Kitty Cole fills Sussex Council Seat

A former Harrington woman, Katherine T. "Kitty" Cole, the widow of Charles W. Cole, was appointed on April 1 to her husband's seat on the Sussex County Council.
Charles Cole died of a heart attack on March 18. His wife will complete the final year of his third, four-year term as representative of a district that covers various inland towns and most of the Delaware oceanfront. Kitty Cole has lived in Rehoboth Beach for 38 years.
She was scheduled to be sworn in on April 8. She will be one of two Republicans on the five-member council.
"I moved to Harrington from Georgetown when I was one-year old. I left Harrington after I finished the eighth grade," said Cole.
"I have a lot of happy memories of Harrington, and still have many old friends there," she added.
"Cole is the daughter of George Toppin, a retired railroad worker who died in October at the age of 91.
"I remember every nook and alley in

Harrington. My family owned a restaurant during the Depression in the Thirties. It was between the First National Bank and Sharp's Drug Store," Cole reminisced.
"I have many fond memories of Harrington. It will always be a special place for me," she said.
Cole owns a small real estate firm in Bethany Beach and is a member of the Sussex County Environmental Association. She worked closely with her husband in controlling development in eastern Sussex.
Referring to her council appointment, she said, "My husband would have wanted it that way."
"My husband enjoyed the company of the other council members. They had disagreements, but they always got along. I think they were hurt very much by his death," Cole said.
"I'm sure I'll get along with them too," she added.
She said she would take her council duties "one day at a time."
"Say hello to my friends in Harrington," she laughed.

Harrington Chamber merges with Milford

Felton Council reviews housing proposal

The monthly meeting of the Felton Town Council was called to order on Monday, April 7 at the Felton Railroad Station. President George Egler called the meeting to order and Secretary Jim O'Connor read the minutes from the previous meeting.
The issues of interest from the previous meeting were the discussion of the insurance on the water tower with the William Moore Insurance Agency. Another issue brought up was the possibility of having police officers patrol around the elementary school when children are going or coming to school. Another point from the previous meeting was that Rob Parnell had his building permit approved for a laundromat that will be open seven days a week until 9 p.m. One other issue concerning the town's firemen is that the referendum was passed for them to wash their cars at the fire station.
Also councilman James Sluter inquired about Bud Hurd's status as a council member while he is being paid by the Town as a police officer. A vote was held at the previous meeting to have Hurd removed as a police officer. This motion was defeated by council.
With this the reading of the old business minutes was completed and the discussion of old business proceeded.
With the floor open William Myers proceeded to speak about the Kerry Development. This is a proposed 18 house development in western Felton. It will be a single family dwelling project in that each house will range from \$42,000 to \$55,000. Residents of North Street and surrounding areas are worried about a traffic problem if the project goes through.
The town council will have a public meeting on Tuesday, April 15 at 7:30 p.m. at the railroad station. At this meeting council will meet with all residents involved and listen to their views and suggestions. The planning and zoning committee is currently looking into the Kerry Development and seeing what the long range plans are. As of right now the sewer system will be able to contain everything, and the water situation is being studied.
On the issue of new business, two families have requested building permits. David and Julie Bickling would like to add a bedroom and dining room. Blake and Holly Scott of Branch

Street inquired about a two car garage. Both of these requests were put on hold until the public meeting on the 15th.
The town is also looking into the purchase of office equipment for the town office. Carroll's will be having a sale of office equipment on the 17th and council members will be checking out the equipment. The town is looking to purchase a phone recording and answering machine, a new copier, and a rear drawer fireproof filing cabinet.
The town will post notices about grass cutting and cleaning of the town hall. The cutting of the town grass will be many areas around town, and this will be spelled out.
Bills of March were paid. Total amount paid was \$3964.66.
The police report was given to council and read. There were 155 total man hours last month. With that were 123 gallons of gas used and 856 miles of travel. There were 15 complaints, five criminal arrests, 28 traffic violations, three warnings and 402 property checks.
Also in police business there were some new developments. Police officers will be on duty on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights until 2 a.m.
Council also appointed Jim Sluter to be in charge of parks and recreation. He will see that the town will be beautified and cleaned up.
Police officers also received increases in pay starting with the new pay period. Police officers received a one dollar raise across the board. Also, all new employees of the town of April 1, 1986 will have a 1.45% Medicare tax taken out of their pay as signed into law by President Reagan.
Mary Ann Stumpf received a raise from \$115 a month to \$150 a month. All raises are effective on the start of the next pay period.
This was the final order of business for the evening and motion was made to adjourn the meeting and it was carried.
Currently the town is auditing its books. At the previous meeting there was a motion to hold all bills until the audit was completed. As of right now the audit is not completed so the motion to hold all bills has been rescinded. All outstanding bills have been paid.
A proposal for the council was brought up by Ron and Mary Ann

The flowers went — to a new home.
Nancy C. and Alvin W. Thompson, who own the Country Flowers shop on Second Avenue Extended in Harrington, have moved their flower shop to a Pennsylvania Dutch-style barn on Del. 14 (Milford-Harrington Rd.), a quarter-mile east of Harrington.
"People have been good to us. Business has been good. We needed more space," said Nancy Thompson.
The Thompsons started the business in an enclosed carport. Soon the flowers were encroaching on their dining room and then their living room. It was then that the Thompsons decided that the flowers needed a home of their own.
Since the flower shop will also feature a new line of gifts, the business name has been changed to Country Flowers & Gifts. The gift line will include glassware, novelties, soaps, spices, candles and pottery.

To avoid interruptions in customer service, the Thompsons are moving gradually to the new location.
Thompson's business also provides flowers for weddings; funerals, parties and banquets.
"We had 72 weddings last year, and we're booked with weddings until the end of this year," said Thompson.
"We've done work for I.L.C. and Nanticoke Homes," she added.
The business employs one full-time worker and others who work "off and on." Family members also give their help.
Tina Barrett, who is president of the Delaware FFA, is the full-time worker. She also designs floor displays and floral arrangements.
The new home is a 1,232 square-foot building built by general contractor Ken Barrett of Wyoming.
A grand opening for the new store will be held between 1 and 5 p.m. on April 20. Refreshments will be served.

Taxpayers get help from IRS over phone lines

Clare Shy Winter, Director of the Wilmington District Internal Revenue Service says that those individuals who have not received their refunds within ten weeks of the date they filed their tax return can call a special toll-free number and check on the status of their refund.

This service is available from 6:30 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. with a touch tone telephone and during normal business

hours with a rotary dial telephone.

The number to call with both the touch tone and rotary dial telephone is 1-800-554-4477.

To use this service you may need to have a copy of your tax return available as you will be asked to supply your social security number, filing status, and the exact amount of the refund you are expecting.

Our Tele-Tax service also provides

recorded tax information on approximately 150 topics that answer many Federal tax questions. The service will advise you of the available tax topics and may be reached by calling the number shown above 1-800-554-4477.

Drug raid nets 480 grams of crack

During the course of the three month investigation, undercover officers learned of the size of the distribution operation and that they were armed and potentially dangerous.

State Police SORT members secured the areas prior to the raids and insured not only the safety of those involved but of the area residents who have been living with this problem for some time. The raids were conducted without injury or incident. The resulting raids and car stop netted approximately 480 grams of the dangerous drug crack, most found in the vehicle. Police indicated that 480 grams of crack is worth about \$48,000 on the street. Police also seized a .12 gauge shotgun and two other revolvers at the residences as well as a total of over \$8,000 cash. Police seized the '86 Oldsmobile and a 1983 Chevrolet Monte Carlo registered to Lindor.

Delaware man dies in car crash

DENTON, Md. — a 72-year-old Greenwood, Delaware man was killed Friday afternoon after he lost control of his vehicle and was thrown out.

State police said James E. Westmoreland was driving east on Hobbs Road, about five miles east of

Denton at 4:30 p.m. when the accident happened. His 71-year-old sister received minor injuries police said.

Police said Westmoreland apparently lost control of the car and it ran off the right side of the road. It then went back onto the road, slid back off and struck

an embankment. Westmoreland was thrown from the car, and the car landed on top of him. He was declared dead at the scene.

His sister, Floy Westmoreland, was treated for minor injuries at Easton Memorial Hospital and released.

Census bureau to collect labor force, child support & alimony data here

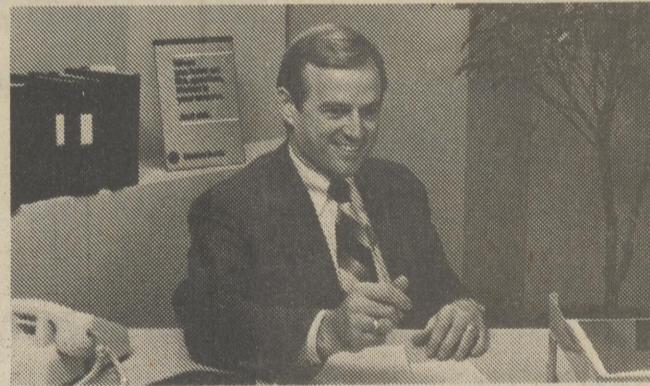

child support and alimony payments. The labor force data will contribute to April's national employment and unemployment picture to be released May 2 by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. February's civilian unemployment rate of 7.3 percent rose dramatically from
