Roberts is also the director of curriculum articulation and director of marketing and advertising for the Terry

While Roberts contributes himself as part of the reason for the change, he doesn't take all of the credit. Roberts credits Dr. VanSciver for doing an

Techinical and Community College's excellent job working on the board, working with the community and dealing with the problems of both honestly and straight-forwardly.

> VanSciver, who joined Lake Forest in August 1986, did so after the resignation of Gerald S. Lysik.

Since then VanSciver feels that the board is united and concerned with what goes on in the district.

change. A big change may be lying ahead if the upcoming November referendum is passed.

Reliable reports have put the figure in the neighborhood of \$50,000, which is a nice neighborhood. Whatever amount Willie walked off with, you can be sure it was a bit more than the \$8 a night he got as a 13-year-old guitar picker in a Texas Bohemian Polka Band.

The 54-year-old singer is a native of Abbott, Texas (population 375). He sang in Texas honky tonks for 20 years before striking it rich in 1976, when he won three Country Music Association awards and a Grammy for Blue Eyes Cryin' in the Rain, the "Country Single

of the Year. While playing his heart out in the Texas beer joints, he sold Bibles, encyclopedias, and vacuum cleaners on the side to support a wife and daughter. In the early Sixties, Willie invaded the big time -- Nashville. Nashville accepted him as a songwriter (he was named to the Hall of Fame by the Nashville Songwriters Association) but rejected him as a performer.

Willie once said, "I could make money writing songs, but I couldn't get a job

So Willie went back to Texas and did it his own way. And since 1976 he's been riding high. Because of his love for a live audience, he still spends 200 days a year on the road.

A business manager who once represented Nelson and Waylon Jennings once said, "I just want Willie and Waylon to be generic names like Elvis, Frankie and Bing.'

The total gate count for this year's state fair was 196,510 compared to the 1986 figure of 217,000 people who bought tickets for the fair.

At nighttime, attendance stayed about even, but during the extreme heat and humidity of the day, people did not flock to the fair as they did in the past when summers were cooler, the fair spokesman said.

Werszner did say that the fair made more money but was unable at the time to reveal a final amount.

The entrance price at the fair this year jumped to \$3.00, compared to \$2.50 last

Despite all of the heat, the fair still held some memorable moments including the sell-out performance of Willie Nelson. Nelson's sell-out was the first of its kind in 15 years, and there was more free entertainment available.



Also represented in the cow judging were the Eliasons from Kalmor Farm in Harrington, A.J. Winkler of Maple Lane Farms in Harrington and Bill



Some of the local swine entries included those from Glen Wright of Wyoming and another group brought in from L & L Farms of Felton.



The most successful Kent & Sussex Fair since 1949 closed Saturday here when cooler weather marked the tradionally hot week.

Good weather, plus added attractions, was definitely responsible for an attendance increase of about 10 per cent over last year, said T. Brinton Holloway, general manager and secretary of the event.

The largest attendance was on Saturday, Holloway said, with Friday having the biggest night attendance since 1949. Friday saw some 7000 persons on the grounds, in the afternoon, with 10,000 additional for the night show and the Lone Ranger and Lassie. Saturday and auto racing saw 12,000 persons on the grounds in the afternoon, with 7000 more appearing at night when the Four Lads, a vocal quartet, was on.

The general manager and secretary figured the week's attendance at 110,000 persons. He stated that everything went smoothly. Someone in the office of the fair association commented that the number of children losing their parents at the fair, was half that of last year's

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



Harrington deserved better decision in little league play

Where Little League was founded on the proposition of fair play, a questionable call on a play at third base during Monday's All Star Tournament play eliminated an exceptional Harrington Little League team whose play is the best over the past 15 years marred that theory.

In Monday night's action at the Camden-Wyoming field, a C-W base runner was called out in the top of the sixth inning in an attempted steal of third. The third base umpire was right on the play and called the base runner out. The players exchanged sides but as the C-W players were taking their positions the C-W coach, not the manager, who is not permitted to negotiate a decision, approached the third base umpire with an appeal saying the third baseman for Harrington had dropped the ball. At this point, all umpires were in the huddle...the first base ump, second base ump, third base ump and the home plate umpire. Prior to this huddle, the first base ump had given his opinion that the third baseman had dropped the





Is it cheaper to borrow money from the FHA? ASK MR. BERKO

Dear Mr. Berko: We are planning to do some work on our home. Is there any advantage to taking out an FHA loan rather than a regular bank loan. Our bank doesn't give FHA loans and they tell me their interest is less than FHA rates. Is this true? Is it possible that they will lend money cheaper than the government? Annette B., Dogsboro, DE

Dear Annette: The FHA, a part of the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), does not lend money. For a fee, based on the loan amount, they insure any participating bank against default by borrowers. Many banks would rather not pay the fee and take their own risks. Your banker was probably truthful about the cost of FHA-insured loans. Some banks who insure with FHA charge rates that take into account the fee paid to the FHA. Whether or not your loan is FHA insured is not important to you, if you get the loan. However, if vou do not have sufficient equity in your home to get a conventional loan, an FHA-insured lender is able to make the loan without regard to your time in the house or equity. By the way, you might look into local programs that provide home improvement loans and grants. Many offer below market interest or even no interest. Dear Florence: Your daughter can avoid having income taxes withheld and may not even have to file a tax return IF she had no Federal income tax liability in 1986 and expects none in 1987. Have your daughter show the employer the boxes on the W-4 form that can be checked off to establish the lack of tax liability. This authorizes him to stop deducting income taxes and even to return any money deducted that has not yet been sent to the IRS. There are certain things to keep in mind, however. Under the new laws a child can earn as much as \$2,540 in wages without having a tax liability. Different rules are applied with unearned income. If combined earned and unearned income exceeds only \$500, a child cannot claim exemption from withholding because

We've made some progress in this area, although the states are far ahead of the federal government in participating in pay equity research, study or implementation.

In fact, 28 states including Delaware have completed or are currently conducting studies of their pay systems and 17 have already made pay equity adjustments in wages paid to their

But the going is slow and difficult. This year full-time women workers earn, on average, only 64 cents for every \$1 earned by men. That's a gain of only six-tenth of a penny since 1955!

Perhaps the National Academy of Sciences in a recent study put its finger on why the going is so rough. It concluded that "the wage rates of women's jobs are depressed because women do them. Women are concentrated in low-paying jobs, not may play some role--and not because sector.

these jobs would be low-paying For about five years now, I've been regardless of who did them, but rather as a result of earlier traditions of discrimination against women that have become institutionalized...

Congress this year is again considering the Economic Equity Act of 1987. Twice before funds for a detailed study of how the federal government stacks up on the equity issue have been approved by the House of Representatives and stymied in the

Meanwhile, the nation's largest employer, the federal government, still sets wages by rating different jobs using the same numerical system used in 1923. In the 64 years since then the federal wage system has not been studied to determine whether the wages and classifications accurately reflect the work force.

Time is really running out. It is estimated that 80 percent of women are concentrated in jobs that will be eliminated or made obsolete by technical changes and automation by the turn of the century.

Equal pay for comparable work is not a radical idea. It has been upheld in the courts, and some states and employers in the private sector have made adjustments to avoid charges of pay discrimination against women.

Oddly enough, those adjustments have cost 2-4 percent in the public solely out of choice--although choice sector and 2 percent in the private

In the park just upstream stands a sculpture called "The Start Westward" by Gutzon Borglum, the creator of Mount Rushmore. Borglum's pioneers disembark there, much as the first settlers of Marietta did in April of 1788, beginning the colonization of the Northwest Territory of the United States—the vast domain stretching out from the Ohio to the Mississippi, encompassing Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin and eastern Minnesota. Today flags from those states fly from flagstaffs newly planted on the flanks of the monument. For Marietta's bicentennial celebration is starting soon, and the community knows it is an occasion of more than local importance.

The year of celebration will commence this month with a parade and worship services, an ice-cream social and an academic symposium. The most important ceremonies occur on July 13, and justly so: July 13 marks the 200th anniversary of the event that made the existence of Marietta possible. Two hundred years ago on that date the Congress of the old Confederation enacted the Northwest Ordinance.

Though not often referred to today, the Northwest Ordinance of 1787 is an impressive historical landmark nonetheless

The Ordinace ensured that settlers moving into the Territory would find law and order already established; it guaranteed that when a sufficient number of them had arrived they would be entitled to a good measure of selfgovernment. The Ordinance promised to create new states that would frame constitutions for themselves and enter the federal union on an equal footing with the original ones.

The Ordinance also acted as a sort of Dr. Robert Hill is Professor of bill of rights. It shielded freedom of encouraged education and prohibited slavery in the Territory forever. In short, the Ordinance opened the Northwest region to settlement and stamped it with a special character; and itself to the Pacific.

It is not too much to say that the spirit Northwest Territory-which also animates the Northwest

Ordinance were drafted to cope with the FEDERALIST PAPERS IS PRO- gave the government of the united States the power it needed if the union of the states were not to disintegrate And the Ordinance fortified national authority in a very down-to-earth way. MARIETTA, OHIO-I write these By giving government to the Northwest Territory, the Ordinance made the land within the Territory marketable-and hence a source of revenue for the empty federal treasury.

> Moreover, both the Constitution and the Ordinance were concerned with the preservation and improvement of republican government-what might be called representative democracy, directed at securing liberty through law. By 1787 it seemed to the most sober of Americans that unjust majorities in state legislatures were perverting republicanism and thereby provoking an anti-republican reaction. They sought in the new Constitution (in Madison's words) "a republican remedy for the diseases most incident to republican government.'

> As for the Northwest Ordinance, its grand object is declared to be 'entending the fundamental principles of...liberty which form the basis whereon...republics are erected;" and so it intends "to fix and establish those principles as the basis of all laws, constitutions, and governments, which forever hereafter shall be formed in the...territory...


> Nowadays we tend to think of 'fundamental principles' as somewhat vague aspirations or abstractions. But that is not the way the Northwest Ordinance treated them. Principles of liberty are generators of liberty, and to serve as a basis for republicanism they must be concrete They include those ways of acting and thinking and feeling that support republican government.

> The Ordinance's method of preserving and improving republican government differed from the Constitution's. Its task was creating new societies, so it payed more direct attention to planting and nurturing the habits and opinions that are the seeds of flourishing republics. In that way it complemented the Constitution-or perhaps even completed it. And for the reason the Northwest Ordinance, and its wisdom, should not be overlooked in this bicentennial year.

A Fourth of July Pledge

by Bettina Bien Greaves .The mass of mankind has not been

born with saddles on their backs, nor a favored few booted and spurred, ready to ride them legitimatley, by the grace of God." Thomas Jefferson, who wrote those words on June 24, 1826, was the author of our Declaration of Independence.

He had been invited to attend the festivities in Washington on the occasion of the 50th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration. Jefferson, then 83 years old, regretted that ill health prevented his accepting. "I should, indeed, with peculiar delight, have met and exchanged there congratulations personally with the small band, the remnant of that host of worthies, who joined with us on that day, in the bold and doubtful election we were to make for our country, between submission or the sword."

Jefferson rejoiced "that our fellow citizens, after half a century of experience and prosperity, continue to approve the choice we made. May it be to the world, what I belive it will be, (to some parts sooner, to others later, but finally to all,) the signal of arousing men to burst the chains under which monkish ignorance and superstition had persuaded them to bind themselves, and to assume the blessings and security of self-goverment. That form which we have substituted, restores the free right

to the unbounded exercise of reason and freedom of opinion. All eyes are opened, or opening, to the rights of man....These are grounds of hope for

This was the last letter Thomas Jefferson wrote. He died on that Fourth

Since that 50th anniversary of the Declaration's signing in 1826, the rights of countless millions to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness have been tragically snuffed out and violated. Yet today, as in Jefferson's time, many "eyes are opened, or opening, to the rights of man." Progress is being made in some respects. As Jefferson wrote, "These are grounds of hope for others.'

It is fitting and proper to join Jefferson, especially on the Fourth of July of each year, in reaffirming our dedication to individual freedom under limited government. In Jefferson's words, "For ourselves, let the annual return of this day forever refresh our recollections of these rights, and an undiminshed devotion to them.


Sacrifice

He was five years old--still a tiny child. The taxi hit him and he was rushed to the nearest medical center. His diagnosis was not good--a fractured leg and trauma to the head. His prognosis was less encouraging than his diagnosis. If he survived at all, the damage to his brain would leave him in a vegetative state. "Oh, Lord", they prayed, "he's so little, and, Lord, You know what will happen if his brain doesn't heal. You know life is not as valuable here as it is in the United States, and he'll probably just be left to die. Please, Lord, heal his tiny body, and make him whole again!" In the weeks to come, the prayers continued, and, slowly, changes began to take place. The coma began to lift; he opened his eyes; he could grasp a hand; he could smile. Two months after the accident, he walked. He was healing!

A modern medical facility in a major city? Hardly! Those who prayed so hard for Koffi's healing were Ralph and Judy Dill of Frederica, Delaware. Togo, Africa, and Frederica, Delaware are about as far removed from each other as two places can be. So what brought the two together? To find out, come with me and meet two special people, Ralph and Judy Dill.

Mr. and Mrs. Dill have been living in Frederica since 1977. They are the parents of Colleen, who is married and is a registered nurse in New Jersey, and John, who is also married and works for Portable Buildings in Woodside. Mr. Dill grew up on a farm in Felton. It was through some close friends that he met and eventually married Judy Peters, who hailed from New Jersey. Following a stint in the Navy, and several years in New Jersey and New Hampshire, the Dills returned to Delaware and Mr. Dill went to work for General Foods. He had spent his working years learning about communications, electronics and machinery. He had no idea how useful this knowledge would become.

During his years on the farm, Mr. Dill had worked with chickens. In 1980, he began experiencing difficulty seeing. Visits to several doctors provided a discouraging diagnosis. Mr. Dill was suffering from hystoplasmosis--a condition brought on from breathing the dust of chicken manure. This can affect various parts of the body such as the lungs, liver or kidneys. In Mr. Dill's case, the retinae of his eyes were affected. Laser treatments were performed in an effort to cauterize



unexpected way.

oozing vessels inside the retinae, but even lasers had their limits. In 1980, Mr. Dill was declared legally blind.

The years since 1980 have been full of change and excitment. Mr. Dill was placed on disability in 1982. This left him with time on his hands. But the Dills are not idle people. They haven't been sitting around, twiddling their thumbs in these past five years. Mr. Dill's disability meant only one thing to them--they now had the time to get out and serve God and people in need. They felt that God had something very special for them to do, and they were really looking forward to doing it!

Adjusting to blindness was not easy. Mr. Dill was dependent on someone else for the first time in his life. Though still partially capable of seeing, he could no longer drive, and reading was next to impossible. Classes in Braille taught him to read by touch rather than by sight. He was beginning to adjust, and it wasn't too long before the knowledge he had stored in his head over the years, including Braille, was put to use in an

modern conveniences--no creature comforts. The Dill's home in Frederica is somplete with a screened-in porch, a gorgeous fireplace and central air conditioning. And they actually wanted to leave their comfortable home and return to such primitive conditions? That's right! But, why? The answer to that is simple. They love God and want to share His love with those who have never heard. They've learned the words of Jesus found in Luke 12:15--"...for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth. October, 1986, the Dills again boarded

the huge airplane headed for Holland, then Togo. This time, their ministry was in a different location. Their eight months in Togo were spent in the twenty-five bed hospital there in the jungle. They lived in an apratment the size of their Frederica livingroom, and it was attached to the end of a school for missionary children. Electricity is very expensive in Togo, so every evening at 8:45, it gets turned off. Perhaps that was better, because the huge mosquitoes no longer managed to find their way through the screens to the light inside the tiny apartment--but then, what do you do with the ones already inside when it's so dark you can't see to smush them? Mrs. Dill spent her days working as a ward clerk in the hospital; Mr. Dill again put his parts training to use and installed a twelve-volt telephone system between the hospital building and clinic offices. Seemed like everywhere they looked, they found something they could do with the knowledge in their heads from years gone by.

So they left their comfortable, modern home and spent eight months in a culture centuries behind our own. Was it worth it? In Togo, the names Grandmama and Grandpapa are given only to those who are loved and respected. It is the highest form of praise. Mr. and Mrs. Dill became Grandmama and Grandpapa. Koffi's recovery was just one answer to the Dill's prayers. Friendships were established and will last forever. Togo-so primitive and hostile, so different from our daily existence. Was the sacrifice worth it? Is sharing God's love worth it? Ask the Dills. With grins from ear to ear, they'll tell you emphatically,

Fifteen years after scoring his inaugural victory with Nobel Will, John Campbell has been setting records and has visited the winner's circle over 3.500 times



He became the first driver at The Meadowlands to win 2,000 races at the East Rutherford harness facility, and only the second driver in harness racing history to attain over \$50 million in purse earnings. Earlier in the month, Campbell reached the 3,500 victory plateau, a feat accomplished by only 20 drivers.

Campbell is no stranger to winning dash titles at The Meadowlands. In 1979 only his second year of racing here, he took down his first of five dash titles, with title number six under wraps for 1987. When he set his record of 303, he broke fellow rival Bill O'Donnell's previous record of 217 by 86 wins.
