## Council holds Workshop for minor business

HARRINGTON. The Harrington Council met on Monday night to discuss with a representative of Simmons Communications Company, J. Christian Fenger, regional manager, the matter of consolidating several cable companies under one head to be known as Simmons Communications Company.

"The reason for this (discussion) is that under this plan the bond company has asked that we appear before the municipalities which are involved to hear of any problems or confusion that might exist. It is just a safeguard method to satisfy the bond company", Mr. Fenger said.

Currently Simmons 656 customers in Harrington and on the whole of eastern shore and St. Mary's county, and Cambridge around 28,000 customers.

"The signal is beeped from our Harrington tower to these various points", added Mr. Fenger. Micro-wave signals are sent to these small communities on the Eastern Shore for television reception. Recently 1st

National Bank of Maryland had sought permission to use the tower as well, which Simmons owns. This was also brought to the attention of the Council. The Maryland Bank would send micro-wave signals from their Baltimore office to Harrington and then have the same signals relayed to Millsboro where their credit card operation is located.

Mr. Fenger pointed out that the franchise renewal between Harrington and his company will be up for renewal in 1991, and the lease on the land will be subject for renewal in 1989. "I personally would hope that we will not only renew these leases but be able to work it where we can have the leases begin at the same time and run concurrently.

Mr. Volenik addressed the matter of a new tax ditch under the Soil Conservation program which will enable the ditch and drainage from Hanley St. to east of US 13 be cleaned out to enable proper drainage for this area. "It will enable the Town to have a representative on this new tax district," said Mr. Volenik.

## Nineteen persons vie for Teacher of the Year

Nineteen persons have been nominated for Delaware Teacher of the Year for 1987.

The winner becomes Delaware's entrant in the national program sponsored by the Council of Chief State School Officers: *Good Housekeeping* magazine; and *Encyclopedia Britannica*.

The program seeks to honor skilled and dedicated teachers who have won the respect of students, parents, and colleagues for their contributions to education and the community. The State Teacher of the Year will address community groups to inform the public about the status of Delaware schools. By action of the General Assembly, the teacher receives a \$5,000 grant to use for the educational benefit of his or her students.

## Bonner recognized at Board Meeting

Mae Bonner was recognized at the most recent meeting of the Lake Forest Board of Education.

While most individuals are lauded for what they cause to happen, Bonner, a bus driver who resides in Felton, was noted for what she did not let happen.

"Mae was taking students home after school," related Ray Stoops, Lake Forest School District Transportation Supervisor, "when she noticed a tractor-trailer cab approaching from the rear at a high rate of speed. Quickly, she instructed the students to move to the front of the bus, activated her four-

way flashers and began to tap on her brake pedal in an attempt to get the driver's attention.

"Finally, he was alerted and was able to swerve to the left at the last moment, narrowly missing the rear of the bus. She was able to prevent what could have been a serious accident."

Bonner was applauded for both her swift and competent reaction in the situation and also for the excellent rapport she has established with her students enabling the action to take place.

## Killens Pond facilities expanded

Two new facilities have recently been added to the recreation complex at Killens Pond State Park near Felton. They include an officially sanctioned 3.1 mile cross-country course and a large picnic pavilion complete with tables, barbeque grills and electrical outlets.

The cross-country course is used by Lake Forest High School for all its home meets and scheduled state and conference invitationals. The course is also open to the public for jogging or walking during regular park hours.

The course passes through many of the park's most scenic areas, as well as over some of Kent County's steeper hills. As an aid to runners, joggers or walkers, red, yellow and blue post markers have been placed at regular intervals. The start and finish are clearly marked

along with the first and second mile course legs. Instructions on how to follow the course soon will be posted near the starting line. The approximate time for a leisurely stroll is an hour and a half.

These are just the latest additions to the new recreation complex that was opened a year ago with the help of the federal Land and Water Conservation Fund. Already existing facilities include a comfort station/concession building, horseshoe pits, volleyball and shuffleboard courts, playground, water fountains, individual picnic sites and a large parking area.

The park is open year-round, with user fees collected only from Memorial Day through Labor Day. Autumn is a perfect time to get to know Delaware state parks.

## Local firemen participate in drill at LF South



### State Fire Marshal to coordinate underground tank inspections

The State Fire Marshal's Office will assume responsibility for inspecting the installation of new underground storage tanks.  
 One of the requirements of Delaware's new Underground Storage Tank Regulations is that tank owners must notify DNREC at least 10 days prior to any new installation, retrofiting, or excavation of an old tank. Owners must also submit plans and applications to the Fire Marshal at the Dover Fire School for review and approval. The Fire Marshal's Office already has the authority to inspect plans prior to installation to insure that tanks and piping are in accordance with fire and safety requirements.  
 Under the agreement, the state Fire Marshal's office will hire a Deputy Fire Marshal who will have primary responsibility for ensuring that any installation or retrofiting is done, not only in accordance with safety and fire codes, but in accordance with the Underground Storage Tank Regulations.  
 Application and notification forms will also be available from the new Deputy Fire Marshal, as well as from DNREC's Geohydrologic Support Branch.

## U.N. BUDGET WOES

The forty-first session of the United Nations General Assembly began recently in New York. Unlike meetings past, it opened on an appropriately subdued note. Instead of the usual high-pitched rhetoric aimed at the United States, much of the talk focused on a more mundane matter: the U.N. financial crisis.

The United Nations had been on a gluttonous spending binge for most of its 40 years. Fat salaries, extraordinary pensions, and redundant, wasteful programs have become the rule, rather than the exception.

Between 1972 and 1982, the core U.N. budget increased more than 700 percent, from roughly \$220 million a year to approximately \$1.5 billion. For 1986-87, the budget stands at approximately \$1.68 billion. The various U.N. agencies, such as the International Labor Organization and World Health Organization, will spend an additional \$7 billion over the next two years.

On top of all this, the United States and other member-states are expected to fork over "voluntary contributions" for a variety of U.N. economic development, humanitarian, and peace-keeping programs.

In all, the United Nations and U.N.-related programs and activities will cost U.S. taxpayers some \$1.1 billion this year. Which is why Congress recently said "enough already," and passed a number of budget amendments cutting the U.S. contribution.

The U.N. bureaucracy and Third-World delegates — who have as much voting power as the U.S., but pay almost nothing to support the U.N. — are understandably apoplectic. If the United States cuts its contribution — possibly by as much as \$148 million in Fiscal Year 1987 — how will the U.N. survive?

The answer, of course, is that it could survive quite nicely by eliminating such things as the unnecessary \$73-million U.N. "conference center" being built in famine-plagued Ethiopia and other programs that are wasteful and nonproductive — simply by getting back to the basics spelled out in the U.N. Charter.

Many at the United Nations don't want to tighten their belts. They are living in style — and they like sticking those rich Americans with the tab.

So with help from the U.N. lobby — organizations such as the U.N. Association of the United States — they have concocted the fiction that it is illegal for the United States not to pay whatever the U.N. says the U.S. owes.

But whoa! Wait a minute. Only the Congress of the United States can appropriate money; not the U.N.

Moreover, the United States stated as early as 1965 — more than 20 years ago — that it reserved the right to withhold funds if there were "strong and compelling" reasons for doing so.

This is a right many other nations of the world similarly have expressed — and exercised.

At one point in the U.N.'s history, 66 states were in arrears on their contributions and the U.N. just winked. In March of this year, 20 member-states were withholding a portion of their contributions for a variety of reasons.

The alleged financial "crisis" at the U.N. never would have existed if the world body had acted responsibly and paid attention to legitimate U.S. concerns about runaway budgets.

The solution to the U.N. problem is not in Washington, it's in New York. Further delay in implementing the much-needed reforms will only make things worse.





## Atlanta Journal 500 set for Sunday

ATLANTA, GA.—Ricky Rudd calls it "Who Remembers? Syndrome." He had it last November and would take another dose of it.

"It's not a bad thing to have," Rudd says. "It not contagious, you don't have to be quarantined and there are no preliminary symptoms or after-effects. It doesn't cost you any money. In fact, it brings you money."

Rudd's disease is one several drivers have volunteered for. And one of them may be infected with the strain at Atlanta International Raceway this weekend when the Atlanta Journal 500 takes the checkered flag.

The disease strikes when one driver wins a race the same weekend another driver wins the Winston Cup title.

And the spotlight is focused this weekend on the torrid battle between Dale Earnhardt and Darrell Waltrip for this year's Winston Cup.

Among the drivers hoping for infection this weekend are Harry Gant, Richard Petty, Joe Ruttman, Buddy Baker, Cale Yarborough, Ron Bouchard and Benny Parsons.

Should any of them make the trip to AIR's victory lane, it would be a welcome journey. All would break long winless strings and add to the modern-day record set by Neil Bonnett at Rockingham in the last Winston Cup race.

Bonnett's win made him the 13th different winner of a Winston Cup race this season, erasing the record of 12 set in 1983 and equalled in 1984.

Gant has gone 31 races since his last Winston Cup win at North Wilkesboro, N.C. in 1985 while Petty's winless string now numbers 69 since his 1984 Pepsi Firecracker win at Daytona. Baker's string is 74 races, dating back to the 1983 Firecracker while Yarborough's is just over a year old, 17 races back to the fall 1985 Charlotte race.

Bouchard's string goes back to his only Winston Cup triumph, 143 races ago at Talladega in 1981 while Parsons' drought dates to this track when he won the spring Motorcraft 500 in 1984, 41 races ago. Ruttman has never won a Winston Cup race and makes his 153rd start here this weekend.

For Yarborough, it is his last chance to bring a victory to the Harry Ranier/J.T. Lundy-owned Hardee's Thunderbird. Yarborough is moving to his own team in 1987 and this is his last outing in the familiar number 28 Ford.

The Atlanta Journal 500 is the last race of 1986 for Baker and his Crisco Oldsmobile team. Led by crew chief Doug Richert, the team has been poised to win in its last races.

Parsons, Ruttman, Petty and Gant will compete in the season finale at

Riverside in two weeks and have one last chance to score victory. All, however, would like to win here at the last oval track on this year's schedule.

Ask any of the drivers to pick a favorite to win this weekend and the odds are they will say, "Elliott."

With good reason. In three of the last four races at AIR, Elliott has made the trip to victory lane. He won both the Winston Cup events last year and finished fifth in the Motorcraft 500 in March.

But it was his May performance which stands out most clearly in the minds of his fellow competitors.

He led all but one lap and soundly thrashed the cream of the Winston Cup crop on his way to winning The Winston and pocketing \$240,000 -- including \$40,000 in lap leader awards. That performance stamps Elliott as the favorite to win Sunday's Atlanta Journal 500.

The winner, however, will probably have a case of Rudd's favorite disease. Last year, Waltrip and Elliott battled for the title to the final race. Elliott broke a shifter pin and watched his title hopes evaporate in the desert sun. Waltrip won his third Winston Cup.

"It was our last chance to win for the year and we had a tremendous race with Terry Labonte," Rudd remembers. "But we're probably the only ones who

do remember because the spotlight was on the title chase."

This weekend, Earnhardt can be the first driver since 1979 to wrap up the Winston Cup before the final race of the year. All the hard-charging driver must do is earn five more points than Waltrip in the Atlanta Journal 500. That would give him a 149 point cushion going into the Winston Western 500 at Riverside.

By starting the race at Riverside, Earnhardt would be guaranteed enough points to win his second Winston Cup if he finished last in the field.

Waltrip, on the other hand, needs something close to a miracle.

He needs to lead the most laps and win here and hope Earnhardt suffers a mechanical problem and his Wrangler Chevrolet finishes at the bottom of the results list.

Richard Childress, Earnhardt's car owner, has never won a Winston Cup. He wants this one as badly as Earnhardt.

Any combination of positions which result in a net five point gain by Earnhardt would bring the title to Childress' Winston-Salem headquarters.

And would result in another documented case of "Who Remembers? Syndrome" for the winner of Sunday's Atlanta Journal 500.

## Allison hopes for Atlanta win and "carry-over" effect on 1987 season

MILWAUKEE (October 24, 1986)—Miller American Racing Team driver Bobby Allison firmly believes that a late-season win will give his team momentum and carry into the 1987 season-opener in Daytona.

"Enthusiasm is contagious, and so is the lack of it," said Allison. "If you close the season on a positive note, the momentum just seems to carry over into the next year. That's why the Atlanta Journal 500 can be so important to us."

"People tend to remember your most

recent performance," said Allison. "If a race team wins one of the last races of the year, the morale during the off season remains high. You'd be surprised how helpful it is in getting a team ready to attack the circuit the following year."

In an "off season" that will see a number of driver and team changes, Allison and Bobby Hillin Jr. already have announced their plans to return with the Miller American team.

Allison, a five-time winner on the

1,522-mile Atlanta International Raceway oval, feels his chances in the November 2nd Atlanta Journal 500 are excellent.

"It seems like the Atlanta track has often given drivers wins at times when they need it the most," said Allison. "I'm not the only person who could really use a win at this point, though. I won a race (the Winston 500 at Talladega) this year, but drivers like Harry Gant, Richard Petty, Cale Yarborough and Benny Parsons have

yet to visit the winner's circle."

Allison's last win at AIR was in the 1982 Atlanta Journal 500.

The first 20 positions for the Atlanta Journal 500 starting field will be determined in a 2 p.m. qualifying session Friday, October 31. Second-round time trials are scheduled later that afternoon.

The Atlanta Journal 500 will be televised live at 2 p.m. (EST) Sunday, November 2 on ESPN.

## Big Money in Pro Motorcycle racing

SACRAMENTO, Calif.—The 1987 Camel Pro Series will pay a record \$475,000 in bonuses to professional motorcycle racers, an increase of \$200,000 over 1986.

The 1987 Camel Pro program will inaugurate a novel, five-lap sprint race called the Camel Challenge. Curtis Gray, Camel Pro team manager for R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co., announced.

The Camel Challenge will be held prior to each main event on the 18-race schedule, with the fastest six riders in qualifying competing for \$315,000 in prize money -- \$17,500 per event, Gray said.

A \$160,000 Camel Pro point fund will be awarded to the top five riders who accumulate the most points in either dirt-track, road-racing or both during the season. Points will be awarded to riders who finish in the top 10 positions at each event.

The Camel Pro national champion will receive \$100,000, and \$60,000 will be divided among riders finishing in second through fifth positions.

The 18-race schedule will include nine dirt-track and nine road-course races.

The 1986 schedule had 31 races.

"By increasing the bonus fund and adding the Camel Challenge race, we can do a better job of promoting the sport of motorcycle racing and make it more affordable for competitors," Gray said. "The Camel Challenge should increase excitement for race fans and add interest to qualifying. It will also help track operators better promote their events," he added.


The winner of each Camel Challenge will receive \$10,000 and the remaining five riders will divide \$7,500.

"We're looking forward to an exciting season -- one that will attract more fans, encourage competitors to become more versatile and stimulate the growth of the sport," Gray said.

Almost \$1.7 million in point funds have been awarded to participants of the Camel Pro Series. This year's program increases are the largest in the 14-year history of the Camel Pro Series.

Seutter was dead on arrival at Milford Memorial Hospital less than an hour after the accident.

Police did not give a cause for the accident. They have not classified the death as a traffic fatality.



# Tozer sets mark, Spartans 2nd in County meet

Mark Tozer apparently has the ability to set a new course record, on every Henlopen Conference layout. In four away meets, this fall he's failed only, at laurel, where he ran off the course.

At Blackbird State Forest, on Saturday, Tozer shattered the mark, set by Milford's Chris Ayres, by one minute and five seconds, in the five-team, Kent County meet.

Blackbird Forest is Smyrna's home course. The hot pace set up front by Tozer and Caesar Rodney's Chris Cronis (16.48) saw the first six finishers, plus the seventh man, Eric Payne of Lake Forest, all finish under the old standard.

Lake Forest's sophomore standout rookie, Mike Eck, got ninth. William Deputy, a senior novice, misjudged the length of the course and was saving something back, when to his surprise, he saw the finish line, some distance ahead.

The speedy, first-year harrier, then went into a lunge kick, that brought him from some distance back, to get up for

the tenth place and last medal. Lake Forest was tops in the medal department getting 10 of 20 up for grabs, that's both boys and girls, with the other four schools dividing the other 10.

Coach Blades was pleased with his charges.

Five locals ran under 18 minutes, for 5,000 meters. That type of performance would guarantee, a state championship, at Killens Pond, November 8th.

Steve Clute was 13th in 17.56, probably his best effort yet.

Alvin Hudson, (18.23), Jon Kane and Darren Lawson finished under 20 minutes, as did freshman Scott Pierce (19.41). Wayne Steerman was at 20.08, Bobby Hill and Roger Collison shaded 21 minutes. We consider every Spartan, who ran Saturday, as a definite prospect, in addition to a couple who were not there.

Lake Forest finished second to Caesar Rodney followed by Smyrna, Milford and Dover.

# Riders end Spartan streak, Tozer shatters record

Caesar Rodney's well-balanced cross-country team, coached by Harrington-area resident, Charles Bell, handed Lake Forest's Spartans their first dual-meet loss of the campaign after 21, straight wins. The Riders prevailed 21-37.

What a difference a year makes! The locals gave C.R. several stiff contests, in 1985, although the Riders won each time except for one pre-season tie.

The Spartans lost Mike Mosley and Billy Haggerty, by graduation. C.R. lost no top-seven runners. Then Lake Forest lost the Torgeson twins by transfer, to Caesar Rodney! Smyrna's veteran No. 1 harrier, also transferred to C.R. Finally, Gary Stulir, a former football player, discovered this spring, that he'd been in the wrong sport, when he became a heckuva two-miler. So, while C.R. had everybody back and added four more good runners, Lake Forest ended up minus two. The rich got richer.

Fortunately, Spartan coach Jim Blades has developed two newcomers, Wm. Deputy and Mike Eck, to go along with veterans Mark Tozer, Eric Payne, Steve Clute, Alvin Hudson and Jon Kane. The revamped Spartans gave the powerful Riders a good tussle and but for an accident involving Deputy, might have made the score closer.

Chris Cronis, the Rider's No. 1 harrier is a classy performer. Cronis ran 16.59 breaking his previous best by several seconds. His best was also the overall course record at C.R. But Mark Tozer ran an amazing 16.25, without any competition, to drop the record low enough to last awhile. Tozer, a junior doesn't figure to see that course again.

After Cronis came Dennis Caswell, Angel Aquilar, Stulir, Lake Forest's Deputy, Lessard, Eck and Payne. Caswell has a most unusual style. He runs near the back of the pack, until the runners get sorted out. Then he starts picking people off and is almost always near the front, by race's end. The little guy was calling on Cronis, at the finish, coming in only two seconds back.

Going into the race, the Spartans wanted to break up C.R.'s top five runners. That came about. It was felt that the fast-improving Deputy had a shot at every foe except Cronis and Caswell. Deputy has excellent speed, having run on Lake Forest's state champion and record-setting mile relay team. William was running, in traffic, when an errant foot came from somewhere, tripped him, causing him to fall, into a wall. There is no proof as to who the owner of the errant foot is or whether it was deliberate or accidental. Nevertheless, it appears that Deputy lost enough time because of the incident to ruin what was a good shot, at fourth place. He was sixth, but was only 10 or 11 seconds back of two Riders. But, a fourth place finish would only have made the score more respectable. Caesar Rodney should be able to run with anybody, in the state, if Coach Bell can get them fired up, by state meet time.

The last state ranking we saw had C.R. as the fourth best team, in Delaware, with Lake Forest sixth. This ranking



automated office concept," said Thomas P. Eichler, Secretary of the Department of Health and Social Services.

The child support system breaks new ground by using laser technology to produce documents, provides a fully interactive system for case management, and has direct access to other State agency data bases.

"Finally, in a State agency, we have the type of advanced computer technology used in the business world," said Barbara A. Paulin, Director of the Division of Child Support Enforcement. The system is already being examined by child support agencies in other states for possible transfer.

The new system is expected to improve services to Division clients as well as increase worker productivity. Ninety

percent of the funding for the system was provided by a grant from the Federal Office of Child Support Enforcement. The system is expected to pay for itself through increased child support collections within two years.

At 11 a.m., the Governor will tour the system with Federal and State officials after which he will send a message opening the system and proclaiming Child Support Week in Delaware.
