

Policy on vehicle use tabled

School Board receives guidance report and acts on resignations

HARRINGTON — A special meeting of the Lake Forest School Board last Thursday night at the W.T. Chipman Library heard from the Guidance Department at the Junior High School and High School levels.

Sarah Webb told the Board that more could be accomplished if another person was hired at the secretarial level to handle incoming calls. "We could accomplish more if we had this extra help," added Mrs. Webb who was acting in her last official capacity as a

result of her retirement.

Jack Grimm of the high school Guidance Department reported that his department is functioning well with a team which has been together since 1981. "When we find a problem with a student we try to assist as much as possible to solve it. We feel that our door is always open...and we like the record to show that we are there to help," added Grimm.

Richard Moretti reported that "...we are still in the throws of balancing the

budget." The problem as Moretti reports it is that the district must set their tax rate by June 1st. The state later acts "...and in this case is announcing already cuts to our program." This means "we have to cut somewhere," added Moretti. Board member Larry Sipple said it did not make sense to set the tax rate and then find that the tax rate does not reflect what will be needed to balance the budget.

Moretti added that the Farmland Assessment Act has caused a loss of \$1.4

million in assessment to the District. "As a result of this there will be more burdens placed on the local funding," added Moretti.

Dave Adams reported that there will be several openings in the athletic department. "We will also have to cut our budget here which means scheduling only conference games and cutting back on equipment and supplies.

The policy on the use of the district vehicle which was prepared by board

member Earl Roberts has been tabled until the next meeting.

The personnel manual has been completed, but the board did not accept it until they have met with Richard Moretti or his designate to review the document in detail.

Dr. Arthur Gilbert presented a manual dealing with "effective teaching for higher achievement." He will conduct a 30-hour seminar for teachers and administrators at the high school

beginning Monday, June 23. "This course will begin at 8 a.m. each morning and run through 3:30 p.m.

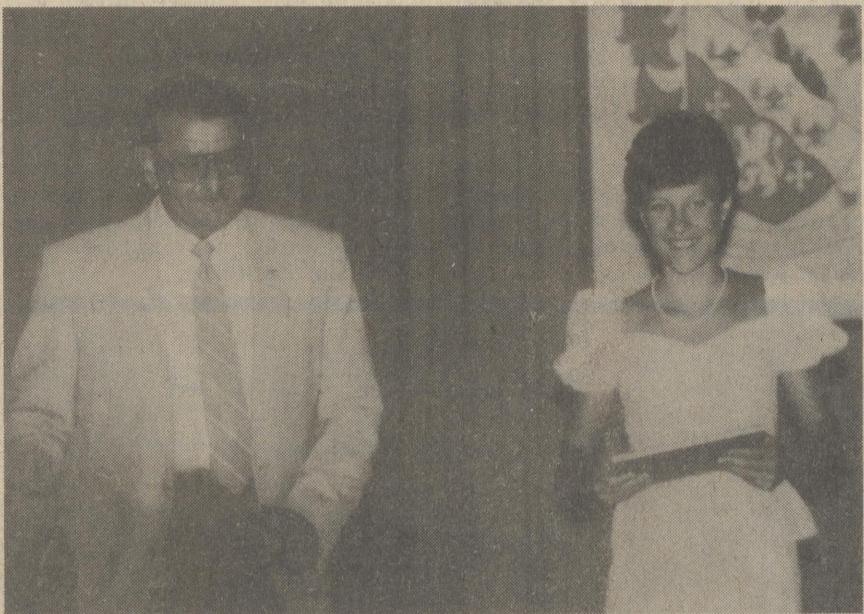

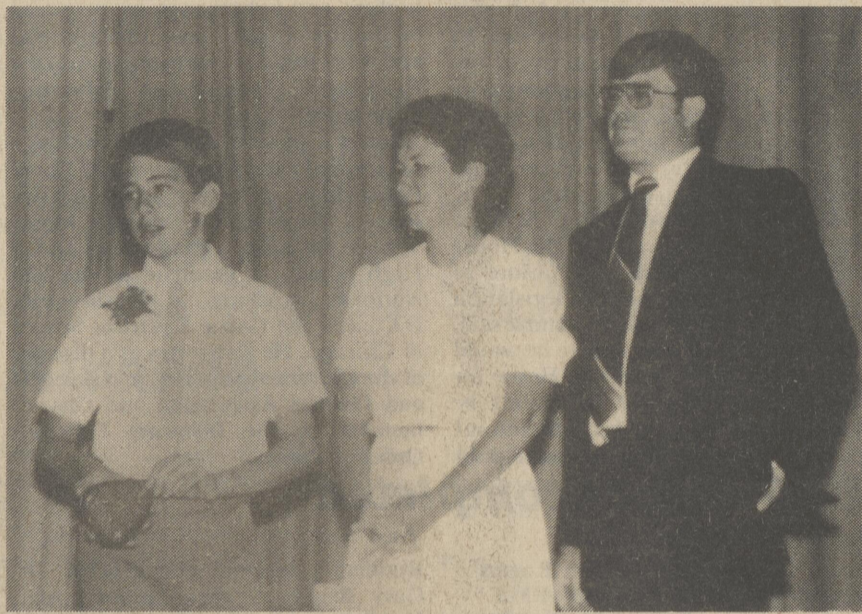

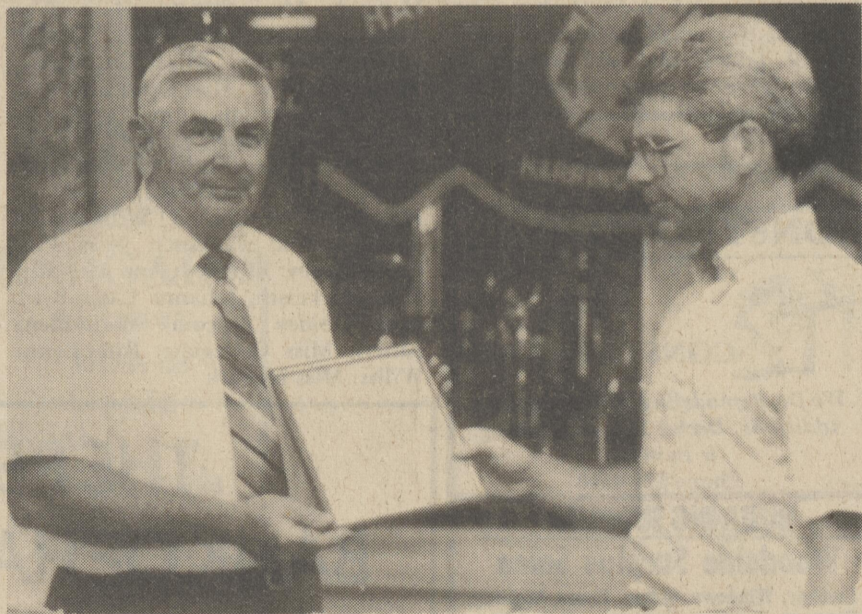

DOVER — Daniel W. Camac Jr. of Magnolia kicked off his campaign for the House of Representatives' 33rd District. That seat is presently occupied by G. Wallace Caulk Jr. of near Frederica.

Camac, 50, is president of Camac Stables Inc. and owns, trains, and drives standardbred race horses in Delaware, Maryland, New Jersey and New York. In a statement on Monday morning, Camac said he decided to run for the seat in the State Legislature through urging of many friends "...who know I can more effectively represent the people of our area..."

He stated that there are three major areas he will concentrate on during the campaign. They are crime, small business, and agriculture.

He said "crime...is eating away at the fiber of our society." He mentioned the big problem is with drugs where "...drug pushers are reaching their dirty hands all the way into our grammar schools and threaten the future of those

small businesses, he said "...my opponent has done nothing to help ease the plight of our small businesses. In fact, the Republican majority of the House in which he serves has been more interested in blockading Senate-passed bills to aid small business than it has been in addressing the major problems most of us are concerned with."

He charged his opponent, G. Wallace Caulk who is Chairman of the House Agriculture Committee of failure to turn out one major piece of legislation that would aid agriculture. Camac said, "as an elected Representative he would be a strong advocate in the House for agriculture," whereby he would be seeking new markets for agricultural products, investigating co-ops to pool

export products through foreign brokers, and fighting against proposed legislation to raise taxes on farmland and water down the farmer's vote on the Farmland Assessment Advisory Committee.

Camac is a former lieutenant in charge of criminal investigations on the Dover Police force, a former administrative services officer for the Delaware Motor Vehicle Division, a graduate of Dover High School, a graduate of the FBI National Academy in Washington, D.C., and the Coyne Electrical School of Chicago. He also serves as a director of the Cloverleaf Standardbred Breeders and Owners Association and Charter member of the Delaware Fraternal Order of Police.

I see the highway crew have put their small orange flags up and down the roadway in front of our house. When

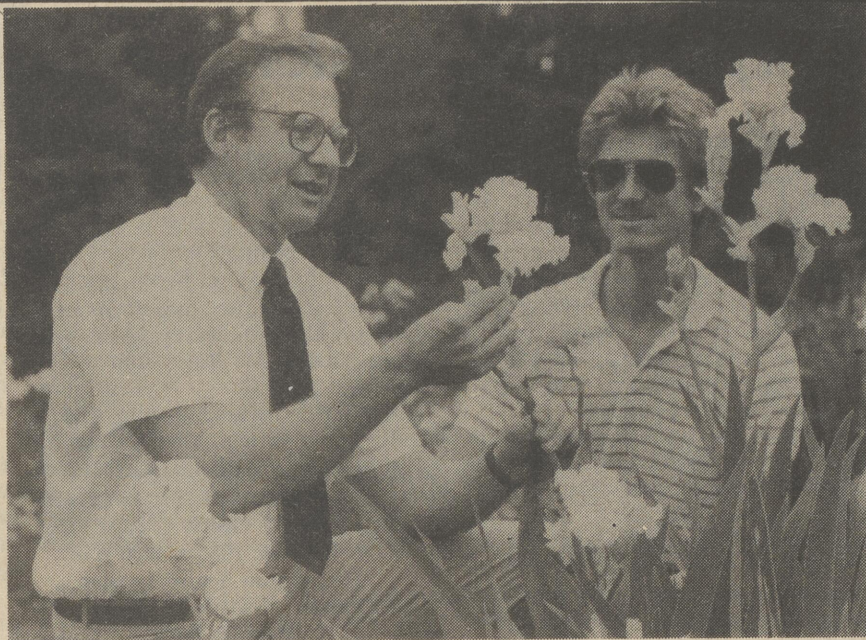
they start operations, our little dog, "Ladybug" will have a great deal to say about that. She will station herself on the big windowseat under the picture window and give tongue.

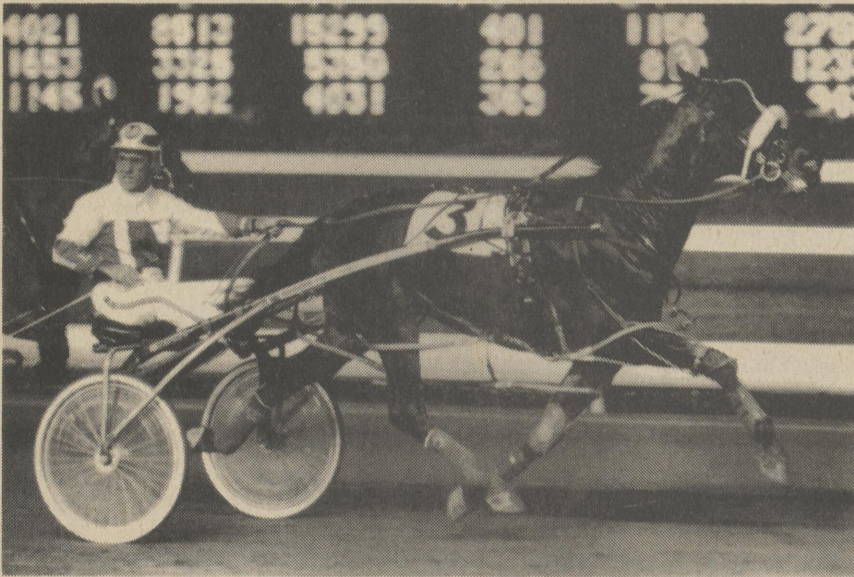

Linda Sanders crowned Miss Georgetown Speedway 1986

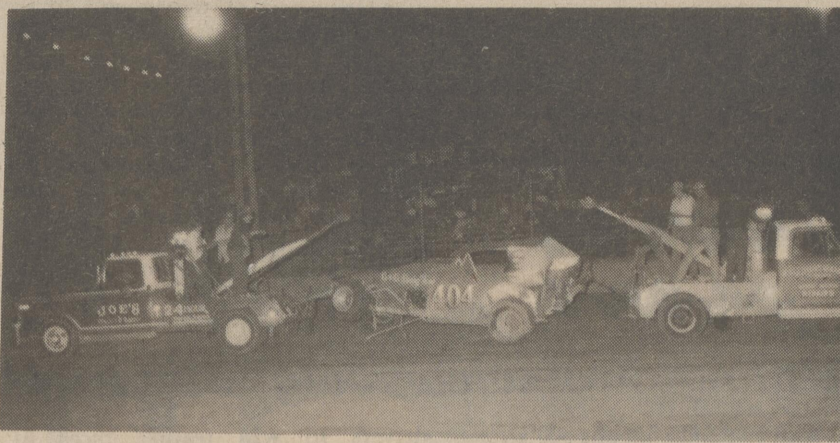

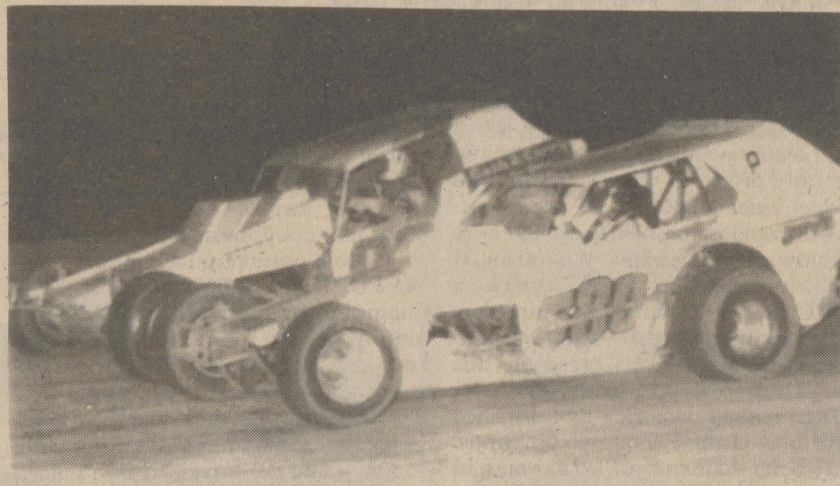

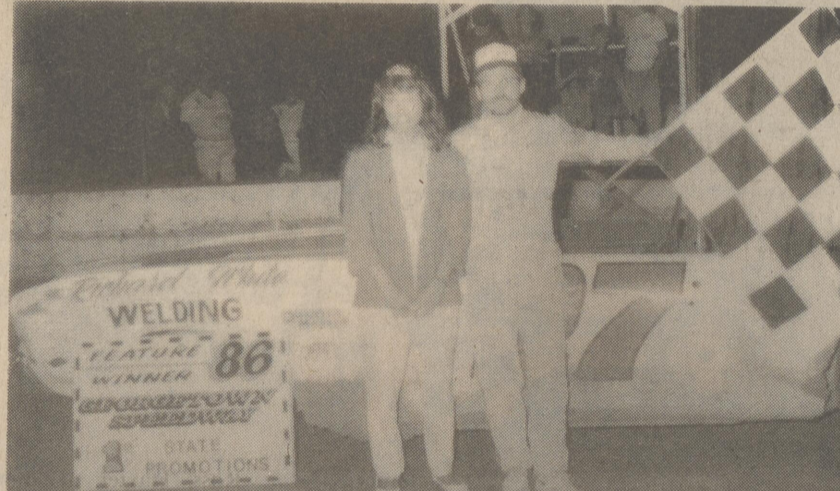

With the track clear and race ready, Ling was quick to respond as Tom

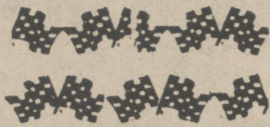
McCann moved into second with Bohn now in third. With one more lap in the record book, the yellow was out again as Tony Sicone of Hammonton came to a stop in turn two.

On the next lap, Darren Eash spun in turn two bringing out the caution sending the E&G Classics car to the rear on the restart.

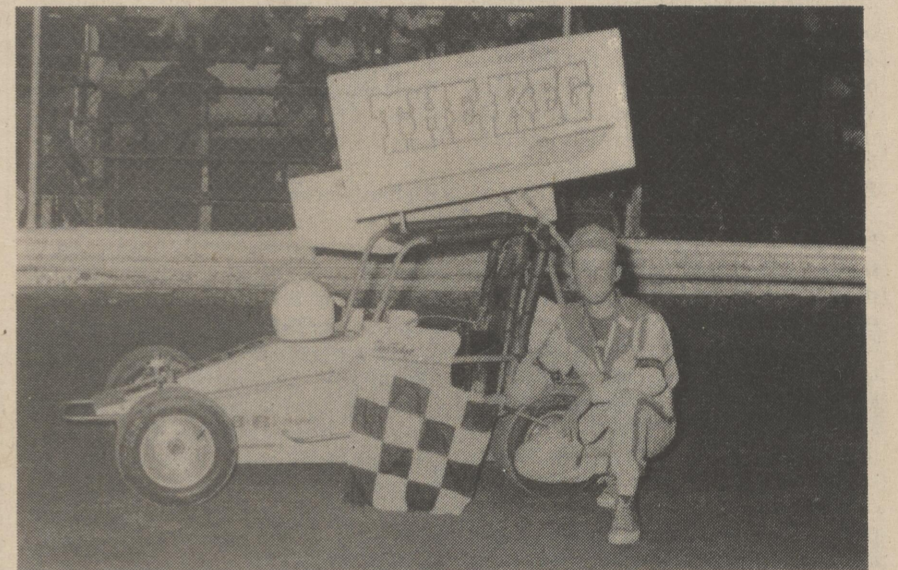
For the rest of the race, Wolfgang dominated the field as Joey Allen and Dave Kelley were left to battle for second.

Skinner takes Potomac feature

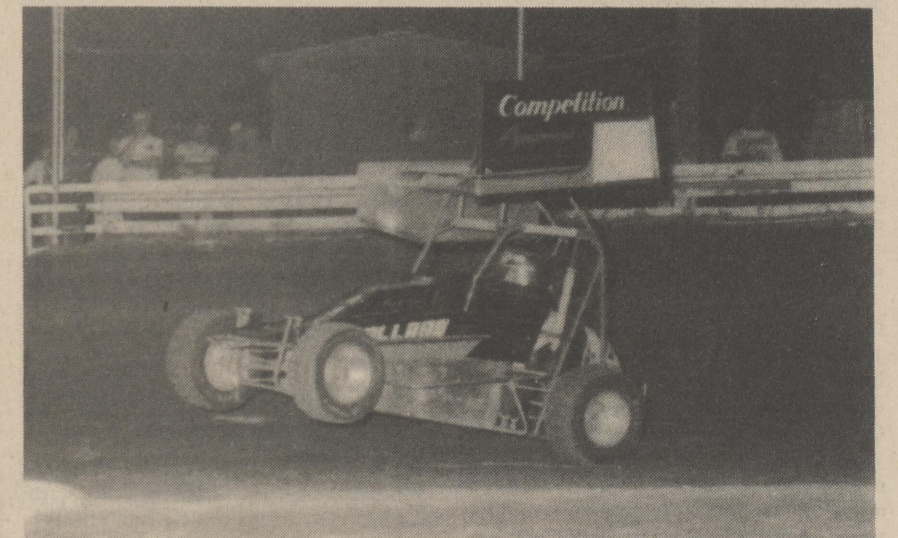

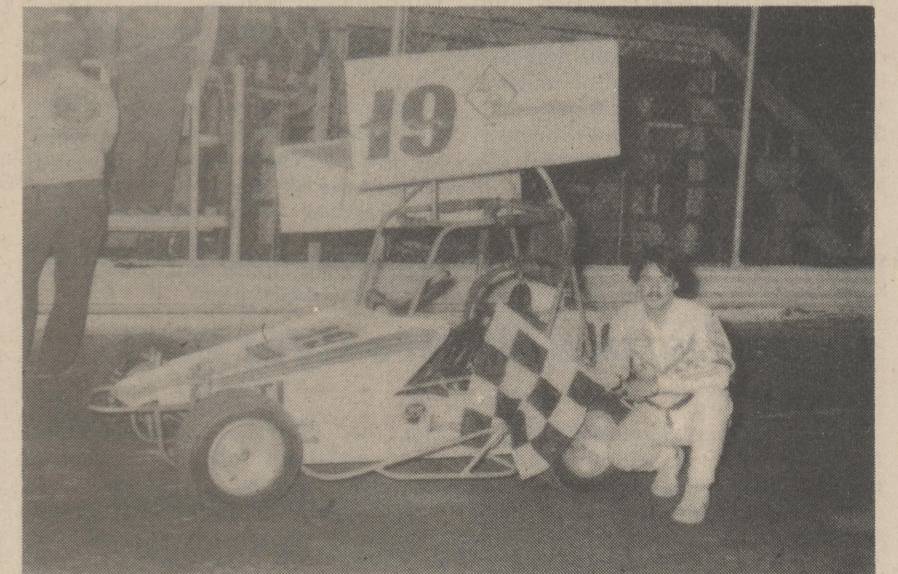
For the first ten laps, Vern Harris stayed on Skinner's bumper until Harris lost control and hit the wall on the front-stretch. This moved Cameron into second.

Senator Minner's column

Last week, I explained in this column my proposal to earmark 2 cents of the current 11 cent per gallon gas tax for the purpose of dedicating additional state revenues for our road improvement program.

Unfortunately, I was informed by the bond authorities that such action would cause a glitch in our bond perspective and open the state up for possible lawsuits by bondholders.

Mr. Harvey A. Napier of the state's bond council in New York, explained that, due to a change back in 1981, Delaware put forth the total 11 cent portion of the tax as collateral for the total amount of what was borrowed. At the time, I was one of the very few in the General Assembly to oppose such a change and my initial worries have become reality.

It seems that the state had put up as much resources for collateral as was borrowed and, if we had used a smaller amount, would be getting more back from our investment for our road program.

I am currently meeting and discussing possible alternatives with members of the Governor's staff and the Secretary of Transportation about this predicament and, hopefully, some type of compromise can be worked out in the weeks ahead to direct more funds to our road repair program without increasing any taxes to the citizens of

the state.

On a very similar matter, the Capital Improvement Bond Bill Committee, which develops the annual legislation specifying major improvement projects the state will undertake, has been meeting and prioritizing proposals during the past few weeks.

As a member of that Committee, there are a number of projects I have particularly been pushing for and trying to get included in this program.

The Milford City water system is obviously one of my top priorities and efforts are still underway to secure state funds for this very important project.

In addition to the water project, there are numerous roads in our community which warrant serious improvement and revitalization and many other areas of our county which need additional highway service.

Kent and Sussex Counties also are in the process of completing new Family Court facilities which will help improve services to area citizens and, because of the addition of new office space and meeting rooms at the Sussex location, will enable local legislators to spend more time with constituents in the area districts.

The Bond Bill will be taking a significant amount of my time in the weeks ahead and I will continue to highlight projects of importance to our district weekly as they develop.

By a vote of 96 to 4, the Senate last Wednesday approved an amendment offered by Senator William V. Roth, Jr., R-Del., that calls for retention of the deductions for the Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs).

Among those joining Roth as co-sponsors of the resolution were Senate Majority Leader Robert Dole, R-Kans., and Senate Finance Committee Chairman Robert Packwood, R-Oreg.

"The tax reform legislation now before us in the Senate is a monumental step in what has been a long trek

towards true tax reform. America is stronger and more Americans are employed because of the tax reform initiated in 1981, including the Roth-Kemp 25 percent tax cuts," Roth said. "This bill continues that reform, lowering tax rates for the working men and women even further. In addition, it will shut down tax shelters and enhance business growth, creating more jobs."

"There is a way to make this good bill better, however. And, that is by maintaining the deduction for IRAs," said Roth.

Publisher's Choice Superintendent's Committee is asked to avoid a potential massacre

On June 25, 1876, at approximately 4:00 p.m. in the afternoon at Little Big Horn, Mont., wave after wave of 3,000 Sioux, Cheyenne, and Arapaho Indians attacked and massacred Lt. Col. George Armstrong Custer's 7th Cavalry. Not one of the 300 soldiers survived.

The battle lasted about as long as it takes a man to eat his dinner. History, however, was written that day so that all school children henceforth would know and study the significance of that event.

What led up to that infamous day was a whole lot of plundering by Lt. Col. Custer, who some historians recorded was seeking gold. He leveled many Indian villages on his way through the northwest.

In the end he got what he was looking for...but it wasn't gold...it was a fight. If things had been put in their proper place prior to the June 25, 1876 attack...which would have been so simple to do, the deadly trail the members of the 7th Cavalry were unknowingly led into, could have been avoided.

Three years ago, a search was begun for a new superintendent for the Lake Forest School District. The search committee although different in name and probably number, will be formed anew to seek a new superintendent. There have been many skirmishes over the past three years. Battles if you will in some cases, that have left the District scared and blighted. Hopefully, the lessons and experience from the past will be a guide for the wise in the future.

I ask the search committee...and I truly hope the committee will be the school board...to be prudent and rational in their selection and select one from within our ranks who best knows the situation. It might be a whole lot easier for one close to the situation to mend and heal the wounds of the district.

On June 25, 36 members of Lt. Col. Custer's 7th Cavalry will be reburied near where they fell at Little Big Horn exactly 110 years ago. The remains of 33 troopers were discovered in a 1984 and 85 dig while 3 sets of remains were found during a 1958 dig. Skeletal bits and pieces will be sealed in plastic bags, encased in three coffins and buried on Last Stand Hill. The loud piercing drum roll at 4 p.m. this June 25 at the foot of Last Stand Hill will be the troopers of Lt. Col. Custer's 7th Cavalry meeting their last muster and roll call.

There will be Indians there on June 25 for the ceremony. Let's not forget their dead from those battles. A touching of the Indians will be symbolic enough for the meaning of peace.

A similar symbolism would not apply to our school district to be sure. We, however, should never forget the strong rivalry between the once two independent school districts with their deep-seated school spirit. Those strong feelings have now been blended into one school district, which hopefully some day soon will be as strong as the two districts were alone. I know it will happen, but it will only happen when good people collect for the common well-being of this School District.

New book examines the jury system

Trial by jury is a fundamental part of the American judicial system, but it also has been the subject of debate for many years. Of all criminal cases, only about 8 percent are decided by juries, and jurors' decisions in sensational and controversial trials often are questioned by the general public.

Are juries competent to interpret today's complex laws? Are the famous more likely to be acquitted? Can a lawyer stack a jury? These questions and others are examined in *Judging the Jury* (Plenum Press, New York City) by Dr. Valerie P. Hans, associate professor of criminal justice and psychology at the University of Delaware, and Dr. Neil Vidmar, professor of psychology at the University of Western Ontario in Canada.

Hans Zeisel, co-author of *The American Jury*, said the book has "reassembled and critically reanalyzed the old and new knowledge that we have of that intriguing institution, the jury. And by weaving these research findings into the forever exciting narratives of actual jury trials, the authors have written both an attractive and an important book." Attorney Melvin Belli called it "most valuable, most worthwhile."

With behind-the-scenes looks at such sensational trials as those of John De Lorean, Jean Harris and John Hinkley, *Judging the Jury* provides a comprehensive look at the jury system. Drs. Hans and Vidmar have incorporated many research findings of the last 20 years that previously had been available only in professional journals. In the book's preface, they write, "As we combined the vivid accounts of individual jury trials with case law and the systematic research studies of social scientists, we gained insights into the functioning and the

purposes of the jury that we had not had before."

Beginning with the origins of the jury system, the book chronicles the evolution of the jury over the years, focusing particularly on the historical events that shaped the American jury. A second section looks at jury selection, with an examination of procedures required by courts to select unbiased jurors and the new trend toward "scientific jury selection."

The book's third section looks at jury decisions and how jurors combine their differing perspectives into one verdict. A fourth section examines the jury in controversial types of cases — the insanity defense, cases of rape and the death penalty.

Drs. Hans and Vidmar have each conducted jury research for more than 10 years, and they have served as consultants to attorneys and the government.

Dr. Hans, a member of the Delaware faculty since 1980, specializes in the areas of psychology and law. She has conducted research studies on factors influencing jurors and on public attitudes toward the courts. Dr. Hans recently received a fellowship in law & psychology from the National Institute of Mental Health and will spend the 1986-87 academic year at Stanford University as a visiting fellow in the psychology department and a visiting scholar at the Stanford Law School.

Dr. Vidmar has written numerous articles in law reviews and psychology journals. A fellow of the American Psychological Assn., he has served as a consultant to lawyers and government about jury behavior, witness evidence and other matters.

Kent County Revaluation Project

The Property Revaluation which is on going in Kent County is nearing the halfway point in its Data Collection phase. The county has retained the firm of Cole-Layer-Trumble Company to carry out the appraisal portion of the program. Duane J. Rashlich, Project Manager, noted that data collectors have completed work in Duck Creek, Little Creek, West Dover, and North Murderkill Hundreds. Currently Data Collectors are working in Kenton, Milford, and Mispillion Hundreds.

Rashlich emphasized that data collectors who will be talking to property owners during the inspection period do not determine value. Their job is only to collect and/or verify the information on land and structures, including the measuring of buildings.

Data collectors and other appraisal workers will carry identification cards and anyone wishing to verify employment can call the Kent County assessors office or the Delaware State Police.

Data collectors will ask to see the inside of a home for inspection purposes and measure the outside of the dwelling. At no time are the data collectors to be without their identification cards. Anyone representing Cole-Layer-Trumble Company not showing an I.D. card should be reported to the local police.

If no one is at home at the time of the initial visit, the data collector will leave a card requesting the property owner contact the local Cole-Layer-Trumble Company office.

The power of the Councilman's seat is the vote

For every meeting one attends at the Council level, the issue usually boils down to who has the last say. The answer always is "...it is right there at the Council table." Each Councilman has the complete power with his or her vote.

The Mayor and the City Solicitor have repeatedly stated that "...whatever Council wants...they have the right and the power to vote in the measure."

The City Solicitor has also said repeatedly "...well this is something we reviewed before...and it is really up to Council."

On Monday, June 9, there were many residents of the Dorman Street area who

had come to City Hall to voice their displeasure with happenings in that area. Citizens come to City Hall for this type of situation, because they look to the Council for help and redress of their complaints. The simple solution to the immediate problem would have been to order additional patrolling of the Harrington Police Department until a final determination could be made.

Like the Mayor has stated in the past "...you want additional patrolling then all you have to do is propose it and vote it in."

In the final analysis, the power to run the City rests in the vote of each councilman.

Patrolling downtown district has brought welcome relief

The presence of Harrington Police Officers patrolling and directing traffic in the downtown district of Harrington has brought many favorable comments from business people in this area.

Officers have been directing traffic on Friday evenings at the corner of Fleming and Commerce streets where traffic can become quite congested with

Honest dealing is crucial to agriculture trade

Delaware proudly boasts Sussex County as the largest broiler producing county in the country. Our small state also has the most farm land per capita of any state east of the Mississippi River. We have productive, efficient and competitive farmers and growers who want an honest deal for their hard work.

It's become apparent that Delaware and all U.S. farmers are not getting an honest deal in international agricultural trade. This country has long been a major supplier of poultry to the world. Sales have been increasingly threatened, however, by the unfair subsidies of our trading partners. Although the Delmarva peninsula does not export many products, any loss in overseas markets hurts the entire agricultural community. Prices fall and the pressure for U.S. markets to absorb excessive rises.

I went to Europe recently and initiated a series of meetings with the leaders of the countries of the European Economic Community (EEC). The EEC is guilty of unfairly subsidizing European farmers. Senator Lloyd Bentsen of Texas and I made it very

clear that the subsidies the EEC pays inefficient farmers are unacceptable. We told several top French and British ministers that agricultural trade issues are as much of a threat to the stability of Transatlantic relations as the Soviet attempts to undermine the NATO alliance.

The United States is trying very hard to have a free market agricultural economy. But the issue also must be addressed on an international level. The French and other EEC leaders I spoke with suggested bilateral negotiations with the United States. I wrote letters back to them reiterating that idea. But whether it takes bilateral or multilateral negotiations, one thing is certain—we need action now. Sentiment for protectionism is running high in Congress. I told the Europeans negotiations are crucial if we are to prevent an all-out trade war.

Agricultural trade and the unfair policies of Europe have reached a critical level. U.S. farmers and poultry producers have efficient methods and quality products. We can compete with the best in the world, if the competition is fair.

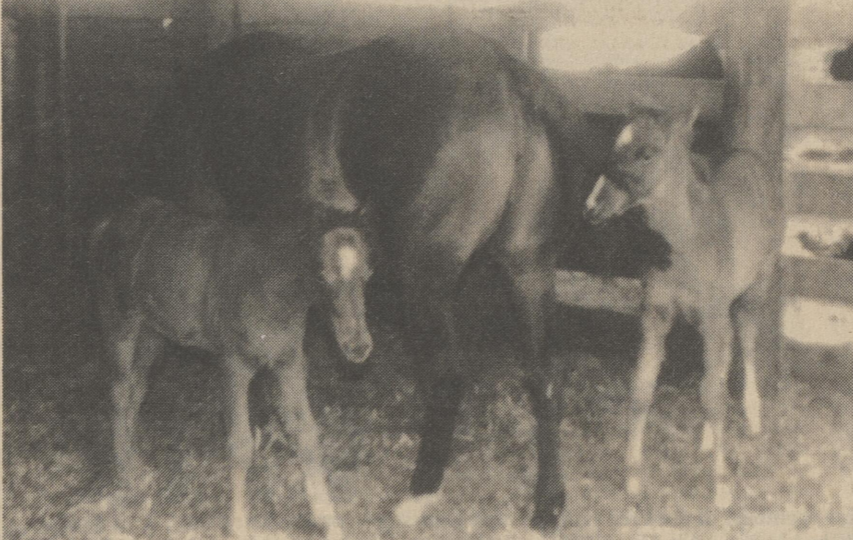

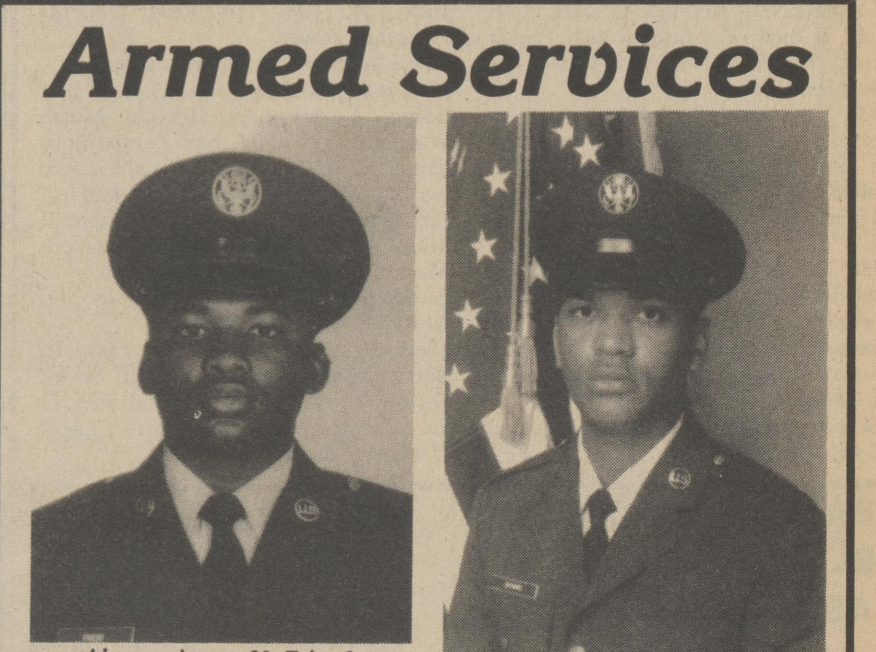

Bald Eagle found dead in Mispillion River

State wildlife officials are not speculating on what caused the death of a young bald eagle whose carcass was recovered on June 10 from the Mispillion River. The carcass was retrieved by unidentified residents, apparently within hours of its death, and was turned over to a state game warden, according to Lloyd Alexander, manager of the Wildlife Section within the state's Division of Fish and Wildlife.

The bird, with immature plumage indicating that it was less than five years old, showed no obvious signs to indicate the cause of its death. The

carcass was shipped to the national Wildlife Health Laboratory in Madison, Wisconsin for analysis. Although no foul play is suspected at present, the circumstance surrounding the loss of the young eagle are being investigated by state and federal wildlife officials and the Division of Fish and Wildlife is interested in any information that the public may have concerning the incident. Bald eagles are an endangered species and are protected by strict state and federal laws. Anyone with specific information on the loss of the eagle should contact 1-800-292-3030 to file a report.

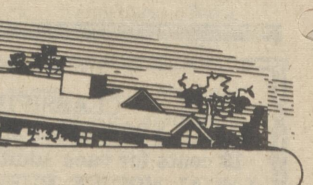

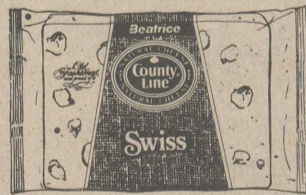
