



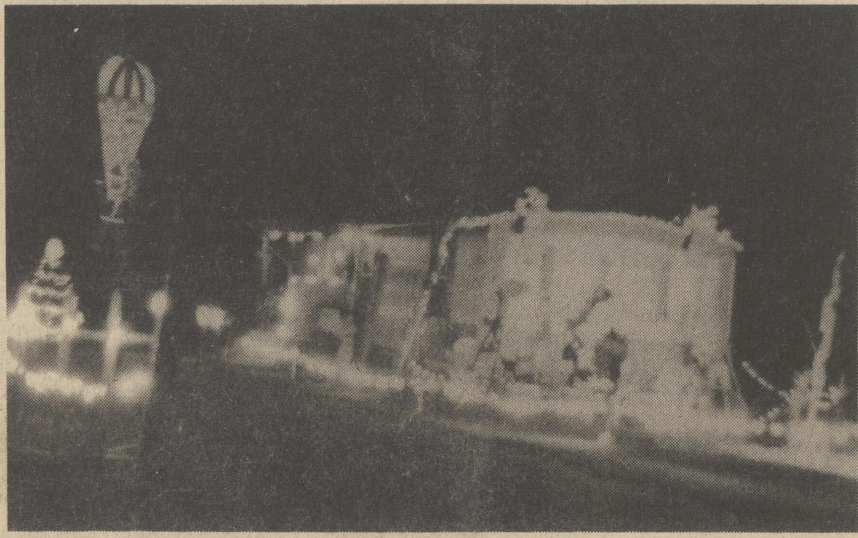

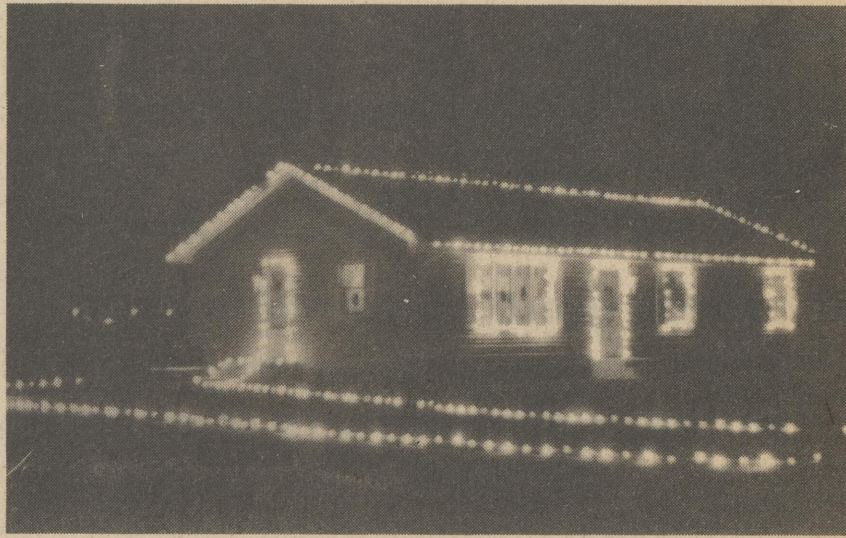

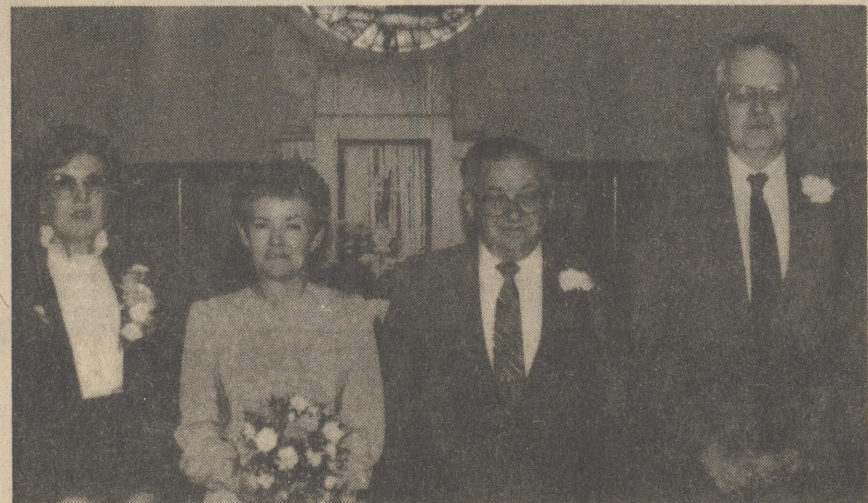

Anderson guilty on one count of second-degree rape

Andrew T. Anderson, former W.T. Chipman Junior High School teacher, was found guilty Friday in Kent County Superior Court on one count of second-degree rape.

Anderson was charged with six counts of second-degree rape in a case involving two under-age female students. He was found not guilty on the other five counts.

The jury of five men and seven women deliberated for two hours on Thursday and 6½ hours on Friday before finding Anderson guilty of having sexual intercourse with an under-age girl on January 18, 1986.

Prosecutor M. Jane Brady and Public Defenders Joseph A. Gabay and Duane D. Werb agreed that the deciding factor was the girl's testimony regarding the January 18 sexual encounter which resulted in the girl's pregnancy and subsequent abortion.

"I'm satisfied but not happy," said Deputy Attorney General Brady.

"I'm happy with the verdict," said defense attorney Gabay.

"I'd say our chances on appeal are excellent," he added.

On Thursday defense attorney Werb delivered a rousing closing argument in which he attacked the credibility in the testimony of both girls.

Werb also delivered a blistering denunciation of the state police investigation conducted by Cpl. David Henderson, juvenile officer at Troop 3 in Camden. Werb recited a litany of alleged lapses in the investigation. He said there were over 50 factors pertaining to the case that the police failed to investigate, ranging from days and dates to TV schedules, weather conditions and the layout of a house.

Although Brady said she was satisfied with Henderson's investigation, Gabay said that he and Werb listed 52 separate items that were never checked.

Prosecutor Brady told the jury in her closing argument that "She's only a kid. She carries a weight that she'll have for the rest of her life. She carries a

weight that you will never know in your lives."

Brady said the only thing that really matters is whether sexual intercourse took place.

Testifying last week was a representative of the Delta Clinic in Dover, who verified the date of the abortion. Also testifying was an official of the Mellon Bank, who verified that Anderson withdrew \$200 from his account on March 19, the date of the abortion.

Anderson testified last Wednesday that he "loaned" the \$200 to the girl because she could not afford the abortion fee.

Anderson said pressure from the girls' families and the girls' jealousy because of his close friendship with each may have motivated their accusations.

"I don't have any control over schoolgirl crushes," Anderson replied when asked why he didn't stay away from the girls.

Anderson's original attorneys, Craig and Kathi Karnitz, of Georgetown, said they removed themselves from the case after receiving telephone calls from one of the girls who said the sexual encounters never occurred.

Marjorie Davis, W.T. Chipman School principal, testified that both mothers complained to her about Anderson's relationship with their daughters. Davis said she spoke with Anderson about the matter.

Gabay and Werb will appeal the guilty verdict on the grounds that Judge William G. Bush III should not have allowed the jury to hear testimony regarding the abortion.

"We will show in our motion how clearly prejudicial and inflammatory it was to the deliberations," said Gabay.

Anderson was returned to Delaware Correctional Center pending a presentence investigation, which takes about four to six weeks, according to Werb.

Anderson faces a minimum sentence of three years in jail and a maximum of thirty years in jail on the second-degree rape conviction.

Air Force Sergeant from Milford saves Government money

Sergeant Judith Williams, a 25 year old jet engine mechanic at the Dover Air Force Base and a Milford High School graduate, has helped the government save some money. Sgt. Williams of the 436th Field Maintenance Squadron discovered a discrepancy in the prices of jet engine replacement parts, saving the government over \$80,000.

"In total, she saved the Air Force \$81,932," said Sgt. Scott Elliott of the Air Force Public Relations office.

Sgt. Williams, who has been working on jet engines for six years, reported the difference in the cost of a left and a right hand engine mounting bar. The left hand engine mounting bar cost \$16,892, while the right hand part cost only \$4,870.

The difference of more than \$12,000 for the nearly identical parts earned Sgt. Williams a cash award of \$3,158, a percentage of what she saved the government.

Sgt. Williams has been praised by Delaware U.S. Senator Bill Roth as "one of the latest heroes in the fight against government waste."

which Sgt. Williams reported the discrepancy "encourages people to report cost overruns," according to Sgt. Elliott.

MMH announces new cardiovascular rehab

MILFORD — Milford Memorial Hospital will inaugurate a Cardiovascular Rehabilitation Program effective January 5, 1987. The announcement of the new service was made by hospital administrator, Glenn Davis.

Davis explained that the Cardiovascular Rehabilitation Program is designed to restore the patient participant to a productive, active and satisfying lifestyle as soon as possible following the recognition of heart disease.

The program will initially operate in two phases, beginning in the hospital when the patient is stable. The second phase commences upon discharge. An integral part of the program is education of the patient and family covering the nature of the disease, possible complications, recovery process, and secondary prevention.

This will include diet management, risk factor modification, use of cardiac medications and a general view of the heart's anatomy.

The Cardiovascular Rehabilitation Program will provide guidance, medical supervision and monitoring, using controlled exercise as a form of rehabilitation therapy. The program follows standards developed by the American Heart Association.

"Our ultimate goal is to help the participant return to a productive and emotionally gratifying life," Davis said. "This will be achieved through continued support by a team of physicians, specially trained nurses, therapists, counselors and nutritionists."

Milford Memorial Hospital has dedicated a special first floor area to the

A 16-year-old Rehoboth youth was arrested at his residence Thursday afternoon and charged with the rape of a 32-year-old Rehoboth area woman.

Investigators at Troop 4 have charged Jeremy L. Ebersole, 16, of Bay Road, Rehoboth, with unlawful sexual intercourse 1st degree, burglary and

kidnapping. Ebersole allegedly forced his way into the victim's residence at approximately 10:15 p.m. Wednesday night and raped her.

Ebersole has been committed to the Stevenson Home in Milford in default of a secured bond.

Farm bill slide show available

The Food Security Act of 1985, better known as the Farm Bill, contains conservation provisions. How will they effect your farm operation? A slide show, now available from the U.S. Soil Conservation Service details this significant legislation and its impact on farmers.

The show explains how farmers who grow crops on highly erodible land or who clear wetlands for farming could lose eligibility for some USDA benefits. The program details the four parts of

the Farm Bill - sodbuster, swampbuster, conservation compliance, and conservation reserve. It also tells which USDA benefits are denied if conservation provisions are not met.

The slide show, which is about 11 minutes long, operates on a carousel projector and has a narrated tape.

Three years ago, nine members of the Dover Century Club set out to construct life-saving information packets and distribute them throughout the Dover area.

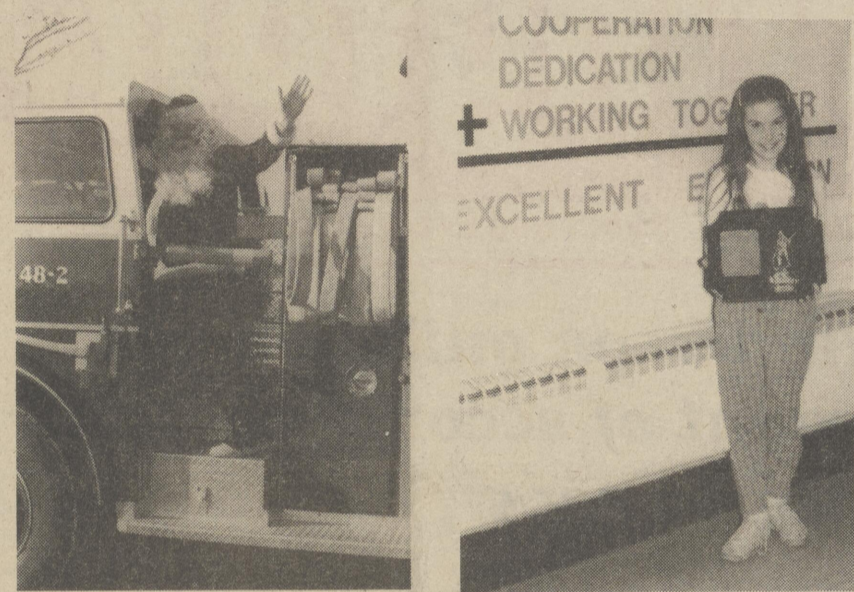

Some find stress, not joy in holidays

While the holidays bring good cheer to most, some people find this time of year to be trying and stressful.

"For many people, the holidays are a difficult time because of personal troubles, strained family relationships and painful memories," says Deborah Amsden, University of Delaware extension home economist.

Amsden mentions five groups of people for whom the holidays are apt to be hard to handle.

*Many working mothers spend 40 hours a week on the job and another 30 hours a week on household chores. And still they feel they must do all of the holiday extras," says Amsden.

*Young families who are living on a tight budget nonetheless want to buy gifts. "The list of gifts and unexpected expenses can cause them to use their charge cards to the maximum limit, she says.

*Older people on fixed incomes still want to "do a little something" for everyone in their ever growing family.

"The list increases--but not their resources," says Amsden.

*Single parents are often stressed because they must share time with their children with the noncustodial parent, stretch their dollars to meet holiday desires and try to maintain conflict-free communication with their ex-mates.

*Single adults who believe that everyone else in the world is surrounded by loved ones during the holidays may feel lonely or even depressed, the home economist says.

"Take a serious look at your traditions," Amsden says. "Traditions are an important source of stability and togetherness, but they can also be stressful."

"If the traditional family dinner, party or get-together is the source of your distress, think of a different way of doing things with people who are important to you," she says. "You might develop a new tradition that will better fit your lifestyle and needs."

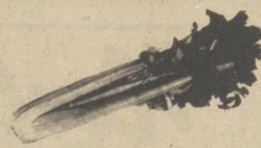

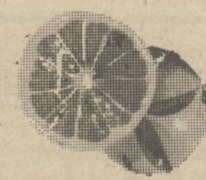

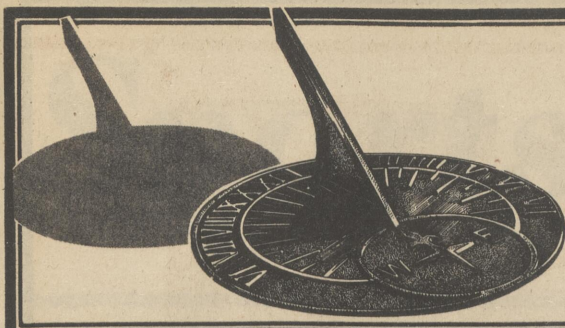

Gas prices up slightly

Gasoline prices in the First State have posted a modest one cent increase since Thanksgiving according to the recent Fuel Gauge Report conducted by the Delaware Motor Club AAA. Motorists traveling in Delaware during the upcoming Christmas/New Year holiday period can expect to pay an average of 86 cents for a gallon of gas.

Full service prices in Delaware now average 96.3 cents for regular grade and 99 cents for unleaded. At self-service stations, the average price per gallon is 73.4 cents for regular and 75.4 cents for

unleaded gas. Unleaded premium is currently averaging \$1.03 per gallon and diesel fuel averages 93 cents.

The averages reflected in the Delaware AAA Fuel Gauge Report are based on cash purchases. The use of credit cards can result in motorists paying four cents more for a gallon of gasoline.

Two-thirds of the gas stations advised that they would be closed on Christmas Day and less than 10% of the stations contacted on this Statewide survey indicated they would be open on a 24-hour basis over the holiday period.

A short note to parents. As reported in this and prior weeks police beat we are seeing an alarming number of increases in our drug case load. These drugs are showing up in our local Jr. high and Elementary schools as a reflection of our general community. An increasing number of CHILDREN are being found to be in possession of dangerous and illicit drugs. In the years past,

Harrington has seen its share of drug cases with: 5 cases reported in 1984; 7 cases reported in 1985; 18 cases reported so far this year in 1986.

This is alarming in that a portion of these cases reflects school children. Many of these problems could have been stopped at home. We are finding a large amount of drugs have been obtained from "Slipping" a few pills out of moms, dads, or grandparents perscription pill bottles. We have even recorded a case of a babysitter slipping a few pills from a customer of hers this way. The unsuspecting customer never missed the drug amounts. Once obtained, the pills or whatever are sold for small change from one teen or preteen to another. This can happen a number of times the result being that the seller has no idea what he or she is selling to the receiver. Many of these drugs won't get a person "high" but

rather affects the performance of body organs (I.E. Kidney pills. Blood pressure pills, etc.). This could be very unhealthy for a 9 or 10 year old child to be taking.

Parents, please take some time to talk to your child and think about the above mentioned problem. Most of the parents that we have had to talk with about this problem never suspected anything until we came to their door. A most unpleasant situation to say the least for everyone involved. I would like to believe that the little ones are not, but unfortunately, the older ones seem to be talking them into skimming drugs as mentioned above. Talk to your children, even at this young age about drugs. Feel free to contact any member of this Department if you need guidance or suggestions. We are here to help in any way we can.

Responsible holiday partying

Is the party host responsible for his guests getting home safely? This question has prompted a holiday alcohol awareness safety campaign, "Silent Night, Sober Night", launched by the Delaware Motor Club, AAA.

To assist the holiday host, AAA offers these suggestions for party hosting.

‡ If you serve alcoholic drinks, make non-alcoholic beverages available to make certain that everyone knows about both.

‡ Prove your lavishness and creativity as a host with a tempting display of food. Offer new foods throughout the evening. Avoid preparing highly seasoned or salty foods or snacks, as these merely make your guests thirsty.

‡ Use "normal" (one ounce) portions of liquor in mixed drinks—or less, and don't mix "strong" or "stiff" drinks.

‡ Serve drinks only upon request.

‡ Remember that a 12-ounce bottle of beer, a five-ounce glass of wine and a 1 1/2 ounce shot of liquor (mixed or straight) all contain the same amount of alcohol.

‡ Close the bar at least an hour before people are expected to leave. Bring on the non-alcoholic beverages, coffee, tea and a dessert.

‡ If a guest has had too much to drink, offer to drive him or her home, or have the person sleep over. Remember that only time sobers you up.

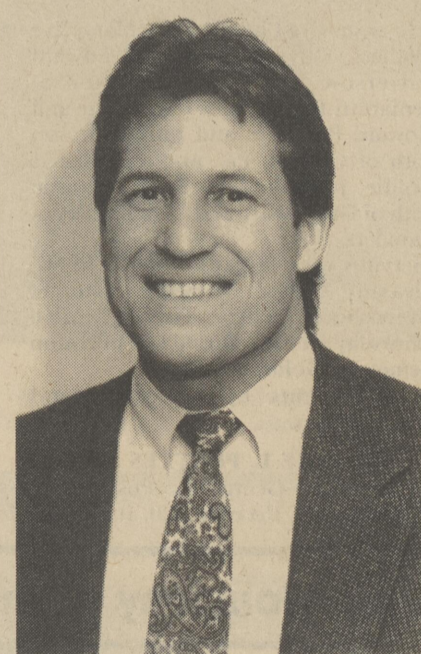

experience. But he is smart and is willing to learn. So we expect good things from Bryan", added Coach Shaffer.

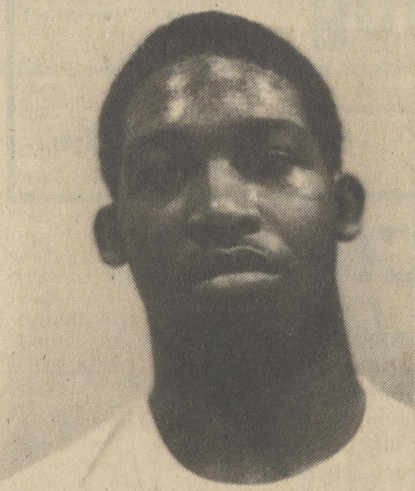
Steve Coppick out for the first time is a sophomore who has impressed Coach Shaffer even though in the Milford tournament he lost both rounds.

Phase Two, the final section of the report on the feasibility of the proposed civic center for the Dover region gives an early appraisal of the center's usefulness as a public facility for Kent County.

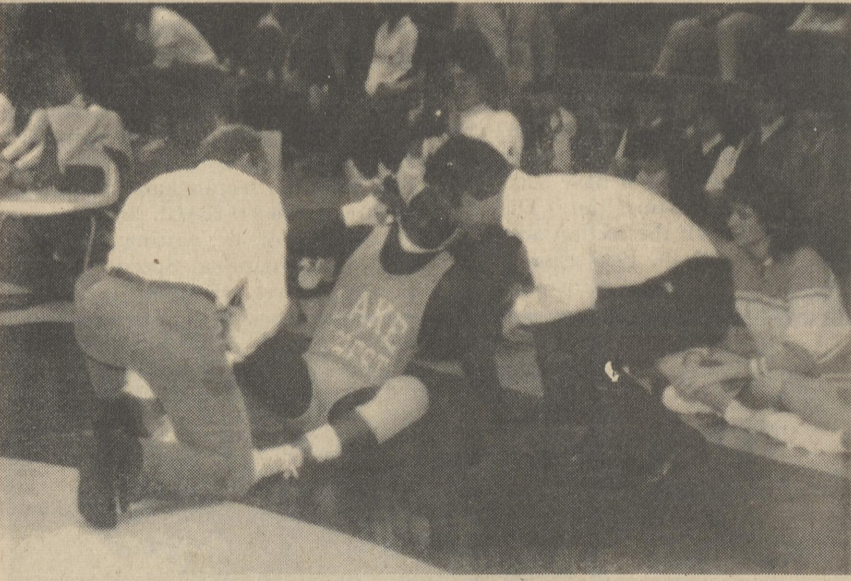
Included in the report is an estimate of the cost of building the facility, which is estimated at approximately seven million dollars, excluding land

acquisition.

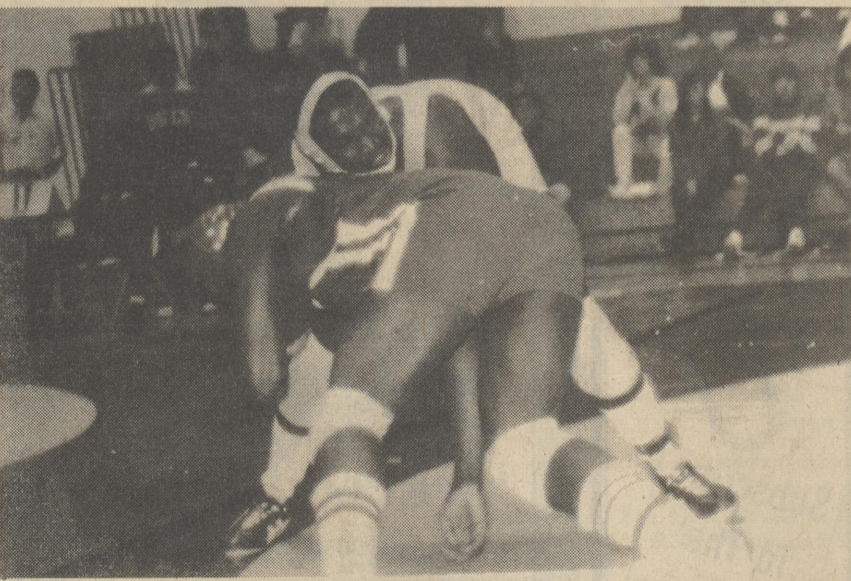

Interest has been received from Wesley College regarding the possibility of siting a football playing field in the Liberty Center Complex.

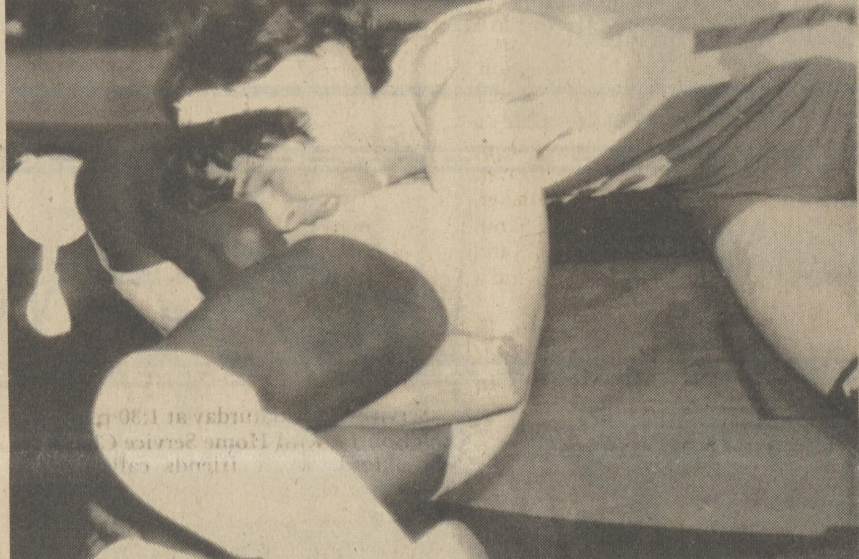

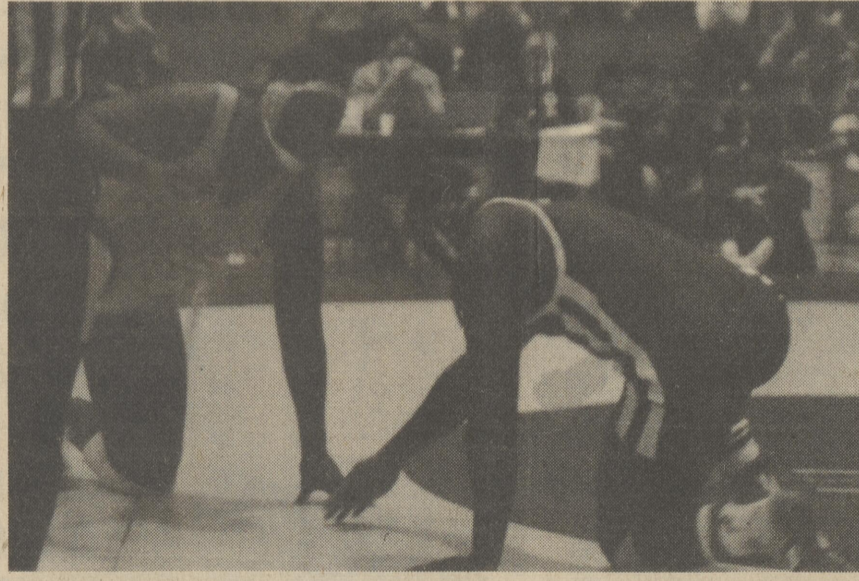
Wendall Watson sprained his ankle in a semi-final match with a CR wrestler and is given first aid until the doctors arrival. Photo by HGF



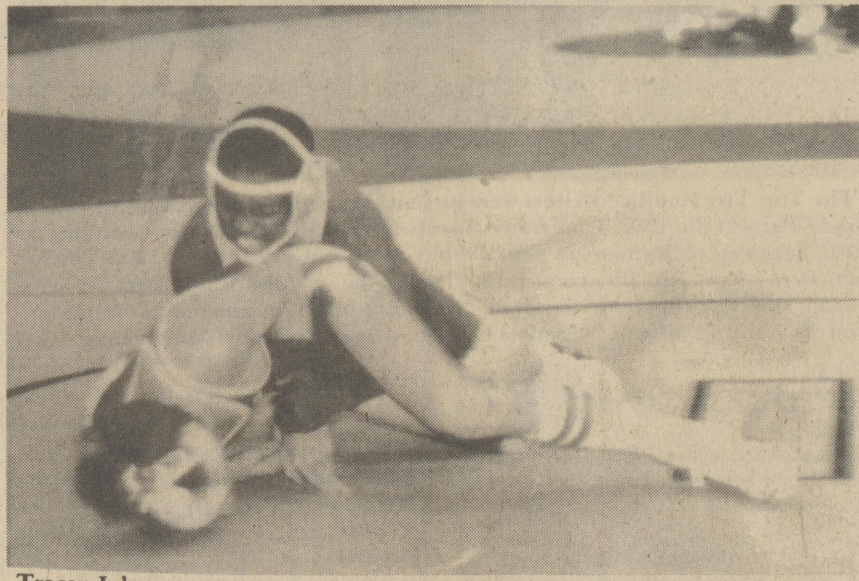
Marvin Hicks, facing camera, had a tough match in the semi-finals, but Marvin wore him down in the end for the win. Photo by HGF

The security of our prisons

The phone call that awoke me on Monday, December 1st, was the most disturbing I had ever received: four dangerous prisoners had escaped from the state prison near Smyrna. The news that came late that afternoon was even more painful: an innocent woman had been murdered near Kenton, probably by one of the escapees.

I resolved that day that the people of this state would receive a full explanation for the failure of our corrections system to keep these dangerous criminals behind bars, and that we would take every step necessary to assure that there would not be another escape.

Today several independent investigations into the escape are underway. The Delaware State Police are conducting an investigation. I immediately directed the Commissioner of Correction, John L. Sullivan, to find out what went wrong at the prison, to punish those responsible and take steps to improve security. And I asked F.L. Peter Stone, the former U.S. Attorney who is head of a special task force already investigating security in the corrections system, to concentrate on the December 1st prison break.

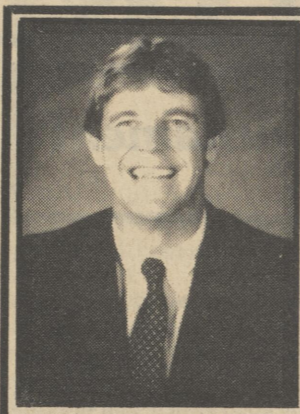
No one knows better than I do that those measures will not return Madeline Kisner to her family, or bring about the capture of the three escapees still at large. But they are vitally important if we are to be able to assure

the citizens of this state that the prison system is strong enough to guarantee their safety.

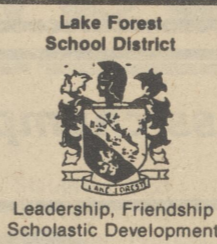
The news of the last few weeks has shown the difficulties any prison system faces. New Jersey experienced an escape at virtually the same time that Delaware did, and a week later three convicts broke out of Sing Sing prison in New York. It isn't surprising that people who break society's laws will also try to escape punishment, harming innocent people who get in their way.

Commissioner Sullivan has already taken disciplinary steps where negligence may have contributed to the escape. And he is planning further changes in the way the prisons are run. Mr. Stone and his group have done excellent work in their investigation of corrections security; their interim report recommends several changes to improve security and their final report in January will go even further. Expect the same high level of performance from the State Police.

Security has already been tightened at Delaware's prisons. Corrections personnel who have seen guards and officers suspended are keenly aware that high standards must be met in the corrections system. I cannot predict what measures will be recommended to strengthen our prisons until the reports are finished, but I am committed to a system which is both secure and fully accountable to the people of Delaware.

In previous columns discussing my membership and activities on the Governor's new study group (Delaware's Environmental Legacy/Shaping Tomorrow's Environment Today), I announced that I had been appointed to a special committee studying Air Resources and future priorities for protecting air quality in our state.

Due to internal requirements for the composition of these committees, however, I was informed last week that I have been reassigned to the Ecological and Living Resources Committee.

This Committee examines a variety of potential environmental problem areas and looks to develop strategies for addressing such problems before the year 2000. The areas of concentration include: problems unique to our wetlands (tidal and freshwater), effects of shoreline migration and the rise in sea level, the problem of shellfish depletion, Agricultural lands preservation, and the preservation of historical sites and landmarks.

As I stated earlier, the topics are varied and extremely complicated with numerous interrelationships with other environmental concerns. But the need

for critical examinations of these matters now couldn't be more evident.

It seems as if governmental agencies and social groups involved with initiating positive change can only be successful if they have some element of support from the public. Problems surface, however, because these issues are so complicated and far-reaching that very few members of the general public know what the problems and concerns are, let alone form opinions and ideas for addressing them. The first priority should be then to educate policy makers, government officials and the public about these matters, and aggressively seek input for resolutions.

The only way we can truly "shape tomorrow's environment today" is to critically analyze the social and economic impact of current governmental policy and modify such policy now, if needed.

As always, this committee will need your input if we are to succeed on this very important mission.
