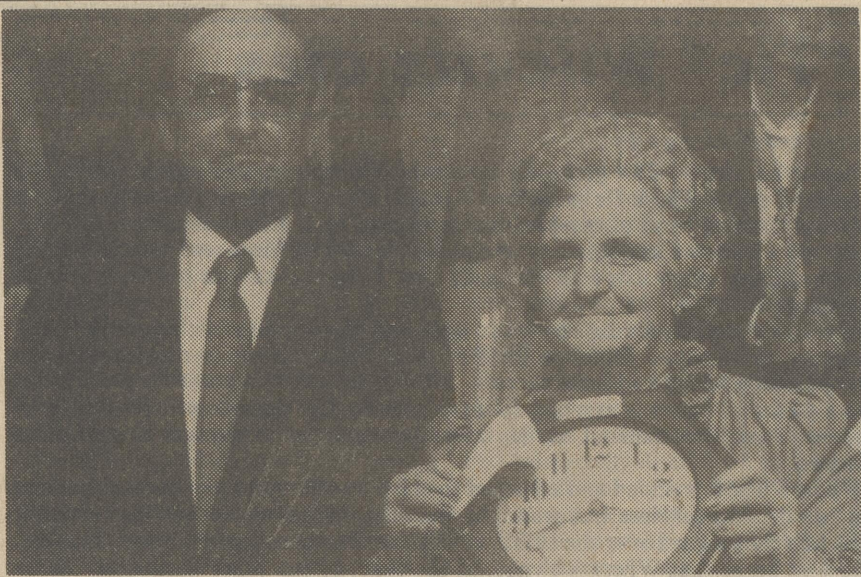

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Noted driver, official "Tic" Wilcutts dies

Editor's Note: The death of "Tic" Wilcutts was carried in last week's Harrington Journal... "In The Pocket". This newsrelease arrived too late for last week's newspaper. The biography was so well done by Marv Bachrad, certainly one of the best at what he does, that it was only fitting to publish it again. Mr. Bachrad is a true example of the real talents present at Brandywine Raceway. It goes without saying that Brandywine Raceway is possessed with talent, which is the reason for its long successful history. As for "Tic", I first saw him drive at Brandywine in the late '50's. He could do marvels with a horse on the racetrack. If he had to be there, you knew that you could count on him.

One of harness racing's leading drivers for most of four decades and one of the all time greats in Delaware Valley history, John "Tic" Wilcutts passed away Friday, November 17 in Southern Pines, North Carolina at age 65.

Wilcutts was a six time leading driver at Brandywine and won three titles at Liberty Bell Park during his standout career that began in the mid forties and continued until the early seventies. He was also leading driver at Rosecroft Raceway during that track's first season in 1948 and at other Maryland tracks, Laurel and the ill-fated Baltimore Raceway as well as at Harrington in Delaware.

Seven times the diminutive horseman won more than 100 races in a season, at a time when there wasn't year around racing. During the 1967 campaign, he guided 165 winners.

A native of the state of Delaware, Wilcutts was born in Magnolia and raised in Wyoming, which remained his lifelong residence.

After two years of military service in the South Pacific, he turned to racing and made it his profession. He also had an opportunity to become a jockey, because of his size and ability to handle horses, but turned to the standardbred sport and quickly became a favorite at raceways along the east coast.

Wilcutts was noted for his success as a catch-driver. He drove Truluck five times and was beaten only once, by a nose in the Cane Pace. He also guided Armbr Nesbit among a host of horses that either shipped in for races at Brandywine or Liberty Bell. He also drove Sir Faffee and piloted the gelding to an impressive victory in the Hollywood Park Trotting Classic in the late sixties.

District hires new Aquatics Coordinator

Like his predecessor, Corash will be responsible for the pool and its administration as well as all the programs

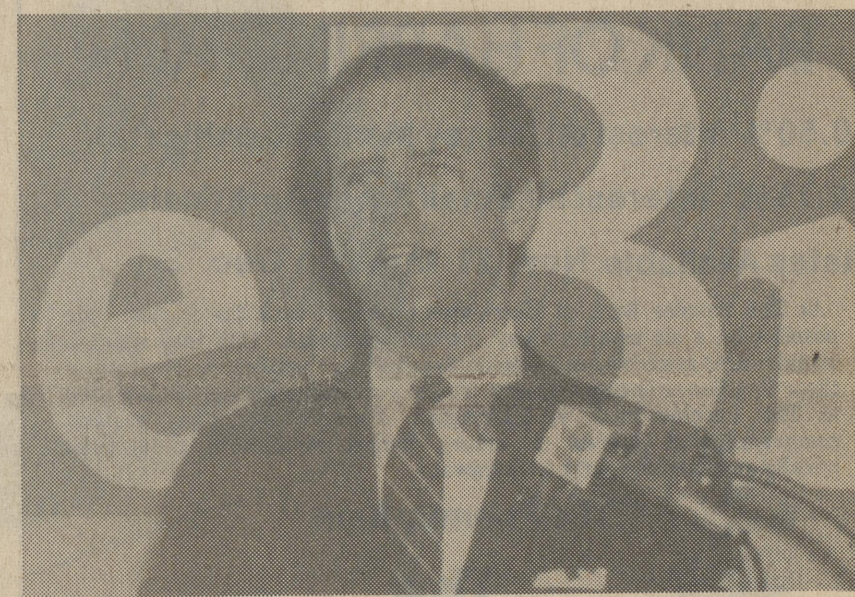
both for the schools and for the community associated with it. He will coach the community swim team.

Holy Cross will stay open, says Principal

Rumors that Holy Cross High School in Dover is closing are not true, according to Sister Mary Alicia, school principal.

Although Holy Cross, the only Catholic High School in downstate Delaware, is having financial problems, school officials are working to reverse the trend of declining enrollment, she said.

The rumors, which have been circulating for two years, have discouraged some students from enrolling, said Sister Mary Alicia.

The school, which celebrates its 25th anniversary this year, recently completed a Middle States Association accreditation process that would certify the school for 10 years.

"You don't invest thousands of dollars in a Middle States accreditation process if you're planning to close your doors in June," she said.

Enrollment has dropped from 222 students five years ago to 154 today. Declines in enrollment run in cycles and can be attributed in part to the national decrease in enrollment, she said.

School officials, parents, and students have coordinated their efforts to raise funds and recruit new students.

In addition to new mini-courses in music and art appreciation, Sister Mary Alicia cited the dedicated teachers, fewer discipline problems, the stress on individualism and, because the school is small, greater participation and achievement opportunities for each student as advantages to attending Holy Cross.

Delaware Unemployment down from last year

In October of 1983 Delaware unemployment was 7.8 percent; in October of 1984 it was 6.3 percent.

James K. McFadden, chief of the Office of Occupational and Labor Market Information of the State Department of Labor said 5,700 jobs were created in Delaware in the last year.

While Delaware's average 1984 unemployment rate was 6.3 percent, the regional rate was 7.1 percent, and the national rate was 7.6 percent.

Delaware's lower unemployment rate can be credited in part to legislation that has attracted industry to the state, according to McFadden.

The new jobs created in the state bring the total non-seasonal employment in Delaware to 276,300.

Bloody Santa movie picketed

Two Felton mothers picketed Movies Six in Rodney Village Friday night in an effort to persuade the manager to remove the controversial film "Silent Night, Deadly Night."

Ann Wood and Christine Burt, both 30, carried posters protesting the film that depicts an ax-wielding maniacal murderer dressed as Santa Claus.

Commercials showing Santa swinging an ax and firing a pistol at his victims during a Christmas murder spree have been discontinued.

Wood and Burt, who each have two small children, are following the example set by mothers in Milwaukee and New Jersey whose protest movements succeeded in having the gory flick removed.

After bad reviews and poor box office showings, Tri-Star Pictures officials decided to release the film only in the Northeast and Midwest.

Wood and Burt are circulating petitions to ban the movie.

Dancer removes top; Police remove dancer

DENTON - Denton officials say that dancing the go-go is a no-no.

Patrons of the Sunshine Inn in this small Eastern Shore community, tavern owner Janet A. Patterson, and topless dancer Beverly L. Gamble were surprised by a police raid on the club on Nov. 21.

Gamble was in the middle of her act when state police troopers, assisted by sheriff's deputies and municipal police, announced the raid.

State police raided the club at the request of Denton Police Chief Bill Davis and filed charges of being a common nuisance and conducting a disorderly house against both Patterson and Gamble.

"There were 15 cops there for this little dinky club that doesn't hold more than 25 people," said the 29 year old Gamble, who performs as a topless dancer in Smyrna, Del. "I think they overreacted."

Gamble's Wednesday night performances began three weeks ago in an effort to step up business at her bar, Patterson said.

"I didn't think we were doing anything wrong," said Patterson, "I didn't know there was a law against it. When they got us to the police station they had to look it up in the books to see what to charge us with."

Both women were released on their own recognizance.

James M. Sparks, 37, of Greensboro, Patterson's brother, was also arrested and charged with hindering the police investigation and resisting arrest during the raid.

"This is the first time anything like this has happened to me. I couldn't believe it," said Gamble.

"Before I started I asked her (Patterson) if she was sure it was all right. She said she had an entertainment license. She had bands there, so I thought everything was OK," she added.

"It was a very conservative act. Everything was on the up and up. I think they (the police) could have given us a warning if they thought anything was wrong," Gamble said.

Gamble's act apparently went over big with the customers.

"Everybody seemed to like it and business sure picked up. One man said to me that this was the biggest excitement around here in 10 years," said Patterson.

Business had been slow, and the club was having a financial struggle, accord-

ing to Patterson.

"She runs a decent place. There's no under-age drinking, and the customers were very nice, not nasty like in some places," said Gamble.

"I try to do the best I can in my profession. But, I know, there are some people, even in the Eighties, who frown on it," Gamble added.

Gamble, who has performed in several other states, said she didn't know there was anything wrong with practicing her craft in Maryland.

Barbara Chandler, Patterson's assistant at the club, said, "We didn't think much of it. I mean, you've got The Block in Baltimore, which is a whole

Harrington City Council considers "Convenience Store" addition to town.

In an effort to thrash out problems that might arise as a result of installing a "Convenience Store" Complex on route 13, south of Hardee's, the REALTY WORLD/Alpha Real Estate Company and the Harrington City Council debated matters of zoning, primarily concerned with whether or not the real estate company's plan to have the service of gasoline facilities as a subsidiary attraction to their stores would violate current zoning laws. It was decided that further considerations were necessary and that the legal

aspects of the question would be determined after further consultations with the local Zoning Board Commission. The Council was assured by REALTY WORLD that whatever their findings were, that they would cooperate and work with the Council. This was the prime consideration of the work of the Council for this "workshop" session, and it was generally, if unofficially, conceded that such an addition to the area would be a boom and an asset to the citizens of Harrington.

Late in his career, after giving up his stable, Wilcutts became regular driver for veteran Frank Safford. He sat behind Moonglo Hanover, Gloria Gray and the rest of a outstanding band of racehorses campaigned by the Gray Brothers.

He was a frail man sustaining six major injuries during his career as a driver. He broke almost every bone in his body and twice broke his pelvis in racing accidents.

In the mid-sixties, during one of his later and more serious accidents, Wilcutts assigned driver after driver in the Delaware Valley circuit to replace while he recuperated. They had little success. Finally, he asked a promising newcomer from Canada, who was starting to make a name for himself to drive Wilcutts' horses. From that moment on, his operation returned to moneymaking for his owners.

When Wilcutts mended and returned to drive he offered to pay his replacement for his driving services but was told that his money would not be accepted. Wilcutts then signed over the USTA certificate of ownership for Money Changer, the best horse that Wilcutts owned, at the time, to the other horseman, Herve Filion.

In 1983, the Delaware Valley Chapter, U.S. Harness Writers' Association inducted Wilcutts into its Hall of Fame.

Upon retirement as an active horseman, Wilcutts became a racing official and served as Presiding Judge at Maryland tracks before being sidelined due to emphysema early this year.

Wilcutts also will be remembered for his association with one of the greatest pacers of all time. In the late '60's, Delaware Valley veterinarian John Peters and racing official Mark Lydon took fancy to a filly at the Harrisburg sale. Not long after, Peter's wife Elizabeth, Lydon and Wilcutts became the owner.

Wilcutts broke her and found all she wanted to is trot. The next spring, as a three-year-old, the filly finally took to hobbles and paced around 2:06 before breaking a bone. The next step was the broodmare ranks where she was booked to first year sire Meadow Skipper.

After adding a fourth partner, Charles Kenny, it was decided that the package of mare, in foal, with colt at her side would be sold. The quartet of owners received \$11,000 from Bert James and the broodmare, Voodoo Hanover and yearling colt, Albatross had a date with destiny.

One of Wilcutts' closest friends was "Doc" Kennedy, a physician who upon retiring from his medical practice in Philadelphia joined Wilcutts' staff at the racetrack.

Wilcutts is survived by his wife Helen, who was a skilled handicapper and widely recognized for her ability to evaluate competition and often received credit for her observations by her husband. Also surviving is a brother, Robert, of Dover, Delaware and a sister, Margaret Carr, a resident of Okeechobee, Florida.

Ceremonies were held Monday, November 19th in Southern Pines, North Carolina where he was cremated and his remains buried in Wyoming, Delaware.

Letter to the Editor. Please print my letter as a tribute to the memory of Rev. Frank Lucia.

Rev. Frank Lucia: A Good Friend
It was about 6:45 a.m. on the morning of August 31, 1976 when I called Rev. Lucia from my home in Irwin, Pa. My

son, Bob Hughes, had just phoned me in a state of grief and shock to inform me that he found his wife, Serita, in the driveway and she was dead. Bob was crying so hard I could hardly understand what he was telling me and what I heard seemed like a bad dream. Serita is dead.

Rev. Lucia quickly responded to my call and went to Bob's home immediately. He found Bob to be in shock and emotionally distressed. Rev. Lucia comforted Bob in the same kind and gentle manner which he demonstrated, I am sure, to many others in his years as a highly respected and loved minister.

Little did I realize that in less than 24 hours I would be calling Rev. Lucia again at about 2:00 a.m. on September 1 to inform him that Bob had been arrested for Serita's murder by Detective Rimmer and Detective Pearce. It was necessary that I locate an attorney to attend Bob's arraignment. An attorney was recommended at which time Bob pleaded NOT GUILTY.

We were not permitted in the home as the investigation was still going on, even though Bob was already in Smyrna. The investigation in his home continued, thus making it necessary for us to check into the local motel. Rev. Lucia visited us that morning in our motel room and prayed with us and comforted me and my family as we tried to realize the searing tragedy of Serita's death and Bob's imprisonment in Smyrna.

Rev. Lucia visited Bob at Smyrna those first difficult days. He also visited my wife and I as we had taken

up residence in Bob's home. When Bob was released in seven days for lack of sufficient evidence, Rev. Lucia was with us once again to share our joy of Bob's release from Smyrna and the sadness of Serita's tragic death, leaving Chad and Brock without a mother.

Bob and Serita were members of Avenue Methodist Church, therefore Mrs. Hughes and I transferred our letter from the Circleville Methodist Church in Irwin, Pennsylvania and also became members of Avenue Methodist Church in Milford. We really loved Rev. Lucia. He became a good friend. We often had lunch together and learned to know a little of each other. He got me in touch with others in Milford that were so helpful during our transition from Irwin, Pennsylvania to Milford.

Bob's record was made clear by an expungement order on April 4, 1977 and we began to consider the future of Bob's two boys, Chad and Brock. We talked with several people of relocating and Rev. Lucia was one of them. After much prayer together, it was decided that we should relocate and we subsequently moved to California.

While in California, our contact with Rev. Lucia continued. Visits back East always included a visit with Rev. Lucia. During Bob's first trial, we prayed together and when Bob was convicted for a crime of which he steadfastly denies any involvement with Serita's death, Rev. Lucia was the first to visit us and comfort us. During Bob's confinement, Rev. Lucia on many occasions drove to Smyrna in all kinds

of weather to visit Bob; to pray with him and serve him communion. Rev. Lucia was always kind enough to drop us a note and give us a report on Bob.


After Bob had received a new trial by the Delaware Supreme Court and was once again convicted, Rev. Lucia did not give up in his effort to visit Bob and keep us informed on his visits to Bob. As time went on and Rev. Lucia's health was deteriorating, he continued to keep in touch with brief notes on his health problems and the concern his family and friends had for him and how grateful he was for those that prayed for him.

I realize this is a long letter to the Editor, but I believed it was important for me to acknowledge with love and great admiration for a man that really made the Scriptures come alive. He really knew what Galatians 6:2 was all about, "Bear ye one another's burden and so fulfill the Law of Christ." And with regard to Bob's imprisonment, Rev. Lucia truly lived the Scripture in Matthew 25:36, "I was in prison and ye came unto me."

Enter into the Gates, Frank, and into the House not made by hands eternal in the heavens and there find your reward for your loyal and faithful service and for a lifetime of love and concern you shared with others. We will always hold you in high esteem and will count you as a very dear friend. May God bless your family as they adjust to your absence from their lives.

Spartans lose play-off game in second half

Despite an explosive first quarter the Lake Forest Spartan football team lost to the Claymont Indians 18-26 Friday afternoon.

The Spartans started out on the right foot with Donnie Bell's 80 yards touchdown run on the first play of the game, but the two point conversion failed. Later in the quarter Wendall Watson ran 13 yards to put Lake Forest up 12-0. With seconds left in the first quarter Donnie Bell had a 65 yard run that added six more points to the Spartans total.

Neither team scored in second quarter, but the Spartan defense continued to control claymont, holding them to just 49 yards total offense in the first half while Lake Forest rolled up 261 yards in piling up its 18-0 lead.

Things didn't go right for the Spartans from the beginning in the second half. On the first play the Indians scored and got the two point conversion to make the score 18-8. Lake Forest turned the ball over four times in the second half, the first time on its first possession. With a little over

seven minutes left in the third quarter, Claymont scored again to close the gap to 18-14.

Early in the fourth quarter Lake Forest fumbled again, which led to another Claymont touchdown that put them ahead 20-18 with a little over 10 minutes left in the game. On the kickoff Martin Bordley fumbled to give the Indians the ball on the Lake Forest 30, but the Spartans were able to stop them when Bordley intercepted a pass to give Lake Forest the ball on its own 13. The Spartans couldn't get their offense moving and were forced to punt after gaining only four yards on three plays.

Claymont was given the ball on the Lake Forest 30 after Dexter Bray tackled a Claymont player before he could make a fair catch on Mike Wing's punt. But the Spartans held on and got the ball back on their 8 yard line with 2:46 left in the game. Once again Lake Forest couldn't move the ball and turned it over to Claymont after quarter-back William Scott was sacked at the 10 yard line on a fourth and six. The Indians didn't waste any time as

they scored on the next play, making the score 18-26.

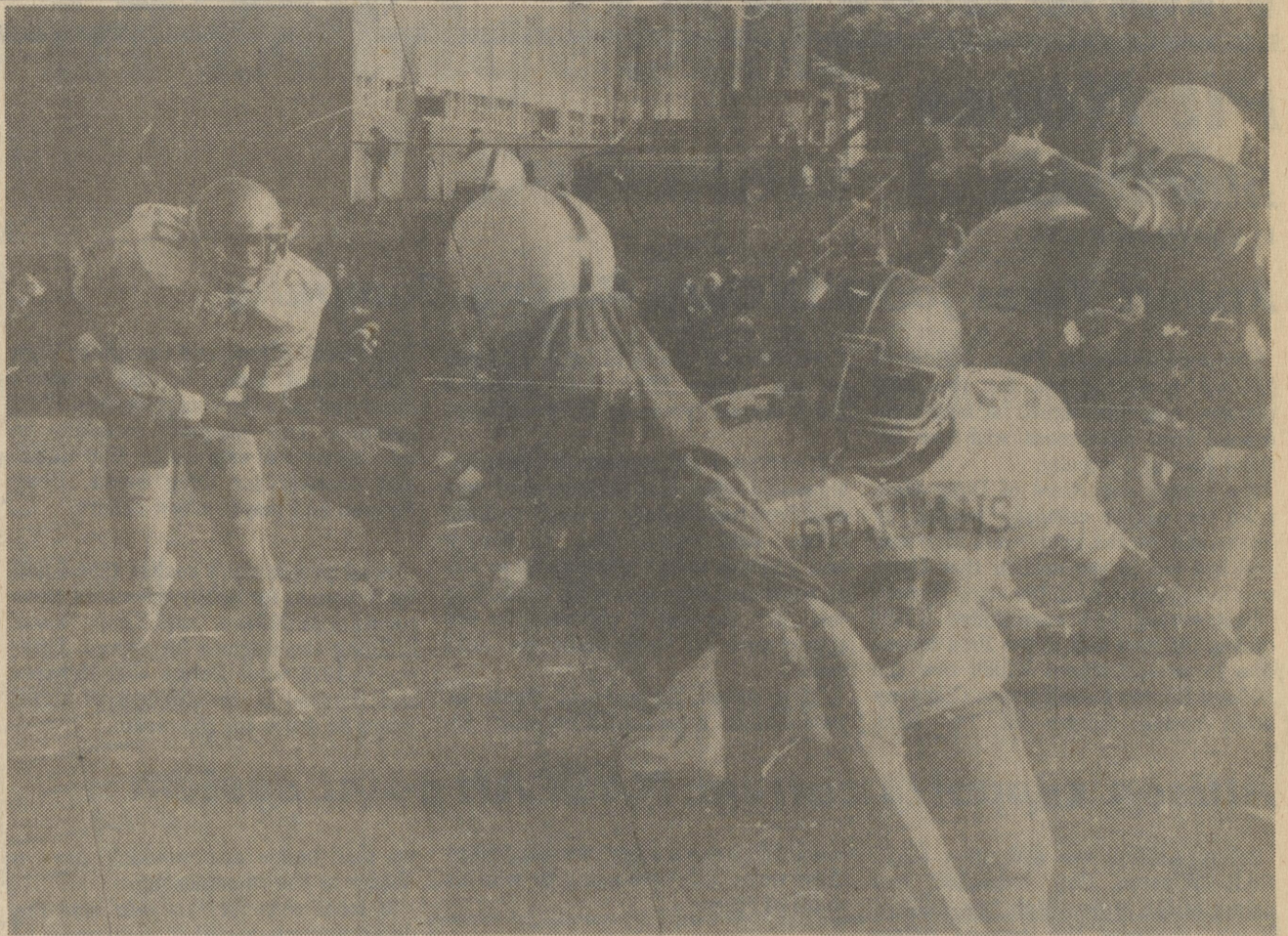
With 2 1/2 minutes left to tie the score, Lake Forest received the kick-off and fumbled it once again. Then Claymont ran out the clock.

Quarterback William Scott's ability to run has been a factor in all the Spartans games this year as he had 800 yards of rushing. But Friday, Claymont put a stop to that, holding him to just 35 yards.

Three Spartan players were named to first team All-Henlopen Conference. They are quarterback William Scott, end Kermit Mosley and linebacker Scott Fleming. Honorable Mention was received by James Hanes, offense, and Eric Warren, defense.

The state tournament winds up this weekend when Claymont faces Friends for the Division II title and Cape Henlopen takes on undefeated Newark.

The week in Harness Racing --A Round-up

Guts came on like a rocket from far back in track record equalling time to take The \$100,000 Battle of the Brandywine; Perky Fiddler posted 7 magic miles and a tight driver's race that continued to the final race were among the highlights of the 32nd season of racing at Brandywine Raceway.

A host of Delawarean horsemen enjoyed their most successful seasons at the track including Presley Moore, Jr., and Linda McNatt, both from Smyrna, Whitey Moore, of Wyoming, Jim Angelo and Dino Episcopo, each from Hockessin, Bruce Saunders of Newark, Mark Daniels of Clayton and Wilmington's Bill Buckley and Joe Holloway. Harrington area horsemen, Del and Brian Manges, Bob Shahan and former area resident Howard Parker also had good meets.

As usual Grand Circuit Racing made two visits during the year. The 3 year olds campaigned in early June and the freshmen pacers and trotters raced in late July.

The highspot of the season, as expected, was the Silver Anniversary edition of the sport's first major race of the season for 3 year old pacers, the \$100,000 Battle of the Brandywine, on June 10.

Driver Bill O'Donnell and the appropriately named son of Raven Hanover, Guts, put on a sensational display of speed from the third quarter to the finish line stopping the timer at 1:54.2 - the fastest mile of the season, a new event record which equalled the track standard established by Direct Scooter in 1980 - and became the highlight of the campaign.

Fourth at the head of the stretch, Guts blazed down the lane to catch Hobo's Willy (John Campbell) approaching the finish line and sped away to a length-and-a-quarter victory. Russ Lynn Scot (Herve Filion) closed well for third money. The first three finishers each had won \$25,000 Battle Prevue divisions the previous Sunday.

Filion, a perennial Brandywine favorite, though now based in New Jersey, returned later in the evening to win the Battle Consolation, the \$25,000 Skirmish, behind Embrace Me in 1:56.4.

Other Grand Circuit high spots included, Limbo Joe who fashioning a 1:59.2 General George Washington record for trainer-driver Gerald Prodrino. Why Not (Mickey McNichol) scored a 2:01 victory in another Division of the \$41,250 trot.

Ron Dancer guided Worth Beein to a new 2:00.2 standard in the \$25,050 Martha Washington.

The \$41,250 Betsy Ross was split into two divisions, Homemade Lovin a 1:58.3 winner in one for Walter "Red" Ross while Sam Belote got Three O One got up in a tight photo finish timed in 1:58.4, in the other.

Later in the season, the 2 year olds were featured. Lead by local favorite Devil's Adversary, a product of the renowned Brandywine "Baby Race" program. The Oil Burner colt did not disappoint as Abe Stoltzfus reined the freshmen pacer to a new Tom Hal record 1:58.4 victory in one of the four sections of the nearly \$60 thousand stake.

Double Bubba (Jim Gluhm) won in 1:59.2, Silent Target (Dick Farrington) scored in 2:00.1 and Escape Forever (Herve Filion), 2:00.2, were best in the remaining divisions.

Trainer Fred Grant drove Tri States Baby to victory in the \$28,800 Pochontas nipping Scarlet Maggie at the wire in 2:00.2.

Stanley Dancer piloted Lovely Lassie to a 2:05 win taking the \$19,000 nancy Hanks Trot.

Early season headlines were take by Abra Cadabra, who ran off five

straight victories including a grand slam in the popular Stepping Stone Series. Jim Brittingham urged the Abercrombie colt to a powerful 1:58.4 effort in the \$10,000 Final.

Bad JR made a shambles of The Starburst Series and won the \$10,000 Final with a 1:58.4 clocking under the guidance of Steve Warrington. Marty Allen and Mae Jean's Crown were awesome in the Progress Trotting Series winning the \$10,000 final easily in 2:01.2.

A pair of female pacing series were taken by upsets. Marland Michele, with Preston Burris, Jr. was a 2:02.1 winner in The Starlet while Ken McNutt ushered Meadowmate to the Princess Series \$10,000 final in 2:00.3. The Sidelwheeler Series final was cancelled after Goldcreek Scooter won two legs and Jordache (Rob Anderson, Jr.) took another.

During late summer, Racing Secretary Fred Greenly programed several series for 2 year olds. Abductor proved to be the best during The Cadet Series for colt pacers winning the final in 2:01.2 for Jim Larente, Jr. Bobby reeser, who enjoyed his finest season ever, drove Oxford Jlie to a fast closing 2:02.2 victory in the \$10,000 Coquette Series.

Reeser also took the main event in the fillies and mares late closer, The Ingens Series romping to a 1:57.3 verdict in the final. Joe Hundertpfund, Jr. purchased Traffic Director during mid season and received a quick dividend taking the \$10,000 final of The Co Star Series in 1:58.2.

Season long favorite Ramshackle Dave repeated as winningest horse of the season. Whitey Moore was the regular driver for owner-trainer Joe Muzzi and they visited the winner's circle 10 times after making the journey 9 times in 1983. Dino Episcopo's hard hitting Mecklenburg was a 9 time winner this meet while his veteran John Lightfoot joined another 9 year old, Lucky Turn scoring 7 wins each on the trot.

This was the season in which Delaware favorite Perky Fiddler came into his own. Trainer Bruce Saunders, and wife Anne-Lis, who own the late blooming son of Gypsy Fiddle watched the 5 year old join the premier pacers at the track and score 7 magic mile victories during the season to register 12 career 2:00 or faster wins becoming the all time champion 2 minute winner in track history. He was later chosen "Horse of the Year" by the U.S. Harness Writers Assoc. Chapter.

Duke of Talbot, Cheryl's Beth, Barton Lobell, Camden Katie, Scarlet Attraction and the ever improving trotter Pizelle were only a few of the upper class horses that proved to be big fan favorites all season long.



In The Pocket

George Sholy, 52, one of harness racing's premier horsemen, has been voted into the U.S. Harness Writers' Association's Living Hall of Fame. The writers also elected veteran journalist Larry Evans a member of the Writers' Corner of the Hall of Fame.

Sholy, followed the classic path up the ladder of harness racing advancement. He continued his family's tradition in the sport while growing up in Indiana, then served as second trainer for Tom Winn and Gene Sears at Midwest ovals. Sholy later went on his own and shifted his base of operations to the New York circuit, where he won both several driving titles and a reputation as a master sulky tactician.

In recent years, Sholy has focused on developing Grand Circuit caliber horses, and at the beginning of 1984 he signed as private trainer for the classy stock of Castleton Farm. Champion trotters and pacers associated with Sholy over the years include Sonsam, Rivaltime, Romeo Hanover, Songcan,

reduction of 1 3/5 seconds from the previous female standard.

The colt Cornstalk became the fastest trotter of all-time when he toured the track at Springfield in 1:53.4, only to have the filly Fancy Crown equal the mark the very next day over the same oval.

Like Sholy, Evans is a native of Indiana. He started his harness racing journalism career using the pen name "Dan Patch," in The Washington (D.C.) TimesHerald. The high school season is over, but two Lake Forest Cross-country runners did very well against older runners, in a Saturday test.

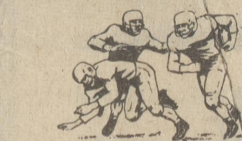
One hundred competitors toed the starting line, at the Kent County Parks and Recreation 10,000 meter run, held at Killen's Pond State Park.

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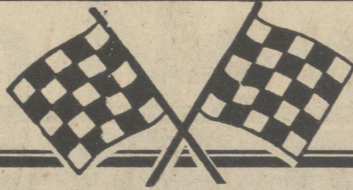

Robert Yates joins DiGard Racing Company

The popular Robert Yates, builder of DiGard power plants for the past decade, recently signed a long-term employment agreement with the DiGard Racing Company.

The recent departure of Doug Hess from the engine company headed by Yates started the rumor-mill churning and has led to speculation that there was instability within the organization.

Controversy had surrounded Yates during the first half of the 1984 season due to an agreement which saw the DiGard Engine Development Company build racing motors for the Mike

Curb/Richard Petty team in addition to the Miller High Life-sponsored Buick Regals driven by Bobby Allison.

"It certainly put a strain on relationships and when that arrangement was dissolved back in July, it was a definite relief," said Yates. "But, no matter how you look at it, we were able to win an additional two races with Richard in the Curb car and it provided us the opportunity to learn some for next year."

Yates stated the current plans for 1985 include a concentrated effort to,

put Bobby Allison and the Miller High Life/DiGard Buick in the winner's circle and take the championship. We'll continue our support program in development of engines for Ken Ragan and possibly for Greg Sacks, Doug Hevron and maybe a few others."

"Most people don't realize that I had built engines for Bobby before we came together at DiGard," said Yates. "I was building the engines for Junior Johnson in 1972 when Bobby won 17 races and finished in the top-ten 27 times when he drove for that team."

Allison supports current NASCAR point system

Bobby Allison, the defending NASCAR Winston Cup champion and driver of the Miller High Life/DiGard Buick, supports the current points system used to determine the series' champion.

"Some of the guys are bickering about the system, but what they are really doing is crying the blues," said Allison. "The current system is a good one," said Allison. "You're awarded for

consistency and if a guy runs consistent these days, he's also going to win his share of races."

One driver suggested that total wins and earnings be considered in crowning the coveted championship.

"That suggestion is ridiculous," said Allison. "It would be unfair, especially to new competitors. If a guy is not on the Winner's Circle Plan he can't pick

up that bonus and wouldn't have a chance at the championship.

"If total wins for the year was the determining factor, that could prove to be costly for fan appeal," said Allison. "It could open the door to allow a driver who doesn't run all the schedule to win the national championship. People at each race should have the opportunity to see the champion in action."

1984 Winston Western 500

PIT CHAMPIONS -- Benny Parsons' team won its third pit crew contest of the year on Nov. 18th at Riverside International Raceway to capture the 1984 Ingersoll-Rand National Pit Crew Championship.

In the closest finish in the six-year history of the competition, Parsons' team edged Harry Gant's team by just two points, 272 to 270, to win the \$30,000 title.

Entering Riverside, Gant's crew held an eight-point lead. Headed by crew chief Travis Carte, Gant's crew earned \$15,000 from Ingersoll-Rand's \$50,000 point fund.

Despite a ninth place finish in the Riverside pits, Bill Elliott's crew hung on to win the \$5,000 third place prize.

Early in the season, Parsons' crew, led by crew chief Cliff Champion, won at Atlanta in March to move into second place in points. By July, they had fallen to eighth place, but a second at Pocono, a fifth at Michigan and a fourth at Darlington moved them back to third place by September.

By finishing the season with victories in the last two pit crew rounds at Charlotte and Riverside, Champion and his men moved past Cale Yarborough's and Gant's crews to win the title.

CLIFF HANGER -- Crew Chief, Cliff Champion, gave a blow by blow account of the Riverside Race. "The title came right down to the wire."

With about 40 laps to go Benny lost third gear while running a strong fourth. "We had a spare transmission ready but luckily we didn't have to install it," said Champion.

"Then with 28 laps to go, the left-rear tire started to leak. We had to make an unscheduled tire change. That put us behind Harry."

"During the last yellow-flag stop, though, we beat him out of the pits, so we pulled out a slim lead."

"...with ten laps to go the car started to overheat. We were sweating about that motor burning up right down to the last lap."

By winning the tenth and final round of the Ingersoll-Rand Pit Crew Championship, Parsons' crew takes a total of \$32,500 home.

"What it boils down to is that each second that we beat Gant's team by was worth about \$2500 to us."

BIG BET -- \$50,000 was on the line in the pits Sunday at Riverside -- \$30,000 to the winner of the 1984 Ingersoll-Rand Pit Crew Championship and \$20,000 to the winner of a bet between rival car owners Johnny Hayes and Hal Needham, who back drivers Benny Parsons and Harry Gant.

"I bet Hal that, stop for stop, our crew would be faster than his when the chips were down," said Hayes.

By beating Needham's men in the pits by 13.25 seconds after five stops, Hayes and his crew left Riverside with both the Championship and Needham's money.

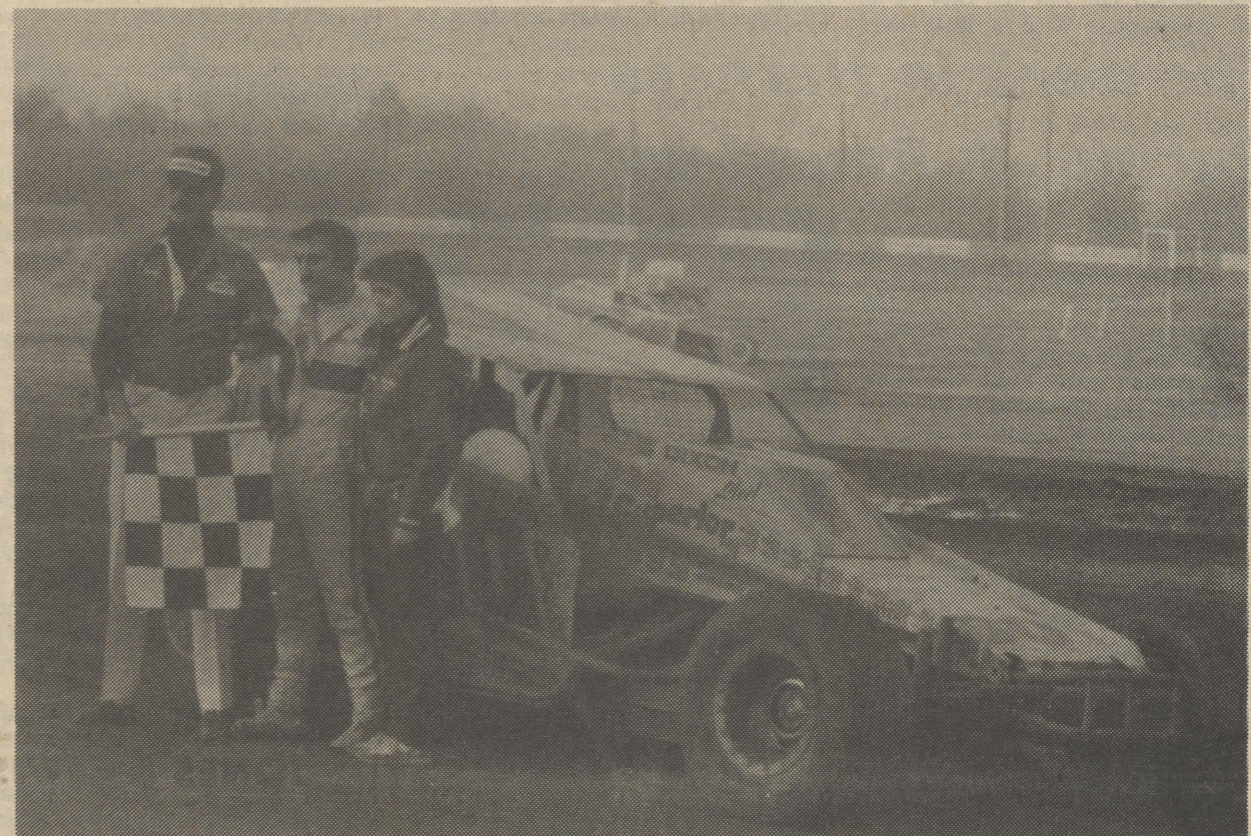

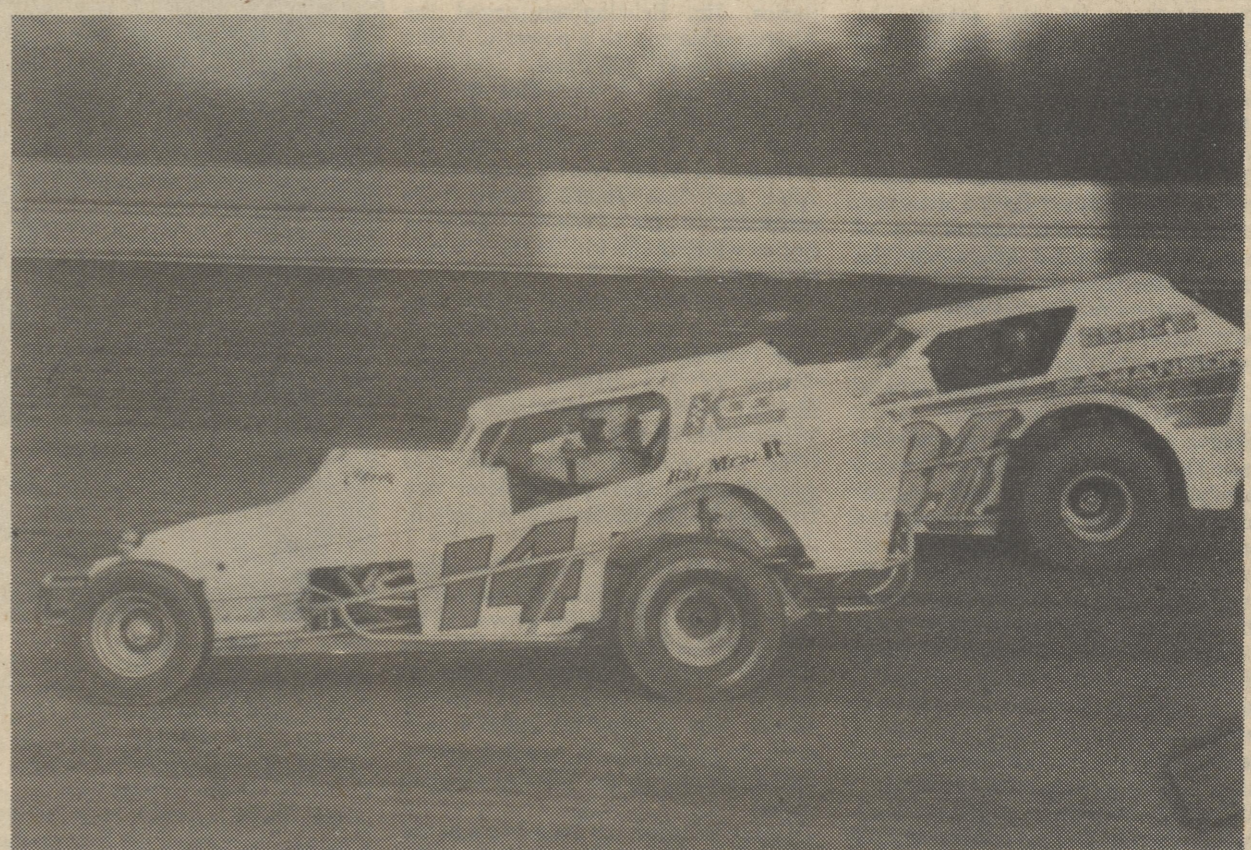

Bridgeville Historical Society plans expansion of "Annual Christmas in Bridgeville"

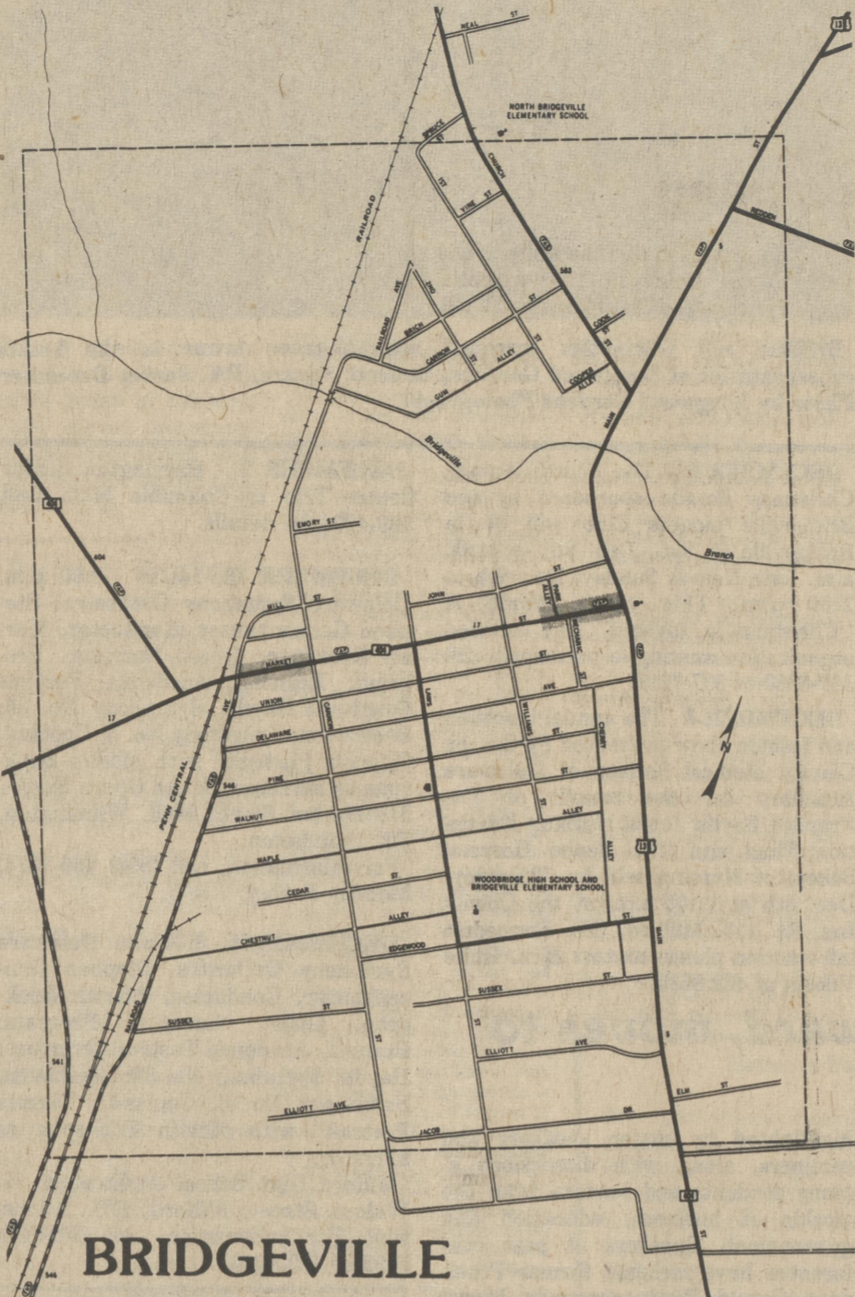
The Bridgeville Historical Society's "Christmas in Bridgeville" committee is planning an expansion of their ninth annual Christmas craft show.

Woodbridge student wins local Century III award, moves to State Competition

Miss Carole Fleetwood, a senior at Woodbridge Junior/Senior High School, has been named the school's top Century III Leader according to Mr. John A. Leone, Principal.

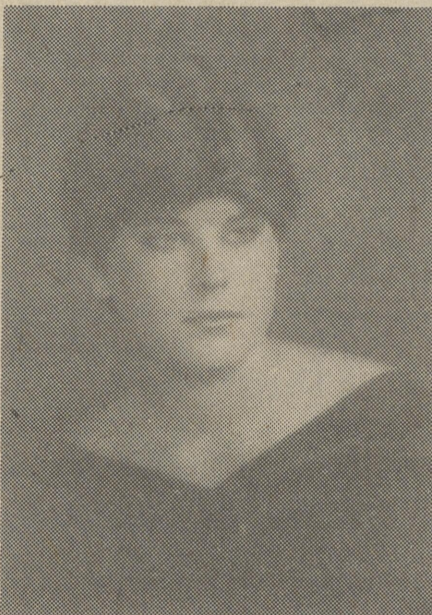

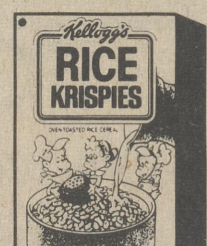
