

Lake Forest School Board prepares for Referendum

LAKE FOREST HIGH SCHOOL. At the regular monthly meeting on Monday night at the high school, plans were announced for a referendum to be held on March 10th.

According to District Superintendent Dr. James VanSciver, an organizational meeting for the referendum will be held on December 4th at 7:00 p.m. in the high school cafeteria.

The topics for the referendum will be building repair and reconstruction as well as upgrading the electrical and heating systems. "I would like to include painting of certain buildings in the District particularly those at

Chipman, but right now we have another problem with a possible leaky underground storage tank", said Dr. VanSciver.

The other part of the referendum will be the issue of voting to participate in the State equalization funding program. Other districts surrounding Lake Forest have gone along with program, and it appears the plan will be acceptable this time around.

All of this ties in with a plan to reform the tax structure for the District. Mr. S. Michael Thompson, a member of the school board, who is also employed at the County level, feels the method of taxing now is outdated and outmoded. "What we want to do is to increase more

tax revenue without raising taxes", said Mr. Thompson, who is slated to present the program tonight (Wednesday) before the State Farm Bureau gathering.

What Mr. Thompson is proposing is a tax that is based on income level rather than property taxes alone. "When I first presented this at the last meeting of the State Board (of Education) the district boards turned it down with a deaf ear because they reasoned this to be solely an income tax, which it is not", said Mr. Thompson.

Right now mobile homes in the District are exempt from taxation. The lot on which the mobile home sits is the only thing taxed. According to Mr. Thompson the burden of taxation in

the District is on the land owners. He wants a better balance in this area between property owners versus mobile home owners.

Mr. Thompson said in addition to speaking to the Farm Bureau he plans to make a similar presentation to the State Grange seeking their support of this plan.

In the Superintendent's report it was noted that there seemed to be a higher number of absentees on Mondays than other days of the week. The suspension report was noted to be higher among the 9th and 10th graders, but as one building principal was heard to say "this was true because certain students were still getting used to the rules of the

high school."

It was also noted that the matter of dumping used oil behind the Ag Building had ceased. This apparently is in violation of the State Department of Natural Resources and there is some contamination caused by the dumping.

The administration was to meet on Tuesday with representative of BASCO, the architectural firm employed to write the repair and reconstruction program throughout the District. The original contract was signed with BASCO in March of 1983. Question to be resolved was whether the contract had expired or was outdated and should it be brought up to par before beginning the project. The School Board has been

approached by the Milford/Harrington Chamber of Commerce and the Board approved becoming a member of that Chamber.

In other matters, the Board accepted an early retirement of Douglas Testerman, Math teacher at Chipman and retirement of Robert Hawkins, a special ed teacher at North.

The following persons have completed their probation period satisfactorily and have become permanent employees under the terms of their contracts. They are: Malcolm Tilghman, and Ronald Bramble, custodians at Chipman, Herbert Moore

DOVER. The Department of Public Instruction has notified Mrs. Janice Hinzman, Supervisor of Food Services for the Lake Forest School District, that Lake Forest has been determined the number one school district in the State for school lunch participation.

Lake Forest measured a 79.5% in the district as compared to 56.7% in the State.

"The success of the program can be attributed to dedicated team work, and a willingness to try new ideas", said Mrs. Hinzman. Food service staff workers attempt to prepare a variety of things for the menu. "Many students today like to eat at fast food restaurants. So...what we try to do is come close to preparing meals that come close to those types of food facilities, but naturally we feel our product is

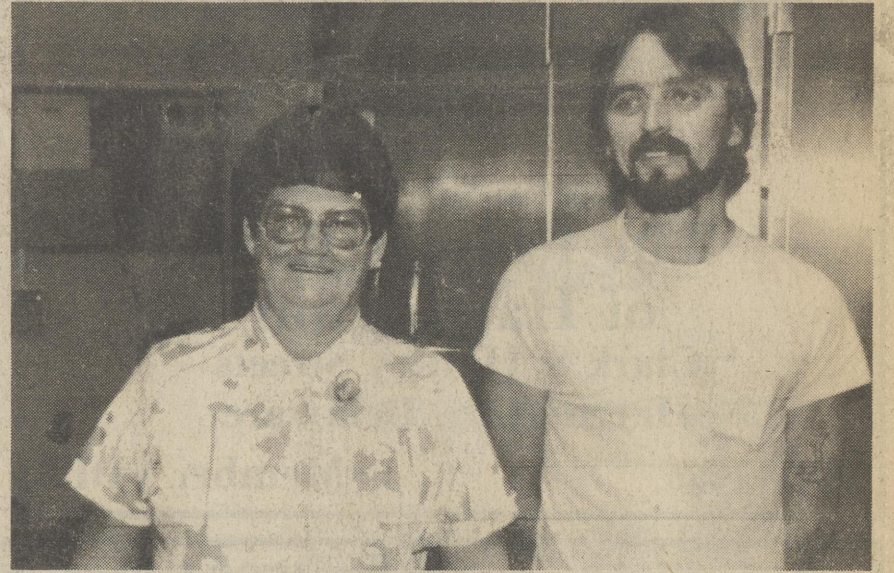
superior", added Mrs. Hinzman.

The choice for the students when they come through the servicing lines seems to be the attracting factors. Lake Forest food service people now have added a salad bar.

The fact of the matter is that students are better fed today than yesteryear. Students see their fellow students eating and this causes a chain reaction. The cafeteria is also a center of social communication. This seems to be an area which can also be improved on, where music and some form of entertainment can be held during mealtime. Many young people today eat while they watch television at home.

Things which are not included on the menu are items like kool aid or foods that are determined to be non-

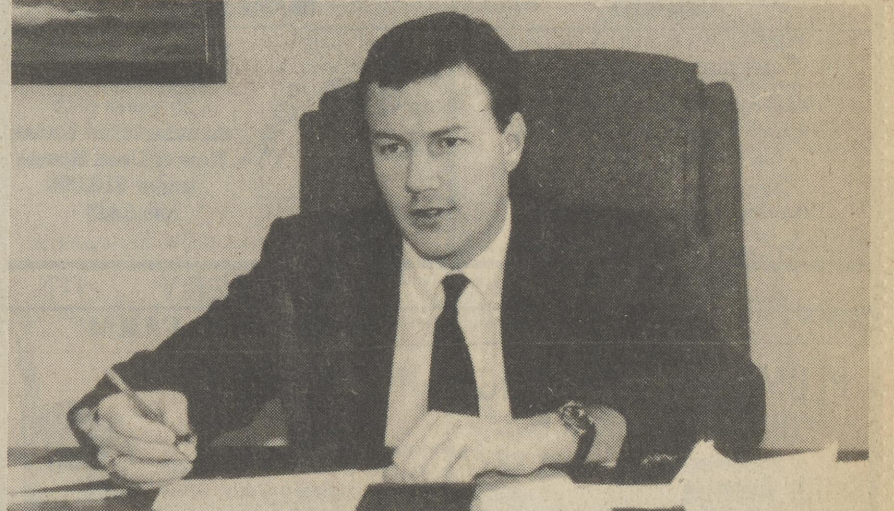

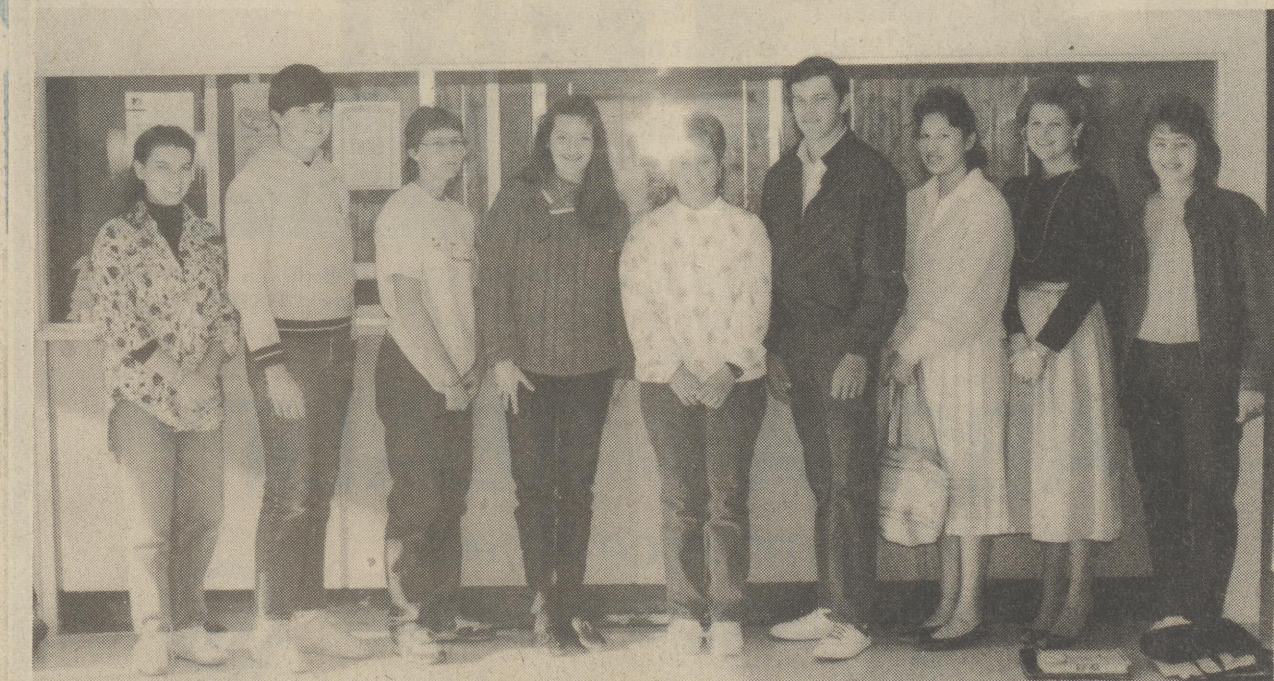
Lillian Lodge won the 1986 Service Award that goes to a person with MS who volunteers and helps other people with MS. Lodge is the Volunteer

LF soccer players named to All-Conference

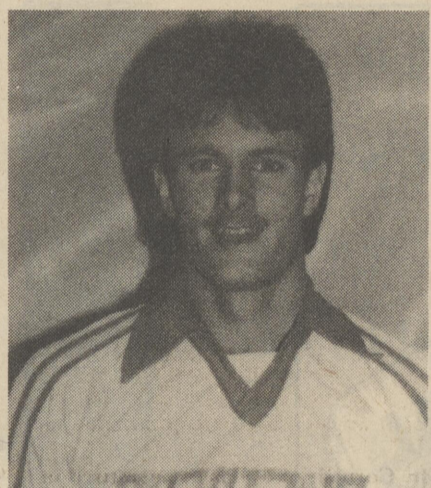

year but promises to help those players for next years team.

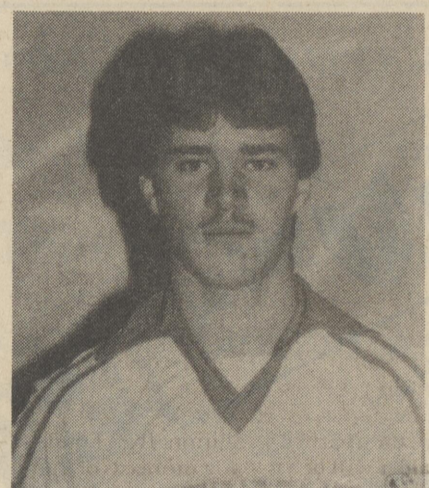
Walt Lekites and Jay Green were first and second team All-Conference respectively, while Kyle Kelley and Scott White received honorable mention.

Sixers to award two \$1,000 scholarships

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Tozer, Pierce, Fisher gleam in Park races

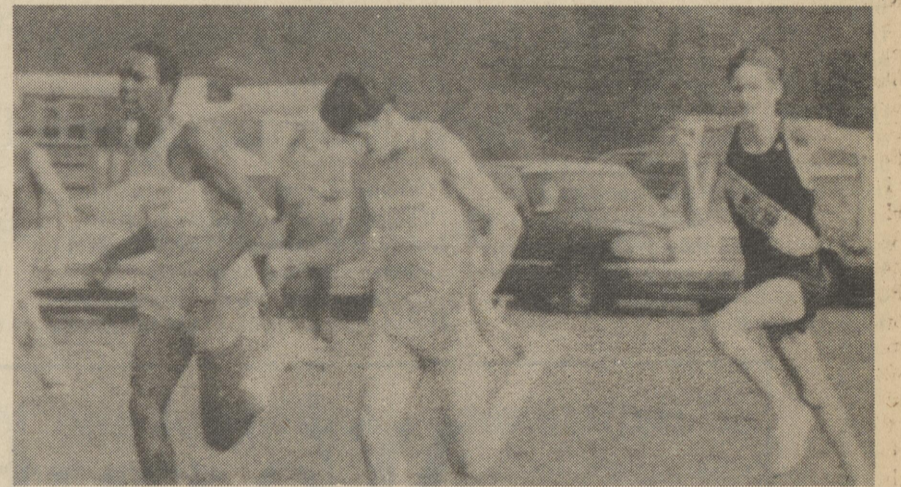
Almost 100 cross-country runners, male and female, toed the starting line, at the Kent County Parks and Recreation 5,000 meter (3.1 miles) race, held at Killen's Pond State Park, Saturday.

Lake Forest High School runners had a remarkable showing, leaving with six trophies.

Mark Tozer, an All-State runner, as a Lake Forest High School junior, this fall, had a large blister, on his large toe, but managed a fine 17.15, good for first place in the 15-19 division and third overall, behind two veterans, in the 20-29 division. Pete Rowe, race winner clocked 16.36. A healthy Tozer ran 16.41 here last month. Tozer beat Craig Dayton, for the first time. Dayton holds the record for 10K, at Killen's Pond.

Scott Pierce, a 14 year-old Spartan freshman, had a very promising first varsity cross-country season, this fall. Saturday. Scott captured the first place trophy in the 14 and under group, with a 20.24 clocking. Since the high school season had ended, seven days earlier, his great effort must have come as a pleasant surprise, since he ran 31 seconds faster, than ever before here. Scott however is a known quantity, since he ran very well for Baxter Smith, as an eighth grader, at W.T. Chipman School, in 1985.
