periods of drought in summer or fall, and sudden temperature drops in winter all stress dogwoods. The plant pathologist recommends adding up to 1 inch of supplemental water per week during dry periods over the growing season. Clearing out turf under the tree canopy and replacing it with several inches of mulch helps conserve moisture for the dogwood's shallow

Fertilize during the dormant season or in early spring to further promote vigor. However, never fertilize after mid-July because tender tissue that develops late in the growing season won't harden off before winter.

Prune out dead water sprouts and low branches on trees that show signs of decline. But prune only when foliage is dry, Mulrooney cautions. He also advises raking and destroying fallen leaves in the fall and picking off dead, clinging leaves. These procedures will help reduce the number of fungus spores that remain to reinfect the tree or spread to other dogwoods next spring.



The economist bases his preductions on a report issued by the Food and Agricultural Policy Research Institute (FAPRI), at the University of Missouri and Iowa State University. Institute economists recently analyzed the new farm bill and projected its effects through 1989.

Their projections point to an increase in broiler consumption from 55 pounds per person in 1985 to 60 pounds in 1989. National broiler production would increase from 13.6 to 15.2 billion pounds. Lower feed costs would help

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How will the 1985 Food Security Act stimulate this increase, resulting in wholesale broiler prices falling from 52

costs would decline as farm prices for corn and soybeans became further depressed. FAPRI projects corn prices through 1989 to hover in the \$1.94 to \$1.99 per bushel range, or well below the 1985/1986 price of \$2.47. Soybeans could range from \$4.86 to \$5.05 per bushel, compared to \$5.19 in 1985/1986.

Though returns decline, loan rates and target prices for corn should make participation in the government's Feed Grain Program advantageous to growers, Vaughn says. Corn returns per acre over variable production costs (excluding land costs) are projected at \$167.15 (1985/1986), \$148.58 (1986/1987), \$145.04 (1987/1988), and \$137.83 (1988/1989) for growers who participate. Returns to nonparticipants are projected at \$130.81, \$60.88, \$51.95 and \$48.95, respectively. Returns per acre to soybean growers are projected at \$102.72 (1985/1986), \$74.61 (1986/1987), \$78.27 (1987/1988), and \$77.90 (1988/1989).

Based on these estimates, high participation in the Feed Grain Program is likely, Vaughn says. "As is

the case with most major U.S. farm commodities, the future for corn and soybeans is one of excess production capacity relative to market demand.

Stocks will remain high, and any rebound in exports will occur slowly." Two factors which could affect these projections are oil prices and the value of the U.S. dollar. The FAPRI report was issued in February, and the analysis was conducted before petroleum prices began to fall sharply. If petroleum prices stay down, Vaughn says, farm production costs will be lower and net income higher.

It is also possible that the value of the dollar will drop faster than anticipated. Vaughn says this could stimulate exports a bit, though not much, due to the lag in the response of exports to

The FAPRI report also does not take into account impacts of the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings Act for budget deficit reduction.

Congress already has modified the farm bill and more changes seem likely. So Vaughn urges farmers to pay close attention to proposed farm legislation in the months ahead, just as they did

"Smoking survey" results

Should smokers refrain from smoking smokers.) in the presence of non smokers?

Would you support state legislation that would create no-smoking areas? These were just a couple of the questions asked of Delawareans who participated in a recent survey conducted by the Delaware Household Survey, College of Urban Affairs and Public Policy. The survey was concerned with many different issues on smoking, and the results may have a strong impact on House Bill 414. Bill 414 is an act to ammend part II, Title 16 of the Delaware Code relating to health and safety, and providing for the use of public places by smokers and non-

The survey which was conducted for the Delaware Lung Association, shows that 93 percent of Delawareans now believe that smoking is hazardous to their health. Sixty-three percent of all adults believe that smokers should refrain from smoking in a public place. (Participants in the survey were not primarily non smokers. 50 percent of

From those individuals who agreed that smokers should refrain from smoking in the presence of nonsmokers, 44 percent agreed that smokers should refrain from smoking at home, 68 percent agreed that smokers should refrain in restaurants and 62 percent agreed that smokers should refrain at

Of all Delawareans surveyed, fifty-four percent were in favor of no smoking legislation in the workplace, sixty-four percent favored no smoking legislation in government buildings, sixty-eight percent favored no smoking legislation in auditoriums, sixty-six percent favored no smoking legislation in restaurants, and sixty-three percent favored no smoking legislation in food

This survey provides evidence that Delawareans now understand that the health hazards of smoking go beyond the active smoker to the involuntary smoker. Smoking can no longer be viewed as merely an issue of courtesy, it those surveyed were smokers or past is a serious health issue.

Governor Castle challenges Ralph **Nader Report**

A report recently issued by a Ralph Nader group rated Delaware's public mental health program among the worst in the country. According to the study, only three other states were ranked lower in the quality of inpatient and outpatient services to seriously mentally ill persons.

That would be very disturbing if it

After reviewing the report, it is very apparent that Nader's group relied on outdated information and did not take into account the great strides we have made in improving mental health services in Delaware. Among the reasons given for the low rating were a heavy reliance on inpatient services at the expense of outpatient and community services and problems and scandal at the Delaware State Hospital. Since the appointment of Dr. Thomas Updike as the Director of the Division of Alcoholism, Drug Abuse and Mental Health in December 1983, those problems have begun to be addressed.

Delaware has been moving people from sterile institutions back into the

A rehabilitation program is now in place in New Castle County to teach community living and vocational skills to the chronically mentally ill. Similar programs are scheduled to begin this fall in both Kent and Sussex Counties. In addition, a statewide program was instituted to prepare mentally ill elderly persons to live in the community and prevent institutionalization.

Dr. Updike has also established community mental health centers and 24-hour psychiatric emergency services. including mobile crisis units, statewide.

And, new leadership and tighter management controls have been established at the State Hospital.
